Meeting Scheduled To Explain Guar Program to Farmers

A meeting to explain the use of guar for soil building and as a cash crop will be held at the courthouse in Benjamin Thursday, May 21 at 2:30 p. m., County Agent W. C. Palmeyer announced this week.

Principal speaker will be John A. Esser, plant manager of the General Mills Guar Plant at Kenedy, Texas. For the past several years, the people near Kenedy have turned the soil-building guar into a cash crop, and Mr. Esser will explain this program fully to the people of this area. Mr. Esser will reserve a part of his time for questions related to the crop, and how the program is to be set up.

All farmers of the Knox, Haskell and Baylor area are urged to attend the meeting. The program is specifically designed, Palmeyer said, for those who are interested in raising the productivity of their land by the use of a soil building crop, and also realize a cash return while the soil building is being carried out.

The program is sponsored by the County Agent and the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District.

Guar has been grown in this area, and shows promise of being a legume farmers can depend on, Palmeyer said.

The welders were halted Wednesday because of inclement weather, but steel is now in place and the contractors are moving in crews to run the concrete slabs.

Work on the bridge began in August of last year, but a delay

of three months was caused by a shortage of steel. Herbert Cunningham of Munday, resident engineer for the State Highway Dept. said Wednesday that there will be no more material shortage, and the bridge should be ready for traffic in about six weeks, weather permitting.

The bridge has five 160-foot continuous I Beam spans, a total of 800 feet. According to Cunningham, 400,000 pounds of

steel and 200 yards of concrete will be used in the structure.

In addition to the bridge, the contractors will hard-surface the approaches from the end of the present paving on FM 143 to a distance of 1,000 feet west of the bridge, making the entire job cover a distance of 1,306 miles. The State Highway Department will continue the paving another two miles west.

Collins Named Chairman for Cancer Drive

Rip Collins, secretary of the local Board of Commerce, was named local chairman of the Cancer Crusade by L. A. Parker, Knox County chairman, it was announced this week.

Four students from Knox County will receive their Bachelor of Science degrees from Texas Technological College, Lubbock, at Commencement exercises May 25 at 8 p. m.

The students are Tom Bush Craft, Knox City, majoring in Agronomy; John McGaughey of Benjamin, Agronomy and Farm Machinery; Minna Sue Moorehouse, Benjamin, Commercial Teaching; and James W. Mansfield, Munday, Agricultural Education.

Scheduled to bring the Commencement address at Jones Stadium is Lewis D. Crusoe, vice president of Ford Motor Co. and general manager of the Ford Division, Dearborn, Mich. Mr. Crusoe is responsible for the design, production, pricing, and sale of Ford cars, trucks, parts and accessories.

Tech's graduating class is somewhat smaller than in previous years. The 643 members of the class of 1953 include 505 undergraduate and graduate students who complete requirements in May, and 138 students who finished their work in January.

The Arts and Sciences Division leads in the number of degrees being conferred with a total of 155. Engineering is second with 108, Business Administration third with 98, Agriculture fourth with 76, the Graduate Division next with 42, and the Home Economics Division last with 26.

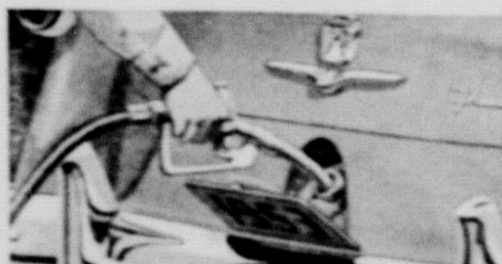

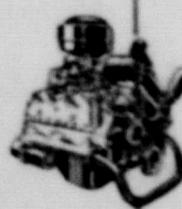

Postmaster Jeff Graham, who returned last week from San Angelo, where he attended the annual convention of the Texas Chapter, National Association of Postmasters, reports that some sweeping may be forthcoming in the Postoffice Dept.

Graham is the newly elected first vice president of the Texas Chapter.

Principal speaker at the convention was Ben H. Guill, formerly of Pampa, who is Executive Assistant to the Postmaster General. Mr. Guill told the group there would be some major policy changes in an effort to give better service in the Department than ever before, but that the postal department would not revert to the spoils system.

Most dramatic step in the reorganization plan, Guill said, is decentralization. By the end of the fiscal year 1954 it is planned to have four semi-autonomous regional offices in operation, and by the end of 1955 the entire nation will be broken down into regions. Decentralization is planned to bring the management of the postal department closer to the patrons, and to help postmasters solve

their local problems without the delays entailed by funneling each request through Washington.

Another item on the program is the consolidation of some postal services, and the elimination of some small offices that have very few patrons. In one section of a North Carolina County, Guill reported, the department found it had nineteen small fourth class offices, all losing money and all giving inadequate service. The offices were eliminated and the patrons served by rural routes and star routes, resulting in a saving of \$25,000 and at the same time giving better service. He indicated that similar programs would be carried out over the nation.

Other items on the agenda include a department to improve personnel relations in the postal service, and another to improve, through publicity, relations with the public. He asked each postmaster to help put the true facts of the postal service before the public.

Pointing out that the Postal Department does not control rates, salaries, or the enormous subsidies it must carry in its budget, the speaker blamed a large part of the deficit in the department to the subsidies on air mail and the handling of

free mail for other departments of the government. He added that only Congress can give the department relief from these burdens.

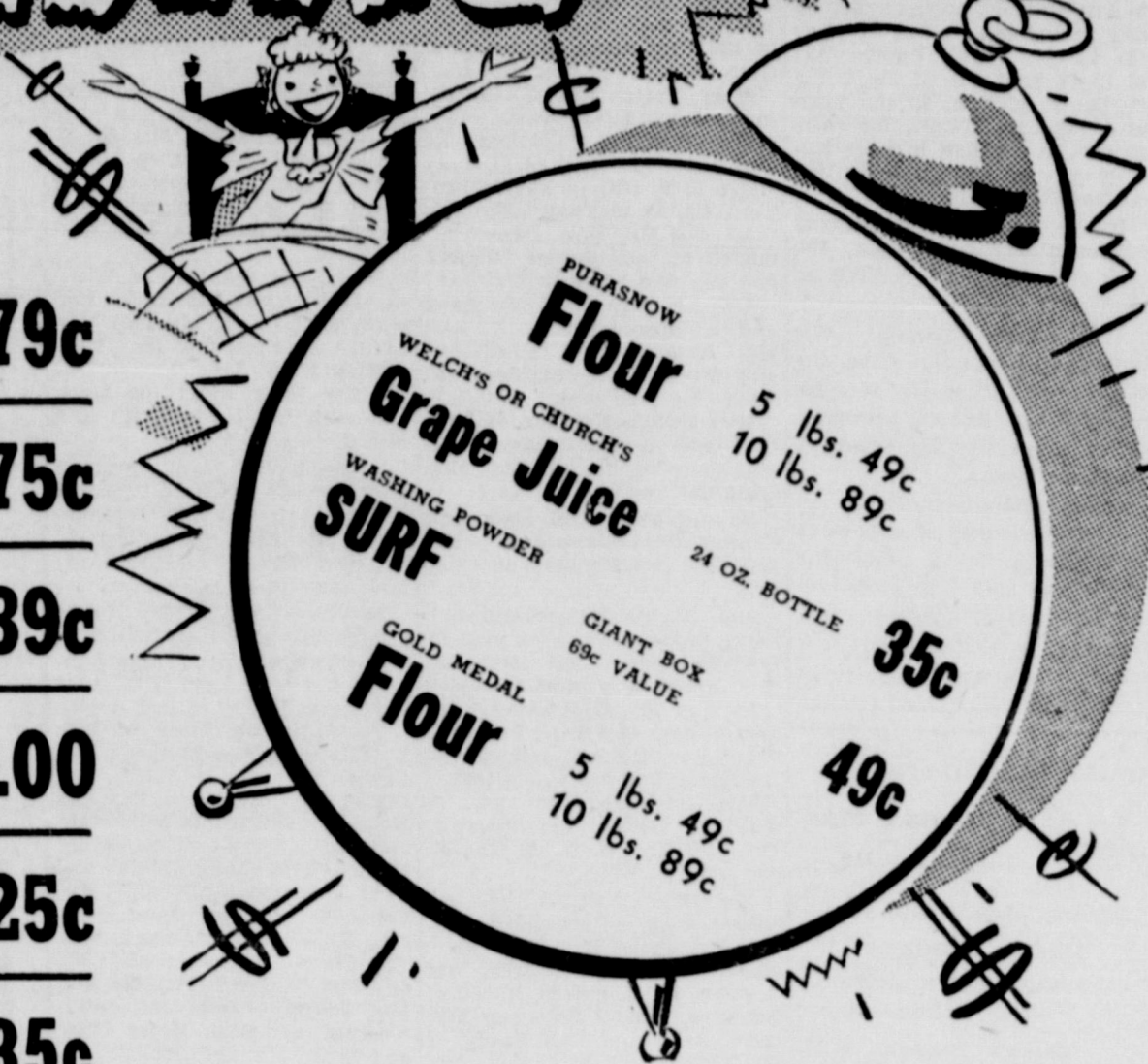
