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PLAN SHEETS TO BE BASIS OF 1943 PROGRAM

County-Wide Sign-Up Will Begin
Next Tuesday in Major Farm
Communities of Area

Beginning Tuesday, March 2, Scurry County farmers will sign 1943 farm plan sheets, the county AAA office announced Tuesday.

Farmers of the county have a series of four community gatherings scheduled next week, at which time they will record 1943 farm production goals.

Community meetings scheduled next week, at which time 1943 plan sheets will be signed, are listed as follows:

Tuesday, March 2—Dunn, Union and Camp Springs.

Wednesday, March 3—Ira, Hermleigh and Ennis Creek.

Thursday, March 4—Fluvanna, Inadale and Bison.

Saturday, March 6—Snyder.

All producers of the county should bring these facts in mind when attending the gathering in their home community.

That the farm plans and accompanying data gathered will constitute the basis for action by the county USDA War Board in advising the Selective Service Boards with respect to draft deferment under the provisions of the law.

Information obtained will be used in advising the rationing boards of eligibility for machinery, gasoline and other materials.

All information will be used to advise the responsible agencies with respect to provision of needed labor.

"As you know," the county agent's office states, "we are committed to large shipments of food and supplies to our allies in foreign countries. Our leaders have asked us to show our intended acreages of each crop so they may in turn promise help to the allies. We do not wish to promise help and then be unable to deliver it. When you indicate your acreage on the farm plan sheet, it will enable them to make a reasonable estimate of the amount of supplies that we can send to the aid of the democracies."

AAA Officials Go To Regional Session Held at Big Spring

Headed by Johnnie M. Ammons, county AAA administrative officer, members of the county AAA committee, the county AAA office clerk and M. L. Andress, county RACC representative, returned Wednesday evening from Big Spring, where the group attended a two-day district Triple A meeting.

"Conservation of Materials and Services" constituted the theme of the district convocation. Subjects discussed included RACC loans, crop insurance, war crop goals, incentive payments and present methods of farming.

569 Grade Three Tires Issued This Week to Scurry

Granting of 450 extra tires, Grade III, for the month of February to Scurry County's War Price and Ration Board caused the board to take action this week to get tires to virtually every person eligible for the war grade rubber. Total of 569 Grade III passenger tires are being issued.

Extra allotment for Scurry County was approved by the Office of Price Administration, Giles Bowers, general chairman of the County War Price and Ration Board, states. Scurry County's War Price and Ration Board approved, through Tuesday evening, issuance, for example of 569 Grade III tires, three Grade II tires, five Grade I tires and 55 tubs.

The board also is issuing approval certificates for 54 truck and bus tires, 16 tubs, 38 recaps and nine farm implement tires.

Approval of the February Grade III tire increase for the county has done much to alleviate an acute shortage of rubber for eligible vehicle owners, Bowers declares, and will make it possible to wipe the ration board slate clean at the end of February business.

Cream Bringing 47c On Market in Snyder

Butterfat is being purchased by Snyder produce houses now for 47 cents per pound—highest price since 1919-1920—according to information from produce handlers.

Ceiling price of 47 cents per pound has been set on butterfat by the government to keep price for cream from getting entirely out of line.

Eggs were bringing 30 cents per dozen Tuesday—a considerable dip from prices obtained on the Christmas and New Year markets. Produce men express the opinion, however, that eggs will not sell below 30 cents per dozen, even though egg receipts have gained rapidly with advent of warm weather and more flocks getting into egg production.

Texas Week Will Be Observed in County

Attention of Snyder and Scurry County people is directed this week to a proclamation by Mayor H. G. Towle of Snyder, designating the week of February 28 through March 6 as Texas Week.

Texas Week is the calendar week in which the approach of Texas Independence Day and Alamo Day herald a week of deep significance and profound meaning, in war-time, to the hearts and minds of Scurry County people.

Appropriate observance of the two Texas holidays is being arranged in county schools, according to information released by faculty members. Snyder Lions Club is planning a Texas Week program for its Tuesday luncheon meeting.

REGISTRATION FOR NEW FOOD BOOK STARTS

Three-Day Sign-Up Being Staged
In Schools of County as Part
Of National Rationing

Three-day period of registration for War Ration Book No. 2 began this (Thursday) morning at Snyder and Scurry County schools, with school students getting a two-day holiday as a result of the registration.

Scurry County's War Price and Ration Board issued an appeal late Wednesday to Snyder and Scurry County consumers to register for War Ration Book No. 2 in their home communities.

M. E. Stanfield, Snyder High School principal, is in charge of the three-day registration in Snyder Schools, and superintendents and principals are in charge of registration at other county schools.

Registration hours each day in county schools have been set from 9:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m., County War Price and Ration Board members state.

Saturday night, midnight, canned goods—fruits, soups, vegetables and canned products containing tomatoes, were "frozen" in Snyder and county grocery stores, and will remain "frozen" until point rationing begins Monday, March 1.

Those who register for War Ration Book No. 2 should make sure they have the OPA declaration form filled out before going to the registration site, Giles Bowers, general chairman of the County War Price and Ration Board, declares.

Tire Inspection on B and C Vehicles to Expire Sunday Night

Snyder and Scurry County vehicle owners holding "B" and "C" ration books are reminded by Scurry County's War Price and Ration Board that Sunday will be the deadline for having tires inspected. Since the deadline falls on Sunday, motorists must have tires inspected before Saturday night.

All commercial vehicles, too, must have tire inspections by Saturday night—if the owners are interested in getting gasoline to operate on during the coming weeks.

Inspections will be made by service stations in Snyder and elsewhere designated as tire inspection stations. Designated inspectors have signs displayed at a prominent spot in their place of business.

Tire inspection records for "B" and "C" ration book holders and owners of commercial vehicles, after submission to the County War Price and Ration Board, must be kept in every vehicle at all times.

313,920 Eggs Bought By Produce Houses

Believe it or not, but Snyder produce houses alone bought 313,920 eggs last week, and paid Scurry County poultry raisers around 30 cents per dozen for the "fruit of the hen house."

Total of 872 cases of eggs, 30 dozen in each case, were bought last week by Snyder produce houses. This figure is for produce houses alone, and does not include eggs purchased by grocery stores.

Snyder produce houses also paid out \$2,500 last week for cream—an indication that the county's farmers are on the job to produce dairy produce, needed urgently by the armed forces and for lend-lease requirements.

SENATOR MORRIS TELLS BANQUETERS FOLKS AT HOME MUST KEEP FAITH WITH FIGHTERS

"I have no faith in prophets who go about speaking of a new social and economic order for America after the war," Senator G. C. Morris of Greenville declared Friday evening at Scurry County's annual Chamber of Commerce Victory Banquet. "I believe we will still have the same social order between right and wrong."

"Our boys on the world's battlefronts are keeping faith with us, and it will be up to us, through organizations like the Chamber of Commerce, to keep faith with the boys in service," Morris emphasized to the 300 banquet attendees.

Senator Morris, as principal speaker of the evening, expressed the belief the boys in service would find the same sun, moon and stars when they returned after the war. He said they all would demand the right to the freedom and liberty of free men and women.

Willard Jones, editor and publisher of The Scurry County Times, who has served as Chamber of Commerce vice president the past year, was elevated to the presidency of the organization for 1943.

Dunn Girls Lose Only Two Games In Basket Season

Members of the Dunn girls' basketball team, coached by Superintendent O. K. Davis, closed the 1942 basketball season by marking up 12 games out of 14 played, school officials report.

Record made by the Dunn girls' division, is one of the outstanding mark-ups for the southern county school in many years.

The Dunn girls won a total of 12 games in playing Pylon, Hermleigh, Westbrook, Lorraine and Fluvanna.

Of the two games the Dunn girls lost this season, Divide beat the Dunn team 36 to 24, and Trent girls beat Dunn girls, in a tournament at Highland last week, by one tally.

Hine Turner, a forward, and Janice Billingsley, guard, two Dunn players, were placed in the all-district team, Coach Davis reports.

End of the basketball season, tabulations reveal, indicate Dunn girls amassed a total of 336 points, compared to 226 points for their nearest opponent.

One of the Dunn girls who made a brilliant showing was Frances Ashley, a freshman, who played forward as a substitute team member. In the game against Pylon girls, Frances scored eight points more than any other forward.

SCOUTS SLATE FIRST HIKE OF YEAR TODAY

Boys of District to Stage Two-Day
Advancement Outing on York
Place North of Snyder

Two-day camp for Boy Scouts of the Snyder District, first to be announced for 1943, is being set up this (Thursday) morning on the Joe York place, one mile northwest of the square, district officials report.

Boy Scouts of Snyder troops and the district who attend the two-day camp leave Winston Feed Store, one block north of the square, at 9:00 o'clock this (Thursday) morning. Since classes are not being held in schools of this territory today and Friday, because of food rationing book sign-up, boys are expected to be eager to make the two-day outing.

James K. Polk, Boy Scout field executive stationed here, who will be in active charge of the camp, will be assisted by Jesse Clements, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 36; E. J. Bradbury, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 38; and C. W. Geelan, Scoutmaster of Troop No. 35.

Advancements will be stressed at the Thursday-Friday camp, and the Scouts will camp overnight, if the weather permits.

Charles Boren and Harold Lewis Wade will be in charge of tenderfoot tests, June Jones and Kenneth Woods in charge of second class advancements, and Douglas McClain in charge of first class advancements.

Boys who want to pass second class cooking tests are asked to take the required meat and potatoes, and all who attend the first camp of the new year are requested to take camp equipment, handbooks and test equipment.

While the principal attendance at today's and Friday's camp will be composed of Snyder Boy Scouts, invitation has been extended Hobbs Troop No. 75 to participate in the camp.

Loans to Purchase Farm Animals Are Available at FSA

Farm Security Administration funds are still available in Scurry County for loans to farmers, farm laborers, tenants and half tenants for purchase of cows, hogs, chickens and other items needed for increased food production, Gerald G. Gordon, Scurry County FSA supervisor, reminds county citizens.

Gordon brought out the fact that increased demands for milk, eggs, beef, pork and vegetables is brought closer home with food rationing now going into effect.

Labrers, for example, who live in town and have available space for keeping cows, hogs or chickens, and who cannot obtain adequate financing elsewhere are eligible for the FSA loans, Gordon says.

Those wishing FSA loans to buy chickens, hogs or cows are asked to contact the FSA office, basement of the Fair Store, at the earliest possible date.

Livestock Threatened By Shortages of Feed

Cooperative Milk Plant Will Be Discussed at Thursday Meeting

Wouldn't you, Mr. Business Man and Mr. Farmer, like to see Snyder get a cooperative milk plant?

If you would, you have a cordial invitation to attend a mass meeting Thursday evening, March 4, 8:30 o'clock, in the county court room. Purpose of the gathering is to see what steps can be taken to secure a cooperative milk plant in Snyder.

Scurry County farmers and business leaders of Snyder have been talking about a cooperative pasteurized milk plant here for the past several weeks. Some 10 men of the county have been checking into the possibility of such a project.

At the present time, there exists an acute shortage of milk for the men in military service. At the Lubbock Army Flying School, for example, where milk is urgently needed for air corps personnel, each man is rationed to one pint of milk daily—at noontime. Minimum of

one quart per day is needed by the men who fly and repair airplanes. Since the transportation problem is becoming acute for the farmer and dairy herd owner, this fact, coupled with labor shortages, makes a cooperative milk plant project doubly attractive.

With a plant of the type advocated for Snyder, farmers could own the plant and operate it on a full-scale cooperative basis—just as cooperative gins are operated.

Too, a coop milk plant here would allow farmers to pool their eggs for toy market prices, have their own pick-up system to get eggs and milk to town once daily and improve considerably quality of products sold.

Every person interested in the improvement of dairying and agriculture in Scurry County, and especially in a cooperative milk plant, is invited to bring some neighbors to next Thursday evening's mass gathering.

Red Cross War Fund Quota to Be Raised in Week

Monday, March 8, was set this week as the opening day of Scurry County's 1943 Red Cross War Fund campaign—a campaign which is expected to result in the county's \$4,100 quota being raised in less than one week's campaigning.

This seems like a difficult goal to reach, but E. O. Wedgeworth, county chairman of the Red Cross War Fund drive, has conferred with community RC leaders, and believes the job can be done in a period of one week.

With a county quota of \$4,100, Snyder and Scurry County people who formerly gave \$1 for Red Cross memberships will be asked to step up donations to the \$4 and \$5 levels—on a voluntary basis.

List of community Red Cross quotas in the RC War Fund drive, names of community committees and other details on the forthcoming drive will be released in next week's Times, Wedgeworth states.

The Red Cross has shouldered more war-time tasks than at any period in history of the organization, and must work on dozens of fronts throughout the world. This calls for more money to carry on home service work, blood plasma bank work for wounded men in the services, nurses at home and abroad and innumerable other duties.

Response to the March campaign here, Red Cross officials say, will provide Scurry County's answer to the challenge for funds to keep the mother of mercy agency functioning.

Farmers Assured of Gas for Vital Travel

Farmers of Scurry County and this trade area were assured this week by the Office of Price Administration, through Scurry County's War Price and Ration Board, that they will get all the essential gasoline for non-highway purposes they need.

The Office of Price Administration, through the County War Price and Ration Board, plans to issue farmers gasoline for non-highway use for a six-month period.

OPA declares "it is not the intention of the program to cut down on necessary allotments of gasoline for use by farmers, but we must not relax our vigilance over the use of rubber for unnecessary purposes."

James Wells Burned When Acid Explodes

James Wells, co-operator of Wells Wrecking Yard in East Snyder, sustained painful burns Tuesday afternoon on the face, arms and chest from sulphuric acid when a refrigerator freezing unit he was working on exploded.

Wells, who quickly stripped his shirt, was brought to a local hospital by Mr. and Mrs. O. O. Paulkenberry and given emergency treatment. He was reported Wednesday to be resting well.

RELIEF URGED FOR RANCHERS BY CC GROUP

Delegations in Abilene Wednesday
To Seek Release of Cattle and
Meal as Emergency Move

E. O. Wedgeworth, Scurry County Chamber of Commerce manager, headed a delegation of CC representatives who met in Abilene Wednesday with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce regional organization, to secure release of cattle and meal for livestock owners of this trade area.

Those who accompanied Wedgeworth to Abilene included A. W. Arnold, Harrie Winston, Al Perry, J. O. Sheild and J. O. Skimmon.

An acute feed shortage has recently developed in Scurry, Fisher, Garza, Kent, Borden and other counties of this section, due to the fact oil mills are not releasing cake, meal and hulls for sale to stockmen in sufficient quantities.

The situation is further worsened by the recent burning of the Fuller Cotton Oil Mill at Snyder, which has in the past supplied the major portion of cottonseed products to cattle raisers in this section.

Backed by local chambers, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is going to bat for the cattlemen and farmers to secure release of feed for livestock.

Outlook for the feed situation is admittedly dark, but with lend-lease requirements and the armed services demanding more pork, poultry and beef than ever before, the Scurry County Chamber of Commerce is joining WTCC officials in demanding that something be done about the matter.

Shopping Canned Goods Simple on Point Schedule

Snyder and Scurry County housewives will find shopping under the point rationing plan, which becomes effective Monday, much simpler than might be expected, Scurry County's War Price and Ration Board predicted Wednesday.

Most purchases of canned fruits and vegetables, it is pointed out, may be made by using only three of the 16 columns in the official table of point values announced this week.

Take, for instance, some of the most widely sold canned goods, with approximate weights and points of values of the most common sizes. Your purchase table would look something like this:

Peas, 1 lb. 4 oz., 16 points; corn, 1 lb. 4 oz., 14 points; tomatoes, 1 lb. 3 oz., 16 points; asparagus, 1 lb. 3 oz., 14 points; beans, green and wax, 1 lb. 3 oz., 14 points; spinach, 1 lb. 2 oz., 11 points; peaches, 1 lb. 14 oz., 21 points; pears, 1 lb. 14 oz., 21 points; sliced pineapple, 1 lb. 14 oz., 24 points; fruit, coarser, 1 lb. 1 oz., 11 points; grapefruit juice, 2 lb. 14 oz., 23 points; tomato juice, 1 lb. 14 oz., 32 points; tomato juice, 1 lb. 7 oz., 17 points; pineapple juice, 2 lb. 14 oz., 32 points; grape juice, 1 qt. or 2 lbs., 15 points; soups, 10½ oz., 6 points.

Governor Urges Farmers Be Let Loose on Acreage

Texas Ranchman Governor Coke R. Stevenson said Tuesday, for the benefit of people in this trade area, the acute shortage of protein feeds in Scurry and other counties of the state could be solved if the farmers were "turned loose."

The best he could learn from government officials in Washington, through telephone conversations, was that "they cannot decide which bureau is holding up the release of needed feedstuffs."

Stevenson asserts that many farmers, here and elsewhere over the state, are writing to suggest that the problem of feed could be solved if it were not for restrictions placed on planting.

He cited a letter from a farmer who was in danger of losing his peanut bonus because he had inadvertently planted too much corn.

"This farmer said they made him plow up 73 acres of corn to plant peanuts that he knew would not mature," Stevenson asserted, adding:

"Sure enough, he plowed up his corn, planted the peanuts, and the peanuts didn't produce. If they had let him alone, there would have been just about 73 acres of corn."

Stevenson's comment followed testimony before a state Senate committee that Texas will lose half its lamb and kid crop, and much of its calf crop, if concentrated feeds such as soybean meal are not made available in three weeks.

The committee was told that one bottleneck is that large supplies of soybeans are being "held off" the market because the government promised mid-western farmers a bonus if they would not sell their beans until spring.

Trees Budding

Predictions this early on the county's 1943 fruit crop would prove premature, but orchard owners of the county declared Wednesday that fruit trees have been only slightly damaged by recent weather changes.

Tone of the weather, and severity of cold spells for the next 60 days will govern, to a large extent, how much fruit Scurry County raises in 1943, fruit growers report.

Plums, pears, peaches and apricots are beginning to bud, as are numerous varieties of ornamental trees, and the kind of weather we have during the next few weeks will spell the story for fruit, growers say.

County Churches to Observe Red Cross Sunday in Services

Snyder and other Scurry County churches indicated Wednesday a major part of services Sunday morning will be devoted to observance, with the rest of the nation, of Red Cross Sunday, Scurry County chapter officials reported Wednesday.

Information on Red Cross services, and roles the Red Cross is playing in the world war of today—with home service units, blood plasma program for wounded soldiers and other phases of the program—will be explained in pulpits over the county.

Ministers of the county ask that churches devote a portion of services Sunday to the Red Cross and the mother agency of mercy and helpfulness in America and abroad.

Mrs. J. G. Hicks, chairman of Red Cross production work for Scurry County, states observance of Red Cross Week will begin, officially, for Scurry County Friday.

Not only Snyder churches, but churches in other parts of the county are planning special services Sunday in connection with observance of Red Cross Sunday.

244 CLUB BOYS PLEDGE FOOD- FOR-WAR AIM

Broad Program Designed to Feed
And Clothe Soldier and Self
As 4-H Club Project

Scurry County's 4-H Club mobilization drive has resulted to date in enrollment of 244 boys for 1943. Edward S. Hyman, county agricultural agent, reported Tuesday.

Production goals of 4-H Club boys in the county are featured by pledge of 38 4-H Club members to raise, for example, 1,768 hens this year. This week has been designated as national 4-H Club Mobilization Week, and those being enrolled for 1943 projects plan to raise enough to feed and clothe themselves and an equal number of men in military service. Texas boys and girls, for instance, plan to raise enough to feed themselves and enough surplus to feed all Texans in service.

Snyder, Bethel, Martin, Hermleigh, Ira, Fluvanna, Dunn and Pyron communities constitute the eight county 4-H Clubs whose members have pledged the following production goals for 1943:

Hogs, 173 head; beef calves, 48; dairy cows, 32; sheep, 21; gardens, 32.

Six 4-H Club boys plan to raise a total of 26 acres of maize; seven club boys a total of 63 acres of cotton; and 38 4-H Club members plan to raise 1,768 hens this year.

February 28 Will Be Deadline For B and C Renewals

February 28 is probably the last day for Snyder and Scurry County holders of "B" and "C" gasoline ration books to have tires of vehicles inspected.

So warns Giles Bowers, general chairman of the County War Price and Ration Board, who asks that motorists not wait until the last minute to have tires inspected by approved inspectors.

While the subject of rationing is under discussion, March 15 has been set as a deadline for accepting stamp No. 11 in war ration book No. 1 for sugar. Stamp No. 25 in the No. 1 book will be good for coffee purchase until March 21.

March 1, point rationing goes into effect here and elsewhere over the nation, and institutional users of processed foods will register March 1 to 10 for the point rationing system.

Here Are Some Highlights of New Rationing Plans

Below are given some tips on point rationing, which becomes effective March 1, prepared by Estella Rabel, county home demonstration agent, which will prove of value to all Snyder and Scurry County housewives.

The tips on point rationing follow: Each person in Scurry County who is not in the armed forces, confined or resident in an institution will receive a war ration book No. 2. This book will have eight pages made up of 96 blue stamps and 96 red stamps. Each of the stamps will have a letter on it from A to Z, and each stamp will also have a number on it. The letter will indicate the rationing period and the number will be the point value. The point value will be shown by the following numbers: 1, 2, 5 and 8.

The blue will be used for processed foods such as canned fruits and vegetables, frozen fruits and vegetables, dried fruits and others. The red stamps will be used for meat which will be rationed later.

Point rationing will probably go into effect March 1, with the rationing books being issued around February 27.

Point rationing will allow consumers a freedom of choice of articles in certain groups. There will be a limit on quantity that can be bought, but wise shoppers can use their points to obtain the most possible amount allowed per person. During the month a person will be allowed so many points (probably 48). After these are used, it will be all that is available for the individual for another month.

Point values on articles will be determined by the scarcity of the food. The larger quantity of a product we have on hand, the lower the point value. The more scarce a product, the higher the point value.

Bobby Mitchell War Prisoner in Philippine

Sergeant Robert D. Mitchell, son of Mrs. Marion M. Mitchell, of Snyder, is a prisoner of war in the hands of the Japanese government in the Philippine Islands, the War Department officially announced this week.

Sergeant Mitchell had previously been reported a prisoner of war in the hands of the Japanese, but his name has been included in the War Department communiqué listing 1,036 American prisoners—including 110 Texans.

Jerry Beavers of Camp Springs, graduate of Hobbs School, has been elected treasurer of the Aggie Club at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, where he is enrolled as a junior, Tech officials report.

Jerry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Beavers, of Camp Springs, is enrolled at Texas Tech as a junior dairy manufacturing major. He received scholastic honors during high school days at Hobbs, in Western Fisher County.

RURAL SCHOOL UNITS ELIGIBLE FOR LUNCHES

District Food Distributor Explains
New Set-Up for Serving Hot
Meals to Students

"The Food Distribution Administration proposes to designate certain foods which sponsors may purchase locally for school hot lunch room programs, in contrast to the former method of buying and distributing foods through the welfare department to various schools," Frank J. Riarson, area representative of PDA, Lubbock, told representatives of Scurry County schools Tuesday morning.

Anthony Hunt of Abilene, District 8 deputy superintendent, presided at the gathering, called to explain new policies of conducting hot lunch projects in Scurry County. Heretofore, Riarson pointed out, hot lunch room programs have been in effect only in independent school districts, but rural schools may now become eligible for lunch room projects—if they have necessary equipment.

The Food Distribution Administration, county teachers were informed, is replacing WPA as federal lunch room sponsor. Schools having lunch room programs will be allowed seven cents per day per child for balanced meals.

The Lubbock PDA chief declared lunch room projects now operating in Snyder Schools, at Ira, Turner, Benis Creek and Lloyd Mountain constituted an outstanding example of lunch room projects in the Lubbock district.

Changes in method of operating lunch room projects, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will allow certain fruits, fresh vegetables, fresh meats, cereal products and dairy products, dried beans and peas and other protein foods to be included in lunch room menus.

Representatives of Scurry County schools present at Tuesday's meeting predicted the new PDA program would prove more satisfactory than the ex-WPA food distribution program.

Dunn Boy Makes High Rating.

James D. Hollis, nephew of Mrs. L. A. Scott of Dunn, who enlisted in the U. S. Navy last November 4, made the highest rating for armed guard in a class of over 1,000 navy enlistees in his class, Mrs. Scott is informed. James, now on duty in the Pacific, is a seaman, first class, and in line for rating as a petty officer.

Nearly 850 Boys From County Now In Armed Service

Total of 848 Scurry County men have entered various branches of military service, either on a drafted or voluntary basis, since the war began, a tabulation by official and authentic sources indicates.

Snyder and Scurry County men represent every branch of the nation's armed services, and are located all the way from Iceland and the Aleutian Islands to Guadalcanal, the Solomon Islands, New Caledonia, Burma and the blistering sand of Africa to posts within sight of Cairo, Egypt.

A number of Scurry County boys, for instance, in military service are serving as bombardiers, gunners, pilots, navigators, infantrymen, signal corps men, plain soldiers and "snipers" in various parts of England, France and other parts of the European war theatre.

Duties of Scurry County boys in military service are so varied space forbids mention of the duties individually, but sufficient to say that Snyder and Scurry County boys are giving their all for the cause of victory and freedom.

County Schools Get First Inspection Tour

Anthony Hunt of Abilene, District 8 deputy superintendent, and Mrs. Gaston Brock, county superintendent, completed Monday and Tuesday inspection of Hermleigh, Pyron and Snyder Schools.

Hunt, in the Monday-Tuesday inspection tour, finished checking schools for the present term, but expects to return in the spring to check school plants before tests are given for standardization.

"I'm proud of the record Scurry County schools are making in the face of war-time difficulties," Hunt declared, "and am always glad to see school trustees and patrons who work so loyally with school faculty members in this county."

Skinny Holmes Safe At Overseas Landing

Private First Class Howard D. (Skinny) Holmes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Holmes, who sailed some time in January in a convoy group, has arrived safely overseas, his parents are informed.

Private Holmes, oldest son of the Snyder couple, was inducted into the U. S. Army in March of last year and was formerly stationed at San Diego, California.

Colonel John E. Sentell Says He Sees Long War With Germany

Remarks Lieutenant Colonel John E. Sentell, U. S. Army, at Camp Howe, Gainesville, made at Tuesday's Lions Club meeting will prove interesting to Times readers, since Sentell was formerly Second Battalion commander, 142nd Infantry, and is a former commander of Scurry County's Company G guard unit.

Sentell, formerly attorney-at-law here, said:

"My guess is that this war will not be over soon, and it's a frank admission that the big job lies ahead of the U. S. Army.

"Germany is weakening, but we have no indication that the country will soon crack. We had better expect the worst in a long war, then, rejoice if things improve.

"Americans have not been hurt—yet; at least nothing to compare with what the Allies are suffering. The American army's job lies ahead.

"Not minimizing the heroes of the past several months," Sentell declared, "but the United States is yet to get its baptism by fire. Our troops are trained before being sent to battle, and troops of this war are so much better trained than troops of the last World War there is no comparison.

"Our enemies," Colonel Sentell pointed out, "have the advantage of battle training, and we must expect losses until our boys have actual battle experience."

Colonel Sentell added, as a sidelight, that the Sentell children had been in nine different schools since they left Snyder two years ago—very few of which were better than

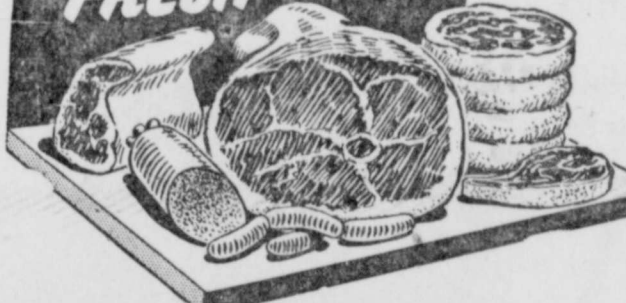

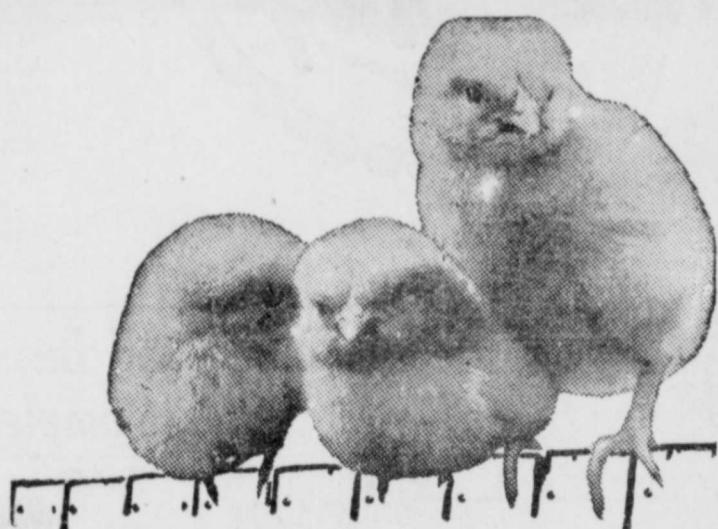

TEXAS WEEK PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the approach of Texas Independence Day and Alamo Day heralds a week of deep significance and profound meaning in the minds and hearts of all Texans, and

Whereas, I am prompted by the patriotic members of the Forty-Sixth Legislature, as expressed in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 8, and by my own feelings of love, loyalty and patriotism toward my state;

Now, therefore, I, Dr. Howard G. Towle, mayor of the City of Snyder, Texas, do hereby proclaim the week of February 28 through March 6, 1943, as Texas Week.

I urge all citizens of this municipality and of Texas to observe Texas Week in an appropriate manner. No one of us will fail to cherish the rich heritage which our founders and forefathers prepared for us of this generation.

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BABY CHICKS



The U. S. Department of Agriculture says: "Probably the most important step . . . is to stress at every opportunity the vital necessity of poultry raisers starting their chicks earlier than usual in order to lengthen the hatching season. It just doesn't seem possible now that hatcherymen can take care of the flood of business."

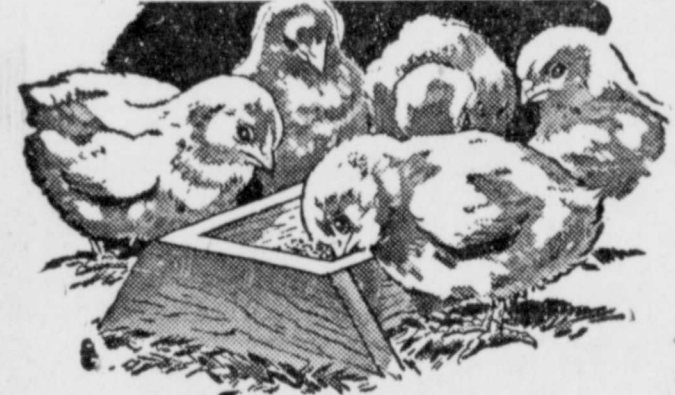

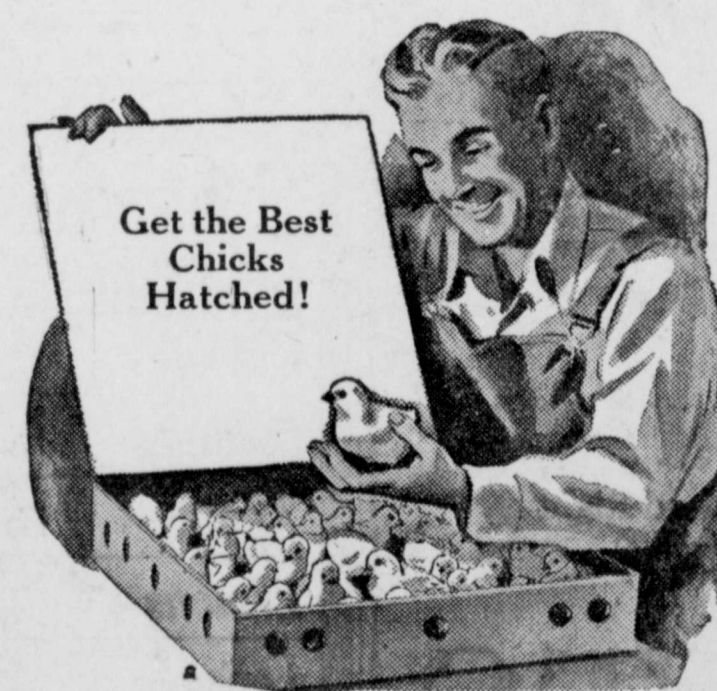

We know, Mr. Business Man and Mr. Citizen, that you're mighty busy these days, short handed and probably just a little out of sorts at the acute shortage of many things you need, but don't you think a kindly word, and a pat on the back will do more to help your neighbors and friends keep even tempers than almost anything else? War-time irritations and lack of words, at times, from our boys overseas is downright maddening, but worrying and fretting always prove boomerangs at unexpected moments.

Why not see if a moment given over to kindly words and sincere encouragements doesn't pay you big dividends?

Our Post-War World

Senator G. C. Morris of Greenville, in the main address Friday evening at the annual Victory Banquet of the Chamber of Commerce, touched on a subject close to the hearts of us all when he declared, without reservation, that our economic order after the war would be much the same as it is today; the same order between right and wrong.

Morris declared that the boys on the world's fighting fronts would come back to a nation that would still have the same moon and stars, the same sun and the same social order to work with in making a better world. "Now, the boys on the battle lines are keeping faith with us," Morris said. "It is up to us to keep faith with them and give them, when they return, a social order of freedom and the right to our culture to free men and women."

Home Front Changes

America's home front is changing so rapidly it is sometimes impossible, without a good weekly newspaper to keep up with the transpiring events which affect the order of our daily lives and the need for flexible readjustment to new governmental restrictions.

Take, for example, the point rationing system for foods which becomes effective Monday. The Times has gone to considerable length in explaining the main points of the program, as they will apply to Scurry County people. Food rationing is only one of the many things changing the home front, and entirely new features of the 1943 farm program, administered by the AAA, is another thing which will revamp the agricultural picture.

Home front changes are occurring in rapid fire order these days, especially in commodities we are short on, and careful perusal of a good weekly newspaper, week by week, is your best means of ascertaining how changes on the front will affect you for the duration—and after.

Editorial of the Week**MIGHTIER THAN BLOCK BUSTERS.**

Whether or not there was cooperation between Messrs. Roosevelt and Churchill in the timing and content of their addresses, they dove-tailed neatly as a single-piece of grand strategy of the air waves. A few days ago Mr. Churchill reassured his own home front, threw in some emphatic statements about the bombing of Germany and Italy calculated to do anything but soothe the already frayed nerves of the peoples of these countries, and went publicly on record that a powerful offensive would soon be launched on the continent of Europe for the relief of the Russians. The president's speech was a parallel in that it was optimistically toned as it applied to the problems of America in this war, assuaged Japanese nerves with mention of the bombing of Tokyo and assured China of early and direct relief. There was duplication of statement in some respects, notably in the president's reference to Russia.

The really important interpretation to be given these two speeches is that there will be a gigantic offensive launched on the continent of Europe at an early date. There is no hint of when this will be, of course, but it must come by early summer when weather conditions will again make possible a renewal of the German offensive against the Soviets, or greatly strengthened German resistance at least.

Not the least significant thing about the president's address was the evident one of sincere optimism that rode through the air on his words. There was nothing that smacked of whistling in the dark—though both he and Mr. Churchill have had to do some of this in the past. Today the president thinks and feels far differently from what he thought and felt a year ago, or even six months ago. His address was a fine and effective piece of strategy in a day when the microphone is mightier than even the block buster.—The Dallas News.

Continued dislocations will be felt in civilian travel for the war's duration, with new directives expected to be issued shortly against too free a use of bus and rail lines. . . . Gasoline rationing, with all of its attendant evils, is creating much confusion because unrestricted utilization of civilian cars and other vehicles would alleviate the present situation and help along the line. . . . For some reason, government officials fear to take the public into their full confidence, but it's a known fact in Washington the real reason the synthetic rubber program is not being pushed any more in the United States lies in the trade agreement this country has with South America to dismantle all synthetic rubber plants after the war. . . . Even Rubber Chem William Jeffers cannot deny this political "saw-up."

Current Comment

Washington, despite temporary American reverses in Tunisia, is ready to push the campaign to quick completion because the administration realizes Hitler must be beaten to the punch to prevent his taking the initiative away from Russia. . . . Need for speed is the chief reason why the American people are being prepared for reverses and heavy casualty lists in the Tunisian campaign. . . . Since Soviet Russia has put up such a valiant fight, and retaken so much territory back from the Nazis, England and the United States realize they must get busy at once, lest Russia have the leading hand in post-war negotiations.

The War Production Board got back this week at Congress in a nice way on the congressional complaint that unnecessary government questionnaires take up entirely too much time and money. . . . WPB has asked Congress for a \$75,000 appropriation to cover costs of answering questionnaires from congressional investigating committees. . . . Naturally, there is an excessive amount of red tape connected with work of government agencies these days, and many millions of dollars are being wasted, insofar as actual necessity is concerned, but Congress should worry—after all, most of our agencies today received congressional sanction.

The Office of Civilian Supply, which in recent months has been heard from in a small way, is now coming forward as the guardian of civilian necessities, and is ready to slug it out with the War Manpower Commission, lend-lease and the armed forces to prevent the diversion of too much manpower and materials from civilian supply that the over-all war effort will suffer. . . . One may look for the Office of Civilian Defense to attempt to cut entirely loose from the War Production Board and be set up as a separate agency.

The Office of Civilian Supply is causing considerable comment, also, with the declaration that almost every industry is essential in some degree. . . . That constitutes the reason why it is irritated by the Manpower Commission's ruling on some industries as non-essential, such as laundries and restaurants, for example. . . . OCS has made a survey of bed-rock needs, and this report will figure prominently in the news of the nation during the next month. . . . We are realizing, as a nation, that we have a tremendous job ahead, and we cannot afford to dislocate our entire economy to comply with demands of the armed forces alone. . . . We will have to strike a happy balance between the needs of the home front and the militia if we are to really carry through to victory.

It is freely admitted that inside Germany morale is deteriorating rapidly, but the Allied Nations must not expect anything like a crack-up any time soon. . . . Sudden admission of defeat in the east has stupefied Germany's home front, and Nazi industrialists admit, indirectly, that the apathy of alien forced labor, amounting to some 6,000,000 workers, is spreading to the natives. . . . End of the war, of course, will be hastened if the present situation continues inside Germany, but even Washington is cautioning against an over-all sense of false optimism. . . . We must admit, as one of the Allied Nations, that we are fighting an enemy with a well-equipped, well-drilled army and some of the best fighting equipment in the world. . . . That we will come out of the fight victorious is conceded here and abroad, but we will undergo many hardships and much loss of life before peace lifts the overcast of gloom over the world today.

All idle machinery in scattered sections of the country is going to be taken over by WPB, and put to good use in helping to win the war—instead of accumulating dust because of being in storage. . . . The forthcoming reshuffling of machinery will help small business in a direct measure and many orders now on hand in war plants will be redistributed to cut down the backlog of orders piling up in many areas. . . . Those who keep well posted on war-time "musts" declare openly that all available machinery, and then some, will have to be utilized to keep our production record on an even keel—especially since the German submarine menace is increasing with advent of warmer weather.

Despite the fact shoe rationing has unduly excited a large number of civilians, there is little basis for the clothes scare going the rounds of gossip peddlers. . . . Office of Price Administration officials and others see no need for rumors that even clothes will be impossible to buy after fall. . . . It is true that restrictions will be placed along, and new specifications laid down, for civilian wearing apparel, but those who help spread the word clothes will be hard to buy at all are merely adding fuel to the very flames which cause government officials to get jittery and spread rationing to cover more and more commodities. . . . Falling in line with European countries, we will, eventually, be rationed on virtually all civilian things we buy; but up until the past few weeks the American public, in comparison with our Allies, hadn't really been hurt. . . . "The squeeze," as Washington admits, "will be applied to all groups without recourse during the crucial months ahead."

If you think the world is all wrong, remember that it contains people like you.

Uncle Afe Guinn Dies Thursday at Home in Snyder

J. A. "Uncle Afe" Guinn, 77, Scurry County resident over half a century and member of the Methodist Church 62 years, died last Thursday evening, 7:50 o'clock, in Southwest Snyder following a brief illness.

"Uncle Afe," as he was widely known, was born September 5, 1865, in Ellis County, and moved to Scurry County with his family in 1890.
