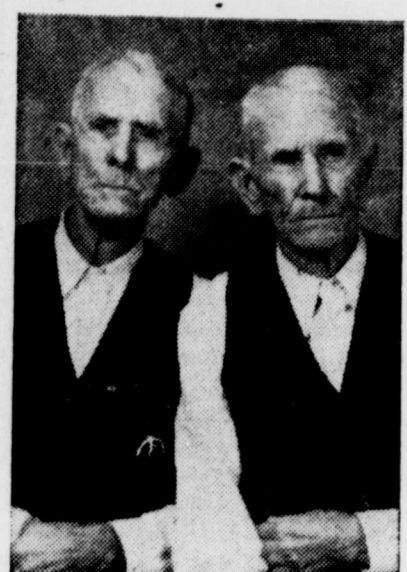

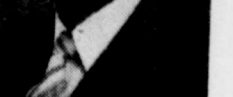

THE MEN IN SERVICE WRITE HOME

Hello, Buford: How's everything going in the good old home town? I've missed the last five or six copies of the paper, but also missed receiving any mail for over a month, so, I'm anxious to receive both the paper and a letter occasionally. . . I had a nice trip over, too stubborn, I guess, to get seasick and swear the

Pacific is larger than Texas as most people really think it's something for us to grant that it is. We are well located and as a boy put it in a letter I censored the other day, "Mom, you'd be ashamed to worry about me if you could see me here." However, it isn't like that for long at a time. . . A letter from a Marine wouldn't be allowed if there wasn't one plug for us in it, but "They haven't been doing bad, have they?" There are quite a bunch of Abernathy boys in the Marine Corps, if my count is correct, about 25 or more. I don't believe you know but Richard Schroeter is a first lieutenant, and Paul Schroeter is a second lieutenant, in addition to the ones you have. They should have been in about your class in AHS, or a year ahead. . . Well, I hope to be receiving my copy of the paper soon, being sent to this address, they will eventually catch me if I move on. I like to keep up with the doings at home and of the other boys scattered all over the world. Let's hope we find our way back after a year or two more of "convincing" a couple of rascals need. Hello, Buford: I'm still in existence — and I do still think of you often — I know you must doubt that because of the delays in between letters, but I miss everyone just as much as the day I left — I have been assigned to a nice (if they can be called nice) army transport ship. It is nice in comparison to some of these tubs — we have nice quarters and the chow is good — that's enough said in the army — but, to add to that, they give us a menu and we have a choice of food — that's nearly army heaven. — The ship is a converted luxury liner that made South American runs and there are a few (few) luxuries left on it. This is a break I have waited for for over a year. Buford, I have been moved over a lot of territory since I came back to the states — my first assignment was in Louisiana, but I only stayed there three days. The outfit I was with here in New York before I went over got word that we were back and they called for us. I didn't like swamps in Louisiana anyway. Being in New York isn't a very good break in some ways (maybe I'm one of the boys you can't take the country out of). This outfit is very lax as far as GI is concerned, but it's the hardest thing you can imagine on nerves. We are under a mental strain all the time — I expect this ship assignment to be somewhat of a rest — the actual work is never as straining as the schooling. Maybe I will get to see a little more action — don't mind if I do. Buford, thank you for trying to keep the paper coming to me, they have followed me all over the world. I get the news, even if it is late and it is home news. You know Texans have made the damdest reputation for themselves in this war — in more

ways than one. Every time I report to a new place and it gets around I am from Texas they say "I thought so." I just reported to my CO on the ship while ago and something came up about where we were from. I told him I was from Texas and he said, "I was just waiting for you to say that." I have had that happen to me a number of times. This major says that you can't talk to a Texan ten minutes without him telling you he's from Texas — Well, why shouldn't we? Texans are doing their part where ever you find one of them — besides, it is the only place in the world where you can get a real hamburger. What is true about getting the country out of a boy is more than true about most Texans — you might get them out of Texas, but you will never get Texas out of them. So long, Buford. I'll write if and when I get back. Lots of luck, Edwin Crow. (Delayed)

Dear Buford: I am still receiving the Review and keeping up with the home town. Your paper is also helping me to find other fellows who are around my station. Thanks a lot for sending it. . .
