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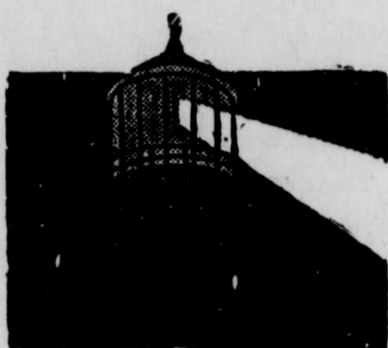

Former Lorraine Man, Ollie Travis Luce, Dies In California July 18

Ollie Travis Luce, 52, died in a Veteran's hospital near Los Angeles, Calif., on July 18.

He was born June 6, 1916 at the home of his grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. N. R. Miles in Lorraine. He attended Lorraine school before moving to Dallas and Fort Worth, and later moved to Manhattan Beach, Calif.

Mr. Luce was a Navy pilot during World War II and later a commercial pilot before his health forced him to retire.

He was buried Tuesday, July 23, in a military service at the Military Cemetery in Manhattan Beach.

Poison Plants In Back Yard

"The summertime beauty of Mitchell County's lush vegetation in yards, fields and pastures also holds dangers that the public should heed," H. N. Smith, State Range Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple, warned this week.

"Chewing, swallowing or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of certain plants, trees and shrubs takes a heavy toll," Mr. Smith said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these sources." Parents should be concerned, the SCS official stated, because many of the plants are quite common in flower and vegetable gardens, and in ornamental landscaping, as well as on native rangeland. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of the plant.

The beautiful oleander bush, for example, grown all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis. The toxin is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander branches and roasted over a fire.

The popular Christmas flower poinsettia is full of an acid, burning juice, so lethal that a child who consumed one leaf might die. Mistletoe berries can also be deadly.

Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomato plants, close kin to the deadly nightshade, have foliage that contains alkaloid poisons which can cause severe digestive upset and nervous disorder if eaten.

Jimson weed, sometimes called thornapple or stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves.

Castor bean seeds are especially dangerous because they are so deadly and so readily available. They are sold in garden stores for about 25 cents a packet and are popular because they produce large, lush plants in one season. Yet each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

Other common plants found in this part of Texas that have poisonous parts are elephant ear, larkspur, azaleas, lantana canana, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poison oak and poison sumac.

"More detailed information on these and other plants can be secured from health and plant authorities," Smith said.

were less seriously hurt. They are in Cogdell Memorial Hospital in Snyder. Her little son Mike escaped injury.

The driver of the truck, Ophell Witt of Cameron, was not hurt.
