Zeppelin Takes Off For Flight Across Pacific Chinese Troops Crowd Railways On Way To Front

Offensive Drive Against Railway Center Expected

Soviet Patrols Are Active
Along Manchurian Border
According To Unofficial
Reports Received Thurs.

Crisis Threatens

More Than 50,000 Men Are
Dispatched After Chinese
Generals Gather In
War Conference

LONDON, Aug. 22. — Manchurian railways today were crowded with troops carrying Chinese soldiers to the front. Dispatches from many unofficial sources told of border activities by Soviet patrols and of a threatened general offensive against Harbin, center of the Chinese Eastern railway system which is the subject of the present dispute.

Harbin, with the railroad running southeast to Vladivostok and also northwest through Manchuria to Siberia, is exposed on the northeast to possible gunboat attacks on the Sungari river.

Defense Planned.
A conference of generals called by Marshal Chang Hsueh Liang at Mukden decided to dispatch several additional brigades to the northern fronts and handed over to General Chang Tso Hsiang the "strategic" plan of Manchuria, the defense of the Harbin area.

So gravely did the conference view the crisis that it was decided to withhold 20 per cent of the salaries of all Manchurian officials to purchase war materials. In addition to a division of troops with a machine gun corps and several batteries of artillery sent to Harbin, 50,000 soldiers from Fengtien started for the western border post of Manchuria.

Farmer Arrested For Slaying Lad

Twelve-Year-Old Youth Is
Killed And Two Others
Wounded While Seeking
Few Ears Of Corn To Eat

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Aug. 22. — Craig Hoffman, 48, a farmer, today was arrested on charges of slaying a 12-year-old boy and wounding two other children who had gone with the boy to the Hoffman farm to get a few ears of corn to eat at an evening fire of sticks and brush.

Grover Hoffman, a brother and owner of the Blue Ribbon Farm in Manville, was released shortly after the arrest. The accused denied knowledge of the killing.

Youth Found Dead.
The Kolesar boy was dead when found and summoned by the 10-year-old sister, Anna, who alone escaped unhurt, found him lying face down in the corn field.

Helen and Joseph Klementov, 14 and 10 years old, respectively, were attempting to drag themselves along the road. Joseph, at first said to be lying with wounds in the abdomen, was reported improved tonight.

Girl Tells Story.

Anna told state police she and her companions were rolling hoops when the Hoffman farm. One of the children remarked it would be a good idea to have a corn roast in the field, so they ran into the corn field and began to pick some. While they were thus engaged a shotgun was fired and three of them, the Kolesars, were fatally shot.

First Bale Gets Premium In Terry

Says Nothing; Does Nothing

LE BOURGET, France, Aug. 22. (AP)—Dieudonne Coste, after two days of saying one thing and doing either another or nothing, tonight took a slightly different tack by saying nothing and doing nothing.

The French aviator, who has had aviation circles in a whirl of excitement by his intimations that he was going to fly to Tokyo, to New York, around the world or simply to a new world straightaway distance record, gave them a rest tonight by taking his airplane back to Villa Coublay air field, from which he could not start to do any one of those things because of its small size.

There were some indications that the air ministry had brought pressure upon him to abandon any plan he may have had to race the Graf Zeppelin in any case, weather conditions appeared unfavorable for a long flight and it was generally interpreted here that the return to Villa Coublay meant indefinite postponement of any flight.

Farmer Released On \$1000 Bond In Orchard Shooting

J. B. Moore Charged With
Assault With Intent To
Kill; Young Carlisle Girl
Victim Improves

A charge of assault with intent to kill was filed Thursday against J. B. Moore, farmer residing one mile north of Carlisle, and he was released on \$1,000 bond and bound over to the next session of the grand jury, following continued investigation in connection with the shooting Wednesday night about 10:30 o'clock of Doris Cain, 14-year-old daughter of E. M. Cain, who lives two and one-half miles north of Carlisle.

The girl is improving steadily in the West Texas hospital after an operation Wednesday night for the removal of gunshot from her body. Perforations of the intestines were suffered from the scattering shot which entered the front of her body.

Improvement Shown.
Her temperature and pulse showed continued improvement late last night according to reports from hospital attendants. She was said to have spent a fairly comfortable day yesterday.

Mr. Moore, through whose orchard the girl and five companions were passing, told officers that he shot

He was injured while riding with a man named Vernon Pole of Boonville, Okla. Pole was supposed to have returned to his home, but authorities have not been able to get in touch with him.

Lady Fliers Are Acclaimed By 20,000

Plans To Finance Highway Systems Discussed By C. C.

Regional Chambers of Commerce Hope to Work Out Plan To Complete State Roads Throughout Texas

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Aug. 22. — Plans for financing Texas highway system to completion, especially as to reimbursing counties for highways taken over by state were discussed at a meeting at the Fort Worth club Thursday by members of two sub-committees representing the three regional chambers of commerce of Texas.

A meeting of the general committee on highways of the three organizations will be held here September 25, and finding of the sub-committees at today's meeting will be reported at that time.

The three regional organizations, the West Texas, the East Texas and the South Texas chambers of commerce, are represented by a committee of nine members, three from each. This committee, in turn is divided into three sub-committees, the purpose, the finance and the educational. Members of the first two sub-committees were present at Thursday's session.

The purpose committee composed of Jewel P. Lightfoot, Fort Worth, representing the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; Clarence Ousley, Dallas, representing the East Texas Chamber of Commerce; and W. O. Huggins, Houston, of the South Texas chamber, and the finance committee, composed of A. N. Bourland, Vernon, chairman of the general committee; W. N. Blanton, Longview, of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce; and J. S. Birdwell, Wichita Falls, first met separately and then jointly.

Offer Is Made In Hague Conference

Plan For Increased Share
In Reparations Formulated
Thursday; Attempt To
Save Tottling Meeting

(By Associated Press)
THE HAGUE, Aug. 22. — A new offer of increased share in reparations payments was formulated tonight and confided to Henry J. Jaspar of Belgium to communicate to its British chancellor of the exchequer, Philip Snowden.

After a day of struggle to keep alive the tottering conference for putting into effect the Young plan or something to replace the Dawes plan for German payments, the representatives of France, Belgium, Italy and Japan finally reached an agreement for an offer which they said represented 75 per cent of the British demand.

The fate of the conference now seems to depend on whether Snowden tomorrow accepts or rejects this offer.

The new offer to Great Britain from the other creditors was compounded from a little taken here and another little subtracted there. Great Britain would be given all margins not thus far disposed of between German payments since April under the Dawes plan of annuities and the reduced amount called for under the Young plan. To this is added contributions from France and Italy. Another slice was obtained by adding in the balance owing by Great Britain to Germany on liquidation of sequestered property.

U. S. AGENT SLAIN

Two Unidentified Narcotic
Peddlers Shoot Man

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 22. (AP) — Two unidentified narcotic peddlers, seeking to evade arrest, today shot and critically wounded Clarence E. P. Moore, government agent, who has been active here for several months in obtaining evidence on an alleged narcotic ring in the old French quarter.

Moore, a former member of the San Francisco police force, spotted the peddler in an automobile and sought to arrest them. One quickly opened fire and shot Moore in the head. The man escaped.

Moore's wound was pronounced serious.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 22. — With the women's transcontinental air derby in progress, the national air races and aeronautical exposition here tonight was on the eve of another big preliminary event, the Portland, Ore., to Cleveland air derby for men.

Air race officials said tonight eight of America's fastest pilots would be in the fleet taking off from Portland at 10 a. m. Pacific time, tomorrow.

Dead Heart Set Beating Rhythmically By Vibrations Of Supersound Waves

BOSTON, Aug. 22. — A dead heart was set beating rhythmically by supersound waves in a demonstration before the thirteenth international physiological congress today by Prof. E. Newton Harvey, of Princeton university.

Dr. Harvey placed in a glass tube a heart removed from a turtle or a frog. A lever connected the heart with a revolving drum on which the recording pencil made a straight line—the sign of death. Abruptly, without any visible change in

the surroundings of the heart, and without an audible sound, the ventricles began to beat and the moving pencil traced the familiar line of heart action.

Thirteen Pilots Complete Flight Over Rough Area

Crowds Break Down Heavy
Police Lines To Greet
Daring Women Aviators
Following Long Hop

FORT WORTH, Aug. 22. — Completing the longest and most hazardous hop of their dash from Santa Monica to Cleveland, thirteen entrants in the women's air derby landed here today to be acclaimed by more than 20,000 persons that broke down staunch police lines.

Although fatigued by the 800-mile air grind from El Paso much of it over rugged, mountainous terrain, the derbyists were hustled into automobiles and taken to the estate of Amon G. Carter publisher for a banquet.

Four Lose Out

Four of those who winged away from El Paso did not reach this control point. Florence Lowe Barnes, San Marino, Calif., and Blanche Noyes, Cleveland, saw their chances for victory faded in mishaps at Pecos. Miss Barnes, overrunning the landing field, crashed into an automobile and her plane was washed out. She escaped injury. Miss Noyes wrecked her landing gear when she was forced down in the sage brush near Pecos. Replacements were sent from here by air.

Both Edith Foltz, Portland, Oregon, and Margaret Perry, Los Angeles, got only as far as Abilene, 100 miles from here. Miss Perry was ill, while Miss Foltz decided to have her landing gear, damaged at Pecos, repaired before continuing. They expected to be on the starting line here at 9 a. m. tomorrow for the

Plane Fire Fails To Halt Aviatix

Mrs. Blanche Noyes Makes
Landing And Puts Out
Blaze; May Continue In
Derby If Plane Is Fixed

PECOS, Tex., Aug. 22. (AP)—Conquering a fire, which she discovered in her plane when 2,000 feet above the earth, Mrs. Blanche Noyes brought her plane on to Pecos today and hopes to continue in the Santa Monica-Cleveland air derby tomorrow, if repairs can be made in time.

The plucky flier first discovered the fire when smoke began issuing from the baggage compartment of her plane about 30 miles west of here.

Her first thought was to open her parachute and let the plane crash, but she investigated and found that something in the compartment undoubtedly was burning. She attempted to wrench her fire extinguisher from its brackets, but could not move it.

Smoke was coming out of the compartment in clouds and she had no time to pick a landing place. Sideslipping, she drifted her plane to the ground, crashing through mesquite bushes three feet high. From the baggage compartment she pulled a mass of charred and burning clothing and flying equipment, burning her fingers, as she did so.

Made Take-Off

In spite of this, and the fact that a take-off appeared almost impossible she clambered back in.

Airliner Departs After High Winds Cause Long Delay

Globe-Girdling Dirigible
Leaves Unexpectedly Day
And Half Behind Planned
Schedule For Next Leg

Plans Are Changed

Giant Airship Has Task
Of Traveling 5,470 Miles
Before Reaching Next
Stop At Los Angeles

KASUMIGAUARA, Japan, Aug. 22. —Friday—The globe-circling dirigible Graf Zeppelin, a day and a half behind schedule, took the air for her projected 5,470 mile journey to Los Angeles at 3:13 o'clock this afternoon, 1:13 a. m., Friday Eastern Standard Time.

KASUMIGAUARA, Japan, Aug. 23. —Friday—Already delayed more than 24 hours at this stop of its round the world flight, a stiff cross-gale wind this morning kept the Graf Zeppelin in its shed and the passengers returned to Tokyo for further sightseeing until conditions improve.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander, in view of the weather conditions set no hour for the next attempt to resume the flight to Los Angeles but arrangements were made so passengers and crew could be assembled on short notice. The ship itself was in perfect readiness for the long trans-Pacific flight.

The giant airship first was balked by a mishap as it was being drawn from its hangar yesterday. A rear motor gondola struck the earth, causing damage which made repairs necessary.

When everything was again in readiness Dr. Eckener found the direction and strength of the wind would make handling of the huge bulk by the ground crew difficult and perhaps precarious.

Women Win Unique Success In Field Of Photography

NEW YORK, August 22.—Maybe it is woman's all-seeing eye or maybe it is her instinctive flair for detail. Something, however, and it is unlikely that it is chance alone is taking increasing numbers of the weaker sex into photography as a profession.

In New York alone there are from 150 to 200 women whose names are known for their pictures. There are hundreds more occupying mental positions in photography establishments who will one day step out and up and be successful.

Women have branched out tremendously in this business of taking pictures. Two New York papers have had first rate news photographers on their staffs for some time. Another woman, Ella Barnett, now owns her own bureau but for years she has been a familiar sight, camera along over her shoulder, stepping into the outer to go down the bay to meet famous folk, returning from abroad for she was one of New York's best ship news photographers. The latest addition to the picture-taking sisterhood is Edith Keating, serial photographer.

Portraits are the oldest and hence the most crowded line of photography. Women, going into this work seem to have known instinctively that they should specialize to make headway. Take Frances Gensler, for instance. She has a charming studio high in historic Carnegie Hall but she always packs up her camera, plates and lights and takes men and women in their own home.

"A person is at his most natural best in his own environment," she maintains. "Self-consciousness is cut in half by taking a man or woman in a familiar room and amongst furnishings that are known intimately. I started home-portraits because I had no studio. Now I wouldn't take any others."

There are a dozen or so women who have specialized in taking natural poses of children. Some refuse to photograph anyone over 10. By infinite pains they get children, that is, children in moments and with infinite pains preserve for fond parents that smile, tilt of the head, flash of dimples, bend of the body, swing of the arm or whatever other thing that is "Joan" or "Jim" to them.

Photographer of Children

Lena G. Townsley stands out for her superb success in capturing the fleeting expression of childhood. She is a charming blonde young woman who works in a freckles in a homely studio filled with little furniture and occupied always by Patty, her friendly dog and Katinka, her majestic cat.

"I follow children around the room as they play," she explains her technique. "Sometimes I take dozens of pictures before I am satisfied. The best pictures are those taken when the child has not known he was being photographed. The worst are when parents tell him to smile."

Love of outdoors gave Mattie Hewitt her inspiration to start her unique line of photography—sports of houses and gardens. The best makings in the country on these subjects carry pictures with her name on them that inevitably draw exclamations of admiration at their beauty and signs of longing for possession of such appealing places.

Here's Unique Art Tony Van Horn learned her art at home in Holland and came here a few years ago to ride the crest of the popularity wave for interior decorating. Her special photography is interiors. "It is not enough to reproduce just the furniture, lines of the floor, walls, and details of furnishings," she argues. "A picture of a room should breathe the atmosphere of the room, reveal its personality, just as a portrait of a person should." Here demonstrate that this photographer practices what she preaches.

Florence Van Dam takes pictures only of theatrical people. She is an Englishwoman who had a London studio, began to specialize in theatrical stars and realized that New York was the place for her success.

It goes without saying that all preparations you use on your face must be absolutely pure—they must be compounded of ingredients that are actively beneficial to the skin. And they must be selected for your individual skin condition, for no matter how pure a preparation might be, if it were made to correct excessive oiliness, it would be ineffective for the dry skin, and vice versa. In fact, you could not use a cream or lotion made for dry skin on one which was inclined to oiliness without aggravating the condition.

And third, you must know how to correctly apply your preparations. Every time you put your hand to your face, you benefit or injure, build or tear down. Every single motion is constructive or destructive. Many women tear down faster than the preparations can build up—simply because they do not know how to apply their preparations correctly. Frequently these women become discouraged and give up the use of really splendid preparations.

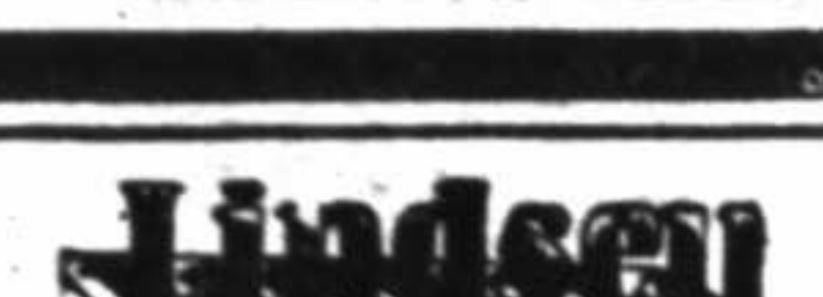

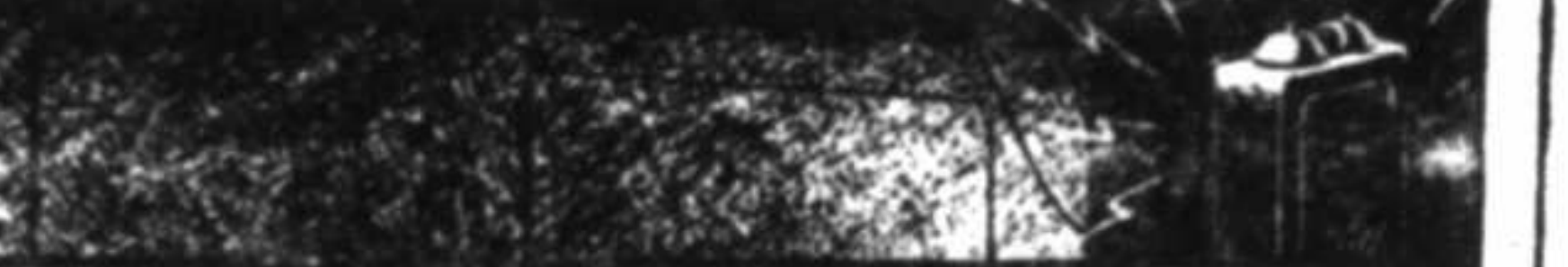

PREVENTION RATHER THAN CURE

THIEVES, petty and otherwise, have opened their fall campaign in the South Plains area earlier this year than usual. Not only Lubbock but practically in every city in this section, has already had one or more visits from burglars and if indications prevalent over the state mean anything the situation will get no better rapidly.

Fall is always a good time on the Plains whether crops are good or bad. Of course there is more loose money at the conclusion of good crop years but even upon those admittedly not so good there is a noticeable increase in the number of all kinds. Drifters are cognizant of the fact and every year along with new and desperate elements a percentage of the riff-raff comes in from the north and south, living like leeches and making off the honorable gain of honest men.

It is impossible to prevent all such robberies and burglaries. There always have been thieves and there always will be. But an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and it behooves the people of this section to do everything they can to make the way of the robber a tortuous one.

The Morning Avalanche believes co-operation on the part of business men in the neighboring smaller places will help hold this year's looting to the minimum. An extra night watchman or two during the fall and winter season should raise an appreciable barrier between thieves and their gain in any city on the South Plains. All night lighting of business houses, too, would help and the cost for the season would be negligible.

As far as Lubbock is concerned, a couple of additional night police officers might be added by the police department already has 14 names on its roll and the burden of prevention falls upon the shoulders of business men themselves. They should be certain that their locks are fast and should add whatever additional safeguards they feel they need for "the robbers' lot of you don't look out." Reports from other sections indicate that a poor crop year is likely to be experienced by the major portion of this state and Oklahoma. If that's true the South Plains will draw more than its usual quota of the petty crooks and grifters and the time to prepare a warm reception is now. Incidentally, while business men are looking to their safeguards it might be well to add that people who do not lock their cars, garages and homes can't expect any sympathy if burglars and thieves take advantage of their carelessness.

It is the friendly hand upon his shoulder, the sympathetic word in his ear, the act of helpfulness in his behalf that means something to him. It is he who gives the "cup of cold water" who earns the gratitude of the thirsty, and not he who simply does not prevent the thirsty from getting it himself.

The life of service is the happy life. Inactivity, superfluity, indifference and indifference sooner or later criminal negligence, sloth and filthiness. The principle of righteous activity is included in the economy of life. It is in the created universe in all nature.

The fact that man is given the ability and intelligence to work, that he knows what is constructive and what is destructive carries with it the implied command "work while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

PEOPLE ARE WITH HOOVER

To be or not to be—that is the question insofar as cruiser construction is concerned. President Hoover is determined to postpone building of the vessels, authorized last winter until opportunity has been afforded for another disarmament conference. Senate leaders, headed by Frederick Hale of Maine are equally determined that the original schedule shall be adhered to.

Of one thing the president may be certain. He has majority sentiment of the nation on his side. There is no doubt whatsoever that the American people are in favor of any and every move in the direction of peace. They can be counted on to rally to the support of the White House in the forthcoming show-down on cruiser construction.

The big navy gang in congress might well put discretion aside of valor and go along with the president. Certainly such a course would be designed to win popular favor and eliminate the suspicion that the choice lies between militarism and pacifism. Mr. Hoover has shown himself to be moderate on this issue of naval limitation. Those who oppose him will be generally regarded as extremists, entitled to little consideration from thinking men.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

STEWART ANALYZES CHANCES OF SENATORS WHO COME UP FOR RE-ELECTION NEXT YEAR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—A representative's seat in congress means just as much to him as a senator's means to other folk—except in the case of a few exceptional representatives. Like Speaker Longworth.

A member of the upper house draws no more pay than a member of the lower one, but he is a bigger man, nevertheless—generally.

Consequently, the air already is full of talk concerning the chances of the senators who must come up for re-election next year. All the representatives must, but nobody mentions their prospects.

Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire has general charge of his republican fellow senators' campaigns. Of course each will fight for himself, too, but the G. O. P. is anxious to have a bigger senate majority in the next congress than it has in this one.

As chairman of the republican senatorial campaign committee Moses succeeds Senator Jesse H. Poinsett of Rhode Island, who has a re-election conflict of his own on his hands and will be too busy to worry over the others. Rhode Island is a doubtful state and former Senator Peter G. Gerry, who lost out as a democrat last year, will be doing his best to stage a come-back at Metcalf's expense.

Senator Millard E. Tydings of Maryland probably will be the democrats' chairman. He was last time.

On the republican side of the fence Senators William E. Borah of Idaho, Arthur Capper of Kansas, James Couzens of Michigan, Henry W. Kever of New Hampshire, William H. McMaster of South Dakota, Charles L. McNary of Oregon and Francis E. Warren of Wyoming—if he lives, for he is 85 years old and has served 34 years continuously—are considered practically certain of re-election. A democrat does occasionally win in Michigan, but only once in a coon's age.

Senator Charles S. Deneen of Illinois may not be renominated. Representative Ruthanna McCormick wants it to go.

Senator Walter E. Edge of New Jersey is out of the race, having been appointed ambassador to France. Representative Franklin W. Post is retiring. President Hoover's "boy scout" would like to succeed him, but will have to beat ex-Senator Edward I. Edwards, who defeated in 1928, is sure to try again in 1930.

Still in the republican column, Senator Frederick H. Gillett of Massachusetts is expected to retire, being very old—though not so old as Senator Warren. Besides, Massachusetts may choose a democrat. It has one now, in Senator David I. Walsh, and went for Al Smith last November.

Senator Guy D. Goff will have competition in West Virginia from ex-Senator M. M. Neely, who lost out as a democrat in the 1928 landslide.

Senator Arthur R. Gould of Maine will be re-elected if renominated, but there are hints that he will retire to escape defeat at the primaries. He has recently made some slurring remarks concerning prohibition, a risky policy for a Pine Tree state politician.

Senator Daniel O. Hastings cannot be considered safe in Delaware, where ex-Senator Thomas F. Bayard is sure to be the democrats' candidate, until the votes are counted.

Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska wanted to retire six years ago, but says nothing about it now. If he runs, he will have the Anti-Saloon league against him, because he supported Al Smith. Nevertheless, it will be a miracle if he fails to carry Nebraska—and much good may it do the republicans for the seldom votes with the democrats.

Senator Thomas D. Schall will have to hustle for renomination in Minnesota.

Among the democrats everyone concedes the renomination and re-election of Senators Coleman L. Blease of South Carolina, William J. Harris of Georgia, Joseph R. Robinson of Louisiana, Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, Morris Sheppard of Texas, and Lawrence D. Tyson of Tennessee.

New Mexico Senator Sam G. Bratton's state is variable.

Senator Carter Glass as the whole country knows has a fight on with Bishop James Cannon, Jr. in Virginia.

Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi and J. Thomas Heflin and Puriford M. Simmons in reality no doubt have a civil apiece in their respective states of Mississippi, Alabama and North Carolina, but there are some whispers of democratic disaffection against all three of them. Once nominated, of course, they are sure of re-election.

Considering how dry he is, the question always is raised how long Senator Thomas J. Walsh can continue to carry the wet state of Montana, but it is generally taken for granted that he will do it this time, as usual.

The chances are at least 100 to 1 against Senator Daniel F. Steiwer of Iowa. He got in six years ago by accident, on the strength of a contest in which the senate's conservative republicans joined the democrats to seat him in preference to his insurgent G. O. P. rival, Smith W. Brookhart—who crashed the gate at the next election anyway. Normally, a democrat's hopes are about as bright in Iowa as a wet's in the heart of Kansas.

INTENSIVE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS OFTEN PRODUCE EYE STRAIN

This is the first of two articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein in which he discusses the cause and effect of defective vision among school children.

At the recent meeting of the American Medical Association in Portland, Ore., Dr. Lloyd Mills called attention to the importance of eyes in education.

The excessive speed of modern civilization demands rapid mental adjustments, which sometimes children are unable to make because of ocular deficiencies. The nervous reactions to educational strain induce irritability, fatigue, restlessness and emotional disturbances.

Dr. Mills is convinced that ocular adjustments to educational forcing produce weaknesses of the eye muscles and eye strain through prolonged over-attention. He believes that the curriculum of study are so intensive nowadays that the physical cost of this type of training yields questionable profit when balanced with the efficiency produced.

"The world does not require faster and more accurate persons," he says, "but urgently needs accurate and dependable ones."

BATTLE OF MONS

On August 23, 1914, the battle of Mons was fought in Belgium. About 3 p. m. the German army attacked the British along the line of the Conde-Mons canal.

The British were to a certain extent surprised, and the powerful German artillery played havoc among them, with the result that that night the British forces were compelled to fall back to a position which had previously been reconnoitered, resting on the left of the fortress of Maubeuge and extending on the right to Jambin, southeast of Valenciennes.

Opposing the English were the fourth and ninth German army corps, and they fought about equal numbers. The forces which awaited the German attack numbered about 86,000 men, roughly divided into 70,000 infantry, 10,000 cavalry and 312 guns.

The front of the British army covered about 20 miles and was an excessive strain upon so small a force, since the enemy was more compact.

The defeat in the battle of Mons was the beginning of the Anglo-French retreat which did not end until the famous battle of the Marne.

Residents Escape As Fire Covers Section

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 22.—Residents of Belmont, Mont., were taken to safety tonight on a special Great Northern train when forest fires reached the town and burned briskly in that vicinity.

The refugees were taken to Glacier Park station, sixty miles away.

Toys of warlike nature and cadet corps have been banned in Le-Docle, Switzerland, which claims the record of being the least military town in the world.

Cotton Advances; Stocks In Rally

Favorable Cables And Continuation Of Drought Cause

Slightly Higher Levels Are Reached Thursday As Trading Is Moderately Active; Close Is Steady

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 22. (P.)—Favorable cables and absence of rain in the western drought section influenced cotton prices to slightly higher levels today. Trading was moderate and fluctuations narrow. December advanced to 18.72 but eased off to 18.62 and closed at 18.67, or 11 points net higher. The general market closed steady at net advances of 11 to 13 points.

Liverpool cables were 8 to 7 points better than due. October eventually advanced to 18.45 and January 18.73 or 14 to 16 points above the previous close.

Sells Below High. There was some selling and October declined to 18.37, 8 to 10 points below the high. Covering developed in late trading and part of the loss was recovered. October closing at 18.40 and January 18.72.

Receipts 18,544 for week \$2,843 for year 210,497; last week 104,036; Exports, 4,588 for week 60,902; for year 145,491; last week 151,116. Stock on shipboard 31,358; last year 41,841. Spot sales 7,174; last year 14,884.

Reactions Follow Early Advances. NEW YORK, Aug. 22. (P.)—Early advances in cotton today were followed by partial reactions under realizing or liquidation promoted by uncertainty over the weather outlook. Prices steadied in the late trading and after selling off from 18.80 to 18.66. December closed at 18.76, on renewed covering accompanied by bullish crop reports from the southwest. The close was firm at net advances of 14 to 16 points.

The market opened steady at an advance of 11 to 13 points. The initial demand was quite readily supplied by overnight selling orders and talk of improving prospect for rains in the southwest. Offerings were absorbed on setbacks of 5 or 6 points, and the market firmed.

The advance carried October to 18.40 and March to 19.00 or 18 to 20 points net higher.

Weight averages 240 pounds down going on shipments generally below the market. The top of 11.65 was realized at St. Louis. Total offerings were 54,890 and 17,500 short of last Thursday and slightly less than a year ago. Fat lambs steady to 25c lower. Chicago top 13.75 on choice natives and 13.60 for best ranges. The supply was 56,500 against 49,961 a week ago and 40,287 the corresponding day last year.

Although a few markets around the loop reported some weak spots in cattle prices, the general tone of the market was better. Aggregate receipts were estimated at 21,700 a decrease of 2,500 from a week ago and 4,900 short of a year ago.

Wheat Traders On Edge As Whip-Saw Action Increases

Bullish Operations Feel Restraining Influence As Entire Stock List Is Inclined To Rally. By JOHN F. BOUGHAN, Associated Press Market Editor. CHICAGO, Aug. 22. (P.)—Whipsaw action of the wheat market kept traders here continually on edge today, prices making numerous quick changes, but averaging lower as a whole. On extreme dips, price speculative buying demand for wheat broadened, but when advances ensued selling pressure increased.

Chicago closing quotations on wheat were nervous, 5-8 to 1-3-4 under yesterday's finish. Corn closed irregular, 1-8c net lower. Wheat advanced 1-4 to 1-1-2c down and provisions varying from 20c setback to a rise of 7 to 10c.

Liverpool Falls. One of the chief depressing factors in the Chicago wheat market today was a sharper fall of Liverpool quotations than had been looked for. The weakness of values at Liverpool was ascribed largely to liberal shipments from Argentina. 5,590,000 bushels this week compared with 1,387,000 bushels a year ago. Western Europe today bought only 500,000 bushels from North America. Primary receipts of wheat in the United States today 2,472,000 bushels on the corresponding day last year and 3,121,000 bushels a week back.

Loans Of Brokers Expected To Take Increase Thursday

Numerous Quick Changes In Price Are Feature Of Session. Although General Trend Is Downward

BY CLAUDE A. JAGGER, Associated Press Financial Writer. NEW YORK, Aug. 22. (P.)—Expectation of a large increase in brokers' loans had little more than a restraining influence on bullish operations in today's stock market.

The carrying was inclined to rally from the low levels reached in the wave of selling late yesterday. An impressive assortment of high priced industrials was once more sent into new high territory. The volume of sales fell to 3,436,200 shares.

Forecasts of a sharp upturn in loans were born out by the weekly federal reserve figures, published after the close, showing a jump of \$133,000,000, which cancelled last week's decline of \$68,000,000 and carried the total to a new high record of \$6,088,000,000, as contrasted to \$4,201,000,000 a year ago. The increase in loans was accounted for by non-bank funds, the account "for others" increasing \$100,000,000.

Credit Contracts. The federal reserve condition statements disclosed a contraction of federal reserve credit outstanding. While purchases of acceptances in the open market were continued, only about \$4,000,000 was added to the system's portfolio, while government securities declined nearly \$6,000,000, and discounting about \$4,000,000.

Floydada Jersey Dairy Herd Gets Wide Recognition

Special Notice Given To
O. L. Stansell Cattle In
Bulletin Of American Jer-
sey Cattle Club

FLOYDADA, Aug. 22.—The Jersey Bulletin of the American Jersey Cattle club, gave nation-wide recognition to the Stansell dairy herd, owned by O. L. Stansell, of this city, this month when the record of three of the herd was given special notice. The bulletin contained the following notice:
