T.M. Alford Retires TESCO With 38 Years Service

T.M. Alford, an electrician with Texas Electric Service Company's Eastland transmission division, retired from the company April 1, with 38 years of service to his credit.

Alford joined TESCO in 1937 in the meter department of Eastland distribution department when, as a local garage owner who maintained company vehicles, he traded in his mechanics career to join the utility.

In 1938 he transferred to the electrical maintenance section at the Leon plant and then moved to the transmission post when the Leon installation was closed down.

Born on the Guitarr Ranch in Jones County, Alford attended schools in Cleburne, Fort Worth and Eastland.

During World War II, he served with the Navy and saw action in the South Pacific from New Guinea to Japan. In the fall of 1945 he stood for 31 hours at the throttle of an LCT (landing craft tanks) holding the vessel off shore during an Okinawa typhoon.

Alford and his wife, Lenorah Elizabeth, were married in 1934 and have five children: Helen Jean Day lives in Duncanville with her husband and two sons, and Margaret Southern lives with her family in Brock.

Elizabeth Ann Smith lives with her husband and three children in Broken Bow, Okla. Tommy Jr. lives in Phoenix, Ariz., and Phillip Douglas and his wife live in Eastland with their children.

The Alfords intend to keep their home in Eastland, where they attend the First Baptist Church.

He enjoys the outdoor sports of fishing and hunting and bagged two nice bucks last season. Both Alfords enjoy

bowling and belong to a couple's league. He carries a 179 average.

Carbon School Buses Burned

The Carbon School transportation system was virtually wiped out in an early morning fire Saturday, and three youths were being held in connection with the fire.

Two school buses were considered total losses with one being completely burned out and the other heavily gutted from flame. Another bus received extensive damage and one end of the bus barn was destroyed by fire.

Six fire trucks were on the scene: two from Carbon, two from Gorman and two from Eastland as Volunteers attempted to extinguish the blaze.

A fourth bus received extensive damage.

Carbon School Supt. Marshall Hickman reported Saturday morning, that bus routes would run on a normal schedule Monday and that there would be "school as usual."

Arrangements were being made Saturday in borrowing busses from neighboring school districts he said.

Infant In Guarded Condition After MV Accident

2-month-old Eastland infant was in guarded condition in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene with injuries received in a two-car accident which occurred about 6 p.m. Friday at Morton Valley.

The child was identified as Mandalynn Rice, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Rice of Eastland. The Rice couple was listed in fair condition at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

The Rices were in a north-bound vehicle on Texas 69 when it was in collision with an automobile driven by Raymond Conner, 80, of Cisco. The Conner vehicle was eastbound on FM 101 when the two cars collided at the intersections of the highways.

Conners and a passenger were treated and released from the Eastland hospital.

Nancy Frost, who plays 1st violin, was a student of the late Wilda Drago of Eastland. At the University of Texas she studied under Antony Donato, and at Ohio State University where she received a BA degree in English, she studied under George Hardesty. Further study at Northwestern State University at Natchitoches, Louisiana, was with John Maltese. She has played in symphonies at Austin, Columbus, Ohio; Natchitoches, La.; and Abilene. Presently on leave from her duties as

assistant concertmaster from the Abilene Philharmonic Orchestra, she is also a member of the Abilene String Trio.

Mildred Pickrell, violin 2, has studied violin since childhood. She was a scholarship student at Kansas City Conservatory of Music. After moving to Ranger, she studied at Texas Christian University with the late E. Clyde Whitlock. Mildred has been a member of the Eastland County String Quartet since its inception in 1969. She is a member and former director of the Ranger Methodist Church choir and is now reserve organist.

Winifred Hittson, formerly of Abilene and now of Cisco, plays viola in the quartet. She is a graduate of Hardin - Simmons University, North Texas State University, and Chicago Musical College where she has degrees of Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and some work toward Doctorate in Music Education. She is a present member and president of the Cisco Music Study Club, Cisco Twentieth Century Club and is chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Cisco Public Library. FORT WORTH—Mr. W. A. Huffman has been given a contract with the county court to provide a temporary building on the square for court house purposes. The city will pay \$15 per month rent for the first six months and the citizens of the city \$35. For the remaining six months the county will pay \$50 per month rent.

FORT WORTH—The first herd of the army of cattle that are now on the march for the northern slaughter pens made its appearance Tuesday morning. It was the property of Miller and Carson and numbered 1,850 calves. The cattle are in fine condition. The early spring and fresh green grass has been very beneficial to the cattle, and they will leave Texas in finer condition than during any previous year.

SAN ANTONIO—General Potter reports the revolution in Matamoros (led by Diaz) is an accomplished fact, and that everything is quiet, although official and other refugees continue to come over to this side of the (Rio Grande) River for security. No federal Mexican troops are on the Rio Grande. General LeBarra of the federal government has reported to the military here.

NAVARRO COUNTY—Corn and sweet potatoes are selling in Corsicana at fifty cents and oats at sixty cents a bushel. Chickens are worth twelve and a half cents apiece and eggs twelve and a half cents a dozen.

AUSTIN—The governor is expected to urge passage of important amendments to the new constitution's Judiciary Article. Many members elect of the 15th Legislature insist on giving the new constitution as it stands a fair chance to work and others insist on radical changes. A long session is expected. Austin is quite dull and expects little from the session of the legislature. The new constitution cuts down on per diem, mileage and salaries to such figures that the solons will have little spending money after paying for hash and lodging.

SAN ANTONIO—One of the greatest curiosities that has ever been brought to our city is the petrified form of an old-time Indian warrior. It was purchased recently by Mr. Joseph Ransom of Laredo, Texas, from some Mexican authorities who are said to have come upon it while working an old mine. Mr. Ransom is now on his way to the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia with this wonderful petrification.

SAN ANTONIO—Work on the extension of the Pierce railroad from the Guadalupe to San Antonio will be commenced this week. The day is breaking for San Antonio and Western Texas at last.

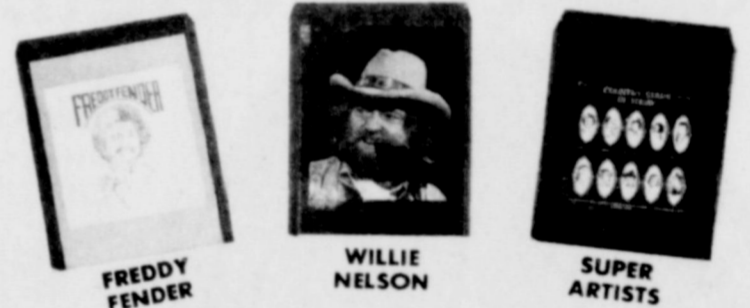

GORDON SPOT

The "merry-go-round" on the eradication of brucellosis is continuing. New regulations regarding this cattle disease, commonly known as "Bangs", have been proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission to meet federal standards. These regulations will go into effect unless rejected at a statewide hearing on April 15.

The hearing will begin at 9 a.m. in the Trinity Room of the

downtown Motor Hotel in Austin. Anyone interested in attending to voice their opinions on the proposed regulations is encouraged to do so, says county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Proposed are aimed at effectively controlling and eventually eradicating the disease and to thereby establish Texas as a "Certified Free State". The regulations

are in accordance with the U.S. Animal Health Association and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Below are a few of the requirements set forth in the proposed regulations. First of all, all male and female cattle two years of age or older offered for sale at any livestock market in Texas intended for breeding purposes must be tested for brucellosis. Steers and sprayed heifers will be exempt.

If an infected animal is found in any herd, the herd will be quarantined on the owner's premise until such cattle have been tested to meet the requirements for quarantine release. Herd owners will have the right to supplemental tests. Reactor cattle will not be branded and condemned to slaughter until results of such supplemental tests (if requested) are ascertained.

Regarding calf vaccinations, the proposed regulations call for all female beef calves to be vaccinated between the ages of three and eight months.

The proposed regulations on brucellosis control and eradication also provide specific definitions and procedures in classifying cattle, obtaining and maintaining certification status, and qualifying methods and standards.

Cattlemen interested in reviewing the proposed regulations are invited to stop by the county Extension office.

Soil Conservation News

Have you sometimes wondered why your favorite fishing pond is just not what it used to be? You catch plenty of fish but few are worth keeping. This is a rather common problem with many of our farm ponds, but not so with those on the J.C. Clearman farm southeast of Eastland.

Although Mr. Clearman is a livestock farmer, he enjoys fishing and having a good place for his family to fish. So what is his secret to good fishing? There isn't any. For managing a pond is no different than managing your pastures for beef production.

Since the ponds on his farm are less than 1/2 surface acre, Mr. Clearman believes that stocking the right kind of fish is essential. He likes to have channel catfish, bass and sunfish but not all in the same pond. So he stocks them separately, especially the bass and the catfish. To avoid introduction of undesirable fish, hatchery fish are used in stocking. This helps to reduce overcrowding and stunted fish.

Once the ponds are stocked, Mr. Clearman does not forget about them. The job is only half done. Each spring he tries to fertilize the ponds with a mixed

commercial fertilizer similar to that used on his pastures. The fertilizer increases the production of small plants and animals which means more food for the fish. In addition to increasing the food supply, Mr. Clearman says that the fertilizer helps to keep out moss and other aquatic weeds that are of no benefit to the fish and are a menace to the fisherman.

The good thing about all of this is that it requires little time and is very inexpensive when compared to the many hours of

fishing that a well managed pond will provide.

The Eastland office of the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District, can provide technical assistance to landowners and interested individuals in solving fishpond problems. For help with your particular problem, give them a call at 629-1480 or go by their office located in the Eastland Bank Building in Eastland.

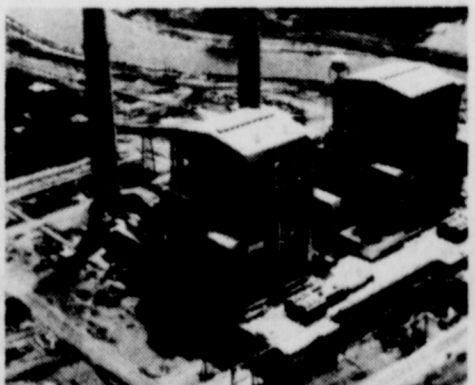
