FOOD STAMPS INCREASE SALE IN THE COUNTY

Increase of \$10,912.00 in food stamps during January 1942 due to the food stamp program in Eastland County was pointed out today by Charles L. Howell, Area Supervisor, Surplus Marketing Administration. This amount represents blue food stamps issued last month.

Clients using food stamps were requested to buy an additional \$14,657.00 in orange food stamps, bringing the total of food purchased with food stamps during the month to \$24,669.00. Families participating in the program totaled 1,694, representing 5,673 persons.

A total of \$367,244.50 in food stamps has been issued since the beginning of the program on September 3, 1940, Howell revealed. Of this amount \$166,656.50 in blue food stamps represents the creation of additional markets for American farm products.

"The Food Stamp Program of the Surplus Marketing Administration is a part of the United States Department of Agriculture's program designed to help in assuring American farmers a fair return on their full production," Howell said.

"Farmers are operating under a full production schedule which responsible officials call a life line of the United Nations. At the same time farm labor shortages are being reported daily.

"Under such conditions, farmers must be relieved of complex marketing problems which would detract from the time and thought which must be given to production planning," Howell concluded.

Woman Who Has Seen Five Wars Says All Are Same

LLANO, Tex. (UP) — Wars, after the fifth, fall into a pattern and one who has gone through that many begins to know what to expect.

Mrs. Clarintha Draper, who has just become 104 years old, said at the outbreak of present hostilities:

"We will all have to get to work and make clothes so our boys can keep warm."

She knew what homespun was, and parched corn coffee and other privations from the Civil War, what it means to be a young mother with two children in hostile territory far from home, with one's husband unheard from and believed dead.

She lives now with her daughter, Mrs. Katie Sessom of the Field Creek community. She came to Texas from Tennessee at the age of three in 1841 with her father and mother. They settled in what was to become Fannin county, after Texans wrested their independence from Mexico.

She married George Washington Draper when she was 16. They raised cattle for several years for the government. Then the war came and her young husband enlisted in the Confederate Army. He was captured by the Yankees while returning to his forces after spending a furlough with his wife in the Arkansas home.

The Union armies burned her home and possessions, leaving her only one horse. Holding her daughter, 2, before her and trusting her son, 4, to cling to her back, she set out on horseback for her mother's home in Texas. They dodged battles, swam rivers, and eventually reached sanctuary.

More than a year later, after the war, her husband returned to the Spanish-American War. I did not bring anything like the hardships to her. But being a woman and a mother, she has seen the tragic pattern re-enacted with variations of suffering and death.

Two Topkicks Is More Than Enough

CAMP BARKELEY, Abilene, Texas. (UP) — Two topkicks in one company is one too many, but that's the situation in three companies stationed at Camp Berkeley.

The situation resulted from the re-enlistment of former first sergeants who were in the enlisted reserve corps.

Th question is: Who's boss? First sergeants being what they are, the predicament is touchy.

Small Farmer Has Food For Freedom Record Of His Own

GONZALES, Tex.—Alton A. Lindeman, of Gonzales county, is one of the county's largest producers in the Food-For-Freedom program, despite the fact that he works a small farm of only 76 acres.

Lindeman demonstrates that a farmer can not only feed his family on a small farm but also raise a surplus for the Food-For-Freedom program that is so important to the nation's war effort. From his flock of 400 hens, this 28-year-old farmer gets a winter production of 20 dozen eggs a day. His production goals call for a flock of 750 hens next fall, and he has made application to the Farm Security Administration for a loan to buy 500 baby chicks and to purchase the feed to make efficient layers out of them.

Lindeman owns the land he works, having bought it with a farm ownership loan from FSA in 1941. The FSA, as part of its contribution to the war effort, extends credit to small farmers and ranchers, both landowners and tenants, who are without other means of financing. Loans enable farmers like Lindeman to own, feed, and raise chickens, hogs, cows, and other livestock which produce food for a fighting nation.

Lindeman goes in heavily for pork production, also, keeping two brood sows and fattening the pigs. Aided by a one-acre hog pasture, he fattened a litter of 11 pigs into 220-lb. hogs in the latter months of 1941 and sold nine of them in December for \$234. The other two are part of his family's meat supply.

On the green oat pasture at present are 16 pigs, offspring of both of the brood sows, which are being fattened for market in June. Both the sows are bred and there will be another pig crop ready for the market in 1942.

"Alton is a good farmer," says Theron Richardson, his FSA supervisor, "and FSA will help him to realize his pork production goal by loans for feed, housing and vaccine."

To a lesser degree, this small-farm family is helping with the Food-For-Freedom program by increasing its production of turkeys, butterfat and truck crops. Lindeman is not increasing the number of milk cows, but has inaugurated a program of better feeding. Turkey marketing goals provide for sale of 30 birds at the fall market, compared with 27 in 1941. A 3-acre garden provides health-protective food for the family and a small surplus for the local market.

A limiting factor on Lindeman's farm, like that of many of his neighbors, is production facilities. He is farming with makeshift hog houses and needs to expand his poultry houses to avoid overcrowding of the birds. FSA loans are available to him for permanent improvements, as they are to many others who own their farms or have a long-term lease, and by mid-spring Lindeman plans to complete a new hog-house and an overflow house for the laying hens.

TANKER IS SUNK NEAR JERSEY COAST

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 6 — The 8,327-ton tanker, Indian Arrow, was torpedoed and sunk by a submarine Wednesday night off the New Jersey Coast, the Fourth Naval District announced today.

Twenty six members of the crew were reported to be missing. Eleven members of the crew and the captain were rescued by a motor boat and were brought to the United States Coastguard Station here.

LONDON. — A responsible British authority said today that Germany is now exerting its greatest effort of the war in the Battle of the Atlantic.

The spokesman said that losses have risen recently, due to the "very heavy" sinkings in American coastal waters.

Law Abiding Motorists Nicked Again As Title Certificate Plans Are Flop Due To Inability To Cope With It

AUSTIN, Tex. — Several million law observing automobile and truck owners discovered this week that they have been nicked again.

They have complied with the certificate of title act and now the state has thrown up its hands and admits it has been unable to do its part of issuing the certificates.

The white flag was run up in a letter sent by the state highway department to all tax assessors-collectors requesting them to register all motor vehicles for 1942 through terms of the certificate of title act have not been met.

To enforce that act the legislature ordered that after Jan. 1, 1942 no vehicle bought since 1936 should be registered without its certificate of title being presented nor be operated on the highways without such a certificate.

The attorney general's department disclaimed a part in advising the tax assessors-collectors to vary from the law.

Repeal of this law by the next legislature now seems in order just as repeal became necessary for the headlight inspection law which proved a farce a few years ago.

Both laws were passed with fees put upon the motorist to administer them. The fee for a certificate of title first was put at 25 cents and remained at that amount from Oct. 1, 1939, when the law took effect, until May 1, 1941 when the fee was raised to 50 cents and issuance of certificates transferred from the State Safety Department to the State Highway Department.

How badly the legislators underestimated what they were demanding is shown by the record of performance. In the first 11 months, the State Safety Department received applications for 1,419,233 certificates of title.

When the job was turned over to the Highway Department under the amended law, the Safety Department was 100,000 certificates behind and had increased its certificate employee force from 18 to 42.

After having worked at the job since May of 1941, the Highway Department finds it has also been unable to do the job. Certificates were supposed to be issued within five days after application.

The Highway department letter of request to tax assessors-collectors said the suggestion was being made in order that motor vehicle owners might not be unduly penalized. Strict enforcement of the act would penalize the state Highway Department also because if cars were not registered the registration fees that go to the department for road building would be cut off.

Some of the blame is put on the war according to the letter which says:

"At this time many motor vehicle owners have enlisted or have been inducted into the Armed services of the United States and have left their motor vehicles with their wives or relatives. Numerous Defense workers depend on their automobiles for transportation to and from their employment and there have been great movements of motor vehicle owners from one state to another to work on the numerous National Defense Construction Projects and in Defense Industries. All of these and other things have added to the complex problems of issuing certificates of title, and have brought about much greater confusion in the administration of the Certificate of Title Act than could have been anticipated by the Legislature at the time of the passage of the original Act or at the time it was amended in 1941."

Governor Wishes Public Knew More Of Defense Plan

AUSTIN. — Gov. Coke Stevenson sometimes wishes he could tell the public more about the preparations made in Texas for defense against attack and sabotage. But he follows the advice of military men and just as they do says nothing at all — except that things are progressing very satisfactorily.

The governor believes that certain information, if the enemy knew it, might act as a deterrent.

"Out in my home country (Junction), everybody knows that the sheriff carries a gun," said Stevenson. "It seems to me that the knowledge is conducive to keeping down crime."

U. S. May Borrow On Friday, 13th

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6. — The United States Treasury Department, borrowing to help finance war expenditures of \$2,000,000,000 a month, will offer a security issue of \$1,500,000,000 next Friday, even though that day will be Friday the 13th.

Grocers Plan A Ration Study At State Convention

DALLAS. — The problems of rationing provisions for a fighting nation will highlight the 30th annual convention of the Texas Wholesale Grocers Association in Dallas Feb. 18-19.

"We have pledged our support to President Roosevelt and the federal government," said secretary-treasurer Sam Hanna, "and because of the gravity of the national and international situation we will make plans at the convention to cooperate to the fullest extent. We will plan a program to keep prices as low as possible and we will try to set up a system whereby hoarding can be avoided."

"One of the principal topics of discussion at the meeting will be conservation of food containers and rubber. We will also impress on our members the importance of throttling all "scare" information that might bring on unwarranted shortages in foods through unnecessary buying."

President of the wholesale grocers' organization is J. D. Patterson of Tyler. Vice presidents are A. W. Cullum, Dallas; E. C. Barrett, Waco; C. A. Perlit, Houston, and O. E. Bradford, Abilene.

Hanna notified Z. E. Black, manager of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce convention department, that the meeting was expected to be the most important the grocers ever held.

UNITED NATIONS STRIKE HEAVY BLOWS AT AXIS ON WORLDWIDE FRONTS

GAS ATTACKS ON U. S. SEEN AS POSSIBLE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The House Appropriations Committee today warned Congress that wholly inadequate provisions have been made for the protection of American cities against the possibility of gas attacks.

The admonition was made in reporting to the House of Representatives a \$160,590,611 deficiency appropriation bill which carried \$100,000,000 for civilian defense, the maximum permitted under the existing legislation.

The committee reported, however, that \$29,893,894 of the bill would be available for gas masks and gas mask production facilities.

The report said that Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia, Office of Civilian Defense director, had recommended that 50,000,000 gas masks or enough to protect all the civilians in the coastal air raid target areas be supplied by the government.

"Enemy air raids upon continental United States are to be expected," the committee said, "but the general military opinion is that they cannot be conducted on a scale approaching the intensity or frequency of raids upon England or the continent of Europe."

'Who Told You?' Club Has Simple Membership Rules

PORT ARTHUR, Tex. (UP) — Parlor strategists please note: Dick Harding, special dock guard, became weary of gossipers who ranted and raved that "I heard this" or "I hear that" concerning the nation's war effort — shortages, ship sinkings, etc. — so he formed a "Who-Told-You?" club.

It takes nothing but common sense to join, he said. There'll be no dues and no initiation fees. The only requirement for membership: challenge all rumors.

"Everytime somebody springs any of that 'I hear' or 'They say' stuff," Harding said, "our club members will proceed to pin him down to get definite."

"What told you?" we will ask first. Then we'll try to track down and deflate some of the idle chatter and gossip and misinformation which is being spread around here about ship sinkings and food shortages and the like.

"If the rumor-monger will name his informant, we'll try to go to that person and see who told him and so on back down the line. We may be able to stamp out some of this hokum that's going the rounds."

Frozen Fumes

Half hour after a high-flying Army pursuit plane passed over Kansas City airport this trail of frozen exhaust fumes remained. Zero temperature caused phenomenon.

Defense lines of the United Nations held stubbornly against Japan in the Far East today, and heavy blows were struck at the Axis forces threatening Tobruk in Libya, and on the Russian front.

On all three fronts, dispatches said, attacks and counter attacks were building up toward decisive engagements that may influence the trend of fighting on the worldwide battle fronts.

In the Far East the American big guns at Corregidor broke up a Japanese assault preparations by destroying enemy gun emplacements on Manila Bay, while the British heavy artillery resumed pounding attacks upon enemy reinforcements on the Bahore Coast, despite heavy Japanese aerial attacks.

In Burma 10 more Japanese planes were reported destroyed and 10 others were damaged during an attack in the Rangoon area. The British were still holding the Salween River line in the face of Japanese thrusts.

In North Africa British airplanes strongly attacked the Axis armored units that have pushed eastward along the Libyan coast from Derna in an effort to reach Tobruk. Heavy casualties and damage were reported to have been inflicted upon the Axis columns.

In Russia the Red Army reported slow but continued advances in which thousands of casualties were inflicted upon the Germans.

The Japanese threat to Singapore continued extremely grave, with additional enemy troops massing across the Strait of Johore in the Bahr sector, despite heavy bombardment by British guns. The Japanese still maintained a strong measure of aerial superiority, although some British fighters were in the air and several enemy planes were shot down or were damaged in aerial warfare there today.

Ranger Business Hours to Conform To New War Time

At a short, but decisive meeting of Merchants of Ranger, held in the office of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce this morning at 11 o'clock, it was unanimously voted that the stores of the city should abide by the new daylight saving time, now referred to as war time.

Merchants of Eastland, at a similar meeting held Wednesday afternoon, had also voted to abide by the act of congress, which calls upon everyone to set their clocks ahead one hour Sunday night, in an effort to conserve electric power for vital war needs.

Object of the meetings was to determine the sentiments of the merchants in observing the new time schedule, which will be followed by railroads, communications systems, buses, newspapers, radios and all other forms of transportation and communications as well as by factories and stores.

The hours for opening and closing, therefore, will be the same in both Eastland and Ranger, with grocery stores opening at 7 a. m. and closing at 6 p. m., except on Saturdays, when they will remain open until 9 p. m., and other stores will continue to open at 8 a. m. and close at 6 p. m., except on Saturdays, when they will close at 9 p. m.

The action in Ranger was unanimous, without a dissenting vote being cast to the motion offered by C. L. Crews that the clocks be set ahead one hour on Sunday night, and that the opening and closing hours being observed throughout the city being set to conform to war time.

Legislation May Be Asked Upon Japanese Problem

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. — Justice Department sources disclosed today that they are weighing the possibility of asking congress for legislation that would permit "protective custody" arrest of any citizen for the duration of the war, as an additional means of coping with the Japanese problem on the West Coast of the United States.

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And What of Russia?

This is a ticklish subject, but it is a subject that needs dealing with. Unpleasant to think about, it is easier to gloss over than to look squarely in the face. It must be faced.

One hears it said, and more often suggested slyly than outright, that the thing to do is to fight Japan and let the European war stew on in its own juice in the hope that Germany and Russia will yet exhaust one another in a no decision bout. Many of those who were most ardent isolationists before the war now swing toward some such view. It is based on the idea that a Communist Russia too triumphant over Germany will turn the whole continent of Europe to Communism and from that vantage point Communize the world.

Quite bluntly let us say, "It could happen." There are no sure things in war, greatest of all gambles. The results of a war can never be accurately foreseen.

However, the results of losing are so plain, so terrible, and so imminent that there can be no doubt about them. We know what imposition by military force of Hitlerism means. Balancing that all-too-definite menace against some decision.

The war, in its total phases, must be supported in every way that will bring victory, including every possible assistance to Soviet Russia. The choice between a present certain evil and a possible future evil is a simple one to any clear thinking mind.

It is an old thing that the same people who assume that Britain and the United States face sweeping social changes as a result of the war also assume that Russia will emerge unchanged. It seems unlikely. Already Stalin seems to have called off the anti-religious campaign for the duration, and it may never be revived. Men returning from a war usually demand greater freedom than before, and Russia is just as likely to move toward democracy as the democracies are to move toward Communism. In Russia, Communism has already passed through three systems in which all changed but the name. The war may well bring on a fourth. There is no reason to assume that Russia will be exempt from the general expectation that no country will be quite the same afterward.

It is because we have faith in our American institutions that we fight to uphold them against military aggression. We must have faith that we can uphold them equally against whatever condition (and no one can guess what it will be) may arise in the war's aftermath. Right now, our guiding star in the war effort must be this:

Any holding out, any reservations, in the united drive for victory is terribly likely to result in universal disaster for all.

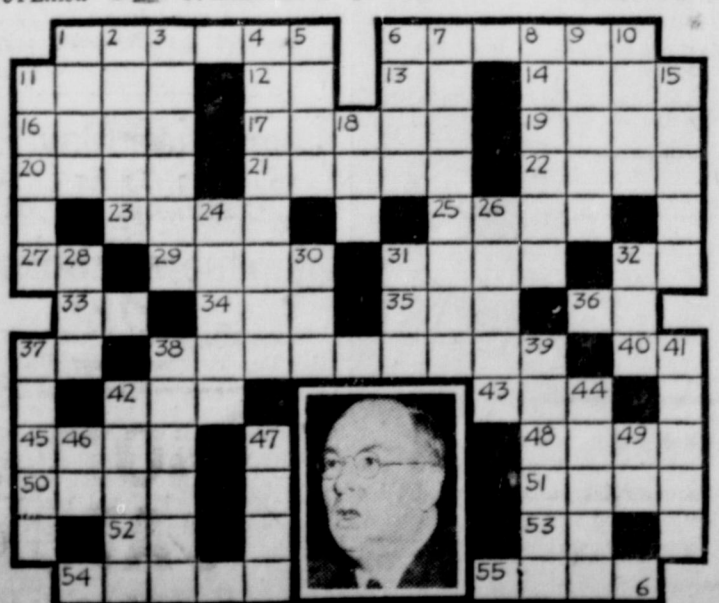

Farmers Asked To Conserve Scrap Iron And Steel

Collection and sale of scrap iron and steel is only one of the many ways Eastland county farmers can help lick the Japs, the Nazis and the Fascists, according to Mr. Bradshaw, chairman of the Eastland county USDA War Board.

Growing needs of a nation at war serve to intensify demand for steel and scrap iron to feed the hungry mouths of arms factories, the defense board chairman said.

Urgent appeal is also made to the public to gather up steel and scrap and carry it to the nearest dealers for use in charging the nation's steel furnaces. A list of dealers for the county are on file in the local AAA office and may be consulted any time, he said.

"We're not asking that you give your scrap to your country. We're asking that you sell it at prevailing prices for immediate defense use," Mr. Bradshaw said in explaining that financial returns cannot be expected to be large but results will be of untold value to farmers in their victory effort.

Bradshaw explained that prices for scrap vary in different sections since dealers deduct cost of transporting scrap from shipping point to mill, as well as preparation charges.

It's just another way of saying that we're at our posts on the farm front," the chairman said. "We're in this war to win, and each of us will have to do his part to get the job done."

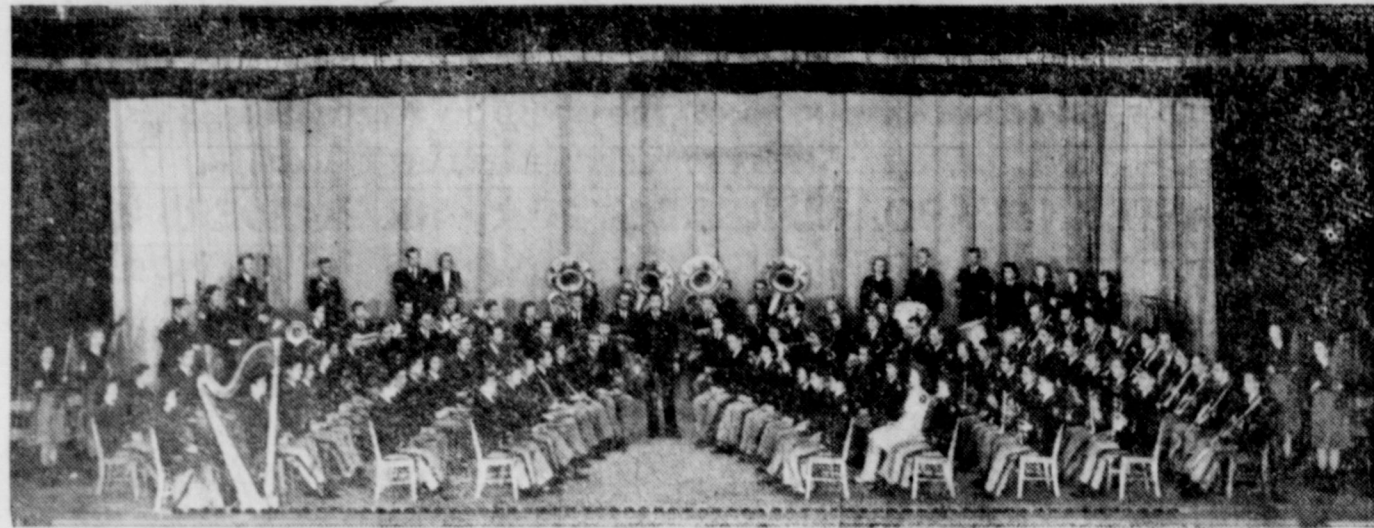

Preparing For a Home Blackout Is Not So Costly

COLLEGE STATION. — Home-makers who plan carefully and use materials they have on hand can blackout their homes with practically no expense.

That's the news from Mrs. Bernice Clayton, Extension Service specialist in home improvement, who says its a good idea to be prepared, even if blackouts never are necessary. The first pointer is: Make use of materials already on hand. Such things as blankets, quilts, bedspreads, rugs, carpets, slip covers, or dark oil cloth may be adequate. Test the material selected by holding it before an electric bulb; make certain it admits no light. Then when the material is hung, send someone outside to see if any cracks of light shine through.

Cloth used in blackout curtains need not be black, Mrs. Clayton says, but dark materials screen the light best. Dark blue, dark green, very dark brown, or dark red is acceptable. Materials of other colors — unless they're too heavy — may be dyed.

It's not necessary to blackout the entire house, so one room or two that is safest should be selected. In hanging the blackout curtains, try to take care of your need for ventilation. British families have learned that often it's necessary to leave windows open, particularly on warm nights. This means curtains must be heavy enough not to blow and expose light or they should be securely fastened above and below the windows.

All effective blackout curtains — whether they're new or made over — must come four to six inches above the glass and hang at least six inches below the sill. Allow one and one-half times the width of the window for fullness, the specialist advises. A light-weight frame fitting into each window offers one solution. It can be covered with heavy dark paper, oil cloth, or several layers of old sheeting dyed black. These can be slipped into windows in a hurry.

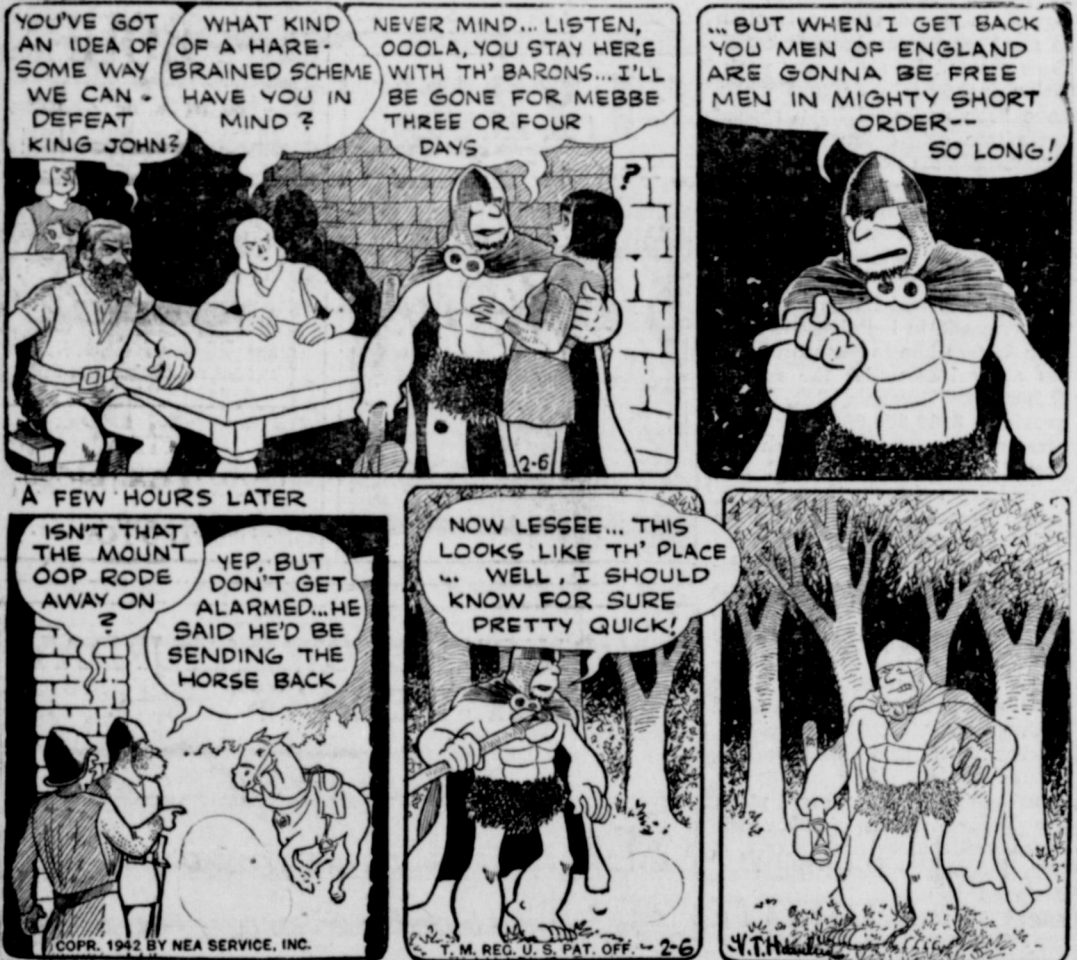

Defense Housing To Be Standardized

FORT WORTH. — Homes built in the future for defense workers in Texas will be standardized.

This does not mean, however, that all will be alike. There will be one, two three and four bedroom units; some will be one-story, others two-story; there'll be detached, twin and group houses, but all will conform to some 25 or more standard plans that have been adopted by the Federal Works Agency, it was announced here today.

These standardized plans, designed to speed up construction to meet emergency housing conditions created by the heavy population increase in defense areas, have been approved by a special committee on defense housing standards. This action is expected to facilitate speedy preparation of working drawings for both permanent and demountable types of houses.

The plans will be made available to architects and housing authorities engaged in building the more than 70,000 homes for war workers authorized under the recently amended Lanham Act, which provides \$300,000,000 for such construction. The plans are expected to be supplemented and revised from time to time.

The standardized plans have not been scheduled for use in connection with the 42,000 demountable houses for the purchase of which President Roosevelt recently allocated \$153,000,000 to the Federal Works Agency. Contracts for the purchase of these dwellings are being negotiated with scores of prefabricators, lumber mills and woodworking plants.

In addition to the basic plans, the Federal Works Agency will make available to architects a 4-inch modular system with each, designed to assist builders, engaged in prefabricated housing, especially site prefabrication.

The plans are for two geographical areas, the northern and southern parts of the United States.
