

Dewey To Hit Truman For Foreign Policies

In First Major Campaign Address, Leader To Propose A New Program

ENROUTE TO BOSTON WITH DEWEY, Feb. 12. (AP) Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will accuse the Truman administration tonight of serious "failures" in handling America's foreign policy and propose a "constructive" plan for building a "lasting peace."

The New York governor will deliver his attack in a Lincoln Day speech at Boston.

It is his first major address since he became an avowed candidate for the Republican presidential nomination last month and his third invasion of doubtful New England in the last five months.

In a statement disclosing the theme of the speech, Paul E. Lockwood, Dewey's secretary, said: "The failures of the foreign policy of the present national administration have brought about confusion among the American people and fear that we are drifting toward another catastrophe."

"Governor Dewey... will propose a specific and constructive program which he believes to be essential for the building of a lasting peace."

"The proposals will deal specifically with the crisis which imperils western Europe and the action which should be taken within the resources of the American people to restore the political and economic stability of the free areas of the world."

Dewey's speech, to be broadcast over a nationwide radio network (Mutual-Northeast), will be given at a Lincoln Day birthday dinner of the Middlesex club of Boston.

The New York governor, who claims to have inaugurated the nation's bi-partisan foreign policy, is expected to reiterate his recent espousal of a European aid program, administered on a "business-like" basis, and to slash again at Soviet Russia.

Gandhi Ashes Are Dispersed

ALLAHABAD, India, Feb. 12. (AP) —The mortal remains of Mohandas K. Gandhi, the beloved man who ranks almost as a saint in this land, were immersed in the waters of three sacred Hindu rivers here today.

Tens of thousands of persons witnessed the ceremony, which took place just after 2 p. m. at the confluence of the Ganges, Jumna and Saraswati rivers. Among the witnesses was the prime minister of India, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru.

Others who watched included members of the central government, the governor of the united provinces, and ministers of the local government.

The special train carrying Gandhi's ashes arrived at Allahabad station at 9 a. m. Nehru, who arrived in Allahabad by airplane yesterday, was at the station to greet the train of third-class coaches bearing the funeral urn.

A guard of honor escorted the urn to Triveni Sangham, confluence of the three rivers, for the final ceremony.

Lincoln Birthday Ceremonies Set

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 12. (AP) —Ceremonies in this shrine city commemorating the 139th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth were planned today at his tomb and at the site of his farewell address to citizens of Springfield.

The American Legion will make its annual pilgrimage to the tomb in nearby Oak Ridge cemetery. Gov. Dwight H. Green will participate in wreath laying ceremonies. Col. Roy L. Dalfers of Springfield will place a wreath on the tomb in behalf of President Truman.

Senator Is Trying To Aid Corporations

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP) —Something should be done to help small corporations, says Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.).

Their mortality rate, he told a reporter today, "is much too high." Fulbright is drafting a bill exempting from Federal taxation the first \$15,000 of a corporation's income.

SECOND ATTACK

Reds Say West Encouraged Germany To Turn On Them

MOSCOW, Feb. 12. (AP) —Russia says Great Britain and France before the war encouraged Adolf Hitler to turn the German army against the Soviet Union.

She charges that they let Germany take over Czechoslovakia and, in the pact of Munich and others, entered into non-aggression agreements with Germany's fuhrer.

These accusations were made in a statement issued last night by the Soviet information bureau. In support of them, the bureau cited German foreign office documents for 1937 and 1938 which it said the Red Army had captured.

The statement was Russia's second in reply to publication of papers on Nazi-Soviet relations by the United States. This one said little about the U. S.

(The British foreign office said the Soviet charge of a British deal with Hitler in 1938 is "quite obviously unfounded," and "hardly requires a denial.")

(Earlier a foreign office spokesman said after a study of "bits and pieces" of documents broadcast by Moscow "We are not in a position to say that we can verify them all." He added that some of the broadcast data were "so colorless no one would want to go to the trouble of inventing them.")

Political Drive By Unions Is Striking Snags

CIO Indictment, Divided Loyalty Causing Trouble

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP) — Organized labor's drive to swing the 1948 elections ran into double trouble today.

The two big complications seemed to be:

1. The possible chilling effect of a grand jury indictment on union political spending.

2. Divided political loyalty within the ranks of both AFL and CIO.

The indictment was returned by a Federal grand jury here yesterday. It cited the CIO and its president, Philip Murray, under the section of the Taft-Hartley Act which bans use of union money for political purposes.

A CIO strategist said privately the indictment is bound to discourage unions from campaign spending.

The CIO contends the section of the law involved is unconstitutional. Both the AFL and CIO have as their aim the defeat of congressmen who voted for the Taft-Hartley Act. But both are finding it hard to make their members stay hatched to a single line of political action.

Top AFL officials failed, at their recent executive council meeting in Miami, to agree on a league director. There is more turmoil about this than appears on the surface.

Bill Hutchison, head of the AFL carpenters and a lifelong Republican, has declined to go along with the others. There are reports that Dan Tobin, one of the staunchest Democrats among the AFL leaders, may make his own separate political plans, too.

As for the CIO, a group of its unions representing about 1,250,000 of the CIO's claimed 6,000,000 members have indicated they may support Henry Wallace's third party. Murray and the rest of the CIO have come out against a third party this year.

Thinks Housing Bill Will Pass

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP) —Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) predicted today Congress will pass a long range housing bill this year.

The Wisconsin lawmaker, vice chairman of the House-Senate housing committee, made this forecast after talking with GOP leaders in Congress.

At the same time McCarthy recommended in a report to the joint committee that there be no provision in the program for government operated or owned public housing projects.

"Private enterprise must be our chief reliance," McCarthy declared. He added that about 700,000 of these probably "will continue to be priced out of the market" each year unless (a) "we are able to bring about a substantial reduction in prices" or (b) arrange for the government to stand part of the cost.

McCarthy's report is based on hearings he held last fall in a number of major cities. Except for public housing, it largely parallels many features of the Taft-Ellender-Wagner (T-E-W) bill approved by the Senate Banking committee last April.

Balloting Brisk In C-C Election

A total of 161 chamber of commerce members had returned marked ballots in the organization's annual directors election this morning and officials were hopeful that a majority of the membership would be represented in returns by the end of the week.

Tabulation of the votes, which will determine 10 new chamber directors, will begin Monday morning. On the ballots members have been asked to select the 10 new directors from a list of 30 nominees.

Lawmen Recover Large Suit Case

City police have recovered a large, tan suit case which the owner may claim at headquarters. Chief Pete Green announced this morning.

The suit case was stolen Monday afternoon from a car parked on the east side of the 200 block of Scurry street. The bag contains clothing.

Bond of \$2000 Is Fixed For Driver

Bond of \$2,000 has been fixed for Walter W. Downing, truck driver charged with murder. The count was lodged, said County Attorney George Thomas, as an aftermath to a collision between the auto transport driven by Downing, who gave his home at Canton, and a car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Francis Potts and Leon Newman on Monday. Potts was killed.

Holiday Gives Falling Prices A 'Breather'

NEW YORK, Feb. 12. (AP) —Plunging market prices took an enforced "breather" today after a week-long rampage. United States commodity and securities markets were closed in observance of Lincoln's birthday.

The first decisive break in the rising price level came on Feb. 4. Since then prices have nose-dived on the commodity and security exchanges, and to a lesser extent in wholesale food and raw material markets. Grains and cotton led the slide. It still was on yesterday, but appeared to be losing some of its violence.

Last Friday the consumer felt the first effects of the widening breaks. New retail food price cuts were on the fire last night.

The retail price of flour and lard fell. Bacon and some cuts of beef were cheaper in many stores. Bread prices were down.

Reaction spread yesterday to securities markets around the world. Stocks tumbled in Manila, Copenhagen, Sydney and Toronto. There was a slump on the London market, but prices there recovered before the British exchange closed for the day.

There were temporary rallies in the prices of grain during the week, but they were short-lived.

The worst day of the week-long melee was Tuesday, when prices fell like ten pins. Stocks tumbled \$1 to \$5 a share Tuesday and sent the Associated Press average down to a new low since last June. Never before were so many issues traded on the New York stock exchange.

"The back of inflation has been broken," said A. W. Zelomok of New York, economic counselor and president of the international statistical bureau, a private organization. Many economists agreed.

Trader's Secrets Interest Solons

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP) —E. T. Maynard of Chicago will be asked to tell congressional investigators how he turned the grain market slump into a \$200,000-plus profit.

The only question today is which of three interested committees will get to him first.

The three are the Senate Agriculture committee, a Senate appropriations subcommittee, and a similar special group in the House.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said yesterday Maynard made more than \$200,000 in wheat, another \$40,000 to \$50,000 in cotton and an undetermined amount in oats.

Senator Knowland (R-Calif.), a member of the Senate appropriations subcommittee, told reporters: "I would advise you to keep in close touch with the committee next week."

Board To Seek Special Census

Application will be made for another special census of the Big Spring Independent school district, trustees announced at a special session Thursday noon.

The census will be asked because of a steady and continuing enrollment increase since the first of the year. If granted, any increase reflected by it would show up in the current per capita apportionment instead of awaiting the 1948-49 roll which will be determined by the regular census now around the corner.

Trustees also named a committee composed of Justin Holmes, Dan Conley and Dewey Martin to consider applicants for the football coaching position. A selection by next week was indicated.

The board authorized W. C. Blankenship, superintendent, to attend the annual convention of the American Association of School Administrators in Atlantic City, N. J., on Feb. 21-26.

This morning, however, Rex Palmer, field executive at Pecos, advised Norris that the elements had interfered again and another cancellation was posted.

Scout leaders said the weather probably would not present an obstacle once the group reached Agua Canyon, the actual camp tract, but snow and ice have made approaches hazardous.

Costa Rica Revolt Nipped By Troops

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, Feb. 12. (AP) —Troops and police nipped today a plot to overthrow Costa Rica's government and install former President Rafael Calderon as Guardia.

The attempted coup began with violence last night over Sunday's presidential elections. A policeman was killed and several persons were wounded in shooting which continued into the early morning.

Ganks raced through the streets. They wore the blue, yellow and red armbands of the Republicano Nacional and the Red armbands of the Vanguardia Popular (communist) party, both supporters of Calderon.

Calderon trails by 10,000 votes in Sunday's election and has conceded the victory to Publisher Otilio Ulate Blanco, of the Union Nacional party. However, Calderon has charged fraud.

Panhandle Blizzard Has Slowed Down

An ice coating—the worst of the winter in some places—halted or slowed ground travel over large sections of north and central Texas today.

The Panhandle's blinding blizzard of yesterday slowed down and its accompanying norther spread to the Rio Grande from El Paso to Brownsville.

At Austin, state highway maintenance engineer G. B. Finley said travel conditions over much of Texas were worse than in the last ice storm. He warned motorists to stay off the highways unless they had chains.

"The only cross-country driving should be of an emergency nature," he cautioned.

Ice conditions were reported from the Red River valley at Gainesville and Bonham as far south as San Antonio.

Interurban car service between Denison and Dallas and from Dallas to Waco was suspended this morning because of ice. Bus service between Fort Worth and Dallas also was cancelled in the morning. Morning bus and automobile traffic skidded on the streets of Dallas, Austin and San Antonio.

Three crew members of a Texas Electric Railroad freight train were marooned five miles northeast of Hillsboro for six hours this morning after power was cut off on the Dallas-Waco line. P. D. Forbes, the conductor, said the men had only a lantern for heat. The men became walking icicles in a 200-yard walk to a highway where they met a taxicab which took them to Hillsboro.

At Midland, on the South Plains, schools were closed today and the mayor called a holiday for all except essential businesses to conserve natural gas for home use.

A spitting snow and sleet fall had not yet covered the ground. Oil and ranch activities were slowed down greatly in the Midland area by the intense cold. The low there this morning was 12 degrees.

Schools were dismissed until Monday at Gainesville, where a continuing sleet storm had laid a half-inch ice coat. At Bonham, east of Gainesville in the Red River valley, freezing rain coated trees and wires with ice. Gainesville had a low temperature of 20 degrees, Bonham 30.

Highway U. S. 75 was blocked south of Corsicana this morning by a huge trailer truck which skidded across the road. Other highways in that section were virtually impassable.

The snow storm, which blinded and paralyzed traffic in the Panhandle yesterday, had spread south and west beyond El Paso and over the South Plains to Lubbock.

But the accompanying blue norther, which produced wind velocities as high as 50 miles per hour at Dumas yesterday, had died down this morning to 20 and 25 miles at Amarillo. Temperatures were slightly higher, with a low of 7 degrees at Amarillo and Pampa.

The funeral ship Cardinal O'Connell arrived last night, carrying 2,799 caskets and 13 cremation urns.

The dead included 12 WACS and nurses—first women returned.

'D-Day' Delayed?

DAMASCUS, Syria, Feb. 12. (AP) —Sources close to the Arab volunteer Army command said today the "D-Day" for the Arab fight against Palestine's Jews, reported set for Feb. 15, has been postponed.

Union To Vote On New Dispute Settlement Plan

DALLAS, Feb. 12. (AP) — The Associated General Contractors of America today will vote on a labor union official's plan for settlement of jurisdictional disputes.

The plan was submitted yesterday by Richard J. Gray, chief of the building and construction trades department of the American Federation of Labor.

Under the plan all jurisdictional disputes not settled locally within 10 days would be referred to a five-man board in Washington.

Labor representatives would hold two positions on the board and management two. The fifth member would be an impartial chairman. The group would be known as "The National Joint Board for Settlement of Jurisdictional Disputes."

The general counsel of the national labor relations board, Robert N. Denham, commended the plan and said:

"I want to urge that every one of you either become an individual participant in it, or authorize those associations to which you belong to participate in it in your behalf."

Denham earlier said his agency "if it must" is ready to begin umpiring building industry jurisdictional disputes.

The plan was termed by Gray "the first fully comprehensive and thoroughly implemented charter for self government, dealing with a specific problem of industrial relations in any major basic industry."

SOIL CONSERVATION

Zant Will Start Seeding Of Clover

Seeding of Madrid clover will start on the farm of Durwood Zant this week. Zant has seed ready to plant about 15 acres to this soil builder and cover crop on his farm in the Gay Hill Soil Conservation Group, two miles north of the Gay Hill School. He is planting the clover as a part of his coordinated soil conservation program in cooperation with the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District.

W. E. Plunkett, who made out a plan for conservation measures this week on his farm two miles east of Vealmoor, will plant four acres of Madrid clover for soil building and grazing. The farmers will have the help of the Soil Conservation Service in planting their clover.

E. A. Richters, cooperater with the district on the J. G. Arnett farm two miles east of Big Spring, started plowing his land on the contour last week, following guide lines run by the Soil Conservation Service. Richters is using contour farming on his land to conserve moisture and prevent washing.

Guide lines for contour farming were also laid out last week on the farm of Bernice Cline in the Fairview Soil Conservation Group. Terrace construction started last week on two farms in the Vincent Conservation group. Roy Lewis, who completed a plan for conservation measures on the Pauline Allen farm a mile north of Vincent,

began building around 6 miles of terraces to hold all the rain that falls on his field and stop the soil from washing. Jeff Roberts also started 6 miles of terraces on his farm four miles south and a mile west of Vincent. Terracing is only one of the measures used by Lewis and Roberts in this conservation program planned by them.

Willis Winters, a district cooperater in the Vincent Conservation Group, is maintaining his crop stubble by plowing his land with a chisel type plow. By using a chisel plow, Winters leaves all the litter on the surface of the soil to control blowing, help the land soak up moisture and decrease loss of moisture from evaporation.

Porter Motley has maintained the terraces on the J. T. O'Connor farm in the Soash Soil Conservation Group by plowing to them with a moldboard plow. Motley also will terrace his farm four miles east of Ackery following lines run this week by T. R. Morris and Harold Bethell of the SCS.

Lines were run last week for terraces on the farms of George N. White and Jack Archer of Ackery. Moisture penetration tests made on the ranch of L. A. Radde, cooperater with the North Concho River Soil Conservation District, show the value of leaving a good cover of grass litter on range land. A. T. Bratton, work unit conservationist at Sterling City, reports. On an area with a good cover of tobosa grass and considerable litter the soil was wet enough after recent rain and snow to gum up on the spade down to 24 inches. An area with scant cover had only a little moisture in the top 4 inches of soil, Bratton said.

Danish Aircraft Crashes In Germany

FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 12. (AP) — A Danish Air Lines plane with 17 passengers and four crewmen aboard crashed today in Germany.

Danish Air Lines officials here said the crash occurred at Ulrichstein, about 30 miles north of Frankfurt.

None of the persons aboard was American, the line said. The plane was en route from Copenhagen to Frankfurt.

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Children May Back Father In Play

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 12. (AP) — Some of the money for Henry Fonda's New York play, "Mister Roberts," may come from his children, Jane, 10 and Peter, 7.

A hearing will be held March 3 on a petition filed yesterday by the actor's wife, Mrs. Frances Fonda, asking court permission to invest \$4,000 for each of the children in Leland Haywood, Ltd., producer of the play.

The petition states that the money would come from a \$37,500 fund set up for the children by the parents a year ago and that two per cent of the play's profits would be paid on each child's investment.

TOKYO, Feb. 12. (AP) — Americans who have married Japanese may return home to establish residence before the Dec. 27 deadline set by Congress.

The U. S. Eighth Army said today their homecoming will be permitted regardless of completion of tours of duty in Japan, or civilian employment agreements.

The "alien spouse" act exempts wives of occupation personnel from immigration restrictions, if such aliens establish U. S. residence before the deadline.

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Lawyers' 'Freedom Of Speech' Case May Go To Supreme Court

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Lawyers now have their own "freedom of speech" case, and they're getting ready to carry it to the United States Supreme Court.

The case is the contempt conviction of Attorney Joe Fisher, who was sentenced to a hundred dollar fine and three days in jail for alleged contempt on the Jasper county court of Judge F. P. Adams. Texas' Supreme Court recently held that Fisher must serve the sentence, in an opinion from which Justice John H. Sharp vigorously dissented. Now, several lawyers have filed "friends of the court" briefs, which will be heavily relied upon in Fisher's appeal to the highest tribunal.

The "free speech" angle of the case is the freedom of an attorney to speak out in building his client's case before a court and a jury. The Fisher contempt arose like this:

On trial before the court was a workmen's compensation case. In final arguments to the jury, Fisher was explaining what he considered the result would be of the jury's possible answers to the charges of the court; and a defense attorney objected. The objection was sustained, and Fisher protested the judge's ruling. This exchange followed:

Judge: "I will declare a mistrial if you mess with me two and a half minutes, and fine you besides."

Fisher: "That is all right. We take exception to the conduct of the court."

Judge: "That is all right. I fine you \$25."

Fisher: "If that will give you any satisfaction."

Judge: "This is \$50. Mr. Sheriff, come and get it."

Fisher: "You mean for trying to represent my client?"

Judge: "No, sir—for contempt of court—don't argue with me."

Fisher: "I am making no effort to commit contempt, but merely to represent the plaintiff."

Judge: "Don't tell me—Mr. Sheriff, take him out of the courtroom. I fine you three days in jail."

Fisher: "If that will give you any satisfaction. You know you have all the advantage by you being on the bench."

Judge: "That will be \$100 fine and three days in jail. Take him out."

Fisher: "I demand the right to state my position before the audience."

Judge: "Don't let him stand there. Take him out."

Whereupon the sheriff took him out. Fisher has not yet paid the fine nor served any of the sentence.

Homes Relinquished

FRANKFURT, (U.P.)—The U. S. Army announces that it has turned 7,600 dwellings and 300 business buildings back to the Germans, since the consolidation of small industry units began last May.

Rice Production Gains In Siam

BANGKOK, Siam, (U.P.)—Siam produced 2,919,598 tons of rice in 1947, slightly more than the 1946 total of 2,613,000 tons, Prince Sithiporn Kridakorn, minister of agriculture, announced. Last year 8,555,600 acres were under cultivation.

Japan's Hot Springs May Be Nationalized

TOKYO, (U.P.)—Now they may nationalize Japan's hot springs, long a major attraction for tourists. Kyodo News Agency says the Welfare Ministry is considering such a step to make sure the hot springs are used for the public's benefit. Japan already has nationalized horse racing.

Belgium Gets Autos

BRUSSELS, (U.P.)—Belgium imported 46,765 motor-cars in 1947 against 10,754 in 1946, official statistics show.

The United States supplied 18,625 cars (3,407 in 1945); 10,101 were from Great Britain (3,824 in 1946); 14,862 from France (3,236 in 1946) and 3,177 from other countries (287 in 1946).

Weather Recorders Prefer Blondes

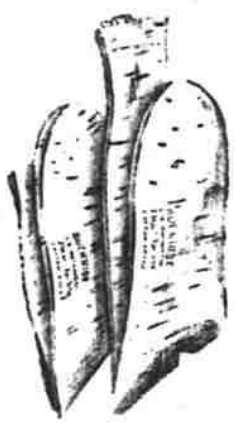

PUBLIC PROBLEM

Living Costs Hit Dependent Children

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—The high cost of living has been tough on the children.

This is indicated by data from the State Department of Public Welfare reflecting a national trend of sensationally augmented rolls of children who apparently must have public aid in order to survive.

The facts about the Texas situation are these:

1. In the past two years, the number of children receiving state-federal direct aid, under the Aid to Dependent Children program, has increased by 21,725—more than 100 per cent.

2. The increase in the amount paid out has been some 300 per cent—from \$208,621 to \$632,064 per month.

3. Even with this triple increase in payments, the average amount paid to each needy child is less than actual need as determined by investigators—8 per cent less in January, possibly 12 per cent in February.

4. Public welfare officials frankly say that many thousands of children who should be on the rolls can't be aided because there is no money.

This pattern is, of course, repeated throughout the welfare program.

Some of the increase in the past two years can be charged off to other reasons than the rising cost of living. However, the national trend strongly indicates that living costs has been the big contributing factor. In Texas, laws were liberalized which allowed addition of more children. During the same period, however, when Texas was adding some 21,000 children, Florida added 15,000; Illinois 8,000 and Ohio 6,000.

Texas still is far from the national average in payments. The monthly payment of \$37.19 per case is compared with the national average of \$62.64.

Public welfare officials emphasize that all of these figures represent living, breathing, struggling

people. Here's the way one of them put it:

"The situation in which these children have been placed by inflation is the same as that experienced by other people who have had to live on a fixed income during the past two years. Except that it is probably aggravated, because there is no elasticity in the budget of need which permits an average expenditure of \$37.19 per month."

"It must also be borne in mind that our departmental investigators work constantly to reach the children who need help most desperately. It is not a question of aiding everyone who actually needs assistance. Funds are available only for those in the most dire need."

Explorer Greeted By 10,000 Penguins

CANBERRA (AP)—Ten thousand penguins clustered around photographer David Eastman when he descended the rocky cliffs of Heard Island to film the domestic life of a penguin rookery for the Australian Antarctic expedition.

The Department of External Affairs said in a report on the expedition that savage skua gulls hovered overhead waiting to pounce on baby penguins separated from their parents while Eastman was taking shots.

The landing on the island, 2,000 miles south-west of Fremantle, was made during a few hours' calm weather in 18 consecutive days.

Landed equipment included a bulldozer, 50 tons of lighter stores, and more than 200 drums of oil which were floated ashore.

EXPERT IS TEACHING BARBERS TO CLIP THEIR WORDS TOO

PHILADELPHIA—Dr. Joseph Lerner is introducing barbers to psychology in a series of lectures at the National Barber College.

First, the barber must stop being mechanical, says this former instructor at the University of Michigan Medical School.

"The barber must remember he's working with people and not just a head of hair," Dr. Lerner advises.

"A barber should know a little about psychiatry and mental disease so he can recognize it. Many people act funny in the chair because they are nervous or afraid."

"It's important that the barber be able to calm a person and kid him along without saying: 'don't be nervous, I won't cut you.' That's exactly the wrong thing to say."

Other suggestions by Dr. Lerner:

"Always agree with the man in the chair. If he complains about the weather, say it's terrible. If he talks politics, agree with his views."

"Some men want to talk about themselves and their problems, and the barber should be skilled enough to let them do just that."

Giles Becomes Big Operator In Real Estate

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Land Commissioner Bascom Giles has just about graduated into the class of big-time real estate operators.

Giles recently has filed with the Austin city government for approval, building permits on 77 new duplexes, for which the cost figure was listed as \$10,000 each. This was a nominal value, however, and others say the 77 duplexes will probably run well over \$1,000,000.

Borger Blast Still Mystery

BORGER, Feb. 12.—An explosion felt by residents of Borger yesterday remained a mystery today.

Sheriff Hugh Anderson late last night said he had been unable to find any trace of the blast.

"There might have been some type of explosion somewhere in the vicinity," Anderson said. "But I checked all of the area and could find no trace of one."

Anderson said it was his opinion the blast was of a minor nature, since anything serious would have left evidence of destruction.

The explosion was felt in Borger around 1:30 p. m. yesterday and reportedly rattled dishes in some homes.

It was first believed to have been caused by exploding nitroglycerine, as several dumps of this explosive are located in the area.

However, Anderson said he checked on these and found none which had gone up in the blast.

She sent a \$10 check to Mrs. Yvonne Pessano with a note stating:

The incident came to light yesterday when Mrs. Pessano, slightly perplexed at receiving money from a stranger, told police.

Miss Hittson, it developed, had followed Mrs. Pessano's car for several miles recently and traced her through license plates. She said she puts aside 10 per cent of her earnings as business manager for a Glendale architect in a "do good" fund to make the awards.

Mrs. Pessano, in turn, donated the \$10 to the March of Dimes.

To Be Sentenced For Extortion Note

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 12.—Mrs. Jane Bean, 20, of Kaufman, Tex., will be sentenced Feb. 27 on her plea of guilty to sending an extortion letter to movie actress Betty Grable.

Mrs. Bean entered the plea in Federal court yesterday. She is charged with sending a letter to Miss Grable threatening to kidnap the actress, seven-month old daughter, Jessica, unless \$5,000 was paid.

SCHOLARS' HANDICAP

Many Of Lincoln Photos Are Fakes

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 12.—Countless pictures of Abraham Lincoln, thought by their owners to be rare and valuable, have provided monumental research tasks for Lincoln scholars since his death almost 83 years ago. But only occasionally does a photograph prove to be authentic.

Lincoln's students count a little more than 120 authentic photographs which have been recovered up to this year, the 139th anniversary of the birth of the great emancipator.

Jay Monaghan of Springfield, Illinois State historian and authority on Lincolnlore, says one in a hundred of the photographic claims "would be dangerous not to answer." There is always a chance, he says, that a new picture might be uncovered.

Lincoln scholars were rewarded for time-consuming investigations during 1947 with discovery of two new Lincoln photographs—one in Decatur, Ill., and another in New York.

To the knowledge of Lincoln scholars, no picture was ever taken of Lincoln and his wife together. Yet, Monaghan relates, the Illinois State Historical Library receives from eight to ten letters a year from persons claiming to have a rare photograph of Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln.

The historical library probably has the largest collection of Lincoln literature in the world. It has a file of many pictures of Lincoln and his wife which are not authentic. A number of them are made from a well-known picture of Lincoln, sitting in a chair and reading to one of his sons standing at his side. Likenesses of Mrs. Lincoln and their two other sons are pasted on, sometimes to the right of Lincoln and sometimes to the left.

Monaghan opines that Lincoln's picture on the five-dollar bill is a "semi-phony." He tells this story: The engraving on the currency was done by William Edgar Marshall from a portrait which Marshall claims to have painted from life while reading law in Lincoln's Springfield office. This engraving shows Lincoln with a beard, but he didn't start raising a beard until later.

College Operators Testify At Trial

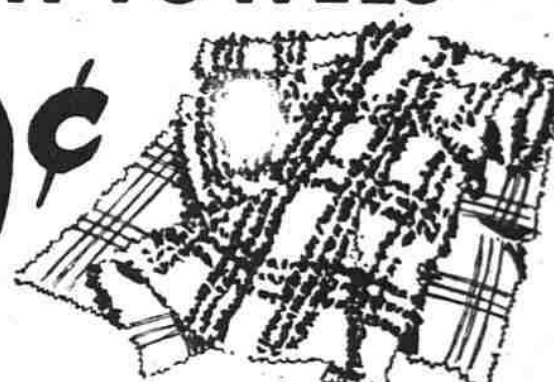

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In Simplicity There Is Real Greatness

On such a day as this—139 years ago today—Abraham Lincoln was born. He grew to manhood in obscurity, punctuated mild success in his profession with a few failures, rose to be President of the United States, and was transformed into immortality by an assassin's bullet.

Through the years he has increased in stature in the minds of citizens of this nation and the world. In the minds of many he became a legend, in others a political demigod. Although he was a great man, perhaps the greatest native born American we have produced, he was neither a legendary or deified individual.

Abraham Lincoln was a simple man. And in his simplicity there was strength of character such as can come from nothing save simplicity.

All through his life he was never given to careful dress. He was not uncouth, as some would indicate, but he was not as careful about having his garments pressed as society dictated. To Lincoln, clothes were not particularly important.

His speech was simple. His addresses, his writings, his letters possessed a clarity, a fineness, a beauty understandable to the least educated, yet compelling and inspiring to the most learned. Not even high

office brought him under the temptation of ambiguity or superfluity.

Lincoln was simple in his mode of action. There was nothing flamboyant in his appearance, although it was striking and even perhaps ungainly. In his career as a lawyer, as an office holder, as a political figure, he was intelligible and straightforward. Deceit was not in the man.

The thread of thought which ran through his life was simple, being based upon what a sensitive conscience told him was right. Shorn of the complexities of compromise, his conceptions were clear to him and could be conveyed clearly to others. In their simplicity, the products of his mind were fundamental and therefore imperishable.

Being moulded of this ordinary clay, Lincoln was above sham. He was what he was; he neither boasted vainly of his humble beginning nor apologized for it. He was dedicated to the proposition to which he said the nation had been dedicated—that "all men are created free and equal." Consecration to that ideal left no room for hate, for grudges, for meanness. Rather, the devotion was given serenity and effectiveness through a simplicity that was greatness itself.

Don't Take The Word Of An Expert

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Economic experts don't always agree, and they're not always right. The same goes for government officials.

Take what's happening now. Or take what happened right after World War II. Or take what happened in 1929.

The point is: You'll have to wait and see who's right.

Right now prices on the commodity exchanges—where things like wheat, corn and lard are traded—have taken a dive.

And some of the experts have been busy for a week trying to explain why.

They sound like they're guessing. It might be this. It might be that. How long will the price drop last? No one can say.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said prices were too high anyway and had to come down. And yesterday Bernard M. Baruch, many times an adviser

to presidents, took a gander at the commodity markets and said: The break in prices is a good thing and does not forecast a business depression.

Now take what happened right after World War II, when John W. Snyder, now secretary of the treasury, was reconversion director.

He estimated that by the spring of 1946 maybe 8,000,000 people would be unemployed.

He was wrong. People piled into jobs and in this past year employment in this country reached a record.

And back in October, 1946, the American Federation of Labor's "monthly survey" gazed into a crystal ball and figured: The rise in living costs was over and by early 1947 the prices you paid for things in stores might come down.

The only trouble was: prices from that point on shot up

through the roof. Now trot back to those ghostly and ghastly days in October, '29 when the boom of the golden 1920's went bust and the depression started.

On Monday, Oct. 21, 1929 stocks slumped.

That night Professor Irving Fisher, head of Yale's department of economics, looked at the situation and calmly said:

The market break was a "shaking out of the lunatic fringe that attempts to speculate on margin." He predicted the market would start climbing again.

Others, including government officials, echoed his views.

But Oct. 24 was the blackest day in financial history, the New York Times reported.

"The most disastrous decline in the biggest and broadest stock market in history rocked the financial district."

Reds Responsible For 'Cold War'

We shouldn't let the charges and counter-charges about who started World War II get us off the beam.

The vital thing for us to know is who began the "cold-war" in which we now are engaged, and what it means.

It is well that we study the current exchange between Washington and Moscow about the antecedents of the Second World War. We won't go into details here but a few highlights on thumbnails are these:

The U. S. State department has published captured Nazi documents purporting to show that Germany and Russia agreed to divide Poland between them, and that they also agreed that Britain and America should be kept out of Europe, Asia and Africa. Moscow retorts that the United States, Britain and France provided Hitler with the strength to

launch the war—that it was done with "a golden rain of American dollars" and by French and British diplomacy.

Well, there can't be much argument about the partition of Poland, for we saw that actually carried out as the war began. And Nazi Foreign Minister Von Ribbentrop testified during his war crimes trial at Nuremberg that Russia was Germany's willing partner in this division.

The bolshevik allegation about "a golden rain of American dollars" is new to this correspondent, and needs a lot of substantiation.

As for the charge about British and French diplomacy, far be it from me to question the truth of that.

However, I'm much more concerned with our current "cold-war" and the danger that it may get "hot."

This "cold-war" was started by

the Soviet Union back in 1919 when the communists, or third international, was formed. This was the general staff to supervise a world revolution for the establishment of communism in all countries. The crusade was pushed until Stalin came to power after Lenin's death in '24. Stalin temporarily pushed the world campaign to the background while he inaugurated his five year plans to make Russia powerful industrially and militarily.

World War II came—and history will determine how it started. The important fact is that a distraught continent did provide a fertile field for the Redism, backed by Russian arms, and a huge communist empire was carved from eastern and central Europe.

One of these circumstances

have grown the "cold-war", which now threatens western Europe and the rest of the world.

Texas Today—

Meet Town With No Kidney Stones

Meet a town with no kidney stones, a thriving North Texas community of 600 with an exceptionally high death rate from old age.

Why this happened to Howe is not fully explained, but Dr. J. L. Shelley, the Grayson county town's only physician, said:

"I've been here since 1909 and I've never caught a citizen of Howe with a kidney stone. I don't know the reason—the fine soft water supply may have something to do with it."

The city draws its water from a nearby 900-foot well in the woodbine sand, the same sand that produces oil in East Texas.

"Kidney stones are not uncommon among folks in the outlying areas who get their water from other wells," the amiable, white-haired, 74-year-old physician stated.

"This is a mighty clean town, too. As city health officer for 37 years, I can say that the average death rate of Howe is far under

the national death rate for all causes except old age. We have an exceptionally high death rate from old age. We have 20 citizens older than 80 out of our preacher-count population of 600. I call it the preacher count because the Methodist and Baptist preachers went around and counted everybody recently. The last census gave us 546."

Another thing about Howe is the lightning rods. Many homes have half a dozen or more. Dr. Shelley has seven on his house.

"I've been intending to take them down every day for 39 years. Before the interurban wires and power lines ran through here, homes had no protection from lightning."

The physician, a very alert man with kindly-blue eyes, has delivered thousands of babies and has seen many unusual cases in his long practice.

"The strangest," he smiled, "was the hairball tumor. Many years ago I examined a stout woman and diagnosed her ailment as some peculiar movable tumor in the stomach. I called in several other physicians and they laughed at my diagnosis of a tumor that moved."

"But we operated on the lady—operated right in her own home—and sure enough we found the tumor. It was movable all right—a ball of hair rolling around in her stomach. This lady, it seems, had a nervous habit of plucking her hair from her head and eating it. She got over this habit, I'm happy to say, and has done fine ever since."

'Baby Beef' Turkeys

PULLMAN, Wash. (U.P.)—A 10-year research plan into poultry nutrition, genetics and management has been started by the Washington State Poultry Council. Hatchability of "baby beef" turkeys, turkey diseases and development of modern equipment on poultry farms will be included in the study.

Dogs Discharged

WESTOVER FIELD, Mass. (U.P.) Five Siberian sled dogs, Troiker, Houb, Kabloona, Saaya and Helen, are awaiting army discharge here. The canine veterans were sent to the Westover base from Goose Bay, Labrador, as surplus to the needs of the Air Transport Command's search and rescue units. One of the dogs, Helen, has a family of four pups which will be discharged with her.

Friendship Fever Is Spreading

WASHINGTON — When the first Friendship Train finished its run across the country, Henry Kaiser, who acted as special conductor on the New York Central division, suggested that one way to solve European relief was to let the American people run a series of Friendship Trains from different parts of the country.

My reaction was that it couldn't be done. In the first place, the job seemed too tremendous. Second, I thought we had imposed enough on the railroads for free freight. Finally and selfishly, I told Henry that my office had been turned topsy-turvy by the job of running one Friendship Train, that I was a physical wreck from riding on it, and that I didn't see how any more trains could be organized.

However, Henry Kaiser was right. Even as we talked, the Wichita Eagle and other energetic citizens of the Southwest had organized a special wheat section of the Friendship Train. Simultaneously patriotic New Englanders had started organizing a Friend Ship carrying food and clothes to the British Isles, while today two Abraham Lincoln Friendship Trains leave from Lincoln, Nebraska, and Springfield, Ill.

So it is appropriate and fitting on the birthday of the Great Emancipator to review the attempts of many Americans to carry out his advice: "It is for us the living, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced."

So much of this work has been carried on by individual citizens and groups of citizens that it is hard for any newspaper to cover it all. But it illustrates the fact that the American people have a deep and almost religious concern for the welfare of their fellow men; also that they themselves want to play a part in American foreign policy, not leave it entirely to diplomats. And if the Marshall Plan is to be an active part of his own state department—then the Mar-

shall Plan will be a success.

Unquestionably, a central, coordinating agency such as that provided for under the Marshall Plan is necessary to direct European reconstruction. However, the wise Marshall Plan administrator will go out of his way to use the tremendous drive and desire of the American people to help their fellow men.

For instance, here are just a few of the things individual Americans, quite independent of their government, have done to carry on "the unfinished work" and build friendship abroad.

MAINE TO LOUISIANA

Up in Maine, a state which the Friendship Train could not visit, the bath iron works received an order to build 30 fishing trawlers to replace part of the French fishing fleet lost in the war. And instead of sending these ships to France empty, the 33 Rotary clubs of Maine undertook to fill the first trawler, "The St. Patrick" with food and clothing for the people of France.

And on the other side, the Rotary club of Nantes, France, has enthusiastically agreed to distribute this food and clothing in such a way as to build up French and American friendship.

In another New England city, the Eastport, Me., Sentinel carried an editorial suggesting that the Sardinia industry contribute a carload of sardines to the Friendship Train. Whereupon the Maine Sardinia Packers' association raised a carload and sent it to Europe through the Unitarian Service committee.

Meanwhile, down in New Orleans, which the Friendship Train had to bypass, various patriotic citizens got together and decided to adopt the city of Orleans, France.

"While the city of Orleans, France, was being bombed," says Mrs. Henry Landry, head of the Orleans Foundation, "our own New Orleans gained 100,000 in population. We are prosperous. So we are giving a little of our surplus to the starving people from whence we came."

Accordingly, the SS Maid of Orleans is sailing from New Orleans the latter part of this month loaded with food.

Out in Detroit the other day, Jean Bellard of the French embassy was addressing the Michigan junior chamber of commerce which raised a friendship caravan for France. Suddenly he got a phone call from Kalamazoo.

"This is Henry Ford speaking," said the voice on the other end of the line. "No, not Henry Ford the auto man, but Henry Ford, the mayor of Kalamazoo. We've adopted the city of Fourges in France, and we want you to come over and give us a

brief talk."

Bellard went. He reported to his government later and he has never seen a group where enthusiasm was so contagious.

FRIENDSHIP SEEDS

Meanwhile the seed-growers of Minnesota have worked out a counterpart of the care program, whereby packages of seed can be sent to European families so they can grow their own food. Reducing prices from \$5.50 to \$3.95, the seed-growers have arranged so that anyone can walk into a seed store in any part of the country and consign a package either to a friend in Europe or to an American relief agency which will distribute the seed. Enough seed to grow five tons of food is contained in each package.

Meanwhile several druggists in Camden, N. J., led by Sidney Zuckerman and Max Schwartz have been working on the plan of a Drug Friendship Train; and in North Carolina, the council of Churches has conducted a clothing drive under the slogan "Fill a SHIP with Friendship."

Finally on the West Coast there was the great job done by the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Alaska in filling a special Friendship ship, while from California, the state's maritime training ship, "Golden Bear," is carrying a special cargo of canned milk along with 100 marine cadets as special ambassadors to help deliver the food.

One of the most important phases of this whole spontaneous move toward American-European friendship is that most of the people who organized these drives are sending their own representatives to Europe as official good-will ambassadors. And it was the experience of those of us who traveled on the first Friendship Train through France and Italy that the people of those countries truly appreciated the fact that Americans took the trouble to visit them personally. We discovered in real fact that the "without the giver is bare."

Visit Of 'Desert Rat'

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Five years ago this week "The Desert Rat" paid a valentine visit to the American forces in N. Africa. In the next few days this tempestuous Teuton—Field Marshal Erwin Rommel—sent the overwhelmed Yanks spinning back forty miles.

That was the only time I ever led troops. I ran back 4 1/2 miles. Many of the men went to their deaths believing they were fighting the battle the wrong way. I know this because one evening they told me so, and the next evening they were dead.

There will always be some controversy over the battle of Kasserine. Many American officers who fought there believe the record would have been considerably better if their units hadn't been fed to Rommel a battalion at a time.

Taking the evidence of all I saw and heard, this is how it looks to me five years after:

There was no American "Army" in Tunisia—only the Second Corps, made up of the First Armored divisions with supporting units.

They were strung out along a 150-mile North-South front with British Maj. Gen. Kenneth A. N. Anderson in overall command.

It was foreseen that Rommel would try to break out to grab the supplies of gasoline he needed desperately. He could strike at the British through the mountain

pass at Pichon or through Faid pass near the center of the thin American line.

Anderson thought Rommel would choose Pichon. But "The Desert Rat" came through Faid pass—with three full veteran Panzer divisions.

Maj. Gen. Lloyd R. Fredendall, Second Corps commander, frantically demanded that he be permitted to regroup the First Armored and First Infantry and fight them as full divisions.

Anderson refused, believing that the Faid attack was only a diversion and that the main blow would still come at him through Pichon.

"I'm going to be the goat of this," Fredendall said when Anderson's reply came.

So the first day one battalion from the First Armored was sent against the Germans. Outgunned, outnumbered—but not outthought—it was destroyed. The next day a second American tank battalion was ordered out and met the same piecemeal fate.

This left Fredendall only one heavy tank battalion. It was under Brig. Gen. Paul McDonald, Robinett—slim, small cantankerous commander of combat command "B."

A brilliant tactician, Robinett and his men stubbornly held off a German force at least five times their size until the infantry could withdraw. Then they pulled out in perfect order.

Comics Planning Trip

HOLLYWOOD, U.P.—Abbott and Costello now plan to leave in July for England, where they will make appearances and film a picture.

"Call Northside 718" (TCB) is another semi-documentary, and, unlike most film trends, this one hasn't worn thin. "Northside" packs as much action and excitement as its predecessors and makes the ordinary Hollywood film seem tame in comparison. James Stewart leads the cast in the story of the Chicago newsman whose research freed an innocent man convicted of murder.

Star Plays For Honor

NEW YORK — John Garfield wanted to set me straight on one item of Broadway gossip.

"I'm sick of the rumors that I wouldn't work in Tennessee Williams' play, 'A Streetcar Named Desire,' because I've got a big Hollywood head," he said.

He asked me if I'd heard the stories. I had.

One widely repeated yarn was that Garfield didn't like the fact that the role wasn't the biggest in the play, and that he wanted it padded into primary importance.

"Imagine me trying to rewrite Tennessee Williams!" he exclaimed. "That's one story I want to set straight. Right away. Garfield said he finally turned down the very meaty role in the play for one measly money."

"I wanted a certain percentage of the gross, which I'm accustomed to getting on Broadway. It's my price, and they knew it when they first talked to me about taking the part. (He wouldn't say what the percentage is, but I'm reliably told he asked for 15 per cent.)"

"It so happened that Mrs. Selznick (Irene M. Selznick, the producer) had to pay out a large part of future profits in percentages to folks like Elia Kazan, the director. G. A. G. (Kazan) deserved his big slice of the pie, but if Mrs. Selznick had agreed to both my terms and gave Gadget his slice too, she's have had nothing left for herself. And as it turned out, I'm grateful that

Mrs. Selznick couldn't meet my demands."

Garfield meant that he otherwise would not have stepped into the lead of "Skipper Next To God," the Experimental Theater drama which received nice notices and hopped forthwith into the hit class. For his efforts in that project of the American National Theater and Academy which is the Experimental Theater's papa, Garfield is paid \$10 a performance, or \$80 a week for six evening and two matinee showings. Now, however, "Skipper" has become so successful that at the end of its Experimental run it joins the commercial theatricals on Broadway and moves into the Playhouse Theater, recently vacated by the demised "The Survivors." This engagement is being underwritten by Producer Blevins Davis, who meanwhile refuses all profits, turning them over to the cast and ANTA.

The movie star is agreeable to Davis' suggestion that half the profits of the commercial engagement be turned over to the Experimental Theater, the other 50 per cent slice going equally to each member of the cast, from the veriest walk-on to Garfield. So what, happened? I asked, to John's usual 15 per cent.

"This is different," he said. "This is something really worth while. The actors who expected to make \$80 a week and were glad to get it will lug a little extra home each week. I doubt that any of us will double our \$80 salary even with the percentage, but it's important just the same to most of the cast."

"But please," he added, "Don't let anyone tell you I was so hammy as to want 'Streetcar' rewritten. It was a swell part as it was—and is. And furthermore, Marlon Brando is magnificent in it. Maybe I wouldn't have been nearly as good."

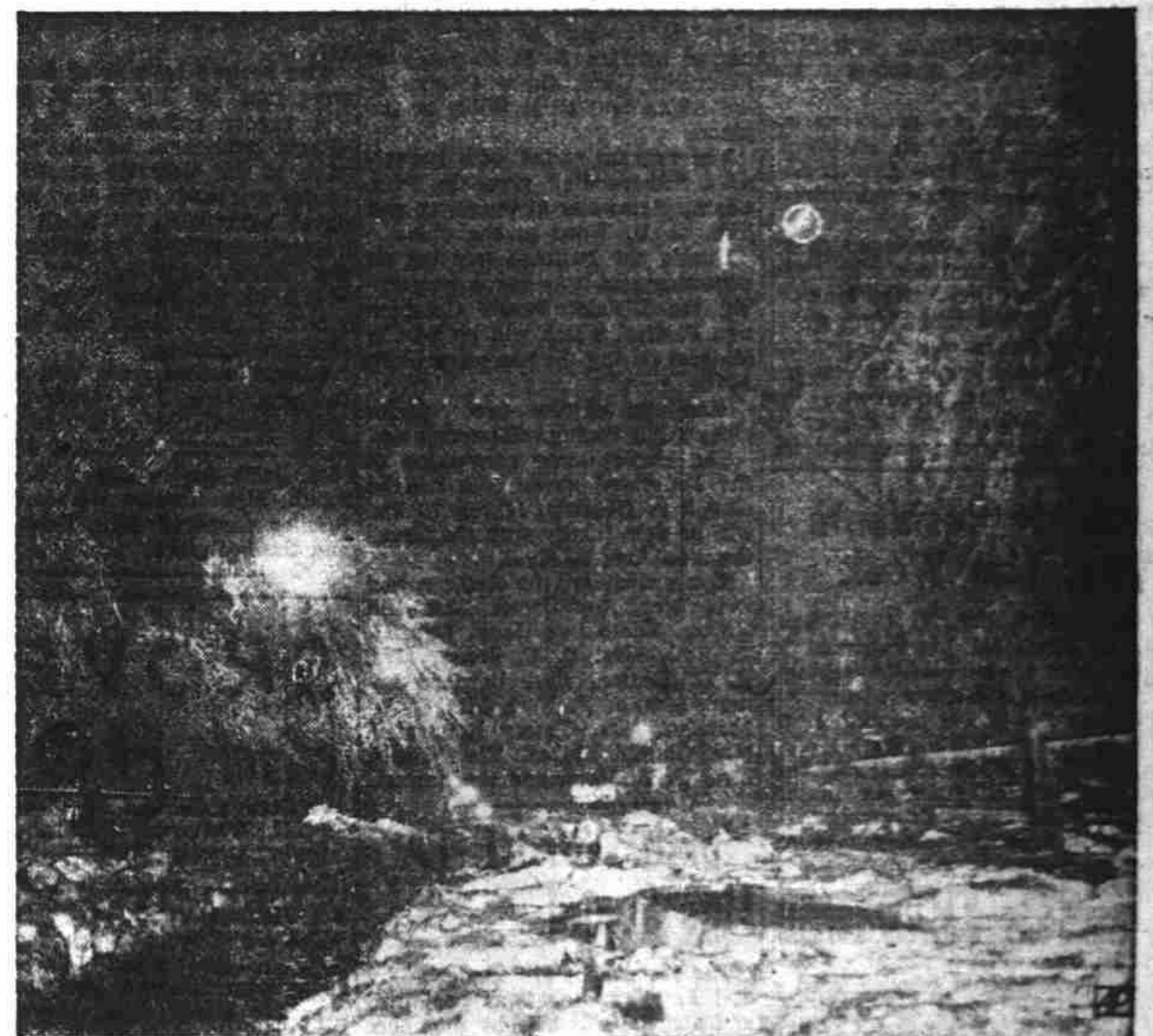

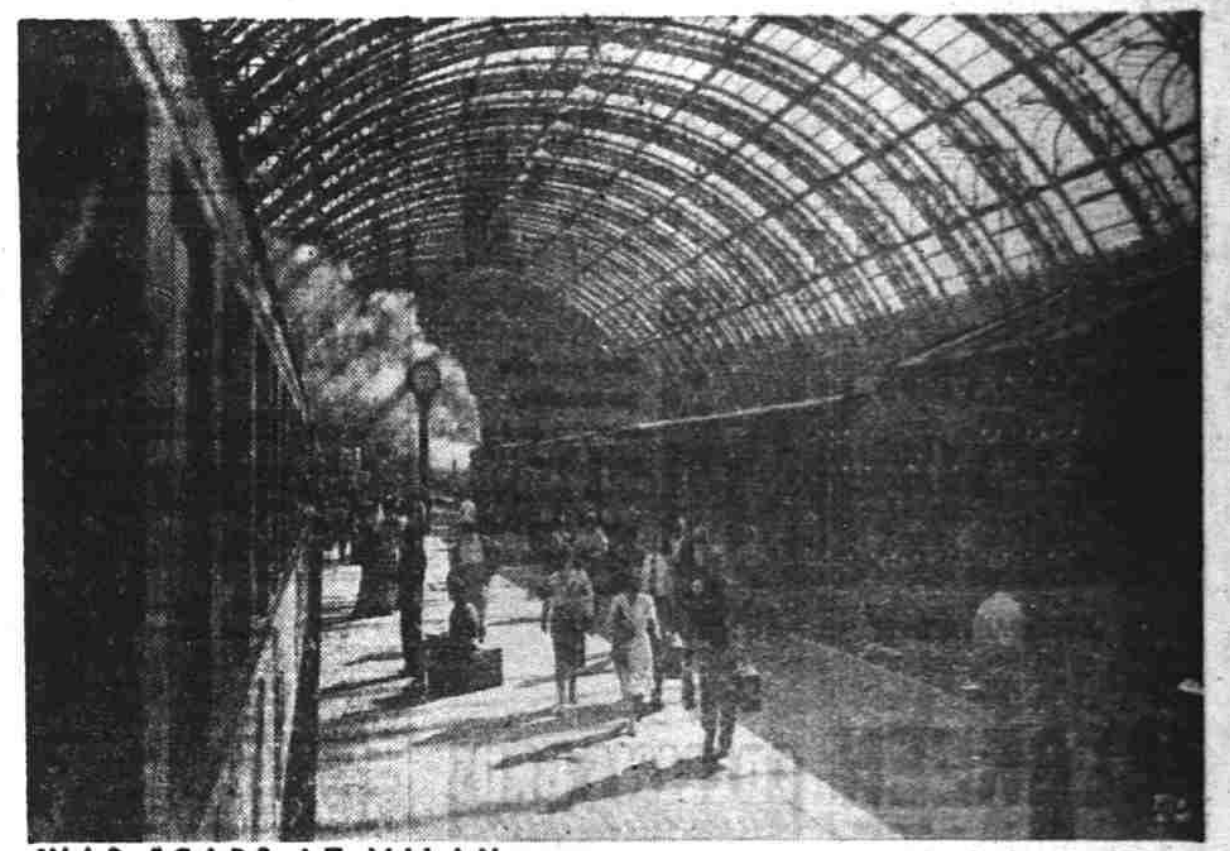

Use This Recipe For Strawberry Pie, Makes Attractive Valentine Dish

I'm a pushover when it comes to graham-cracker pie crusts. A new one I've heard about is delicious. It's simple to shape the crust just right, and to do this it's important to pack the crumb mixture firmly and evenly into the pie plate or pan. A firmly packed crust will hold together so well that it can be lifted out intact from the pie plate after baking.

An easy way to shape the crust is to press an 8-inch pie plate on top of the crumb mixture already in the 9-inch pan in which it is to be baked. The upper plate will force the mixture into a firm, even layer on the under-plate and the rim can be shaped with the index finger.

If a smaller pie plate than the one the crust is to be baked in isn't available then a flat-bottomed cup, such as a standard measuring cup, does the best job of pressing the crumb mixture into the pie pan. It's easier to use than the back of a spoon because the cup will press more crumbs at one time. The tests on this ice cream pie showed that the freezing compartment of the refrigerator should be at the point generally used for keeping ice cream. The pie will keep just about indefinitely at this temperature—though it's too good to last more than a day! Be sure to check before making the pie, though, to make sure that the pie plate you plan to use will fit into the freezing unit of your refrigerator.

Valentine Ice Cream Pie
Crust
16 graham crackers, finely rolled (1-1/3 cups)

1/4 cup softened butter or fortified margarine.
1/4 cup sugar

Roll graham crackers fine. Place crumbs, softened butter or margarine and sugar in a bowl; blend together. Mix thoroughly and evenly with hands or fork. Pour crumb mixture into a 9-inch pie plate. Press mixture on bottom and sides of pie plate into a firm layer, shaping into rim around edge of plate. Bake in moderately hot oven (375F.) about 8 minutes. Cool thoroughly and fill.

Filling
1 quart vanilla ice cream (purchased or homemade)
1 12-ounce package quick-frozen sliced strawberries.
Turn control on automatic refrigerator to coldest point. Spoon vanilla ice cream into baked graham cracker crust, spreading ice cream against bottom and sides of crust. Place filled pie or coldest shelf in freezing compartment of refrigerator. Thaw berries. Remove pie from freezing unit 1/2 to 1 hour before serving. Place drained strawberry slices on ice cream in a heart shaped outline. Fill in center with berries. Return pie to freezing unit until serving time. Serve the remainder of the strawberries and juice as a sauce with the pie. 6 to 8 servings.

Note: The frozen strawberries should be completely thawed before the pie is to be served. The best looking slices should be spooned out into a separate bowl to use as the pie decoration. The berries should not be put on the pie until an hour or so before serving so they won't freeze and become hard. In serving the pie it is best to cut it into wedges using a sharp knife and then to use a pie server to lift out the pieces.

Grapefruit With Apricot Nectar

1 1/2 cups apricot whole fruit nectar
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
3 tablespoons granulated sugar
Few grains salt
1 1/2 cups grapefruit sections
Blend together apricot nectar, lemon juice, sugar and salt. Pour into refrigerator tray, place in freezing compartment with control set at lowest temperature and freeze until mushy. Stir occasionally with fork. Reset temperature control to normal as soon as frozen; and serve as soon after freezing as possible. To serve, divide grapefruit sections among 4 to 6 chilled sherbet glasses or sauce dishes and top with frozen apricot nectar.

Spice Cake

Have all ingredients at room temperature. Grease a square pan 8x8x2 inches. Line with waxed paper and grease again. Set oven. Sift, then measure:
1 1/2 cups cake flour
Resift into mixing bowl with:
3 tablespoons tartrate baking powder. Or 1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder.
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon allspice
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cloves
Add:
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1-3 cup high grade vegetable shortening.
1/2 cup light corn syrup
3 tablespoons milk
Beat for one minute (150 strokes)
Add:
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat for one-half minute (75 strokes). Pour into cake pan. Bake in moderate (350 F.) oven for 30 to 35 minutes.

Beans And Frankfurters

4 frankfurters
4 teaspoons prepared mustard
4 teaspoons chili sauce
1 can (1 pound 2 ounces) baked beans.
Split the frankfurters lengthwise but not through. Spread with mustard and chili sauce. Lay frankfurters in bottom of casserole. Pour baked beans around them and cover. Bake in a moderate (350 F.) oven for about 30 minutes, or until thoroughly heated. 4 servings.

Dr. R. P. Parcells, president of the Amarillo school board, said if the three could interest enough qualified Negro students, special night classes might be set up.

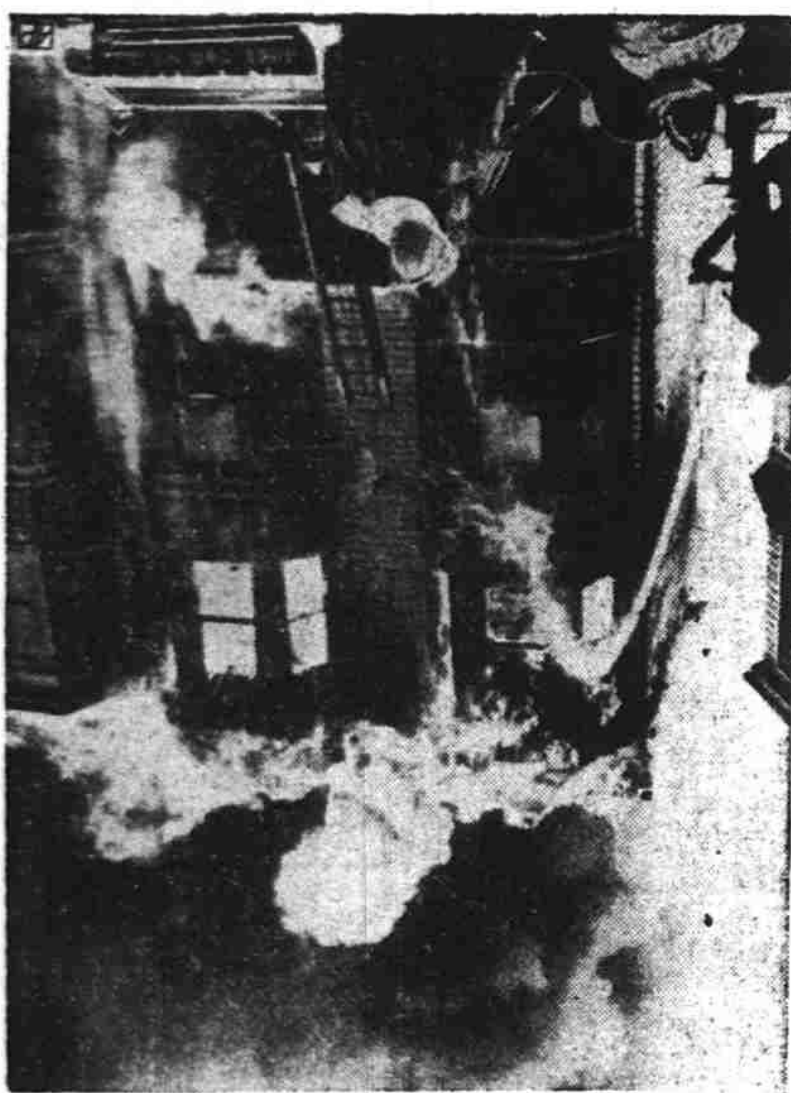

DIRE PREDICTIONS

Red Paper Sees American Crisis

MOSCOW, Feb. 12. (U.P.)—The Soviet weekly New Times said today the drop in commodity prices in the United States is "one of the symptoms of growing economic crisis."

The communist party newspaper Pravda and the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia reported further decreases in U. S. commodity prices. They have not commented editorially.

Papers also carried stories on

this week's prices on London exchanges. They printed a full account of the dire predictions Monday of Sir Stafford Cripps, British chancellor of the exchequer.

Soviet economists ever since the end of the war have been predicting a depression for the U. S.

New Times said regardless of what happens to prices in the next few weeks, the U. S. is ripe for an economic crisis.

Without stating that the current commodity slump would be the spark which would set off the powder barrel, the weekly said that all that is needed to bring about a major, crippling crisis is a price fall.

The Marshall Plan, said the journal, isn't going to save America from its black Friday, either, notwithstanding the hopes in some circles.

"Even figures from American official sources show the extent to which the basis of crisis have ripened," the New Times said.

Professor Hits Modern Living

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 12. (U.P.)—Complexities of modern life have caused the decline in the American birthrate, says Dr. John Rock, clinical professor of gynecology at Harvard medical school.

Americans, he told a group of medical specialists here, "should live a little more like animals, a little less the way they think superior humans should live."

Modern life, he said, is a fight which the United States is losing. "It is influencing our nervous systems to the point where we are not living normally. Even refinements in our diet, such as fortified and purified vitamins, are having their effect. All this has important long range implications."

"When we are tired we simply must rest. Animals are smart. After eating they give their digestive system a chance. We don't. We rush right back to the office."

Famous Soviet Film Director Reported Dead

MOSCOW, Feb. 12. (U.P.)—Sergei M. Eisenstein, 50, world famous Soviet film director, died yesterday, Moscow newspapers reported today.

The body will lie in state at the House of Films from noon today and funeral services will be held tomorrow.

Eisenstein, who directed such films as "Potemkin," "Ten Days That Shook the World," "Alexander Nevsky," and "Ivan the Terrible," had won the order of Lenin, the Stalin prize and the title "Honored Artist of the Soviet Union" for his work.

(More recently, however, he ran into critical difficulties and his "Ivan the Terrible, Part Two" was reported banned in Moscow late in 1946 because it depicted Ivan as a man with "a character weak and spineless—something like Hamlet.")

It was his second picture, "Potemkin," which won Eisenstein his first wide critical acclaim abroad.

He was then 26. He came to the United States in 1930 under a contract reportedly calling for a salary of \$3,000 a week, but never turned out a picture.

Two scripts he prepared were disapproved by the studio and he left for Mexico, where he made a film called "Thunder Over Mexico." It was not well received by the critics and he returned to Russia.

Serve Spiced Meat And Glazed Yams

Glazed and fragrant comes Spiced Meat and Glazed Yams to table on this Peace Plate. Home economists of the Consumer Service Section, Citizens Food Committee are looking out for appetizing flavor—as well as economy and convenience—in combining apple juice, luncheon meat and yams or sweet potatoes.

The menu plan also calls for creamed asparagus (use either canned or frozen) and a delicious Winter Salad Bowl. For a crunchy top fruit dessert easily made from canned peaches, have Peach Crumble, warm or cold.

Spiced Meat and Glazed Yams
2-3 cup apple juice and canned meat liquid (mixed)
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
2 tablespoons fat
1-8 teaspoon salt
12-ounce can spiced luncheon meat
4-6 yams or sweet potatoes, cooked, peeled (and left whole)
Combine apple juice, meat liquid, brown sugar, fat and salt in deep 8-inch skillet. Boil 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Place meat in center of skillet, and surround with yams. Cover and simmer 20-25 minutes. Baste with sirup several times during cooking to glaze meat and yams. 4 servings. Variation: Substitute canned pineapple juice for apple juice, reducing brown sugar to 1 cup.

Winter Salad Bowl
1½ cups shredded, scraped raw parsnips
¾ cup diced celery
1-3 cup minced onion
8-10 small stuffed olives, sliced
½ teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
¼ cup French dressing
¼ cup mayonnaise
1 small head lettuce
Use medium-coarse shredder for parsnips. After shredding, combine them with diced celery, minced onion, sliced stuffed olives, salt, and pepper. Combine French dressing and mayonnaise; add to parsnip mixture, and toss well. Serve in nests of lettuce. 4 servings.

Peach Crumble
Put the sliced peaches from a No. 2½ can in a greased casserole. Mix 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind, 2 teaspoons lemon juice and ¼ cup peach sirup, and pour over peaches. Mix together 6 tablespoons flour, 6 tablespoons sugar, ¼ teaspoon nutmeg, and ¼ teaspoon cinnamon. Add 3 tablespoons butter or fortified margarine and work in lightly with a fork until mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle over peaches and bake in moderately hot oven (375 F.) 30 minutes or until brown and crisp. Serve warm or cold. 6 servings.

Haile Selassie Hails U. S. Envoy

ADDIS ABABA (AP)—Haile Selassie, Emperor of Ethiopia, told George Robert Merrill, new American minister to Addis Ababa: "We are confident that your mission will strengthen that close friendship and sympathetic understanding which have always characterized relations between our two countries."

The emperor made this statement after the new American minister presented his credentials at the Imperial Palace.

It is estimated that about 3,000 Negroes served in the American revolutionary armies.

Prize Magpies Fly Skies In Colorado

DENVER (AP)—An unusual magpie shoot has been instituted in Colorado to control the magpie population.

Fifty-eight captured magpies were released recently in the state with numbered bands on their legs. Hunters killing the banded birds will qualify for prizes ranging from \$15 to \$250 and totaling \$1,350. The contest continues for the rest of the year.

The idea is that the magpie, a relative of the crow, has increased until it menaces other birdlife.

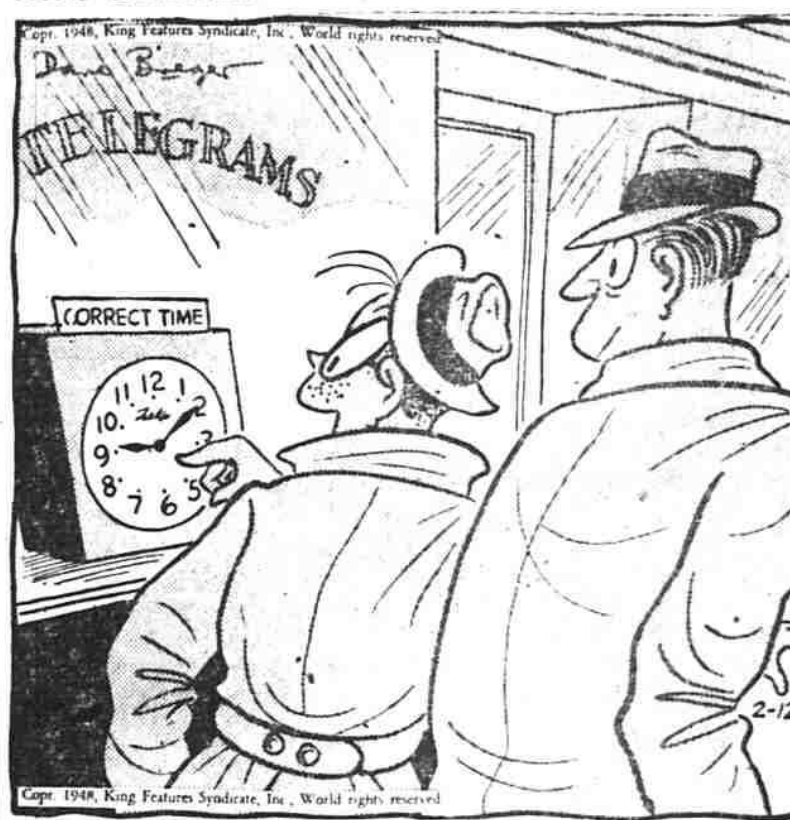

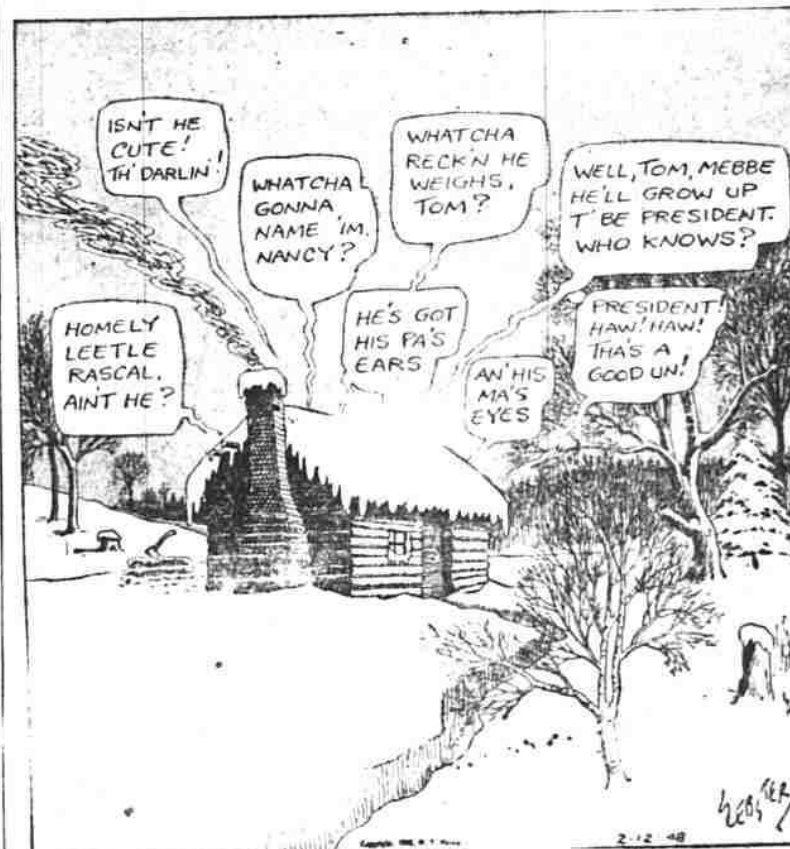

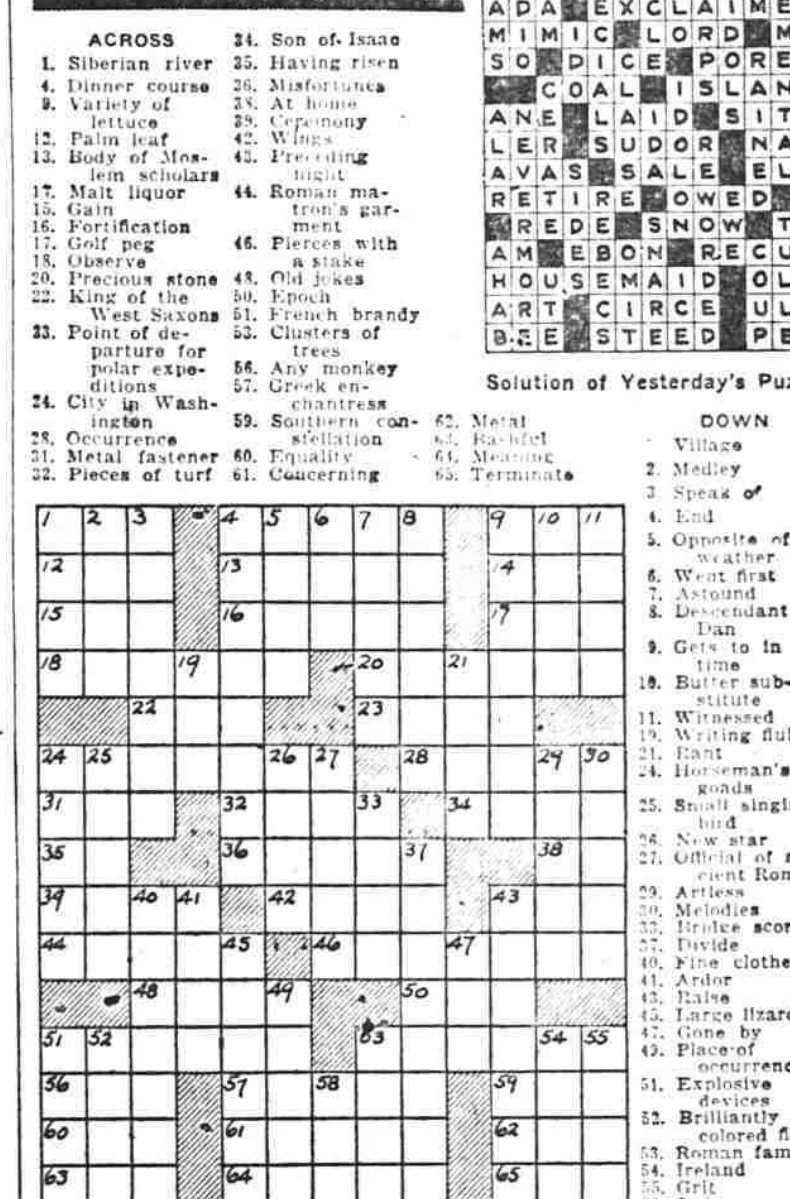

Baylor has already defeated the other major contender, Arkansas, while Texas has yet to meet the gangling Razorbacks.

And Baylor's smooth Bruins have just three more games to play—against two lower bracket clubs and another tilt with Texas.

Texas, defending champion and winner of 16 of 17 games this year, will be just an even bet for the first time in conference play this year.

The Longhorns have a slight advantage in speed over the Bruins, who have won eight straight games, but will be playing on the Bears' home court against one of the best defensive teams in the circuit.

Three Baylor players are among the first ten in scoring while Texas main punch is Slater Martin and his Tom Hamilton.

Jackie Robinson, Don Heathington and Bill Johnson are the high scoring sparks of the Bears.

Four other conference games are scheduled this week.

Tomorrow night, Texas A & M is host to Rice at College Station and Texas Christian meets Arkansas at Fayetteville.

Saturday, Arkansas and Texas Christian will complete their series at Fayetteville.

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LOOKING 'EM OVER

Longhorn baseball league clubs drew an aggregate of around 242,000 paid admissions to their games during the 1947 season and all clubs either broke even or made a little money.

There is no reason why the league shouldn't top its 1947 gate by 100,000 admissions. If eight teams start the spring — and there is a chance San Angelo and another club will toe the mark — the patronage should total somewhere around 425,000.

The Big Spring club set the pace at the gate during 1947 with a modest draw of about 45,200 paid admissions. If Pat Stacey and Claude McAden field a team capable of challenging for the lead, the turnout here may total 75,000 paid admissions, taking for granted that the size of the grandstand here is going to be enlarged.

The big jump in attendance should take place in Odessa, always a good sports town when it has a winner. Indications are A. D. Ensey will come up with a very rugged outfit this season. A draw of 75,000 to 100,000 there would not be surprising.

Balling may do better this year than the 42,500 it drew last year. The city proper boasts only around 7500 people, at the most, but everyone in Runtells county apparently is baseball conscious. Bill Moore's attendance at Cat home games fell off after the all-star game last year. He'll not host the spangled teams this year.

VERNON RECOGNIZED AS LIVESTOCK BASEBALL TOWN

Midland will probably be a much better baseball town this year than last, when the Indians attracted some 37,000 patrons to home games.

Vernon is destined for better things. Manager Lloyd Rigby isn't going to be satisfied with a loser and Bob Huntley apparently has the money back of him to field a strong lineup. The draw there was brisk last year despite the fact that the Dusters' park didn't have lights until near mid-season and could never win more than three games at a stretch.

Sweetwater, always a good football town, remains a question mark in baseball but can probably make ends meet. Operators there made a lot of mistakes in 1947, most of which could be blamed on inexperience, and the club was in a financial hole for a long spell. However, the Sports slipped into the playoffs and the turnout eased a lot of worry.

FORMER BIG SPRING LEFTIE SIGNS WITH AUSTIN

John "Lefty" McFarland, who pitched for the Big Spring club in the old WT-NM league back in the late '30's, will toe the slab for the Austin Pioneers in the Big State league this year.

McFarland had a tryout with the Chicago Cubs during the war years. He also toiled at Macon for a spell. At Austin, Long John will be working for Hank Oana, the Hawaiian hurler-outfielder who was with Dallas last year.

Aiken Changes Face Of Texas Education

AUSTIN, Feb. 12. (AP)—Reports from Paris indicate strongly that Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr. of Paris will be opposed this year by Rep. John Ford. This has centered attention on one of the most unusual records held by any Senator, that of Senator Aikin.

Aikin is not a particularly brilliant orator; he would be the first to admit it. But by plugging away, he has changed the face of education in Texas. So many years ago that even he has trouble in remembering, he proposed that the state enter the field of helping to finance junior colleges.

For session after session, his bill was defeated. Aikin, with unshakable persistence, brought the subject back to legislature after legislature. Finally the bill was enacted. It's now a settled part of state policy. Moreover,

the trend in high education is toward the junior college.

Aikin also has helped nurse the rural aid appropriation, now known as equalization aid, from a mere babe to one of the state's biggest biennial appropriations. This is the law which seeks to render aid to the poorer school districts, so that children in those districts will have a chance for as good an education. And his name has always been on the per capita aid bill.

It came as a surprise to some Austin legislative observers to learn that Rep. Austine Celeya of Brownsville originated the teacher pay bill at the last session of the legislature or at least, he is so quoted in the Laredo newspapers. Celeya has been visiting up in Laredo. That's outside his representative district, but it is strictly within the congressional district of Milton West, who isn't running for reelection.

Celaya told Laredo reporters that it was too early to say definitely anything about the Congressional race. But "speaking of his long and fruitful legislative life, Celaya said that he was most proud of originating the teachers' pay raise bill."

Rep. Dallas Blankenship of Dallas, who was the first signer of the teacher pay raise bill, no doubt will be interested.

The most activity in the West Congressional district is being shown by supporters of County Judge Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr. of Hidalgo. He's in the race. Philip Kazen of Laredo is considered a probable candidate and friends of J. T. Ellis, Jr. of Weslaco, defeated by West last election, are booming him to run.

It looks like the principal advocate of labor restrictive legislation, Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio, will be back in the next House; he's announced for reelection and none have announced in opposition to him, yet.

Schools Spend \$233,689.91 In Five Months

Disbursements of the Big Spring independent school district for the five months of its current fiscal year which began last September 1 have totaled \$233,689.91, it is shown in the latest monthly financial statement of the district.

Budget disbursements for the entire year are set up at \$481,810.70, leaving \$228,120.79 for the remaining seven months of the year if the district operates within its budget.

Administration outgo totaled \$77,753.81, against yearly budget total of \$10,285; white instructional service outgo aggregated \$174,866.40 against budget sum of \$342,632.50; colored instructional service, \$3,741.97 and \$8,800; plant operation, \$13,371.88 and \$33,350; fixed charges (interest and insurance) \$2,509.15 and \$3,200; capital outlay, \$12,551.30 and \$21,600; debt service, \$9,400.82 and \$27,443.20.

Receipts for the five months have aggregated \$339,565.14, as compared with an estimated \$466,519.16 for the entire year. Current tax collections amount to \$232,099.08, against a budgeted \$245,875; per capita apportionment, \$89,544.20 against \$206,164.40.

Gold Rush Recipe Still Good Eatin'

PLACERVILLE, Calif. — In gold rush days this was Hangtown, famed for swift justice and a dish called the Hangtown fry—an elusive mixture of oysters, eggs, bacon and maybe onions.

Here as elsewhere there are two schools of thought about onions. With or without, this unique omelette was part of the gold rush which began a century ago at nearby Coloma.

The local chamber of commerce approves this version:

In '49 a miner who had struck it rich at Shittail Bend, hungry from short rations, staggered into Placerville, then called Hangtown because of the ease with which local lawbreakers found themselves strung up to oak boughs.

At the first available eatery he passed up the grizzly bear steaks and demanded the best and most expensive food to be had. That turned out to be eggs and oysters. "Fry me plenty of both and throw in some bacon," were the words creating the Hangtown fry, which still crops up on menus in many tongues.

Some 99 years later this correspondent, having first heard of the Hangtown fry, came down over the same hill into Hangtown, his mind fixed on the real thing in Hangtown itself.

"What is it?" inquired the waitress in a popular steakhouse. The proprietor didn't know what a Hangtown fry was either. The two cooks in the kitchen had never made one, but knew how. It was an "r" month, but they had no oysters. They obliged with the recipe:

You chop 4 strips of bacon and fry almost crisp, then in the same pan brown 4 medium oysters lightly with 2 tablespoons of chopped onions. On top you dump 4 beaten eggs and fry on both sides. This will do two hungry people as well as it did one hungry miner a hundred years ago. It's delicious with cold green salad and crusty French bread.
