## Youth Better After Surgery

Condition of Scott Hudson, Colorado High athlete injured in a highway wreck Sunday, was improved Wednesday following surgery Tuesday in a San Angelo hospital.

Hudson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hudson, was seriously injured while returning with his family from a rodeo in Del Rio.

The youth, who recently was accepted in Area 2 for Lone Star Farmer degree and elected treasurer of Area 2 Future Farmers of America, was riding in a pickup with his brother, Joe Dan Hudson, when the vehicle was in collision with

another vehicle entering highway traffic near Eldorado.

Scott, who was not driving, was thrown from the vehicle and pinned beneath. His injuries included punctured lungs and severe abrasions.

Surgery was performed Tuesday to remove the youth's spleen after his condition worsened.

The Hudson family was traveling in two vehicles with trailers attached to their horses when the accident happened late Sunday morning. The two boys were in the lead and followed by remainder of the family, whose car was not involved in the wreck.

## \$70,000 Grant For Bilingual Study

Colorado Independent School District has received final approval for \$70,000 in federal funds to expand its bilingual education program into its second school year.

The federal grant is only \$894 below the revised request submitted by Supt. Lloyd McKee to Office of Education in Washington, D. C.

However, Colorado City schools will have additional \$3,600 in carryover funds from its 1970-71 bilingual program that will increase the total available federal funds for 1971-72 to \$73,600.

Supt. McKee had been optimistic for approval for the school request since he and Mrs. Nell Price, the school district's bilingual project director, met with Richard Goulet, Office of Education, Washington, recently in Dallas.

The new grant—which does not require matching state or local funds—will finance expansion of bilingual education from kindergarten to the first grade.

Approximately 225 pupils are expected to be included in the two-grade program with about 100 in kindergarten next school term and 125 in first grade.

In its request for federal funding, the district proposed in 1971-72 school year to spend the following for bilingual education:

Approximately \$17,955 in administration and administration contracted services, materials and supplies; \$41,731 in instructional teacher and teacher aide salaries with educational materials, supplies and technical assistance; approximately \$8,000 for pupil transportation, community liaison and parental services; plus about \$3,226 for purchase of educational equipment and articles for instruction.

To begin the bilingual program—a pilot effort for this West Texas area with cooperation of Region 14 Education Service Center in Abilene—the district received \$60,000 in federal grant during the last school year. It is from this funding that the district has \$3,600 in carryover money to add to its new \$70,000 grant.

Specifically, the new federal fund will finance a project director, 2 professional bilingual teachers, 3 teacher aides and a secretary. Remainder of the two-grade staff—for instance, the first grade will have a total of 6 teachers and 2 aides—will be financed by regular state and local funds.

As Colorado City schools move into its second full year of bilingual education, the State Board of Education in a meeting Saturday in Dallas issued an official statement designed to speed the growth of dual language instruction for Texas.

It is the state board's first official policy statement on bilingual education and encourages school districts to provide bilingual class work to all children who enroll with little or no knowledge of English.

The state board in its Dallas meeting pointed out that Texas is just now beginning the task—with a total of only 52 different bilingual projects un-

der way in 59 Texas schools in the 1970-71 school year.

Thirty-two of these--of which Colorado City is one--are projects all funded under federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The remaining 20 are in districts supporting their programs with local funds.

"We have made a start,"

the state board spokesman said, "but with 577,000 Mexican American children in school today, we have a long way to go."

The state policy is divided into 5 steps--much like the program Colorado City public schools have initiated in a step-by-step 5 year plan. It places top emphasis on bilingual programs for children who enter

school for the first time knowing little or no English. Later steps focus on primary, elementary and secondary school age youngsters.

Fifth priority, one which the board emphasizes will make Texas a truly bilingual state, will emphasize concurrent language development in English and Spanish for all students.

## 'Rush' At ASCS Farmers Certify Crop Acres

Farmers Wednesday were crowding Mitchell County's Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service Office to speed up early payments in the federal ag program.

They were taking advantage of liberalized policies that allows zero certification now for grain sorghum under drought conditions while certifying planted cotton acreage.

Don Stewart, ASCS county executive director, said the advantage to farmers under this "loosening" of procedures allows early government payments in July with a later option to plant grain sorghums when moisture conditions improve.

If a farmer because of drought, had no opportunity for grain sorghum before June 1, he can now certify "zero" acres with the ASCS office and certify planted cotton acreage.

"When he certifies his cotton and "zero" grain sorghum," Stewart explained, "our office can speed the data to our computers in New Orleans and the producer will be assured of early payment in July."

"And, if the producer gets a chance to plant grain sorghum later, then he can come back to our office and certify at the later date."

"So, it is to the advantage of the producer to certify as soon as possible," Stewart emphasized. "Each crop must be

certified before a producer is eligible for payment."

The relaxing of procedures to allow "zero" grain sorghum certification reflects a Department of Agriculture policy for early payments in face of extensive drought conditions.

"It appears to be a loosening up to help," Stewart said. "No doubt, the drought has brought this change."

"We are hurrying the certification data to New Orleans computers as soon as it comes into our office," he continued. "This is so early payments can

be back here in July. But we can't do anything until the producer certifies with us."

Thursday — today, June 10 — is the deadline date for planting cotton. If moisture conditions have prevented a producer from planting by this date, then there is no regulation making it mandatory for him to plant.

If cotton is a total loss and later it rains to permit planting of grain sorghum, the producer can go along and plant grain sorghum with no limitations if he has met set aside acreage See 'RUSH' Page 8

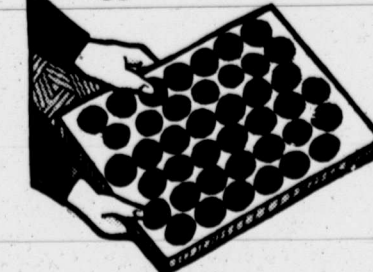

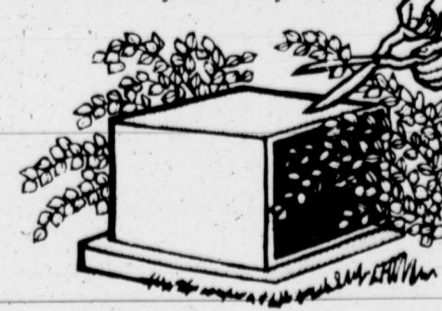
