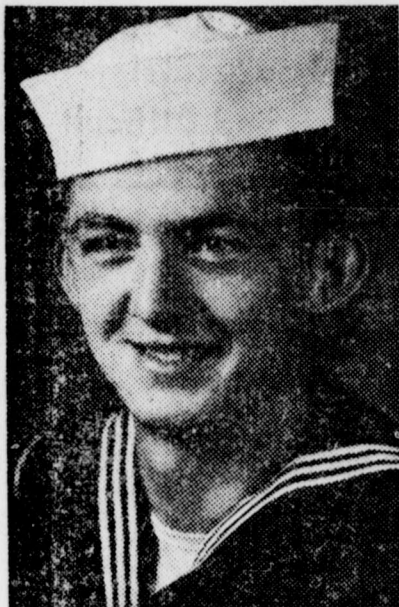


Anderson Boys Are In Navy and Army

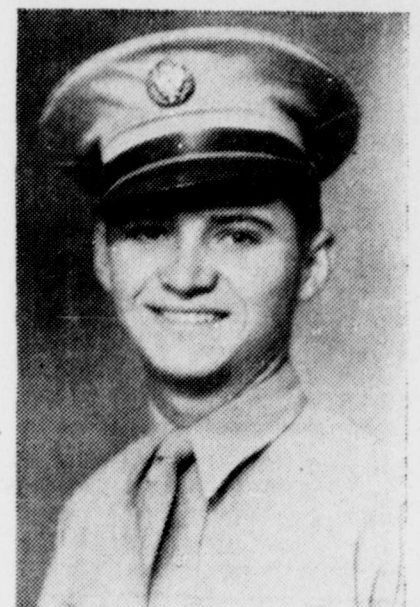

Pvt. Gene M. Young Dies Oct. 31 of Injuries Received in Germany



Another Cotton Center family now has a gold star in its service flag. Pvt. Gene M. Young, who was injured in Germany on Oct. 13, and was evacuated to Belgium for hospital treatment, died on Oct. 31st of the injuries, believed caused by shrapnel. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn B. Young of Cotton Center, former Abernathy family. The parents received a telegram from the War Department the day Gene died, telling them he had been wounded. A few days later they received a letter that Gene had dictated, reporting he "had been nicked by a piece of shrapnel." Following that another telegram was received from the War Department, reporting his condition as "unsatisfactory." The final telegram was delivered Sunday morning to the family as they attended services at the Church of Christ in Hale Center.

Gene was born April 12, 1925, at Girard. His survivors include the parents and two brothers, Vaughn and Lyndale, and grandsons, Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Young, Andrews, and Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Williams, Jayton. Gene was in service seven months and one week, and had been overseas less than a month. He attended Abernathy and Cotton Center schools. Prior to entering the service he had been employed on farms in the Cotton Center area. He received his training at Camp Hood, Texas.

Charlie Benson, 74, Resident of Hale for 55 Years, is Buried Monday

Last rites were held 3 o'clock Monday afternoon in Hale Center Baptist church for Charlie Damon Benson, 74, Hale county resident 55 years, who died early Sunday in Lubbock hospital. Benson, who lived near Cotton Center, was not married.

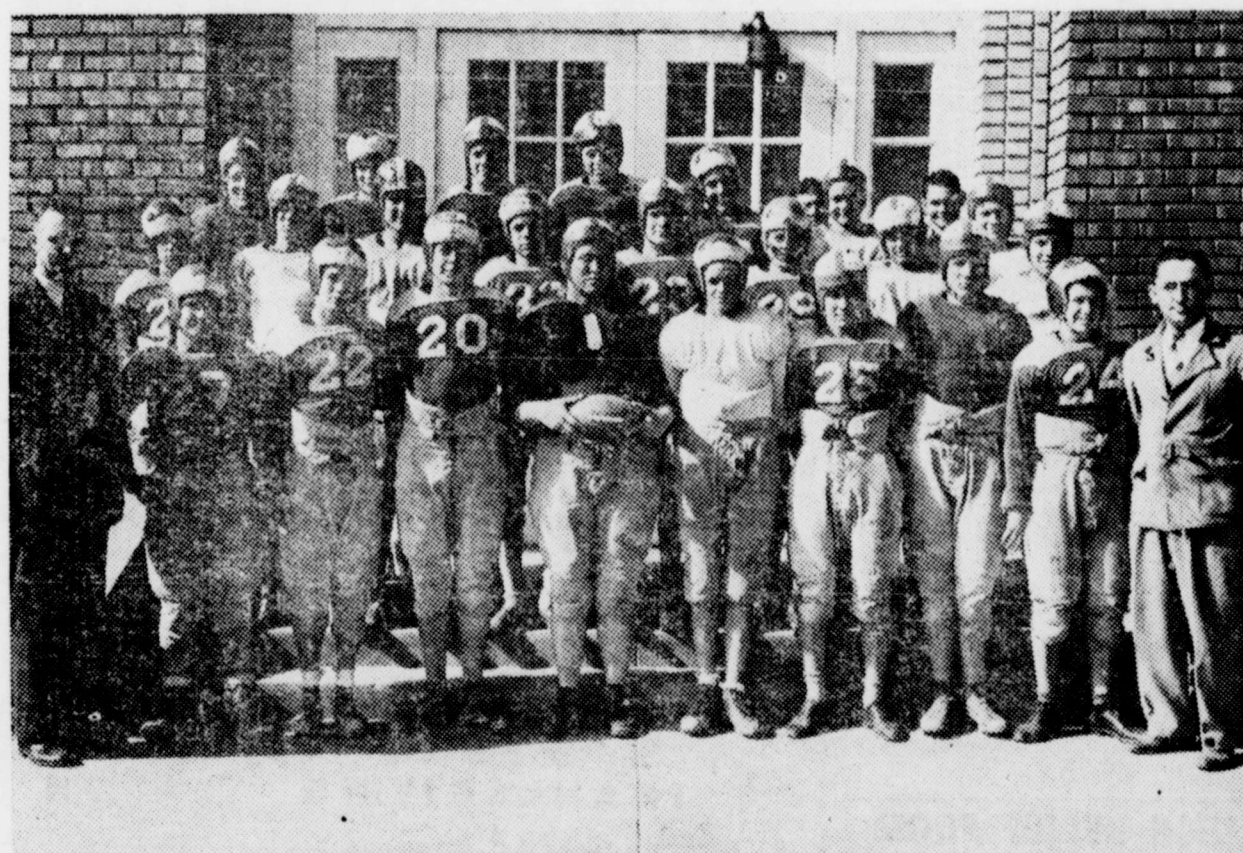

consecutive missions over enemy
territory without a turnback, and
"Tar Heel Baby," credited with 64
missions without mechanical or per-
sonnel failure. These two Libs were
champions in their class, but without

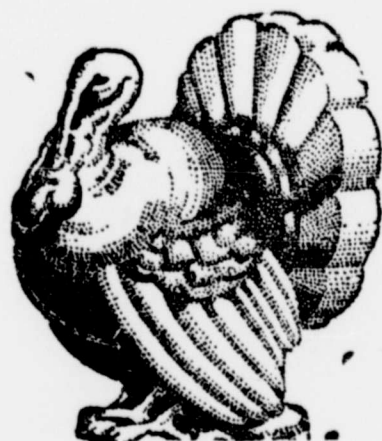

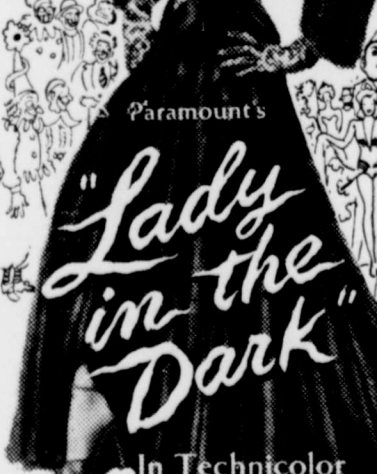
