The rains this week have brightened the prospects for aerial spraying of mesquite. Moisture is considered one of the critical factors in this form of mesquite control and certainly was critical in this area of the state.

The moisture will delay the spraying for a few days however. New leaves will be put out by the trees and these should be allowed to reach maturity before aerial spraying is done. The tips should be fully grown and the entire leaf surface of the tree should have a dark green, glossy appearance. The diesel oil in the spray mixture will burn the tender leaves that are not mature and cause shedding and possibly decrease the effectiveness.

Mesquite this year have a good growth of foliage, the best in several years. This is desirable when aerial spraying is considered as a means of control. Since the leaves absorb the herbicide, the better the foliage, the better the chances of a good job.

Bob Ragsdale, associate range specialist with the Extension Service of Texas A&M University, spent Wednesday in Sterling County. After looking at a number of locations, he felt that the rains might delay the spraying a week or ten days.

If you are planning to do any spraying, watch your trees and the new crop of leaves. When they are dark green and glossy, then spray. It will probably be around the first of June with the rains bringing on a new crop of leaves, or possibly a few days after, before the present leaf crop is mature.

Eggs of the pecan casebearer were found on trees at two locations in Sterling City on Thursday morning of this week. The eggs were still fairly white indicating that they had recently been deposited on the small nuts. Cool, wet weather the past ten days has slowed down the casebearers in all areas of the state and in most areas they are a little later than usual. Warm weather for the next few days will probably bring more of the moths out at night and more eggs will be deposited on the trees.

For protection against the casebearer, it is advisable to spray when the eggs are found or four or five days after the first egg is found. This will afford protection against the emerging worms which chew into the tiny nuts.

This weekend, and not later than Monday or Tuesday of next week, seems to be a good time to spray for the best protection. The first opportunity should be used; many times the days get rather windy and it is necessary to postpone spraying for a couple of days.

Best treatment for control is a combination of two sprays. Malathion at the rate of 1 1/4 pints of 50% emulsion and two pounds of Sevin per hundred gallons of water is the best combination. The malathion will give a quick kill while the Sevin will give a residue of five to seven days or slightly more.

Other recommended sprays are DDT at the rate of 3 lbs. of 50% wettable powder, Malathion at the rate of three lbs. of 25% wettable powder, toxaphene five pounds per hundred gallons, or one pint of nicotine sulphate per hundred gallons of water. Best: Malathion and Sevin combination.

On Wednesday, May 26, all boys of pony league age, 13 through 15, are needed at the new park at 4:00 p.m. to see about organizing a team for them. We will need all the boys of this age to be able to have a team, so, boys, get out all of your friends and come out to the ball park with your gloves.

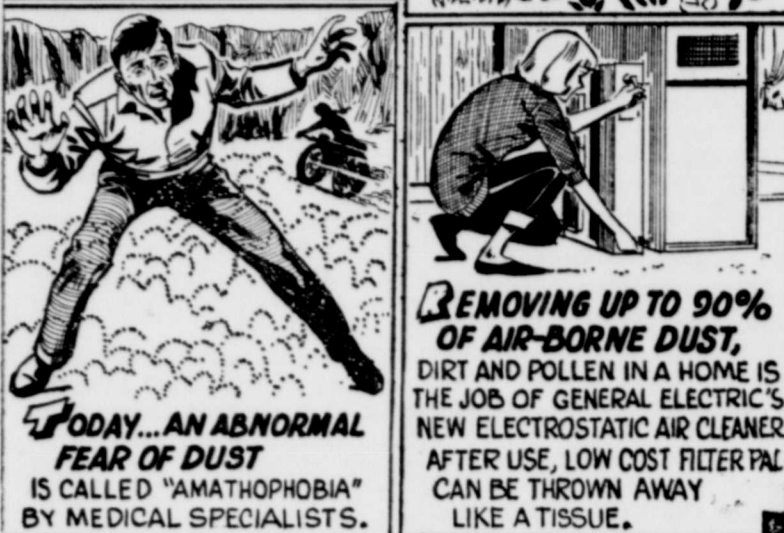

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced a new examination to fill the position of Service Representative in the Social Security Administration's District Offices throughout the country. Service Representatives furnish information to the general public concerning the benefits payable under the Social Security Act. These positions are at the grade GS-4 level paying \$4,480 a year. It is necessary to pass a written test and to have either two years of appropriate work experience or 2 years of study about the high school level.

The final date for applying is June 30, 1964 but those who file by May 25 will be tested on the first test date which is June 19. Applicants should consult Announcement No. PH-138-3(65) for detailed information and instructions. Applications should be sent to the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland.

Another new examination for Agricultural Commodity Grader (Meat) has also been announced. These jobs, paying \$5,000 a year, provide for training on the job in various phases of the livestock and meat programs. Related experience and/or appropriate education are required. Applications must be filed before June 15, 1965 with Central Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Consumer and Marketing Service Unit, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices located throughout the country or from the Boards of Examiners above.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination for filling research and non-research positions in all branches of engineering in the Washington, D. C. area. In addition, positions in certain branches of engineering will be filled throughout the United States. The salaries for these positions range from \$5,650 to \$15,665.

This new examination incorporates revised qualifications standards and replaces previous examinations. Persons who have not yet been appointed from earlier examinations must pass this new one if they are still interested in being considered for these positions.

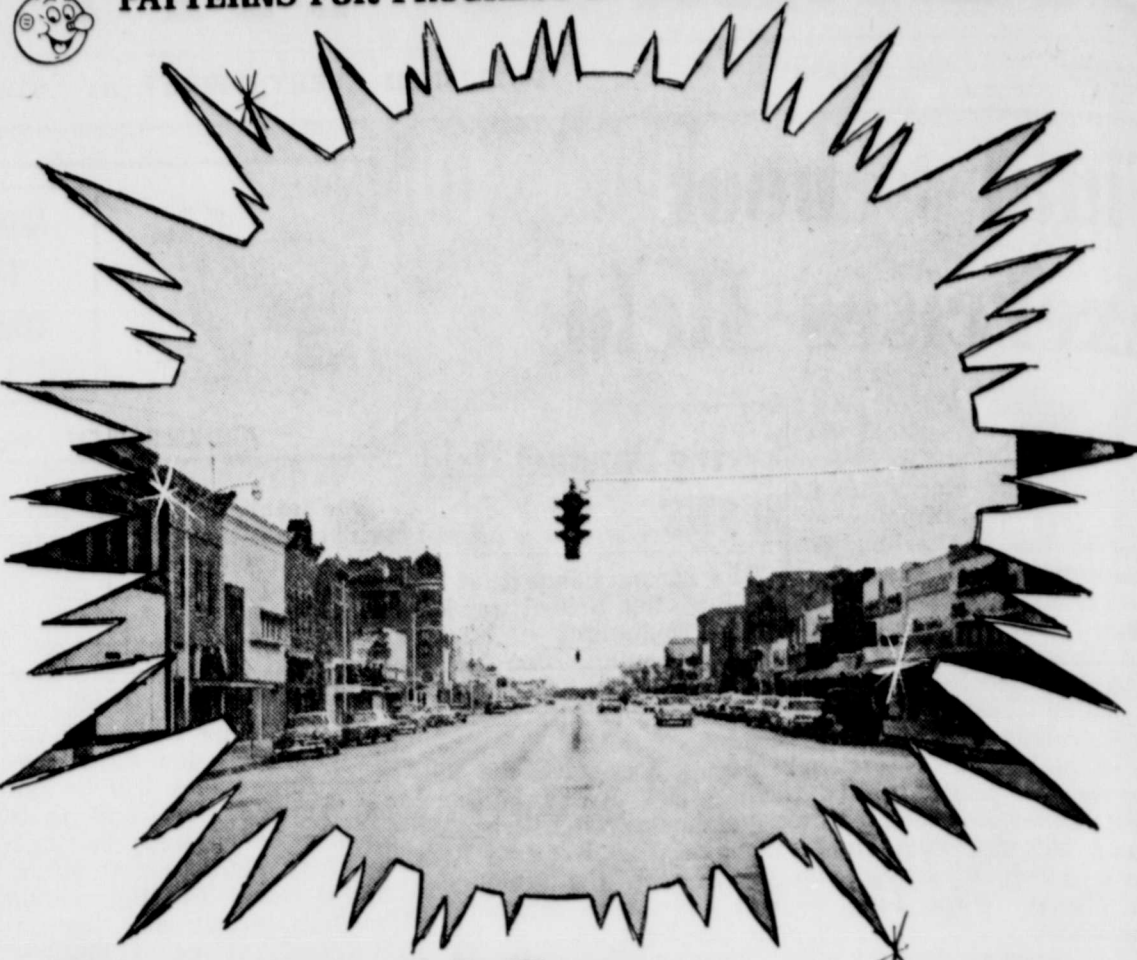
To qualify for non-research positions, applicants must have an engineering degree or an equivalent combination of appropriate college work and professional experience. For positions involving highly technical research, development, or similar functions a bachelor's degree in engineering is a requirement. Additional professional experience and/or education are required for the higher grade levels.

Full details concerning the requirements to be met as well as instructions on how to apply are given in Announcement No. 332-B.

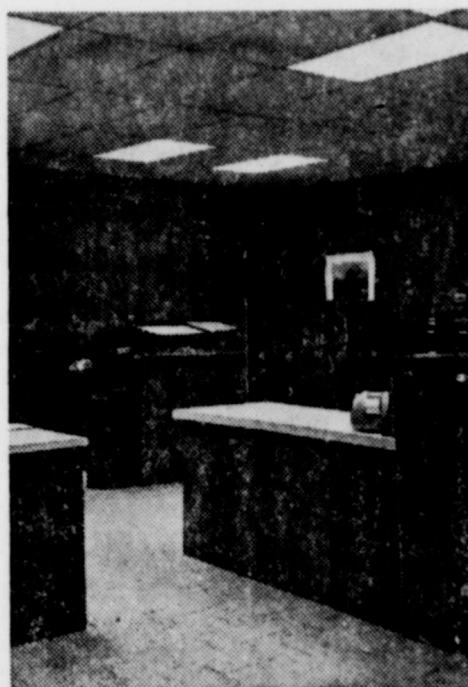

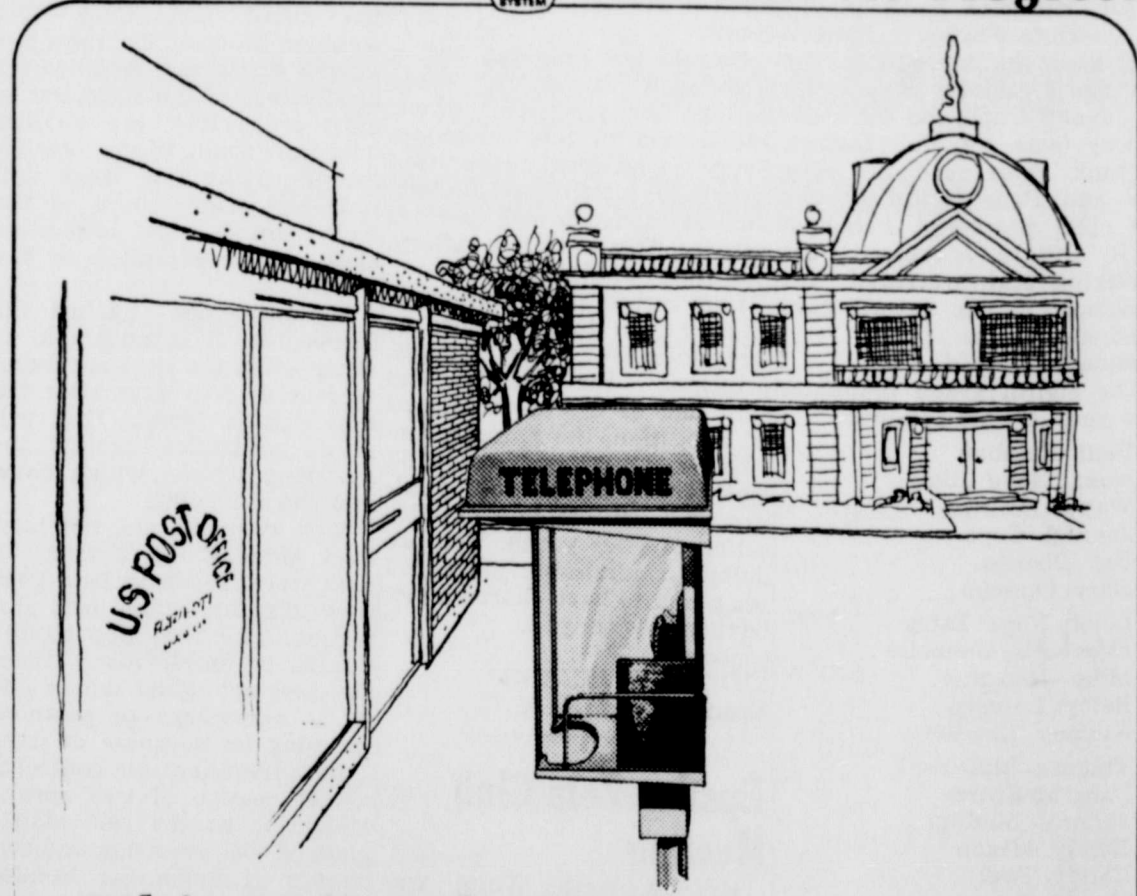

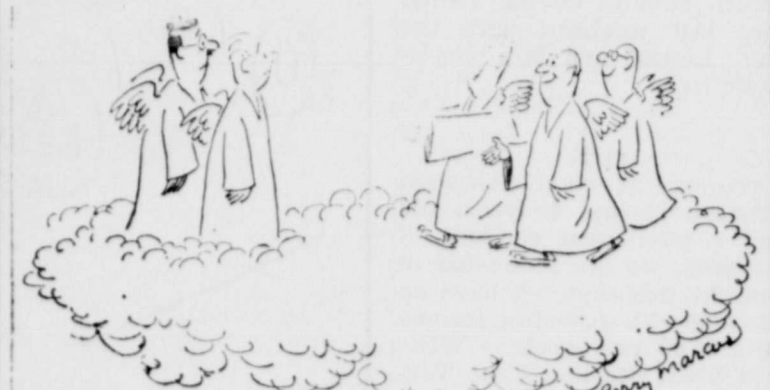

For Social Security

Maids and Cooks Must Have
Social Security Paid

Wages paid a household
worker—whether employed as
a maid, cook, laundress, clean-
ing woman, baby sitter or
similar job—are covered for
social security purposes if the
employee is paid \$50 or more
in cash in a calendar quarter.
A calendar quarter is a
3-month period beginning with
January, April, July or Octo-
ber. Room and board are not
counted, but carfare is, if paid
in cash.

If you have a domestic em-
ployee, you are required to re-
port these wages to the In-
ternal Revenue Service and
pay the social security taxes.
A report for the quarter just
past is due not later than Ap-
ril 30. Failure to file timely
tax returns may result in ad-
ditional penalty and interest
charges.

But most important, you
might be depriving your
household worker of her so-
cial security protection and
benefits for herself and pos-
sibly her family—benefits to
which she is legally entitled.
Employee who meets this require-
ment. Additional information con-
cerning this subject can be
obtained from your local so-
cial security office. Ask for
leaflet OASI-21.

the nation.

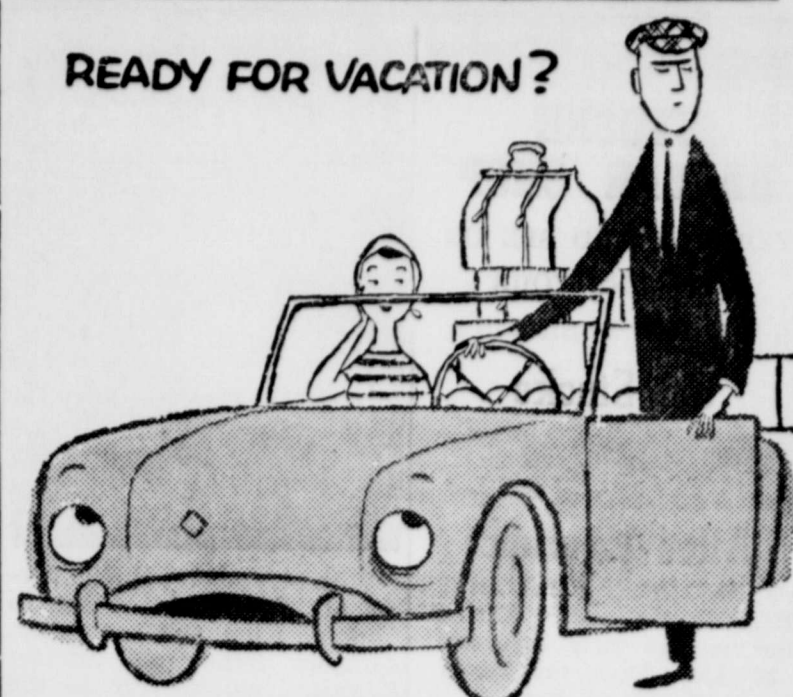

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Our WASHINGTON Letter

With an eye on political fav-
ors at the hand of Martin
Luther King and company,
Senators Teddy and Bobby
Kennedy, moving far to the
right of their late brother,
were repulsed in the Senate
last week in their efforts to
outlaw the poll tax in Texas
and four other states. Called
"extremists" by the respected
columnist, William S. White,
the Senate faction that sup-
ported the Kennedy brothers
even included three Senators
from the southland.

The vote to prohibit Texans
from exercising the right to
determine for themselves
whether they do or do not
want to continue the poll tax
in the election of state and lo-
cal officials, failed by a vote
of 49-45. Even the Attorney
General contended the amend-
ment against Texas and the
other states, would be held
unconstitutional had it been
approved. The racial issue was
not really involved, because
the poll tax applies to all, re-
gardless of race or color.

But as it true with most
liberals, the Constitution is of
little concern to them if it
interferes with their free-
wheeling, all-or-nothing, ap-
proach to legislation.

The Constitution expressly
gives to the states, not the fed-
eral government, the right to
determine the qualifications of
voters. But the liberals want to
make as much political mileage
as they can out of the issue,
and then hope that the pre-
sent liberal-slanted Supreme
Court will again mis-interpret
the Constitution. And that may
happen.

As the Senate continues to
debate the so-called voter-
right bill, the House commit-
tee, considering the same leg-
islation, is moving toward a
show-down and House action.
The House version will pro-
hibit the poll tax in Texas, and
will, of course, sail through
the House on a wave of ex-
treme liberalism which today
rules the roost on the House
side. A conference committee
will then have to resolve the
poll tax issue.

The over-all voter-right bill
is a brutal assault upon the
very essence of rights guaran-
teed in the Constitution to the
states. It proposes to give to
federal hand-picked registrars
arbitrary power to move in
and even take over the elec-
tion processes in local elections,
if such procedure suits their
fancy, in communities where
less than 25% of eligible Ne-
groes should not choose to ex-
ercise the voting privilege. It
would seem that those who
favor this form of unnecessary
federal intrusion have little
faith in the capacity of people
to govern themselves.

Boys Warned To Register on 18th Birthday

State draft board No. 137 in
Midland, which has jurisdiction
over Midland, Glasscock and
Sterling counties, today an-
nounced a tougher policy re-
garding men who register late
for the draft.

The new policy was an-
nounced by Fred A. Hannah of
Midland, board chairman.

The policy was established
after a board survey which
determined that almost 100
youths had registered late in
the past six months.

Federal law requires that
young men register with the
nearest draft board on their
18th birthday, or within five
days thereafter.

Under the new policy, all
young men who register a
week late or more will be
asked in writing to appear be-
fore the board in person to
explain their tardiness. The
board will give formal official
consideration to declaring these
men delinquent under the law
and processing them for armed
forces induction ahead of other
men in their age group.

of young men: Mrs. Vada D.
Sikes, board clerk, at the Oil
& Gas Building (Room 605)
in Midland; Mr. Vernon M.
Gill, Post Office, Garden City.
Mr. Hal M. Knight, Post Of-

besides Mr. Hannah, the chair-
man, of Midland, are Hubert
S. Allen, Midland; and Oliver
T. Jones, Sterling City.

McEntire.

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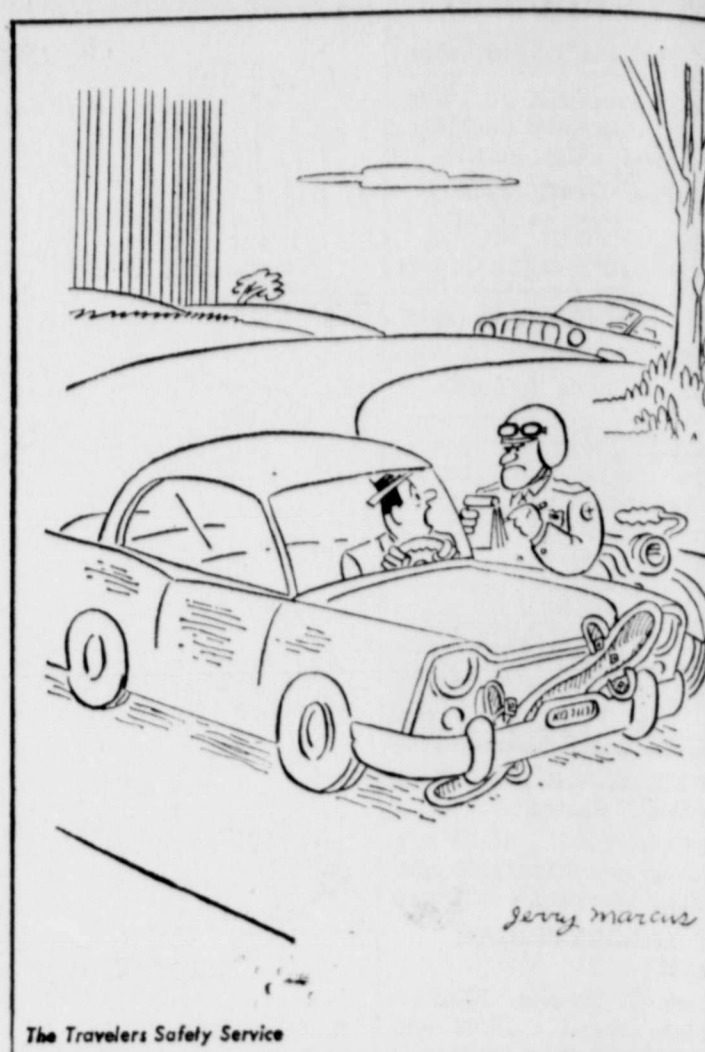
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
