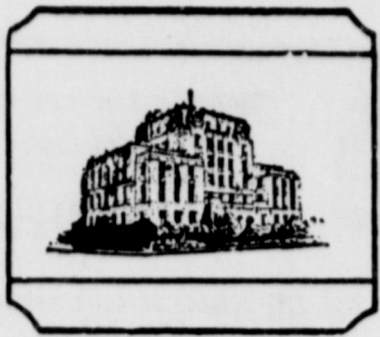

BIG RED CRUSHES COLEMAN, 12-0 in Classic Mavericks Face Stamford In Bi-District Clash Friday

Tickets on Sale Monday Here

The Eastland Mavericks, the team with a stately scheme, won all the District 8-AA marbles Friday night before a capacity Maverick Stadium crowd when they dumped

Coleman, 12-0, and announced that they're going to play in the big league.

Big Red will face Stamford Friday night next at P.E. Shotwell Stadium in Abilene

for Bi-District honors, with a 7:30 kickoff. Tickets go on sale here Monday at 9 a.m. at \$2.00 FOR ADULTS, \$1.00 FOR STUDENTS. No student tickets will be sold at the gate on game night.

It was a fitting closing with the Mavericks putting together a perfect regular season with 10 wins and no losses, amassing 443 points and allowing only 32 to be scored against them.

The Stamford Bulldogs will be the opponents for the Mavericks in the first post-season duel and it'll be a bit of old home week, as the Bulldogs are coached by Charlie Smith,

long-time winning coach for the Neighbor Ranger Bulldogs.

Between 4,000 and 5,000 people jammed Maverick Stadium with cars overflowing the parking lots and parked alongside and in ditches on Int. 20 from the "Queen to the Courthouse".

A standout Maverick defensively defensive team refused to budge to the powerful Bluecats, who were able to mount several drives only to see them collapse to interceptions and ball-turn overs.

The good, but not great, Coleman team did their share of defensive work too, but the Mavericks racked up impressive statistics, and in any other ballgame undoubtedly would have registered any number of scores. They gained a fantastic 290 yards rushing, good for 19 first downs and added 106 yards in the air with six of Quarterback Craig Lund's ten tosses going for the good.

End Bob Mace did his usual thing, snagging two important Coleman aeriels.

On the other side of the ledger, the Mavericks mis-cued a number of times as evidenced by their penalties column. They had eight for 50 which indicated that the entire team wasn't up to its usual standards.

Most reasoned that it could have been the excitement of the most crucial game. Coleman denied Eastland last year on a show-down shoot-out, 7-6 (on a questioned block PAT took), and the Mavericks were hungry for this win, this night.

Both teams were high for the game, with the visitors appearing to have maybe peaked in a week-long of football fever at Coleman where the game was being played daily. It appeared that the whole town came to Eastland Friday night.

On the other hand, Coach Shirley Frazier, his staff, the entire administration, and the town as a whole, awaited the important game on a low key: maintaining regular schedules and doing serious preparations for the big night without a lot of extra hoop-la.

The lack of extra-window painting and hell-raising in general was no indication of a lack of enthusiasm on the part of the Maverick fans. They had it, and brought it all with them to Maverick Stadium to boost their mighty warriors.

And the careful, methodical, stick-to-business approach proved to be the right one for the Big Red. There was no doubt but that they could do it—all they had to do, was do it. And they did, in spades.

The Bluecat defense held: once on the three-inch line, at the 20 and any number of other times.

It was a first and fourth for the scoring people, with the first tally coming late in the first and the last very, very late in the fourth.

Junior Tailback Howard King led the ground attack with 165 yards and Quarterback Lund brought his completion total to 38 of 35 passes.

James Eldson, Joe Herrera and Bob Mace were the key Eastland defenders.

The Mavericks marched 72 yards on 12 plays to score on their first possession. Running

Busy Night Ahead for Commission

The regular monthly meeting of the Eastland City Commission Monday evening is likely to be a busy session with a lot of key points on the agenda.

The Commission will meet at 5:30 p.m. at the City Hall for a on-the-spot look-see around town to determine areas where improvements can be made.

Meeting back at the City Hall at 7 for the regular meeting, the commission agenda will include these items:

The City Pound, City Property, Beautification, four-way stop signs, budget and salaries, the two city dump grounds, consideration of a possible site for the new city sewer plant, and discussion of the million dollar apartment complex now under con-

struction here.

The Commission passed an ordinance this week regarding the drilling of oil wells within the city limits. (Text of the ordinance appears as a legal notice in this issue.)

The city is looking for another location for the new sewer plant after land owners of the property previously decided upon elected not to sell.

The city's new sanitary land fill program is in operation south of town with all the city's garbage being hauled there for burial. Last word from the Cisco City Commission is that they are still studying to determine if they can economically afford to haul their refuse the distance from there to here to utilize the Eastland disposal facilities.

They had previously requested consideration of their using the landfill here in return for proper remuneration.

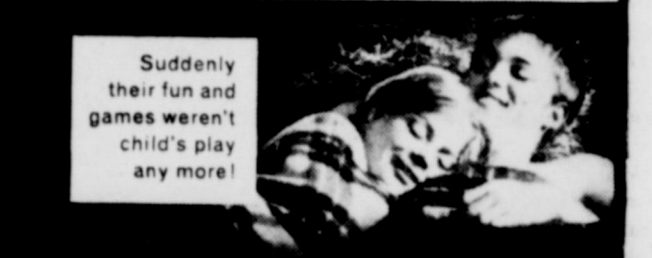

Texas Food And Fiber Week Proclaimed

Eastland County Judge Bailey has been named chairman of the local Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week observance which will be November 15-21, the week before Thanksgiving, according to C.G. Scruggs, Dallas, vice president and editor of The Progressive Farmer magazine and chairman of the board of the statewide council promoting the special event.

Judge Bailey is expected to call on agricultural and business leaders in the county to work as a committee in promoting appreciation for the abundance of food and fiber from the state's farms and ranches.

Texas Governor Preston Smith and John C. White, state commissioner of agriculture, are honorary chairmen for the statewide observance. Leon Slaughter, Abilene, projects director for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is coordinator for the Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Council, a non-profit organization chartered in May, 1971, "to

sponsor public relations programs designed to gain consumer appreciation for the abundance, quality and value of food and fiber."

In addition to Slaughter and Scruggs, the other charter directors of the Council include Dr. H.O. Kunkel, dean of agriculture, Texas A & M University; Dr. Wayland Bennett, vice president for academic affairs, Texas Tech University; and Don Blacketer, Honey Grove farmer. The latter three serve as vice chairmen. James L. (Curly) Hays, Abilene, West Texas Utilities Co., is treasurer of the Council.

A large number of professional people in agriculture-related businesses, organizations, state and federal agencies, news media, and educational institutions working in the Council

The first organizational meetings of the Council were held in February in Fort Worth and Austin. Task force committees met in April in Austin, and the finance committee held its first meeting June 29 in Houston. Money to finance news releases, films for television and tapes for radio will come from voluntary contributions.

In the letter naming Judge Bailey as chairman of the county Food and Fiber observance, Scruggs pointed out that agriculture is today—and has been for many years—the number one industry in the State of Texas.

"In this day and age of confusion and confrontation, drugs, pollution, etc., all of us tend to forget that through the unparalleled efficiency of agriculture, America is the best-fed—and at the least cost—

of any nation in the world," Scruggs said.

The Council state chairman said that even though a large part of Texas' population is now found in urban areas, the food and fiber industry of Texas figures strongly in the daily economic life of every Texan.

"Over and above that," Scruggs added, "the bountiful array of food and natural fibers available to all is a blessing which no other nation enjoys."

To call attention to these facts, the week just before Thanksgiving—November 15-21—has been designated as "Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week." County judges all across Texas are being asked to give leadership to the effort on the county level.

News media are being asked to contribute free time and space for publicizing the statewide celebration.

Tom C. Hart Named To New Post



A Cisco man, Tom C. Hart, 50 has been appointed to serve as Eastland County probation officer, according to Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey.

Hart is a native of Cisco, a graduate of Cisco Junior College and Texas A & M Extension Service Basic Law Enforcement School. In addition Hart has had previous law enforcement experience while in the military service.

The appointment, effective Monday November 8th, runs through August 1972.

In addition to serving as County Juvenile Officer, Hart will also act as adult probation officer, under authority granted by Judge Earl Conner Jr.

The post of Eastland County probation officer was recently made possible through funds granted exclusively for this purpose by the Federal Emergency Employment Act.

Assistant Manager Bob Green discussed the functions of the association. Later in the morning the group toured the Gorman Peanut Plant. Wilber Shell showed the visitors all the processes the peanuts go through from the time they arrive from the farm until they are shelled and stored in cold storage.

He stated that his work would consist of checking on the cases handed him by the judge as well as some counseling and guidance work for the County.

Mr. Hart said that he was pleased to accept the position as probation officer, and that he would be working in and out of his office in the Court house.

Mr. Hart said that he still believed that "an ounce of prevention was worth a pound of cure."

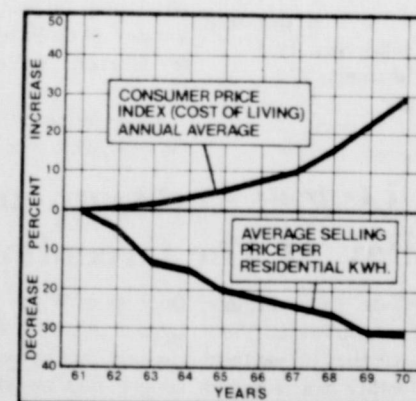

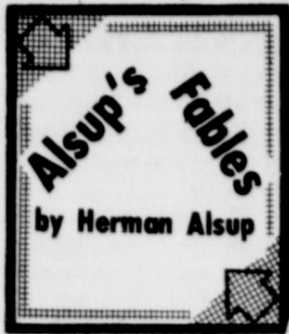
While the cost of living is up about 30 percent over 1961, the average price of electricity per residential kilowatt hour is down more than 30 percent (see chart).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. That no person or property proposing to drill a well for the discovery and or production of oil and or gas within the City of Eastland, Texas, shall drill any such well or commence drilling

operations for any such well within 200 feet of any house, apartment or other building used for residential purposes in said City unless such person or party shall have theretofore received written consent for such drilling or drilling operations from all owners of such houses or apartments or other buildings used for residential purposes located in said City within 200 feet of the location of such proposed well.

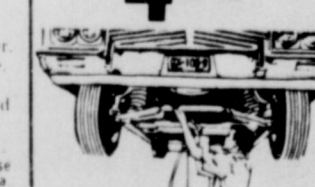
