Congress is puzzled by surplus products production. Some folks, suggest that the Government might interest itself in helping farmers market their surplus products.

Charles Williams, who ought to know something about conservatism, says: "No; that problem should be left to farmers without government help." A two-month-old baby might be left to put on his own little shirt "without mommer's help." Farmers would be as well able to deal with foreign governments, under our Constitution, or with foreign problems, as a baby would be to deal with its own nourishment and clothing.

To learn how farmers can be helped and surplus products sold at a profit they might find out what the British do with their surplus rubber products. There is a rubber farm surplus. And you notice that they manage to sell it to the United States at a dollar a pound, when it could be sold profitably at thirty cents a pound. A government that wants to do a thing can do it.

The railroad trainmen, hundreds of thousands of faithful workers, ask for better pay, and ought to get it. Railroads, protected by government, enjoy prosperity. Steadily increasing, they should divide prosperity with the men that do the work through the nights in cold and rain, on those that collect dividends at home.

Our Americans, especially business men and money makers, should demand that good workmen get their share of national prosperity. The rich man can get only his share of what the average man has to do.

Government figures show that from 1920 to 1924, "automobiles killed" 10,76 men, women and children. In 1925 the "death toll" numbered 11,528.

Accustomed to give the false and misleading impression that the automobile in itself is a dangerous, deadly demon, these figures are NOT true facts.

Of the sixty-odd thousand killed in five years some were the victims of stupid reckless or drunken drivers, some of incompetents. The greater number killed were victims of their own carelessness, commonly described as "jay-walking" when a man on the railroad track killed, nobody blames the locomotive or suggests suppressing railroads. The signs read, "Stop, look, listen," and "Keep off the tracks."

The Colorado River, put to work used, will add hundreds of millions yearly to the wealth of the United States.

It will supply several Western states with more than a million horsepower, and irrigation sufficient to provide food for tens of millions of human beings.

The real wealth and future happiness of this country will gain from a single project of science and constructive statesmanship more than it would from finding mines unlimited.

John Hulbert killed 140 human beings, his total profit on the killings was \$18,200. His line is not that of an ordinary holdupman for he is Sing's public executioner, and time he straps a man into the State pays \$130. It seems \$130 for work that lasts half

HERALD HAS BEEN PUBLISHED EIGHT YEARS

With this issue of the Herald, we start on another year. The Herald was started at old Ochiltree eight years ago and after being published by several different owners, was purchased by Brazell Brothers who published it at Ochiltree for about a year before moving to Perryton when this town was started in 1919. In the fall of 1920, the Herald plant was destroyed by fire. Brazell Brothers immediately put in a modern up to the minute shop but it was too late to the machinery house in the spring of 1921. On April, 1921 the Herald name and subscription list was purchased by the Stewart Printing Co. composed of Paul F. Stewart and the present owner of the Herald, and to the job equipment already owned by the Stewart Printing Co. was added a line up of modern newspaper equipment. In October 1923, the interests of Paul F. Stewart was purchased by the present owner.

The Herald has always stood for the upbuilding of Perryton, Ochiltree County and the surrounding territory. We have had our ups and downs with the latter in the majority, we've made many mistakes and will make many more. The people as a whole have been very loyal in their support. The same rule applies in Perryton as in every town and that is that the live merchants of the town are those whose advertisements are found regularly in the home paper.

OUR ELECTRIC RATES ARE LOWER

A COMPARISON OF OUR ELECTRIC CURRENT RATES WITH PAMPA'S CORPORATION OWNED PLANT

We have heard a number of Perryton citizens remark that we should sell our municipal light and water plant to some of the larger utility corporations. For the benefit of all, we publish the following comparison of the new reduced rates which have recently been put in effect by the Southwestern Utility Co. at Pampa and the present rates now in effect here in Perryton.

Another thing to take into consideration is the fact that with a private owned light and water plant, between \$2,000.00 and \$3,000.00 would have to be raised by taxation every year to pay for current used for street lighting and for rental of fire hydrants. During the past year approximately \$2500.00 of water and light revenue was transferred to the general fund of the City of Perryton to help defray general expenses of city government. This amount would have to be raised by taxation if we had a private owned plant. During the past year a large sum, from the earnings of the plant, has been expended in making extensions.

BETTER GASOLINE FLOW IN NEW FORDS

Redesigning Ford cars with lengthened cowl, which permitted the installation of the gasoline tank between the instrument board and dash, has not only made possible new features of comfort and convenience, but has actually increased the efficiency of the fuel system as well. The gravity flow delivery of gasoline to the carburetor as applied to Ford cars has long been recognized as the most simple and positive in action. The fuel line runs direct from the tank to the carburetor eliminating any necessity of carrying a small tankful of gas on the engine side of the dash. And now this system has been made even more efficient and in addition, all features are instantly accessible for adjustment.

In the first place, the gasoline tank, which is under the cowl and back of the dash in all types except the Fordor, holds a larger supply of fuel than formerly. Then, too, the supply is now held so high above the carburetor that no matter how steep the grade or how low the supply, the motor will receive its fuel.

The accessibility of the new installation will be appreciated most by those who have at sometime received dirty gasoline and gasoline in which water had condensed. The gasoline sediment bulb, handily located just above the carburetor on the engine side of the dash, provides a means for easily cleaning the line and removing all foreign matter.

Driver and all passengers may remain undisturbed in their seats when the tank is being filled, as the intake is located under a cover similar in location and appearance to a cowl ventilator. Hence there is no possibility of leakage inside the car from the gas station filler hose and the danger of fumes in the car is entirely removed. Any accidental spillage is carried instantly to the ground through a specially designed spillway.

PURE SEED MAKES GOOD YIELD

Practically the whole community around Slaton, Texas, according to Mr. D. F. Eaton, County Agent of Lubbock County, is buying its supply of pure seed of dwarf yellow milo from I. J. Thornton, Lubbock County club boy, who grew 5,250 pounds of milo heads or 70 bushels per acre on three acres in the Lubbock County boys contest last year. His total profit on the three acres was \$311.31 not including a free trip to the International Show at Chicago which was awarded him by the Santa Fe Railway for having produced the winning yield, "I. J." who is 15 years of age is in high school and making record grades, according to Mr. Eaton's report, and this was his third year as a club member, he having previously made the State teams in grain and stock judging contests. He used seeds from the pureline selection, T. S. No. 670, developed on the Lubbock Experiment Station and furnished to him through his County Agent. This is a very good example, thinks Mr. Eaton, of the fact that higher yields are secured by planting improved seed, and is a good illustration of the progress that has been made in the development of high yielding strains of grain sorghums by the Experiment Station; and the keen demand for seed from this prize winning crop indicates the growing popularity of pure seeds among progressive farmers.

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

"He Who Finds Gold Dies in the Almshouse"

He was a Swiss adventurer, born in Germany, schooled in the French army and a member of a band of trappers who crossed the western plains to California in 1838. There the Spanish governor Juan Alvarado, made him a general and presented him with 11 square leagues of land upon which he built, at the junction of the American river and the Sacramento, a fort which he named Fort New Helvetia.

With an army of 50 men as a garrison, he dwelt here in feudal state, ruling over thousands of Indians who cultivated his broad acres of wheat, tended his vineyards or cared for his herds of 12,000 cattle, 10,000 sheep and 2,000 horses and mules. Governor Michelmoreau, Alvarado's successor, presented him with an additional 11 square leagues of land and so Gen. John A. Sutter was truly a "monarch of all he surveyed."

Then on January 24, 1848, Capt. James W. W. Marshall, employed by Sutter to build a sawmill at Coloma up the American river, found in the sands some shining particles. He told Sutter about it and although they tried to keep secret the discovery of gold, the news leaked out. One day in May a man walked down the streets of San Francisco holding aloft a bottle of shining dust and shouting, "Gold! Gold! Gold from the American river!"

The news depopulated San Francisco. Sailors deserted their ships in the harbor. A tide of gold-mad humanity surged around Fort New Helvetia or Fort Sacramento, as it was also called. The Swiss "king's" stores were looted by reckless adventurers who soon followed the first adventurers; his live stock was stolen; his lands were overrun by squatters.

"He who finds gold will die in the almshouse." So runs an old Spanish proverb. Gen. John A. Sutter learned the bitter truth of that. California became a part of the United States and the titles given by the Spanish governors were no longer recognized. He appealed to the United States courts for recompense and justice. For awhile he was given a monthly pension of \$250 but relinquished this bounty after receiving it 14 years. Enslattered and poverty-stricken he went east and settled in the little town of Little, Pa. There he died in 1880.

Fort New Helvetia, Sutter's Fort, is now the city of Sacramento, the capital of California.

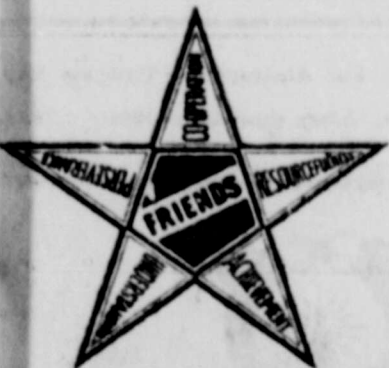

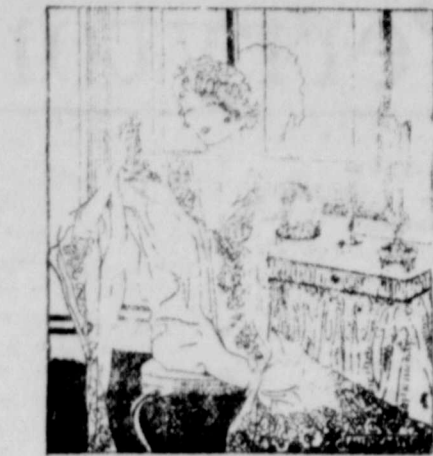

DID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK

By Edson R. Waite, Secretary, Shawnee, Okla., Board of Commerce
Paul Shoup, Executive Vice President of the Southern Pacific Company, says:

THAT the real problem that confronts us is the maintenance of an adequate revenue for our railroad transportation system, not necessarily as a matter of justice to the owners, which ought to be considered, but as a matter of vital necessity to the people of this country, in order that this transportation system may be maintained.

THAT to maintain the transportation system and standard of service required by the best interests of industry and commerce, the steam railway transportation system of this country ought to spend a billion dollars a year for equipment, new facilities and improvements.

THAT new facilities and improvements cannot be provided if revenues are inadequate.

THAT freight rates are relatively small items in the retail prices of staple articles of consumption and in no sense do they control these prices.

THAT the price of oranges per box in New York last year varied within one week more than the entire transportation cost to bring these oranges from California, of lemons more than one and one-half, and of cantaloupes substantially one and one-half the transportation cost.

THAT while slight changes in freight rate levels are of relative unimportance in the prices of commodities, they have a most important effect on the ability of a railroad to maintain itself as a sound, going concern, and its ability to make those expenditures for facilities necessary to adequate and efficient service.

DOCTORING YOURSELF

I cannot think of anything that is a greater menace to your physical welfare, than the hour when you attempt to diagnose your own disease, and set out to buy a ready-made cure for it. You could hardly assume a task that is fraught with greater danger.

There is little of "magic" in common sense. A human being who does not know how to keep from getting sick, is a mighty poor proposition to take care of his own ailments when he does get sick. Yet there are dozens of people in most communities, who attempt to cure themselves upon that hypothesis, that they know is wrong when they exercise reason.

The profession of medicine is an honorable one, however unscrupulous some of its adherents may be. There are pirates on all seas where easy victims are afloat; and the most villainous is the buccaner who preys on the sick and afflicted, under the disguise of respectability. And, there are people who are ever ready to sing the praises of "cure-alls" and furnish their photographs to clinch the evidence. Is that any valid reason why the stuff is good for you?

Most any kind of testimony can be bought for the price these days, from the people who sell them. A good thing to remember is, that every ache or pain has a definite cause beneath it. And, unless you know what this cause is, and exactly how to remove it, you had better leave treatment to somebody who does know. Even a good physician when he is sick, and his judgement likely to be erroneous, will call his neighbor physician to help him out. No good doctor will trust his health or that of his family to the mercies of the exploiter of the bottled nostrum. He knows the value of prudence in the vital matter of caring for the sick.

SCHOLASTIC LEAGUE
MEET AT CANYON IN APRIL

Amarillo, Texas
April 20, 1926
To All Members of the League:
The District Meet will be held this
year on April 23-24 at the West Tex-
State Teachers College, Canyon,
Tex. Our meet last year was reas-
onably successful, but we feel that
there is much room for improvement;
plans are being made to secure

greater progress and efficiency.
As many of the following changes
as possible will be effected:
(1) Boys' and Girls' Debates will
be conducted simultaneously, extend-
ing over both days of the meet finals
on Saturday evening.
(2) Declamations in the City
School Division will be held in the
College Auditorium and the Rural
School Division in the auditorium of
the new Methodist Church. There
will be preliminaries and semi-finals

in both divisions—the declaimers will
be divided into groups of six or eight
for the preliminaries, the best two
in each group being selected; and
then all except three will be elimina-
ted in the semi-finals. No declaimers
will be required to speak in recita-
tion rooms. Supt. D. D. Jackson of
Dalhart will conduct the contests in
declamation in the city school divi-
sion, and Supt. E. H. Hunter of
Claude will have charge of the rural
school section. Finals in all declama-
tion contests will be held in the Col-
lege Auditorium Friday evening.
(3) Contests in Extemporaneous
Speech will be supervised by Supt.
C. H. Dillehay of Hereford. He will
probably use the auditorium of the
new Presbyterian Church. Prelimin-
aries will be conducted on Friday after-
noon and the finals Friday even-
ing.

(4) No material changes are con-
templated in Tennis and Track. We
advise that tennis players and track
contestants do not enter literary
events. Preliminaries in Track events
will be held on Friday afternoon,
finals Saturday afternoon. All ath-
letic questions should be addressed to
Mr. S. D. Burton, Canyon, Texas.

(5) A detailed program will be
printed and distributed during the
first week in April.

(6) A special train to the State
Meet will be operated over the Santa
Fe lines, and Mr. P. N. Montgomery
of Amarillo will be in charge of the
train. Separate Pullman coaches for
boys and girls will be in charge of
the train. Separate Pullman coaches

(7) The custom of awarding cups

CHANGING OF MODELS
CAUSES BIG LOSS

Modern automotive engineering
and science have so perfected the
chassis of the fine motor car that the
prospective owner is practically as-
sured of years of perfect performan-
ce with only slight servicing. Build-
ers of coachwork, keeping pace with
engineers, have developed bodies which
retain beauty of finish and interior
design for practically the life of the
chassis. Yet despite the advance of
this state of perfection in automo-
bile building, each year sees thou-
sands of truly fine cars made obso-
lete long before their time by the
periodic introduction of "new models"
which by inference label the existing
line as antique.

In addition to the embarrassment
occasioned by driving a motor car
which has been branded as out of
date, the owner of the car of dis-
continued model suffers no incon-
siderable financial loss through this
change. It has been estimated by au-
tomotive economists that a new model
drives down the value of the pre-
ceding car 40 per cent—even though
the "old car" be only a month old.
A second change occasions a 20 per
cent reduction and each subsequent
change 10 per cent.

When the Lincoln Motor Com-
pany became a division of the Ford
Motor Company, a body policy was
adopted by the company designed to
protect purchasers of Lincoln cars
from artificial depreciation result-
ing from periodic changes in model.
This policy, is outlined in a state-
ment made public by the Lincoln Mo-
tor Company as follows:

"All Lincoln body types originate
from custom designs created by Am-
erica's foremost body builders—
Brunn, Judkins, Districh, LaBaon,
Holbrook, Locke, Willoughby and
others. Each is treated separately
and is striking in the individuality.

types; produced under the supervi-
sion of the Lincoln Motor Company
and permitting a substantial savings
in cost to the purchaser.

SAYS STATE SCHOLASTIC
SHOULD BE INCREASED

Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 23.—The
state scholastic per capita appor-
tionment should be increased \$2.00
per child for each succeeding biennium
until it reaches \$24.00, says Presi-
dent J. M. Bledsoe of the Texas State
Teachers Association. It is absolute
folly to expect Texas to guarantee an
efficient system of public free schools
for even a short period of six months
as provided in the Texas Constitu-
tion upon an apportionment insuffi-
cient to maintain such a system, he
declares. Four dollars per month per
child is a reasonable basis for com-
puting school costs.

Securing a \$14.00 per capita ap-
portionment for the 1926-27 school
term is the most immediate problem
for the state to solve. Only \$12.00 per

capita is in sight for 1926-27 unless
relief comes through appropriations
by the Thirty-ninth Legislature in
special session or by the prompt ac-
tion of the Fortieth Legislature.
Scores of schools will be unable to
run for six months this year, and
1926-27 terms will be much less if
only \$12.00 per child is available.

Legislation looking to the ulti-
mate reconstruction of public school
education in Texas is to be urged by
the Texas State Teachers Associa-
tion for approval by the Fortieth Le-
gisature. The Association has accep-
ted the invitation to assist the legis-
lative committee of the Texas School
Survey Commission in formulating the
proposed legislation. This commit-
tee, authorized by the Thirty-
eighth Legislature, is composed of
Hon. Pat Neff, Tom Flinty, Jr., and
T. D. Brooks.

The Texas Educational Commis-
sion is being formed by the Texas
State Teachers Association, and will
include representatives of all educa-
tional and economic groups of the
state, to plan a program for educa-
tional progress in Texas.

FACULTY COMMENT

Students in the eleventh grade should not forget that a scholarship is to be awarded at the close of school. This scholarship will go to the high school graduate who has the highest average for the year. It may be used in some college of this state next year and will go a long way in making it possible for some one to attend college who might not otherwise be in position to attend a college. Certainly this is something worth striving for.

In looking over the attendance records of the high school students it is found that several have perfect records in this respect. This sort of record is very much in favor of the student making it as it is noted that, as a rule, the student with a good attendance record, also has a good achievement record. Usually consistent and thorough work characterize a perfect attendance record. It is a safe bet that a student with a poor attendance record is "down in his work." One would hardly expect it to be otherwise.

Considering the number in the Perryton School, there has been very little interference with the school work on account of sickness. Of course a few have been kept out of school on this account, but the number is not very noticeable at any one time. We may consider ourselves rather fortunate this winter with such a small amount of sickness among the students.

A new feature of the "School News" each week in the future will be a "School Calendar." It is intended to carry in this calendar any and all events, programs, games, entertainments, plays, etc., that will be held the following week. This will be done for the convenience of the school and

the public generally as it has been a little trouble to make connection with such things in the past on account of not having the dates well fixed in mind. When a number of events are to be had in succession, it often causes confusion unless one has a schedule for reference. The calendar is intended to keep things straight. Let us hope that it does.

We often wonder if the "School News" is hitting the mark as we should like it to do. When we make this statement, we mean to say that the School News is intended to keep the patrons and the public at least fairly well informed on the school happenings and also to give them some idea of the management and policy of the school as a whole. Patrons may get the opinions of the teachers on certain things from time to time and thereby be able to work in closer relation to the school. The "Faculty Comment" is meant to give an open, honest expression concerning some of the important things that directly touch the educational welfare of the child. Teachers are not always able to have a free and frank discussion with the parents and this method may serve to give some understanding in the matter. At least the purpose of it is good and we should all take it as an honest effort in the right direction.

What we need at the present time is more of a "real appreciation" of the opportunity to get an education. When one takes his schooling as a matter of course, or a mere routine matter to be followed at a certain stage of life, he is missing the real point to his education. The spirit that prompts him and the need that he feels for it are the things that count. There must be a vision and a goal before one is properly guided in getting an education.

The Vocational Agriculture Class is paying attention to spring gardening at the present time and it looks as though the boys are learning to "finger-in-the dirt" a little bit. Experimenting is a part of the game and, as one old general in history said, "I have some cabbages in my garden which I raised with my own hand," is a mighty good way to show how the thing is done. The brain and the hand make a mighty good combination when it comes to raising a garden.

The past week marked the close of the fifth month of school. The school has now progressed far enough to give a good indication as to what the students are doing in their work. It is not hard to tell which way the wind is blowing so far as passing grades is concerned. It is high time that some students are bestirring themselves if they expect to get promoted this year. Nothing short of hard work every day and all the way

will save them in the end. Certainly those who have the chance will have the ambition and the determination to make the most of it.

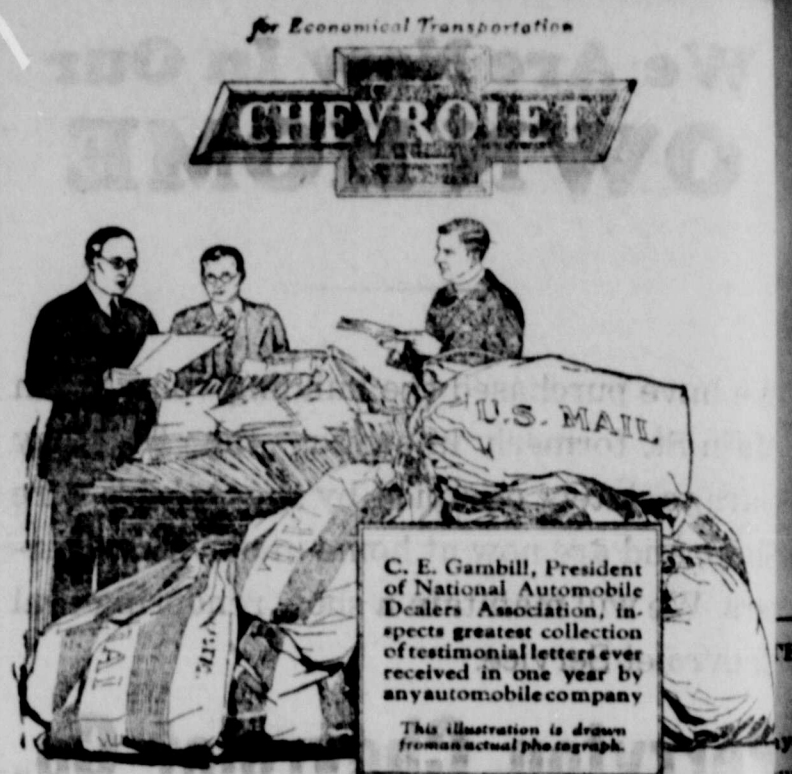
