FEBRUARY OIL DRILLING.—Despite the low price for oil production, activities in Texas during February were unusually heavy. Producing wells to the number of 322 were brought in, in the gas well producers numbering 6. There were 206 dry holes reported for the month. Pecos county reported the largest number of producers, the number being 37, while Winkler county came second with 25, and Brown and Callahan counties tied for third place with 23 each. The largest number of permits to drill was 72 in Wichita county. Brown was second with 69, and Archer and Winkler tied for third with 39. Every indication is that 1928 will bring the greatest oil and gas development the state has ever seen, as every part of the state is being thoroughly scouted.

FACTORY MEN ADVERTISE.—Manufacturers of Dallas have organized for more thoroughly advertising that city as a manufacturing center. The advertising presentation will show that the city's factories turn out a well-balanced list of products and that this fact is not sufficiently recognized. Such a campaign, like all other co-operative efforts of concern engaged in like pursuits, is sure to result in greatly increased business. Texans need to be shown in a systematic way what Texas makes and should be induced to give preference to the state's products.

SAN ANGELO'S NEW HOTEL.—While hotel companies are seeking opportunities for investment, they seldom put down money in a place unless they have the data at hand to show that it will pay. In building a million dollar hotel at San Angelo, the Hilton Hotel company shows that it regards San Angelo as a city in which a million dollar hotel will not only pay now, but will continue to pay.

RAISES MECHANICS WAGES.—The Texas-Pacific railroad has announced increases of one and two cents an hour for its shop workers, who were seeking raises approximately about 12 per cent. This increase affects a total of nearly 2,000 persons employed in various capacities in the company's shops in Texas.

TEXAS MOUNTAINS GROW.—A new survey made by the United States Geological survey has found El Capitan, the highest point in Texas, to be 8,700 feet high which adds eight feet to the height heretofore reported. This is not a great deal, but Texas is thankful for every evidence of its growth in any respect. The new measurement is also easier to remember than 8,692 feet.

BREWSTER IN NON-COTTON ZONE.—Brewster is the only county in Texas recommended for a non-cotton zone by the state bollworm commission, whose recommendation and report will likely be accepted by both national and state authorities. The commission has also recommended that the existing relations be continued in all counties now under regulation and that the regulation be extended to other counties in which infestation has developed or may develop. The commission found that in Brewster county but a single plantation is infested and that is so badly infested that regulations will not cope with the situation.

KELL'S PAMPA RAILROAD.—There is the familiar old ring to the announcement made by Frank Kell of Wichita Falls, pioneer city and railroad builder of Texas, in the announcement: "You can tell the world that Pampa's new railroad will be built." Contract has been signed for the immediate construction of a railroad from Pampa to Cheyenne, Okla., where it will connect with another Kell railroad and form a direct route to Oklahoma City.

BANK CONSOLIDATIONS.—Once it was thought in Texas that the more banks a place contained the better the financial condition of the people appeared. The people have found, as cities and towns are finding, that it is not numbers but strength that counts, and that a few strong banks are better than more with smaller capital. There have been many bank consolidations in the State in the last few years. The latest place to report such a consolidation is Lockhart, the First National bank having taken over the Lockhart State bank, which has been running for the last twenty years.

AIR PLANE INSURANCE.—One of the largest Texas fraternal insurance companies has amended its rules to permit policy holders to ride in airplanes, that heretofore having been cause for cancellation of a policy unless the policy holder signed a waiver of protection. That is a recognition of the general use and the safety of airplane transportation.

Practically every church of the Cisco district of the Baptist church is represented at the Baptist Workers' conference, which convened with the First Baptist church of Cisco this morning, with Rev. H. O. Hull, of Eastland, associational missionary, moderator of the conference, and one hundred and ten messengers of the several churches in the Cisco district in attendance. "Soul Winning" was the subject of the conference, which was opened with a song service, led by H. A. Hull, of the East Cisco Baptist church. The devotional service was led by Rev. E. W. Goss, of the Gorman church, at 10 o'clock, and "Plan of Salvation" was the subject of the address which followed by Rev. C. D. Owen, of Sweetwater. "Christ as a Soul Winner" was the theme of the splendid spiritual address of Rev. Scott Hickey, of Abilene. At the conclusion of Mr. Hickey's address the quartet of the First Baptist church rendered two delightful vocal numbers. The sermon for the morning hour was delivered by Rev. W. R. Earp, of the Moran Baptist church, who gave his hearers some valuable precepts on Christian work and what Christ expects his followers to do in His cause.

At the conclusion of the morning sermon the moderator recessed the congregation, after the benediction, for lunch, which was served informally in the dining room in the basement of the church, by the Baptist ladies of Cisco. The afternoon session, which began at 1:30 o'clock, was turned over to the women workers of the Cisco district, after the devotional, led by Mrs. Acker C. Miller. One number from the program was a special talk by Mrs. W. T. Turner, of Waco, whose husband has just been called to the pastorate of the Eastland church. The remainder of the ladies' program will be concluded this afternoon when addresses will be made by lady messengers from other churches, among whom are Mrs. A. C. Rice and Mrs. B. P. Woodell, of Ranger; and Mrs. J. J. Pitts, of Eastland. Rev. C. R. Shirar, pastor of the First Baptist church of Breckenridge, will speak on "Closing Up the Conquest Campaign," to be followed by reports from the district captains, who are as follows: Breckenridge district, Rev. J. L. Roden, Caddo; Eastland district, Rev. E. W. Goss; Gorman; Cisco district, Rev. A. C. Miller, Cisco.

ABILENE CHURCH TO GIVE \$20,000 TO MCMURRY

ABILENE, March 13.—It was announced Monday that forty members of St. Paul's Methodist church in this city Sunday gave \$16,985 to McMurry College to apply on that college's indebtedness, and enough additional pledges from the church are in sight to make its total contribution \$20,000. The college is seeking \$60,000 to liquidate its debts. President J. W. Hunt spoke briefly before the collection was taken at St. Paul's.

ASK ORDER TO PREVENT COUNTY SEAT REMOVAL

PAMPA, March 13.—Pending preparation of an election contest, District Judge Newton P. Willis has been asked to issue an order to prevent removal of the Gray county seat from Lefors to Pampa. Pampa last Friday was successful by a substantial majority in an election to remove the county seat. In asking the restraining order, opponents of removal charge irregularities at the polls here. Judge Willis set a hearing for March 16.

Arrangements are going rapidly forward for the meeting of the National Convention of the United States League of Local Building & Loan Associations which convenes in Dallas May 21, and at which 2,500 delegates are expected from all parts of the country, according to word received here by T. Hunter Foley of the Cisco Building & Loan association. The various committees for the convention have been appointed by Ralph A. Beaton, president of the Texas Building & Loan associations, and a tentative program has been outlined. "The convention at Dallas will be of interest to every investor in a building and loan association as many questions of vital importance to the association will be discussed," said Mr. Foley. "Resolutions will be drawn up and adopted recommending laws to the legislatures of the various states in an effort to make more uniform the regulations under which the building and loan associations operate. A code of ethics by which future policies of building and loan associations may be governed is to be adopted at this convention. While plans for the business of the convention have been going forward, the entertainment of the delegates has not been forgotten, and special attention has been given to plans for entertaining the wives who accompany their husbands to Dallas. "The growth of the building and loan idea within the last few years in all parts of the United States has been remarkable," concluded Mr. Foley. "People in all walks of life, and more especially people of moderate means have been quick to seize upon the building and loan idea as a convenient method of saving money and building homes."

MARKERS WILL SHOW TOURIST HOUSTON WAY

AUSTIN, March 13.—It is announced at the highway department that every effort will be made to place official markers on state highways leading into Houston before the National Democratic convention, June 26. Leo Ehlinger, maintenance engineer, said the department wants to have the Houston highways marked before the meeting so the thousands of people that will come by automobile can easily find their way to Houston. "An engineer has been specially employed to arrange for the marking system for the manufacture and installation of the official signs," said Ehlinger, "and when they have been placed there will be no reason for any tourist to take the wrong highway. We will make every effort to have the markers ready for the summer tourist travel of our own citizens, as well as the influx of visitors from outside the state. "Contracts for erecting the markers leading into Houston will be let soon, and after that will come the remainder of the state as rapidly as the special engineer can get to it. "The markers will be the same design as approved by the federal bureau of roads and as used in other states, with the addition of a touch of individualism by the use of the Texas star as a background."

GROUNDING PROBE SET.—BOSTON, March 13.—The federal investigation of the accident of the passenger steamer, Robert E. Lee, which grounded on Mary Ann Rocks at Manomet while en route from Boston to New York with 150 passengers during a blinding snowstorm Friday night, will be held here Wednesday.

LONDON, March 13.—Captain W. R. Hinchcliffe, who hopped from Cranwell airdrome at 8:40 this morning, is attempting a trans-Atlantic non-stop flight, it was announced by Mrs. Hinchcliffe some hours after the flier left with one male passenger. He passed Mizen Head, County of Cork, Ireland, this afternoon, flying westward, according to Dublin dispatches.

MOTHER'S APPEAL FOR WANDERING DAUGHTER

A real sob story comes from Ranger, in connection with the sad appeal of a sick mother for the return of her wandering daughter, which is full of pathos, and would bring tears to the most hardened nature. In other years a mother sometimes grieved for her wandering boy, but those were days when the home ties were stronger, and it was only the sons who acquired the wanderlust and strayed from the parental roof. And it were these boys, out "trying their spurs," or sowing their crop of wild oats, who grieved their maternal ancestors by failing to keep in touch with home ties, but never the daughter. She was too close to mothering ways, whose ever watchful eye nurtured and kept her close to the heart and home. But "those days are gone forever." Since the emancipation of the weaker sex cases are not rare where the girls wander away from the home ties, and the mother grieves for her faltering girl, gone. God knows where. So this mother today is calling for her absent daughter, and a telegram from J. C. Frahm, of Los Angeles, has been dispatched to Ranger authorities asking for information concerning the whereabouts of Pauline Chassey, who was believed to be somewhere in Eastland or nearby counties. Following is the telegram, and if there be those who know anything of the young woman they will confer a favor by notifying her of her mother's appeal: "Pauline Chassey, your mother is critically ill and keeps calling for you. Hurry home before it is too late—Dad."

Cook Pool Credited With 4,023,135 Bbls.

ALBANY, March 13.—During the two years that the Cook pool in Shackelford county has been in existence, the Cook ranch, exclusive of the Reynolds and Matthews tracts and other tracts upon which production has been secured, has produced a total of 4,023,135 barrels of petroleum. During the same period 223 wells have been drilled on the Cook ranch of which 73 were producers. There are 600 producing acres on the Cook tract. The average production per acre during the past two years has been 6,700 barrels. What is known as the "B" lease of the Cook ranch has produced since development began, 1,659,000 barrels of oil averaging 26,000 barrels to the acre.

Bulls For Cisco Dairy Herds Here

The bulls purchased at Paluferris, Kingsville and College Station, for the Eastland county bull circles, are now in the stock pens, having arrived here Monday, and the interested parties, those who contributed to the purchase of these bulls, are in a meeting this afternoon at the Cisco chamber of commerce for the purpose of allotting the bulls to the several communities in the circle. There are eight bulls in the shipment, which are said to be aristocratically bred, and will be the nucleus for the dairy herds that are expected to make the Cisco Country famous.

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COMPANIONATE MARRIAGE

Companionate marriage is another blow at the already groggy home. What incentive would there be for a young couple to economize and slave, and get a piece of property and a house, and furnish that house, and have children, if at the end of five years or such a matter the jig would be up unless both parties wished to renew the contract? What wonderful protection such a system would give a woman and her children. When the matrimonial lease had run out they could be left high and dry, and the head of the family go and enter into a deal with some other woman.

The permanency of marriage is what makes for its success. The thought "We are in this thing for life and have got to make a go of it," is behind successful matrimonial unions. It is the folks who go into the arrangement regarding it lightly who cause so much trouble in the connubial realm. One cannot take much interest ever in a residence that one knows can be taken from one; that is why the average renter has not the pride in his home that the owner has. "What is the use?" he says. "I may have to get out of here next month or next year."

"What is the use?" would say the man in companionate marriage. "She may quit me when the time is up." "I'll have no babies," would say his wife. "I might have the poor dears left on my hands when our contract expires."

Every married couple that sticks must make the best of things, for marriage is a matter of adjustments and readjustments. Rarely do two persons unite who are at first thoroughly congenial to each other. Most couples have to learn to be congenial, and the time required to learn may be a year, five years, ten years, fifteen years, twenty years, or perhaps longer.

If a man and woman were to unite for but a limited period, the moment things began to go wrong they would look forward to the time when they could be disunited; they would make no effort to straighten things out; they would mark time. They would fret for their freedom and once they got it, they would tie up again with somebody else—for a period. It is the difficulty of severing the marriage bond that often helps a husband or wife over a temporary foolish infatuation with someone else. If the tie should be untied at the critical moment it would never again be tied. New alliances would be formed.

A prominent judge of Los Angeles (there are lots of queer birds in Los Angeles) is advocating trial marriage of five years. Why five years? Why not one year? Why not mate for the season, and let the state take the children?

A new wife every year. Wouldn't that be great! Would that make the world happier? What would be the result? Do you want to know? One famous luminary tried it—only he had more than one wife a year. He had about twenty. The more he got the more he wanted; that is human nature. Yet after having lived his life with his thousand wives and concubines, he wrote, "Vanity of vanities, all is vanity."

No one need worry that companionate marriage will take the country. The scheme insults romance, for loyalty is the keynote of romance. The idea of marital transcendence offends the man and woman who love each other. When they join themselves together they would rather make the agreement for eternity than for life.

Let theorists advance their theories. It gives folks something to talk about and argue over and does no particular damage, because there is a divinity in man that will, in the main, steer him right.

MEXICAN PROBLEMS

Mexico, after getting a pretty good start at reconstruction, seems to have slumped again. The country is suffering from the effects of labor trouble, religious trouble and foreign trouble. The one bright spot in the picture is that the Mexican government now seems to understand these troubles, and is trying to remedy them. The labor problem is serious and far-reaching. The present administration started out to give labor rights long denied it, and seems to have gone a little too far. A member of the government says that labor has been getting the better, so far, of nearly all its controversies with capital, which was fine for a while, but has ended in labor's undoing. The big end has been given to organized labor at the expense of the business activity and stability of the nation and the rapid decline of the national finances. The many thousands of laborers out of work have learned this, and are now demanding that capital be given a fair show. Agriculture and industry have been ruined. When wages were high, farmers deserted the farms. Agricultural production fell off, raising farm products to prohibitive prices and diminishing the market for factory products. Factories had to shut down. Now there is wide-

spread unemployment. Business and government are facing a financial crisis. A new policy is being worked out, with the cooperation of organized labor, whereby capital and labor will both be encouraged. The oil situation is improved, as a result of Mexican legislation and court decisions guaranteeing American property rights. The government now feels that the religious controversy must be settled. Facing the situation squarely, seeing it clearly and seeking to remedy it is three-fourths of the battle. The remainder of President Calles' administration, which has nine more months to run, should show real improvement, if our own government and people continue their present cooperation.

TEN-HOUR DAY

A newspaper man after an economic tour writes: "To a northerner traveling in the south, there is something disturbing to the spectacle of those hundreds of cotton mills working their employees six days a week and 10 hours a day, expecting to sell their product to northerners who do not work as long." He is concerned with the economics of it, arguing that there is danger of overproduction and unemployment on that basis. Perhaps the personal, human problem is more important. Perhaps it is a moral and social problem more than an economic problem. The Southern Textile Bulletin wants the 10-hour day, or 55-hour week, applied to every southern state. That hardly leaves the textile workers enough leisure and energy for personal development, health, progress recreation, culture, good citizenship and wholesome family life. The steel industry was finally persuaded to go on an eight-hour basis for moral and patriotic reasons, and shows no evidence of being sorry it did.

TWO MONEY BAGS

The public is pretty familiar by this time with a certain satchel in which \$100,000 was carried from an oil magnate to a public official. It is, by common acknowledgement, one of the most unsavory episodes in American life. And there are cynics who have declared it typical of our time. But is it? The story was printed the other day of another money bag no less noteworthy. It was a canvass bag containing \$52,000 in unmarked bills of small denominations, picked up on the street by a poor workman who had been out of a job for two months. The finder might have kept and used that fortune without detection. The bills were unmarked; the loss had not been noticed and would have been hard to trace. Or he and the filling station employee to whom he showed his find might have divided the treasure between them, kept silent and made their families comfortable for many years. What did they do? The bag bore the name of a bank. They called up the bank, and with considerable difficulty persuaded the bank people to come and get their money. Remarkable? Perhaps. But more typical, we venture to say, than the other case.

RATLIFF CASE SET FOR MARCH 26 AT ABILENE

ABILENE, March 13.—Marshall Ratliff returned to Abilene Sunday to re-enter the Taylor county jail, his first visit there in more than a year. Already under life-term sentence for his participation in the Cisco bank robbery of last December, and facing trial here for murder, Ratliff was brought to Abilene, heavily manacled, by Deputy Reed and Payne of Eastland county. He will be tried in 194th district court Monday, March 26, the charge being the murder of "Big" Bedford, police chief of Cisco; then will be taken to Anson for trial for the murder of George Carmichael, Cisco police officer.

Ratliff was sour and silent when the two Eastland county deputies delivered him at the county jail. The jaw wound, which he received in his flight from Cisco, after the bank robbery and gun duel, apparently has healed; and, if he wanted to, Ratliff could talk, but he is not disposed to talk.

Ratliff's first brush with the law was staged in Abilene when, with his brother, Lee, he was arrested at a local garage by Sheriff H. T. O'Bar, following the robbery

of the Valera State bank of Coleman county. The brothers were convicted and dispatched to the penitentiary. Both were later pardoned by Governor Ferguson. During the interim Lee Ratliff was again convicted and returned to the penitentiary, but Marshall was still enjoying his liberty until he was arrested for participating in the spectacular raid on the First National bank at Cisco.

ALLRED'S ARM BROKEN IN DOING EXERCISE
WICHITA FALLS, March 13.—James V. Allred, attorney, sustained a fractured arm while doing his daily dozen before the radio at his home here early Monday morning. He was carried to the general hospital where attendants said he will be incapacitated for several days. Allred was an unsuccessful candidate two years ago for attorney general.

BERKELEY, Cal., March 13.—Four million years ago forests of magnolia, sycamore, chestnut, and other hardwood trees flourished in Yosemite Valley. H. L. Mason, associate in botany at the University of California declared here today. Blasting on a park road near Mammoth Hot Springs and Camp Roosevelt recently revealed tons of rock in which the fossil imprint of twigs and leaves were found.

Prof. Mason places the age of these fossils at 4,000,000 years, and says that indications are that the rock was formed of material cast up by a volcanic eruption that killed the trees.

An abundance of chestnut leaf imprints in the fossil beds, the botanist avers, shows that tree was one of the most common in the giant prehistoric forest.

Byrnes Murder Rivals Hickman

Confessed Slayer Says Blood Made Him Kill; Ready to Pay Penalty of Death For Crime

PORT WORTH, March 13.—It was the blood that caused me to do it. When I saw that I went wild. This briefly here Monday afternoon in the city detective's office said Floyd Newton Byrnes, 24, San Angelo, describe his motive for the brutal triple killing in that place last Saturday night of the people with whom he had lived for four years—Mrs. J. W. Juergens, her 12-year-old daughter, Myrna, and her aged mother, Mrs. Rosa Schirra.

"I don't know what caused it outside of that," he continued. "We quarreled over a check I had forged on her husband, and she kept getting on me until I hit her. Blood trickled down her face; that's what set me off."

Byrnes, who has made a voluntary written confession to Sheriff J. R. Hewitt of San Angelo and a half dozen verbal ones to others, then told of his crime, "as far as I remember it."

He said that after he struck Mrs. Juergens he seized a hatchet, with which he smashed in her skull. As she fell he turned on the daughter, Myrna.

"I remember that she was screaming," he said. "I remember that, and the way she fell. Then the old lady came in and I let her have it. That's all I remember at that time. I don't recall cutting them up with the butcher knife or stabbing them with an ice pick, as they say I did."

Byrnes related his story in an off-hand, detached manner. Of medium height, strongly built, he appeared to be almost phlegmatic. Not once did he lift his voice above the modulate tones common in polite society, nor did he with a single exception, show any emotion.

Byrnes' eyes are green and rather piercing, the maxillary bones are well developed, even bulging, the nose short and sloping, the chin aggressive. Standing, he gives the impression of a latent, maniacal strength—an impression borne out by his sinewy hands. He was asked about William Edward Hickman, the Los Angeles murderer.

"His crime in no way influenced mine," he replied. "I didn't read about him; just heard other folks talking about him. It wasn't Hickman, I tell you, it was that blood."

Willing to Go to Chair

"Are you insane?"

"No sir, I'm not! That's what's got me to studying. I'm no more crazy than anybody else. And that's why I am willing to go to the chair. No matter what they do to me I'm ready—I deserve everything that's coming to me."

"You expect the death penalty then?"

"Of course. Who the hell wouldn't?"

"No insanity in your family?"

"I don't want to talk about that."

The slayer's full story was told without any faltering, and though at times he expressed the deepest regret over the killings, his remarks were more in the nature of lip service—the saying of the expected thing—than an expression of remorse.

"I was born in Birmingham, Ala," he began, "but left home when I was 16. Mother's name is Mrs. J. E. Dorsett, and I have a sister. I hope they haven't heard of this—they've got troubles enough of their own."

HARDY'S WIFE TO-UNDERTAKE HIS BIOGRAPHY

DORCHESTER, March 13.—At the desk where the late Thomas Hardy wrote most of his novels and poems his widow is now preparing a great accumulation of papers, notes and letters for the much-anticipated biography of the great author.

"There is much preliminary work to be done," says Mrs. Hardy. "In such a task everything of even cursory value must be included."

"As yet I have not made any appeal for letters of my late husband. Up to a year or two ago he was a great writer of letters, within a certain well-defined circle and these may be of supreme interest as reflecting his opinions not only on literary matters, but upon wider questions."

The preliminary work that I have done has been to me a labor of love and in some ways a wonderful revelation. There is yet much to be done before one can, as it were, see daylight as to what will be needed from his friends and acquaintances in order that the biography may be in all senses a complete reflection of him.

"Nothing definite is yet arranged as to the writer of the biography. Names of intimate friends will at once leap to the minds of those who knew my husband. I have my own hope in that direction but at the moment I must not express it. In any case the work will be proceeded with, and it is my great wish to see it completed without undue delay."

MACHINE MUSIC TO TAKE PLACE OF ORCHESTRA

NEW YORK, March 13.—Music in the near future will be machine-made, predicts George Antheil, young American composer writing in a current number of "Transition," a modern international magazine of the arts published in the Latin Quarter in Paris.

"I believe that very soon there will be electrical machines which can automatically reproduce every sound wave," he continues, "and which will not only replace the old orchestra but create every sound on earth the ear is capable of hearing."

"Until then we must occupy ourselves more and more with mechanical instruments. The greatest beauty will be that which comes out of the esthetic possibilities of the instruments."

Mr. Antheil is well-known in Paris for his production of a mechanical ballet which brought the gendarmes to the scene. So much wind came from the airplane propellers, which were some of the "instruments" used, that many in the audience put up umbrellas.

He is now writing a "jazz opera" which concerns love and politics, to be called "The President's Daughter." It deals with public events in the United States, clandestine love, political conventions, murder, repentance, etc. Police officers, chemists, policemen raid night-clubs looking for liquor, a man loves a woman and then murders her, and finally discovers she was not responsible for his failure. It is all very American. This jazz-opera will be tried out in Dresden.

Toll Bridge Fare Cut to Be Sought

AUSTIN, March 13.—Reduction of fare on the four toll bridges connecting Texas and Oklahoma will be sought in conferences tentatively scheduled for Gainesville, Tex., and Denison during the second week in April. Assistant Attorney General R. M. Tilley announced on his return from a Dallas conference on the matter.

Tilley, former United States senator J. W. Bailey, R. L. Murphy, Oklahoma assistant attorney general, and others met in Dallas and agreed to hold the hearings.

Col. J. S. Schley has been designated by the secretary of war to preside. The state highway commissions of Texas and Oklahoma have protested prevailing rates to the federal government.

ELEVEN BODIES FROM MEXICAN MINE; NO HOPE

MEXICO CITY, March 13.—Trapped between fire above and water below, the embowed men in the American-owned Aurora copper mine near Tepic are believed to have perished.

The fire continues within the mine and, with the failure of the pumps, water continues flooding the lower levels. Notwithstanding loss of hope, compressed air is being forced into the workings in an effort to save the miners, if any remain alive, from asphyxiation.

Eleven bodies have been recovered, according to information received by the mining company here, leaving ten men underground, where they have been since early Friday morning.

U. S. Plans Aid to Agriculture By Developing Foreign Markets Same as Was Done for Commerce

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The United States government will undertake to do for agriculture what it has been doing in recent years for commerce and industry in creating and developing the foreign markets. It proposes to enact into a law a bill just proposed by Representative Porter, chairman of the foreign affairs committee of the house.

The bill proposes for the government to add agricultural attaches and agents to the United States foreign service, just as it now has military, naval and commercial attaches. It would set up an agricultural division in the foreign service.

In Foreign Field

To quote the language of the bill, the officers in this division "shall be trained agricultural representatives whose duties shall be, in addition to aiding in increasing the effectiveness of the reports on agriculture made by other foreign service officers, to acquire information regarding world competition and demand for agricultural products and the production, marketing and distribution of such products in foreign countries; investigate farm management in said countries and any other economic phases of the agricultural industry, and to conduct abroad any activities in which the department of agriculture is now or in the future may be authorized to engage."

The United States already has an export trade of something more than \$2,000,000,000 annually in agricultural products and manufactures of raw materials produced on the farm. The biggest single item is raw cotton of more than \$800,000,000 a year, with close to \$150,000,000 additional of cotton manufactures.

Grain and grain products come next, ranging between \$400,000,000 and \$500,000,000 a year. Livestock and livestock products exceed \$200,000,000 annually. Fruits and vegetables approximate \$150,000,000 a year, and tobacco a like amount. Other miscellaneous farm products exported total around \$100,000,000.

Immense Imports

The United States is annually importing approximately \$1,000,000,000 of agricultural products and manufactures therefrom exclusive of such products as crude rubber, coffee, cocoa, etc., to which the climate and soils of this country are not adapted.

This \$1,000,000,000 of imports enters into direct competition very largely with the products of American farms and ranches. It is important to American agriculture, therefore, that producers in this country be informed of production conditions abroad.

Porter believes that the addition of agricultural experts to the foreign service can accomplish a twofold result by extending the foreign consumption of American farm products and keeping the American farmers informed of what their foreign competitors are doing. His bill is now before the foreign affairs committee for consideration.

Seven jurors were chosen by noon, out of 42 veniremen examined. Questioning of veniremen by Clem Calhoun, district attorney, indicated the state would ask the death penalty.
