City awaits word on sewer grant

Word of Rockport's application for a federal grant to enlarge the city sanitary sewer plant capacity may be forthcoming Monday night, Jan. 24, when the city council meets in its regularly-scheduled session.

One of the items on the agenda will be a report by Mayor Burt Mills and City Administrator Herman Johnson on the public hearing held by the Texas Department of Water Resources in Austin on Thursday, Jan. 20.

Rockport applied to the TDWR for federal funds — through the Environmental Protection Agency — to help pay for expansion of the city's sanitary sewer plant

from the present one million gallons per day to two million gallons. If approved, the federal grant will fund 75 percent of the costs of designing and constructing the project.

In a special meeting this past week, Rockport officials gave notice of intent to issue \$600,000 in certificates of obligation to pay the city's share of project costs.

The city earlier accepted an offer from a private developer that would include sufficient funds to pay the city's cost of the project and if that money is available at the time city officials need it, the certificates of obligation will not be issued.

Monday night's meeting will begin at 7 p.m. with a joint public hearing of the city council and city planning and zoning

commission on three zoning requests in the city.

The regular session will begin at 7:30 p.m. or immediately following the joint hearing and will include a report from the city charter commission. The council will be presented with a copy of the proposed

charter, approved by the commission in its meeting last Monday, Jan. 17, and a request that the charter election be called for April 2 — the date of the regular city elections.

In what has shaped up to be a busy council session, Mills is scheduled to

administer the oath of office Monday to the five new members of the city board of development. Appointed at the council's Jan. 10 meeting, those taking the oath Monday will be Pat Brown, Curtis Kovacs, Virginia Shivers, J.C. Harlan and Gayle Atchley.

The council will consider a letter from Charles Fake, pastor of First Baptist Church, offering the church's present facilities at 902 Main as a site for a new city hall.

Mayor Mills received the letter this past Monday in which Rev. Fake asked to discuss the possibility with the city. First Baptist Church is planning to relocate on Enterprise where it has purchased a large tract of land.

In his letter to the city, Rev. Fake noted the existing church facilities include three buildings and a parking lot occupying a full city block and added, "The buildings are large enough to accommodate future growth of city offices and have potential for other uses, such as a civic center."

At the Jan. 10 meeting, Mills made public a letter from Allied Live Oak Bank in which bank officials were offering their present facilities for a new city hall.

Also scheduled on Monday night's agenda will be an ordinance annexing a portion of Hwy. 35 North from the south boundary line of the Wal-Mart properties to the north line of Traylor Avenue and Traylor Avenue from Hwy. 35 to the Fulton Beach Road.

Public hearings on the Traylor-Hwy. 35 annexation were held Dec. 13 and Jan. 4. Annexation of Traylor Avenue is a necessary first step before the city can consider a request from Candy Stick Corp., developers of Harbor Oaks Shopping Village, for annexation of that development into the city.

Complaints aired in ACND session

The Aransas County Navigation District commissioners held a workshop meeting Tuesday, Jan. 18, and a shouting match between the commissioners and audience members began early in the evening and continued till adjournment.

Harry Bennett of Goldston Engineering Inc. of Corpus Christi gave a presentation on the proposed new construction for the Phase II Beach project and suggested that the commissioners might want to go another way and spend the money allotted for the project in another manner.

He said nothing in the present drawings is sacred and if the commissioners wish to pursue another type structure he would be glad to draw them up. He also suggested they consider purchasing preconstructed buildings if they would better suit the purpose.

The commissioners decided to think about the matter and put it on the agenda for the next ACND meeting Feb. 8.

Pete Waters came before the commissioners seeking permission to buy the bait stand on Fulton Beach Road that is presently owned by Dr. Lewis.

Waters said he has been operating the bait stand for most of the time that Lewis has owned it and he said now he wants to own it.

Lewis has been paying \$76 a month for the lease. The commissioners decided the lease price should be raised and during the discussion an audience member said he thought the lease should be put out for bids. Commissioner Kirk Holman said the going rate for a bait stand lease is now \$200 per month and he told the board he thought that is what should be charged.

The commissioners then got the Lewis

lease from the file and said his lease is up in 60 days and he hasn't sent the navigation district a notice that he wishes to renew it.

Waters told the board they would have a letter from Lewis in a few days expressing his desire to renew the lease and to sell it to Waters.

Harbormaster Bernie DeForest told the commissioners the roof of Mom's Bait Stand in the Rockport Harbor is in need of repair. Because the navigation district owns the bait stands in the harbor, the ACND must pay the bill.

DeForest said a large amount of rotten wood must be repaired. He said it will be a major job and most of the roof and paper will have to be removed to get to the rotten wood.

Commissioner Holman said he didn't think the navigation district should own the bait stands.

"All the bait stands in Rockport Harbor belong to the navigation district," said DeForest.

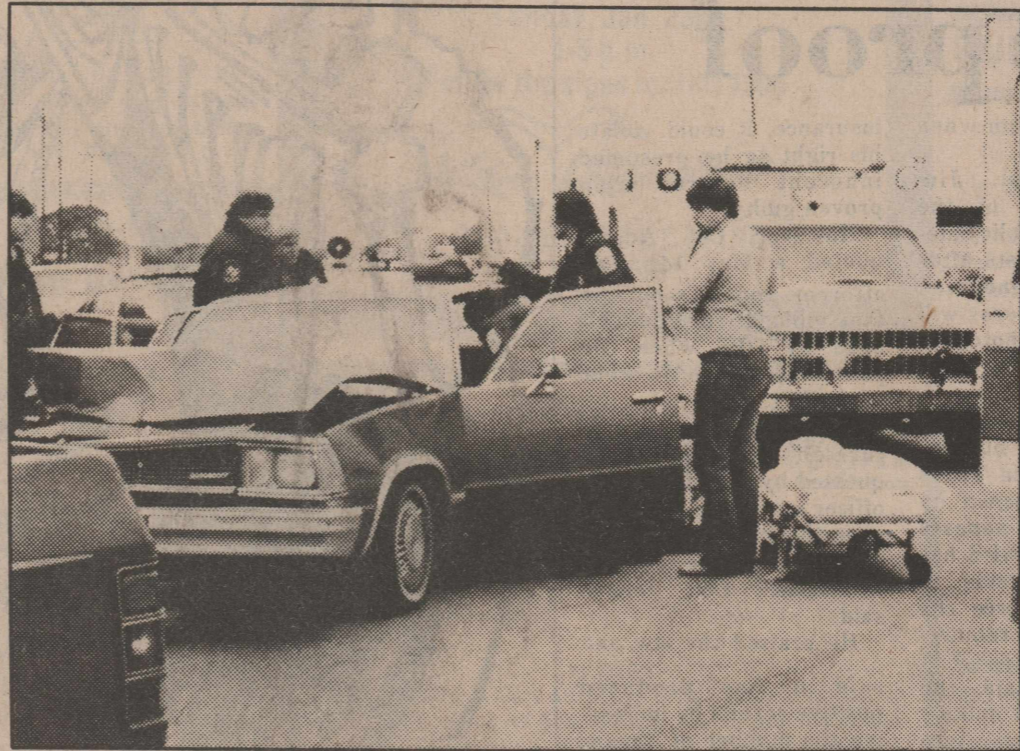
Holman asked Reese Rozzell to come up with a new lease for the bait stands that will include water and electricity meters. "I've got a water meter on my bait stand and I am using about \$25 in water a month. And I think we need to turn over all the bait stands to the lease holders," said Holman.

Commissioner Holman then made a proposal that the ACND let the students from Texas A&M graduating class in the Sea Grant program help the ACND with some of its problems as their class project.

"I took the information and talked to the presidents of both banks and the president of the Chamber of Commerce and they all said the same thing. Sometimes they do the research with no regard to what it costs," said Holman.

Holman said he thought the students could take one of the long-range problems

Park board sets goals for '83

Goals for 1983 — starting with a survey of land available for parks in Rockport — were set by the city's board of parks and recreation in a meeting Wednesday night, Jan. 19, at City Hall.

On a motion by Kathryn Winkelman, seconded by Cy Richards, the board voted unanimously to research available park land and "any individuals that might be willing to donate land for park use."

Board members also discussed a recommendation made in a 1972 city plan that the city require developers to set aside a certain portion of new developments for park area.

"It's on the books," said Board Chairman George McCague, "but it's never been enforced." McCague and other members of the parks board expressed a desire to see the recommendation put into effect.

Looking to the future at Wednesday night's meeting, board members noted that as Rockport grows, so will its needs for parks and recreational facilities.

Board member Bobby Jackson observed

that "What a lot of people still want is a (public) swimming pool."

"I think it's the one thing this community needs," Winkelman said.

Richards volunteered to talk to officials in surrounding communities that have swimming pools and McCague appointed him a "committee of one" to investigate what other communities are doing and the costs involved in financing and maintaining a public pool.

The meeting opened Wednesday with election of 1983 board officers. McCague, who late last year took the chairman's post but said he only wanted to finish out that year, reluctantly yielded to pressure from

remaining board members who wanted him to serve in the position.

Board members unanimously re-elected McCague expressing their feelings that he was the "best-qualified" to serve as chairman.

Winkelman was re-elected vice chairman and Patty McArdle secretary of the board.

McCague noted in other business on the agenda that in response to a petition from members of the Aransas County Soccer Association, topsoil has been spread on one of the two soccer fields in Memorial Park, arrangements are being made to sprig the field with grass and the city has agreed to install a watering system.

U.S. named defendant in tax suit

LAMAR — The U.S. government — or one of its agencies — has been named one of the defendants in a lawsuit for \$9,479.62 in delinquent taxes owed to the Aransas County Municipal Utility District in Lamar.

The suit has been filed against Gulf Hidalgo Corporation and the United States of America for taxes owing on the 6,033-acre Tract D in Goose Island Lake Estates, the subdivision served by the ACMUD. The land is apparently owned in part by Gulf Hidalgo and in part by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC).

According to a report presented by Alma Johnson, the district's tax collector, in the district board of directors meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 11, a March trial date is anticipated.

The suit is one of several in progress in the district's efforts to collect delinquent taxes, some of which have been owed for years.

The delinquent tax collection push began last year with the hiring of Calame, Lineberger and Associates as the district's tax attorneys. Tax suits began going into district court late last year and on Dec. 7 the first sales of property for back taxes were held.

Johnson told directors another tax sale is scheduled for Feb. 1. Another four suits — including the one involving Tract D — are currently in progress and legal action is pending in two more cases.

The utility district began its tax push with more than \$42,000 in delinquent taxes on the rolls. As of Jan. 1 this year, the district's delinquent taxes amounted to \$34,382.78.

ACMUD to consider contract with Lamar

LAMAR — Directors of the utility district that serves Goose Island Lake Estates have called a special meeting for 11 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 22, to consider a proposed water service agreement between the district and Lamar Water Systems Inc. (LWS).

Also on the agenda for the special session, which will be open to the public, is discussion of the district's plan of debt adjustment.

The meeting will follow a workshop session during which details of the proposed water supply contract with LWS are discussed. That session will begin at 9 a.m.

Under general terms of the contract, the Aransas County Municipal Utility District (ACMUD) No. 1 would agree to supply water to LWS in exchange for sufficient funds to pay for repairs to the water plant that are needed to bring the plant to an acceptable level of operation.

Specific details of the plan are still unresolved, and directors hope to iron these out in the workshop meeting.

The district's water plant ceased to produce potable water soon after it was put on-line in 1978 and a dispute between the district and Envirogenics, the company that designed the plant, as to who was responsible for the malfunction resulted in a stalemate.

Late last summer, the district received an offer from Membrane Systems Inc. (MSI) of Corpus Christi to repair the plant. The district put the job out for bid and MSI submitted the low bid on the project — \$68,000.

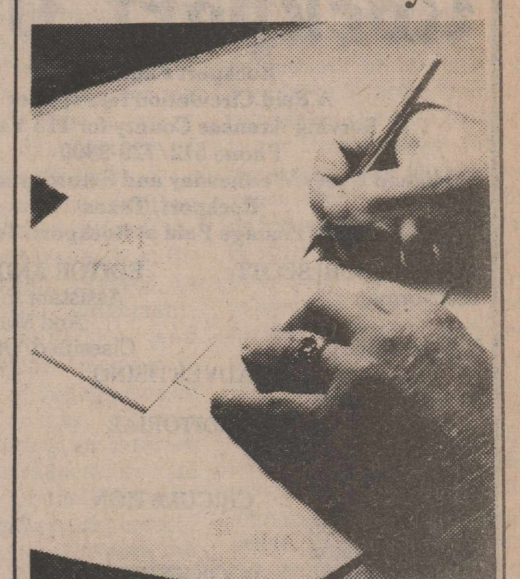
The district does not have funds on hand to pay for the repairs and is presently indebtedness stemming from bond issues in 1977 and '78 to pay for construction of the water and sanitary sewer plants.

Directors late last year began negotiations with owners of LWS on the premise that, if an agreement can be worked out, the contract could be used to secure a loan to repair the plant. The funds actually paid

to the district by Lamar for water would then be used to pay off the loan.

At the utility district's Jan. 11 meeting at which Saturday's workshop session was called, ACMUD Director Bill Southern said, "We have tentatively agreed (with LWS) in principle but we are not ready to sign a contract."

Texas facing first tax increase in 12 years

Struggling to stay afloat in troubled economic waters, state governments, most of them hard-hit by recession, will end fiscal 1983 at least \$2 billion in the red.

Fortunately, Texas is not among states that will end 1983 in debt, but it faces tough financial decisions during the next two years, mainly because of declining revenues estimated at \$1.5 billion by Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Before the current session of the legislature convened, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby predicted the possibility of a tax increase of as much as \$1.5 billion and warned it would be "virtually impossible" for legislators to deal with needs of state government within estimated revenues.

If taxes are increased, it will be the first time in 12 years, which commends the way state government has

been managed during that period.

The legislature must deal with major increases in funding for public and higher education, highways, prisons, welfare, mental health and mental retardation, a prospective multi billion dollar state water plan, probation and parole, annuity increase for retired teachers and state employees.

Although there are several causes of the current

situation, recession is clearly the most important single factor because it causes reduction in revenues while increasing pressure for more spending.

That's the way a survey

conducted by the National Governors Association and National Association of State Budget Officers summed up states' financial difficulties.

Information in the sur-

vey is based on responses from 41 states. The most alarming finding was a sharp decline in state income since fiscal year budgets were prepared last summer. Nine states now

expect large deficits by the end of the fiscal year, June 30 for most states.

The revenue drop for the 41 states reporting was nearly \$8 billion, offset only partly by spending now expected to be \$4.6 billion less than estimated last spring.

The survey pointed out that because recession puts people out of work and increases the need for welfare and other aid, it places a drain on state

treasuries at the same time newly unemployed people stop paying taxes and others hold down taxable personal spending.

State revenues are expected to rise by only 6.3 percent above fiscal 1982, somewhat below increases during the past decade. Even as bleak as these totals are, the fiscal situation in the states may be worse than portrayed in the survey, researchers said.

Be safe, carry insurance proof

A ruling by the attorney general's office and a statement by the director of the Department of Public Safety concerning proof of liability insurance have compounded confusion about what motorists should or should not do.

Unless the legislature clarifies the law on whether vehicle owners are required to provide proof of liability insurance if called upon to do so by a law enforcement officer, the number of time-consuming court challenges is likely to multiply.

It would be a simple matter for lawmakers to change the law to dispel confusion, and that is what should be done. As it stands, motorists do not know for sure whether they are legally required to provide proof of liability insurance.

The state attorney general's office ruled in an advisory opinion that motorists cannot be penalized for failing to carry proof of

insurance with them when they drive.

Even so, Col. Jim Adams, director of the Department of Public Safety warned motorists after the opinion was announced that state troopers will continue to ticket motorists who cannot furnish proof of liability insurance.

An attorney general's ruling is not law, but has the force of law in Texas until it is overturned by court challenge. It appears in this case that DPS has the law on its side in continuing to enforce the insurance proof requirement.

Col. Adams said the attorney general's opinion does not require state troopers to change their policy "because the statute requires motorists to furnish information concerning evidence of insurance to a police officer upon request."

The attorney general said if courts are permitted to try a driver on charges of failing to provide proof of

insurance, it could violate his right to be presumed innocent before being proven guilty.

However, Col. Adams quoted a May 14, 1982 attorney general's opinion that upheld rules developed by DPS when the proof of insurance law went into effect.

"If a person is unable to furnish information requested by the officer, the officer may issue a citation even though the individual claims to have the required insurance," Col. Adams said.

He praised the law and said it has produced positive results by increasing the number of Texans who have insurance.

"Before the law was passed, 74 percent of Texas motorists involved in vehicle accidents did have insurance. According to 1982 reports, 91 percent of drivers involved in vehicle accidents have obtained and maintain insurance," Col. Adams said.

I dream and become lost

TEXANS BE GLAD. You have warmer weather than Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. on this Jan. 13. The mercury was at 41 degrees in the morning but was expected to rise to the middle 60s. Fortunately the sky is bright and clear and there is very little wind.

Fancy, if you will, trying to see everything in the Smithsonian in a single day. Rather like it is attempting to absorb all the sights between Palm Beach and Ft. Lauderdale via the ICW. Except for occasional patches of mango swamp, the area is solidly built up and canals spread off the waterway. Homes run the gamut from an occasional mobile home park to magnificent mansions. Perhaps the outstanding characteristic of everything is that everything is so well-kept and immaculate, a circumstance that Florida that Karakal has visited. Once, a week or more ago, we were walking the quiet streets of Boca Grande and saw a couple of beverage tins on the ground. The sight was almost shocking.

Karakal is at the city dock on the New River. Neatly clipped grass grows to the bulkhead, then a sidewalk, the street and a park with handsome trees and flowers. At frequent intervals are tidy covered garbage bins. I should be embarrassed to drop a gum wrapper.

SO MANY YEARS passed since I was last in the tropics that I suspect my memory is confused because South Florida seems, despite the cold, as tropical as any place I can recall. Here in mid-January everything is lush, citrus trees not just in groves, but on lawns as well, while everywhere the flowers bloom.

I confess to the probability that I have prejudices, but nevertheless my preference is for the west coast. It seems to me to be what I have heard others call it, the real Florida. One sees older homes and while tourists and retirees from

the north are everywhere, they seem to be less frequent to the west. And have no fear, visitors are easily identifiable. First by the clothes they wear, next by their accents — nine times out of ten — Yankee.

LATER THE NEW RIVER is like a highway, but the traffic is water borne and endless. Not a half minute goes by without passing boats, tiny tenders, huge to modest sailing vessels, an endless array of power boats, some of which are almost ocean liners. All are conversation pieces for seafarers.

There are no dull moments. We meet old friends and make new ones and all the while we wait for a sailmaker to sew a new jib. Meanwhile Karakal is, in the jargon of our way of life, shipshape and Bristol fashion. At least almost. Chores, maintenance are always without end. I must confess that there are jobs I perform aboard a boat cheerfully while ashore I avoid and put off to the bitter end.

I AM MINDFUL THAT I have perhaps painted Florida in glowing terms. It is easy to forget that we have fellow countrymen without sufficient food and shelter, to forget that not much more than 30 miles to the south is Miami and crime and violence. Here the scene is so peaceful. But only the night before last the skipper of another boat biked alongside and came aboard for a drink, an hour later his bike, which had been left no more than six feet from our hatch, was gone.

We have sea fever, or island fever, especially the skipper and I. This morning we had a chart of the Abacos spread in front of us. From years of experience Doc knows the keys as well as I know the route from home to the grocery store. My own experience is limited to a glorious two weeks, and that half a dozen years ago. For me a chart is as stirring and exciting as a beautiful woman. I dream and become lost from the rest of

the world. That chart is still before me and I read names — Green Turtle, Tilloo, Double Breasted and Elbow Keys. The names are music and without end. I can hear the water breaking on a reef and I can almost taste a conch chowder.

THERE IS AT LEAST one thing that is at least a bit of an irritant to sailors, especially those of us who like to depend upon the wind. Landsmen almost without exception assume that we are very wealthy people, and true, some are, even as among landsmen. A powerboat spells wealth only when it approaches the size of an ocean liner.

The situation is almost funny. I know of youngsters who have worked as bus boys, mowed lawns to save a few hundred dollars to buy a little Sunfish. They are put down as scions of wealth while by contrast the kid with an 18-foot powerboat with a thousand or more dollars behind in a motor is assumed to be helping his family survive by putting fish on the table. I exaggerate only a little.

So just how much does it cost to cruise? Lin and Larry Parry, famous cruising sailors, have the best answer: Whatever you have to spend. On the other hand, I think that we aboard Karakal are fairly typical of most rag sailors, except that we do tend to dine ashore more often than most. But let it suffice that my personal costs are less than living ashore, or if you like far less in three months than I might spend in a week at a resort hotel, and without whooping it up every night. Naturally this does not include the cost of the sloop which is the skipper's home and has the value of a comfortable abode ashore. The cost of food, drink, fuel are divided evenly among us, a situation typical in other boats which we meet.

When our new sail is ready, and weather permitting, we shall be crossing the Gulf Stream to West End on Grand Bahama. I am ready.

Stopping waste

Despite regulations that forbid military aircraft from being used "except when travel is in the national interest and commercial transportation is not available or capable of meeting the movement requirement," the Pentagon provided more than \$2 million in VIP domestic travel service and related entertainment for members of Congress in 1982.

Information indicating flagrant violations of federal regulations was made available to a national magazine and other news media after provisions of the Freedom of Information Act were cited by media representatives.

During the year, 35 senators and 111 House members took trips on planes operated by the Air Force's 89th Military Airlift Wing, the Pentagon admitted.

Pentagon sources said congressmen often prefer special treatment provided by the military, including home-to-airport chauffeurs, special baggage handling and other services.

Travel service is not the only benefit from relying on the military to get around. Military escort officers usually carry what is called "walking around money" to cover lawmakers' lodging and other expenses.

Examples: During the space shuttle landing at White Sands, N.M., in March, the tab for such

extras as refreshment, taxis and reading material came to \$4,433.

Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, was flown to West Point to speak at graduation ceremonies. Cost for use of a Lockheed Jetstar was \$5,616, plus \$1,076 for his party's food and lodging during the three-day trip.

Two planes carried nine House members, five wives, six staffers — and 35 foreign visitors — to San Francisco for an international forum. Total costs, which included a tour of Napa Valley wineries, was \$80,000.

Bureaucratic government lends itself to such practices as described above. The Pentagon, hoping to curry favor from congressmen, is delighted to offer them special treatment at taxpayers' expense.

It is no wonder congressmen want the Pentagon to handle their transportation problems. They don't have to be bothered by following pesky federal regulations governing use of military regulations.

If such waste and abuse of tax funds as apparently is being practiced by the Pentagon could be eliminated from government, President Reagan would not have as much trouble in the future cutting the federal budget deficit as he is having now.

One final word: We do not oppose congressional hitchhiking on military aircraft.

It didn't do any good

Editor's note: The Live Oak Peninsula Philosopher on his grassburr farm tries to get his mind off earth problems this week, without success.

Dear editor: With the world in the shape it's in, what with world-wide recession, unemployment and mammoth deficits, and professional economists acting like politicians — attacking each other's solutions without offering any of their own, I thought it might help to get my mind off earth's ills by examining space for a while.

It didn't do any good. For example, it's been discovered that traveling in space isn't all it's cracked up to be. You get a terrible case of motion sickness up there or out there, whichever it is. In fact, it's so bad the space people are planning on sending a doctor up with the next crew of astronauts to study the problem.

What I'm wondering is, who's going to study the doctor if he comes down with motion sick-

ness?

In the early days of space exploration there was considerable talk about colonizing that distant void. We'd send up a huge space ship, part by part, till it was big enough to accommodate a whole community. I've forgotten what those people would do up there, I think maybe it was to make those ball bearings and grow violets, but after we've seen TV shots of astronauts floating around in their capsules, the thought of a whole community of people floating around and bumping into each other makes you shake your head. The idea seems as impractical as balancing the budget by quadrupling the deficit.

Now it's true that two Russian cosmonauts stayed in space for over six months, and while I haven't been to Russia, I can see it might be possible they'd rather have motion sickness up there than whatever it was they had down there.

Babe Dahlgren, the former Yankees first baseman, is a part of baseball history — but one who accepted the role reluctantly.

Dahlgren succeeded Lou Gehrig as the New York Yankee's first baseman on May 2, 1939, in Detroit when the ailing Iron Horse took himself out of the lineup, ending his streak of consecutive games at 2,130.

"In the last three innings, I kept begging Lou to go in and keep it alive, but he said, 'No, you're doing a great job. I had a home run and a double in that game, and I could have had four homers. The double bounced off the top of the fence, and the left fielder jumped as high as he could to catch two other balls.'"

Extraordinary would seem to be the definitive word for Steve Boros, the intellectual successor to Billy Martin as manager of the Oakland A's.

Boros has a degree in English from the University of Michigan. He is working on his autobiography and is writing a novel with a baseball setting. An extensive reader, Boros also enjoys Russian drama, American fiction, the Broadway theater and Woody Allen movies. But by his own account, Boros hardly could be more average.

"They say the average big-league career lasts 4 1/4 years," Boros said. "That's exactly what mine totaled. They say the average batting average is .245; mine was exactly .245."

The NASCAR Winston Cup point fund will be boosted to a record \$500,000 in 1983, making it the richest point fund in auto racing history.

The \$200,000 increase was announced at the 1982 NASCAR Winston Cup awards banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel here by Gerald H. Long, president and chief operating officer of R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

"The NASCAR Winston Cup Series is the most prestigious auto racing circuit in the world and is the world leader in attendance. In recognition of its major league status, we at Reynolds Tobacco feel the sport deserves a half-million-dollar point fund," said Long.

"The sport's tremendous growth in the last decade is due in large part to the emergence of the Winston Cup championship as the ultimate prize for a race driver.

In 1983, the champion will receive \$150,000," Long said. "This is the fourth straight year that the company has increased the point fund and the increase we are announcing today is the largest ever."

The Reynolds Tobacco executive said that 1982 was another record year for the Winston Cup Series as we saw record crowds at race after race.

The biggest reason for the increase in attendance was the intense competition. "For example, a record 14 drivers swapped the lead a record 45 times at the Atlanta Journal 500 and with 20 laps to go, six drivers still had a shot at winning the race," Long said.

"This huge increase in the point fund is our way of

saying thanks to the drivers and crews for putting on such great races."

Boston Celtics president and general manager Red Auerbach said that when he was coaching the team he did not enforce his rules through fines. In fact, he recalled, in 20 years he collected only \$80 in fines.

"For what, pray tell? I had a rule: Nobody on the team eats pancakes. That was my thing. One night we got into Rochester, and it's about 1:30 a.m. I walk into the coffee shop and Sam Jones is eating pancakes. I told him it would cost him \$5, and since he had a mouthful, he mumbled he'd finish them. I told him it would be \$5 a bite."

As for the other \$75, they resulted from a 5 a.m. scene in a hotel lobby where Auerbach found three Celtics standing with three women. According to Auerbach, when he said hello, one of the players replied, "Meet my cousin," adding, "we're on our way to church." Said Auerbach: "I couldn't take that, I fined 'em \$25 each for insulting my intelligence."

As the National Football League players strike dragged through its 57 days, much of the players' early support for Ed Garvey, their executive director, dissolved into bitterness.

How bitter? Well, a police officer in St. Louis thought he had heard every explanation in the book until one night, during the strike, when he came across a car that had crashed into a fence. Behind the wheel was the St. Louis Cardinals' hulking defensive tackle, Rush Brown. "He said he was mad at Ed Garvey," recalled the officer, who ultimately charged Brown with driving under the influence.

"He said, 'That jerk, I ain't got no job because of him.'"

An example of one of Tom Lasorda's taller tales, according to Angels general manager Buzzie Bavasi, was the time the Los Angeles Dodgers manager was talking about the benefit of prayer during a religious broadcast.

"Tommy told the story of the last game he pitched for Montreal in the International League," Bavasi recalled. "He told how the bases were loaded with none out in the ninth and he had a two-run lead and how he turned his back to the batter, looked up at the Great Dodger in the Sky and asked for help. "Then he threw the pitch, and the batter hit a blazing line drive right at the third baseman, over to second, to first for a triple play."

Later, I saw Tommy and said: 'Hey, I remember that day . . . and you told the story perfectly, except you added one word. "It wasn't a triple play. It was a triple.'"

Of course, Julius Erving's biggest fan is his wife, Turquoise. But apparently, she's an even bigger fan of the game he plays for a living. "I really love basketball," she said. "When we were living in New York, I told Julius that when he retired, I wanted season tickets to the Knicks. He just looked at me in disbelief. Basketball is my whole life. When

he retires, I'll miss his playing but will continue attending games."

Apparently, there's still one person in the Philadelphia area who would not recognize the 76ers' Julius Erving if she saw him.

"There are still some problems when blacks go to country clubs," Erving said. "I went to meet a doctor friend of mine, and I was carrying my clubs over my shoulder. I told the lady at the desk who I was there to meet. She got on the phone in the clubhouse and said, 'Sir, your caddy is here.' "My friend asked who, and she repeated the statement. My friend asked for the name, and I just said, 'Mr. Erving.' "He was mad, but I had to laugh."

Home-field advantage is a contradiction in terms for the Los Angeles Raiders, who live and practice 365 miles away in Oakland, their former address, and visit Los Angeles only for games.

For most teams, it would be a hardship. But the Raiders thrive on adversity and revel in their outcast image. "It has been like playing away every week," said all-pro linebacker Ted Hendricks. "But it hasn't been that difficult. I don't know if it's the free spirit of the Raiders or what, but nothing has bothered us over the years."

Asked if the current Raiders' spirits are free, Hendricks said, "Correct! For example, I have just hung a picture of the Three Stooges in Dave Dalby's locker. Curly had his head in a vise and is being administered by Moe and Larry. It looks like a Raider team picture."

Cats pin loss on Pirates

The class-act of South Texas rolled into the Pirate gym Tuesday when Calallen came to play the Lady Pirates of Rockport-Fulton.

Earlier in the year the clawin' Cats had pinned a 71-19 loss on Rockport, and they took a page from history and tried to dupli-

cate the score as they took a 70-21 this go-round.

Calallen pressed the Ladies into submission in the first period when the Cats outscored Rockport 15-1, and with that they set the Pirates in a hole from then on.

Only in the second quarter, when Rockport

stayed close in scoring (16-14), did the Rockport team play with the capabilities they have shown in the past few weeks. With that good bit of scoring, the Pirates stayed 16 behind at 31-15.

That one scoring spurt was all the Pirates enjoyed as they were held to only six points in the next 16 minutes of playing.

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

With a little time and understanding we might find the Binary Jig

Allow me to introduce the Binary Jig.

No, it isn't a dance done by crazed programmers at places like Data General, Software Arts or even IBM. It is a way of looking at information, value and the transformation of how we work.

In a recent article ("Capital Offense," Dec. 17, 1982) Forbes Magazine took a little software company named Comserv to task because it recorded the value of its major product, computer software, at \$6 million in spite of the fact that it was little more than several thousand feet of magnetic tape and some instruction manuals. Real values, the Forbes article said, usually

are found in investments made in land, buildings, machinery and inventory — hard physical stuff, not computer programs.

The magazine went on to report on the "liberal accounting" of Comserv and how computer programs, which usually are expensed (that is, paid for currently rather than regarded as an investment that will be recovered over a period of time like the cost of a bulldozer or barber chair), really shouldn't be carried on the books as assets.

The difference in accounting is major for Comserv and those interested in owning its shares. If the company expensed that \$6 million in program development costs, its net

worth would drop by 36 percent to \$10.7 million and its reported profits of \$2.2 million would become a loss of \$1 million.

Obviously, this is more than an academic matter. The real problem, however, is that the measures of value that once served industrial society well now must be expanded to embrace the measures of value required by "The Information Age."

You can understand this by taking a look at the tools used by two generations.

My father, a machinist and mechanical inspector, worked in a machine shop with things he called "jigs." According to the dictionary, a jig is "a device used to maintain mechanically the correct positioned rela-

tionship between a piece of work and the tool or between parts of work during an assembly." As a practical matter, a jig should be made and used anytime you intend to do something repeatedly, because you will do more work in less time, with much greater accuracy.

In fact, we are surrounded by all kinds of jigs and they range from the typewriter tab settings office secretaries use to speed and standardize typing to the enormous stamping and molding tools used to manufacture parts of automobiles. A jig is the physical embodiment of thinking and frees us from having to think through the same process again and again.

I never learned to make jigs the way my father did. He was killed in an accident a week before I started college. Instead of having the opportunity to learn all that he knew (which included the letters of Lord Chesterfield and the original Song of Solomon as well as how to make jigs) his legacy to me was an intimidating oak box of micrometers and other tools that I never learned to use, in spite of four years at MIT.

But there is another reason that I never learned to use the tools my father used.

In the first week at Tech, visiting lecturer Aldous Huxley spoke about "negative entropy," the capac-

ity of human beings to create order.

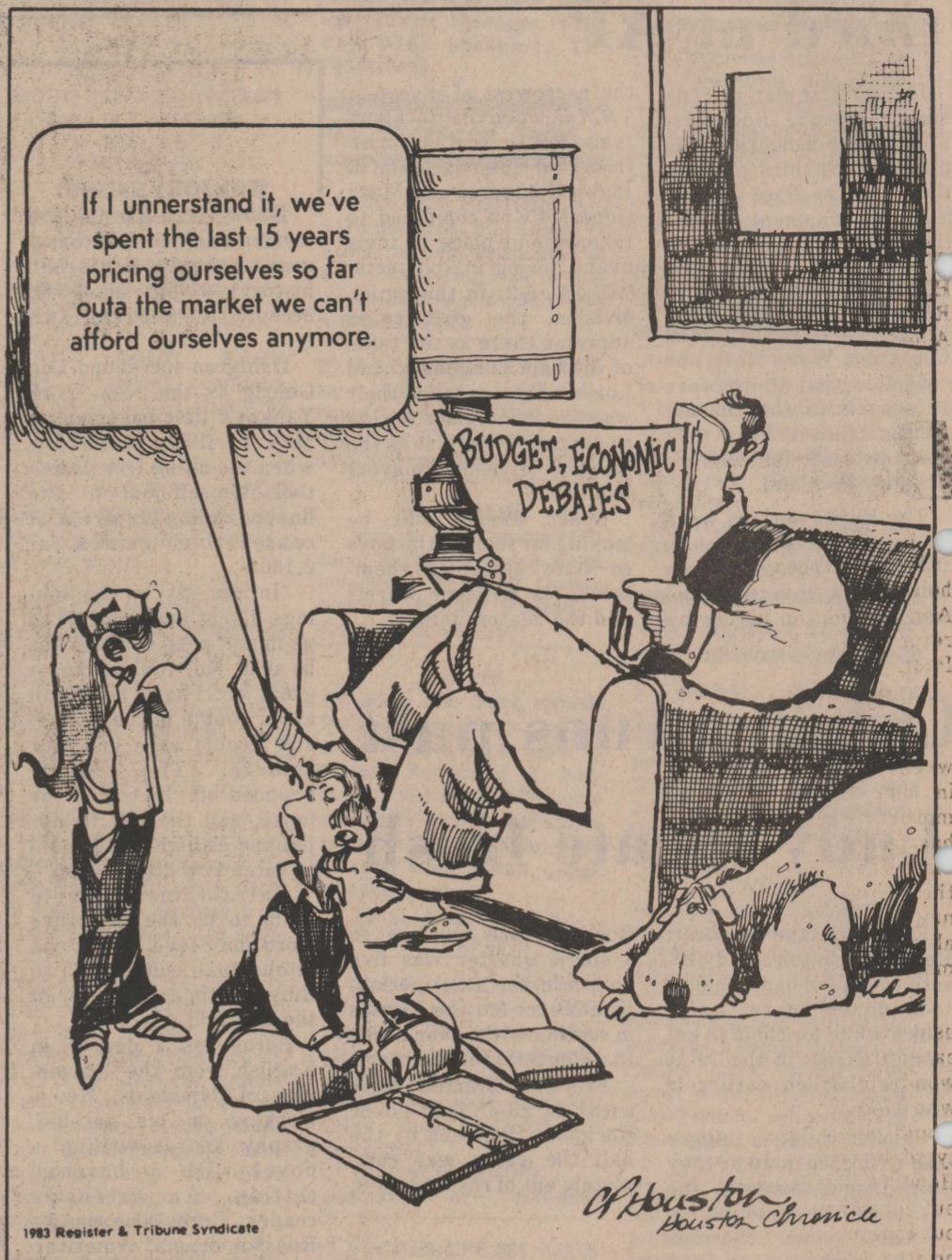
Creation and progress, Huxley thought, were not to be found in the raw accumulation of industrial "stuff" but in the constant accumulation, ordering and redistribution of knowledge.

What the author of "Brave New World" was talking about was a fundamental and original idea that might be called "the information theory of value," a notion that would allow us to go beyond things and money as measures of value to the ideas that engender both. After all, the value of any building or machine is only as good as the ideas it embodies.

Right now, a computer program is as close as we can get to Huxley's information theory of value, and True Value.

It also is the jig to be used by this generation and the next.

With a little time and understanding, we might all find that the Binary Jig is a pretty good dance, too.

Specht stresses county permit requirements

Many Aransas County residents, and even some building contractors, are not aware that county building permits are required by law in all areas outside of the incorporated cities of Rockport, Fulton and Aransas Pass. Also, every mobile home permanently set up in this area requires a county mobile home permit before it is installed. The primary reason for these permits is to control flood damage — as much as possible.

Aransas county is a flood-prone area and so residents are eligible for government-subsidized flood insurance. However, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) makes some very reasonable demands of all property owners in this area. At considerable effort

and expense FEMA has produced "flood hazard boundary maps" so that every piece of property in the county can be assigned an elevation zone designation which shows the height above sea level that the lowest living floor should be to escape flood damage. Naturally, those structures erected before the flood control ordinance was passed, April 27, 1977, cannot be expected to comply, but new buildings must do so. If the county does not strictly enforce this the federal government may cancel out all its flood insurance in Aransas County. Of course, this would be disastrous.

When a building or mobile home permit is applied for, the property location is determined on

the FEMA map. If it is in a high-rise zone we require a registered surveyor's elevation certificate showing the height above sea level of the building or mobile home site so that the first floor can be built above the danger point; or in a mobile home, so that it will be set up to the proper height.

The fees for these permits are quite modest. Building permits cost \$1 for each \$1,000 of construction cost and mobile home permits are \$10 each. However, the fines for failure to obtain a building or mobile home permit before starting work can be very high — up to \$200 a day for each day of violation.

Building permits

Permits have been issued for \$70,600 in construction in Rockport during the first 20 days of 1983, according to records on file at City Hall.

Included in the permits was one for a dwelling, on Magnolia Street, issued Jan. 13. Estimated value of the new residence is \$43,500. The four-room, two-bath structure will be of composition shingle and contain 1,140 square feet. Contractor is Paul Jackson. Owner is Terry R. McCrary of Huntsville.

A permit to remodel the Mayhood Travel Agency

building was issued Jan. 12 to owner Gordon R. Stanley. Estimated value of the new construction is \$15,000.

Another permit for remodeling — this one of a residence — was issued Jan. 14. Estimated value is \$4,000.

Other permits issued so far include additions to two residences, totalling \$5,600, and installation of a metal fireplace in a residence, \$1,000; fence construction, \$600; installation of a sign, \$500; and construction of a metal storage building, \$400.

Community environment is the key to development

COLLEGE STATION — Community environment and attitude are key factors influencing industrial development.

These factors and others were discussed at a recent Rural Industrial Development Workshop at Texas A&M University.

To be a candidate for industry, a community should have a good business climate, adequate public services, good living conditions, adequate recreational facilities and available educational facilities, such as colleges or vocational training schools, said Q.T. Jones, with the Westinghouse Electric Co., Pittsburgh, Pa. Westinghouse has located 43 new plants in the U.S. since 1967 and has considerable experience with the process.

"When I go into a community I want to look at all available housing in all classes, all churches, schools, shopping centers and existing industries. Sometimes I even stop at a store and talk to people to see what they think of their community," Jones said.

H.D. Davis of Saginaw, the 1981 Volunteer Small City Developer of the Year, agreed that community attitude is important. Davis helped bring \$27 million worth of industry — which created 300 new jobs — into Saginaw over a one-year period. These plants have expanded to the tune of \$1.5 million and have created additional jobs.

"We had to deal with the people of Saginaw — 5,735 population — and their fears of bringing in big city problems and losing the

small town atmosphere," said Davis. "We developed a positive, cooperative attitude toward industry among people. Chamber of Commerce and elected officials."

According to Davis, developing this attitude meant cutting cost, time and red tape for industry representatives. It also meant getting Saginaw prepared to extend its streets and utilities in any direction, depending on industry needs.

Another workshop speaker, Charles B. Wood, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, said the TIC exists "to promote and encourage development and protection of Texas business, industry, agriculture and commerce within and outside the state." The TIC is also there to provide an effective business information service, conduct research on business conditions, stimulate commerce and encourage location of new business, he added.

Wood said the TIC's advertising budget is a "tax producer, not a tax eater. For every 100 jobs created by new industry in Texas, 237 new secondary jobs also are created. That gives us a return of approximately 240 to 1 on our advertising investment."

Texas is among the lowest spenders on economic development, according to Wood. Texas spends about \$1.5 million annually as compared to California, \$8 million; Florida, \$6 million; Illinois, \$26 million; and New York, \$31 million.

The annual workshop was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

Meek named to post

The Board of Directors of the Rockport Country Club has announced the addition of Michael G. Meek as assistant sales manager. His responsibilities at RCC will include handling on-site sales of the remaining lots and aiding local brokers in their sales efforts.

director for a major homebuilder and then as a broker for a major commercial and development firm. Prior to that, after graduating from Texas A&I University in 1975 with a BA in management, Meek was employed as a marketing manager for Johnson and Johnson in San Antonio and Texas Instruments in California before moving back to Texas in January of 1980.

The \$15 million development will offer over 800 single-family homesites, an 18-hole championship golf course, a tennis/swim center and clubhouse. Over 400 lots totalling \$8 million in sales have already been transacted and utility construction is now underway.

1040EZ form introduced

The Internal Revenue Service had developed a new simplified tax form for single taxpayers, called Form 1040EZ. The IRS says that, as the name implies, the 1040EZ is a brief, simple-to-complete tax form.

The IRS estimates that over 20 million taxpayers will be eligible to use the new form. For example, most college students who file federal individual income tax returns will be eligible to use the 1040EZ even if they are claimed as dependents on another taxpayer's return.

To use the 1040EZ, a taxpayer must be single, claim only one personal exemption, and claim no exemptions for children or other dependents. All income must come from wages, salaries, tips and no more than \$400 in interest. Taxable income must be less than \$50,000.

The form contains only 11 items, the IRS says, which is half the lines on the Form 1040A for 1982. The 1040EZ is divided into steps that guide the taxpayer through the form. Most of the instructions

needed to complete Form 1040EZ are on the back of the form. However, the IRS advises that this year's 1040EZ filers will need to use the 1040A instructions for the tax table and for the special worksheet used to figure the allowable deduction for charitable contributions on the new form.

The 1040EZ has been included in the 1982 Form 1040A tax package. It is also available separately at many local IRS offices and through form distribution centers in many banks and post offices.

160 million bushels expected

Soybean outlook bleak

As is the case with most other crops, large supplies and low prices are plaguing soybeans.

An increase in domestic stocks of soybeans of some 160 million bushels is expected for the 1982-83 year, and this could drive prices down below the average loan rate of \$5.02 per bushel.

Johnny Feagan, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Service, notes several reasons why a large soybean crop could push prices below the loan rate; only about a third of the current crop will be eligible for the loan program, storage is short and export markets are not adequate to rescue falling prices. The economist expects

domestic use of soybeans to be near 2.14 billion bushels, up 3 percent from a year ago. But he says this increase is due to lower prices rather than a shift in demand for soybean products.

About 26 million tons of soybean meal should be produced this year, 6 percent above last year. Domestic meal use will be up about 3 percent due to a strong hog-to-meal price ratio of 8 to 1. A slight increase in poultry production could also bolster soybean meal use.

Domestic use of soybean oil should be up about three percent over 1981, says Feagan. Exports of soybean oil and meal depend heavily on the European

Economic Community and Japan. The EEC took about 45 percent of all U.S. soybean exports and more than 60 percent of our soybean meal exports last year, so this market share holds the key to prices.

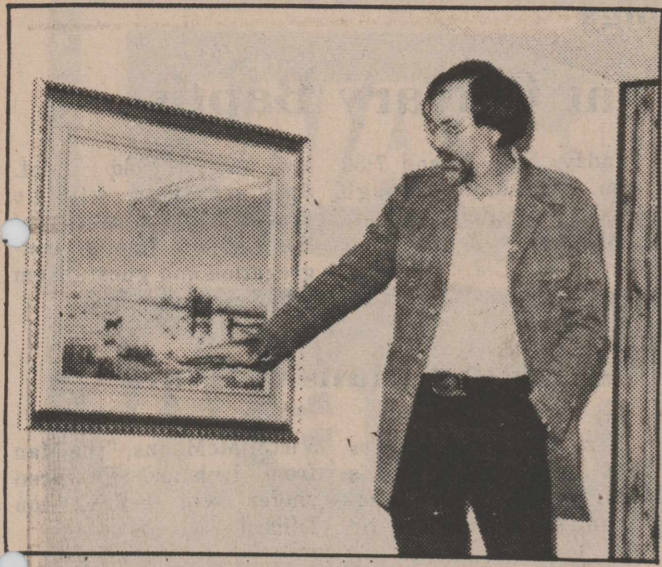
Feagan expects prices for the 1982 soybean crop to average between \$4.75 and \$5.75 per bushel. And farmers can expect little price improvement for the 1983 crop unless acreage is cut sharply. Full participa-

tion of grain and oilseed farmers in the government set-aside program could benefit soybean growers, but the likelihood of improved soybean prices in 1983 is fairly remote, says the economist.

For the next several weeks we'll be regressing in time via some of my mother's recipes which she has collected for many, many years. Bill and I are in the process of building a new house so consequently, all of my own recipes are momentarily in storage.

Since the ones I'll be using are all in the dessert category, it would be wonderful if those of you who follow my column could send some other types of recipes to share. How about it, gang? Can't put your name up in lights, but I promise we'll put it in print!

PECAN CAKE
This is a wonderfully chewy cake.

- 1 pound butter
- 1 pound pecan halves
- 1 pound brown sugar
- 1/2 pound candied cherries
- 1/2 pound candied pineapple
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 6 large eggs, separated (yolks in separate bowl)
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 ounces pure lemon extract

Cream butter and sugar; add egg yolks one at a time, beating after each.

Sift baking powder with 2 cups of flour.

Add lemon extract alternately to the creamed mixture.

Dredge fruit and nuts with the remaining 2 cups of flour and add to the creamed mixture. Then add stiffly beaten egg whites and let stand overnight.

Next morning bake in a greased tube pan in 225° F. oven for three and a half hours. Upon taking it out of the oven, turn it upside

down so the butter can drain back through it. Good!

MAYONNAISE CAKE
Ever find that you're in the mood to bake a cake but you're out of shortening, milk and eggs? Not to worry! Try this instead.

- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup cocoa
- 1 cup water
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise (or salad dressing)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift all ingredients together several times. Add water, mayonnaise and vanilla, stir until smooth. Pour into two 8-inch layer pans which have been lined with paper or lightly greased.

Bake in 350° F. oven for 30-35 minutes. Cool and frost.

GERMAN CARROT CAKE

"This cake tastes a little like German chocolate cake," says Kay Jaworski who sent in this recipe to a newspaper goodness knows when! You be the judge.

- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 cups cooking oil
- 4 eggs
- 3 cups grated carrots
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon

Cream sugar and oil, add eggs, then dry ingredients, fold in carrots last.

Bake in layer pans (lightly greased) at 350° F. about 30 minutes. Test with toothpick. Cook and frost.

- 8 ounce package cream cheese at room temperature
 - 1/4 stick butter
 - 1/2 box powdered sugar
 - 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Mix well, frost and enjoy!

Lack of vitamin B-12 can cause unpleasant odor

Q. You're going to think this is strange, but I have a friend who has a terrible body odor. Could a vitamin deficiency cause this?

A. Vitamin B-12 deficiency can cause an unpleasant body odor. Other signs of this type of deficiency are a sore tongue and mouth, neuritis, nervousness, menstrual disturbances, back stiffness and pain and difficulty in walking.

Q. My hair has recently become very dry and lifeless. I'm taking a good multi-vitamin and plenty of extra C and E. What else do I need?

A. When vitamin A is undersupplied, the hair can become dry and lacking in

luster and sheen. Nutritionists usually recommend from 25,000 to 50,000 units of A daily.

Also, research has shown that dry, lifeless hair may take on a glossy luster when a good salad oil (cold-processed vegetable oil such as safflower, soy, etc.) is added to the diet. The amount to use appears to be one or two tablespoons daily.

(An added bonus is that dry, scaly skin has been known to become soft and lovely with the use of vegetable oil.)

Lines blur between church, state

FORT WORTH — The erosion of lines between church and state is causing increasing concern in recent years, said Dr. Ronald B. Flowers, an associate religion professor at Texas Christian University.

Conservatorship is a method by which parents or other relatives of a cult member can obtain a court order to have the person legally released into their care for deprogramming. The order is granted on the idea that cult members are detained against their will and do not have the physical or mental capacities to care for themselves.

Such cases the judge has to make a decision on what kind of religious group the cult is — that is, whether it's a good group or a bad group.

Deprogramming, political activism, church taxation and prayer in public schools are some of the issues of current concern. Deprogramming of religious cult members, or "counterbrainwashing," has taken several forms — including the controversial method of conservatorship proceedings, he said.

Conservatorship therefore restores the freedom of choice to the young people, he said.

In most cases, he said, a cult was involved, the judge almost always decided it was a bad religion.

Flowers said the proceedings raise a church-state question because in

"This is a potentially harmful situation from a church-state standpoint," he said. "It sets a dangerous and unfortunate precedent for judges to make a judgment about the validity of a religion simply on the basis of rather brief and one-sided testimony."

Art, motorcycles bring pleasure to Buck Busch

The license plate on his motorcycle — a big Honda with most (if not all) the comforts — says, "Buck's Toy." Sometimes he and his wife, Louise, hop on it for a ride to Tivoli . . .

"It's my hobby," says E.T. (Buck) Busch. "All 74-year-old men should take it up."

Motorcycle riding isn't Buck's only hobby. He has another for which he's better known, certainly since his work went on exhibit this month in the lobby of First National Bank.

Buck is a marquetrarian — which is a tongue-twisting word for someone who assembles wood veneers into a picture (marquetry) or a geometric design (parquetry).

"It's an ancient art," Buck said during a recent interview at his home on FM 3036. Although the origins of marquetry are unknown, samples of the art have been found in the tombs of Egyptian kings dating back to 3100 B.C.

It's also a painstaking art: Using not much more than an Exacto knife and glue, the marquetrarian works with pieces of wood no more than one-fortieth to one-thirty-sixth of an inch thick — and even then, because of the toughness of some of the woods used, he often must make the same cut many times over in order to slice through the wood without breaking the knifeblade.

"It's fascinating work," says Buck. "People don't realize how many types of wood there are." He produces a book on marquetry (and parquetry) that includes a list of the different types of wood used by marquettrians. "There are 240 different woods in here," he says. "Six types just of walnut."

Buck has been a marquet-

trarian for about 12 or 13 years now and when asked how he became involved he shrugs and says, "I don't know. I sent off for a kit because it looked interesting, but when it came, it wasn't any fun. The wood was pre-cut — just a jigsaw puzzle. So I sent off for a kit with uncut wood."

From that point, Buck was hooked. His home is filled with examples of his work: pictures, geometric designs, marquetry and parquetry designs on cabinets, tables . . .

Buck says he's given away about 20 of his pieces, but he hasn't sold any even though he's had offers from people who wanted to buy his work. But he's not in it for the money — "It's strictly a hobby." A member of the Marquetry Society of America — which has 1,003 members throughout the 50s states — what Buck would like is to find some others in this area who are interested in the art form.

"You get two, three people involved in it," he says, "you can swap veneers, exchange ideas."

A native of Alvin, Buck brought himself and Louise to Rockport 18 years ago from Dallas where he had been employed for 20 years by Braniff as a power plant inspector. "We'd been coming down here for years and years on vacation," Buck said. "When I retired, we looked at Florida and California — then came here."

Louise puts in they went to George West for that. "We have a lot of birds around here," she observed, "but we don't shoot them. We feed 'em."

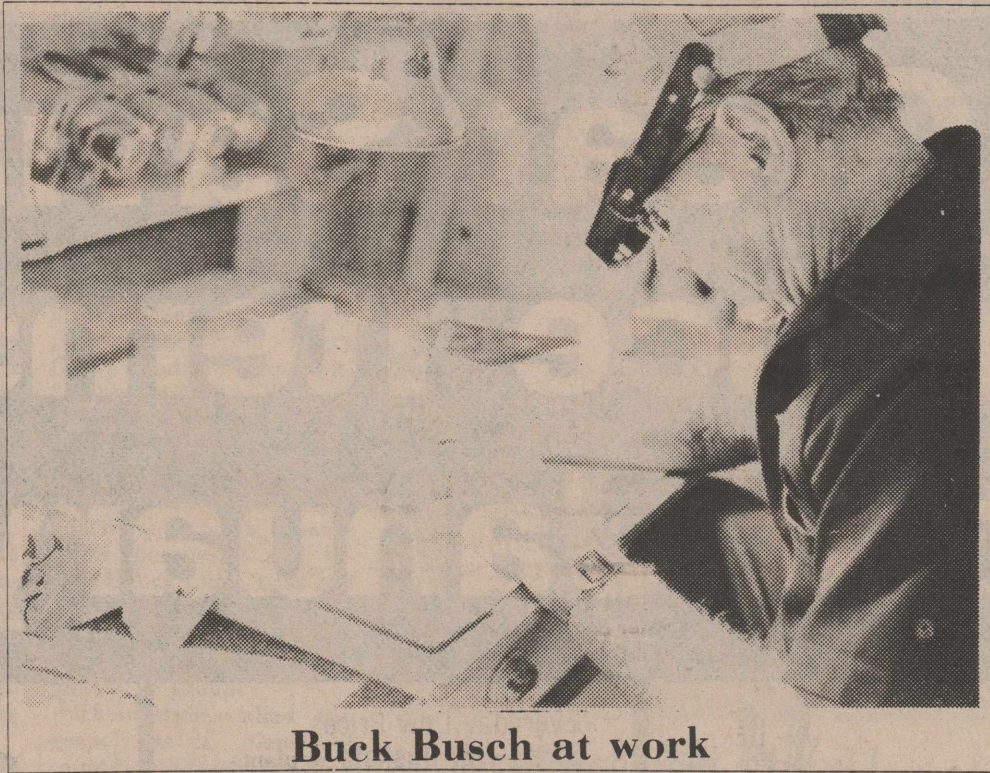
He's an active Shriner and has used his talents in marquetry to make pictures for various Shrine organizations.

you think I would be safe in leaving her in the enclosed yard unattended? I don't want her to get bred.

Dear Frances,

Females that are in heat must be guarded carefully. Male dogs will either dig under your fence or climb

over it to breed a female. Do not trust a fence to protect your pet from being bred by an unwanted male. She should be kept in the house during the 21 days she is in season. When she is allowed outside, the pet owner should be right beside her, leash in hand. Dr. H.H. Lutz

Wilds on Wildlife

Christmas bird count takes dedication

This is not pleasure bird-watching, it is serious, get-down-to-work statistics-gathering. It happens every year at Christmas-time when the Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC) goes into action. A day is picked between certain dates for a particular area and that is the day the count must be made, no matter what the weather is like. This year the dates were between Dec. 17 and Jan. 2.

The Christmas counts this year on the whole seem to be about normal. We'd had early sightings of western species that don't usually come this far east, and a few showed up on the Christmas counts — some green-tailed towhees and a Say's phoebe, plus my little faithful black-throated gray warbler.

As I said before, the CBC is work, not play, but some of the counters are remarkably dedicated. The champion of the counts this year was Charlie Clark. Charlie, a retired engineer, moved from Chicago to Rockport in Oct. 1979.

Although he was suffering from a leg injury from a bike fall he had received several weeks earlier, he went on seven counts, most of them back to back. That means that he got up before

daylight, was at the count site by daybreak, stayed in the field all day counting birds (often under miserable weather conditions), and didn't return home until after dark. Then he

got up the next day and did it again. The seven counts that he did included: Corpus Christi west (Calallen, Annville), Kingsville, Port Aransas, Welder Wildlife Refuge, Flour

Bluff (Corpus Christi east), Aransas National Wildlife Refuge and Padre Island.

We only managed to do three counts this year, mainly because I was out of town part of the time. Our counts included Welder Wildlife Refuge, Flour Bluff and the Rio Corona count in Taumalipas, Mexico (more about this count next week).

The Kingsville count was conducted by Dr. Allan Chaney with 17 other counters helping. One hundred and thirty species were counted with a total of 23,432 (blackbirds are a large part of the total). Temperatures ranged from about 48 degrees to 60 degrees with a bitter wind blowing. The more unusual species on the count were in Mary Tryer's backyard! She had two red-breasted nuthatches. Other goodies in her yard, but not seen for the count, were a western tanager and a brown creeper. Mary's yard is becoming famous in bird-watching circles.

The Flour Bluff count had 43 participants led by Bob Fraley of Portland. A total of 151 species were seen, compared to 137 last year. But total numbers were so down that it ranked as 2nd or 3rd lowest total number of birds counted, ever. Most unusual species on this count was a whimbrel, Kiskadee, Say's phoebe, red-breasted nuthatch and a wood thrush.

The Padre Island count, led by ranger Richard Harris was a miserable day's work. There has been enough rain to turn the island into a marsh of one and one-half inches to six inches of standing water to wade through. Those in the boats all day counting in the bay were really frozen.

The Welder Wildlife Refuge count had an unforeseeable problem. Fog was so thick at the beginning of the count that we couldn't find our correct count areas! Gene Black-

lock led this count with 29 people. One hundred and fifty-eight species were recorded with 19,586 birds in all.

The count that recorded the most species, 193, was the Corpus Christi west count, also led by Gene Blacklock.

The Port Aransas count includes Aransas Pass and Ingleside and was one of the most interesting of the counts this year. Warren Pulich of Port Aransas, had about 18 people counting. Out of 165 species they came up with some western species and a lot of crazy migrants that should have moved further south months ago. For instance they turned up a blue grosbeak, scissortail flycatcher and even a kiskadee and a nighthawk. Western species included a green-tailed towhee, ash-throated flycatcher, white-winged dove, rufous hummingbird and a Harris sparrow.

Waterbirds were in good supply and included 10,000 redheads and plenty of pintails and wigons. For about five years now this count has been highest in the nation for reddish egrets, a threatened species. There were 48 counted this year, which will probably be the national high again. A whimbrel, frigatebird and greater scaup were sighted, also.

For the information to be useful, the CBC count must be done within the official count period. This information is continually used in all types of on-going studies and can be very useful to the landowner, too, in determining the health of his land. So to tell us that we can count on Jan. 3, but not before, does not help us much, or him. It's difficult to understand that hunting is a higher priority than one day of counting birds. Fortunately, most landowners are very cooperative and it is greatly appreciated.

The phone service operates weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The best days to call to avoid a busy signal are Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. The least busy times to call are between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m.

IRS office — People may visit the Corpus Christi IRS office in the Smith Building, 425 Schatzel St., weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., to ask questions or pick up forms and publications.

Forms and publications

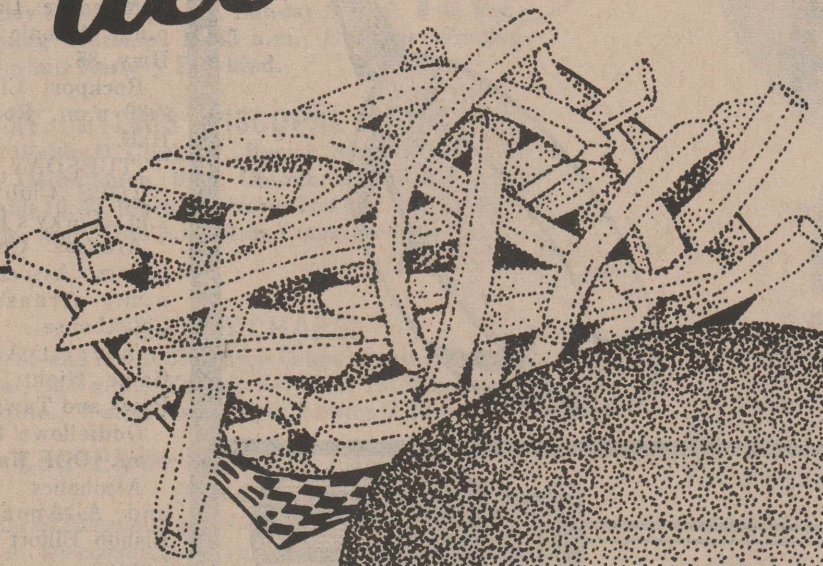

Article VI provides for initiative, referendum, recall

Editor's note: Because of the length of Article VI of Rockport's proposed city charter, only the first eight sections of the article were printed in last week's Pilot weekend edition. The remaining sections are published this week. The charter in its entirety will be presented to Rockport's city council Monday night, Jan. 24, for consideration and the calling of a charter election.

Sec. 6.09 ACTION ON INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM PETITIONS

(1) When an initiative or referendum petition has been finally determined sufficient, the City Council shall promptly consider the proposed initiative ordinance in the manner prescribed for enacting ordinances or reconsider the referred ordinance by voting repeal. If the City Council fails to adopt a proposed initiative ordinance without any change in substance within sixty days, or fails to repeal a referred ordinance within thirty days after the date the petition was finally determined sufficient, it shall submit the proposed or referred ordinance to the voters of the City not less than thirty days nor more than sixty days following the failure of the City Council to act as specified herein. Any election order so issued shall comply fully with the Texas Election Code.

(2) The called election may coincide with a regular City election should such City election fall within the specified period. Special elections on initiated or referred ordinances shall not be held more frequently than once each six months, and no ordinance substantially the same as a referred ordinance which has been approved at any election may be initiated by the voters within two years from the date of such election. Copies of the proposed or referred ordinance shall be made available at the polls and shall be published at least once in the official newspaper of the City not more than fifteen days immediately preceding the date of the election.

Sec. 6.10 CALLING OF RECALL ELECTION

(1) If the officer whose removal is sought does not resign, then the City Council shall order an election and set the date for holding such recall election. The date selected for the recall election shall be not less than twenty-five days nor more than thirty-five days after the date the petition was presented to the City Council, or from the date of the public hearing, if one was held. Any election order so issued shall comply fully with the Texas Election Code.

Sec. 6.11 WITHDRAWAL OF PETITIONS

(1) An initiative, referendum or recall petition may be withdrawn at any time prior to determination of sufficiency by filing with the City Secretary a request for withdrawal signed by at least six members of the petitioners committee. Upon the filing of such request the petition shall have no further force or effect and all proceedings thereon shall be terminated.

Sec. 6.12 FORM OF BALLOTS

(1) Ordinances shall be submitted by ballot title, which shall be prepared in all cases by the City

Holl teaches music course

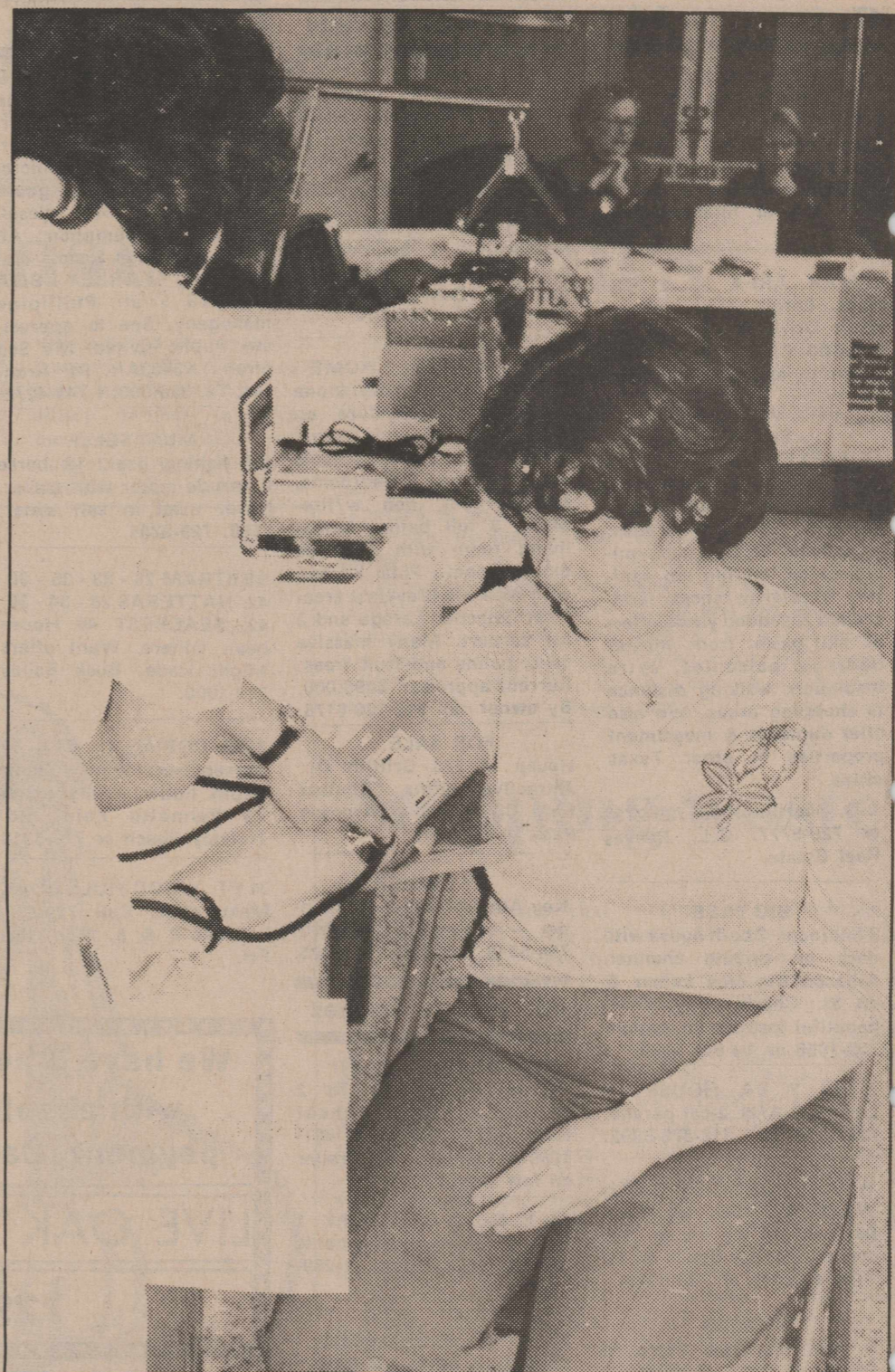

Proposed city charter

Attorney. The ballot title may be different from the legal title of any such initiated or referred ordinance and it shall be a clear, concise statement, without argument or prejudice, descriptive of the substance of such ordinance. Immediately below the ballot title shall be printed the following two statements, one above the other, in the order indicated:

"For adoption of the ordinance" and "Against adoption of the ordinance"

Immediately below or to the left of such statement shall appear a square in which the voter may cast his vote by making a mark.

(2) Ballots used at recall elections shall, with respect to each person whose removal is sought, submit the question:

"Shall (name of person) be removed from the office (name of office) by recall?"

Immediately below each such question there shall be printed the two following statements, one above the other, in the order indicated.

"For the removal of . . . by recall."

"Against the removal of . . . by recall."

Immediately below or to the left of such statement shall appear a square in which the voter may cast his vote by making a mark.

Sec. 6.13 RESULTS OF ELECTION

(1) If a majority of qualified electors voting on a proposed initiative ordinance vote in its favor, it shall be considered adopted upon certification of the election results and shall be treated in all respects in the same manner as ordinances of the same kind adopted by the City Council. If conflicting ordinances are approved at the same election, the one receiving the greater number of affirmative votes shall prevail.

(2) An ordinance adopted by initiative may be repealed or amended at any time after the expiration of two years by a majority vote of the city council.

(3) If a majority of the qualified electors voting on a referred ordinance vote against the ordinance, it shall be considered repealed upon certification of the election results. If a majority of the qualified electors voting on a referred ordinance vote for the ordinance, the ordinance shall be considered in effect.

(4) An ordinance repealed by referendum may be re-enacted at any time after the expiration of two

years by a majority vote of the City Council.

(5) If a majority of the votes cast on the question of recall at a recall election shall be against the removal of the elected official named on the ballot, he shall continue in office for the remainder of his unexpired term, subject to recall as before within the limitations of Sec. 6.14 below. If a majority of the votes cast on the question of recall at a recall election shall be for the removal of the elected official named on the ballot, he shall, regardless of any technical defects in the recall petition, be deemed removed from office and the vacancy shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of this Charter for the filling of vacancies.

Sec. 6.14 LIMITATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

(1) No recall petition shall be filed against any officer of the City within six months after his election or appointment, nor within six months of such a petition being filed and found insufficient, nor within one year after an election for such officer's recall.

(2) In no instance shall an officer removed from office by recall election serve in an elective office of the City within a period of three years following the date of the election at which he was removed from office.

(3) Unless successfully withdrawn, no petition shall again be filed on a proposed or referred ordinance of substantially the same content within a period of two years of the failure of the petition at a City election.

Sec. 6.15 FAILURE OF CITY COUNCIL TO CALL AN ELECTION

(1) In case all of the requirements of this Charter have been met and the City Council shall fail or refuse to receive an initiative, referendum or recall petition, or order such initiative, referendum or recall election, or discharge other duties imposed upon said City Council by the provisions of this Charter with reference to initiative, referendum or recall, then the County Judge of Aransas County, Texas may discharge any such duties herein provided to be discharged by the City Secretary or by the City Council. In addition, any qualified voter in the City may seek judicial relief to have any of the provisions of this Charter pertaining to initiative, referendum or recall carried out by the proper official.

and do a study on it and tell the ACND what is needed for the area.

"How many of those folks live here?" asked a man in the audience. Holman replied probably none of them. "Then how do they know what we need?" asked the audience member.

"They probably don't know the needs of Aransas County as well as the people who live here," said Dave Maguglin.

"Kirk, I think the first thing we should have these people research is why we can't get a permit to build a new harbor at Cove Harbor North. We've hit a stump down there," said Maguglin.

The biggest controversy of the evening came when the commissioners began the discussion of retail sales from boats at Fulton and Rockport Harbors.

Aransas County Navigation District Chairman Bobby Landrum told the board members and the large audience of shrimpers that some complaints have been made that several persons are selling oysters from their boats as they are backed up to the seawall at Fulton Harbor. Several shrimpers said they couldn't get their boats in or out of the slips.

One shrimper said he had been threatened by a man who had his boat backed up to the seawall selling oysters.

DeForest said in order to discourage the practice he has been charging them 25 cents a sack to sell from the boats.

"If it gets out of hand we will have to step in and make some rules or raise the dockage in March," said Landrum.

Landrum said he knew the shrimpers were having a hard time and that some of them are having a hard time making it.

"Mr. Chairman, everybody in this country is having a hard time but we don't subsidize the Radio Shack or Sail Printing or the bank," said Holman.

"We need to take those bulkhead slips and say they are retail slips and charge \$100

a month for those slips," Holman continued. Maguglin said he didn't feel that any boat should be allowed to tie up if it interferes with other boats getting in and out.

Holman said he thinks it is ridiculous for someone to have to pay only \$30 a month and then be in the retail business.

One man in the audience spoke up, "If the wholesale houses won't buy oysters, what are we supposed to do — starve? Don't you understand that this is forced on us?"

"Legally they can't sell oysters off their boats. You have to have a walk-in freezer to be certified," said Holman.

"The houses are certified but the oysters are not," responded a member of the audience.

One shrimper asked why the ACND didn't develop a fisherman's wharf and develop a market so people would know it was here.

Reese Rozzell, asked his opinion, told the board members he didn't believe the board should condone, assist or encourage the violation of a state law by allowing the practice of retail sales from the back of boats.

The discussion moved to the proposed boat ramp to be built in Fulton Harbor, and the members of the audience said they believe the location proposed is one of the worst locations in the harbor.

Holman said there isn't a need for a boat ramp in Fulton Harbor, adding that another ramp in the area didn't have 15 boats using it during a crowded summer day.

One audience member said it is just the rich people who want a boat ramp in the area and said he launches his boat from the old ramp.

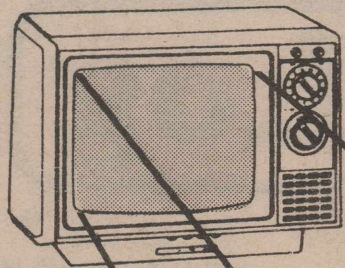
One audience member brought a round of support for himself when he asked the commissioners, "Why do you just try to spend money? Why don't you find out what the people of the county really want?"

Soap Beat

Survey finds soaps are popular campus habit

College fads, like goldfish swallowing in the 1930s and streaking in the 1970s, may be somewhat silly or, like Vietnam War protest rallies in the 1960s, may be overly serious.

But profitable is the right word to describe the college fad of the '80s — soap opera watching. No network knows this better or exploits it more than ABC, which sponsored a study last spring of student soap opera watching habits at 11 major universities around the country. More than 1,000 students responded to a special questionnaire made up by the ABC Research Unit. A staggering 70 percent of the respondents claimed to watch ABC's "General Hospital" at least once a week. ABC's "All My Children" and "One Life to Live" followed "GH" in college popularity.

ABC found that the reasons the students prefer their brand of soaps over the other networks are because they are "the most interesting and involving" and "the most likely to try new things."

More than three years ago ABC started an increased focus on storylines featuring young people. College students can, for example, better relate the problems of

"AMC's" college student sweethearts Jenny and Greg (Kim Delaney and Laurence Lau), or "OLTL's" teen heartthrobs Cassie and Gary (Cusi Cram and Jeff Fahey) than the middle-aged love teams such as Bob and Miranda (Don Hastings and Elaine Princi) on CBS's "As the World Turns" or Rachel and Mac (Victoria Wyndham and Doug Watson) on NBC's "Another World."

The survey also found that college soap opera watchers are also active people. Sixty percent are successful in reaching their goals. Sixty-nine percent said they often participate in games, sports and other activities.

It seems that soap opera watching is much better for the health of college students than goldfish swallowing.

Powerful 'Journey's End'

"Journey's End," starring Maxwell Caulfield and Andrew Stevens, is the latest "Broadway on Showtime" special. The play, which airs on the pay-TV service throughout

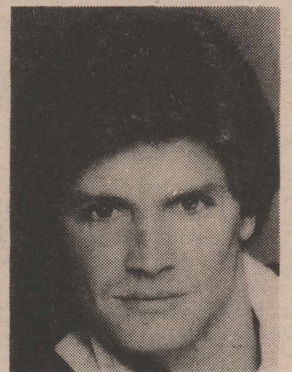

Arthur Hill, Eric Roberts and Conchata Ferrell star in Nathaniel West's "Miss Lonelyhearts," to air on PBS' "American Playhouse" series on Tuesday, Jan. 25. (Air dates may vary; please check local listings.)

The new television adaptation has been translated into a one-hour production by young filmmakers H. Jay Holman and Michael Dinner.

The drama centers on a young reporter (Roberts) on a large metropolitan daily newspaper who is assigned to write the popular advice to the lovelorn column.

In the process, he becomes entangled in the personal lives of the troubled people seeking salvation by airing their private agonies in public. Despite the adverse effect the column has on his life, the reporter continues to try and get past his editor's cynical approach and perpetuate the sincerity and honesty of the human race.

Offbeat Poston in with 'inn' crowd

Since the early days of TV, veteran actor and comedian Tom Poston has been a fixture on the tube. He's starred in a wide range of shows—from the "Steve Allen Show," to "To Tell the Truth" panel show to "Mork and Mindy." This year, he's featured on CBS' sitcom, "Newhart."

Poston portrays George, an employee of the Vermont inn run by Bob Newhart and his wife.

He says of Newhart: "He is adorable and endearing. Some people think he's bumbling, but I think he is just a man who is in his own world... someone who thinks parallel to everyone else."

Poston also relishes working with Newhart.

"You can see his mind at work on the show," says Poston.

"With Bob, suggestions are welcome, but that does not mean they are all accepted with open arms. We don't have a license to interrupt what's going on by pitching random ideas, but he lets us inject things that are creative. And, I'm a live audience performer, which I love (the show is taped in front of a live audience at CBS).

"I guess the biggest dif-

ference in TV over the years is that there is no more live TV," says Poston.

"Live TV had more pressure than today's filmed or taped shows. Back then we felt as if we were pioneer-

ing TV by doing something different. TV has hardly broken new ground in that respect.

"I still think live variety TV could work today. Perhaps they should let a piece of scenery fall down. It puts the blood back into the show. Steve Allen was the best at covering up mistakes and the results were hilarious. I used to cry, he was so funny."

Because of his roles on "Steve Allen" and "Mork and Mindy," Poston himself has been typed as an offbeat character.

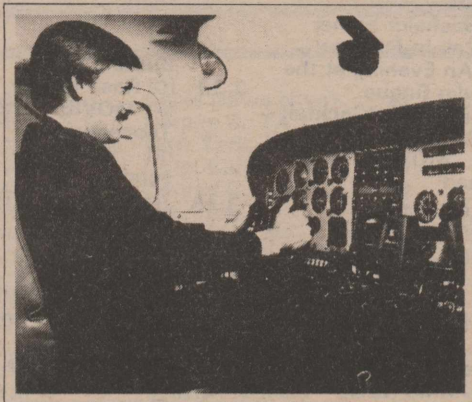
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
