Haws Honored with Distinguished Service Award

Haws, Wichita county agent since 1953, is one of six Texans named to receive the National Agricultural Agents Association's highest honor, their Distinguished Service Award.

Haws was nominated for the award by the Texas Association of Agricultural Agents from the national organization was announced by Todd W. Berry, Van Housen agent and chairman of the Texas Awards Committee.

Haws are presented annually to a select group of the county agents who have a period of 10 years or more outstanding contributions to agriculture and the community.

Presentations of the award will be a highlight of the annual meeting to be held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, September 22-26.

Wichita county agent Haws has been a county agent, Cooke 1945-1953 and Wichita 1953 to the present, he has supervised 31 statewide 4-H projects, coached 12 state winners, individual or team demonstrations. The influence of his training has been responsible for many of the attending college and agricultural or closely related subjects. Strong points of his 4-H program have been citizenship and leadership. Junior exhibitors from his county have won top honors in livestock and poultry shows and fairs of the state.

Communities in the county have been many times have been and state winners in the county community improvement program. Two Master Farmers have come from the county and several farm-

ers have won county, district and state honors in soil and water conservation work. Haws has used demonstrations extensively to acquaint farmers and ranchmen with new practices and through their use family incomes have been increased and life made more rewarding.

In 1960, the U. S. Department of Agriculture recognized his contributions to agriculture by presenting him with its Superior Service Award, one of 13 going to Cooperative Extension Service employees of the nation.

Before joining the Extension Service, Haws taught vocational agriculture for three years. He is a native of Cherokee county; a graduate of Summerfield High School and holds a B. S. degree from Stephen F. Austin State College and an M. A. degree from Sam Houston State College with majors in agriculture.

The honoree has served as a district director and as chairman of the Resolution Committee of the Texas Association and as vice chairman of the Extension Programs Committee of the National Association.

Despite his busy county agent schedule, he finds time to participate in civic and community activities, especially those dealing with youth and agriculture.

Aboard Guided Missile Cruiser

David E. Hart, radioman third class, United States Navy, son of Mrs. Earl P. Hinnant of 508 West First Street, Burk Burnett, is serving aboard the guided missile cruiser U. S. S. Little Rock, flagship of the Sixth fleet in the Mediterranean, which departed Villefranche, France July 27 for Barcelona, Spain.

The Little Rock spent most of July at Villefranche after a six-week cruise which took her to Trieste, Italy; Rhodes, Greece; and Beirut, Lebanon.

At Trieste, the Little Rock crewmen gave a party aboard ship, in joint observance of Little Rock's third year as a guided missile cruiser and of Italian Independence Day. An estimated 1,500 visitors attended the celebration aboard ship.

An Atlantic Fleet unit, Little Rock normally operates out of Norfolk, Virginia.

New Maximum Daytime Speed Limits In Effect August 23

More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission in Austin, revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The commission today passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-mile-per-hour maximum.

The commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

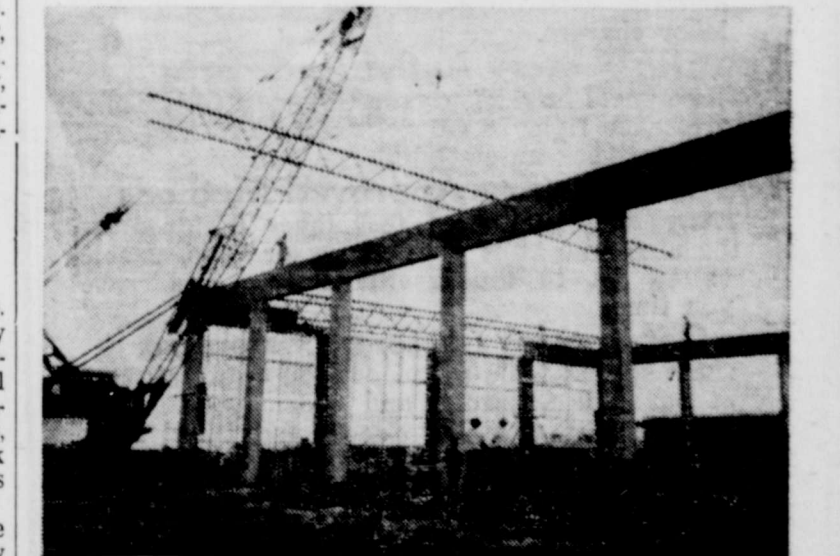
Going to College

New Gym at High School Going Up



Work on the new 22,000 square foot high school gymnasium is progressing about on schedule. Virgil Mills is contractor for the huge job. James Killebrew of Wichita Falls, architect, stated he believed it to be the biggest gym in North Texas.

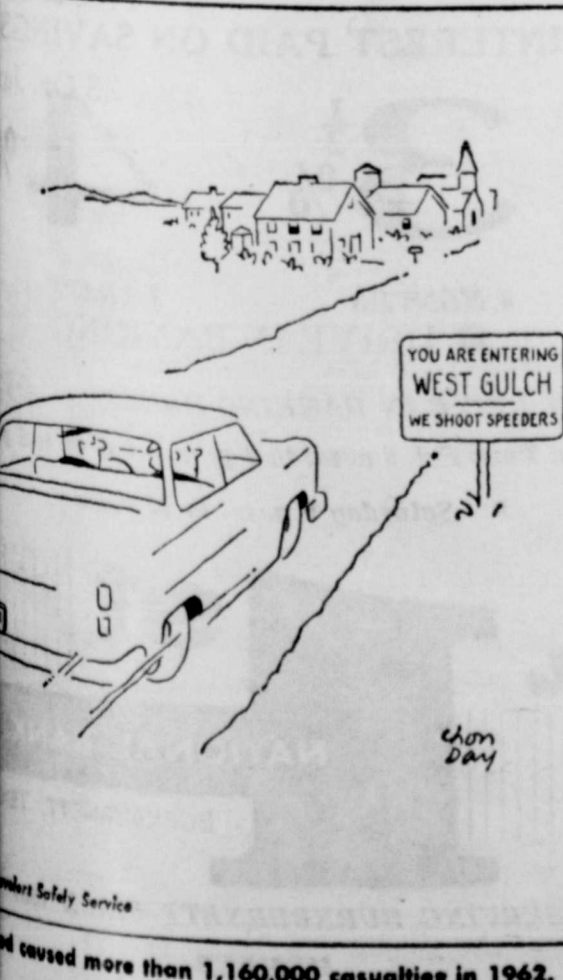
The posts and cross members are of triple reinforced concrete. Travis Gore, steel erector of Wichita Falls is shown above putting the steel cross members in place. The boom used to hoist the steel is 120 feet long. Notice the man atop the concrete frame near the lower section of the boom. These steel trusses have a clear span of 96 feet. Part of the gym will be completed in November. The complete job is scheduled to be ready in Jan., 1964.

Mills also has the contract to put in concrete seats at the football stadium, recently purchased from the Chamber of Commerce and known as Morgan Stadium, scene of the annual rodeo. Extensive work is being done at the stadium. In addition to the concrete seats, the field is being widened and the light poles moved back and the light capacity doubled.

The West side of the stadium, which will be the home side, will be ready for the first home football game on October 4th. There is a possibility the East side will also be completed by this date. The West side will sport a new press box, new rest rooms, etc.

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WITH A CHARY HAND

The late Samuel Gompers is generally referred to as the father of the organized labor movement in this country, and he fought to the last ditch for what he thought the unions had coming. He once had something to say about Welfare State, though he didn't use that comparatively new phrase. In his view, "Doing for people what they can and ought to do for themselves is a dangerous experiment. In the last analysis, the welfare of the workers depends upon their own initiative. Whatever is done under the guise of philanthropy or social morality which in any way lessens initiative (is) the greatest crime that can be committed against the toilers. Let social busybodies and professional 'public morals experts' in their fads reflect upon the perils they rashly invite under his pretenses of social welfare."

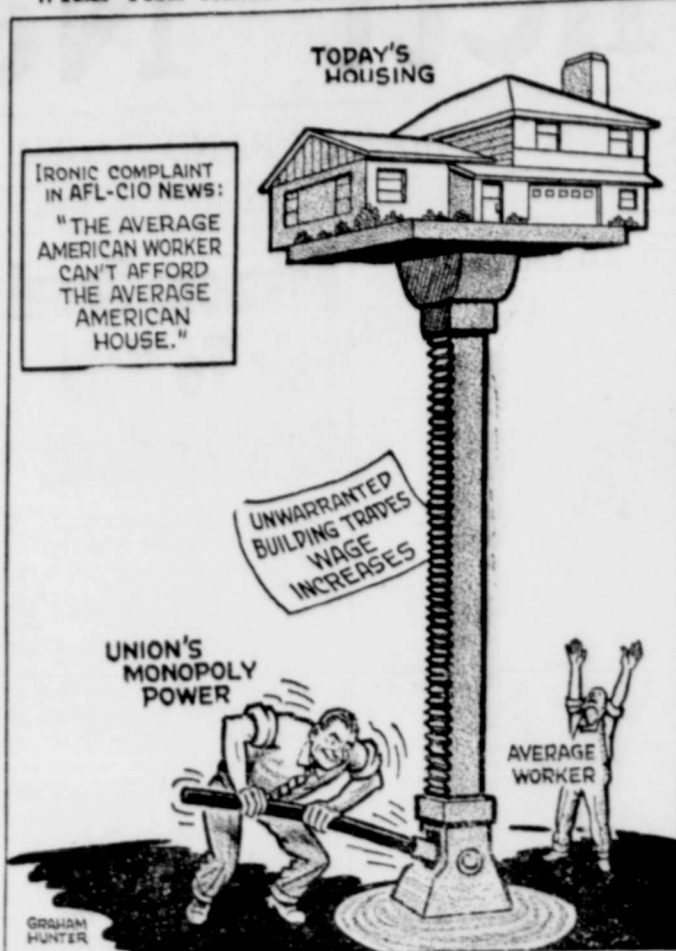
The complexities inevitably accompanying scientific social and economic change have necessarily altered the attitudes that government and labor bring to bear on controversial problems. These problems are tough economically and politically, involving wages, working conditions, protections against adversity, the shifting employment situation, tax policy, and the like. But this is no excuse for the "let the government fix it" attitude that has sorely infected so many of us.

We must give power to government with a chary and reluctant hand, and only when the need is inescapable. Otherwise we'll create a Welfare State whose proper synonym is "dictatorship."

WILL THE REAL PRICE-HIKER STAND UP?**They Should Look to Their Own House**

The bitter complaint of the AFL-CIO News that the average American worker cannot afford the average house ranks as the "pot-calling-the-kettle-back" statement of the year.

That's because it is the monopolistic power of the building trades unions affiliated with the AFL-CIO itself that has driven the cost of housing skyward through repeated unwarranted wage hikes.

In the past ten years alone wage rates in the construction industry advanced more than fifty per cent. And the unions cannot pass the buck to the cost of materials because it rose but thirteen per cent in the same period.

A quick look at the wages and fringe benefits paid construction workers in the New York City area removes any lingering doubt as to who has put houses out of the reach of the average worker. Plumbers get \$6.30 an hour; sheetmetal workers, \$5.86; carpenters, \$5.60; glaziers, \$5.28 and common laborers, \$4.46 an hour.

You would think that the unions would be satisfied with those lush, out-of-this-world rates but they are not. They are in the process of hammering out INCREASES OF FROM 92 TO 97 CENTS AN HOUR in their negotiations for new contracts.

Thus it is that the AFL-CIO can find the answer to the high cost of housing right in its own house.

HAY FEVER

Aaaaaaaachooooooooo!
Here comes the hay fever season!

If you're one of the several million in this country who have annual bouts with hay fever, or other millions who undergo severe asthma attacks during the hay fever season, watch out, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. It's rough sledding ahead.

From the middle of August through mid-September, those sensitive to ragweed pollen suffer their most agonizing time. That's when the ragweed pollen is highest.

Hay fever is not caused by hay and it isn't a fever.

Hay fever is an allergy. Your body becomes sensitive to a foreign substance. This can be almost anything for various individuals, but is most likely to be ragweed pollen. The results also vary, but most commonly are sneezing, watery eyes, runny nose and general miserable discomfort.

Tolerance to pollens sometimes can be built up by injecting a dilute solution of them under the skin. These shots must be medically prescribed to meet individual needs. In some cases your doctor may prescribe one of the antihistamines for temporary relief.

The most common preventive measures against hay fever are:

- * Get specific anti-hay fever shots well ahead of the season.
- * Avoid exposure to ragweed pollen by keeping away from areas where it is prevalent.
- * Air condition the home and work in air conditioned surroundings, if possible.
- * Antihistamine drugs lessen the nasal and sinus congestion.
- * Keep the home as dust free as possible during the height of the hay fever season and throughout the rest of the year.

Graduates From Naval Air Technical Training Center

Undergoing Recruit Training In Illinois

James P. Bird, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie C. Lacy of 709 Dana Street, Burkburnett, is undergoing nine weeks recruit training at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois.

The program includes naval history and organization, customs and etiquette, ordnance and gunnery, damage control, seamanship and shipboard routine, military drill and sentry duty, physical fitness, swimming, first aid and survival.

During their training period recruits receive tests and interviews which determine their future assignments in the Navy. Upon completing the program they are assigned to service schools for technical instruction or to ships or shore stations for on-the-job training in a specialized Navy rating.

Texas Residents May Obtain Proof of Age From Census Bureau

Last year, more than 14,000 residents of Texas turned to the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, for help in proving where and when they were born. They needed proof of age to collect social security and other retirement benefits. They needed it to obtain passports. They needed it to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. They needed it for some forms of insurance.

These persons who requested assistance from the Census Bureau last year were among an estimated 20 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birthplace. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only acceptable source of this information for many of these people. Since its beginning in 1790, the U. S. Census has recorded identifying data for almost 350 million persons, many of them listed several times in separate censuses. The Bureau has provided copies of these records to about three and one-half million people, as legal proof of age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship.

Persons seeking such a record for social security purposes should go to the local Social Security Office, or, for other purposes, write to the Personal Census Service Bureau of the Census, Pittsburgh, Kansas, for an application form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two census for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as a guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

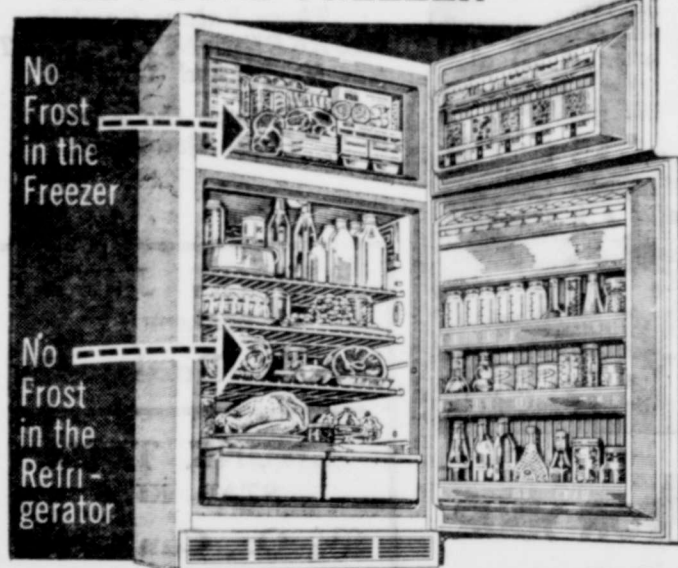

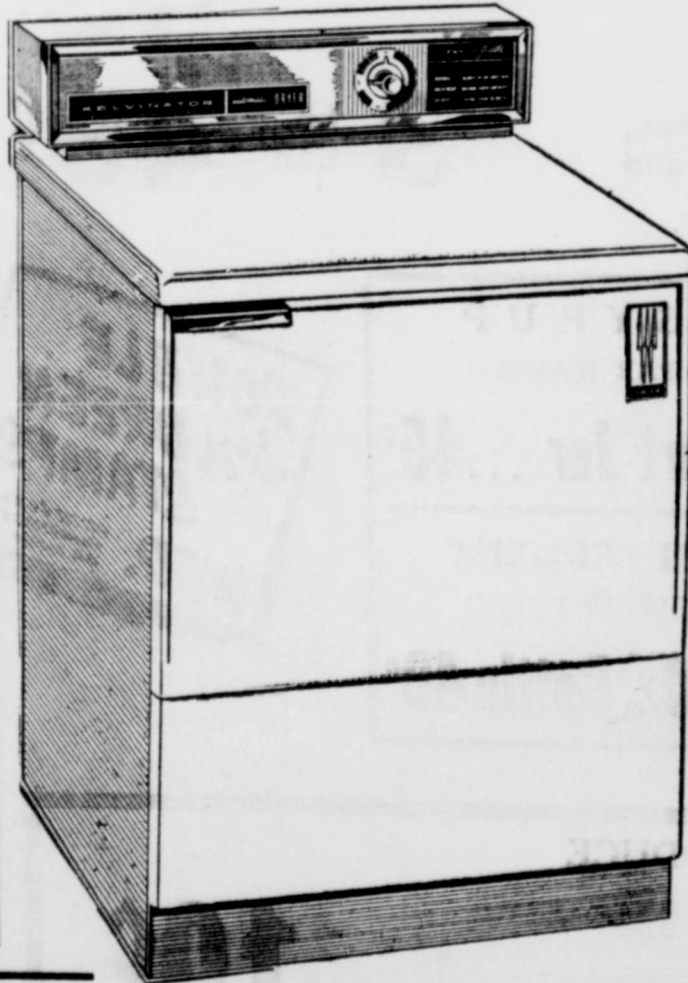

Household Hints

Do you have a pet peeve in housecleaning? Here is one homemaker's terrible trio - and some suggestions to feel less peevish about three hard jobs.

Blinds - Spring or summer is the season to tackle outdoors. If you have a child's wading pool handy, fill it with warm water and pine oil cleaner. Then line up all your blinds and hose down for rinsing. Dry blinds by laying them on the lawn just until the moisture runs off. (Putting flat on a beach towel keeps slats free of grass cuttings.) Oven - Don't let your oven get too grimy. After you cook a meal that is especially spattery, soak racks as soon as possible in solution of grease-dissolving pine oil cleaner and water. Let the cleaning solution set to do its best work - then rinse racks and oven with hot water.

Bathroom - Enlist helping hands here. Each person who uses the bathroom should tidy up in small ways to make the big clean-up job quick and easy. Replace towels neatly, clean tub after using, sponge sink, rescue soap. You can help your helping hands by keeping a general-purpose pine cleaner in the bathroom, along with a long-handled sponge. These two minutes on the part of each member of the household will help cut down the weekly cleaning routine. At weekly bathroom clean-up use a pine oil cleaner to disinfect, clean, and deodorize tile, metal, porcelain and glass.

Small glass baby food jars make ideal containers for many items that otherwise clutter up drawers and work spaces. Keep thumb tacks, pins, buttons - maybe bus or lunch money - and nails, screws, washers or what have you in individual jars.

Does hot water in your home seem to be losing pressure? It may be a sign of scale build-up in the pipes. If you can locate the trouble spot, try freeing the passage with wire. Otherwise, new plumbing may be in order. Scale is due to minerals in hard water and usually occurs first in the hot water lines, according to The Lindsay Company, St. Paul, Minn., manufacturer of water conditioners. The only permanent solution is to switch to soft water.

You can paint steps and still not lose the use of them. Just apply the finish to every other step and let dry before you paint the remaining steps. You can go up or down using every other step - the dry ones.

Do this to keep track of those special laundry instruction tags that come with some articles of clothing: Immediately upon purchase write on the back of the tag a description of the garment. Put the tags in a box in the laundry area.

TIP FOR ROUGH-ROAD TRAILERS

Hit for the roughest roads you can find. Clothes in your trailer (or camper) closets will never bounce off hangers if you hang each item on two hangers facing opposite directions. Crossed hooks can't be thrown.



Q: "How can I get rid of freckles?"

A: Most people think they're attractive - but if you don't you can disguise them by wearing a slightly tan-tinted make-up that will cause the freckles to show less prominently against the color of your skin.

Use a cosmetic with plenty of covering power that, at the same time, won't defeat its purpose by looking heavy or artificial. Your best bet is an Angel Face medicated cream make-up in a shade called Golden. This is neither too light to be ineffective nor too dark to seem unnatural. And it's very right for summer!

You can also draw attention away from your freckles by wearing light, bright solid colors and avoiding polka-dot and spotted patterns and dark, dull shades of brown.

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GO TO POT

Go to pot with a bar of yellow soap when you're camping - and coat the bottoms of the pots you use. Soap won't burn off in the fire's heat, but the soot will wash off in a jiffy. Another way: Cover pot bottoms with aluminum foil which transfers heat but not impossible-to-remove, get-all-over-everything, dad-blast the stuff soot.
