ORDERS JURY TO REMOVE SHERIFF

URGES ACCEPTANCE OF FORD'S PROPOSITION

WASHINGTON, June 9.—Three separate reports setting forth recommendations for action by Congress with respect to the development of the government's \$106,000,000 power and nitrate project at Muscle Shoals were made to the House today by members of the military af-

fairs committee. The task of making the final decision is admitted by experts to be duly presented to a full membership of the House at an early date, but recommendations to that end were submitted after four months of continuous consideration by the committee.

The majority report declares that the Ford proposal is the only one that was found worthy of serious consideration and asks that its acceptance thereby eliminating the Gorgas steam plant.

HICKCOX GETS LIFE SENECE

PRES. HARDING AT PRINCETON

PRINCETON, N. J., June 9.—President Harding reached here today at one o'clock to dedicate the Princeton battle monument, after traveling across the country by motor from Somerville, New Jersey, with his party.

CITY EMPLOYS CIVIL ENGINEER

J. E. Pirie, who has been in the employ of the Federal Highway Commission for several years, has accepted a position with the city of Ballinger as highway engineer and will have charge of all the street, drainage and other work where the services of an engineer are needed.

The City Commission closed a contract with Mr. Pirie Thursday for a period of six months, or longer, if his services should be needed, and Mr. Pirie will enter upon his duties as soon as his resignation with the Federal Highway Commission has been accepted.

Engineer Pirie will begin at once to run the levels, work out contours, and figure estimates for the street paving. Nothing towards actual work on street paving could be commenced until an engineer was employed, and his work will come first.

Mr. Pirie is one of the most competent engineers in the state, and since coming to Ballinger, and for some time prior to moving here, he has had charge of the road work for the federal government in a territory embracing a large number of counties, and he has had under his supervision road construction in every county in this section of the state where road work has been done, as well as assisting in street paving in a number of West Texas cities. Mr. Pirie was for a number of years assistant engineer for the city of Houston. He is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, an organization to which members are not admitted until they have proven themselves competent and past the experimental stage.

With considerable money to spend in street and water works improvements, the city is indeed fortunate in securing the services of an engineer in Mr. Pirie's class, and one whose home is here and who is interested in the city's welfare.

CAN SEND FIRE TRUCK OUT TOWN

The matter of sending the fire truck to fight fires in neighboring towns as a matter that is entirely up to the discretion of the city officials, and it in no wise affects the insurance carried in this city, according to a letter to Mayor Raby from the State Fire Insurance Commission.

Mayor Raby asked the insurance department for a ruling on the question, as there was some criticism recently because the fire fighting apparatus was sent to Paint Rock, and in reply to his letter G. N. Holton, secretary of the State Fire Insurance Commission says:

"In reply to your inquiry of May 29th, with reference to dispatching the fire department equipment to the aid of a neighboring town, would say that this is a matter left entirely to the discretion of the city officials, and any action of that sort that might be taken would have no effect on the insurance carried on property located in your town, even though the apparatus might be absent on a mission of this kind at the time of the fire."

MAN AND WOMAN GET WARNING

ANDERSON, S. Car., June 9.—Investigation is under way today into the kidnapping late last night of Robert W. Sullivan and Miss Ruby Floyd, who reported to the police that they were seized while seated in an automobile in front of the girl's home.

Sullivan is secretary of the South Carolina Cotton Manufacturers' Association. He told the police here that the abductors were dressed in the regalia resembling that of the Ku Klux Klan. The party went three miles from the city, where it was declared that warnings were given the couple not to be seen together again. Both of them are said to have refused to accept the warning.

BEAUMONT, June 9.—Tom Garner was ordered removed as sheriff of Jefferson county this morning when Judge Street announced that the evidence submitted was conclusive that Garner was guilty of misconduct and he instructed the jury to return a verdict for removal from office.

The judge denied that he gave the jury instructions that if any member disagreed with the instructions given that he would be fined or sentenced to jail by the court in asking for verdict of removal.

Judge Street said that the fact that the sheriff had become a member of the Ku Klux Klan was in contravention of the oath that he took as sheriff. The counsel for the sheriff countered with the statement that there was nothing in the Klan oath that conflicted with the duties of sheriff. The court then said that the oath was taken for "effect" to fool and deceive the ignorant class.

Counsel for Garner gave notice of appeal this afternoon.

SCHOOL BOARD ORDERS ELECTION

The local school board was in session Thursday night and acted favorably on the petition presented asking for an election to ballot on whether the tax shall be increased from 50 cents on the hundred dollars to 75 cents. The election was ordered for July 11th.

A few other questions were discussed by the board, and an order placed for fuel for the school. Miss Josephine Burris was elected as teacher in West Ward. Miss Burris takes the place of a teacher who failed to accept, or had not signed a contract.

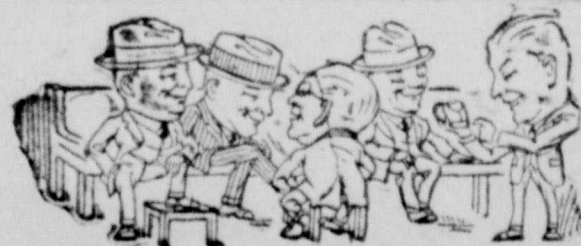

PARKWAYS FOR RESIDENCE STREETS

Some of the would-be progressive spirits became a little excited when a suggestion was made in Thursday's Ledger that a parkway, or flower bed, be left in the center of the streets, and only a twenty foot driveway on each side be paved.

This plan was proposed only for streets outside of the business district, and from Sixth to Elm Creek on Hutchings Avenue, and from Tenth to the Colorado River bridge on Hutchings.

Ballinger streets are wide, and there is ample room for carrying out such a program of civic beautification, and at the same time conserve money in paving. It would be much cheaper to pave a twenty-foot driveway on each side of the street next to the curbing, and curb off a space for grass, trees and flowers in the center.

The safety feature is also worth considering. It would forever put an end to driving on the wrong side of the street. Cars could always observe the traffic law by remaining on the right side of the parkway when traveling.

The city commission should be encouraged to adopt such a plan when they begin work on residence streets, and especially should this apply on Hutchings Avenue, which is entirely too wide and expensive to be paved from curb to curb after getting out of the business district.

CLAIMANT TO \$50,000,000



Rufus Coppock, Plymouth businessman and seaver, with his dog Tipperary, calmly awaits happenings before entering his claim in sharing one of the richest estates in America. The story of the Coppock estate is one of the most romantic. Rufus has a copy of a 99-year lease, which claimants declare proves their title to lands in New York, Jersey City, Philadelphia, Oil City, Phoenixville, Media and other parts of Pennsylvania. The lease was dated in 1816 and was to run 99 years. The descendants of Bartholomew Coppock, who founded the fortune, have organized the "Coppock descendants" and are preparing to claim lands leased by their ancestor more than a century ago.

ALBATROSS FLIES 3,000 MILES

Bird Follows Ship Six Days and Seven Nights on Pacific Without Furling Wings.

Seattle, Wash.—Starting from a small solitary island near Japan a black-headed albatross followed a steamship across the North Pacific for six days and seven nights. It became an object of unusual interest among both passengers and crew and several big wagers as to its length of flight and duration of strength.

Meat and bread tossed to the bird during the day was picked up from the waves without the great wings being furled. For six days and seven nights the race kept all at fever heat with excitement, and when 3,000 miles from the Japanese island and following a greasy breakfast of meat and fish the albatross turned abruptly and was lost in the distant horizon. The ship was then 1,500 miles from the nearest Alaskan port, but the bird is supposed to have flown straight home.

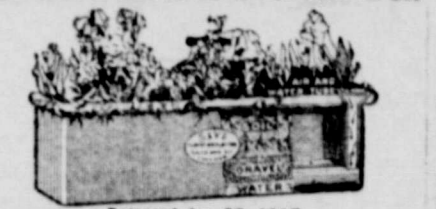

DESIGNERS SHOW UNENDING VARIETY IN HAT STYLES



SUMMER entices the fancies of those who create its millinery into many lovely bypaths, and fashion for this particular summer has brought the wealth of inspiration to designers. The phylandering breezes of midsummer are not more unfettered than the genius of these same designers who undertake to reflect the glories of the season in hats that are laden with its blossoms and fruits and gay with its colors. An appreciative public gives them encouragement and blithely they proceed to translate even dawns and noons and nights into headwear.

Naturally variety in hats is unending—there are hardly two alike—but many of them have wide brims, and variations of the poke bonnet appear among late arrivals. Materials are airy, colors beautiful and very generously received, nevertheless the big black hat that belongs to midsummer is not without a following. A fine example of the all-black hat appears at the top of the group illustrated.

It is made of hair braid, its brim curves upward, and is widened by a border of chiffon. Another black hat has its wide brim upturned at the front. It is a spirited shape, fittingly trimmed with a flare of fancy feathers that spring from a cluster of flat roses.

At the right of the group a leghorn hat finds its usual place in the summer's sun, with huge dahlias set flat against its crown. The hat of straw braid at the bottom of the group barely hints at the poke bonnet in its shape. Its indented brim is bound with silk and about its crown are grapes with roses and other flowers.
