Lions To Sponsor Pee-wee Baseball Summer Practice

Angelo Teams to Play Benefit Game Here July 20th

Within the next few days every boy from eight through twelve years of age of record as a pupil in Ozona schools will receive an entry blank and an invitation to join in a preliminary Little League for baseball play in Ozona.

If enough respond, a meeting will be called at a later date to organize teams, draw up a schedule and arrange for practice games to be played the balance of the present summer. The list of boys is now being prepared by Supt. Lem Bray of the Ozona Schools.

This plan was the outgrowth of a meeting of interested boys, their parents and members of the Ozona Lions Club, sponsoring organization, last Friday night when representatives from the San Angelo Little Leagues were on hand to explain details of the organization and rules.

This summer's activities will be in the nature of a try-out for Ozona and a test of whether or not the boys and adults of the community will support a Little League. There will be no uniforms this year, but if there is sufficient interest, sponsors will be secured and the teams organized and uniformed for league play next Spring and Summer.

A game between two all-star teams from San Angelo leagues will be staged at the Lions Club softball field here Friday night, July 20, with proceeds to be split by the local Little League group and the San Angelo groups. The Lions Club's part in the game will be used to finance this summer's program for the boys, including the purchase of necessary equipment such as balls, bats, masks, etc.

All stars selected from teams sponsored in San Angelo by Sam's Chicken Shack and Bateman's will make up one of the competing teams in the game to be played here and the other will be composed of top performers from teams sponsored by Sheppersons and What Else?

The game will start at 8 p.m. and admission charges will be 75 cents for adults. All Children 12 years and under will be admitted free.

10-Year-Old Big Lake Boy Drowns In Pecos River

Larry Gene McAden Friday Afternoon Victim of Accident

Larry Gene McAden, 10, of Big Lake, drowned in the Pecos river, 60 miles southwest of Ozona, about 4 o'clock Friday afternoon. Funeral services for the boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Truman R. McAden, who had moved to Big Lake from Bangs about six years ago, were held at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the Bangs Methodist Church. Burial was in the Bangs Cemetery.

The lad was fishing with an uncle, Cam Lilly of Ozona, and two other adult men, near Pandale. He was wading in shallow water and apparently stepped off into a deep part of the stream.

However, his body was recovered about 35 minutes later in water approximately three feet deep indicating that an undertow current had moved the body back a few feet in to shallow water.

Artificial respiration was applied but the boy failed to respond. The body was taken overland by Cody Funeral Home of Ozona to the Davis-Morris Funeral Home in Brownwood which handled the burial services.

Survivors include the parent; two sisters, Marilyn and Yolande, both of Big Lake; an both paternal and maternal grandmothers.

Bank Deposits Off Near Half Million in First 6 Months 1951

Reflecting the first-of-year tax payments, effects of the drouth and the off-season of selling in the ranch business, deposits in the Ozona National Bank at the close of business June 30 show a decline of \$441,412 from the total of depositor's money held by the bank on December 31 of last year.

At the same time, the bank's statement of condition issued Saturday shows, loans of the bank have climbed more than a quarter of a million dollars in the six months period, from \$825,828.19 in December to \$1,078,888.82 on June 30.

Deposits are still above the five million mark, standing at \$5,041,574.28 on June 30 against a total of \$5,482,986.89 in December.

The bank paid its semi-annual 10 per cent dividend, amounting to \$10,000 on July 2. This is the 71st dividend paid by the 46-year-old financial institution.

Board Cramped By Fund Lack To Build HE Cottage

Only \$20,000 of \$350,000 Issue Left after First Contracts

Members of the board of trustees of the Crockett Consolidated Common School district are studying all angles of construction in an effort to cut enough corners to come up with a sufficient amount of money to build a cottage for the home economics department, one of three new buildings contemplated in the \$350,000 bond issue recently approved by Crockett voters.

Contract was awarded recently for construction of an addition to the North Elementary school and a separate building for the manual training department and band. This contract was awarded to the Balfanz Construction Co. of Abilene on a bid of \$297,300 (not \$279,300 as previously reported.) Added to this amount will be an architect's fee of approximately \$18,000 and the cost of a lot adjoining the school property purchased from C. W. Taliaferro for \$5,500 plus furnishings.

It is estimated by the board that approximately \$20,000 will be left in the \$350,000 bond fund for construction and furnishing the home economics cottage. Cheaper construction methods are being studied and with the help of the architects and contractors, efforts are being made to pare some costs from the other two buildings, eliminating some features that will not detract from the appearance or serviceability of the buildings, all in an effort to complete the entire project as contemplated in the bond issue.

The North Elementary addition, work on which will start soon, will include a five-classroom wing to be added on the north end of the present building and a combination auditorium-play room on the south end. The manual training shop and band hall and the H. E. cottage are to be constructed on the newly acquired Taliaferro lot and the one adjoining to the north, the house presently on the latter lot to be moved to make room for the new buildings.

Price Clinic To Be Held Here By OPS July 12th

Representative of Ft. Worth Office to Assist Merchants

A "Price Clinic" to assist all Ozona and Crockett county businessmen with OPS price problems will be conducted in the county courthouse, Thursday, July 12, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Announcement of the price clinic came from the Fort Worth District OPS. A price specialist representing that office will be in the city for the clinic.

Ellis H. Boyd, district OPS director, pointed out that even on a county to county basis, price regulations constitute a big job. OPS statistics show that about five million dollars in retail sales were recorded for Crockett county last year. A business survey conducted by the OPS revealed more than 60 business establishments in Ozona alone.

"A good percentage of these firms come under OPS regulations," said District Director Boyd. Everything from manufacturing to the services of a baby sitter or practical nurse is covered, he said.

Merchants, regardless of their type of business, are invited to take their OPS problems to the clinic.

Lee Snyder Dies Of Injuries In Auto Accident

Ozonan Pinned Under Wreckage of Car Near Juno

Funeral services were held at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon from the First Baptist Church for Lee Snyder (Schneider), trucking contractor and casing crew operator, who died at 8:30 Monday morning from injuries suffered about 9:30 Sunday night in a car accident about three miles south of Juno on Highway 163.

Mr. Snyder was traveling in the direction of Del Rio. The accident occurred at a low water crossing on Devil's River below Juno. The car, a late model Packard, went out of control at the dip, hurtled the embankment and came to rest over the right-of-way fence in the adjoining pasture.

Mr. Snyder was pinned under the wreckage. Two Latin-American men are reported to have been the first to the wreck and jacked up the car and pulled the fatally injured man from under it. The accident is believed to have been caused by failure of a rear tire. The tire was ablaze when rescuers reached the scene and the wheel was removed to prevent the spread of fire. The car was demolished.

Mr. Snyder was brought to the Ozona Hospital in a Cody Funeral Home ambulance and lived until the following morning.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Clifton R. Tension, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Pallbearers were Hugh Gray, Joe T. Davidson, Gerald Beckam, Lester Allen Mark Corbell and Earnest Dunlap. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery, with Cody Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Snyder had been a resident of Ozona 25 years. He is survived by the widow; one son, Charles Lee of Ozona; the father Otto Schneider of Corpus Christi; two brothers, W. O. Schneider of San Angelo and Marvin Snyder of Ozona, and three sisters, Mrs. C. W. Taliaferro of Ozona, Mrs. Phil Hynes of Teheran, Iran and Mrs. Charles Harper of San Angelo.

Conoco Crockett Strike Testing Ellenburger Flow

Discovery on Shannon Flows 21 Bbls. Hourly First Tests

An Ellenburger discovery in northern Crockett county, Continental Oil Co. No. 1-A J. M. Shannon Estate, was in the process of taking potential Tuesday.

In nine hours of natural flow through a 5-16-inch choke, the strike had made 191 barrels of clean oil in nine hours and was continuing to flow to test. Production was from open hole between bottom of 55 1/2-inch casing at 7,185 feet and total depth of 7,236 feet.

Earlier the strike recovered oil on tests between 7,100-50 and 7,151-81 feet in the Ellenburger topped at 6,949 feet. Location is 2,000 feet from south, 2,068 feet from east line of section 22-UV-GC&SF.

Shell No. 1-5 University, Ellenburger wildcat in northwestern Crockett; was drilling below 10,857 feet in lime and shale after getting salt water on a drillstem test.

With tool open 90 minutes No. 1-5 University had a strong blow of air throughout the test from 10,610-675 feet, recovering 420 feet of drilling mud and 6,340 feet of salt water with no oil shows. Projected to 11,000 feet, No. 1-5 University is 660 feet out of the northwest corner of section 23-5-U.

Texaco No. 1 Marrs, wildcat 4 1/4 miles north, northeast of Iran, was preparing to drillstem test between 7,580-647 feet in lime. Lario No. 1 Shannon was making hole below 4,703 feet in lime.

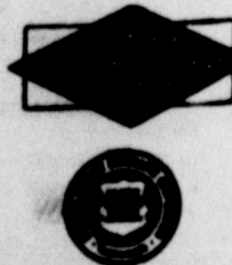

Explains Changes

July 2. — The draft for expiration July 1, 1955, Brigadier L. Wakefield, state reminded Texas

Wakefield noted the following changes in the service act:

Inducted will serve for a period of 21 months. Males must be registered of 18, as formerly. Inducted for induction instead of 19. No man can be inducted so long as he is eligible older men. Physical and mental standards have been lowered. Result that some men in IV-F will be found in I-A.

Present strength of the force, approximately 3 1/2 million, will be raised to 5 million.

For cases of extreme dependency on the base alone.

Now or hereafter deferential, occupational, dependency grounds, liable for service until 26th birthday.

Men not deferred are to 26th birthday. Objections to service shall be ordered, subject to regulation by the President, civilian work in the interest for 24 months.

Entering the service by draft board are obligated for years in the reserves.

College students will be deferred until they graduate, until they are 20, or until they fail.

College students may be deferred on the basis of class standing (the last complete year) on the basis of a government test. The last is not bound to defer on this information, but on consideration of it.

Some other college students may be deferred on a less competitive basis.

11. No inducted man may be assigned overseas until he has had four months training.

12. All enlistments in the armed forces, reserve and regular, which expire after July 9, may be extended by the President for one year. No person shall have his enlistment extended a second time.
