CHANG PREPARES TO DEFEND CITY AGAINST BOSSES

WARSHIPS GATHER OFF COAST TO PROTECT FOREIGNERS

MARINES ARE READY

WASHINGTON TO DEMAND CONTINUANCE OF ALL U. S. RIGHTS

(By The Associated Press)

SHANGHAI, April 1.—War between China already divided by a great civil conflict between the North and South, tonight appeared threatened with further dissension arising within the Cantonese forces between the Nationalist commander in chief, General Chiang Kai-shek, and the Hankow government.

Reports from usually trustworthy sources today indicated that General Chiang has been dissuaded as generalissimo of the Nationalist forces by the Hankow government.

There was even indication, it was stated, that General Chiang, whose military victories have placed the entire Yangtze valley under Nationalist control, is now concentrating his strength in the Shengkiang district to defy the Hankow government.

Foreign Powers Prepare
Whatever the outcome of the political struggle believed to be in progress between the military and moderate wing of the Cantonese regime and the civil government at Hankow, the foreign powers in China today continued their operations to protect their nationals from civil foreign activities.

Within a short time United States warships will be on duty along the Chinese coast, from Canton in the south to Tientsin in the north, guarding American citizens. The destroyer USS Pillsbury, is on its way to Tientsin, Shanghai province, and the cruiser Asheville has been ordered to Tientsin to guard the foreign expeditionary force.

War-Lords Weaken
Although there have been no real foreign incidents in the north comparable to those which took place at

ELEVATOR FALL FATAL

One Man Killed; Two Others Probably Fatally Injured in Tumble Down Shaft

NEW YORK, April 1 (AP)—One man was killed and two others were injured, probably fatally, when William Mulholland, 32, hurried 15 floors down an elevator shaft in a building under construction in Brooklyn today.

As Mulholland made the 170-foot plunge to his death, he struck Richard Detloff, 32, Wayne, N. J., who was working on the top of the elevator cage in the shaft, both men crashing through the elevator roof, falling on Joseph Wademan, 25, who was working inside the car. Mulholland was dead when fellow workers reached him. Detloff and Wademan suffered severe internal injuries and long hospitalization. Hospital physicians say both men will recover.

SAN ANTONIO, April 1 (AP)—Private S. L. Ginder of the twentieth infantry was released on bond of \$1,500 today in charges of robbery by assault. Captain P. Watson, victim of the assault in a hospital recovering from a blow about the head, Watson, who is 32 years old, kept a small grocery and was supervisor of one of the camp trucks in the barracks. He is said to have lost between \$25 and \$300.

TWO RESCUERS DIE IN AIDING FELLOW

BODIES OF THREE MEN FOUND VICTIM OF DEADLY POCKET GAS

(By The Associated Press)

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., April 1.—Two mine rescuers were killed today in a battle with deadly gas in the Connorsville mine, a branch of a mine from Thompson, Pa., and were summoned to take part in the rescue of the mine which had been sealed for 10 months because of fire in the workings.

Direct mine men were on hand to direct the operations, for it was known that sealed underground tunnels were choked with gases. Cases of helmet gas were sent in to capture the working and to ascertain it possible whether the sealing of the mine had extinguished the fire.

C. Roy Ruppel, Frank Burns and Wm. Heagy, of Parnassus, formed one crew.

For some unexplained reason, it was said, Ruppel removed the mouth piece of his helmet. He soon collapsed a victim of carbon monoxide. Burns and Heagy, realizing the danger, sought to carry Ruppel to safety in their haste to save Ruppel they forgot to keep their oxygen helmets closed, and they were overcome.

FORD MUST STAY IN BED

Doctor's Orders Make Capitalist Lie Flat on Back Until Injuries Are Healed

DETROIT, April 1 (AP)—Amidst the quiet, peaceful surroundings of his home, Henry Ford tonight impatiently obeyed the instructions of his personal physician that he remain flat on his back in bed as the quickest and surest means of recovering from injuries received last Sunday night when the Ford coupe in which he was driving alone was forced from the road.

Meanwhile, the statements and rumors dealing the accident as a result of a deliberate attempt to kill Mr. Ford continued to an expression of belief it actually was an accident, possibly unknown to the driver who caused it. The possibility of further official investigation virtually had vanished.

BRITAIN INTENDS MAKE CHINA PAY FULL INDEMNITY

WILL ACT ALONE SHOULD OTHER POWERS NOT CO-OPERATE

WANTS U. S. TO HELP

WILL ASK APOLOGY AND PAY FOR SLAYING OF SUBJECTS

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, April 1.—Great Britain is prepared to play a lone hand and a strong hand, if necessary, in settling the Nanking affair.

A note to the Chinese authorities stating the British demand was approved by the cabinet today and is to be forwarded to the Washington and Tokyo governments in the hope they will agree to make the protest jointly.

It is understood the final draft of the note demands reparation for the victims of the Nanking outrages, or their families, punishment of the perpetrators and apologies to the governments whose consulates were looted and whose officials were attacked.

The cabinet also considered what action to take in the event of rejection of the British demand by the Chinese. On this question, however, it is indicated that Great Britain's policy has not taken any definite form.

Match depends upon the wishes of the United States and Japan. Suggestions have come from both capitals which might be incorporated in the British plan of action. However, in this case also, Great Britain will act alone if not supported by the other powers.

The fixing of responsibility for the Nanking attacks on individuals of the Cantonese troops will be left entirely to the national governments, on which the British place responsibility for the events at Nanking. Officials here believe that establishment of a commission of inquiry composed of foreigners would be futile, resulting only in delay in liquidating the whole affair.

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—Senator Charles McNary, who is a millionaire, was forced today to borrow a dollar from Senator Borah of Idaho, before he could eat lunch.

The Michigan senator had forgotten that the separate restaurant, where he stores his change, accounts, had closed and he was faced with either going hungry or raising some money.

He met Senator Borah outside the capitol and explained that he had left his pocket book at home and needed a dollar.

"That's an old story," replied Borah. "I believe you're broke, but here's the dollar. This is the proudest moment of my life."

King Ferdinand Is Reported Dying

KING FERDINAND IS SAID TO BE DYING

CONFLICTING REPORTS UPON ROUMANIAN RULER ARE GIVEN OUT

(By The Associated Press)

PARIS, April 1.—Advices from Bucharest say that it was reported tonight in official circles that King Ferdinand of Roumania, whose illness was reported today to have taken a turn for the worse, was expected to face a crisis tonight which his physicians did not believe he would survive.

The police and military authorities in Bucharest were said to have taken all precautions in view of possible disorders which might follow the king's death.

Doctors Report
BUCHAREST, April 1 (AP)—A slight improvement in the condition of King Ferdinand of Roumania was announced in an official bulletin issued tonight over the signature of Professor Denicopol, the hospital head.

His majesty's condition is slightly improved. Temperature 34.4 centigrade (93.92 Fahrenheit) respiration 20 pulse 100.

WAR RECALLED BY TRAIN
Marines Enroute to China Label the Sides of Cars With Slogans As in World Conflict

FORT WORTH, April 1 (AP)—Memories of world war days were fresh today when a long troop train, with "China" painted on the coaches, passed through the city, bearing 125 men and 11 officers of the sixth regiment, United States Marines, on their way to San Diego, California, via El Paso.

A fair trip. No sickness or trouble. "All's well." This was the message of Colonel Charles Stephenson, one of the officers aboard. Colonel E. C. Snyder is in command of the detachment.

The men were from Philadelphia, Boston, New York and other northern and eastern cities. They will be followed by detachments on three other trains due to pass this city today.

FERGUSON IS SILENT
Makes No Comment Upon Signing of Anti-Amnesty Bill By Governor Moody

DALLAS, April 1 (AP)—James E. Ferguson, former governor, in a long distance conversation from Meridian, Bosque county, tonight said that he would not make a statement at this time concerning the signing of the anti-amnesty bill by Governor Dan Moody yesterday, but would give out one last word sometime next week.

The bill signed by Governor Moody was in the nature of a repeal of the so-called amnesty bill passed early in the "civilization" regime of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson with the object of restoring the right to hold office to her husband, impeached while governor in 1917.

Radio Rulers Ponder Congestion Problem

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—Considering four days of public hearings at which scores of representatives of radio interests appeared, the federal radio commission tonight took under advisement a voluminous record of testimony out of which it hopes to bring a semblance of order to the present chaotic radio situation.

A multitude of proposals to remedy the congestion resulting from 732 stations using 35 available wave lengths were offered and these the commission is at liberty to use in reaching a starting point for relieving stations of April 24, when the sixty day respite allowed by law expires.

Out of the mass of suggestions came several large scale plans which, if adopted, would revolutionize present broadcasting by wholesale reduction of the number of stations; other general opposition to revision of the present broadcast band; other physical changes on the ground that existing equipment would have to be scrapped, and less drastic formulae to reduce the number of stations; almost

BREAKFAST—Baked apples, cereal, cream, country sausage, cornmeal pancakes, maple syrup, milk, crisp graham toast, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Ham loaf, creamed celery, fruit guff, pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, tea.

DINNER—Schubert steak, baked sweet potatoes, parsley patty cakes, eggplant with hard cooked egg dressing, gingerbread pudding, graham rolls, milk, coffee.

Small persons under school age may have some maple syrup with their crisp toast since they should not include in the pancakes.

Ham Loaf
Two cups cold boiled rice, 1 cup chopped cold boiled ham, 1/2 cup stale bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 teaspoon onion juice, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 tablespoon flour.

Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Put ham and rice through food chopper. Add sauce, bread crumbs, parsley, onion juice, pepper and paprika. Mix well and add egg beaten until light. Mix thoroughly and press into a brick shaped pan well buttered. Cover with buttered paper and bake forty minutes in a moderate oven. Turn out of pan onto a hot platter, garnish with sprigs of parsley and serve.

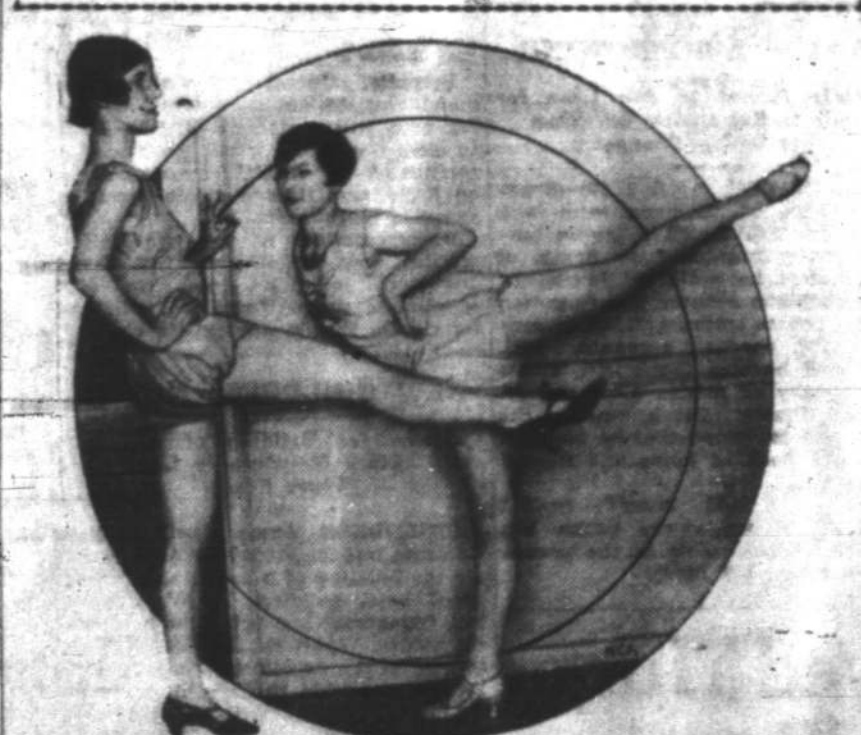

What a stunning costume!—you exclaim admiringly upon viewing a new spring creation on a manikin. But do you realize that half the beauty of clothes lies in the way they are worn? The smartness of Easter ensembles cries for a graceful bearing and a spring walk to set it off.

Exercise that teaches muscular control lies at the bottom of every graceful walk. The battle for grace begins at the waist line. If you let your body sag or grow stiff, how can you swing along as if you owned the world? You can't.

Perhaps you are one of the guilty ones who have neglected exercise for the selection of new hats and frocks. If so, it is high time you made your ways. And here are the exercises to limber your back and line you up for a walk of distinction.

First, turn on a phonograph record with real verve. Music, I repeat, should always accompany exercise. Stand erect, head-up, back straight, finger-

tips on hips. Rest your weight on one foot, and swing the other out in front of you, with a kick, as high as you can without bending your trunk. Now swing it out behind you then to the front until it resembles a pendulum, swing blither and higher each time. If necessary, hold onto a door to keep from losing your balance though it is better done without support.

CHECKING UP ON PRESCRIPTIONS OF LIQUOR BY DOCTORS

All of us know, almost for certain that a large percent of the prescriptions issued for liquor are issued for no real physical ailment. Many thousands of gallons of the stuff has been sold under the prescription rule that we are confident was never intended for medicine, and for that reason we are inclined to believe that there should be some very strict regulations be tied to the issuing of prescriptions for the stuff. It seems that there is liable to be a checking up on the action of some of the fellows who are issuing prescriptions promiscuously. The Vernon Record a few days ago stated editorially that Comptroller H. B. Terrell has announced a campaign against doctors who write liquor prescriptions in the names of fictitious persons or who issue them in the absence of an actual physical examination of the patient, with the avowed purpose of revoking permits issued to doctors who violate this provision of the law regulating the prescribing of liquor. Already the permits of two San Antonio physicians have been revoked, we are informed, and it is the announced purpose of Mr. Terrell to carry on a state-wide investigation of such violations as were found in San Antonio. No doubt an investigation would reveal that violations of the kind complained of by Mr. Terrell are general. It is a matter of common knowledge that there is little difficulty in obtaining liquor prescriptions, the chief limitations being the price and the supply of blanks furnished to physicians. That informal and promiscuous writing of liquor prescriptions is a violation of the law is to be obvious to require a supporting argument. The law very clearly states that liquor may be issued on a physician's prescription for "medical" purposes. Many, perhaps a majority, of the prescriptions go to persons who make no secret of their desire to use the liquor for beverage purposes. A "medical" need can be conjured up for most anybody who has the price of a prescription. This is not true of all doctors, but it is true of many, who use their liquor prescription permits to insure themselves a nice bit of cash patronage. Comptroller Terrell has discovered nothing that was already generally known, and it is not surprising that investigation revealed the fact that two San Antonio physicians had violated the provisions of the law in issuing liquor prescriptions. But there isn't much that he can do about it, so far as securing a general enforcement of the law is concerned. The doctor is the judge of a patient's medicinal needs, and rightly so, and he can outwit Mr. Terrell's sleuths by the simple process of going through the appearance of making a personal physical examination of all patients to whom he issues liquor prescriptions. About the only remedy for the evils of promiscuous writing of liquor prescriptions is an awakened sense of duty that physicians owe to the laws of their country and to their professional ethics. This is a slow process, and the fees are too attractive to expect doctors to forego the opportunity of picking up the money that the thirsty ones are eager, anxious and willing to pay fancy prices for a pint of satisfaction for their appetites.

CRIME COMMISSION'S WORK MAKES GOOD SHOWING

Up in New New York some drastic laws are being passed by the legislature in an effort to stamp out crime, or at least bring it down to a minimum. In commenting on this act the San Antonio Express says that forty bills have been passed by the New York legislature at the State Crime Commission's behest to put more "teeth" in the famous Baumes Laws for curbing crime. Outspoken opposition has arisen against only one out of the forty, which would impose more drastic regulations regarding the sale of pistols.

For example, one provision would raise the presumption of guilt against all persons riding in a automobile in which a revolver were found. Marksmen's clubs and other citizens protest that such a law would infringe the constitutional right to keep and bear arms.

As a result of these objections the measure may be modified somewhat. Nothing would be gained by making it so severe as to be unenforceable; but it is not likely to be, and should not be, dropped altogether.

Meanwhile, the 39 other bills—intended to render parole and bail harder and conviction easier, to simplify judicial procedure and leave fewer loopholes by which the criminal may escape punishment—probably will be enacted virtually without dissent. The lawmakers already have voted unanimously to continue the investigating body's life for another

year—sufficient evidence that its work has been satisfactory.

Given sweeping powers and a year in which to labor, the Commission could study crime conditions in the State at first hand and more thoroughly than had been attempted before. A legislative program better adapted to the public needs than a judiciary committee could have devised in the brief time at its disposal, was worked out thus.

Though in effect only since last July 1, the Baumes Laws have demonstrated their usefulness. A decline in crimes against life and property is noted already. Professional bandits, finding the New York atmosphere unhealthy, have sought more congenial environment. Numerous other legislators are giving consideration to bills modeled after the Baumes Laws.

The National Crime Commission, that about a year ago initiated the movement for a scientific study of lawlessness, suggests that more States profitably might undertake such surveys as that lately completed in New York. It has afforded an intelligent, hopeful basis for legislation.

A State crime commission need not be expensive. The New York Legislature appropriated \$100,000 to cover a year's work; but for the average State, it is estimated, \$5,000 to \$20,000 a year will be found ample. Compared to the annual cost of crime, that outlay is small indeed.

MELLON'S CLINCHING ARGUMENT

In answering the Columbus and Princeton University professors' plea for revision of the foreign debt contracts with a view to cancellation in whole or in part, Secretary of the Treasury Mellon used a clinching argument. The Allies bought war supplies in the United States on credit; the United States paid cash for all it bought in Europe. The debts represent the credit given by the United States Government. That, says Mr. Mellon, "explains why we ended the war with everyone owing us and our owing no one."

That explanation strikes a deadly blow at the theory that American loans to the Allies were a contribution to a common cause. If that had been the thought in the mind of both parties, it should have extended to supplies obtained in Europe for the American Army. In that event notes might have been given by each party to the others, but would have been regarded as mere memoranda to be returned at the close of the war. Thus the slate would have been clean.

That thought was due not in the mind of the Allies. When discussion of loans began soon after the United States declared war, France requested that no gifts be offered and insisted on payment at the expiration of thirty years. Not until the war ended did talk of cancellation begin, on the theory of contribution to a common cause. Had that theory been in mind of either party, one party would hardly have sold on credit to another from which it was buying for cash.

Nothing then remains of the plea for cancellation except the pretense that in not giving much sooner to the aid of the Allies the United States was false to a moral obligation; that it let the Allies do its fighting while it prepared to fight; that the loans were an inadequate offset to the losses of men suffered by the Allies at that period. That argument by implication attacks the right of the American people to be sole judge of the question whether and when they should declare war—a right inherent in national sovereignty.

This Nation does not accept the judgment of any other nation as to when it should make war, especially that of nations which have made secret, selfish bargains contingent on the result of the war—bargains which the Allies did not probably dare not, reveal to the American Government, much less invite it to become a party to them; bargains which weakened the claim that the Allies were fighting not only for their independence but for that of this and all other nations. This Nation has the unrestricted right to decide when it should fight, and those who say it should have been guided by the opinion of other nations make an insidious attack on our independence.

BANKING HABITS ENCOURAGE NATIONAL THRIFT

The American people have had much teaching, particularly during and since the World War, in the doctrine of thrift. We have made some measurable progress along that line, to be sure. A century ago the savings banks deposits in this country were less than \$1,250,000,000; today they are about \$25,000,000,000. Seventy years ago there were 8,635 depositors in savings institutions; today these have increased to 40,000,000.

The size and number of banks and similar financial organizations have increased tremendously in recent years, and a glance at the daily news dispatches indicates that this expansion has by no means reached its maximum. In the matter of dollars and cents we as a nation are becoming well placed in the thrifty class.

Why Are You Bald?

The average scalp has at least a hundred thousand hairs, if they are all there. In few instances in modern life, however, has any man all that he started with, and indeed many women are inclined to think they have lost a few.

There are two reasons according to experts, why the hair falls out. In the first place, because of some infection of the scalp or disease. In the second large group of cases the cause is not determined.

In such cases, the hair may fall out all at once all over the body, or it may fall out in large or small patches. After a severe fever, there is a tendency for the hair to fall out, usually about three months after the time the fever was at its highest.

It takes a hair about six weeks to grow one inch and cutting the end does not improve its growing qualities. Cutting sometimes will remove the split ends. The hair of various persons varies in thickness from 15 to 20 to an inch, if laid side by side, to nearly as 300 to an inch.

HEYDLER WOULD ARBITRATE HORNSBY STOCK

OFFERS TO SETTLE WITH FORMER CARD TO GAIN RELEASE

(By the Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 2.—President John A. Heydler of the National League today said he would offer to arbitrate the Rogers Hornsby stock tangle in a final effort to keep the case out of the courts.

According to Heydler, he intended to confer immediately with Hornsby and President Sam Breadon of the Cardinals in an effort to dispose of the former's holdings in the St. Louis club. Heydler described his hope of success as depending largely on convincing both men the "best interests of the game require a compromise."

At the same time, he stood firmly by his decision barring Hornsby from the championship lineup of the New York Giants until he disposes of the stock.

"I sincerely hope we can make President Breadon and Hornsby realize that a compromise is necessary for the good of baseball," he said. "Baseball men with whom I have discussed this case seem to agree that Hornsby has no chance of getting the \$195 a share he is asking."

"My personal opinion is that Hornsby should sell his stock now while the Cardinals are a good investment. He is a minority stock holder, and probably Breadon is the only man who will buy his holdings. The latter already has offered Hornsby I understand \$50 a share, which is slightly more than the price he paid."

"I can appreciate McGraw's viewpoint. They have bought a valuable player and they don't want to be deprived of his services. At the same time, as president of the League, I am duty bound to protect the public against anything approaching syndicate baseball."

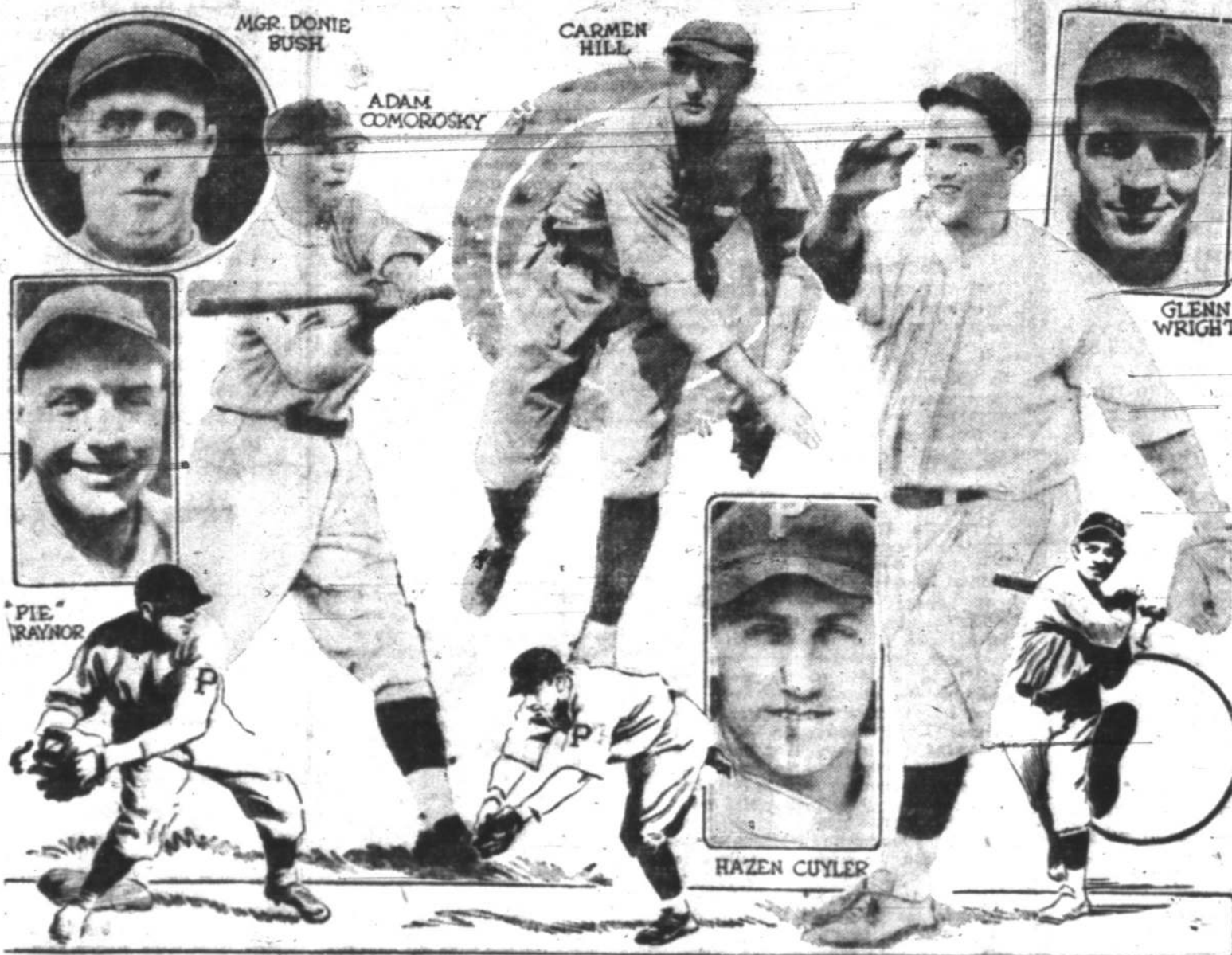

Paulino Decisively Wins Heeney Bout

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, April 1.—Paulino Lucendo, the Spanish woodchopper, battered his way to a judges' decision over Tom Heeney of New Zealand in a close and bitterly fought ten round match in Madison Square Garden.

The Basque's line held as they locked heads and slugged away like a pair of longshoremen on a dock. Despite a volley of short right chops to the chin, the Spaniard forced the fighting in the sixth and drew fresh blood from Heeney's battered eye.

A terrific left to the head nearly floored Heeney in the seventh, but the New Zealander, although in bad shape, withstood a fierce battering as the round closed. Paulino found the range with his left in the eighth and continued beating home punishment although Heeney slipped over several stiff right counters. Nanking and other nationalist controlled cities, there is anxiety here over a pronounced weakening in the authority of the Kuomintang, or northern war lords. It is feared the collapse of the northern military might might result in anarchical conditions which would imperil foreigners.

The ignominious defeat of General Chang Tsung-Chang at Shanghai, and Nanking by the nationalists, has greatly diminished his prestige in the province of Shanghai, and consequently has increased the possibility of disorders there.

A majority of foreign women and children have been evacuated from Ningpo in Chekiang province, south of Shanghai, while virtually all foreigners have left Changshu, in Hunan, and Wuhu and Chungking on the Yangtze.

Two strong Japanese fleets have appeared on the Chinese coast.

To Protect Americans

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—Firm intentions of the Washington government to use whatever means necessary to protect Americans in China was reiterated today in a formal statement by Secretary Kellogg, issued shortly after orders had gone out sending 1,500 additional marines to stand by at San Diego, California, awaiting developments. A platoon of light tanks and two batteries of motorized field artillery, with the new gas and light of marines.

The United States government is taking necessary steps to protect the lives and property of Americans in China," Secretary Kellogg said.

He added that no orders for American evacuation of Shanghai had been issued from Washington and that only those Americans located at points in China where protection could not be afforded had been advised to withdraw by Minister MacMurray at Peking. Mr. Kellogg's statement was prompted by published criticism, among Americans at Shanghai, including certain officials of the municipal council, which governs the international city, charging lack of firmness in Washington in dealing with the crisis and failure to cooperate with other western powers.

U. S. Cooperates

American diplomatic and military representatives in China are cooperating fully with other foreign representatives when faced with a joint problem such as protection of the lives and property of their nationals," Mr. Kellogg said.

The same statement of miscommunication placed on official announcements in Washington as they are circulated in Shanghai was indicated at the White House. It was indicated that in the future, the views of President Coolidge in connection with day to day developments in China might not be made available as freely as in recent weeks.

As to the movement of additional marines to San Diego, beside the force already enroute, the foreign representatives in Washington for Shanghai it was stated the President does not expect to be sent to China, unless they are called for by Admiral Williams.

Commissioners court records and equipment are being assembled in the office vacated by the justice and finishing touches were added Friday evening to the moving process.

JUDGE MULLIGAN MAY NOT TAKE BENCH HERE MONDAY

While feeling better, Col. Clark M. Mulligan, judge of the newly created 29th district court here, who has been ill at his home for some time, may not be able to assume the bench when the court opens Monday. It was announced Friday.

No announcement has been made as yet on whether or not the court will open with a special judge, or whether the term will be postponed.

The judge has had considerable temperature for several days, suffering with what physicians diagnosed as bronchial pneumonia and was not clear of fever Friday.

Operators, too, doubted that any prompt settlement would be made. Some predicted a suspension lasting three months.

Non Union Attempt

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 1 (AP)—Announced determination of the Pittsburgh Terminal Coal corporation to operate its mines non union, thus severing an extended relationship with the United Mine Workers, overshadowed all other developments today in the bituminous coal suspension resulting from the failure of the operators and union to reach a wage agreement.

Union leaders termed the corporation's new wage scale—a reduction from that provided in the Jacksonville agreement—ridiculous, and expressed the belief that the 3,100 union miners employed by the company would stand firm with the union in the determination to accept no cut. There are 40,000 union miners in the Pittsburgh districts.

rangers will be sufficient. They will remain until the law wins out over the lawless—until the lawless unconditionally surrender.

A second district attorney to aid the one now serving in the county will be appointed soon, Moody added. Borger, in the Hutchinson county oil field, has been the scene of numerous outbreaks since mushroom growth transformed it almost overnight into a city of 15,000 persons.

Rangers have been ordered there several times and have made numerous raids. A company of several men were stationed there for weeks but finally was removed when peace seemed to have been effected.

Further outbreaks, if not quelled by the ten picked rangers sent today, may cause the declaration of martial law as the last resort. The governor, however, said he will avoid calling the militia if possible, because he believes civil authority will win out and because of the great expense martial law would incur.

Vengeance Wrought

BORGER, Texas, April 1 (AP)—Officers tonight were working on the theory that Pat Kenyon and A. L. Terry, whose lifeless bodies were found riddled with bullets early this morning near the oil field town of Whiteburg, were slain as the result of underworld vengeance.

Three men held in the Hutchinson county jail are charged with murder of the two officers and two other men, identified as participants in the Pampa bank robbery Thursday, are being sought in connection with the same deaths.

Secrecy surrounds the investigation of officers who are being assisted in their probe by rangers McCormick and Ballard. This afternoon a dragnet was spread through resorts known as the haunts of underworld denizens and six men are in the city jail here and are being held for investigation.

"We have every reason to believe that men implicated in the robbery of the Pampa bank were also connected with the murder of Terry and Kenyon," County Attorney W. O. Cook said.

Terror Slaying

Three men tonight were held under heavy guard in the county jail at Stillwell, as the aftermath of a bank robbery and 36-ounce murder that spread terror through the Panhandle oil field the last 24 hours.

Hugh Walker and Ed Bailey were arrested early this morning in connection with the killing of Pat Kenyon and Al Terry, Borger deputy sheriffs whose bodies were found near the oil town of Whiteburg. Just before noon "Whitey" Walker, brother of Hugh, identified as one of the Pampa bank robbers was arrested here and is also held in connection with the murder of the two officers.

Reckless game, believed to have been held in the hands of Ray Terrell and Matthew Kimes, notorious Oklahoma outlaws and identified as two of the five unmasked men who Thursday afternoon robbed the First National Bank of Pampa of \$35,000, early this morning claimed the lives of the Borger police officers.

Shot In Cold Blood

The bodies of the two men, Pat Kenyon and Al Terry, were discovered just before dawn on the Phillips road near Whiteburg by Henry Field, an oil worker. The position of the two bodies indicated the two officers had made a desperate attempt to capture the bandits. They apparently were shot down in cold blood, without a chance to return the fire.

Terry lay with his head at the feet of Kenyon and their plain lay between them, where they had dropped from the lifeless hands of the deputy sheriffs. Tracks of the dead men's car indicated they had swerved across the road in an apparent attempt to block the on-coming car and it is officers opinion that the fatal shooting ensued.

Terry received a bullet in his left eye, ranging downward to the base of the brain. Kenyon was shot in the back of the head and in the left breast. Both are believed to have died instantly.

Honeymooners Find Them
Three hours later, Henry Field, driving a wedding party discovered the automobile in the road and the bodies lying on the ground.

Neither of the deputies had fired his pistol. Their guns were still loaded and it is believed their assailants opened fire on sight and then sped on in the darkness.

A chain of circumstances led officers to believe beyond any doubt that the bandits who looted the Pampa institution sent the two officers to their doom.

The elusive bandit leader hid his plans well as they drove out of Pampa after looting the bank, speeding across the rough terrain of Hutchinson county the robbers headed for the Archer farm house, midway between Pampa and Borger, drove into the farm yard with their blue and black sedan and sought for the Archer garage, where they picked up the car.

Then, with drawn pistols, they approached the house and demanded en-

trance.
All through the afternoon the bandit gang stood guard over W. E. Archer and his sister. Placards dangled from their hands punctuated with threats to kill their host.

At dusk the bandit leader ordered the farmer and his sister into a closet, looked them in and then rolled the big sedan out of the garage and proceeded on their journey.

The identification of Terrell and Kimes as the Pampa gang was made certain today when officials of the bank after viewing pictures of the two men, positively identified them as members of the public crew. "Whitey" Walker, a member of the famous "Out on Top" Walker gang of the Oklahoma Cherokee hills, has been identified as another member of the gang, officers said.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 1. (AP)—The mound building aborigine of America, stripped of the fantastic myths which have hovered above him, is revealed as a savage who loved the vibrant and ornamentation, paid great attention to ceremonial, trafficked with distant tribes and could fight when he had to.

This appraisal has been reached by the Ohio state archaeological and historical society after more than two seasons of exploration in the great mounds of earth and stone built as ceremonial sites and found in their greatest completeness in Ohio.

A patient striving for beauty is depicted in the remains of mound building civilization uncovered in recent months in the Scioto mound scene of "The Great Pearl Burial of Ohio."

In this primitive but regal tomb of the red man, were unearthed five kinds of cloth, leather finely tanned and dressed, and thousands upon thousands of pearls.

Within the mound, 250 feet long, 100 feet wide and 25 feet high, explorers found under a layer of earth and stones an interior mound built of puddled loam, enclosing four burial cells of logs, 1 foot square.

Two men, two women and two children were the skeletal occupants of the tomb, the men resting on copper plates, found them, and the mounds of freshwater mussel shells, some the size of small seeds and others as large as hazel nuts. All had been worn as necklaces, armlets, anklets or ornaments.

Beneath the copper plates was a

coiled evidence of the splendid burial robes on which the dead were laid. They were beautifully woven, in conventional designs with concentric circles and curving bands, and colored with vegetable dyes in red, maroon, orange, yellow, tan and black. In the moment of their finding, archaeologists' estimate of mound builder culture was lifted to a new plane.

Five pipes carved from steatite, a dense dark stone flecked with crystal, were found in highly polished, one weighing more than seven pounds. They were ceremonial council tobacco pipes, two carved to resemble dogs and others fashioned after an owl, a bear and a chipmunk.

Delving again into the mound this summer, President Arthur C. Johnson, curator of the society and H. C. Shetrone, curator of its museum, expect to find new treasures at its heart. Even if the mound yields nothing more, its exploration has added a feature to the century-long search into the untried history of America's ancient peoples.

BUILDING PERMITS SHOW INCREASE FOR LAST MONTH

Building permits for March took a jump over the months of January and February and totalled \$128,593 bringing the total for the year to \$1,354,432. Most of the permits issued during March were for residences, only a few business house permits being applied for. The largest permit issued was for the Baker Furniture company's new brick which will be erected at a cost of \$27,000.

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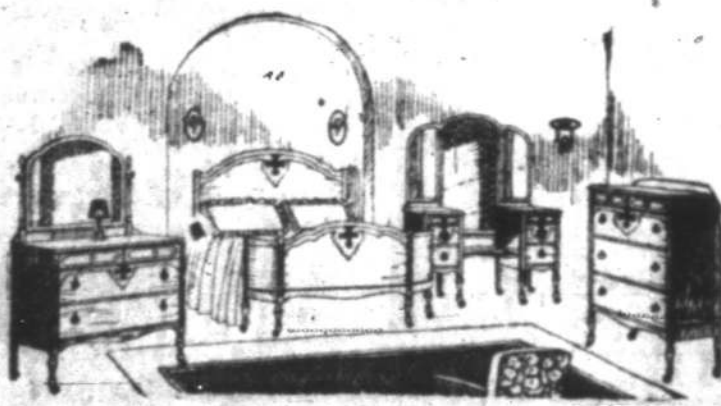
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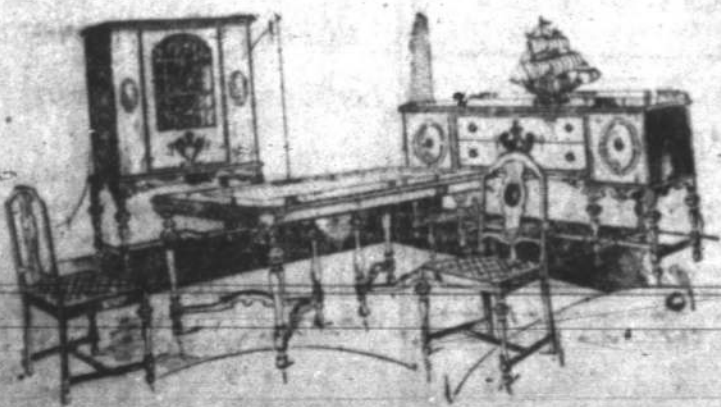
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
