BACK FROM PEN

In - Again - Out - Again Leach at It Again!

David W. Leach, Colorado City's punkish badman with speedy feet, has done it again.

He came back from state prison last week, arriving here about 2:30 a. m. And Friday he was back in trouble again—this time facing an assault charge in Abilene.

But just as he has done in other brushes with the law, the 34-year-old ex-con slipped away right under officers' noses.

It was only last February that Leach was hustled out of 32nd District Court here by the seat of his pants on his way to prison. He had drawn a year's sentence for illegal possession of a pistol last year.

A week before, while awaiting the jury's guilty verdict in the case, Leach had slipped from the third floor courtroom and run away in the night. His capture came 3 days later at a road block near Pecos.

Just a few weeks earlier, he had destroyed jail property in what officers described as an attempted jail break.

And back in 1952 he fled from Mitchell County's old jail, sawed his way out of a Big Spring jail in 1954, the same year he was wounded in a gun battle here while on the run from police.

Leach, whose prison term was cut short this year by good behavior,

obligingly notified police last week upon his return home.

His homecoming was quiet, too, until the reports started coming in late this week.

Police heard by their "grapevine" Leach was on a "party" here one night this week.

Abilene officers say he later showed up in Abilene where his wife has been living.

Friday he was charged with assault, accused of beating his wife.

Police recall that it was a series of incidents with his wife that touched off Leach's last trouble, resulting in his flashing a pistol and going to the penitentiary for illegal possession.

Leach was in Abilene's county jail Friday when officers went to take him to court.

"There were a several deputies there," a Taylor county lawman told The Record by phone, "and they had brought him down from the jail cell."

"They were talking and just standing around . . . to take him to court."

"And they must have forgot about him . . . for in a little bit . . . he was gone."

Saturday afternoon there had been no report as to Leach's whereabouts, although a warrant had been issued for his arrest.

Band, Fiddlin' To Open Fair

Third edition of Mitchell County Fair, boasting a record number of exhibits and features plus free entertainment features nightly, opens a 3-day run here Thursday at 5 p. m.

And before the last visitors walk the fair corridors in Civic House, National Guard Armory and outdoor areas Saturday night the attendance is expected to surpass last year's record 5,000.

More than 100 judging divisions in adult and men's agriculture products, women's and girl's departments, flower and shrubs show, arts and crafts will attract entries from all areas of the county.

Twenty-seven industrial and business firms already have signed for commercial exhibits far ahead of last year's number—and the total probably will pass 30 before Fair time.

Carnival rides on T&P Parking lot will add to the Fair fun, already assured of approximately 20 concessions offering games, prizes, foods and drinks.

There will be a prize—lounge chair—which will be awarded free to some lucky visitor registering at the fair.

An old-time fiddlers contest and a concert by Colorado High Wolf Band in front of Civic House will offer free entertainment for Thursday's opening crowd.

The fiddling and band music will begin at 7 p. m.

Free musical entertainment will be repeated Friday and Saturday night's too. On stage Friday at 7 p. m. will be the Landeros Orchestra, playing "music with a Latin beat."

Rock and roll orchestra will play for the Saturday fair crowd, also at 7 p. m. Exhibitors—those for judging and commercial displays—will move their displays to

Student Hurt In Collision

Adron Welch, 16-year-old Hospital with 3 broken ribs, Colorado High student, is recovering from serious injuries received Thursday night in a school bus-automobile wreck near Silver.

He is in Root Memorial

Welch, told The Record Saturday, "but we don't know how long he will remain in the hospital."

"He will have to eat liquids through a straw for 4 to 6 weeks."

Welch was driving a Renault car Thursday night when the small foreign vehicle was in collision with the school bus driven by Assistant Coach Jeff Walker.

The bus, carrying Colorado High B-Tec football players back home from their Lake View victory, had stopped a few minutes earlier in Silver for Welch, who lives at Silver where his father is employed by Sun Oil Company.

The Silver youth and a companion, Pat Wilkes, then got into the Renault and were traveling north on State Highway 208 (to Colorado City) in the same direction as the bus.

State Highway Patrolman Elwood Rogers said the collision happened when the driver of the Renault attempted to make a U-turn in a no-passing zone.

"The bus, which was closer than the boy thought," Rogers reported, "hit the car's side in the middle of the highway."

Neither the car or the bus turned over.

Only other injury reported by the patrolman was a small cut on the nose of Wilkes.

AT LONE WOLF SITE

Placement Center For Farm Workers

Placement center for farm workers has been set up at Lone Wolf Coopatorium on State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee) at Colorado City's east city limits.

Handling the duties at the information center is James Lucas, who is assigned here by Texas Employment Commission.

Lucas will assist in request for farm crews as well as directing migratory crews to work areas within the county.

Setting up of the placement center here during the cotton harvest season follows a recent meeting of the Mitchell County Farm Labor Consultant Committee.

The meeting was in compliance with consultation provisions of Public Law 78, which provides that Mexican National may be imported to relieve labor shortage when there is actually a shortage

of domestic agricultural workers existing within the area.

Members of the committee met with area representatives of Texas Employment Commission to review and consult on cotton harvest seasonal worker needs, estimated work supply and shortages, along with other plans for the Farm Placement Program during the next 12 months.

Consultation with the committee each year in regard to this program is regarded by the TEC as a valuable assistance in serving area farmers and workers.

Members of the Mitchell County committee are R. B. Baker, J. C. Costin and Rev. Thomas Quinlan. Representatives of the TEC participating in the meeting were Truett L. Hawkins and W. T. Edwards of Sweetwater, James A. Tobin of the San Angelo TEC District office.

Monahans Power Sends Wolves to 24-8 Less

A 145-pound lad came off the bench for his starting assignment Friday night and sparked Monahans High's undefeated Lobos to a 24-8 decision over Colorado High Wolves.

Gordy Tamplin jerked the throttle for the 2AAA title contenders and, then, a couple of "old pro" teammates, Quarterback Norman Smith and Fullback Mike Honeycutt, turned on the touchdown power.

The defeat was the third in a series for the aggressive Wolves of Coach Sam Chris

Wolves kept the pressure on throughout the contest, threatened seriously in each half. And had it not been for an erratic lateral that boomeranged into a Lobo touchdown, the outcome might have been different.

As it was, though, the Wolves managed only the distinction of being the first opponent to cross the Monahans goal line this season.

The Lobos scored once in the second quarter, twice in the third for the triumph. A bruising stacked trap by fullback Don Vee, the Colo

the Wolves' touchdown in the fourth.

Along the victory path Monahans earned 17 first downs, gained 379 yards running and 17 yards with 1 pass completion.

The Wolves, who had a damaging fault of just missing key pass plays, chalked up 10 first downs, gained 147 yards on the ground and 34 yards in the air.

But they completed only 3 of 13 passes. An alert charging Lobo line kept the pressure on Wolves' quarterback Jerry Mikes, who had a little

Soil Zone 2 Supervisor Vote Oct. 4

Election to name a Zone 2 supervisor for Mitchell County Soil Conservation District has been set for Oct. 4.

Zone 2 of the local district includes all land east of Colorado River and north of U. S. Highway 80 in the northeast corner of the district and has its headquarters in Loraine.

The election will be at a mass meeting for which the time will be announced later, set by the district supervisors.

Currently serving as Zone 2 supervisor is Perry H. Bowles, Colorado City farmer, with operations in the county's eastern area.

All persons, both husbands and wives, who own land in Zone 2 and live in a county all or some part of which is in the district, and who have attained the age of 21 years are eligible to vote in the zone election.

Nominations will be made from the floor and the person receiving a majority of votes of the qualified voters present will be elected for a term of 3 years.

Supervisors serve without pay except for a small allowance for expenses. They are the administrative and policy-making body of the soil conservation district.

To be a district supervisor, a person must be 21 years of age and a landowner in the zone from which he is elected. Conservation work, leadership, and time for balloting his district duties are also to be considered.

IN FIRST 4 DAYS

\$4,079 Counted For United Fund

Mitchell County Fund reported \$4,079 in pledges and cash collections Saturday.

The total was the first report from all divisions since the annual all-in-one finance campaign opened Tuesday to obtain money for 8 deserving organizations throughout 1961.

Leading the campaign was the Advance Gifts Division with \$2,254 in pledges and collections, according to Bob Reilly, campaign chairman.

With \$805.50 was the General Division, which has the largest number of contacts within the entire United Fund drive.

Special Gifts Division reported a total of \$165; Employees Division had \$545; Westbrook (the town only), \$141; Farm and Ranch Division, \$33.50.

More than 150 volunteer workers have joined hands in the United Fund campaign to seek donations and pledges totaling \$23,988—the amount needed for the 8 youth, welfare and health organizations in their program of work next year.

With one concentrated effort United Fund combines these 8 financial projects into one time-saving drive.

And — friend wife contends that we already have most of these items.

But the little woman is wrong there. She doesn't know the half of it — in fact even a fraction of it. There are millions of items we don't have! Trouble with her is that she's looking at the multitude of canceled checks . . . and comparing them with the small bank balance.

However, she is right in many respects. Looking back I find that I do buy nearly every lure that's advertised in the local newspaper. Also I've purchased most of the rods and reels that have been "specialized" in the press. My resistance always weakens when a store runs one of those "introductory" or "special-price" offers. I'm a sucker for such deals. If I can save money I'll buy most anything.

In fact the wife remarked just the other day, that if I didn't quit saving money that way we'd soon be broke. "We just can't afford to save any more," she warned.

There's a merchant in our town whose name is Dan. He has three stores. Biggest is a general merchandise type of store, but it stresses things for the sportsman . . . everything from tees to tents.

He's a big buyer and sells at a small margin of profit. Every time he runs an ad his store swarms with customers. Usually I'm one of them.

I keep our fishing and hunting gear, as well as our boating extras, in a small store-room in our fishing shack on the lake. I'll admit the room is pretty well packed.

My wife has complained lustily and long about my buying too many outdoors items. My "excuse" has been that I have to keep up-to-date on the products if I'm going to write about them.

But, she found a way to put a stop to all this "foolishness" . . . as she calls it.

She's a pretty clever gal, that woman. When I came in from a recent visit to Dan's — with two or three of about every type of lure that Dan had "specialized" . . . there was a big sign greeted me over the storage room door. Embellished in huge letters was — "Dan's No. 4."

That ended it. I took the hint. Now I tell Dan to come out to my place on the lake, anytime he runs out of anything — and replenish his stock.

Anyway, if you haven't been reading in this column lately, anything about the latest in everything outdoorwise, that's the reason. But chances are we'll be back again as soon as the storm blows over — just like any avid angler.

Hooky season is with us again.

If you don't know what we mean, then you've never skipped school to go fishin'.

Maybe we shouldn't be giving the youngsters ideas. They get blamed for enough nowadays. But we'll lay you 2 to 1 they are 10 times better behaved than the kids of 20, even 40 years ago. And they're definitely smarter!

Anyway it's not their fault that, when school doors open, fishing gets better. But it sure does.

However, one doesn't have to cut school to get in some good fishing. There is plenty of time on week-ends. And if there's fishing water close by, many an angler finds it possible, and profitable, to get in a few hours of early morning casting before reporting to work.

Don't overlook the fact that fish bite late in the evening too.

Anyway — fall fishing is wonderful!

Are you ready for it? Got the tackle box cleaned up, hooks sharpened, rod carefully checked, reel oiled and new line installed?

What the Fall months mean to you in the way of a successful season depends a great deal on your preparedness. Nothing is more disgusting than to arrive at a choice fishing spot only to discover that you failed to bring along your favorite lures, or your best rod and reel.

Some anglers keep a check-off sheet handy — just to be sure nothing is overlooked.

We keep our rod and reel in a Boyt case. It looks just like a gun case, but instead of a gun it holds a two-piece spinning or casting rod, a fishing reel, and a dozen or so lures of top-water and underwater variety. It's a mighty handy case.

Take along a couple of them, fully rigged, and you can forget your tackle box and still not kill a day of good fishing.

But, even then it's wise to open the cases before you leave home and give 'em the ole double-check. We know, because we just flat failed to do it only a few days ago.

So, there we were, right on top of the ole fishing hole . . . with everything and everybody ready to fish — except yours truly. We had everything with us including a brand new four star Garcia rod which we had won in a fishing tourney at the Outdoor Writers meeting at Lake Texoma — everything that is except one important item. We'd failed to outfit the case with any kind of reel.

Nationwide Ads Point To Area's Expansion

The nation's leading business executives are being introduced this month to "The Opportunity Frontier of Texas," which is the basic theme of an area development advertising program developed by Texas Electric Service Company.

"Opportunity Frontier" in-

cludes the Colorado City and Mitchell County area, a strategic point in the vast Texas area served by TESCO.

Representatives of TESCO were here in Colorado City Wednesday to meet with Chamber of Commerce officials in a luncheon conference to discuss the advertising program aimed at expanding the industrial and business development of West Texas.

Announcement of the program was made recently in a

In commenting on the program, Thomas said: "We want to do our part in helping attract more business and industry to the area we serve. FOR '61 MODELS

Optional Engine For New Falcons

The Ford Falcon, one of the most successful new cars in history, model year with a proven record of all-around economy introduces a new 101-horsepower performance option — the Falcon 170 Special engine — with its '61 models.

The Falcon established itself with a sales of nearly a half million since it was introduced in October, 1959.

The 1961 Falcon has a new, convex-shaped aluminum grille, but preserves the styling and inside-outside dimensions of its predecessor.

That means the Falcon will continue to offer full six-passenger seating room, good maneuverability and a 23.7-cubic-foot trunk to carry luggage.

Among improvements are 2½-times-thicker anodizing on the aluminum surfaces, double-wrapping of the aluminum muffler, galvanizing of additional underbody parts for greater rust and corrosion protection, and more effective use of stainless steel for parts such as the new hub caps.

The 1961 Falcon, to be introduced by Craddock-Witten here Thursday, will be offered in four models — 2 and 4-door sedans and 2 and 4-door station wagons.

Falcon has established its fuel economy reputation by delivering up to 30 miles per gallon of gasoline. Recommended oil change interval with the Falcon's Full Flow oil filter is 4,000 miles.

For those who want increased performance — about 15 per cent better than the standard 85-horsepower, 144.3-cubic-inch engine — Falcon will offer an optional 170-cubic-inch, six-cylinder engine that is rated at 101 horsepower.

Both Falcon engines operate on regular grade fuel. Both Falcon Sixes also have

a new "snorkel type" air cleaner that results in quieter operation, more uniform air flow and smoother high speed engine operation. Engine front covers are cast from aluminum for better sealing.

A new, optional automatic choke also is available with either Falcon engine.

Two transmissions — three-speed manual shift and Fordomatic — can be matched with either the standard or optional engine. Heavy-duty transmission and drive-line components are used with the Falcon 170 Special.

The Falcon styling is simple and functional, with a minimum of decorative chrome. The front fenders and

hood slope downward to provide maximum visibility. Single seven-inch headlights, set into the new grille, provide illumination comparable to that of the smaller dual headlights on other cars.

Other new appearance items include headlamp-rims, rectangular parking lights designed to blend with the new grille, and new Falcon emblems on the sides of the front fenders.

Falcon station wagons have a crank-down tailgate window, with power-operated control optional. Falcon wagon load space length is more than seven feet, with a volume of 76.2 cubic feet — comparable to the 1957 Ford station wagon.

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
