The next stop on their list will be Jackson, Tennessee, where they will stay with Mrs. Trice's brother, and then on to Nashville to visit with friends.

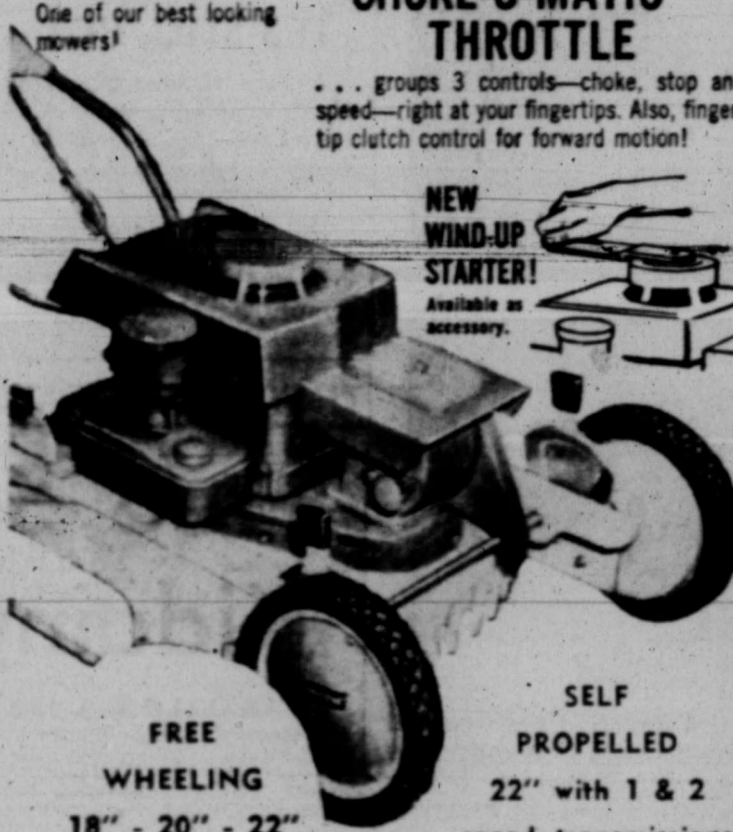

"The sad part of it all, he said, is the 'poor way' in which the U. S. has reacted to these Southeast Asia conditions.

"We have made the wrong approach to help these people," Forshey explained.

"We need to go to the people, not just the government."

"We need to know the people and give them a way of life."

"Finances don't always help."

"What we need is an exchange of personalities — a person to person helping and sharing."

Forshey said U. S. policy and diplomatic service hasn't always been directed in this manner.

Some experts say Southeast Asia may be the next to fall to Communism, he reported.

"I'm not that pessimistic," he said. "I don't see it if we change our policy a little and meet our real responsibilities."

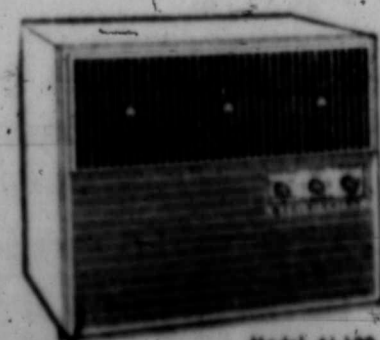

Summertime Meal

Mrs. Charles Williams and Mrs. Dewey Turner, members of the Looney Home Demonstration Club, give their favorite recipes for summertime cooking.

Mrs. Williams has discovered a new way to fix beets. She combines them with caraway seed. The ingredients are 2 cups cooked sliced beets, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper, and 3/4 teaspoon whole caraway seed. Combine the ingredients and heat. For variety she sometimes adds 1/2 cup of sour cream.

Mrs. Turner's favorite recipe is for Norwegian meat balls. Ingredients are 1 pound hamburger meat, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 cup milk, and 1 egg.

Soak the bread crumbs five minutes. Beat the egg slightly and add to the bread crumbs. Mix with meat and season with onions, salt, pepper, and ground mace (to give it a different taste). Form small balls and fry until very brown. Drain off most of the fat and make a rich brown gravy. Drop meat balls into the gravy and simmer slowly about 40 or 50 minutes.
