Mike Lowry Dies March 6

Funeral services were held for Mike Lowry Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in the First United Methodist Church. The Rev. Dick Richards, pastor, officiated and was assisted by Payne Hattox, minister of the Church of Christ.

Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

Mike, 23, was found dead Wednesday of last week in his apartment in Paducah after a brief illness. One of his coworkers checked on him around noon and when Mike failed to answer a call he entered the house and found him.

Mike was employed by the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife and had worked for the Wildlife Refuge, north of Paducah, for the past month.

Born June 13, 1950, in Quanah, he moved to Knox City with his parents in 1963.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vic Lowry; one sister, Mrs. Danny Josselot of Haskell; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. O.K. Lowry of Knox City, and maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lela Johnston of Chillicothe.

Prelims in both track and field events will get underway at 10 a.m., according to Coach Jimmy Rogers, with finals slated to begin at 2:30 p.m.

Interscholastic rules will prevail throughout the meet, with U.I.L. scoring being observed. Trophies and ribbons will be presented.

Those who plan to help with the boys' meet Saturday are reminded that a meeting for volunteers is being held tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 o'clock in the high school building.

Teams entered in this year's meet include Newcastle, Lueders-Avoca, Crowell, Throckmorton, Rotan, Hamlin J.V.'s, Haskell, Holliday, Munday, Paint Creek, Woodson, Goree, Rochester, Albany, Seymour, Abilene Christian High School, Archer City, Chillicothe, and Knox City.

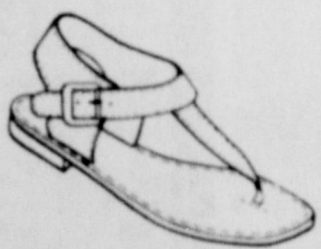

Would you believe we were entertained by a Mariachi Group from Weslaco High, Weslaco, Texas, after Noche Folklorica? They played many songs in front of winding stairways, the river, and water fountains. There was a touch of Old Mexico indeed!

After this, we settled down for the night--well nearly for the night. Once you get something like swimming in the hotel's pool in a person's mind you can't stop him, and that's exactly what we did, go swimming at 11:45 p.m. Brrr.... was that water cold!!

The next morning, the sun was shining, and the clouds were lifting when everyone received a call from our sponsors to wake up and get ready to head for the convention again. I don't think everyone like the idea!

At 9:30 a.m. the State President, Miss Sherri D. Thomas from W.B. Ray High School in Corpus Christi, Texas, called the Morning Session to order. Ramon

There was so much excitement in the air that you had a hard time trying to keep from getting those silly goose bumps!! The convention was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

Since this was a convention and conventions usually have entertainment of some sort for everyone, this convention was no exception. The Gran Baile started at 9:00 p.m. and was held in the Banquet Hall, and featured Phlash Back and Watermelon Band (both were from San Antonio.)

The only purpose for any convention though, is to learn, learn about the different things that are going on in the world. We learned how to

make new friends, to understand the Spanish culture, to appreciate the country we live in, and to see the happiness is a child's eyes when he can walk for the first time. Yes, all this was accomplished in San Antonio this past Thursday and Friday, and we thank everyone for letting it happen.

Oh, yeah, we also learned how to get lost in San Antonio, to get left behind at the convention center, to drive down the wrong way on a one-way street, how to dodge big trucks, to watch old cane-laden ladies run across the street, and to love our fellow man.

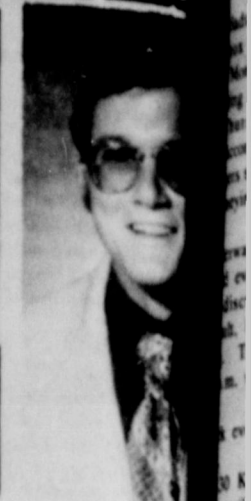
DIANE CLONTS

During his free time Stanley was active member of the Student Body, President of his class, and a member of the Future Teachers of America. He has brought various all-district in football, basketball, and volleyball.

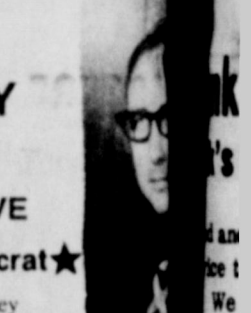

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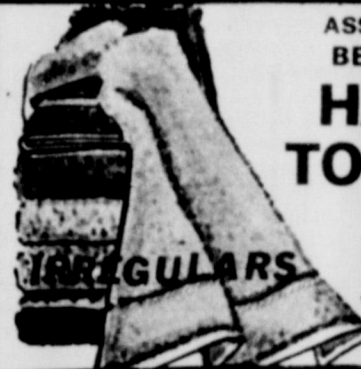
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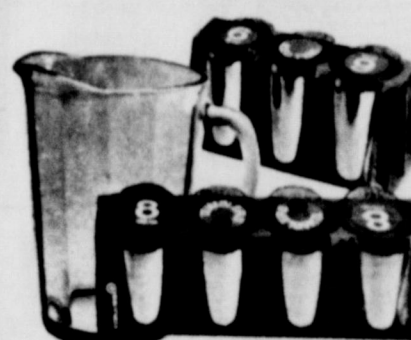

Commissioner White is expected to discuss agricultural production and its role in the energy crisis. One of the main concerns of the Texas Department of Agriculture, which White directs, is the amount of fuel allocated to farmers for the production of food and fiber this year.

"Even though agriculture does have a priority to get the necessary fuel it will need, we must see to it that agriculture does not lack in its energy

requirements this crop year," White said.

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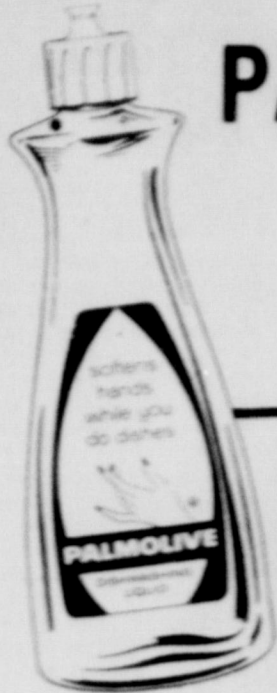

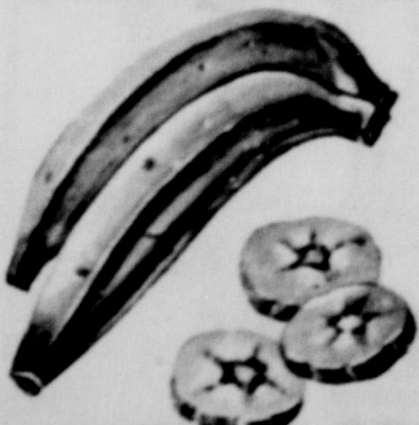
