Walker found guilty, Kennedy acquitted

SNYDER — A Scurry district court jury found Pat N. Walker, Post attorney and oil operator, guilty of a charge of theft by exercising control here late Friday afternoon, but acquitted James Kennedy of Post, his oil partner, of the same charge.

The six-man, six-woman jury deliberated three and one-half hours before returning its verdict.

District Judge Wayland G. Holt set June 6 for sentencing Walker.

The trial, which began Tuesday afternoon with jury selection and continued all week, was moved from Post to Snyder by a change of venue.

The felony charge of theft

by exercising control concerned the taking of scrap iron belonging to Erwin Young, formerly of Post who now lives in Colorado, for construction of a platform for a drilling rig owned by Walker and Kennedy, as trial testimony showed.

Walker took the stand in his own defense and testified that Young had given his consent for the scrap iron to be picked up.

Young, a witness for the state, testified that there

Further construction is proposed for center

3 requests at hearing

Three requests were made Monday night for city revenue sharing funds at the public hearing conducted by the city council — and the "biggest pitch" came from supporters of the Post Community Center who urge phase II and III of that project to be undertaken.

Phase II is the construction of the main entrance with new restrooms plus some exterior trim.

Phase III is building a youth center in what is now the rear of the east parking lot at the center.

These two projects were estimated to cost \$91,000 by architects in 1975 when original community center conversion plans were drawn for the super market building.

Mrs. Patty Kirkpatrick, chairman of the city-county youth board, told the council that the architectural firm who drew the plans told her this week that construction costs have gone up "at least 15 percent since that time — and to be safe the 1975 estimates should be increased by 25 percent."

This would add \$22,750 to the total, bringing the possible present cost to \$113,750.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick told the council that the youth center had functioned well in the present center two nights a week but since March the young people had been "run off" five nights for other events which were scheduled into the center on either Thursday or Saturday nights.

City Councilwoman Maxine Marks, the community center director who headed the mayor's community center committee that brought the present center into being, said a separate youth center would aid operations. Both women pointed to the steadily increasing use of the community center and predicted its use by the community will continue to increase.

Norma Baumann, youth center director who was praised by Mrs. Kirkpatrick for the outstanding job she has been doing with the young people, said the youth night attendance is growing and has topped 100 on a

Saturday night.

She said she expected heavier use by the young people during the summer vacation period.

The City has some \$43,000 in federal revenue sharing funds to budget through Sept. 30 and is further assured of well over \$100,000

additional in 1978 and 1979.

It was a "listening session" for the council who took no action on any of the requests, but the community center project received at least "a good ear" from all council members.

The other two fund requests were from Joe

Giddens, asking an additional \$890 from the city for the summer recreational program, and for office space to make a variety of health services available here to all citizens.

The latter request was made by Dr. Board who (See Revenue, Page 16)

Garza's 1976 oil output up

Unlike most of the rest of Texas, Garza County's oil production increased last year.

A release by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association listing Texas oil and gas production by counties for 1976 showed Garza County produced 6,960,162 barrels of oil for the 12 months period.

This was approximately 160,000 barrels more than the 6,800,000 pumped from Garza wells in 1975.

Texas oil production declined for the fourth year in a row slipping 31,958,079 barrels to a total of 1,179,221,092 in 1976.

Scurry County, Garza's southern neighbor, was the No. 1 oil producing county in the state last year with 83,071,294 barrels.

Garza has produced a total of 148,916,895 barrels of oil since the first discovery well in 1926.

Free advice to graduates

We don't know what the odds are exactly, but they shouldn't be too long that one of the 64 youngsters who will step up for his or her diploma at Antelope Stadium Friday night will wind up a millionaire.

The odds are even better that several will be quite successful and that a majority will lead happy and fulfilling lives.

Your 12 years of schooling to date has been all preparation to go fourth as young adults into a still bright, if complicated and dangerous world to carve out a hunk of life for your very own.

What kind of life that will be will depend upon many things.

For those who have planned and continue to aim at specific goals your changes of success are better providing you have chosen goals which aren't too high — or aren't too low either.

For those who are prepared to seize opportunity when it comes and work diligently, you need only a little luck — the presentation of the opportunity — to succeed.

For those who have no goals and care little where life carries you, look to be in ten years in some eddy of life's stream just going round and round.

Success is not to be measured in material wealth. That is the acceptable American yardstick, but it is not a proper one which is part of America's dilemma.

Success could be better measured in individual achievement. Some want to achieve great undertakings. Some want to travel. Some seek an "exciting life." Some want to help others. Others prefer a quiet routine.

We prefer to rate success on a happiness scale.

For example, a big strong boy with an outdoor background may love horses and

ranch life and completely enjoy ranch life. He may be a cowboy or a rodeo performer (for extra money) when he is young, but when he matures he may wind up being one of the area's most solid cattlemen.

Same goes for a farm boy who loves farming and sees the challenge of an excellent life there as an agri-businessman.

The problem for most young people is that at the age of high school graduation they have no idea what they want to do with their lives, but are just in a hurry to get on with it.

The ones who know what they want to try are fortunate. They should see if they are capable of getting a start in what they want to do. That may mean college training or trade school preparation.

One of the greatest futures today for young Americans are in good trade schools.

College certainly isn't the answer for everybody. It is for some. In many fields today college education has not only doubled in cost over the last 10 years but a master's degree is almost a pre-requisite instead of just a four-year bachelor's.

A lot of parents can't afford college for their kids.

But the chance is there for those who want it because there are plenty of opportunities to borrow through governmental guaranteed educational loans and through job programs. It makes a college education a lot of work. But it is there for just about everybody who needs one.

To sum it up, for every graduate your future deserves some hard thought and planning. Remember it is best to take a few years now to get on the right road for your life than to grab the first job you see that can buy you a car and support you and a young family.

Instant voting no answer

Instant registration on election day at any polling place has been proposed by the Carter administration for all federal elections.

The plan has drawn a lot of editorial comment across the country. A lot of politicians and unions don't like it even though everybody points out how easy election day fraud could be under such ideal circumstances.

The theory behind the instant registration proposal is that many citizens are prevented or discouraged from voting by restrictive registration laws. The concern on low voter turnout is understandable. Only 53 percent of the electorate bothered to vote for president last November.

Congressman Omar Burleson who opposes instant registration points out it does not follow that instant registration means universal voting. Surveys made after the presidential election showed only two percent of last November's non-voters listed registration as the reason they failed to vote.

In the small towns and rural areas, registration is no real problem as long as a citizen is interested enough in voting to take the time to register when innumerable opportunities present themselves.

Of course, in most big cities registration is far more difficult. It calls for a special trip to the office where the registration is being conducted, more often than not a wait in line and so forth. It's enough of a hassle that a lot of working folks put it off until the deadline is passed and they're "out of action" politically.

But for these "instant voting" is not necessarily the answer, just an easier opportunity without a great deal of lost time to properly register.

Voter apathy is a problem, as Congressman Burleson points out, "but a walk in voter with no other qualifications than his bodily presence hardly appears to be the solution."

The choice of governmental officials is meaningless unless citizens carefully weigh their votes.

If you've noticed, The Dispatch years ago abandoned the pre-election editorial urging everybody to be sure and vote. We don't want the "don't cares", "the I don't know whose running," or the "let's see now what proposition are we voting on today" to cast a vote.

We like to see elections settled by the citizens who care about what's going on.

Mr. and Mrs. William F. Shiver became the parents of Tiana Maury Shiver on May 26, 1959, in Freer, Texas. Daddy claims that I didn't stop my squalling and howling until I started school six years later. Two years after my birth, my chorus got a new voice in the form of my sister Larisa Shiver. My mother as a primary student, remembered as pleasant ones filled with loving teachers and piano lessons. As I advanced to elementary school, I became a sneezed and sneezed my way through elementary school and into high school where I became a bookworm. My favorite pastime of devouring every book that I encountered in junior high school was occasionally interrupted by solo and ensemble contests on my new flute.

I was forced into high school where I gained many new insights through drama club plays, numerous clubs and organizations, choir, band, and piano lessons. As I prepare to graduate, mother and daddy hint that they would enjoy an old tradition of my six year dreams, and I am anxiously waiting to see if there is truly life after graduation.

MARK KIRKPATRICK
Mark Kirkpatrick was born in Lubbock, Texas on December 26, 1958 — or so the birth certificate says. He was the first born of Mr. and Mrs. K. W. Kirkpatrick. His father is a teacher and his mother a housewife.

long time to plan me. Whatever the case it was seven years after my sister's Marsha, arrival that I made my grand appearance.

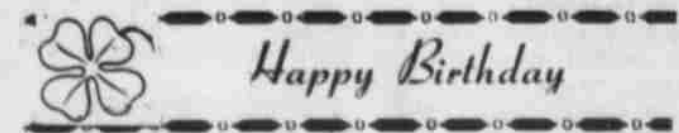

The Lubbock man explained that the area organization gives particular attention to counties who do not have organized health departments, so Garza and Post are due for prime attention in the steadily developing program.

Dr. Board said whereas state funds were available to provide a wide variety of health services personnel and equipment it could not provide its own office space. He said about four regular-sized 10 by 12-foot rooms would be needed for the health clinic here and probably would be used on a twice a week basis.

He estimated cost of such space as between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick in presenting her community center request to the council asked for an immediate \$333 from the city to help purchase an organ for the center now at the center on approval. The county is going to be asked for a like amount and the center has the remainder for the \$1,000 purchase price, she reported.

Nelson held the boy in his lap while Moore drove. Twice the boy's eyes rolled back in his head and he seemed to lose consciousness. Nelson attempted to keep him awake by promising him a ride in his helicopter.

A medical team consisting of a doctor and five nurses worked feverishly to patch the wound and to stabilize the youth's condition so that he could be transferred to Lubbock and a specialist's care. Ninety minutes after arrival at Crosbyton, he was enroute to Lubbock by ambulance.

The boy is in St. Mary's Hospital and is expected to recover.

An investigation disclosed that the boy and six younger brothers and sisters were alone in their residence on the farm after their stepfather, Claudio Lopez Jr., reportedly had taken their mother to Lubbock when the shooting occurred.

Investigating officers believe a six-year-old brother was holding a single shot .410 shotgun when it accidentally discharged, striking Mark Cuero in the back. After the accident the wounded boy and the sister had walked the quarter mile from the house to FM-651 where the two Garza men saw them.

The boy reportedly suffered three crushed ribs from the force of the impact and a punctured lung, although the lung did not collapse. Quite a bit of buckshot entered the boy's body.

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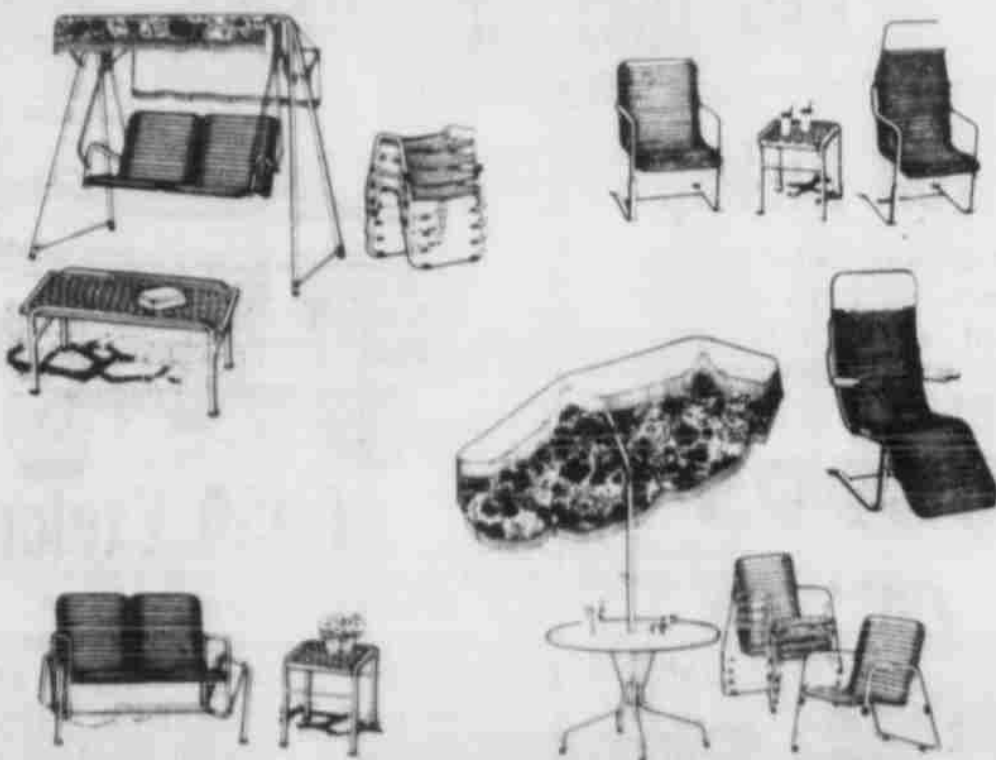
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
