600 GUARDSMEN USED TO PROTECT NEGRO

(By Associated Press)
JACKSON, Miss., June 21.—All newspapermen were ordered from the Hinds county court room today by Judge Potter just before the case of Walter Burley, negro, confessed slayer of two white women, was called for trial.
Burley entered a plea of guilty but the court refused to accept it and the jury was speedily chosen.
The court house is surrounded by barbed wire entanglement and guarded by 600 National Guardsmen with machine guns to prevent any possible trouble.

TIRE THIEVES HERE TUESDAY

Thieves seeking gasoline, lub oil and tires visited six or more homes in the 700 blocks of Broadway and Sixth Street early Tuesday morning, taking eleven tires and thirteen tubes, several gallons of gasoline and fifteen gallons of lub oil.
D. R. Smith, 700 Sixth Street, owner of the M System Store, reported the loss of three tires from his car; Max Wilson, 707 Sixth Street, reported the spare tires taken from his car and from Mrs. Wilson's car; B. W. Winn, of San Angelo, district highway superintendent, who was at the Wilson home, had all gas drained from the tank on his car, a 15-gallon drum of lub oil also was taken from the Wilson home; Herbert Sledge, 704 Broadway, reported the spare tire on his car stolen; Dr. E. C. Baskin, 704 Sixth Street, reported the gasoline drained from his car; the negro man living in the servant's house at the Ralph McShann home, 708 Sixth Street, had four tires stolen from his car; the negro man living in the servant's house at the home of Dr. J. G. Douglass, 700 Broadway, lost one tire and two new inner tubes.
It is probable that other thefts occurred early Tuesday morning, but reports on other raids have not come to the attention of the officers.

Mr. Wilson stated Tuesday at noon that he was of the opinion that the thefts occurred some time between 5:00 and 6:00 a. m. In two instances the cars had been jacked up and the tires removed. Another car had been jacked up but apparently the thieves were frightened away as the tire was not removed, but several of the lugs on the wheel were loose.

STATE FIRE LAW FORCES CHANGES AT HOUSTON

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, June 21.—A recently enacted state law will compel Houston's fire department to change water connections on 3,750 pieces of hose, 1,500 fire plugs and on 21 pumps, each with three to four outlets.
The law requires that every city in the state have fire fighting equipment of the same standard and size, which means, officials here said, that the diameter of the connections must be three and one-sixteenth inches with seven and one-half threads to the inch.

"We are going to build a gas line via Ballinger to San Angelo and if the people of Ballinger want natural gas, we will furnish it," L. B. Dennings, president of the Lone Star Gas Company, announced here Tuesday morning.

Mr. Dennings, F. L. Chase, vice-president and operating manager, and a Mr. May, field man for the Lone Star company, were in Ballinger conferring with Mayor S. B. Raby and other citizens in regard to the gas business. The gas men were in Brownwood Monday night and came on to this city Tuesday morning.

"We are going to build a line to San Angelo; that is a sure fact, but the question now is, how large should the line be," said Mr. Dennings. "If Ballinger citizens want to use our gas, the line will have to be larger; if not, a smaller line will do very well."

"We now have the contract to furnish the San Angelo Light, Power & Ice Company with gas, and expect to obtain other commercial contracts in San Angelo, and if the citizens of Ballinger want gas we will build a larger line and start work immediately on a distributing plant here with crews at work on a ditch for the line from Coleman county thru Ballinger and on to San Angelo.
"We have been co-operating with the oil and gas producers of

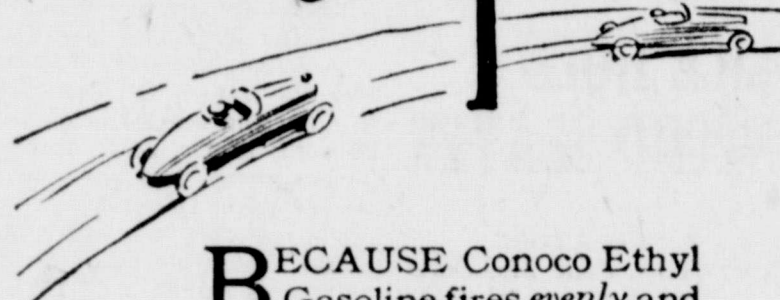

"The proper care of footwear, coupled with its intelligent selection, means a reduction of from one-quarter to one-half in shoe bill and at the same time keeps the feet neatly and serviceably shod. Good care includes prompt repair. It is never true economy to wear down-at-the-heel, dilapidated shoes. Such shoes neither protect the feet nor properly support the body. What might be saved in leather may be paid eventually to foot specialists and doctors. If the necessary bit of repairing is put off the shoe may be so badly worn that it no longer is worth mending and from \$2 to \$5 will be lost by neglect."

Lone Star Gas Co. to Build Line Short Ways from City

(Continued from Page 1)

Texas and Oklahoma but do not have anything to do with oil. Gas is our business. In Oklahoma and Texas we now have more than \$100,000,000 in properties and within the next five years we expect to spend \$15,000,000 in West Texas, furnishing the cities of this section with natural gas from fields in Brown, Coleman, Callahan, Eastland and Shackelford counties.

"Our lines now extend into the Panhandle and into Oklahoma. We furnish North Texas and a large part of the state with gas now, and with the gas supply of the Central Texas counties unlimited none of the cities on our system will be without gas at any time, either winter or summer, and during the coldest months the supply will be as strong as during the summer months."

Recently the Lone Star company purchased the holdings of the Texas Company, which extend into this section as far as Abilene. On July 1st the Lone Star company will take over the Brownwood Gas Company. The former concern now has men in Brownwood checking up the properties and the transaction will be closed at the end of the present month.

When asked about the franchise Mr. Dennings said that neither Ballinger nor San Angelo had granted such to his company and that they had not purchased Barney Carter's franchise, which has been reported transferred to G. L. Ohlstrom & Company, of New York.

The Ballinger franchise was originally granted to D. C. Boyd, of Cisco, who in turn transferred it to Mr. Carter. It was reported some time ago that the new com-

pany was ready to take over the work and start immediately on the line from Coleman county through Ballinger and to San Angelo, but no new developments have been reported from this source.

"Had the citizens of Ballinger asked us to take over the franchise last fall when it was granted to Mr. Carter, we would have refused it because we were not then ready to start work in this section," Mr. Dennings asserted. "We do not take over a franchise until we are ready to do the work and then it is soon completed."

AUSTIN, June 21.—Possibility that the Lone Star Gas Company may pipe natural gas into Austin is seen by the local city commission.

F. L. Chase, of Dallas, vice-president of the company, has requested—and been granted—a conference on the matter.

Other companies also are understood to be bidding tentatively. The city is served with artificial gas.
