Win Region At Huntsville

Rebelettes In Second Consecutive State Basketball Tournament

The Rivercrest Rebelettes will face Hull-Daisetta at 9:30 a.m. Friday, Feb. 29 in Austin in the opening round of the State Class A Girls Basketball Tournament after taking top honors in the Region III playoffs in Huntsville Feb. 23.

The other matchup in Class A will be between Panhandle and Boyd. Rivercrest is the only team of the four which qualified for the State meet last year. Finals will be at 7 p.m. Saturday night.

The first game of the Region competition for the Rebelettes was Friday night against the West Sabine Tigers, where Rivercrest won by a margin of 57-47.

The Tigers took control and scored first on two free throws, but only seconds later Rebelette Robyn Reeder was fouled and tied the game with two free shots. Rivercrest then took a 6-2 lead when Judy Via laid two baskets up under the goal. However, West Sabine was not to be put under as they carried the ball to 6'3" post player Cara Audret. Soon the game was tied again, but with 0:46 left in the first period Scotti Wood dropped

in two foul shots to carry a 12-10 lead into the second quarter.

In the second period the score was close as the lead went back and forth. The Tigers continued to force the ball in to star player Cara

Audret, who scored 17 of their 18 points in the quarter, while Rivercrest was paced by a combination of the post scoring of Robyn Reeder and Veronica Howerton and the outside shooting of Scotti Wood. The Rebelettes held a

one point lead as the scoreboard read 29-28 at the halftime buzzer.

After the half Rivercrest got under control. West Sabine was plagued when Cara Audret left the game in foul trouble. The Rebelettes

pulled ahead of the Tigers by nine points in the third quarter to hold a 45-36 lead as the fourth quarter began. The Rebelettes went to a four-corner offense for part of the last half to help cinch the 10 point decision.

Scotti Wood and Robyn Reeder headed up the Rebelette offense with 18 points each, while Veronica Howerton added 11 points.

The defensive charge was led by Veronica Howerton with 13 rebounds and three steals. She was accompanied by Robyn Reeder with eight rebounds and four steals, and Donna Hines, who grabbed six rebounds.

High scorers for West Sabine were Cara Audret hitting for 28 points and Denise Weatherspoon adding 11.

The final game of Regional play, between the Rivercrest Rebelettes and the Grapeland Sandiettes, tipped off Saturday at 9 a.m. In this game the Rebelettes breezed to a 76-36 victory.

The Rebelettes started out using a full-court press and a 2-3 defense against the Sandiettes. This plus the Rebelettes' offensive ability proved too much for Grapeland. By the end of the first quarter of play Rivercrest was in command 18-5.

In the second quarter, the Rebelettes only outscored Grapeland by two points, but

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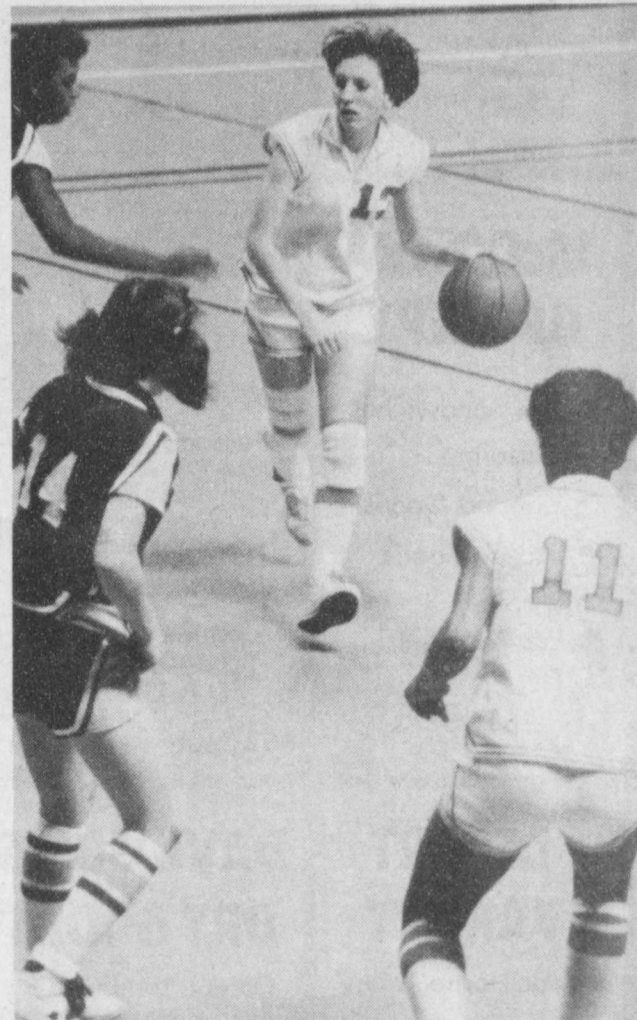

Filing Deadline Is March 5

The filing deadline for the April 5 city election in Bogata is March 5. As of Monday, Feb. 25, only Dr. Jack Troutt had officially filed for the City Council. Troutt is an incumbent.

Increased Red River Attorney Funding Requires Act Of Legislature

An act of the Texas Legislature would be necessary to increase the present salary and supplement of the Red River County Attorney by \$18,950

above the present funds being paid to current Red River County Attorney Pat Beadle.

J.P. Shrader with the State Comptroller's office con-

firmed Tuesday that Beadle is currently receiving an annual salary of \$31,000, plus \$8,500 for staff and office expense from the State.

Shrader confirmed information obtained from Andy Schuval with the

Texas Prosecutors Coordinating Council in Austin and Paul Givia in the office of the Attorney General.

Schuval said that House Bill 31, passed by the last session of the legislature known as the Professional Prosecutors Act, enumerated several offices in the state as professional prosecutors. Fannin and Grayson County Attorneys are among those who were named in the bill as professional prosecutors, a distinction which prohibits the attorney holding the office from conducting any private practice.

The salary for prosecutors funded by the state is \$31,000 a year, Schuval said, with multi-county prosecutors getting \$20,000 a year supplement for staff and expenses. Single County prosecutors get \$8,500 supplement for staff and expenses, Schuval continued.

Under the professional prosecutors bill, the amount for staff and expenses is \$22,500 for all prosecutors, regardless of whether or not they are single county or

multi county, and the salary is 90 percent of the district judges salary, or 90 percent of \$40,500, which comes out \$36,450. The only offices which have the advantages of funding under the professional prosecutors act are those offices which were

named in the act, Schuval commented.

An act of the legislature would be necessary for the Red River County Attorney's office to be included under the guidelines set out by the professional prosecutor's act, Schuval said.

Shrader said that the inclusion of Red River County under the professional prosecutor's act would be the prerogative of the office holder. According to Shrader, the Texas District and County Attorneys Association went out before

the last session of the legislature with a letter to all the prosecutors and asked them if they wanted to be under HB 31. If they elected to do so, Shrader said, then they, in essence, prohibited themselves from private practice.

Trustee Election Called

Election of three school trustees for the Talco-Bogata School will be held on Saturday, April 5, 1980. The election order was an item on the agenda for approval at the February meeting of the Board of Trustees. The terms of John M. Ward and Dr. E.E. Brooks of Bogata and Jerry Clemmons of Talco are expiring.

One three-year term will be filled from Bogata, one three-year term will be filled from Talco and one one-year term will be filled at large and may be from either Bogata or Talco according to the number of votes received.

Incumbents John M. Ward and Dr. E.E. Brooks of Bogata have already made application to have their names listed on the ballot for the April 5 election. Requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for the election shall be in writing, signed by the candidate, and filed at the superintendent's office at Rivercrest by 4:30 p.m. on March 5, 1980.

School To Hold Open House Tuesday, March 4

Talco Elementary and Junior High will hold Open House Tuesday, March 4 from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m.

The Texas State Teachers Association is joining with other education-related organizations and local Masonic bodies throughout the state in urging teachers, students, and the general public to participate together in the 30th annual observance of Texas Public Schools Week.

TSTA President Cecile Russell of Amarillo is calling on local associations and members to participate in the statewide observance in

this 126th year of free public school education in Texas. TSTA is approaching its own 100th birthday anniversary, having been established at Mexia on June 29, 1880.

Gov. Bill Clements on February 1 signed a proclamation designating March 3-7 as Texas Public Schools Week and urging citizens to participate in local observances of the special week. The State Board of Education recently issued a similar resolution. The board has cooperated with Texas Masons in promoting the special week since the first observance in 1951.

In most of the approximately 1,100 public school districts in the state,

the first full school week in March is set aside each year to give Texas citizens a special invitation to visit their schools.

Theme of the special week is "Texas Public Schools: Democracy in Action."

Many school buildings will participate with open houses, classroom displays, and special exhibits of student work.

Mrs. Russell said she hopes that parents and other school patrons will take this special opportunity to see first-hand the accomplishments of Texas schools, students, and teachers.

Community Public Service Files For Rate Increase

Community Public Service Company filed last week with the City of Talco and the Public Utility Commission of Texas for a 17.7 percent rate increase. Your bill may vary from the 17.7 percent amount depending upon your usage.

C.O. Mills, Northeast Division Manager for Community Public Service, said it is expected to take about four months for a final determination to be made on the request.

The City of Talco has

original jurisdiction for regulating rates within its city limits. The unincorporated areas covered by this rate increase request are regulated by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The Commission also has appellate jurisdiction over the city established rates.

Mills said that additional government regulation at both the State and Federal levels has increased the Company's costs. He also said that inflation has increased the Company's

operating expenses.

District Manager David Hudson also stated that the customers have already been experiencing an increase in the cost of electricity due to the continuing escalation in fuel adjustment and purchased power costs. However, he stressed that this money cannot be used by the Company to offset the rising costs due to regulation and inflation. This money goes directly to the supplier to pay for the increased cost of fuel.

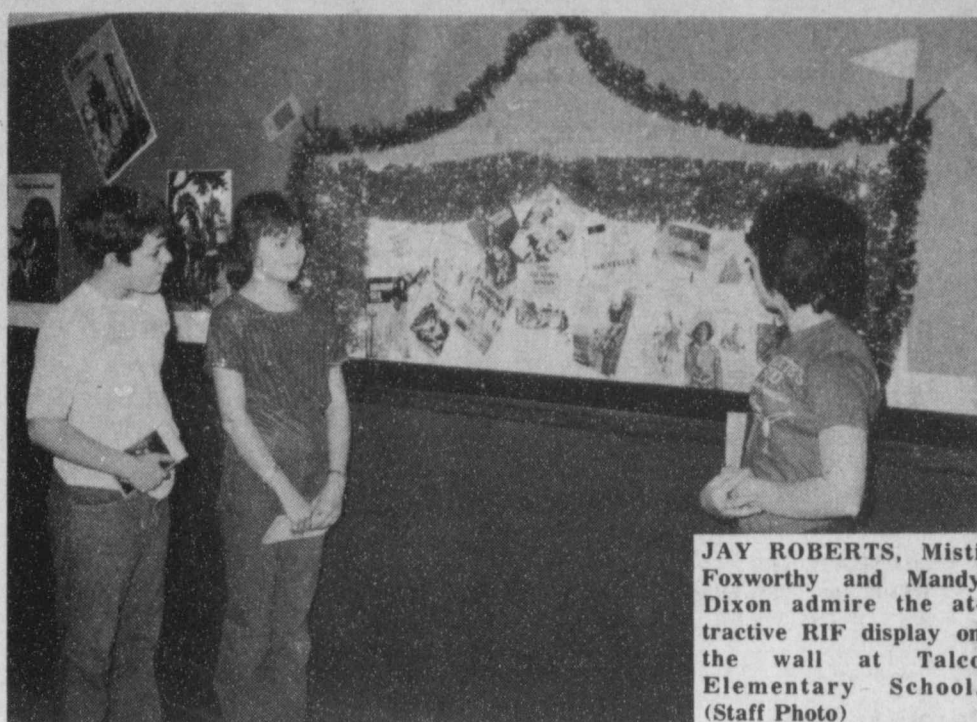
