Man Known Here Stabbing-Victim In California

Michael B. Sullivan, 21, grandson of Mrs. C. M. Moseley, is hospitalized in Anaheim, California, with critical injuries he received on Tuesday night, August 10.

Sullivan, son of Zelda Ruth Moseley Sullivan of Austin, was stabbed in the chest and thigh after being attacked on an Anaheim street. He underwent heart surgery to repair the damage and is still in intensive care.

A witness to the stabbing said the young victim was driving on a downtown street when a car pulled alongside with four young men and a woman inside.

They began cursing Sullivan "because he was wearing a cowboy hat," a passenger in the auto said. When the autos stopped at a traffic light a long-haired man, about 20 years old, leaped out of the auto and attacked Sullivan, who had also got out of his car.

After falling down with the critical wounds, Sullivan was able to get up and back into his auto.

Anaheim hospital officials reported that another young man was wounded under similar conditions a week before.

Mrs. Sullivan is in California with her son, who with his brother, Barry, Jr., is employed there.

Rain, Rain, Rain Welcomed Here

More rainfall was received in the Santa Anna area during the past week with three to four inches reported in most of the communities around town. Rain fell each day, Wednesday through Saturday.

Santa Anna had the largest one-day total for the year, officially measuring 2.05 inches on Friday.

The cool and cloudy weather had lasted for three weeks with the exception of a few clear days. Temperatures stayed in the 80s most of the time during the rainy spell.

Although rainfall of about ten inches was received throughout the area, many rural families still have a shortage of water as most of the rainfall was in small amounts and of most benefit to the pastures and fields.

Santa Anna Public School To Begin New Term Monday

The Santa Anna Public Schools will begin the 1971-72 school year with the first day of classes on Monday, August 23. Faculty members spent Monday through Wednesday in San Angelo in the TSSA-sponsored in-service workshop and will be on duty at the school today and tomorrow for faculty workdays. High school students will

register for classes this week and elementary students will be registered on the first day of classes. Senior and junior students will register from 2:00 to 3:30 p.m. Thursday and the sophomores and freshmen will register from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon Friday.

RECORD BUDGET FOR 1971-72 APPROVED BY SCHOOL BOARD

A record \$254,919.00 budget for the Santa Anna Independent School District was approved last week by the Board of Trustees. The public hearing on the proposed budget for 1971-72 will be held on Tuesday, September 14.

The budget for the coming year is \$18,543 over the past year. The increased appropriation includes a \$5,000 increase in payments on bonded indebtedness from the available interest and sinking fund, \$3,500 payment on two new buses, \$5,000 for payment on the proposed vocational building, and \$2,500 as a payment on the new band uniforms.

Another increase in the budget included the local portion for teachers' salaries. Decreased amounts were budgeted for building operation and maintenance.

The new accounting system for the Santa Anna Public Schools was also reviewed at the monthly meeting and final board approval was given the amended budget for the past year.

Jesse Williams, president of the board, led the business session with all members present.

Routine business on the agenda included reading and approval of the minutes and payments of the bills and accounts for July.

Contracts for collecting school district taxes were given as well as approval of collection for delinquent school district taxes.

School insurance was discussed and the board approved.

'71 Fund Drive For C-C Center Starting Soon

The annual drive for Civic Center funds is underway with local and area people invited to take part. Letters with requests for donations will be sent to residents of the community.

Funds from the drive will be used for maintenance, landscaping, a public address system, and additional furnishings. The large center is already furnished adequately for many activities and much improvement has been done during the past year.

The new community center was used about 80 times during the year and is available at a small cost for private and approved public functions.

Square dance clubs in the community are planning to purchase and install playground equipment at the center and other individuals and groups have made other designated donations.

Memberships to the sustaining group for the center are \$5.00 a year and donations above that are welcomed.

The former armory building was purchased two years ago for use as a community center and is a fine addition to the city and community.

The little girl was playing in the yard of the Dockery home when the cat bit her. The Dockerys suspected the cat had rabies and had the test made in Austin Wednesday.

Lynn is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Dockery of Trickham and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Blackwell of Coleman, formerly of Rockwood.

The confirmed case of rabies is the second in the Rockwood area this summer. A rabid fox was killed at the A. D. Eppler's last month after it attacked a dog in the Eppler yard.

Coleman County has been approved for funds for livestock water reservoirs under the Emergency Conservation Measures program.

The purpose of this practice is to provide adequate livestock water at sites where due to the current drought, livestock water facilities have failed.

This practice is applicable to enlargement, rehabilitation including removal of silt or sealing, and construction, where more practicable, of dams, pits, or ponds on pasturelands in drought disaster areas to provide water for livestock.

This practice is applicable only where the County Committee determines on an individual farm basis that drought conditions still exist which justify performance of the practice.

All pond sites will be checked by an employee of the County Committee before approval by the County Committee.

The cost will be \$176 per cubic yard of dirt moved in the construction of the pond, plus 80% of the cost of the work involving removal of silt. Reservoirs started prior to July 28, 1971, or completed after September 30, 1971, are not eligible for cost share.

The County Committee will continue to operate the tanking or pond practice under the REAP with cost share at \$11 per cubic yard.

Farmers and ranchers needing ponds should make applications immediately.

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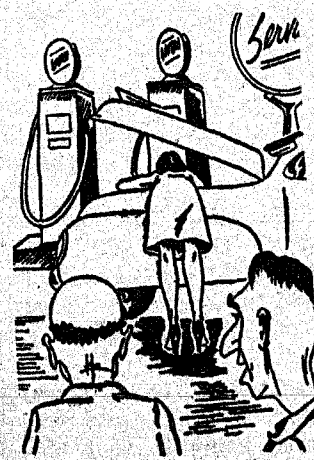

Coleman County has been approved for funds for livestock water reservoirs under the Emergency Conservation Measures program.

The purpose of this practice is to provide adequate livestock water at sites where due to the current drought, livestock water facilities have failed.

This practice is applicable to enlargement, rehabilitation including removal of all or sealing, and construction, where more practicable, of dams, pits, or ponds on pasturelands in drought disaster areas to provide water for livestock.

This practice is applicable only where the County Committee determines on an individual farm basis that drought conditions still exist which justify performance of the practice.

All pond sites will be checked by an employee of the County Committee before approval by the County Committee.

The cost will be \$176 per cubic yard of dirt moved in the construction of the pond, plus 80% of the cost of the work involving removal of silt. Reservoirs started prior to July 28, 1971, or completed after September 30, 1971, are not eligible for cost share.

The County Committee will continue to operate the tanking or pond practice under the REAP with cost share at \$1.1 per cubic yard.

Farmers and ranchers needing ponds should make applications immediately.

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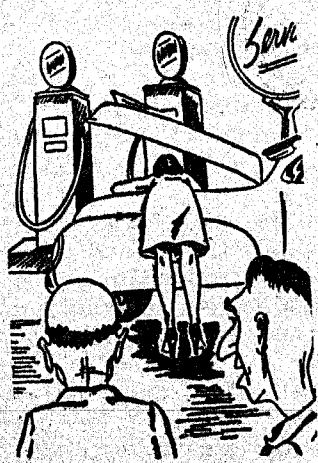
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In Our Opinion

PRICE AND WAGE CONTROLS were a long time coming, but President Nixon finally acted Sunday. That is drastic action but it seemed the only way to control runaway inflation.

Following a series of wage increases, followed naturally by price increases, everything was going out of sight. Those who did not benefit by either were caught in a squeeze, and they had no alternative than to lower their standard of living.

The success of the freeze will depend on the cooperation of business and labor alike, and if they don't work with the president, then he will be forced to put some teeth in the order. As it is now, he is depending upon their cooperation to make it work. But, if it is necessary, that is what he should do.

This column has given President Nixon a hard time recently because he failed to act on many things that we deemed in the interest of the majority of the people. However, we must give every dog his due. This act, we believe, was a good one.

In another area where he has been criticized, the President moved in the interest of the people — that is in the bussing of school students. His recent order to the HEW and the Justice Department, with the threat of doing some firing hanging over their heads, to go easy on their orders to bus school children, in order to achieve racial balance, was long over due. It is in keeping with his campaign promises, and it looked for a long time that he was not going to follow through on it.

Whether we are Democrats or Republicans, Richard Nixon is our president and we should support him every way we can and still have a clear conscience. His decisions should not be viewed from a party standpoint, but from the view of what would be best for the country. However, there are many of his critics who judge him strictly from a political point of view. Some of the more liberal politicians in Washington have gone to the extreme in looking for something to harp about. Much of it is strictly politics and has no basis for their ridicule.

However, this is still a country with free speech and, unlike much of the world, we can still differ with the chief executive publicly. When that right is denied, then we are in big trouble.

Check the history of every totalitarian state in the world. The first thing the group in power did was to throttle the news media. Then came the dictated news releases that said just what they wanted them to, with never a word of criticism.

The next thing they did was to take over the educational system, and put in literature that upheld what they wanted the youth of the land to believe.

As is evident, even in our own country, much of the young are extremely idealistic and more easily swayed with good propaganda than those with a few years of experience behind them. Of course, we need idealistic people, because they are the ones who really push for improvements. However, we need the more conservative ones to balance the scale so that we don't go overboard over every new idea.

That has been the secret of the success of this nation from the beginning. Every individual has the right to express himself. Out of so many and varied beliefs, there can usually emerge a workable idea.

Some large companies have what they call "rapp" sessions where a group get together and everyone says whatever comes to mind. Sometimes an idea that on the surface, looks foolish, develops into something good.

It would be good if all of us would be willing to listen patiently to other people's ideas, then when we pitch them all into the pot, we could probably come up with something good.

Sometimes we sit and listen to someone on television, who, because of his past actions, we don't particularly like, but if we listen and consider what he says, in changes are that there is some area of agreement.

If we can take our areas of agreement and work out then the chances are that somewhere we could find a middle ground that, although not completely to our liking, would be more satisfactory to everyone generally. Wouldn't it be nice if our politicians would take that point of view?

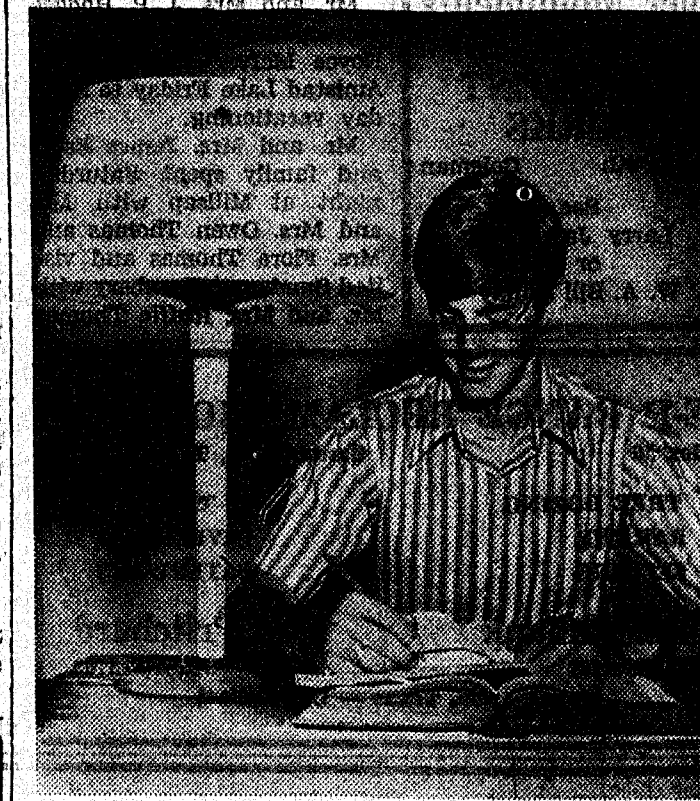
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Coleman County Newsletter

The Coleman County Historical Survey Committee met on August 11 in the office of County Judge Frank Lewis with eight members and several visitors present. A series of slides prepared by the State Highway Department was shown, with pictures of eight historic Texas forts and the country around them. There was also a small display of early Coleman County relics, including old pistols, school bell used at the Needmore school in 1893, antique matchbox, a piece of the barbed wire of the old Redwire pasture of the Day ranch and other things.

During the business session of the committee, there was discussion of an essay contest in schools of the county, a booth at the upcoming county fair, and the placing of historical markers in the county. The committee voted to apply to the commissioner's court for only half the amount of funds which had been granted in the past.

Approval has come from the State Committee for the beautiful marker denoting the Old Military Road which went north to south through the county from about 1850, uniting frontier forts from Belknap on the Brazos to the Rio Grande. This marker will be placed where the road went about three miles east of the Santa Anna Mountains, and will be on the south side of the Highway 67/84; it should arrive in October and a dedication will be held after it is put in place.

This military road followed level valleys as much as possible, staying under the slopes of the gradually rising plateau, crossing the creeks where the banks could be shoveled down without too much work by the sweating privates, going around the little headers and generally bearing a little to the northeast. The worst hazard in the central part of the state was the ford of the Colorado River, called to this day the Military Crossing. This was a poor place with a rock bluff, a steep descent and a rough rock bed, not too difficult for the cavalry but a trial every time for the wagons and teamsters.

The road crossed Home Creek above its confluence with the Mukewater, kept along west of that creek un-

der the flies in terrain, toward a good crossing on the Jim Ned where in 1857 was established Camp Colorado after it was moved from nearer that river. In plain sight three miles to the west, as we have said, were the two hills which were the most famed landmark of the whole Central Texas area, the Santa Anna Mountains.

This Military Road was the safest route for travel, and a number of settlements grew up along it, including Brady City on Brady's Creek and Trickham on the Mukewater. Up and down from fort to

fort went the six-mule wagons of the army, with their loads of guns, ammunition, prisoners and bedding; the six to ten-span teams of oxen hauling corn or hay from the farms of the settlements; and the troops of Texas Rangers on scout, the cluttered wagons of home-seekers, the hacks or spring wagons of the surveyors, the cattle inspectors, the troops of cavalry riding smartly in their own cloud of dust. This way soon became a well-marked route with many ruts in the tall grass.

On July 28, 1857, Colonel Robert E. Lee wrote to his wife in Virginia that he was back at Camp Cooper on the Brazos after riding 800 miles in 40 days. A part of that ride was along the Military Road also referred to as the Fort Mason-Fort Belknap Road, and that may have been one of the times when the famous West Point man, later to command the Southern Armies in the Civil War and to become known as one of the few great tactical leaders of all time, crossed our country.

A vivid description of the travel on this road was given by a settler on Home Creek, Bailey Barton, who was taken there by his family in 1862 at two years of age. He is quoted in "Into The Setting Sun," a book by the late Beatrice Brady Gay of Santa Anna, who interviewed him for the book.

"I always liked to watch the soldiers as they came and went to San Antonio. . . . The Military Road crossed Home Creek near our house." This was when the Bartons were living on lower Home, several years before they located on the site now owned by Frank Crum. Barton went on, "The army had long, heavy-tired wagons drawn by small mules, and it took sixteen mules, four abreast, to a team. There was always at least three wagons at a time, and only one man to each wagon. . . . I never got tired of watching the men unhitch and hitch up the teams. Each mule had a special place, and when they stopped the harness was carefully dropped off just as it came. When they were ready to start, each mule was called by name and told to get in place, which he hastened to do, the teamster would pull the harness up, snap it in place, and the wagon train would be off in no time."

Up and down this famous road went many officers and men soon to win glory on Civil War battlefields; besides the immortal Robert E. Lee and his nephew, Fitzhugh Lee, there were Earl Van Dorn, whose men called him the Dutchman and revered him, Theodore O'Hara, poet and military hero who was the author of the famous elegy, "The Bivouac Of The Dead"; there were Albert Sidney Johnston and Ranald S. MacKenzie and Kirby Smith, John B. Hood, the gallant John S. (Rip) Ford and many more.

It seems fitting here to quote the O'Hara poem. The muffled drum's roll has beat the soldiers' last tattoo; No more on life's parade shall meet that brave and fallen few. On fame's eternal camping ground their silent tents are spread, And Glory guards with solemn round the bivouac of the dead.

Many people have asked me if East Pakistan, where they had the destructive flood last year, and the wars and consequent troubles this year, is near where I lived and where most of my loved ones live.

East Pakistan is far, far away to the south, while I lived in the extreme north of India, nearer to West Pakistan. And all with whom I keep in touch live in the north, the area called Uttar Pradesh, formerly the United Provinces.

But a man who last year married one of my granddaughters is auditor in the Air Force of the Defence Department and at present is stationed in West Bengal, about 100 miles west of Calcutta. In May he wrote, "There are many thousands of refugees fleeing from East Pakistan, all in a most pitiable condition. They have nothing except the few garments they have on, and a few cooking things. The army feeds all who pass by us, and we are planning to build a home for the children."

It is heartening to know soldiers of every nation have a feeling of compassion for refugees, like our own American boys in Korea and Vietnam who generously help those organizations who maintain hospitals, schools and homes for the miserable refugees.

Policy Set For Lunch Program Financial Aid

Supt. Cullen Perry has announced the free and reduced price lunch policy for the Santa Anna school children unable to pay full price for the school lunches.

Families with income scales who are eligible to apply, or are suffering from unusual circumstances, are urged to apply at the school business office.

Application forms will be sent to students and additional copies may be obtained from the school office.

Students qualifying for the reduced price lunches will be charged 20 cents a day under the adopted scale. The full price for the lunches will be charged until applications are approved.

Under the provisions of the policy, the applications will be reviewed and eligibility determined. If a parent is dissatisfied with his ruling, they may request a hearing and appeal the decision to the school board.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in the school office where it may be studied by any interested patron.
