## Homemaking Students To Participate In Civil Defense Class

Eighteen Homemaking students, eligible to participate in the summer homemaking program, will attend a two weeks class in Civil Defense to be conducted in Memphis June 10 through 21, Monday through Friday of each week. Mr. Doyle Fowler, Red Cross instructor, will work with Mrs. Sue Shields in teaching the class. The experience and knowledge gained from instruction of this type is invaluable to persons of all ages. It could mean the saving of many lives as well as one's own.

Cost of the class will be three dollars for a membership that covers the entire family for the year, plus a fee of five dollars for daily classes for the two weeks period. The local F H A chapter has the necessary textbooks for the course. The students will go by bus, leaving the school building at 8:30 a. m. each day and returning at 12 noon. If further information is needed, contact Mrs. Shields at the school.

## A. S. C. News

### 1967 Grain Sorghum Loans

These loans will mature on June 30, 1968. Producers who now have loans will have three choices: (1) redeem the grain by paying off the loan (2) forfeit the grain to CCC, or (3) extend the loan for up to an additional 12 months. By extending the loan, ownership of the grain will be retained for the extended period and CCC will pay all the storage costs after the original maturity date.

### Replanting Dates

It has been determined that cotton can be planted up to June 15 in Donley County and still produce a normal crop. The date for grain sorghum is July 10. If cotton or grain sorghum is planted and lost before these dates, it must be replanted in order to be eligible for price support payments. You may replant after these dates if you wish.

Any producer who wishes to replant these acreages to other crops after the above dates must file a written request for credit before the land is plowed. The acreage must be inspected by a representative of the county committee to

Since 1928 the Texas Forest Service has produced 415 million one-year old baby seedlings in its nurseries for reforestation purposes by Texas landowners. Set out with a spacing of 6 by 8 feet this number would be sufficient to plant 437,000 acres, an entire county the size of Trinity or Wood. Today, the Indian Mound Forest Tree Nursery near Alto in Cherokee County produces about eight million trees annually.

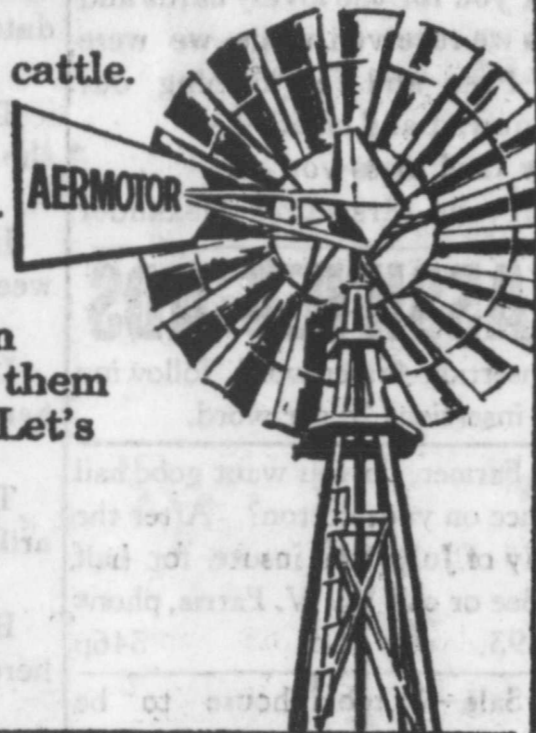


