WALTER ALLEN FOR COUNTY JUDGE

Take pleasure in announcing candidacy of Attorney Walter Allen for the office of County Judge, at the coming Democratic primary in July. He is an Ochiltree product, having come to this county with his people 18 years ago. He is a native of Canada, and he first lived on moving to the little town of Hamilton, his native place in Central Texas. From his early years he has taken an active interest in the development and welfare of Ochiltree County and its citizens.

He received his education in the schools of the State and in the colleges in Texas, having had Academic training at Baylor University, and having taken the course in the Law Department of the University of Texas at Austin, which last named school he attended on his own way, earning all of his expenses while taking the law.

On completion of his legal education he entered the law practice at Pecos, in Clay County, Texas, and shortly thereafter he was elected County Attorney of that County in a contested race for the office. He was re-elected to a second term in opposition. During the term he vacated the office, and he has since been employed by the military services in the country in the World War, in which service he attained the rank of Captain. After the war he returned to Ochiltree County and entered the practice of law, forming a partnership with his brother, Jack Allen, and will so engaged.

He has taught rural school in this county, has been an employee in the Department of Education at Austin, was Secretary of the Department of high school affiliation of the University of Texas, is a vital part of a good part by our schools. Thorough legal training and his many years of experience and successful active practice of the law have well qualified to properly discharge the duties of Judge of the County Court in which there has now been a considerable amount of business of importance. Mr. Allen is worthy of the consideration for this important office by the voters and will appreciate your support.

TEXAS COUNTY BANK WILL NOT REOPEN

The committee from among the depositors named to consider ways and means leading to the reopening of the Texas County National Bank, made a report to a meeting of depositors held in the high school auditorium last Saturday to the effect that after considering the matter from all angles they were unable to report any plan for reopening the bank. A shortage in bad notes to the extent of approximately \$46,000.00, accumulating for years and concealed from the directors by various means employed by Cashier Salter; something like \$45,000.00 in doubtful paper, made so by existing conditions and ordinarily easy to collect in a going bank, but difficult of collection in a suspended institution, making the total bad and doubtful paper approximately \$91,000.00. The paper in the bank rated as good totals \$135,000.00. Ross Rizley, representing the committee spoke for the depositors briefly outlining the situation. Receiver Letson was called on for any information that he might care to give, but stated that he was not permitted to reveal the conditions in a defunct bank, intimating, however, that the statements by Mr. Rizley might be relied upon. After the statement by these gentlemen, there was nothing more to come before those assembled, or at least no one responded and the meeting adjourned. The bad notes mentioned are the accumulation of years, some of them probably the property of the bank even before several of the present directors acquired stock in the bank, the bad paper being admittedly concealed by Cashier Salter by juggling same through various accounts. There is no occasion for anyone to doubt the part played by Cashier Salter in wrecking the bank and he has used more talent in concealing the shortage than along any line for the good of the institution.

It is understood that when representatives of the Comptroller examined the bank just a day or two before it closed the loans showed a total of \$199,000, approximately and the deposits totaled about \$185,000. Since the bank closed its doors investigation shows that the deposits were about \$225,000.00, approximately and the loans total around \$232,000 the difference in the figures first quoted and those following being concealed from the examiners by Cashier Salter. One feature tending to bar the reopening of the bank is the fact that it would be necessary for those fostering that undertaking to raise in cash, not including other shortages, about \$65,000.00 in the bank as public funds, and not enough persons could be found willing to assume this financial responsibility, in connection with other matters difficult to overcome from a money standpoint.—Guymon Tribune.

United States Marshal Al. Thresher, arrived in Guymon Wednesday evening on Rock Island Train number two, bearing papers containing information against H. A. Salter, formerly cashier of the Texas County National Bank, of Guymon, which were preferred by National Bank Inspector Brock, who closed the bank here November 8th. These were served on Mr. Salter that evening, and Mr. Salter and attorney John L. Gilson accompanied Marshal Thresher to Beaver City, Beaver county, leaving on train number four yesterday morning. At Beaver, Mr. Salter was arraigned before United States Commissioner T. P. Braidwood, where he gave bond in the sum of five thousand dollars, to await the action of the Federal Grand Jury in Oklahoma City. Ike Garten and W. A. Ingram qualified as bondsmen in the sum of \$5,000.00. Messrs Salter and Gilson returned on number two Friday, this morning before the Herald had been able to get to press owing to unavoidable delays. Attorney Gilson who with Attorney Jack Harris will defend Mr. Salter before the Federal Court, declined to make any statement further than the foregoing at this time.—Guymon Herald.

Railroads Completely Regulated

The Santa Fe says efficient transportation to meet growing need of country is possible under existing Governmental regulation. Farmers and business men asked to exercise their influence in giving Transportation Act a fair trial.

The vigor of our national life absolutely depends upon transportation, primarily the railroads. To insure that all important functions of the railroads are discharged in an orderly and dependable manner the Government has undertaken to regulate them in the following particulars:

1. A Government Commission determines freight and passenger rates.
2. A Government Commission determines what is a "fair return" on the value of property used for transportation purposes, but does not guarantee any return.
3. A Government Commission determines the above value of transportation property.
4. A Government Board determines wages and working conditions in case of dispute between railroad employer and employee.
5. A Government Commission determines whether or not a railroad may issue its stock and bonds.
6. A Government Commission has determined how all railroad accounts are to be kept.

7. A Government Commission determines whether or not a railroad line may be built or abandoned, leased, sold or merged with any other line.

8. Any and every form of discrimination is prohibited by law.

9. A Government Commission prescribes safety methods and appliances and makes constant inspection for any failure to observe its requirements.

There are duties devolving upon the people to see that the railroads are given fair treatment by the Commission and Boards to whom has been delegated the task of exercising the overwhelming control described above, and that the provisions for such control are not lightly tampered with nor changed until some clear need for change appears. With such treatment assured the railroads can and will grow in capacity and efficiency to meet all the needs of our country, and health and vigor will be assured to our great national industries, such as farming, manufacturing, mining and commerce.

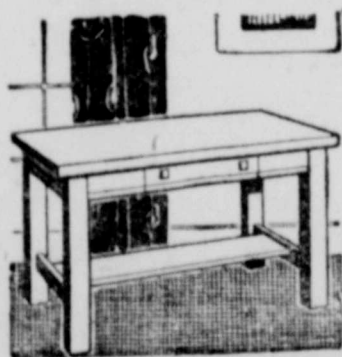

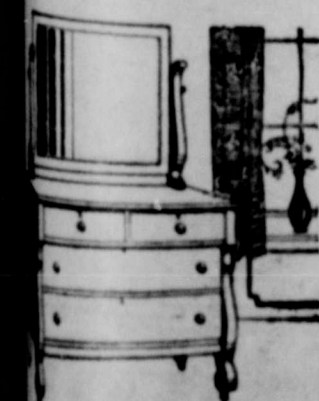

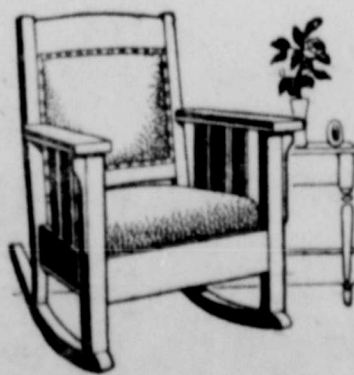

EDITORIAL

Miss Helen Schultz, operator of the Red Ball Transportation Company, which runs busses in Iowa, is the center of a legal battle in which she is endeavoring to prove to the satisfaction of the State Board that her service is a "public convenience," within the meaning of the Iowa motor-carrier law. This is denied by the opposing railroads, the Chicago Great Western; Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific; Chicago & North-Western; Minneapolis & St. Louis; Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern; and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Roads. These roads are supported in their contentions by the county supervisors of Worth, Cerro Gordo, Hardin and Franklin counties, who also declare the heavy busses damage the highways excessively.

Friends of the highway bus idea contend that the remedy for any damage done roads by bus operation lies either in higher taxation of such busses or the construction of roads able to bear the traffic of heavy busses. They say that the bus is a convenience, as much a necessity to towns served as are trolley cars, and point to the fact that in the beginning the railroads were against the establishment of interurban trolley service, but that in later years the railroads found them of such value in relieving them of the unprofitable

SAYS FARMERS SHOULD RAISE SOME COTTON

J. O. Tansey, one of the prominent land owners in the vicinity of Sutton's Store in the east part of the county, was a visitor in Guymon last Saturday, and incidentally boosting the cultivation of cotton in Texas county. He tells us that many bales of cotton have been grown in the vicinity of Perryton, Texas, this year, and are being marketed there. This cotton is bringing from 33 to 36 cents a pound and is proving a most profitable crop. He thinks the farmers of Texas county will make no mistake in planting cotton another year. The fear that it will not develop sufficiently is overcome thru the fact that the new process of ginning enables the grower to gather the cotton in the hulls, and the fibre, while slightly colored, ranges only a cent or a little more off from the price of the hand picked product. Mr. Tansey also tells us that J. S. Burton, one of his tenants, hauled 88 bales of broom corn to Perryton recently, which he sold for \$132.50 a ton, and received a check for \$1950.00 for his crop, which averaged \$24.25 per acre. It seems that the better roads are inducing many of the farmers in the southeastern part of the county to market their products in Perryton.—Guymon Herald.

Baked Stuffed Eggplant.—Cut eggplant into quarters, lengthwise, removing the pulp close to the skin. Force the pulp through a meat chopper and drain; there should be two and two-thirds cups of the pulp. To the pulp in a saucepan add one and one-half cups of ham stock, bring to the boiling point and boil twenty minutes. Add three-fourths of a cup of coarse dried bread crumbs, one-fourth of a cup of melted butter, one teaspoonful of lemon juice, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one egg, slightly beaten; mix well and fill the shells with this mixture, sprinkle with buttered crumbs and bake.

Green Tomato Relish.—Take two quarts of green tomatoes, four quarts of chopped cabbage, one-half dozen onions, two small red peppers, one bunch of celery, one-half ounce of celery seed, two tablespoonfuls of salt, one-half ounce of allspice and one-half ounce of mustard seed. Chop the vegetables very fine; add the other ingredients and cook twenty minutes, adding one-half ounce of tumeric at the last. Fill cans and seal.

Scalloped Macaroni—With Onions.—Cook one cupful of macaroni broken into one-inch pieces in boiling salted water to cover. When the macaroni is soft and the pipes well rounded, drain. Peel twelve silver-skinned onions, prick them several times and cook in boiling salted water until tender. Put a layer of macaroni into a buttered baking dish, arrange over it half of the onions and sprinkle with a third of a cupful of grated cheese; pour over one-half cupful of rich white sauce, repeat and cover the top with buttered crumbs. Bake until thoroughly heated and the crumbs are brown.

Youth Exhibits Champion Steer

Lloyd Taube of Marion, Iowa, Wins First Prize With His Calf.

Lloyd Taube, a seventeen-year-old boy from Marion, Linn county, Iowa, had the proud distinction of exhibiting the grand champion baby beef at the Iowa state fair, held at Des Moines, in what was probably the largest show of this character ever held. The boys and girls whose animals had won at the various county fairs were entitled to compete for state honors at Des Moines, and a total of 446 head were lined up before the judges when the state contest was called.

The steer with which Lloyd won the highest honor against this strong field was a pure bred Aberdeen Angus calf named "Tiney". He was a February calf, sired by Erin Boy II of Lone Ash. Lloyd bought him in September and fed him largely on a home-grown ration of shelled corn and clover hay. The calf did so well that his owner entered him in the Baby Beef club in his county, and at the local fair was awarded the championship over 32 entries. This award carried with it a free trip to the International Live Stock exposition, which will be held in Chicago the first week in December.

Took His Pet to Fair.
Spurred on by this success, Lloyd took his pet steer to the Iowa state fair. This animal and one other were the only entries from Linn county, which made his subsequent triumph all the more noteworthy. After the large classes of well-fitted beeves had been sifted down by the breed judges, Prof. H. H. Kildee was called upon to

tie the ribbon on the grand champion of the show, and he selected Tiney for this high honor. Lloyd accepted the congratulations of the ringside crowd with becoming modesty and attributed his success to plenty of good feed and constant attention.

Tiney weighed 925 pounds when records were started on April 1, and at the close of the contest balanced the beam at 1,150 pounds. He was allowed about eighteen pounds of shelled corn a day and all the clover hay he would eat. At Des Moines he presented such a highly finished appearance that he could not be denied the victory, in spite of very strong competition.

Has Won Three Times.
Lloyd has been in club work for six years and has won at a county show three times, always with an Angus calf. Three years ago he was awarded a trip to the international, and it was the inspiration received while at Chicago that later proved a big factor in achieving his crowning triumph. While he will again attend that premier exhibition of the live stock world this year, he will not exhibit Tiney there himself, as he had promised a well-known Angus exhibitor living in his home town to let him have the calf at the close of the Iowa state fair. This breeder will continue to grow out the steer and will enter him at Chicago in the open classes against the highest fitted beeves of the most skilled and experienced exhibitors. It will be interesting to watch how this highest type of 'boys' club endeavor will rank when pitted against the finest products of the noted veterans of the industry.

Corn for Silage Should Be Practically Matured

Silage corn should be allowed to grow as late as the season permits, or until the corn is practically matured, i. e., the kernel has become hard and dented. The stalk is usually somewhat green as late as this stage. Many experiments have been conducted which show that a greater amount of feed of a better quality and that will keep more easily can be obtained from silage which is made from corn cut at this stage of maturity.

Take Pains to Prepare Good Alfalfa Seed Bed

In sowing alfalfa, take pains to prepare a good seed bed. Have it well firmed and fine on top. Then sow 15 to 18 pounds of seed per acre, but be sure to have it inoculated. Don't sow alfalfa on sour land. If your land is not sweet defer seeding until next spring and in the meantime give it a dressing of two to three tons of ground limestone.
