Yankees Outplay Bums In First Game Of Series, Scoring 6-5

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—Two home runs by Joe Collins carried the New York Yankees to a 6-5 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers today in the first game of the 54th World Series. A crowd of 53,809 saw a slugfest match marked by five homers and a Dodger rally that fell just short of tying the score in the eighth inning.

Traffic Control Changes Okayed For 3rd, 4th

The city commissioners Tuesday night approved eight recommendations for better traffic control, as introduced by the Citizens Traffic Commission, and added three other changes of their own.

Commissioner Curtis Driver suggested that the traffic lights on Third and Fourth streets should be speeded up and the other commissioners quickly concurred. City Manager Herbert Whitney proposed the following plan which was adopted and will be put into effect in the near future.

Traffic lights on Third and Fourth streets are now on a "single alternate" system; that is, they all change at the same time with alternate lights being different. The new plan calls for a "double alternate" system which will have the lights changing in pairs. Thus two consecutive lights will be red, two consecutive lights will be green.

The traffic signals on the two one-way streets are now set at 14 miles per hour. There is a complete change in the signals every 35 seconds. A pedestrian has 17½ seconds to get across the street at any of the intersections.

The new plan will allow traffic to move at 24 miles per hour without stopping for a light. The complete cycle will take 40 seconds and pedestrians will have 2½ seconds more time to get across the street.

With this new plan, signs will be posted at regular intervals telling motorists the rate of speed at which the lights are set.

An addition to the traffic signals at Third and Main will be installed in the next few days. It is a green light designated "walk" and will be used as an experiment. The light was made from surplus parts here and if it is considered successful, others probably will be installed later on at other intersections.

It is designed for the convenience of pedestrians.

The commissioners also approved a plan to install signs reading "Right Turn Only" at each of the drives coming out of the Safeway Store parking lot on Gregg Street. This will be done to improve traffic conditions in the area.

The proposition of installing traffic signals at Third and Fourth streets at the Birdwell Lane intersection will be forwarded to the Citizens Traffic Commission for a recommendation.

The CTC recommendations included a signal light at the Fourth-Douglas intersection and a designated cross-walk for schoolchildren at State and Sixth.

This latter walk was recommended because about 90 per cent of the students at East Ward School use the intersection which has a considerable motor traffic.

The CTC recommendations included seven requests for "Yield Right of Way" signs at the following intersections: on 15th Street at Main, on East Sixth at Circle Drive, on Circle Drive at Stadium, on Pennsylvania at 17th Street, on 21st Street at Main, on Kinney at Sycamore and on Kinney at Stadium.

Paul Wakefield Quits As State Draft Director

AUSTIN (AP)—Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield resigned as state selective service director today, effective Sept. 30. Simultaneously, Gov. Allan Shivers announced recommendation to President Eisenhower that Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, present deputy, succeed Wakefield.

The governor recommended that Schwartz's appointment be effective Oct. 1.

Both Wakefield's resignation and the recommendation for Schwartz's advancement will go through the national director of Selective Service, Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, to the President.

Wakefield, who reached retirement age in the U.S. Army in May of this year, has been connected with state selective service in Texas since early in World War II. He had been director for more than six and a half years, receiving his appointment from former President Truman on recommendation of the late Gov. Beauford Jester.

Shivers sent a letter to Wakefield expressing "much regret" over his resignation.

"Our state, and especially its young people, have been fortunate to have this most important activity in the hands of so understanding, considerate and fine a gentleman," said Shivers, adding: "I think it was a fitting addition to your long career of service to Texas and to the United States that you should have headed the agency which so intimately affected the future of our young men during this important period of history."

"We all have reason to know and appreciate your ability to choose capable administrators, to deal with people in a warm and effective manner, and to enforce official regulations with humanity and understanding."

Wakefield issued a statement of tribute to "all members of the Selective Service family for their valued cooperation in running the state's draft boards."

"They are due most of the credit for whatever I may have accomplished," said Wakefield.

He described members of Texas draft boards as "little groups of big patriots" who are "giving their services free to their country, week in and week out, some of them for the past 15 years."

Another Juror Selected For Washburn Trial

SAN ANGELO, Tex. (AP)—One more juror was selected today for the murder trial of Harry L. Washburn, but this brought the total in two days to only three and attorneys were pessimistic about completing the panel.

Accepted was Kenneth Strickland, 32, a salesman.

Only two jurors were picked yesterday from a total of 32 men and women questioned in a long tedious session.

Most of them were excused because they already had a fixed opinion on whether or not the 39-year-old Houstonian planted the dynamite bomb that killed Mrs. Heen Harris Weaver last Jan. 19.

"Another day like this and we'll see whether we get to go to trial here," Dist. Atty. Aubrey Stokes said last night.

Defense Attorney Cliff Tupper said jury picking was taking "a lot longer" than he expected.

Only 53 members of the original 250-member venire remains and each side still has 12 challenges.

So far no motions asking that the trial be changed to another arena have been presented.

Picked as jurors yesterday were Mrs. Jack L. Downing, attractive gray-haired wife of a local service station operator, and Robert Mikeska, a tall, tanned farmer of Czech extraction.

Mrs. Downing said she had known Mrs. Weaver socially but would not let the friendship sway her deliberations of Washburn's fate. She is the first woman ever picked for a 51st District Court jury.

Earl Smith, special prosecutor hired by Mrs. Weaver's family, questioned prospective jurors closely for their feelings for the death penalty and circumstantial evidence.

"There were no eye witnesses who saw the bomb attached to Mrs. Weaver's car," Smith said several times, the first time the state has definitely indicated it had no such first-hand evidence.

Officers have said ten sticks of dynamite, hidden in the engine of the Weaver family car, exploded when Mrs. Weaver pressed the starter. Several persons nearby told officers they heard the early morning explosion and looked around to see debris flying through the air.

Several prospective jurors said they had known Mrs. Weaver, her family or her husband, Harry E. Weaver, former Houston architect.

Four Negroes were questioned but none were accepted.

Spectators benches occupying about half of the high-ceiling courtroom were filled most of the time although the low-voiced replies of some jurors could not be heard beyond the first two rows.

Most of the spectators were elderly men and women. There were several well-dressed women of middle-age and in one group, a teenage girl.

Washburn, again dressed in a neat blue suit and a white shirt, closely followed the questioning of each juror. When pointed out for identification he would jump to his feet and nod as if being introduced.

Several of the women, unaccustomed to court procedure, mumbled, "Glad to meet you."

The trial opened Monday with Judge Joe L. Mays overruling a defense request that the indictment against Washburn be dropped.

He also fixed six absent witnesses \$200 each.

Missing Marcus Baby Recovered

STOCKTON, Calif. (AP)—A grief-stricken woman who kidnaped a baby because she deceived her husband with a story of motherhood surrendered 11-day-old Robert Marcus to a Roman Catholic priest today.

Officers said she confessed stealing the baby from the nursery of a San Francisco hospital nine days ago.

Police Chief Jack O'Keefe said Mrs. Betty Benedicto, 27, of Stockton delivered the baby to the Rev. Allen McCoy at St. Mary's parish after telephone of Stockton delivered the baby infant's father in San Francisco, and instructing him to meet her here.

The baby is in excellent condition and police said there is no question he is Robert Marcus.

Dr. Marcus, 34, grinning for the first time since his son was stolen, said "We feel in our hearts he is ours. We are 99 per cent certain. But we will await footprint checks and blood tests."

Marcus and his grief-stricken wife, Hanna, 29, who has been in a state of near collapse since the kidnaping, made the 80-mile trip to Stockton in a San Francisco police car in 75 minutes.

Mrs. Benedicto, sobbing and near hysteria when taken to the Stockton police station, was booked on a technical holding charge.

Chief O'Keefe said he understood San Francisco authorities would charge her with kidnaping.

Dr. Marcus in appeals to the kidnaper for safe delivery of Robert, had promised he would not prosecute. Asked about that today, he said:

"I think the woman is a psychologically disturbed person."

"I myself have no further concern with the woman, other than to offer my thanks for the baby's return."

Chief O'Keefe quoted Mrs. Benedicto, wife of a prosperous publisher of a Filipino weekly newspaper, as saying she took the child because she had convinced friends, including her husband, she was pregnant.

The husband, Marcus Benedicto, 52, didn't know of the ruse, the chief said, and didn't become suspicious until last night. Then he went to police, almost at the moment his wife was telephoning Dr. Marcus, about 12:30 a.m. today.

O'Keefe said Mrs. Benedicto sobbed out this story:

She began gaining weight several months ago and people began teasing her about being pregnant. To stop the kidding, she said she was—and convinced her husband along with others.

When the approximate time came for a baby to arrive, she went to Los Angeles to visit her mother. Her mother put her on a diet. She lost several pounds and returned to Stockton. Her husband asked where the baby was. She told him it was sick but that she could get him in a couple of days.

When "Papa" Benedicto began passing out cigars, she went to San Francisco, looked over the Mt. Zion Hospital nursery and dashed away with the Marcus baby. She said she chose that particular one because Marcus was her husband's first name.

Mrs. Benedicto drove immediately back to Stockton with the baby and kept him in her three-room apartment—while possibly the greatest manhunt in the history of the San Francisco bay area was getting under way.

Then mental anguish set in. She said she loved the baby and wanted to keep him. But all the time her radio and television sets were blaring pleas from the grief-stricken father.

Storm Tosses Rough Threat At South Texas

Hurricane Janet tossed a rough weather threat at South Texas Wednesday as the mighty Brazos River started falling after a near-record rise on its upper reaches around Seymour.

A Weather Bureau advisory said the newest storm in the Gulf of Mexico was expected to hit the coast of Mexico between Vera Cruz and Tuxtla early Thursday. It was blowing gale winds 200 miles to the north and 100 miles to the south of the center.

The Weather Bureau warned tides would rise as far north as Port O'Connor, southeast of Victoria, and some low beaches were expected to be awash late Wednesday night.

The backlash of another hurricane, Hilda, which followed a path somewhat similar to the one Janet is taking caused heavy rains and some flooding in South Texas a few days ago.

Only scattered showers were forecast for Texas Wednesday.

Water Rates, Tap Charges Set For Coahoma District

COAHOMA — Tap fees, meter deposits and water rates have been set by directors of the Howard County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, which is to serve the area around Coahoma and Sand Springs.

The district now has a pipe line under construction from Big Spring to Coahoma. Treated water will be supplied from the Big Spring filtration plant under a contract with the City of Big Spring.

Pipe line tapping fee for HCW-CID customers will be \$15 and a \$5 meter deposit will be required. Rates for water will be a \$3.50 minimum for 3,000 gallons, plus \$1 per 1,000 for the next 2,000 gallons and 75 cents a 1,000 for all water used in excess of 5,000 gallons per month.

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Lake Thomas Still Gaining

Lake J. B. Thomas inched upward Wednesday morning, but indications were that the big rise from Borden County flash-floods of Sunday was about over.

The level at 11 a.m. stood at elevation 2253.47, and E. V. Spence, general manager for the Colorado River Municipal Water District, said that he figured the final level would be 2253.5. This would be only 4.5 feet below the service spillway level.

Lake Thomas already has picked up about 41,000 acre feet of new water from the rise. It now contains about 173,500 acre feet and covers 7,000 surface acres.

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Circular Drafted To Offer City's Bonds For Sale

City Commissioners Tuesday discussed the preliminary draft of the bond circular that will offer for sale \$915,000 of the recent \$990,000 city bond issue. The circular was explained to the commissioners by Ransom Gallaway, representative of the city's fiscal agents, Henry-Seay Company.

In brief, the circular describes the city's financial status and other obligations and offers general obligation and tax bonds totaling \$615,000 and water and sewer revenue bonds totaling \$800,000. Sealed bids for the bonds must be received before Nov. 8, 1955, at 5:15 p.m. The bonds will be dated Nov. 1, 1955, and will be extended over a 20-year period. The city will retain the right to payoff the general bonds in 13 years and the revenue bonds in 15 years. These latter options may enable the city to save considerable money in interest in later years.

Commissioners also looked at preliminary sketches and plans for the new fire station to be constructed at Eleventh Place and Birdwell Lane and the new Police Station to be constructed across the street, diagonally, from the city hall.

The city fathers tentatively approved the preliminary sketches of the police station, but they asked for further plans on the fire station. The present plans call for a driveway on Eleventh Place. The commissioners thought it might be better to have the drive on Birdwell or possibly a driveway on both streets.

ADVANTAGE OF WEARING SHORTS

Genoans Are Cool Characters While West Texans Burn Up

GENEVA (By Mail) — Sept. 1 was the hottest day of the year for Geno.

As the SS Independence slid into the harbor it was obvious to a Texan that he was back in Corpus Christi or Houston. It was apparent the second day out of New York, when the Independence got into the Gulf Stream, that Bermuda shorts were a regular part of men's summer apparel.

In Genoa when the port officials piled out of the pilot boat in their white uniforms with Bermuda-cut pants, West Texans in fall clothes realized again just how wrong one can be.

As you ride through France, Switzerland, and Italy in September it appears the shorts are shorter here than in Bermuda and that the men who have them cut half way to their knees wear them long compared with the women—particularly young women or women who imagine they are young.

Bicycles and motor scooters are the only mode of private travel within reach of the average European. Gasoline taxes, automobile sales taxes and taxes on tires make an automobile too expensive.

The Italians have two popular motor scooters—the Lambretta and the Vespa. They make more motor scooters than any other firms in the world, and these Italian motorcycles can compete anywhere in the world on quality or price.

Cities with the most bicycles registered per thousand population are Amsterdam, Hamburg and Geneva. Women seem to ride them

as readily as men.

It was amazing to see the nylon wire petticoat craze in Genoa. It can be said without fear of contradiction that the genius who put over this shorter-skirted style did not realize what he was doing for a woman riding a bicycle into the wind.

The crops are almost perfect in southern Europe this year. The fig trees are laden and the apple, peach and pear branches could not bear up with more fruit. Grapes are plentiful.

A traveler will be amazed at the number of acres of Indian corn now being grown in Italy and Switzerland. This is something new in southern Europe.

The tops are cut off the stalk after the tassels have fertilized the ear and are laid out on the grass to dry so they can be used to stuff mattresses. The ear is smaller than ours both in length and in diameter. It looks like popcorn. The shucks are saved when the corn matures.

Bean and pea vine stakes, grape trellises and a hundred other gar-

den needs make a straight stick something to be cherished in these lands where it takes a government permit to cut down a tree. In the last few years railroad right-of-ways, where garden stuff could not be grown, highway banks and gullies have been planted with locust trees. Set out close together they produce a quick growth of trees an inch in diameter and 10 to 12 feet high. These are cut in the bundles and stored under the eaves of the barn.

In Geneva every tourist is impressed with the statue of water near the center of the city where the Rhone flows out of Lake Geneva. The statue is a column of water pumped out of the lake and thrown 125 meters (about 390 feet) into the air. This gigantic fountain goes on each day at 10:30 in the morning and operates continuously until 11 o'clock at night. It can be seen from almost any point in Geneva and is an effective landmark of the city.

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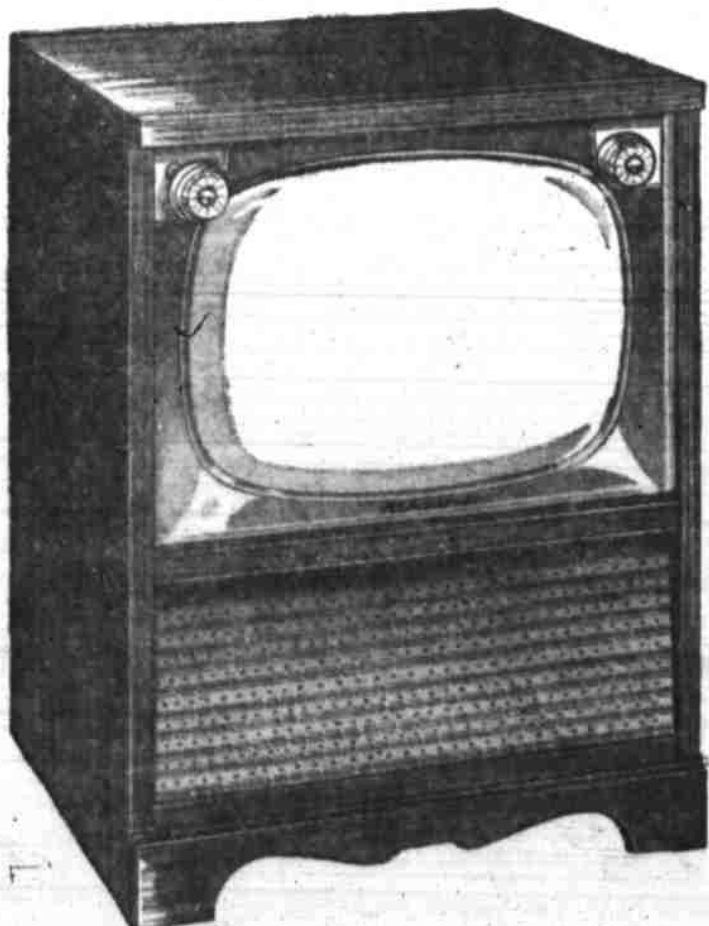
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Peace Attributed To Strength Policy

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Nationalist China declared today that any improvement in East-West relations is not due to Soviet good will but to "the policy of strength adopted by the free world."

Nationalist Foreign Minister George K. C. Yeh told the U. N. Assembly that collective security measures in Europe and Asia have served as the main block to the advance of world communism. Speaking in Chinese during the Assembly's annual policy debate, Yeh urged the free world to weigh carefully the Communists' latest peace offensive.

"Let us be sure that the Soviet motive is not a calculated effort to capitalize on the world's longing for peace and its abhorrence of war as a means of further extending Communist rule over the world," he cautioned.

He hailed President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace program as the harbinger of a new era after "10 years of frustrating negotiations with the Soviet Union on the international control of atomic energy."

But in their quest for peace, he continued, the non-Communist nations should not be deluded by every conciliatory move the Russians make.

"The peace tactic chimes in with the desperate hopes of a war-weary world so perfectly," he said, "that the smallest concessions, such as the release of illegally-held prisoners of war or the exchange of a few civil words between Soviet leaders and foreign diplomats are being eagerly seized upon as evidence of Soviet sincerity and a change of policy."

In a reference apparently to India, Yeh said some Asian nations were playing into Communist hands by following a policy of "neutrality."

The Communists, he charged, are capitalizing on Asian nationalism to speed the spread of communism in Asia.

Turning to Red China, Yeh said the Nationalist government on Formosa had a moral and legal obligation to help liberate the 500 million people now under Com-

munist rule on the mainland.

The Nationalists argue that despite its talks of peaceful coexistence and the "Geneva spirit," Moscow actually wants to shear the United Nations of its power to make any important decisions.

They point out that unification of Korea is still remote despite Communist claims of cooperation and content that the Peiping regime exercises a strong influence in North Viet Nam.

The Assembly went through three hours of heated debate last night without reaching a vote on whether to discuss the explosive Algerian question this year. It finally adjourned discussion until tomorrow afternoon.

Fourteen Asian and African states led by Egypt launched a determined effort to upset the steering committee recommendation to omit the dispute from the assembly's agenda.

The United States is supporting France's argument that Algeria is a domestic issue outside the competence of the Assembly.

Bomber Undergoes Hard Strain Test

SEATTLE (AP)—Five million dollars worth of bombing plane is being pulled, squeezed and squashed to pieces here to prove its structural strength.

The builder, Boeing Airplane Co. described the "torture test" on the B52 jet bomber as the most extensive structural proving program ever conducted on a single airplane.

The tests involve use of 60 miles of wiring and 3,000 strain gauge circuits and an intricate system of cables and pulleys.

Boeing said the tests saved time and money and provided precise information on the strain each plane part would stand under flight conditions.

Heavy Trading Kicks Stocks Upward In Continued Recovery

NEW YORK (AP)—Heavy trading kicked stock market prices up still further today in a continued recovery from Monday's big break.

Gains ran as high as \$1 to \$4 a share and the ticker tape, which normally reports transactions within the first ten minutes of trading.

They've called it the "Eisenhower market" for the last two years of the six-year stretch and it was the Eisenhower market that staggered on Monday in shock at the President's illness.

As good news came from the sick-bed in Denver, the market regained confidence and recouped an estimated 25 per cent of the

huge losses sustained in Monday's break, the steepest since the Great Crash of 1919.

The firmer tone spread to markets in Chicago, London, Paris, Milan, Toronto and Montreal.

The quoted value of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange regained an estimated \$3,200,000,000 of the nearly \$13,000,000,000 loss calculated for Monday.

The Associated Press 60-stock index gained \$2.90 to close at \$173. The day before it dropped \$11.40, the biggest fall since Oct. 26, 1929.

Favorable news about the President's progress, the chance for comparatively cheap buys, a renewal of buying by big investment trusts and a swarm of small in-

vestors seeking bargains kicked prices upward.

Trading volume on the New York Stock Exchange totaled 5,500,000 shares, a large figure but well below the 7,720,000 shares traded on Monday, the biggest total in 22 years.

New Airlines Rule

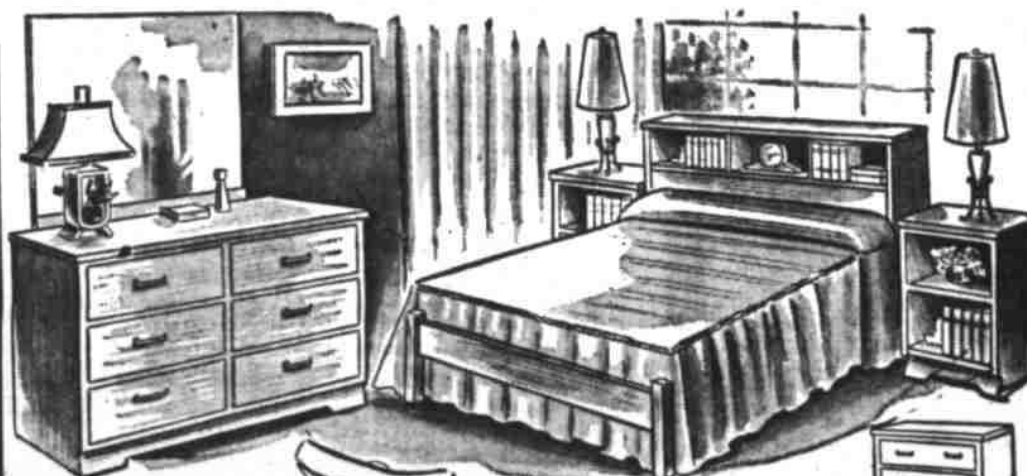

Ex-Star Sues For Return Of Taxes

LOS ANGELES (U)—Former movie star Marion Davies Brown has sued for the return of \$37,819.27 in California sales taxes which she avers is being illegally held by the state.

She said in her complaint that the tax was paid under protest after she had been assessed by the State Board of Equalization on Personal Property.

Her lawyer said she disposed of more than one million dollars worth of personal property between July 1945 to September 1952, most of it oil paintings, and he contends that inasmuch as she is not regularly in the business of buying and selling, the mercantile-type sales tax does not apply to her.

Hoover Commission Dies, Leaves \$83,000 Unspent

WASHINGTON (U)—The Hoover Commission, whose keynote was economy in government, went out of existence today on a consistent note. It returned \$83,000 in unspent funds to the Treasury.

During its two-year life, the Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government, headed by former President Herbert Hoover, received \$2,848,534 from Congress to finance its search for ways to streamline federal operations and cut expenditures.

The commission actually halted its work by law last June 30, but it was given another 90 days for liquidation chores. That time was up today.

In its final formal statement, the commission said it made 314 recommendations, with 145 of these considered administrative and the remainder subject to legislative or presidential action.

"Already 50 administrative recommendations have been carried into effect," the commission said, "and one minor one alone will save the government yearly four or five times the total cost of the commission."

The statement did not say what this specific recommendation involved.

The commission noted that more than 200 bills were introduced in the last congressional session, designed to carry out its recommendations.

Da Vinci Work 'Not For Sale'

CHICAGO (U)—A Chicago interior decorator says he will not sell his newly discovered Da Vinci oil painting of Madonna and child, but adds that "sooner or later I will donate it to an American museum."

"I will keep it and enjoy it awhile," said Hans R. Teichert of his \$450 purchase now valued at more than one million dollars.

Teichert said he had not decided what museum he would give the painting.

Dr. Hans Huth, curator of research at the Chicago Art Institute, has not seen the painting but has expressed doubt that it is really the work of Leonardo da Vinci, famed for his Mona Lisa.

\$18 Million City Tax Roll Approved By Commissioners

City Commissioners approved the 1955 tax roll in their regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday night. The total valuation was \$18,327,250, which at the increased tax rate of \$2.05 will bring a levy of \$375,708.63. This is a levy increase of \$48,065.49 over 1954.

The valuation on real property this year is \$13,894,870, a \$577,270 increase over last year's \$13,317,600. On personal property, the valuation is \$4,432,380, an increase of \$39,540 over 1954's total of \$4,392,840.

The total valuation for 1954 was \$17,710,440 or \$616,810 under this year's figure. The rate in 1954 was \$1.85.

However, it was explained, an experiment now being planned may provide adequate paving for the streets in that section on a much cheaper basis.

When asked how much street paving would cost, Mitchell was told it averaged about four or five dollars a foot. The commission instructed City Manager Herbert Whitney to provide more trash barrels for the park and instruct the park superintendent to check the care of the shrubs in the park.

Mitchell said there was a woman on the north side who pays for sewage although her house is not connected to the line. He was assured that the case would be investigated.

Highway To Laredo Reopened To Traffic

MEXICO CITY (U)—The Communications Ministry said the highway to Laredo, the main tourist route between the capital and the border, was reopened to traffic yesterday.

The highway had been closed for a week, since heavy rain from Hurricane Hilda flooded the route and washed out part of the road. One-way traffic is still being maintained through some landfills and over some temporary bridges.

Typhoon Lashes Way Toward Japan Island

TOKYO (U)—Typhoon Louise, still packing 125-mile-an-hour tropical winds, beat a steady path toward rice-rich southern Japan today.

Louise, the most vicious storm of the season is expected to be 125 miles south-southeast of Kyushu, Japan's southernmost island where much of a record rice crop still is unharvested, by tomorrow afternoon.

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Arkansas Faces Huge Task In TCU Battle

Swink Leading U.S. In Gains

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Texas Christian goes up to Fayetteville Saturday to open the Southwest Conference football race against Arkansas boasting the nation's leading ground-gainer—Jim Swink, who's averaging 135.5 yards per game.

Swink is the greatest ball-carrier at TCU in 25 years and if he maintains his present pace, will be not only the best at TCU but the top man of Southwest Conference history.

The conference record is 1,302 yards per season, set by Bob Smith at Texas A&M in 1950.

Swink came to TCU primarily because of his basketball ability. He was an outstanding player in Texas high schools and Coach Buster Brannon of the basketball team wanted him. So did Coach Abe Martin of the football team because Swink wanted to play football, too. It finally was agreed that he would play on the grid team and let basketball go.

But Swink, a star ball-carrier in his sophomore season, decided to let some basketball go so he went out for the sport in spring training, and made the team in two days.

Right now, however, Swink is busy trying to help the team to the conference football championship. If he does as well against Arkansas as he has against Kansas and Texas Tech, the Horned Frogs will be off and running toward that title.

Swink has made 31 points in the two games and if he keeps that up also will crack the conference scoring record—a matter of 128 points, set by Joe Hunt of Texas A&M in 1927.

Jim has gotten off at least one long touchdown run per game. It was for 80 yards against Kansas and 59 against Texas Tech. His average has been 12.3 yards each time he carried the ball.

Rice Owls Lone SWC Favorite

Southwest Conference football teams aren't expected to win more than one of their interconference games this week.

Rice is an 18-point choice over Louisiana State but Maryland is given seven points over Baylor, Southern California 13 points over Texas and Georgia Tech 6½ points over Southern Methodist.

Texas Christian is a 7-point favorite over Arkansas in the Southwest Conference opener while Texas A&M is a 7-point pick over University of Houston.

Fullmer Favorite Over Bob Boyd

CHICAGO. (AP)—Gene Fullmer, a 23-year-old from West Jordan, Utah, was a solid favorite to knock off Chicago's Bobby Boyd in a 10-round bout of middleweights at the Stadium tonight.

Boyd, 20, is a 2½-1 underdog and goes into the nationally televised battle (ABC, 9 p.m. EST) with 34 victories, 6 losses and 2 draws. Twenty of his triumphs were by knockouts.

Fullmer has lost only one of 33 fights and has scored 19 knockouts. He is ranked fourth in his division. Boyd was last beaten by Milo Savage in New York but has since won three.

Lane Hired By Cardinals, Who Give Boot To Walker

NEW YORK (AP)—Frank Lane is in as general manager of the St. Louis Cardinals and Harry Walker is out as field manager of the Redbirds.

Eddie Stanky, who Walker succeeded as St. Louis manager last May, may be back in baseball as manager of the Minneapolis Millers, farm club of the New York Giants in the American Assn.

These choice items were learned last night as the baseball folks gathered at World Series headquarters on the eve of the opening game at Yankee Stadium.

At least one proposed deal fell through. Paul Richards' plan to step down as manager of the Baltimore Orioles and name George Kell of the Chicago White Sox as his successor was vetoed by the Baltimore board of directors. The board insisted that Richards live up to his three-year contract calling for the dual role as field and general manager.

They were to meet again either today or tomorrow when the signing is to take place and an official announcement will be made. Dodgers Confident They Will Prevail

NEW YORK (AP)—The World Series starts today and the Brooklyn Dodgers, although underdogs, are confident this is the one they're going to win.

The odds-makers think otherwise. They've installed the New York Yankees as 13-10 favorites.

Since the Dodgers won their first pennant in 1916, they've lost all seven series they've played. The Yankees, on the other hand, have won 16 in 20 attempts since 1921, including their last seven.

Brooklyn Manager Walter Alton said yesterday after the Dodgers' workout in Yankee Stadium: "Listening to the way the boys talk, it is evident they are confident about this thing. That naturally makes me confident."

Alton picked Don Newcombe, his 20-game-winning right-hander, to start on the mound against Whitey Ford, a left-hander who has won 18.

The weather forecast was "cloudy with showers, possibly ending in late afternoon." Even so, a near-capacity crowd of 67,000 was on hand for the opener.

The game will be broadcast and telecast, starting at 1 p.m. EST. There was continued doubt that Mickey Mantle, the Yankees' top hitter, would be able to play more than part of the series. He had a torn muscle in his right leg.

He worked out along with the team at Ebbets Field yesterday and managed to clout a couple of balls into the outfield seats but he couldn't run without pain.

"I'm not hopeful of playing—at least not in the first two games at the Stadium," he said dejectedly. "It doesn't affect my hitting but I know I can't run on it."

Mantle said however that the leg was improving a bit each day since he injured it while beating out a bunt Sept. 16. He has been on the sidelines since except for two futile pinch-hitting appearances in Boston Sunday.

Mickey's reduction to the status of pinch hitter would deprive the Yankees of their leading hitter (.366) and league's leading home run hitter (37). Manager Casey Stengel, who said he would not make up his mind about Mantle until game time, indicated he would use Bob Cerv in Mantle's spot in center field and play the left-handed Irv Noren in left against right-handers. Against a left-hander, he will use Elston Howard in left.

Stengel was set in all other positions including shortstop, where he finally decided on Phil Rizzuto, the grand little veteran of eight World Series. Alton had no reservations about his lineup. He stuck to the same one he announced Sunday.

FORT WORTH (SC)—With the good news that Fullback Vernon Hallbeck should be back in full harness, the TCU Horned Frogs should be near a physical peak for their rugged SW Conference opening with the Arkansas Razorbacks in Fayetteville Saturday.

Hallbeck, the 205-pound blaster from San Benito, left the Texas Tech game early in the last period with what was feared to be a broken rib. X-rays, however, indicated only a bruised back muscle and Trainer Elmer Brown is confident he'll be back in full stride Saturday. Big Vernon, the converted guard, netted 79 yards on 18 carries against Tech and did a lot of faking.

Bryan Engram, captain and left end, was the only other casualty and his wound was minor. He suffered a small head cut when he slid into a concrete drainage ditch trying for an end-zone pass. Guard Joe Williams, who nursed a pulled leg muscle much of last week, played through the Tech game without further injury.

Coach Abe Martin and his staff were highly pleased, of course, with the 32-0 triumph over the strong Tech team. Martin was especially pleased with the improvement in his passing game and stout defensive line play.

In the 47-14 victory over Kansas in the opener, the Frogs hit only one of eight passes. They connected on three of 10 for 59 yards in the Tech game. Martin is still confident his overhead game will produce when badly needed.

The Frog defense against Tech was almost perfect. Spearheaded by Hugh Pitts, All-America center candidate, the Purple line smashed Tech's plays before they started. In all, the Raiders netted only 12 yards from scrimmage and failed to complete a pass. Junior Tackles Don Cooper and Norman Hamilton had a big part in this record.

Meanwhile, Coach Martin planned to work his club long and hard for the Arkansas game. Walter Roach, the Frog scout on the Razorbacks, reported the champion Razorbacks "a vastly improved ball club from one week to the next."

Roach reported that the Hogs showed a very stout overall defense and enough offense when needed. He felt the Porks displayed much improved play in all departments in the 21-0 triumph over Oklahoma A&M.

It will be "Dads' Day" in Fayetteville Saturday and Arkansas officials believe a near-capacity crowd of 35,000 will see the 32nd meeting between the old rivals. TCU has won 17 games, Arkansas 12 and two were ties in the long series.

Last year, Arkansas started its title march with a 20-13 victory over the Frogs. Back Bobby Proctor's 63-yard return of a pass interception set up Henry Moore's winning touchdown lunge with only minutes to play.

TCU will fly to Fort Smith, Ark., Friday and workout there. They will move to Fayetteville by bus Saturday morning.

A large crowd of Frog fans will follow the team.

'50,000-A-Year Job Lures Durocher From Baseball

NEW YORK (AP)—Television, long accused of stealing baseball's cash customers, now has lured away Leo Durocher.

The Lip revealed yesterday just why he had turned in his uniform as manager of the New York Giants, erstwhile world champions. It's TV—and a \$50,000-a-year job with the National Broadcasting Co.

Grid Spotlight Pointing To Waco Field This Week

WACO, (SC) — The Baylor University Bears, hopeful of springing one of the major surprises of the college football season, went to work in earnest on their offense this week as they prepared to meet the mighty Maryland Terrapins this Saturday night in Baylor Stadium.

"Maryland has one of the greatest defensive teams I ever saw," Stout Steve Owen, Baylor defensive specialist told the Bears after he had watched the Terps batter UCLA, the nation's No. 1 team, 7-0.

"It'll take a real offense to score on that bunch," Steve added. Maryland held UCLA to a minus

21 yards rushing.

Baylor worked to sharpen its passing attack this week, and made plans to make best possible use of what it hopes will be superior team speed. UCLA found that power wouldn't work against a massive Terp line that will outweigh the Baylor forwards at least five pounds per man. The No. 1 Maryland line averages 209 pounds, the No. 2 checks out at 208 pounds and the No. 3 at 210.

Coach George Sauer purposely has brought his offense along more slowly than usual, has worked the Bears more on defense than on offense to date.

"But we've got to get that attack ready now," he said as his Bears began a week of long sessions on offense, "nobody's going to out-defense this big fine Maryland club."

Baylor has thrown only 21 passes this season, completed only 7 for 84 yards while running 98 rushing plays for 444 net yards. Defense has set up nearly every Baylor score.

Del Shofner, suffering a strained leg tendon during the summer, has been much slower than usual, has been used little except on defense. The Bears are hopeful he will be ready for Maryland.

If he is — the Bears might surprise.

The cities are growing so fast, new high schools are going to be forced on them. That could change the outlook of each of the teams.

Now that news of the school's promotion has become official, the problem of seeing that adequate athletic facilities are provided has been deposited in the lap of the local school board.

It's a big problem and the board is understandably moving slowly to cope with it.

He is Wendell Phillips, whom Stanton (Texas) fans might recall. He played halfback on Sundown's mighty team of 1954. Wendell scored ten touchdowns on the option play as Sundown sped to the District 4A championship.

Wendell is in Staunton Military Academy to complete his high school work. He lacks 2 1/2 credits of earning his diploma. He wants to enroll at Texas Tech next fall.

Wendell doesn't care for the military life but, more than that, he'd like to attend school nearer home.

Wyatt Posey, Texas Tech assistant, is the man responsible for Phillips' entry into SMA.

Texas did get a mild measure of consolation in the late season of 1941. If Southern California's young Trojans want to make something of it, the revenge motive works both ways.

Fatal Beating Claim Pressed At Paxton Trial

SAN ANTONIO (U)—The government pressed its claim today that Sgt. I.C. Robert Lee Paxton, 26, fatally beat his 4-year-old step-daughter, but indicated it would not seek the death penalty.

The Red Cloud, Neb., veteran of the Korean War and his Japanese-born wife, Tsukiko, are jointly charged with murder in the death of Brenda Kay Paxton, 4, who died May 11.

Likelihood that the government would seek a second degree murder guilty verdict came out yesterday during arguments over a defense motion for acquittal.

Paxton, on the witness stand in his own defense yesterday, said he married Mrs. Paxton at Kobi, Japan, in December of 1951. He had been sent to Japan, he testified, after being injured in a jeep accident.

Brenda Kay, he said, then was about a year old. For months before the marriage, he related, he had supported the mother and child. When he was transferred back to this country, his testimony continued, the couple was unable to bring Brenda Kay, nicknamed "Candy," because she was a Japanese national.

Later, he said, he arranged for her to be flown to the United States and a short time after her arrival legally adopted her.

Paxton told the federal district court he and his wife had disagreements over his affection for Brenda Kay, Tsukiko, he said, complained "that I loved Brenda Kay better than our own child."

The Paxtons are parents of a two-year-old girl who is blind.

Paxton recalled on the witness stand that he slapped Brenda Kay because she would not eat her food. After the slapping, he said, "She picked up the spoon and started to eat."

The sergeant said he washed the dishes, left his wife and the two children in the kitchen, and went into the dining room.

"I heard a noise like someone hitting somebody—like the slapping of a belt," he testified. Then, he swore, he heard a sound which he believed was Brenda Kay falling from a chair.

"I picked up the baby and put her on her bed," he said.

The child was brought to Brooke Army Hospital the next day by Paxton. She was pronounced dead a short time later.

Billie Marvin Hanson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Hanson of Galt, recently participated in the daring rescue of a youth from a sheer cliff above a boiling sea cove.

In order to affect the rescue of the nearly frozen 18-year-old boy who had started out to climb the face of a cliff near the U.S. Naval Air Station at Whidbey Island, Bill had to climb with two other airmen to the top of the rugged precipice from another direction.

Then they lowered a line to the boy, who was able to fasten the rope around his body. Hanson and his mates then lowered the lad to a Navy crash boat below.

The face of the cliff near Oak Harbor, Wash., has never been climbed. In 1952, a man almost accomplished the feat but before he reached the top he slipped and his body was never found in the swirling waters below.

Hanson took the rescue as a matter of fact. He said that he "hoped the next guy waits until after chow."

Hanson entered service in March and has been at Oak Harbor as an apprentice airman for the past three months.

Wilson Against Further Cuts

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of Defense Wilson was reported today to have concluded after a new survey that it would be militarily unwise for the armed services to cut their spending any further this year.

Informants said Wilson had assured Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey and Budget Director Rowland Hughes that the Defense Department would continue every effort to "look under every log" for more economy, as Humphrey has asked all government departments to do.

But they said the Pentagon chief also assured the administration's fiscal leaders that the only way savings approaching a billion dollars could be brought about in the military establishment would be by:

1. Cutting down the numerical armed forces strength, called the "force level."

2. Reducing contracts for planes, ships and other weapons and equipment, or

3. Through a combination of both.

Wilson took the stand against a further cutback in spending after reviews of the situation with each of the service secretaries, top military commanders and his own fiscal experts.

Wilson's decision against more spending cuts is believed to have been made late last week. He was scheduled to fly to Denver Sunday, presumably to advise Eisenhower personally of his decision. However, the President's illness canceled that plan.

Suit Asks \$147,000 For Wreck Damages

A suit for damages totaling \$147,000 was filed in 118th District Court here today by Keith Hansen against the H. Posey Trucking Company and others of Colorado City.

Hansen asks judgment for the \$147,000 as a result of a highway mishap which occurred Aug. 25 about six miles east of Big Spring. A car driven by Mrs. Hansen was in collision with a truck operated by Charlie Newton Jaraginn and owned by the Posey firm, according to the petition. Negligence is alleged.

Judgement is asked for \$50,000 for injuries suffered by Mrs. Hansen, \$72,000 for loss of her earning capacity and \$25,000 as exemplary damages.

Mrs. Benedicto said she never was in San Jose, scene of a huge police hunt last week when a woman of her description, with a baby, was reported seen there by several persons.

The district attorney took up the story again:

"I told my husband our baby was due about the end of August. So then I went to Riverside County. I came back to Stockton I told Mark I had had the baby. I told him it was ill and had to stay in the hospital down south. But he wanted it. He insisted I bring it home. I had to get out."

stricken parents for the return of their child.

To calm her nerves, she went to a boxing match last night, taking the baby along. A suspicious sheriff's deputy queried her about the infant. She produced a birth certificate from St. Francis Hospital in Lynwood, near Los Angeles. Mrs. Benedicto said the certificate originally was issued for her sister's child, now aged 4, but hadn't been filled out completely. So she inserted the name of the child she kidnaped.

The deputy released her but still was not satisfied. He called the Lynwood Hospital and was told no such child had been born there.

But in the meantime, Mrs. Benedicto had telephoned Dr. Marcus. Before Marcus and his wife arrived, she delivered the baby to Father McCoy. FBI agents, tipped off by San Francisco police, were waiting there and arrested her.

The Marcus baby was stolen when a nurse in charge left the hospital nursery for a few minutes. Student nurse Lettie Clement, 21, said she saw a buxom blonde woman at the viewing window. Asked for her pass, the woman said she already turned it into another nurse.

The Marcus baby's crib was nearest the nursery door.

Nursing supervisor Eleanor Lorenz saw a woman of the same general description walking from the hospital with a baby in her arms.

Mrs. Marcus was kept under sedatives five days. She refused to eat, was fed intravenously, and said little, except "All I want is my baby."

Mrs. Marcus had a tragic past. Both her parents and her younger brother died in Hitler's gas chambers. She was smuggled into Holland when she was 13. She met Dr. Marcus in Philadelphia while he was interning there.

Mrs. Marcus improved Saturday when her other two children, Susan, 2, and Richard, 3, were taken to her bedside. She was taken to her San Francisco home Monday.

Police had conducted possibly the most intense search in the history of San Francisco trying to find the child quickly. Doctors feared for his health. He had been circumcized only three hours before being taken, and he was accustomed to breast-feeding.

A formula was issued by the hospital, published in newspapers and broadcast on radio and TV in the hope it would reach the kidnaper. Dr. Marcus made a dramatic personal appeal by radio, urging the child's return and promising he would not prosecute the kidnaper.

More than 600 policemen searched a 30-block area around the hospital, questioning residents house by house.

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newspaper Diario de Yucatan said the storm earlier hit Quintana Roo, the easternmost strip of Mexico, a lonely stretch of coastline.

Between the two strikes, Janet had picked up a little speed; she was moving about 21 m.p.h. when she first lashed at Quintana Roo.

Only a few reports were available from the area, the Weather Bureau at Miami said. The latest advisory last night estimated the storm's highest winds at 135 m.p.h. The Weather Bureau's advisory at 5 a.m. said the highest winds were about 115 m.p.h.

Winds of hurricane force swelled out 60 to 70 miles from the center and gales whipped across land and sea 225 miles to the north and 100 miles to the south.

Janet buffeted the Yucatan Peninsula after completing a destructive course through the Caribbean Sea.

Her course was expected to be somewhat erratic as she swept further inland but there was a good chance, the Weather Bureau said, that any strength she might lose in her journey overland would be regained when she reaches the open waters of the Bay of Campeche.

The worst was yet to come, the Weather Bureau warned.

The hurricane already had claimed about 200 lives in the Caribbean. Perhaps nine U. S. Navy men and two Canadians were among them. They were aboard a hurricane hunter plane that flew into the storm Monday morning and has been missing ever since.

Janet swept over little Swan Island in the western Caribbean yesterday morning and no word has come from the 35 persons stationed there.

"Antennas going down. Abandoning weather station," said the final message. "All hands seeking shelter in Navy building."

The Weather Bureau and Civil Aeronautics Administration has 35 persons on the island, where the Navy has a concrete micro-seismograph station. No anxiety was felt for their safety; the installation is well above the high water mark.

Emergency List Deadline Set

WASHINGTON (U)—The Defense Department has set a Nov. 1 deadline for completion of secret lists of emergency actions to be taken in the event of a national military emergency.

A directive issued to the military services Sept. 22 and made available today said, the results of Operation Alert last May showed that "much more attention must be given to the development of a well-defined program covering emergency actions."

During Operation Alert, President Eisenhower and thousands of key officials and workers left Washington and test-ran the government from hideouts under simulated war conditions.

The directive said that during the alert exercises "it became apparent that communication problems would make impractical the transmission of lengthy documents on an emergency basis."

The Defense Department also said it was shown that many military actions would have to be based on congressional authority when there is "no guarantee that the Congress would be immediately available" to grant such powers.

In some cases, the directive said, emergency action documents could be prepared and ready for use upon the signature of a responsible official.

WALL STREET (U)—The stock market opened today in a continuation of its upward trend, with gains in most leading issues displaying wide gains.

Trading started fast. Almost immediately the Dow Jones Industrial Average moved up 1 1/2 points to 164.12. The S&P 500 index rose 1 1/4 points to 47.12.

An asphalt compound is spread on the streets and crushed stone is spread over it. This prolongs the life of the paving. Work began on Owens Street Tuesday between Eleventh and Twelfth Streets.

They were arrested yesterday afternoon after Judge Dunagan ordered their \$1,500 bonds forfeited and requested their arrest. The Rangers arrested them at Benavides.

Chapa and Carrillo had been scheduled to appear here for trial Monday. About 50 witnesses, most of them for the defense, were reported to have been in the court room when the pair failed to appear.

Defense attorneys argued that chief counsel Percy Foreman of Houston was engaged in a trial at Corpus Christi and could not be here.

Foreman reportedly told Sheriff Willie S. Ashcraft of Smith County there was no point in bringing Chapa and Carrillo to Tyler to post bond and then "have them turn around and leave."

SAYS JOHNSTON

'Numbers Racket' Charge Supported

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-SC) said today testimony by Veterans Administrator H. V. Higley supported Democratic charges that a "numbers racket" was being played with the government's employee security program.

Johnston is chairman of a Senate Civil Service subcommittee investigating the Eisenhower administration's controversial security program, put into effect in May 1953.

Higley told the subcommittee yesterday, before it recessed its hearings until today, that the "great majority" of 449 Veterans Administration employees listed as fired under the security program were "in the nonsecurity category."

He said they would have been "fired anyway" for other reasons.

He said most of these dismissals came under regular civil service regulations which permit firings for incompetence and other causes, although the initial checks were run as part of the security program.

Referring to this, Johnston told newsmen, "You can call it padding or whatever you want," adding that it bore out the "numbers racket" charges leveled by Democrats and other critics of the program.

He said he intended to press all government departments and agencies for a breakdown of the reasons for all listed dismissals under the security program in order to bring out the complete picture.

Johnston said he was convinced that "practically all" federal employees who have been tagged as security risks could have been discharged under regular civil service procedures "without besmirching anyone's name."

Higley said he didn't have anything to do with compiling the lists of the security firings.

Subcommittee Counsel Paul Hadlock asked him if any of the dismissed VA employees were Communists. "Not to my knowledge, sir," he replied.

Dallasite Convicted Of Bribe Attempt

DALLAS (U)—Ray Hope Clem, 72, was convicted yesterday of giving a \$1,000 bribe to an agent of the Internal Revenue Service.

Sentencing was postponed. Clem's attorney claimed the Dallas lumberman and real estate developer was illegally trapped into giving the bribe. There was no denial that the money changed hands.

Charles Gresham, the agent, said he had a radio transmitter hidden under his shirt when the money was passed and that the conversation between himself and Clem was recorded by other agents in another room.

ASC Asks New Anti-Erosion Practice For Howard Farms

The County ASC office, now is accepting applications for a new winter soil conservation practice, Gabe Hammack, manager, announced today.

The applications are being taken subject to approval of the new practice by the state ASC committee. Hammack said, however, he is confident the state committee will approve the practice for Howard County.

The new practice will be the planting of winter legumes for protection against erosion. The maximum federal cost share of the plantings will be 50 per cent of the cost of seed and fertilizer, not to exceed specified sums.

The legumes can include hairy vetch, Dixie Wonder or Austrian winter peas, either in rows or broadcast and in combination with oats and rye. They must be seeded prior to Nov. 30.

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Packing Firm Heir Listed As Suicide Victim

CORONA, Calif. (AP)—Suffering from cancer, Louis F. Swift Jr., 60, grandson of the founder of the Chicago meat packing company, killed himself with a shot through the heart at his ranch home yesterday.

The coroner listed it as a suicide after receiving this report from sheriff's deputies:

Swift's wife Libby heard a shot and rushed into the bedroom to find her husband sprawled with a wound in the chest. A .38-caliber revolver lay nearby.

Two servants said they had found Swift with the gun while his wife was shopping, but had persuaded him to put it away. As they left and Mrs. Swift returned, the shot rang out.

Swift had been suffering from throat cancer for several months. Last January part of his vocal cords was removed. He had been unable to speak since the operation.

Besides his wife, the former socialite, Elizabeth (Libby) Chase of Lake Forest, Ill., Swift leaves a son, Louis F. Swift III. Swift briefly attended the University of Wisconsin. A spokesman said he had not been very active in company affairs, but had managed plants in Denver and Texas. He had lived here eight years.

New Police Car Due To Replace Wrecked Vehicle

The City Fathers agreed to purchase a new police patrol car to replace the one that was badly damaged in an automobile mishap early Tuesday morning. In the commissioners' meeting Tuesday, authority was given City Manager Herbert Whitney to buy a 1955 car from the low-bidding Tidwell Chevrolet Company.

The winning bid for the purchase listed the car at \$1,689.80 and allowing \$750 for the wrecked patrol car. The city will pay a net \$939.80 for the new vehicle. The lowest estimate for repairing the wrecked car was also from Tidwell Chevrolet and was \$886.06. The car had accumulated 30,000 miles and was a 1955 model.

Whitney told the commissioners that he had a written statement from the patrolman, James William Baker, driver of the car at the time of the mishap stating that he had fallen asleep and allowed the car to get out of control. The car rammed into a telephone pole causing extensive damage to the front.

A patrolman riding in the car at the time, Fran Glasscock, received a dislocated shoulder as a result of the accident. The commissioners recommended that Whitney decide on any disciplinary measures.

Wonder Drugs Aid Fight Against Rheumatic Fever

NEW YORK (AP)—In a backstage drama, medical science has achieved practical victory over a heart disease that probably cripples more children each year than polio.

The disease is rheumatic fever, a silent saboteur of heart valves. Wonder drugs have brought this victory in one of the brightest successes in heart research.

Other drugs are scoring successes too against another major killer—high blood pressure, often a contributing factor in heart attacks such as that President Eisenhower suffered.

Rheumatic fever is a disease of aches and pains and fever that involves the heart, often scarring vital valves, making them leaky and making the victim a heart cripple.

Doctors sought and finally found the answer.

Rheumatic fever, they found, followed infections with a vicious type of germ, one type of "strep" or streptococcus. In a small percentage of humans, a curious kind of reaction explodes after a strep sore throat or scarlet fever. The victims of this aching rheumatic disease are most often children between the ages 5 and 9.

They often recover without ill effects. But too often the inflammatory disease hits the heart valves or the heart muscle, creating scars, interfering with the heart. Rheumatic fever can kill or cripple. It is estimated half a million children now suffer from it, and as many adults are its victims.

Usually, damage does not occur with the first attack. But the child becomes sensitized to recurrent and damaging attacks.

While there still are mysteries as to exactly what happens, medicine has found the method of prevention. It is to treat any strep infections promptly with penicillin, and to give one of the wonder drugs continuously to the past victim of rheumatic fever, to prevent future attacks.

The American Heart Assn. has launched a campaign for prevention of this unnecessary crippling. Daily tablets of penicillin or sulfa drugs, or once-a-month shots of a long-lasting form of penicillin, now make it possible practically to eradicate rheumatic fever.

In the last five years have come new drugs that help control many cases of high blood pressure (hypertension in medical terms), blamed directly as the killer of 23,000 Americans annually, and a handmaiden of death directly or indirectly in another 150,000 fatalities. More than eight million Americans have some degree of it.

Only in a small percentage of cases, such as certain kidney diseases and adrenal tumors, is the cause of hypertension known. In the rest, the exact cause is unknown. Nerves and emotions can play a role. So perhaps can peculiar chemicals in the kidneys and brain, according to recent research.

And any diseases producing a narrowing of arteries can bring increased pressure. Deposits of fatty material on the inner linings of arteries, the condition that brought on President Eisenhower's heart attack, can force the heart to work harder, to build up more pressure in order to push blood through the vast arterial highway of the body.

High blood pressure puts an overload on the heart, often making it increase in size. The greater pressure can damage blood vessels, leading to hemorrhages. In

the train, such bleeding from damaged arteries brings strokes that can paralyze or kill.

In most cases, hypertension is believed to result from constriction of the smaller arteries, thus creating more resistance to blood flow.

Many of the new drugs bring good effects by acting upon the nervous system to bring relaxation of nervous or muscular control of these arteries. Some affect the central nervous system, others the sympathetic nervous system.

Only about five years ago, physicians had little in the way of drug armaments to combat hypertension. The sedative phenobarbital to calm the tense, keyed-up individual was a main standby.

Now there is an amazing array of drugs, which help bring hypertension under control for long periods in at least one third of patients.

The list includes extracts from the Indian snakewood plant, rauwolfia serpentina; veratrum from the green hellebore; synthetics such as hydralazine and hexamethonium and pentamethylolindium.

They are not the last word, said one heart specialist, but "they are a big step in the right direction."

Improved drugs may be expected. Special diets are credited with reducing hypertension in some cases. Researchers are seeking basic understandings of the cause of this disease, even exploring the possibility of a vaccine against it.

One of the best treatments is to cultivate serenity, or imperturbability.

Americans Puff Even Harder

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department reported today that Americans are smoking more cigarettes now than, in its view, the "main impact" of the cigarette-health controversy apparently has passed.

Reporting on "the tobacco situation," the department said Americans 15 years of age and over will smoke an average of nearly 10 pounds of tobacco in cigarettes during 1955.

That would represent a 1.2 per cent increase over last year but fall 4.8 per cent shy of the 1953 figure—a record.

Without elaborating, the report said: "The main impact of the publicity concerning cigarettes and health on cigarette consumption appears to have occurred during 1954."

Medical authorities have made numerous studies, some of them with conflicting conclusions, on a possible relationship between cigarette smoking and lung cancer. The department said it expected cigarette smoking to continue on an upward trend next year.

Over-all tobacco consumption, the department reported, has increased slightly this year but is 4½ per cent below 1952 and 1953.

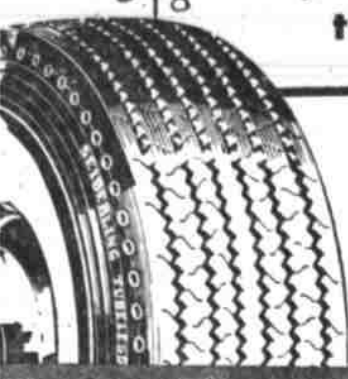

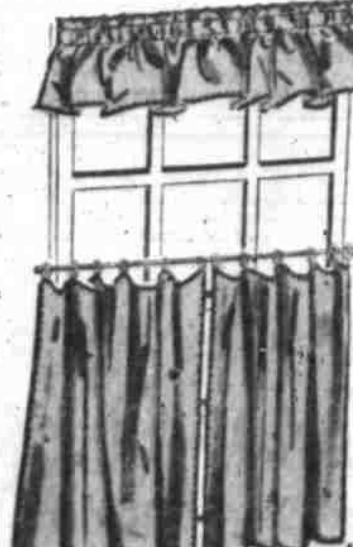

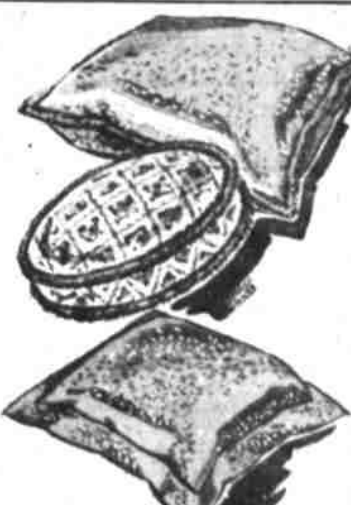

Death Takes Noted Horse Breeder

DALLAS (AP)—A long illness terminated in death yesterday for Henry W. Frost, well-known breeder of thoroughbred horses.

A former long-time resident of Middleburg, Va., Frost moved to Dallas several months ago.

He is survived by his two sons, Henry W. Frost Jr., Dallas, and Winston Frost, New York City. Funeral services will be held tomorrow at Middleburg, Va.

Portland Area Evacuated Fast In Civil Defense Test

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—A 1,000-block area, including Portland's downtown business district, was evacuated in 34 minutes in yesterday's civil defense test.

The city's air warning system shrilled its previously announced signal at 3:10 p.m., and immediately afterwards orderly stream of vehicles and pedestrians began moving along the many evacuation routes.

The speed of the evacuation exercise, named Operation Green Light, was credited by civil defense officials to the fact that the area was not nearly so crowded as usual and to a traffic control system that turned all traffic lights green along the exit routes and eliminated cross traffic.

Portlanders had been told that the test might come yesterday, today or tomorrow. Apparently many of them expected it yesterday and left for home early or didn't come in to town.

The thousands who were downtown were turned out of business houses. Many got in their automobiles and, for the first 15 minutes, it appeared that a gigantic traffic jam was forming.

This was due partly to motorists slowing down to pick up pedestrians walking out of the area. But within 20 minutes the jams had cleared and the evacuation proceeded without incident.

Only essential workers and squads of police and firemen were left on the streets when the area was declared officially cleared.

Fifty minutes after the test started, the prearranged all-clear signal was sounded and traffic began swarming back into the district. Most office workers, however, had been given the rest of the day off and went on to their homes.

There were no serious traffic accidents or other mishaps as the estimated 100,000 to 150,000 persons left the test zone. One volunteer civil defense worker was stricken with a heart attack during the test and died on arrival at a hospital.

Woman Dies After Telling Of Vacation

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A 40-year-old woman was killed last night because she vacationed in Dallas and received a long distance phone call from there.

Kenneth D. Riley, 38, told officers he shot his fiancée, Mrs. Jean Hayes, at her apartment because she kept telling about the good time she had while in Dallas. The victim's 21-year-old daughter, Miss Jean Louise Hayes, was a witness to the shooting.

Rotarians Hear District Leader On Ladies' Day

"What I Like About Rotary" was the topic of Rigdon Edwards, Sweetwater, in the annual talk of the Rotary district governor to the Big Spring Rotary Club Tuesday.

Edwards enumerated the organization's international outlook, opportunity for fellowship and its requirements for membership as his principal reasons for liking Rotary work.

The organization's world-wide fellowship was illustrated recently at Lake Success, he said, when Rotary district governors representing about 90 nations gathered for a conference. Edwards said he was surprised to learn that representatives of all parts of the world have similar problems and ambitions.

Requirements for membership in the organization, he said, are "inclusive," rather than exclusive. The system of member classification includes representatives of all worthy undertakings, he declared.

The Rotary Foundation, which conducts a world-wide student exchange program, illustrates the international scope of Rotary, Edwards pointed out. He said the hundreds of students who annually study in countries other than their own help promote international understanding and good will.

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Uncle Ray: Some Egyptian Kings Used Lions For Hunting

Inquiries about weapons and hunting customs feature our batch of Egyptian questions for today.

Q. What weapons were used by Egyptian soldiers?

A. They employed spears, battle axes, long knives, slings and bows and arrows. It was common for the soldiers to carry shields.

Q. Did the ancient Egyptians enjoy hunting?

A. Some of them did. Wooded hills and valleys existed on both sides of the Nile River. A hunter would enter wild places while looking for game. Several servants went with him, prepared to carry home any animals which might be brought down. Often the master rode in a chariot.

The servants carried food and drink, including baskets filled with bread and meat, also skins filled with water.

The hunter had arrows tipped with metal—Copper, bronze or iron. Feathers were placed on the arrows to help them fly to their marks.

Q. Did the Egyptians use hunting dogs?

A. Dogs accompanied some Egyptian hunters on their trips. It was the custom for a hunter who rode to the woods in a chariot to step out before the trees became too thick. While he walked along, hunting dogs were likely to accompany him. They helped to round up game.

More exciting were the hunting lions which were taken along by some kings. Trained from the time they were cubs, the lions were skillful at tracking game for their masters, and striking it down.

Q. What were the chief kinds of game?

A. Egyptian hunters pursued wild goats, leopards, rabbits and foxes. In marshes they used their bows and arrows to shoot geese. Now and then a hunter hurled a throwing stick to bring down a wild goose which was trying to fly free of the reeds in a marsh.

Q. Did the Egyptians have many domestic animals?

A. They had donkeys, oxen and

goats. Some of them kept geese. Young geese were obtained in the marshes, and were raised on Egyptian farms.

Batches of eggs were hatched later, and the flocks grew.

Road Slayer Dies In Chair

BELLEfonte, Pa. (AP)—John Wesley Wable, outwardly calm, died last night in the electric chair for the "phantom slaying" of a sleeping truck driver on the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

Brought to Rockview State Penitentiary here yesterday after two desperate last-minute appeals failed, Wable made no last statement as he walked into the death chamber and sat quietly while watching guards strap him to the electric chair.

Four minutes later he was pronounced dead after two charges of electricity, each 2,000 volts.

Wable, 25, of Ohio, a small town in western Pennsylvania, was convicted of the shooting of Harry F. Pitts, 39, of Bowling Green, Va., on July 25, 1953, as Pitts slept in the cab of his parked truck.

Wable was charged, but not tried, with the slaying of another driver and the wounding of a third on an approach road, all within a few days and under almost identical circumstances. Wable, who maintained he was innocent, was arrested in Albuquerque.

Editorial

The Uncertainty Is Exacting

We have to go back all the way to 1901 to find an exact parallel to the shock and uncertainty attendant upon something happening to the President of the United States.

At Buffalo, N.Y., President William McKinley, a fine figure of a man, handsome and personally very popular, made a speech on Sept. 5, 1901. On the following day he attended a reception at a private home, and an anarchist named Leon Czolgosz fired a bullet into his body. As a boy we remember the shock and horror that swept the country, and it was prolonged to Sept. 14, when he died.

Two other Presidents have died in office since then, but their passing was sudden. The shock was there, but there was no lingering uncertainty. Woodrow Wilson was stricken while in office, but finished out his term to die in private life. There was confusion and uncertainty, to be sure, in his final months in office, but the gravity of his condition was so well concealed that public anxiety and uncertainty never reached a serious stage.

With the death of Harding, a capable vice president, Calvin Coolidge, stepped quietly into his shoes and the business of government went on as usual. That was repeated in 1945 when President Roosevelt died suddenly.

There is inevitably an element of uncertainty in President Eisenhower's condition, as the world prays for his recovery. It will be two weeks before the doctors can make a full assessment of the damage done by the heart attack, meantime the American people without regard to political coloration will wait and worry, hoping for the best. In this sense, anxiety imposed on shock, the Eisenhower incident parallels that of McKinley. Since Woodrow Wilson's time the presidency has become a goldfish bowl affair, and concealment is impossible.

In spite of its hugeness and its complications our American form of government really is a marvelous piece of machinery so no serious interruptions of any sort need be expected, regardless of the outcome of Mr. Eisenhower's illness, and no important policy changes.

League Wins Deserved Award

The highest award in its field has been accorded the Texas Research League for having done the "most noteworthy piece of governmental research" by a private agency during the past year. This is a fine tribute to the league, which is financed privately by individuals and businesses, to do the infinitely tedious digging so necessary for the preparation of dependable data.

The job was a monumental one—the production of a fourteen-volume study report on Texas state hospitals, undertaken at the request of the Board of Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools. Seven of the League's own staff headed by Aris A. (Bob) Mallas Jr., flanked by professional consultants and voluntary consultants recruited from Texas private enterprise, tackled the chore, which contained recommendations whose purpose was to improve the administration of the system, bring its laws up to date, and effect operating economies.

So thoroughly did the league do its work that the 54th Legislature this year enacted most of the principal legislation called for in the league's report. It may take years to work out all the kinks involved in so sweeping a reformation, but at least a start has been made.

Far from resting on its new laurels, the league has taken on an even bigger chore—a study and analysis of Texas' far-flung highway system, its construction, planning, financing and administration. This is a highly complicated problem, the biggest single operation in state government, and nobody understands all the angles simply because no concerted inquiry has ever been made into its many-sided operations.

That is where the Texas Research League can render another public service of the greatest importance, at a time when highway planning and construction is taking on new importance and urgency.

He Can't Find Our Inflation

"You're having a boom too, but your prices don't rise like ours."

An Englishman, returned to the United States after a four-month sojourn with his kindfolk, was talking.

"Why should prosperity in your country be different from ours? Why should we be having a pound crisis, a sterling crisis, while you just have a good time? Your labor unions get wage increases, but you don't seem to have inflation. We do, why?"

He's right. The cost-of-living index in Great Britain has been rising fairly persistently:

1952	126
1953	128
1954	132
Today	140

How different from ours:

1952	113.5
1953	114.4
1954	114.8
Today	114.7

So, in three years our index of the cost of living has moved hardly at all, as against the 16 per cent rise in Great Britain.

That doesn't mean prices haven't risen here. They have.

Industrial prices have been advancing. Steel prices were boosted after the wage increase this summer. Similarly, aluminum went up after an increase in aluminum wages. At the beginning of the year, copper sold for 30 cents a pound. Now, it's anywhere from 43 cents to 50 cents and hard to get.

But inflation hasn't tarried at the farmer's door. Agricultural prices have been declining. The cost of food has dropped—especially the cost of meat. So U. S. housewives don't suffer from severe shopping pains. Price stability in the U. S., I tell my British friend, has been compounded of divergent trends—lower farm prices and higher industrial prices.

"I know," came the reply, "but why haven't your retail prices risen sharply as the result of higher wage rates. I don't hear grumbles over here about prices of TV sets, automobiles, and so

on. Why aren't there complaints?"

It's our price system, I suggest. A person has to be a mind reader and a statistical genius all at once to know what happens to retail prices of automobiles and appliances. In autos, the companies fix their wholesale prices to dealers. They also recommend retail prices to dealers. Then the dealers set prices as they please.

That permits the dealers to make all kinds of concessions—big allowances on your old car or a discount if you pay cash. So it's hard to figure whether prices go up from one year to the next—except that you do know that wholesale prices are going up. Therefore, it's a good bet that retail prices are going up, too. TV prices, for instance, are going up right now. And Ford has raised car prices.

The fundamental difference, however, between Great Britain and this country is supply. We have no shortage of automobiles, vacuum cleaners, refrigerators, TV sets, or food for American consumers. We haven't had an era of austerity, followed by a burst of relief—a kind of post-war buying spree.

In Great Britain, the government is striving to increase exports. Therefore, a certain proportion of British automobiles and other products are reserved for shipment abroad. That limits domestic supply. And the pressure to cut prices—to give consumers a better break—is not so great as here.

"But you're also exporting a great deal," my British friend protests.

Again, he's right. But America has had more economic leeway, more margin. Great Britain has had over-full employment. Only 1 per cent of persons in "insured" jobs have been out of work. In the U. S., unemployment reached 6 per cent during the 1954 recession. Unemployment's still about 3.3 per cent of the labor force here.

In both countries, inflationary pressures exist—except that in Britain they're more pronounced. It's as if Britain were the leader and America the follower. The British boosted interest rates. The U. S. followed. The British tightened up on installment credit terms—hire-purchase, as they say. So did the Federal Reserve Board and the Comptroller of the Currency.

And now the British Chancellor of the Exchequer wants the banks to cut loans by about 10 per cent. That's something for American bankers, on the eve of their convention in Chicago, to ponder. Could it be an augury of further restrictions?

Japanese Protected

MANILA (U)—Filipinos still remember—and resent—the Japanese occupation 10 years after. So the Philippine government has set up a camp behind barbed wire for the Japanese salvage workers here to work on ships sunk in Manila bay during World War II.

Police guard the camp. No visitor can get into the camp without a special pass issued by the army.

Nixon Hasn't Taken Over Yet

WASHINGTON (U)—The center of power in the Eisenhower administration remains firmly rooted in the White House today with no foreseeable likelihood that it will be shifted to Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

A White House source says there is "absolutely no reason" for any delegation of presidential powers to the vice president at this time because President Eisenhower is fully capable of making any major decisions necessary.

There has been a good deal of speculation here that Nixon very likely would take over a large part of the burden of the presidency until such time as Eisenhower is able to return to his desk. But this talk is now diminishing.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty had announced in Denver that the attorney general's office would be asked to prepare an opinion on the legal problems involved and the extent and means by which presidential authority could be delegated temporarily.

The Constitution says the vice president takes over in case of the President's removal, death, resignation, or "inability to discharge the power and duties of office." But it does not spell out the extent of the inability, say who shall determine it, or specifically provide for any temporary delegation.

Atty. Gen. Brownell said on arriving in New York yesterday from Spain that he would prepare an opinion on the powers of transfer of authority as soon as possible.

But a short time later in Washington, after staff discussions en route, he said there was "general agreement" no such action was necessary at this time.

The general change of attitude coincided with a rising optimism that Eisenhower is on the road to a quick recovery.

The sequence of events suggested to some political observers, however, that top administration people had quickly closed ranks against the idea of giving Nixon extraordinary powers which might enhance his chance to win the GOP presidential nomination in case Eisenhower doesn't run again.

But one White House source disclaimed any such intent, adding: "We've been so shocked by what has happened that we haven't even thought of sorting out the political implications that are involved."

There has absolutely been no political discussion around here so far as I know.

"If something further should happen to the President—that would

be another matter. The President's death would mean the vice president would take over.

"But as things now stand, the President is recovering. There is no reason to delegate his powers to anyone. Even now he is able to talk for a few minutes each day to visitors. His mental powers are not affected in any way. He still is able to make the decisions

that are necessary—and as his recovery progresses, he will be increasingly able to give more time to his duties.

"All of us know our responsibilities and we'll carry on as usual. There is going to be no shifting of power—and there is going to be no 'power grab'."

'Mr. Smerdley' The Watchcat

WESTPORT, Conn. (U)—There are many unusual characters in the community of artists, writers and intellectuals.

But "Mr. Smerdley," the only one in the neighborhood who sleeps in a Dutch oven, is perhaps the most unusual.

In an area teeming with watchdogs, Smerdley has the distinction of being the only "watchcat." He is a pet ocelot, a kind of tropical wildcat, owned by Arthur Kennedy, the well known Broadway and Hollywood actor.

Kennedy bought the wildcat, which came from Peru, as a 5-week-old kitten on the West Coast while completing a starring role in M-G-M's film, "Tall, Dark and Handsome." Ocelot raising has become some thing of a fad on the West Coast, where two clubs devoted to the breed have been organized.

The ocelot, a tree climbing cousin of the common cat, is known scientifically as fells pardalis, flourishes in Central and South America, once ranged as far north as Georgia. It is a beautifully spotted and barred animal of a tawny hue that, when full grown, is 3½ feet long and weighs 25 to 35 pounds.

These are ominous facts in the Kennedy household. For Smerdley at eight months is growing up fast on his daily diet of a pound of horse meat, two cans of baby food, and a spoonful each of vitamins, cod liver oil and calcium.

Smerdley, who has developed a formidable armory of fang and claw, shows no interest in learning tricks and his main ambition in life seems to be to grow up a normal wildcat.

"We are enjoying a tentative relationship with him right now," said Kennedy, rubbing a deep scratch on the back of his hand. He and his wife are currently

wondering if Smerdley wouldn't become more amicable on a diet of strained spinach instead of horse meat.

Smerdley, while resenting adult handling, is quite amicable to the two Kennedy children—Laurie, 10, and Terence, 12. He loves to attend weekly rock 'n' roll jam sessions in the studio barn with the neighborhood children, sticks his head against the phonograph and drinks in the music—a real live cat.

"He also is quite a television fan," said Kennedy. "He particularly is fond of watching sports, such as football games, and likes to stay up for the late, late movie. But he doesn't care for Westerns—too much shooting in them—and is indifferent to British pictures, which he seems to find too slow and talky. He growls when he wants the program changed."

His role as a watchcat hasn't been tested in action against a burglar. But the ocelot, who has radar-like hearing, growls, hisses and spits at the approach of any stranger.

Rains Bring Up Snake

PITTSBURGH (U)—The heavy rains of recent weeks have brought much havoc to this state—and also a new snake.

The Pennsylvania Herpetological Survey, sponsored by Carnegie Museum, discovered the new snake. It was the first such discovery in Pennsylvania in 62 years. The snake, evidently, only comes out of the ground in very rainy weather. It lives mostly in mountain areas. Rather appropriately it's been named "Mountain Ground Snake" with the scientific tag of "Haida Valeriae Purcha."

Neil D. Richmond of the survey says the snake, never growing longer than 12 inches, is of reddish brown color with black specks.

Poor Service

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (U)—The report made by L. A. McLaughlin, a filling station operator, to police when two gunmen held up his safe containing \$150 was routine except for one thing.

During the holdup a regular customer drove in for gas and the two gunmen, posing as employees filled up the customers tank. But, complained McLaughlin, they neglected to check the oil and clean the car's windshield.

No Manana

ALBUQUERQUE (U)—Members of the New Mexico Manufacturers Assn. have advocated the abandonment of the traditional "manana" of New Mexico's Spanish-speaking heritage and advocated making it a "today" state.

The association said recently "every businessman who has seen fit to take a membership should fully realize that time to act must be now to promote our great state for what it is."

How Not To Get Out On A Limb

About this time every year, the public is treated to one of the most enlightening discourses imaginable. Reference, of course, is to interviews with football coaches, who, like lawyers, have found out you can't get in too deep water if you stick to the old phrases. For instance:

"Coach Zilch, how does your team at Webebo Normal stack up this season?"

"Well Buzz (that's a good name for a sports gleamer), I think we'll do pretty well. We got hurt a lot by graduation. We got a lot of green guys out there, but I'll say this, they're trying. We'll make a lot of mistakes, but we're liable to give somebody a fit. We've got a mighty long way to go, but I never worked with a finer bunch of boys."

One Heart Flutter, And Picture's Awry

WASHINGTON—The throb of a single heart, its sudden deviation from the normal, was enough over the weekend to change the whole face of public affairs from one of calm serenity to anxiety and uncertainty.

For the possible absence of the metaphorical heart of Dwight Eisenhower—the man of kindness and compassion, the man whose depth of understanding and spirit of conciliation has won world renown—brought grave concern to millions of people in this and foreign lands.

Sometimes it takes the shock of change to bring an awareness of the meaning of the past.

Few thought in 1952 that a man whose life had been dedicated to the art of war would become the man of peace to whom nations felt drawn with a yearning that he might accomplish what others had failed to do.

Few thought, moreover, that a man whose career had been deliberately detached from politics could understand popular currents and find himself the most popular figure, politically speaking, of a half century in America.

But just as Woodrow Wilson in 1912 told a hero-worshipping nation, which was being asked to give a third term to Theodore Roosevelt, that there is no "indispensable man," so Dwight Eisenhower this year has been telling the political leaders of his party the same thing to correct their mistaken dependence on his own expected candidacy for re-election.

This correspondent at the time pointed out that Mr. Eisenhower was being sensible as well as modest and that he understood better than the veteran politicians the unwisdom of building a party around one man.

While the Eisenhower personality was a popular one in the campaign of 1952, it was the negative trend against Trumanism which made the wartime general such a welcome alternative. Some 50 million voters do not know enough about any one candidate to forsake parties and issues vital to them and vote solely on personal popularity. On the contrary, the tide was running so deeply against the Truman administration on the issues of "Korea, communism and corruption" that almost any prominent Republican could have won in 1952.

Similarly in the absence of any palpable misdeeds in the political sense such as responsibility for a depression or lack of integrity in public office, the economic condition of the country and its relations to the world is the deciding factor in continuing the administration in power. Hence it has been contended by many experienced observers that anyone the Republicans choose can win in November 1956 if "peace and prosperity," as the people know those issues today, are still prevalent at election time.

Conversely, if a depression hits the country next year or a recession such as swung the 1954 congressional elections so the

Democrats, not even an Eisenhower would be certain of victory.

The idea that the Eisenhower policies would be seriously altered if a change came in the White House is erroneous. Actually any successor would try to capitalize on the present administration's policies and achievements. Every vice president, for instance, who has ever succeeded to the presidency has endeavored to follow the policies laid down by his predecessor and upon occasion has suffered politically for deviating later from such policies.

Today the Republican party is much stronger than it was in 1952 because the myth heard on the stump from the Democrats that the Republicans can bring only depressions has been wiped out by the economic facts of the boom era now prevalent.

So far as world affairs are concerned, it is the secretary of state, John Foster Dulles, who has laid the foundations of American foreign policy though indeed the peaceful aspirations of that policy have been singularly dramatized by President Eisenhower and given warmth by his remarkable faculty for exuding friendliness. This was exemplified at the recent conference in Geneva.

The expectation generally, when the news came last Saturday, was that a "mild heart attack" would surely remove Mr. Eisenhower from the political scene. But physical handicaps have not always in the past disqualified men from holding high office. When Roosevelt attacked Franklin D. Roosevelt it was regarded by many as ending his political career. But his strong will overcame such theories and he served three terms in the White House and a part of the fourth.

The Senate, suffered a severe heart attack. Only a few weeks ago Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, Democratic leader of the Senate, suffered a severe heart attack but expects to be back on the job in Congress next January as he has been making an excellent recovery. Dr. Paul White of Boston, famed heart specialist, who was called into consultation at Denver, was quoted as saying that "a second term for Mr. Eisenhower is quite conceivable."

A heart attack spells the necessity for judicious use of physical energy thereafter. It means the end of golf for many patients—the President played 27 holes last Friday. But mostly it requires an avoidance of stress and strain and nervous tensions. Mr. Eisenhower never was the worrying kind. He was able even during the war to take things in his stride. At the White House he rapidly became accustomed to a staff-type of operation which spared him tension.

So the sudden change, announced over the weekend by the doctors' bulletins, did not necessarily mean to some observers that the President was disqualified for a second term in the presidency unless he himself or the fates decide it that way.

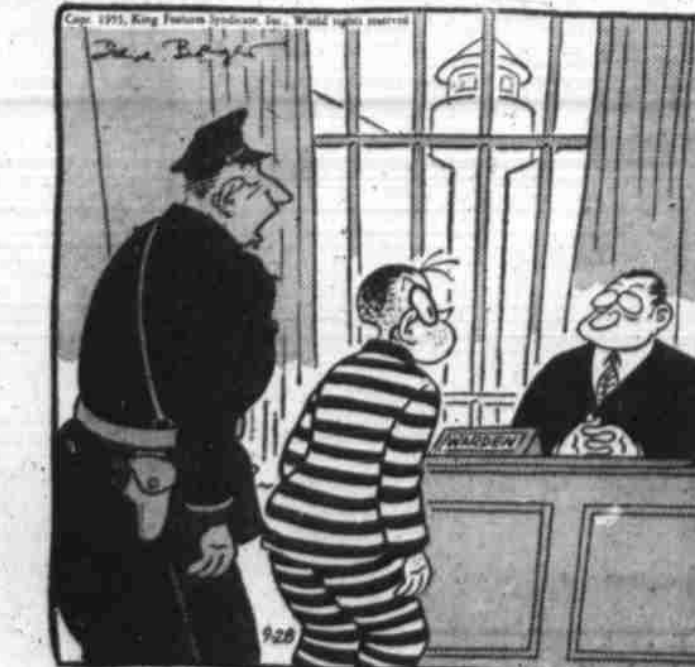
The show was further dampened by an interview in which Nelson said he was fed up and had handed in his notice. But here's the switch: Nelson is back doing the show and Joan isn't.

AT ADLAI'S LECTURE

Talks Set By 3 Top Demos May Pack Political Punch

AUSTIN (U)—Three of the Democratic Party's biggest wheels meet here today for private talks which could pack strong political significance.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson both will welcome Adlai Stevenson on a visit to Texas for a lecture billed in advance as non-partisan.

Stevenson as the 1952 Democratic presidential candidate was swept under in the Dwight D. Eisenhower landslide that carried Texas for the GOP for the second time in a century.

Now, since President Eisenhower's heart attack may take him out of the running next year, many political pros in Texas are saying that Stevenson or almost any other Democratic nominee has a good chance to bring the state back into its traditional political position.

Stevenson's paid lecture on "America, the Economic Colossus" is scheduled for 8 p.m. at the Uni-

versity of Texas' huge Gregory Gymnasium. The session is sponsored by a student committee as the first of the 1955-56 "Great Issues" series. By pre-arrangement, the speech itself will be non-partisan.

Stevenson will be the overnight guest of Sen. Johnson (D-Tex), the Senate majority leader, for what Johnson insists is a purely social occasion. The senator's aides insist there is no political significance in the visit, which was arranged last August when Stevenson wrote Johnson wishing him a speedy recovery from his heart attack.

Both Stevenson and Rayburn will be dinner guests of James P. Hart, former chancellor of the University of Texas and former associate justice of the State Supreme Court. Hart has frequently been mentioned as a 1956 Texas gubernatorial possibility. Whether or not Stevenson, Rayburn and Johnson will get together simultaneously during Stevenson's visit here was not known. Since Stevenson's lecture and his

visits with Johnson and Rayburn were arranged, President Eisenhower suffered his heart attack. The possibility that the President might not become a candidate has raised Democratic hopes to a new high.

It was not considered likely that Stevenson, Rayburn and Johnson, all high in the national councils of the Democratic Party, would fall to discuss that new hope and the Eisenhower prospects at some length.

Whether or not they will reveal what was said or even what they talked about remains to be seen. No press conference has been arranged.

Plans call for him to attend the dinner, then give his lecture and soon thereafter drive to Johnson's ranch about 60 miles west of here. Stevenson will have no opportunity to meet his political foe, Gov. Allan Shivers who repudiated him in favor of Mr. Eisenhower in 1952. Shivers will be in Houston for an oil well driller's convention.

2 Fliers Saved From Sharks Due To Arrive

HONOLULU (U)—Two fliers snatched from the jaws of attacking sharks in a dramatic Pacific rescue arrive today aboard the rescue ship Steel Advocate for a joyous reunion with their wives. The two are the only survivors of a Flying Tiger line cargo plane that ditched at sea Friday night while carrying military supplies to Wake Island. Three of the five-man crew perished, one from shark bites.

One of the survivors, copilot Robert C. Hightower of Vallejo, Calif., was bitten on the foot as he was pulled from the water.

He and his companion, Capt. Anthony Machado of Hollywood, Calif., the pilot, told of their ordeal yesterday in a radio-telephone interview with The Associated Press.

Machado said he survived for 40 hours without a life jacket. "I kept going by hanging on to one of the guys, then the other." The battle with the sharks began almost immediately after the big four-motor plane went down, carrying navigator Dominick Ventresca of Sepulveda, Calif., who was pinned inside the wreckage.

Another navigator, Richard C. Olsen, died from shark bites only a few hours before his two companions were picked up by the freighter Sunday. Hightower said he was bitten 15 to 20 times and Machado said he bore the marks of several brushes with sharks.

"We lost count of the sharks but there were hundreds," Machado said. "We tried to keep watch but we fell asleep. The only way we kept from getting bitten worse was that they nudged us first before taking a bite. That way we woke up and scared them off."

Machado said copilot Warren F. Gin of Los Angeles died from swallowing salt water.

"He didn't want us to touch him," Machado said. "He slipped off his life jacket and went under. I dove down and got him once and we held him up until almost daylight. He died and I took his life jacket. That was about 40 hours after we went down."

Coke Stevenson Gets Insurance Position

DALLAS (U)—The directors of the Physicians Life & Accident Insurance Co. last night named former Texas Gov. Coke R. Stevenson as president. The announcement followed a special meeting.

Stevenson will retain his present position of chairman of the board of directors of the company.

Grandma Quits With Winnings Of \$32,000

NEW YORK (U)—Grandma Myrtle Power, the baseball sage from the Southland, has taken her \$32,000 and retired from big league play on TV after a perfect five-week season.

Urged by her children and a host of well-wishers not to take the risk, she passed up a chance at the grand prize on The \$64,000 Question CBS giveaway show.

The 70-year-old widow says her winnings, estimated at \$31,000 after income taxes, will be "put in a sock" and saved.

Announcing her decision to quit on the program last night, she said it seemed "the sensible thing to do."

Mrs. Power, a baseball fan for 60 years and a Brooklyn Dodger rooter, said: "My Dodgers have won lots of pennants and I feel like I won a pennant, and they never won a World Series and I don't want to beat them to the draw."

Among those who urged her not to try for the \$64,000 by facing another question in her chosen baseball category was Jack Dempsey. Mrs. Power said the former heavyweight boxing champion talked with her at his restau-

rant this week and "almost got down on his knees to ask me to stop on account of the taxes."

If she had tried for the \$64,000, she would have gotten only \$12,000 or \$13,000 more after taxes.

Before Mrs. Power stepped out, another baseball whiz advanced through the \$8,000 question in his chosen category—also baseball.

He's Patrick Keough, 62, of St. Louis, a baseball fan for more than 50 years. He can try next Tuesday night for \$16,000.

Keough won \$4,000 by naming three National League players who have hit four home runs in a single game since 1900—Chuck Klein of Philadelphia, Gil Hodges of Brooklyn and Joe Adcock of Milwaukee.

For \$8,000 he was asked three questions about the 1920 World Series, and he answered correctly:

1. Cleveland was Brooklyn's opponent.
2. Elmer Smith (Cleveland catcher) was the first to hit a bases-loaded home run in World Series play.
3. The Cleveland second baseman, Bill Wambegans, made the first unassisted triple play in a World Series game.

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Negro School Chief Called Violator Of Segregation Ruling

MUSKOGEE, Okla. (U)—The Negro superintendent of schools at Red Bird, an all-Negro community in neighboring Wagoner County, is accused of violating the U.S. Supreme Court ruling on desegregation.

A complaint was filed against Elmer Jenkins by U. Simpson Tate of Dallas, regional attorney for the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People. Jenkins is accused of refusing to allow the transfer of 14 Negro students from his district to nearby white schools.

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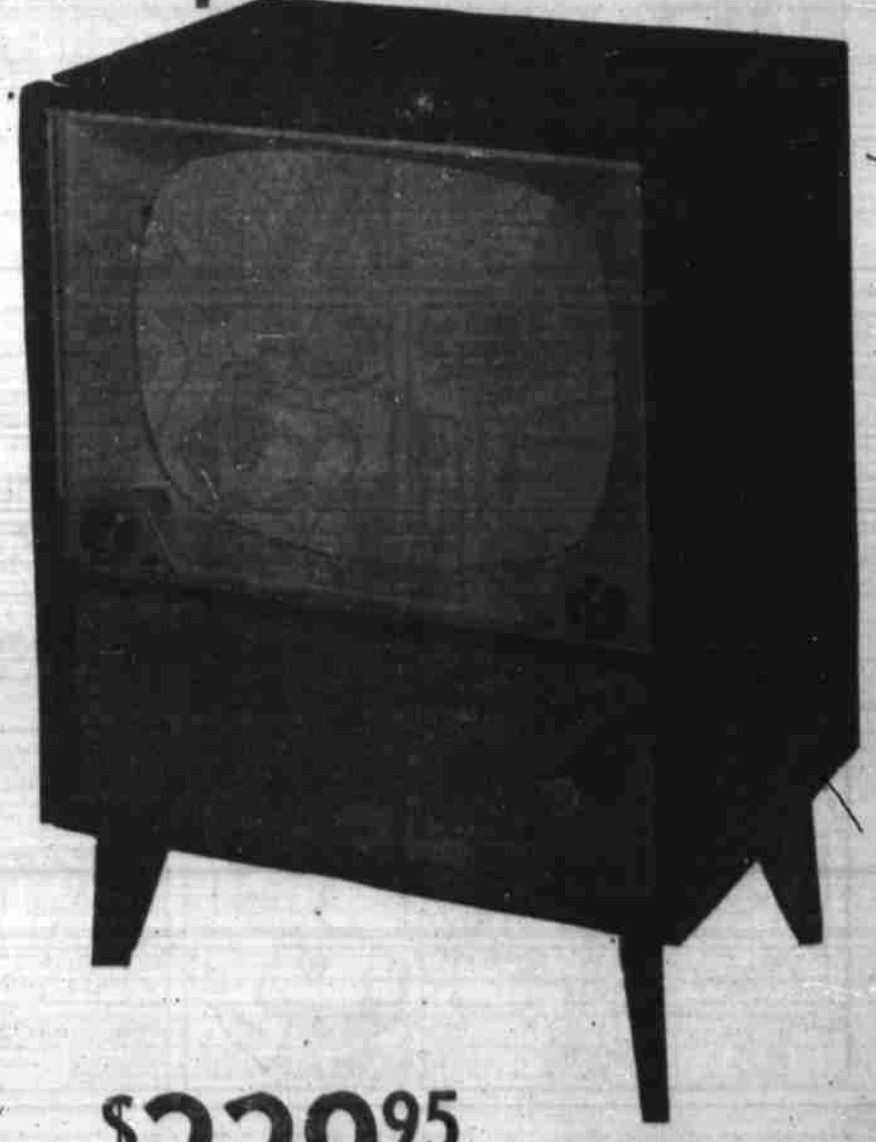
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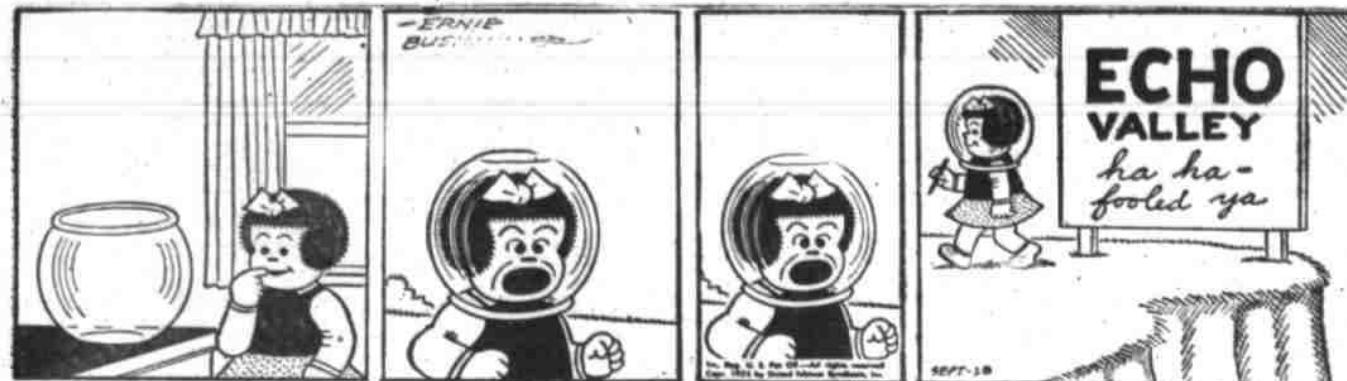

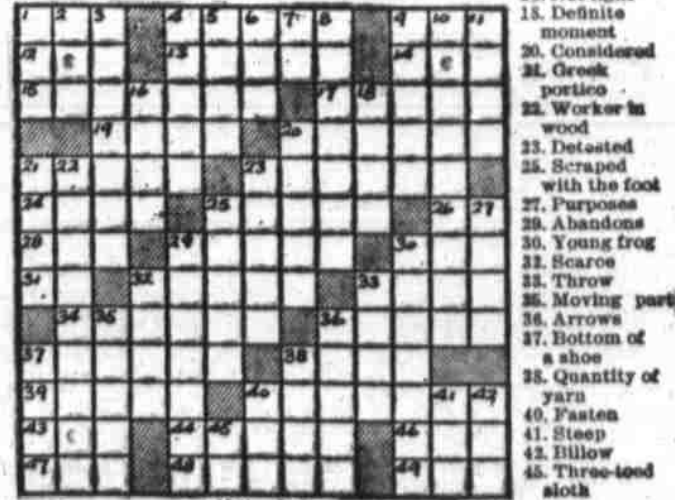

Actress Sobs On Stand In Paternity Suit

LOS ANGELES (U-P) — A pretty movie bit player broke down in sobs in Superior Court as she described her asserted love affair with actor Jess Barker, whom she accuses of fathering her unborn child.

Brunette Yvonne Doughty, 25, testified yesterday that when she informed Barker, 41, of her pregnancy last April 8, he replied, "What do you expect me to do about it?"

Barker is still involved in a divorce contest with screen actress Susan Hayward. Miss Hayward was awarded an interlocutory decree Aug. 17, 1954, which has not been made final because Barker has an appeal on file.

Miss Doughty has asked Judge Elmer Doyle to make a preliminary order requiring Barker to pay \$1,000 in medical bills plus reasonable support, pending trial of her suit to have him declared father of the baby expected in November.

Barker took the stand to testify he had only \$6 in his pocket and "maybe a few dollars in the bank." Barker's attorneys said the actor will deny the paternity charges.

Miss Doughty said the affair began on their second date. Later she said they shared an apartment.

Picnicker Finds Money Stuck In Car

FAIR LAWN, N. J. (U-P) — Police took up Joseph Mondelli's "Let them figure it out" challenge and came up with an explanation for the \$297 in bills he found cluttering the inside and outside of his car as he was about to leave a picnic.

Some youths, on an alcoholic lark, had ransacked autos near the picnic area, taken \$335 from orchestra leader Chick Mahon's car, and for a joke stuck most of the money all over Mondelli's car.

Ike's Team Confident He'll Be Back In Driver's Seat In 30 Days

WASHINGTON (U-P) — President Eisenhower's administrative team was described today as confident that within 30 days at most the President himself will again be able to guide the nation.

The opinion was based on continued optimistic medical reports on Eisenhower's progress in recovering from a heart attack which struck him last Saturday in Denver.

One presidential aide said that if a matter of transcendental importance should arise immediately, it could be taken to the President even now.

Meanwhile, however, Eisenhower's top aides were reported to be settling down to a 30-day "holding operation."

During this period, the source said, the by-word in the government on major policy matters will be "Leave it where Ike last saw it."

For the time being at least, the problem of how, if at all, essential presidential policy-making powers could be delegated to others, a prime topic in Washington Monday, has been pushed into the background.

Cabinet officials were reported to feel that the administration could — and should — roll along for at least the next 30 days on policy decisions already made by Eisenhower before he was stricken. After that time, it was felt, Eisenhower

will be in shape to consider and decide the topmost policy matters, barring complications which might delay his recovery.

Whether Vice President Nixon was a party to this "as you were" thinking — reportedly put forward by Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey and concurred in by Sherman Adams, top presidential assistant — was not clear.

Nixon moved throughout yesterday, grave faced, from one conference to another, at least partially in preparation for formal meetings of the Cabinet and the National Security Council over which he will preside later this week.

Among Nixon's conferences yesterday was one with Leonard W. Hall, chairman of the Republican National Committee. Hall said the meeting concerned Nixon's speaking engagements out of Washington. He said that Nixon, "naturally wants to stay around Washington."

Nixon also attended a luncheon conference with Adams, Humphrey, Atty. Gen. Brownell and Brownell's deputy William P. Rogers.

Brownell said he had come to the luncheon conference — hours after reaching this country from an interrupted vacation in Spain — to be brought up to date on developments since the President's illness.

He said he felt that there exists adequate legal authority for "day-to-day operation of the govern-

ment" during the President's absence. Brownell said his staff was agreed that there is no immediate need for an opinion by the attorney general whether presidential powers can be delegated. But he added that the complex legal question would remain under study.

Afterwards, an informed administration source said a main topic at the luncheon concerned what is the minimum of paper signing, and like routine legal chores, imposed by law on the President, and whether this load could be reduced.

Rocket Sled Sets Land Speed Record

LOS ANGELES (U-P) — A new land speed record of better than 21 miles a minute has been set by an unmanned rocket sled at the naval ordnance test station at China Lake, Calif.

W. D. Drinkwater, Navy scientist, said the steel-shod runners of the sled turned red-hot as it hit 1,280 miles an hour over a 4.1 mile course. Ten rocket motors hurled the heavy sled to peak velocity in two seconds.

The highest speed previously announced for an unmanned sled was 1,100 m.p.h. over a 10,000-foot track at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.

California GOP Leaders Back Knight Decision

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (U-P) — California Republican leaders indicated informally today they'll support Gov. Goodwin J. Knight in his declared intention to lead the state's vote-heavy delegation to the party's 1956 national convention.

Their position, as shown by a telephone survey, could offer a serious obstacle to White House hopes of California's Richard M. Nixon in the event President Eisenhower decides not to run again.

The possibility of Eisenhower's stepping out upon the state's Republicans dizzily on a political merry-go-round — with signs flashing by: Nixon? Knight? Knowland? Warren?

No matter where it stops, party sources acknowledged they're in for an intraparty fight if they can no longer count on Eisenhower's name.

The prize is the second largest delegation to the San Francisco convention, ranked only by New York's.

Gov. Knight, strongly pro-Eisenhower but pointedly cool toward Vice President Nixon, wasted no time in declaring his position after word of Eisenhower's heart attack.

He hopes Ike will recover his health and try for a second term.

If he does, California will swing to him on the first ballot.

Russia Keeps Silent On Middle East Arms Proposal

NEW YORK (U-P) — The Soviet Union kept silent today toward an American-British request that the Communists help in limiting the sale of heavy arms to Egypt and the Middle East.

U.S. Secretary of State Dulles and British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan broached the issue to Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov at dinner here last night following Egyptian Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser's announcement that Red Czechoslovakia had agreed to swap such arms for Egyptian rice and cotton.

Dulles and Macmillan repeated to Molotov their desire, expressed in a statement earlier yesterday, "to avoid an arms race which would inevitably increase the tensions" in the Middle East. In their statement they added the hope that other governments would be guided by the same aim.

The Soviet foreign minister did not comment, other than to say he would communicate the U.S.-British view to Moscow.

Pointing up the specter of an

arms race, Israel's ambassador to Washington, Abba Eban, hurried to newsmen there that his government might ask for U.S. weapons if Egypt gets the Red arms.

In their statement Dulles and Macmillan in essence said they want Middle Eastern countries to have sufficient arms to keep order at home and repel aggression from abroad — but not enough to disturb the Arab-Israeli balance of power.

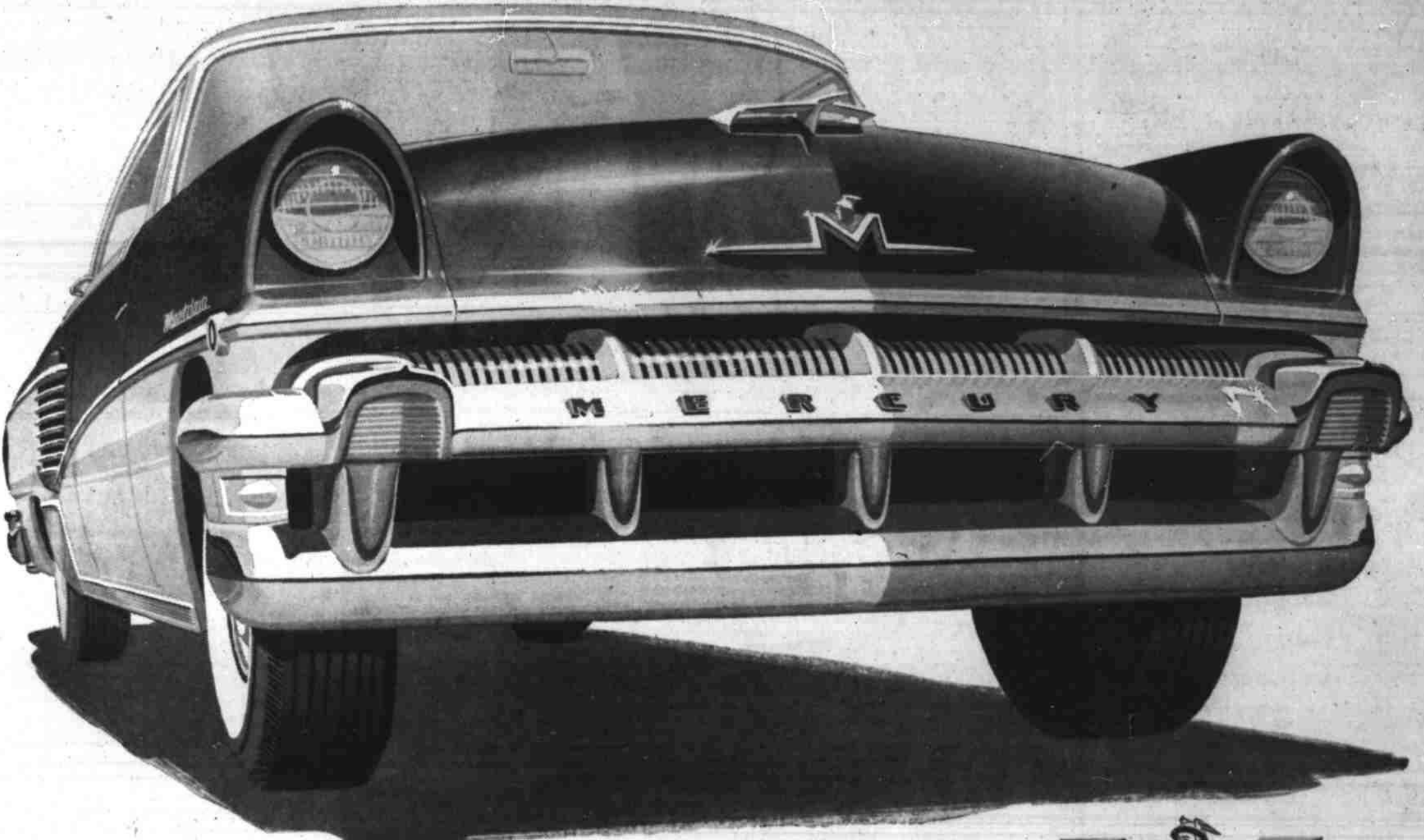

Pollution Of America's Waters Spreads Blight Over U. S. Scene

WASHINGTON (AP)—Pollution of U.S. rivers, lakes and harbors is spreading an evil and potentially dangerous blight upon the American scene.

Countless cities and towns flush their raw, untreated sewage into our beautiful streams. Nearly 11,000 industrial plants spew millions of tons of poisonous, corrosive chemicals into the water we drink and brush our teeth with.

Many cities, such as Los Angeles, have closed down their bathing beaches at times because of pollution. In some areas pollution-stained waters have brought industrial expansion to a virtual halt.

Here, as seen by a panel of sanitation experts who insisted on anonymity, are the nation's "10 most polluted cities"—that is, metropolitan areas where pollution is a major problem:

1. Pittsburgh—Has voted bond issue for treatment works.
2. St. Louis—No sewage treatment.
3. Miami—Putting in big sewage treatment and ocean outfall plant.
4. Kansas City.
5. Omaha—Making progress toward cleanup.
6. Seattle.
7. New York-New Jersey area.
8. Washington, D.C.
9. Charleston, W. Va. (Kanawha Valley area).
10. Youngstown, Ohio (Mahoning River area).

Scientists say even our "second-hand" water—fouled by sewage and recaptured to be used again—is generally safe to drink after going through modern water purification plants. But 31 million Americans live in cities with no water treatment facilities at all.

In the Ohio River watershed alone, 24 cities have no sewage treatment. And in 32 states, appropriations for water pollution control are less than \$30,000 a year.

Federal health authorities today are gravely concerned about long-range effects on human health stemming from the vast influx of noxious industrial wastes into the nation's waterways.

Says Mark D. Hollis, chief sanitary engineer of the Health, Education and Welfare Department:

"The whole problem in sewage treatment in the past was to break down organic waste. Now in the last 15 years we've got 700,000 new synthetic chemicals—plastics and so on—and they have changed the nature of waste.

"What is the effect on human health? We just don't know. We don't get any immediate acute effects, but we must look to the potential long-range dangers.

"What happens is that you put a lot of these chemicals in streams and they react on one another. The result, in effect, is that our streams have become a giant test tube for what is taking place."

As an example, Hollis said that an influx of two-tenths parts per million (PPM) of copper into a stream doesn't affect the fish. Nor does 8 PPM of zinc.

"But if you combine as little as one-tenth of that amount of copper and zinc in the stream, you kill all the fish," he said.

Right now a red-hot controversy is brewing over detergents. What is happening to our lakes and streams as a result of waste water steeped with the 2½ billion pounds of household synthetic detergents sold to American housewives annually?

Some health authorities contend that chemicals found in common synthetic household detergents cause frothing and otherwise gum up the works at water treatment and sewage plants, thereby impeding the purification process.

To which the industry replies: "Nonsense!" or, "Prove it."

F. J. Coughlin, manager of Proctor and Gamble Co.'s research services and chairman of the research advisory subcommittee of the Association of American Soap and Glycerine Producers, said in an interview:

"Household synthetic detergents are no more toxic than ordinary salt. Some feed manufacturers are actually mixing detergents into feed for chickens, cows, pigs and other livestock, and there is some evidence it speeds their growth. At least, there's no harmful effect."

As for assertions that detergents are clogging up water treatment plants, Coughlin said that in a recent test 2,800 pounds of a top-selling household detergent were dumped into the sewage treatment plant at San Antonio, Tex., without causing any marked degree of foaming.

Nevertheless, there have been frequent though scattered reports of interference with normal treatment processes in which detergents were named as the suspect.

The American Water Works Assn. Journal says a blanket of detergent laden foam 12 to 24 inches thick covered the 700-foot-wide Ohio River from shore to shore at Wheeling, W. Va., in December 1953 when heavy rains followed a prolonged dry spell. A sample of the foam, submitted to the Pennsylvania Health Department, was found to contain 3,800 parts per million of synthetic detergent.

Tests have shown that as little as 14 PPM of detergents in a stream killed fish. And rats given an 8 per cent mixture of detergents in their diet all died in a week.

Slowly awakening to the menace of foul water, more than 32 states have now enacted antipollution legislation, and many towns and industries have been ordered to clean up. They are beginning to realize that pollution deprives them of badly needed water in recurring times of drought.

Truman Claims History Aid In Red Infiltration Tussle

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former President Truman says his knowledge of history helped him deal "calmly" with the "Communists in government" controversy during his administration.

Truman likens the allegations of subversion in government to the "witch craze" of colonial days. He says they reflected "anti-Communist hysteria" and brought "indiscriminate branding of innocent persons as subversives."

In the second installment of his memoirs, published in the current issue of Life magazine, Truman says his actions in the situation were shaped in part by knowledge gleaned from reading in history of what he termed previous "waves of hysteria."

He deals also with two other items often cited by his political critics—the failure of his Kansas City haberdashery after World War I and his association with the late Tom Pendergast, once the "boss" of Kansas City Democratic politics.

Truman blames the Republicans for the 1922 failure of his clothing store, operated in partnership with Eddie Jacobson. He contends Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon, a Republican, pursued economic policies that spelled financial disaster for Truman and thousands of others.

As for Pendergast, he tells of flatly rejecting an obvious bid by "Boss Tom" for the award of 10 million dollars in road contracts to a group of businessmen friendly to the Democratic city machine.

Truman, then presiding judge of Jackson County, relates that when Pendergast and the contractors called on him he announced the business would be "let to the lowest bidder" and, in keeping with a campaign promise, would be supervised by a bipartisan board of engineers.

He quotes Pendergast as telling the contractors: "I told you he's the contraryest man in the state of Missouri."

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Fire Prevention Observance Slated In Lamesa Schools

LAMESA — Fire prevention observance is shaping up for Lamesa schools, according to Terry Land, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee planning for the special week.

Insurance underwriters from the West Texas Field Club from Lubbock will come here Oct. 11-12 to visit all schools and give programs before all service clubs.

J. B. McAmis, representing the volunteer fire department, said \$50 in prizes would be posted by that organization for the poster contest, which is open to all school children. The Junior Red Cross is adding \$10 to the prize fund.

During the week there will be an inspection of all schools for fire hazards, a check on fire drills, etc.
