SCHOOLS IN THE BURKBURNETT DISTRICT ARE READY FOR FALL CLASSES

TEACHERS ANNOUNCED FOR FIVE INSTITUTIONS; BUILDINGS ARE REMODELED FOR 2,000 STUDENTS

Schools in the Burk Burnett area are ready to open during the first two weeks of September, and approximately 2,000 students in the area will return for fall study to five schools. Burk Burnett will open Sept. 13, Clara Sept. 6, Fairview, Sept. 7, Devol, Okla., Sept. 6.

In each school improvements have been made during the

summer, and the buildings are ready for the winter session. The pupils of the district will report to their teachers for enrollment and assignments on the dates announced in each school. The programs of formal study will start the following day in the schools.

The Burk Burnett students will start later than any other school in this area, and the pupils will not be required to report until one week after all other schools have started their fall sessions.

Clara school has completed the renovation of the buildings. The buildings have been remodeled and repainted, and new typewriters added to the business course rooms. Superintendent R. M. Davis is expecting 175 students, an increase over last year. The bus at Clara will be driven by Raymond Beavers and will take the same route with the same schedule this year.

The teachers at Clara this year will be R. M. Davis, superintendent, Paul Matthews, principal and coach, Misses Delu Curtis, Sarah Gibson, Mauryne Lindley, Marguerite Parrish, and Dorothy Isbell.

The Fairview schools will open with a suitable program in the high school auditorium the morning of Sept. 7. The pupils will be registered. The teachers are Y. C. Paschall, superintendent, Erwin Brand coach, principal, and history teacher, Miss Mildred McKinney, English, volleyball coach, and commercial classes, Lillie Mae Armstrong, home economics, Irene Hawkins, Spanish and mathematics, in the high school, and in the grammar school, Dixie Overton music and first grade, Kathryn Goldsmith, history and language, Wilson Tunnell, arithmetic and geography, Toby Baird, third and fourth grades, Vera Louise Taylor, second and third grades. The principalship of the grade school has not been filled, but the selection will be made soon.

Only one vacancy remaining in the faculty of the Devol public schools, the opening date has been set for Sept. 6.

The vacancy in the high school faculty was created more than a month ago with the resignation of Miss Loretta Stinson, teacher of home economics and history.

Faculty members include Glenn B. Dillingham, superintendent; Vernon S. Durham, high school principal; Pauline Corzine, Spanish and mathematics teacher; Clayton M. Landers, grade principal; James T. Crouch, seventh grade; Mrs. Jessie Mae Hines, sixth grade; Mary Lucille Yell, fourth and fifth grades; Opal Lee Hale, second and third grades; and Frances Hill, first grade.

Duncan Optimistic About School Year

C. J. Duncan, superintendent, announced Thursday that this promised to be one of the banner years in the schools history. He said that the enrollment probably would increase, and that the high school would be one of the largest. There will be 61 students from the Cashion district who will check in the first week, and the freshman class from the grade school would bring the enrollment to approximately 425.

The enrollment will start Monday, and all day will be used for the enrollment. High school students have been urged to enroll on that day since formal class work will start the following morning.

Mr. Duncan urged that the parents accompany all children who had never enrolled in the school before, in order to aid the teachers in gathering information necessary for the registration.

170 Bales Ginned In Burk Burnett

The first three weeks of the cotton season brought 170 bales of cotton to the Burk Burnett gin and the Farmers cooperative gin according to the reports of the companies Thursday at noon. While the weather the last few days had caused a slowing of the harvesting of cotton, with the passing of the heavy rains the picking has continued at full speed. No estimate of the total amount has been made locally. However, the general opinion among farmers was that the younger cotton had been appreciably aided by the showers.

Cotton Improvement Movement Gains Momentum As Farmers Look Toward 1938

The cotton improvement movement continues to interest Texas cotton farmers, who expect that the 1937 results will be exceeded in 1938. County agricultural agents report that a large number of farmers attended a recent series of meetings dealing with Texas cotton situation.

Approximately 150 Travis county cotton farmers attended a meeting in Austin recently at which time cotton specialists presented the Texas cotton picture. Farmers of the Travis county one cotton community of Pflugerville, where some 1,500 acres are planted to a quality variety of cotton, are making plans for marketing this lint.

He is a graduate of the Junior college of Wichita Falls, of the North Texas State Teachers college at Denton, and has completed some work toward the Master's Degree at the A. & M. College of Ft. Collins, Colorado.

Superintendent Y. C. Paschall of Fairview in promoting Brand says that the Fairview Bears will continue under Brand's coaching the same type of basketball play and competitive sportsmanship that have carried them to two consecutive county championships and a district championship during the last two seasons.

Brand, who has been also serving as Grammar school principal at Fairview, will act as high school principal, also succeeding Watkins in that position.

Texans Accept 5 Amendments And Reject Fee Law

Donaghey Elected to State Legislature By Good Majority

DESTITUTE AIDED

Texans accepted five amendments and rejected one last Monday, and voters of the 112th floratorial district elected R. R. Donaghey, Vernon attorney, to the state legislature.

Returns from 220 out of 254 counties, including 31 complete, with a total of 87,506 votes tabulated by the Texas election bureau, showed comfortable, and in some cases substantial, margins for passage of all but one of the six proposed constitutional amendments.

There were 49,668 votes against the amendment abolishing the salary system, with 36,369 in its favor.

Other totals: For removal of liability for stockholders in state banks 56,151; against 28,279. For aid to destitute children, 60,463; against 26,220. For discounts for prompt pay-

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COUNTY FAIR PREPARATIONS

Iowa Park is starting the last rush of preparation for the Wichita County Free Fair to be presented September 22 through 25. This small community has done an excellent job since adopting the fair several years ago, and in the new effort they have the pledge of cooperation from the other communities in the county. It is a courageous endeavor each year.

This year the buildings and ground landscaping started last year will be completed, and the fair can be presented under much more comfortable and attractive conditions than ever before. The citizens tackled a huge task when they started the planning of the permanent headquarters, but the work has been done efficiently.

Burkburnett is joining the other county communities in helping our neighbors in this project. We feel sure that we express the attitude of all Burkburnett when we say that if there is anything that Iowa Park wishes for Burkburnett to do, that we are more than willing to try.

CONGRESS ADJOURNS

The bitterest session that congress has ever had in the history of the two houses has ended. Not even the slavery legislation of the pre-Civil War days called for as much bickering and fussing as the recent session. The most powerful extra-legislative organizations in Washington brought into play powerful lobbies and exerted influence on the acts of congress.

The basis of all the dispute was the late lamented supreme court bill. The struggle over that bill divided parties, caused personal friendships to crack under the strain, and ended in a compromise. The purpose was accomplished. A more liberal supreme court now sits in judgment of the constitutionality of bills than sat in Washington before the struggle started.

To make the session more difficult the most important series of strikes and industrial trouble started during the congressional session. CIO and John Lewis became very terrifying spectacles to the legislative members.

On the heels of this strife the wage-hours bill arose from the administration recommendations. In the upper house after a battle of stalling and evasion it was passed. In the lower house it came out of the sub-committee, the committee and was killed in the rules or steering committee.

Farm legislation became a step-child, neglected for the more disputed measures. The bumper cotton crop placed the farmers in a serious situation. So serious is the situation of the cotton growers that a special session will have to be called.

On the whole the session of the national congress did more to clear the air politically than many recent meetings. The real political philosophy of almost every member was analyzed in the struggle. All shades of liberalism and conservatism were discovered during the disputes.

While a semblance of peace was kept, the fire of dispute waged bitterly underneath the controlled exterior. This session probably will have more to do with the determination of American political party history than any held in the national capitol.

A PARADOX

One of the strangest paradoxes in American history is the fight that the American Union Civil Liberties is making for the right of the Nazis to hold meetings without official interruption from police and civil authorities. The Civil Liberties union is one of the most potent forces in America for freedom of speech. The organizers of the association have fought many unpopular causes for the right of men to say what they please.

It is the fundamental idea of the organization that the right of free speech is an inherent right. That the right of speech is sacred to Americans. So the group has thrown its money and influence into the fight for minorities that might have been suppressed beneath public opinion and forgotten.

Again the organization is fighting for a minority. This time it is for the American Nazis. This is strange because the Nazis are a party that would suppress everything that the AUCL stands for in its ideal. Should the Nazis again power one of the first organizations to disappear would be the Civil Liberties union. All the American "rights" that the organization represents are dangerous enemies to the rule of that type of government.

But the union has the right idea. The fact is illustrated in the recent news story from St. Paul, Minn. In that city 300 children were led in a demonstration against the mayor and governor. The children led by a communist woman booed each official. But at the second stop, the governor's mansion, they found ice cream and cake waiting for them. The temptation of the sweets overcame the children's political philosophy, and they fell for the tempting ices. They returned over their route and cheered the officials in spite of the hectic speeches of the leader.

That's the way to treat people who feel discontented. Feed them and clothe them and their grievances disappear. Suppress people and a revolution slumbers until the moment when its flames can destroy the whole government.

Oil Industry Celebrates An Anniversary

THE oil industry—the industry that introduced the Machine Age and changed the course of civilization—was born 78 years ago at a small farm in Titusville, Pa.

It was August 29, 1859. Colonel E. L. Drake, a railroad conductor who held the title of "colonel" only by courtesy, stood gazing at the shabby pyramid of timbers he had built on the banks of Oil Creek. The derisive hoots of his neighbors were ringing in his ears.

Suddenly from the shadow of this primitive derrick, a bearded giant burst forth. He was Uncle Billy Smith, blacksmith and welder,

who had cast his lot with the visionary Drake.

Uncle Billy, trembling with excitement, grabbed Drake and led him to the mouth of the pipe shaft. The pump began working. Then . . . liquid, dark and thick, gushed from the earth.

"There, Colonel," cried Uncle Billy, "is your fortune."

The true source of petroleum had been found. A new epoch in history had begun.

The fantastic boom that followed soon led to a violent conflict between oil-drilling farmers in Western Pennsylvania and powerful transportation interests seeking to wrest control of the industry from them.

The farmers fought back. With their enemies battling them viciously at every turn, they built the world's first oil pipeline to carry the oil from the rich Pennsylvania fields across the mountains to tide water at Bayonne, N. J. These pioneers were the founders of Tide Water Associated Oil Company and their historic pipeline laid in 1878 is still carrying the world's costliest crude, the crude that is used to make Vedol motor oil and Tydol gasolines.

Texas Cattle Fed Out Early In Season Have Prospect Of Excellent Market

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 25.—Texas feeders have prospects of an exceptional market for such calves as they can finish out by the end of the year and the first two months of 1938, according to G. W. Barnes, animal husbandman of the Texas A. & M. Extension Service.

Barnes, who has recently completed a tour of the major grain and livestock areas of the state, reports that the grain crop is good over a major portion of Texas.

"The good grain crop over a large part of the state, in combination with the shortage of grain for early feeding in the corn belt, makes this an ideal year for Texas feeders," Barnes said. He warned, however, that feeders should start their operations at once in order to get their animals well finished and on the market before corn belt calves begin to move.

The excellent grain prospects in the corn belt have strengthened the demand for feeder and stocker animals, Barnes pointed out. Texas normally sells about two million feeders and stockers each year, he said and feeds out around 150,000 calves.

If calves are placed on feed as soon as the grain supply warrants, so that the animals can be marketed before early April of 1938, Barnes believes that Texas feeders could profitably finish out from 300,000 to 500,000 animals.

Safety Foundation Announces Awards for Saving of Lives

LIFE-**SAVING** awards to be made by the Light for Life Foundation, new national safety organization, will go exclusively to persons who perform heroic acts outside the line of duty and without compensation. It has been announced by Capt. Charles B. Scully, Executive Secretary of the Foundation and Director of Life Saving of the American Red Cross, New York.

The Awards Committee of the Foundation decided that awards will be made, after full consideration of the nominees' claims, "in cases where an individual personally used emergency lighting either in an attempt to prevent loss of life or to effect a rescue of people in danger of losing their lives." Emergency lighting was defined as any light that is portable, such as lamps, flares, flashlights, lanterns, etc. Any person eligible for consideration for an award was invited to submit his case. Foundation officials expect the awards to become an important factor in increasing the safety consciousness of the American people.

Capt. Scully, who is chairman of the Awards Committee, pointed out that the Foundation is confining its activities to emergency lighting because that field of safety work is virtually uncharted. Members of the Foundation, all nationally known leaders in safety education, are now conducting exhaustive research into the relation between emergency lighting and accident prevention, and plan to make these findings available to the public.

Other regulations set up by the Awards Committee include the following: the Foundation will give not more than 10 first class medals

Four thousand trees, 70,000 shrubs and 700,000 flowering plants will be planted on Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay for the 1939 World's Fair.

In any one year and may, at their discretion, make as many money grants; certificates of merit may be awarded in cases which the Foundation considers meritorious but not exceptional; all applications for awards must be filed within one year of the act. 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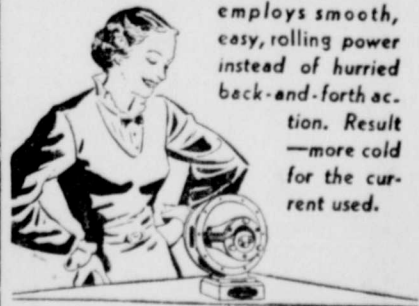

ment of ad valorem taxes, 64,585; against 21,720.

For the Harris county road plan amendment, 46,170; against 32,427.

For aid for the blind, 65,654; against 21,852.

The bureau predicted not more than 120,000 votes would be cast and indicated the six o'clock tabulation would be the last unless substantial changes occur.

Latest unofficial returns here from statewide election showed mounting majorities for five of the six proposed constitutional changes.

The amendment to authorize restoration of the fee system of remunerating district and county officers appeared to have been killed by a margin of approximately 3 to 2.

The most popular proposals were those empowering the legislature to give aid to \$15 per month to each of the adult needy blind and discounts up to three per cent for prompt payment of property taxes.

Problems Arise

Amendments authorizing state assistance of \$1,500,000 a year to dependent children and relieving state bank stockholders of double liability likewise held long leads. The proposal to permit Harris county to adopt a pay-as-you-go road plan had a fairly comfortable margin.

The vote was even lighter than had been forecast. Indications were that the total was little, if any, above 125,000.

Claude D. Teer, chairman of the board of control, said machinery for aid to dependent children and the blind would not start functioning until after the legislature appropriated money for the program.

The raising of \$1,750,000 a year in taxes for these forms of assistance will be one of the big problems before the legislature at its special session starting about Sept. 20.

Will Rogers Shrine Completed—Dedication Is Labor Day

(SPECIAL TO THE STAR)

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 26. — The beautiful Will Rogers Shrine of the Sun is to become one of the most unique singing towers in the world. Spencer Penrose, who has built the granite memorial on Cheyenne mountain, half a mile above the Broadmoor hotel, is now having installed an elaborate system of Westminster chimes and vibraphone which can be operated automatically or through a console on which concerts can be given.

The silvery notes will be amplified and sent out over the entire Pike Peak region. Westminster chimes will be heard on the hour and each quarter hour,

starting with the songs of the birds at dawn of each new day and continuing until 11 at night when they close the day with a hymn. After dark, floodlights will illuminate the shaft like a jewel set in velvet. The lights will come on gradually ten seconds before the song of the chimes, and thirty seconds after the last note has been lost in the night, the light will be dimmed to extinction.

The singing tower will be in readiness for formal dedication of the shrine on Sept. 6. Almost two years have been required to complete the memorial. Friends of the late Will Rogers from all corners of the nation are prepar-

ing to be present for the dedication. Special trains from California, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, and Illinois are to carry thousands to the shrine for the dedicatory service to be held at 11 a. m. on Sept. 6—Labor Day.

Because Will Rogers was the dean of cowboys, a world-wide Will Rogers Memorial rodeo will be held Sept. 4, 5 and 6 on the Broadmoor hotel polo grounds, just below the shrine. The opportunity to memorialize Will Rogers in the rodeo arena is attracting the world's leading cowboys. The Pike's Peak Polo association is offering handsome trophies and \$15,000 cash prizes.

Kitchen Improvement Saves Steps For Home Demonstration Club Members

Improvements in the kitchen save steps and make life more pleasant for many Central Texas home demonstration club members, according to county home demonstration agents in that section.

Kitchen improvements and a different arrangement of the work center in the home of Mrs. J. F. Blue of the Gordon club in Palo Pinto county save her an average of 382 steps each time she goes through the routine of preparing and serving breakfast and cleaning up the room. Before the improvement she averaged 489 steps from the time she entered the kitchen until everything was in its place, and now it takes only an average of 107 steps.

"Since we put running water in our kitchen several years ago by means of a windmill and elevated tank, we have had water in and out, but the outlet has

never been very satisfactory," said Mrs. J. D. Roper of the Meeks club in Bell county as she consulted her county home demonstration agent on the problem. A pit 6 feet long, 3 feet wide, and 18 inches deep was dug and filled with rocks and pieces of brick for the first 12 inches and soil for the last 6 inches. The drain pipe enters the bottom of the drain. Sink odors and unhealthy puddles have been eliminated through the use of the pit.

Renovating a 14 year old rug was one of the many improvements made in the course of the house repairing demonstration of Mrs. J. Collier Price of the Derr's Chapel club in Ellis county. At an expense of \$1.75, Mrs. Price applied two coats of tan interior paint and a border of green paint. The rug was then stippled with dark green, lettuce green and brown, varnished, and waxed.

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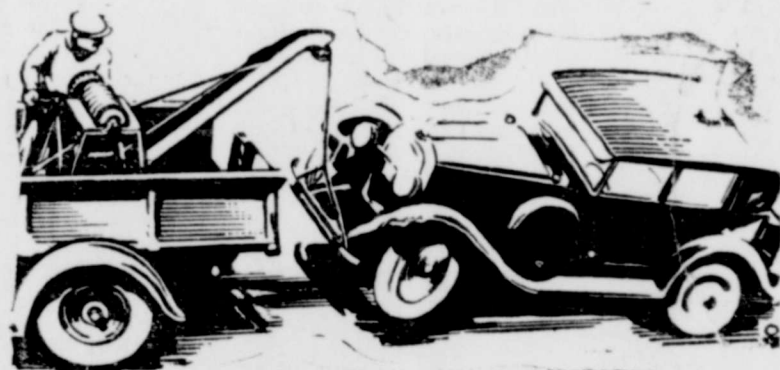

"The Rest of The Record"

This week demonstrated again the wisdom of taking the unrestrained power of pardon out of the hands of the governor and placing it in the hands of a non-political board.

Upon my return from Mexico I found four men condemned to die in the electric chair. Under the old system the governor, with all his other cares and responsibilities, would have had to pass on these cases. It simply wasn't fair to compel him to submit to the painful appeals of wives, mothers, relatives and friends. Although he might have a legislature on his hands, although he might have sickness in his home or several other trying ordeals, he was placed in the position of weighing the life of a man and almost standing outside the death chamber watching the condemned man pace back and forth waiting for the deadly hour of twelve o'clock and the last walk to the little green chamber. I don't think I ever slept a wink on the night any man was compelled to pay the penalty.

Now it's different. Before the governor can commute a death penalty, or grant any other kind of clemency, it has to be recommended by the Board of Pardons. The governor can refuse to follow the Board if it recommends clemency, but cannot grant any whatever unless the Board recommends it.

There are three members of the Board. One only is appointed by the governor, and the others by the Supreme Court and court of criminal appeals. The members of the Board have several responsibilities and, of course, no other responsibilities than looking into clemency cases. In this manner both the convict and the public get a better deal than under the old system where the governor was charged with all the responsibility in addition to his other duties.

I am proud of this great reform. We are not having any complaints about wholesale abuses of the pardon power. It is all based now on merit, and unquestionably everyone is much better satisfied.

Naturally I have been quite busy catching up with my correspondence after a two weeks vacation. However, on Friday of last week I flew down to Palacios on the Gulf Coast to review the 36th Division of the Texas National Guard in camp there. Texans generally probably do not realize what a wonderful organization of fine young men this is. Unquestionably we have one of the best National Guard units in the nation. Nearly 8,000 men train intensively at Palacios each summer for two weeks. This is in addition to their regular drills and parades back home. They are well equipped, well officered, and as fine soldiers as any I saw during the World War.

The total cost for military defense in Texas which is borne by the federal government approximates more than a million dollars annually. The National Guard has in its possession more than four and a half million dollars of federal property, guns, uniforms and equipments. Its payroll, including both men and officers from the highest to the lowest military grade while large in the aggregate, averages only \$83.50 per capita per year. Their time is given free as a patriotic duty.

In addition to the 36th Division, we have what is known as the 56th Cavalry Brigade, about 1100 in number who train for two weeks each at Mineral Wells. As Commander-in-Chief of the Texas militia I always visit these two camps. It was a great joy to me upon my recent visit to Mineral Wells to hear one of the federal army officers praise the cavalry brigade. He said that we had as good, if not the best, in the nation.

Of course, we don't want war, and I pray God we may always be spared what is going on in Europe. It has been the policy of the state, however, to maintain a regular militia from the beginning. The wisdom of this was demonstrated in the World War when our National Guard was the first nucleus around which our defense was built.

It is heartening to know that if a war emergency should arise, our guard is manned, officered, equipped, trained and ready for immediate service.

Of course, as most everyone knows, soldiers don't have much use for a sailor. I was in the Navy during the World War and I had quite a bit of fun out of some of the National Guard officers by reminding them that their Commander-in-Chief was once a sailor!

I wasn't greatly surprised to find upon my return from Mexico that the politicians have been "buzzing" quite a bit. It is my understanding that State Superintendent of Education L. A.

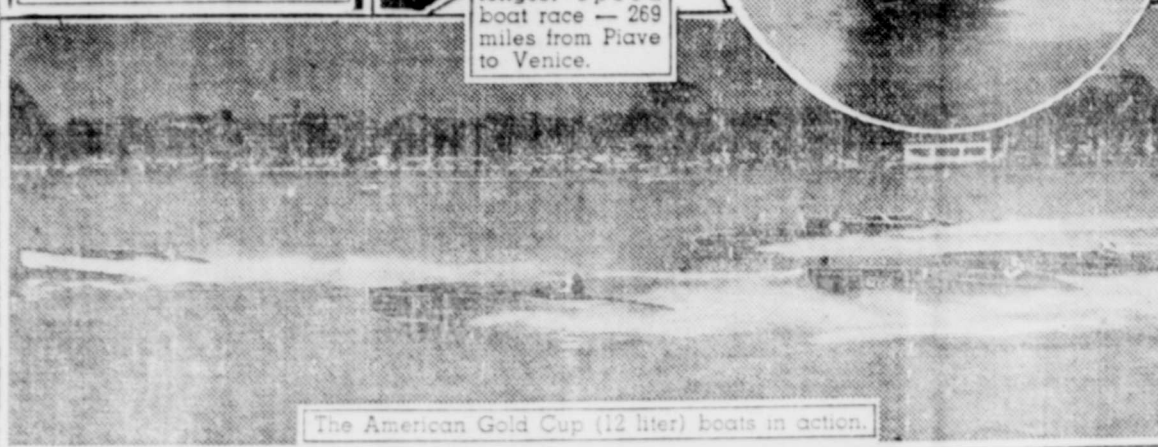

America's Greatest Motor Boat Event Will See World Record Craft in Action

By LATTIMER SHAW

WHILE 90 percent of all motor boat racing in the world is conducted in the United States, it is strange that in the development of our 12 liter Gold Cup boats, our oldest and proudest class, the sportsmen of Italy and France seem to have a secret concerning speed which we don't seem to possess.

The fastest one-mile speed established in this country with a super-charged 500-hp. Gold Cup boat is 76.08 miles an hour by Notre Dame, owned by Herbert Mendelsohn, of Detroit. Until a few weeks ago the world's record was held by Guido Cattaneo, of Italy, at 85.51 miles an hour. Then along came Maurice Vasseur, of France, and raised it to 87.31 miles. And now, on August 4, Count Theo Rossi, of Italy, in a boat of his own design, has boosted it to 90.97—more than 14 miles an hour better than our best!

This has not been at all the fault of American designers, owners or drivers. Since 1929 the rules of America's oldest and most glamor-

ous motor boat contest have imposed upon our sportsmen great heavy hulls weighing at least 1600 pounds and other restrictions of boat and power which have made it impossible for us to match the speeds of the European craft built with only one limitation—an engine not exceeding 732 cubic inches cylinder capacity.

The thirty-fourth Gold Cup race in Detroit on Labor Day, September 6, may tell a different story but the odds are against it. Count Rossi, Cattaneo, Vasseur and several other top-notch European drivers will be there with their new world record boats and it is extremely doubtful if our five or six Gold Cup craft can suddenly jump ten or fifteen miles an hour to stave off the foreign invasion.

Count Rossi, Europe's most experienced motor boat enthusiast, is the most likely winner if his two new boats, Amaldi and Aradam, named for two mountains he helped to capture in Ethiopia, can hold together for 90 gruelling miles.

Due to the rule that foreign

boats, admitted to the race for the first time, must enter through American clubs belonging to the American Power Boat Association, a victory by either of Count Rossi's boats will carry the cup to the Oakland Yacht Club, of Oakland, Cal., and thus bring true a dream Pacific Coast yachtsmen have held for the entire 33 year history of the famous Cup. Other honors will also go to the Oakland Club if Count Rossi wins—the Aaron De Roy trophy for the fastest lap and another gorgeous new trophy.

Among his many activities Count Rossi, a young bachelor, is an all-around sportsman and was captain of the Italian bobsled team at Lake Placid a couple of years ago. In addition he is head of the great Martini & Rossi vermouth company, the world's largest makers of vermouth, and his co-workers have bet on him by putting up one of the most magnificent prizes ever seen in the motor boat world—the \$5,000 Martini & Rossi perpetual trophy for the fastest 30-mile heat made in this and subsequent Gold Cup races. No wonder the Oakland yachtsmen are sending a big delegation to Detroit to root for their Italian team!

The report comes from China that the Chinese have developed the ideal defense against the huge battleships of Japan. The proposed defensive system is made up of a series of fast moving diesel motor boats with only a six man crew and torpedo officers. These boats are supposed to be able to travel at the rate of 50 or 60 miles an hour and handle easily. They can dash into a nest of battle ships launch two or three destructive mines and then retire before the huge battle wagons can even get their guns ready to work. Skimming low along the surface of the water the ships make a very difficult target for even machine guns and light defense guns of the enemy battle ships. They are lightly armored, but have protection from machine guns and rifles. Then even if each is sunk, but accounts for the destruction of a major ship, the loss of the small boat and six men is less expensive than even an effective air raid.

Dust Bowl Pastures

Congress appropriated 10 million dollars for the purchase of farms in the dust bowl. These farms will be transformed into huge pastures, and will be allowed to grow soil saving grasses and trees. Most of the land is of a marginal nature, and it should never have been cultivated. Having a rich upper layer of earth, the land produced heavy yields of grain crops the first few years. This layer was soon exhausted and the wind and rain storms compelled the process of erosion leaving a barren desert-like area. Experiments are being conducted to make the area grow a matted grass that will hold the moisture and keep the land from washing and blowing away. The pastures will then be handled just as any other government pasture, rented to stock owners.

More Logical

In St. Paul, Minn., last Saturday morning a communist dem-

onstration was held in which a woman led 175 children around the city hall to boo the Mayor Gehan and the relief officials in that city. The leaders gave the mayor a thorough boozing then marched to the capitol where they repeated the raspberries for Governor Benson. Instead of trying to make a speech or stop the demonstration the governor had ice cream and cake waiting for the youthful demonstrators and their leader. In spite of the valiant pleas of the woman leader the children stuffed themselves house giving the governor a rousing cheer. This seems to be so much more logical way to treat children than the similar incident in Germany. At Munich the children of a church marched in protest to a police station and three were shot, the remainder confined to prison camps for discipline. Somehow that makes us like our nation a whole lot more.

Cash Talks

When it comes to carrying on a satisfactory conversation with any man working for a living, cash talks better than almost any type of persuasion. Whatever may be the criticism of the present policy of the government or the condition of the nation, the farmers are being spoken to in a manner that must appeal to them. This year the cash income of the farmers of the nation will be nine billion dollars. That is one billion dollars higher than last year and the highest in the history of the nation except during the inflated days of the World War. So the farmers enter the market as a powerful force for recovery. With money enough to escape the subsistence level they will flood the heavy and moderate industries with orders accompanied by cash payments. That is what makes industry hum in this section.

Lump Sum Will Be Paid Under Social Security New Law

DALLAS, August 23. — "Considering the large population in Dallas and adjoining counties, no doubt there are many individuals in this area who are entitled to file claims for lump sum payments under the old age benefits program of the Social Security Acts, Ernest L. Tutt, manager of the Dallas office of the Social Security Board, said today. "Monthly retirement benefits to qualified individuals will not begin until January, 1942." Tutt said, "but lump-sum and death payments became effective after December 31, 1936, to covered employees who became 65 years of age and to the estate of workers who die prior to becoming 65."

"Lump sum payments are computed at the rate of 3 1-2 percent of the total wages received after December 31, 1936, and prior to the worker's death, or 65th birthday. Since January 1, 1937, the Social Security Board in Washington has received 14,500 claims, of which some 10,000 have been paid," Tutt said.

It was pointed out by Tutt that all employers are required to file Form SS-3, known as an informational return, for each employee who dies or attains age 65. This form must be filed with the collector of internal revenue, and it signifies that no further taxes are to be assessed on such employees. The Social Security Board has nothing to do with the taxes imposed under the act, and all returns and remittances should be forwarded to the collector of internal revenue.

Claims procedure will be fully explained to any individual interested in filing a claim by the Dallas office of the Social Security Board, and "we are prepared to assist claimants in every way possible in the correct filing of claims for lump sum payments or death benefit payments," Tutt said.

The Dallas office of the Social Security Board is still issuing large numbers of social security account cards; however, ample facilities have been provided for the handling of claims and other matters.

Quota For NYA Jobs Released

AUSTIN, August 26.—A quota of part-time NYA jobs for each Texas county has been established, and the county superintendent of each county will be advised immediately the number of jobs allotted, J. C. Kellam, Texas director of the National Youth Administration, announced today.

Each county superintendent has been requested to organize a county committee to recommend an allocation of jobs within the county. As soon as this is done, the NYA state office will consider the recommendations and be in position to grant formal approval to schools for participation in the program, Mr. Kellam said.

As heretofore, students in secondary schools of the state will be enabled to earn a wage not exceeding \$6 a month. They will be selected for employment by officials of their school, who will also determine the nature of the work and supervise its performance.

The Texas quota of school aid jobs has been reduced from 8,500 to 6,300 this year, and an extra allotment of \$10,000 per month, which provided additional school aid jobs for drought-stricken counties of West Texas, will not be continued.

School officials desiring to obtain information regarding quotas and application forms should communicate with their county superintendents, and should supply them with information which will assist the county committee

in making equitable recommendations regarding the distribution of jobs, Mr. Kellam said.

Students seeking part-time NYA school aid jobs should apply to the superintendent or principal of the school which they plan to attend, he said, since the officials of schools approved by the National Youth

Administration for participation in the program are charged with selection of students for whom they believe we should be doing in car driving a record of every high school in the United States.

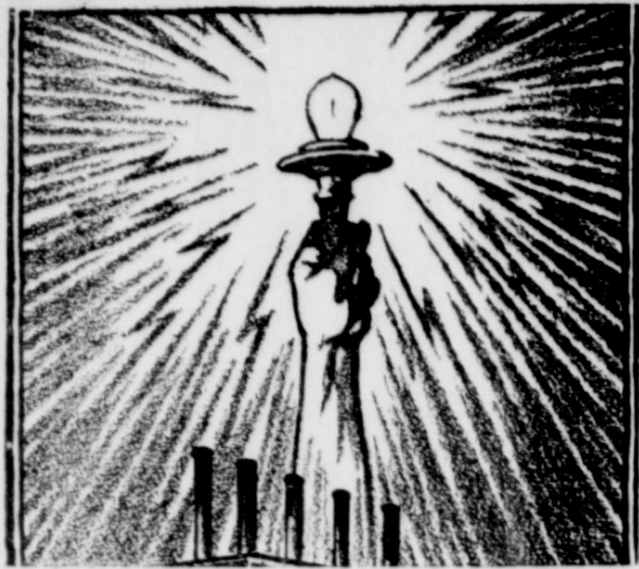

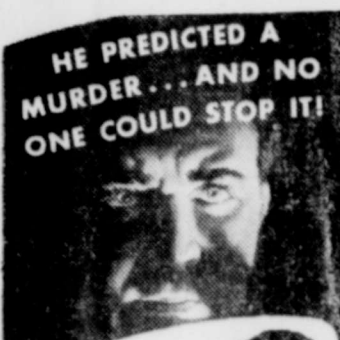
