

Six Arrested In Car Racket Raid

OPA Agents Launch Attack On \$75,000,000 Automobile Ring Operating In South Carolina

LEESVILLE, S. C.—(P)—Special agents of the OPA arrested six men here Monday in a raid they described as the first step to crack a \$75,000,000 traffic in automobiles at above ceiling prices that reached into 14 states.

The arrests were made after agents purchased five automobiles at an open air automobile market here, jammed with an estimated 80 dealers and 500 automobiles.

Agents said they previously had seen an estimated 1,300 cars offered for sale on two trade days at an average of twice the price ceiling.

C. C. Moseley, special agent in charge of 10 men from the Atlanta division of special investigation for the OPA, described the arrest as the "first lap in operation to wipe out a mammoth black market" in which only dealers participated.

Moseley said the Leesville market was believed to have operated for at least nine months and that during that time sales were believed to have totaled approximately \$75,000,000. He said dealers who bought here added approximately 25 per cent to the price for resale in their respective home towns.

He estimated that 39 per cent of the sales were for new automobiles, trucks, civilian jeeps and motorcycles.

"The Leesville sales have been used car dealer sales and few, if any, of the thousands of cars have been sold directly to private citizens," Moseley said.

Phillips 1 Millard Has O&G Cut Mud In Drillstem Test

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Millard, Southwest Ector County wildcat, projected to around 10,000 feet to test the Ellenburger, ran a one-hour drillstem test on a middle Permian section at 5,602-5,795 feet.

There was a slight blow of air throughout the 60 minutes of the investigation. Recovery was 178 feet of gas cut, drilling mud and 168 feet of oil and gas cut mud.

The exploration was making new hole, at last report. It is 660 feet from north and 684 feet from east lines of section 2, block B-15, east survey.

Stepout Flows Oil

Phillips No. 1 Wyman, (Scharbauer), 1,980 feet from east and 660 feet from south lines of section 12, block A, psi survey, and one-quarter of a mile southeast of the discovery for flowing production from the middle Permian on the north-east side of the Goldsmith field, in Northwest Ector County, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid through casing perforations of 6,110-6,260 feet.

After swabbing the acid load and residue to plug the well kicked off and flowed 315 barrels of oil in 14 hours, through a 1-8-inch choke, with one-half of one per cent sediment.

Gravity was 41 and gas-oil ratio was 1,485-1. The well is shut-in for storage.

Another for Block 12

The Plymouth Oil Company is building a derrick and moving in rotary for its No. 1 University on the Block 12 district of North-Southwest Andrews County.

It will be 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 15, block 12, University survey, and is one-half mile due east of The Texas Company No. 1-P State, the discovery for flowing production from the Tubb-Bernian.

The Plymouth project is to go to 7,500 feet, or production in the Tubb at a lesser depth. It is on a farm-out to Plymouth from the Atlantic Refining Company.

The Jury Is Out

Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Pinson, West Andrews County lower Ordovician exploration, in northwest quarter of section 13, block A-40, psi survey, and one mile southwest of the initial Ellenburger producer in the Nelson field, was bottomed at 10,820 feet, in Ellenburger dolomite, taking a velocity survey.

Informed sources report that actual top of the Ellenburger was at 10,800 feet. That has not been officially confirmed.

Some slight signs of oil, and some water has been encountered below that point. Some observers reveal that after the current survey is completed operator representatives will decide the future of the exploration. It has been indicated that abandonment might be ordered.

Stanford Oil & Gas Company No. 1-GG University, Northeast Crockett County possible Ellenburger discovery, in section 12, block 39, about 12 miles southeast of the Barnhart field, had set 7-inch casing at 8,298 feet, with 500 sacks of cement, over total depth of 8,384 feet, in the Ellenburger.

That indicates that operator will try to develop commercial production from the open hole. The lower few feet of the prospect likely will be ordered.

Death Toll By Violence In State Reaches 14 And 14 Others Hurt

The last week in August has opened with a traffic death toll from violence in Texas—14 dead and 15 injured Tuesday.

The sudden wave of deaths, resulting from traffic accidents, drownings, train wrecks and shootings, followed a comparatively accident-free election weekend.

One girl was killed when thrown from a horse. Five children were seriously injured when a Spanish-American war cannon ball with which they were playing exploded in Houston.

The dead were: Arvel McKinney, 31, of Odessa, killed in a car wreck three miles east of Odessa on the Midland highway late Monday night. Four others were injured in other wrecks in the area. They were Mrs. Minnie Howze, of Big Spring, Samuel J. Ates, of Odessa, A. C. Werner, of Odessa and Davis Crawford of Midland. Two others were being held in the Ector County jail on charges of parking on the highway as a result of the accidents.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Chamberlain, and three children, Katherine 13, Billy, 10, and Warren G., 22, were killed when their car and another crashed head-on five miles west of Weatherford. The parents and Katherine were killed instantly, and the two sons died Tuesday in Weatherford hospitals.

Starkie Collins Milton, 37, a Shreveport, La., truck driver, was burned fatal in a fire at Seago, Texas. He was rushed to a Dallas hospital with second degree burns. He died early Tuesday.

Ivy F. Pope, 44, his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Hattie Pope, 17, and his daughter, Wilma Pope, 12, all of Grand Prairie were killed when their automobile was struck by an eastbound Texas and Pacific freight train at Bagdad crossing near Grand Prairie.

Homer Bradley, 30, of Lancaster, died in a Denison hospital after receiving injuries in the collision of a Texas Electric Railway Express car and an electric locomotive late Monday, two miles south of Denison. Bradley was conductor on the express car.

Miss Amelia Walker, 18, daughter of Hall Walker, banker and president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, died in a Ranger hospital late Monday from injuries received when she was thrown from a horse.

Roy Q. Minton, 52, of Denton, Southwestern representative, Newspaper Enterprise Association, was drowned while swimming off Fort Crockett at Galveston.

Charles C. Wallace, 44, caretaker at the Cedar Crest Golf Course in Dallas, drowned when he fell while taking a bath at the South Dallas YMCA.

Six persons were injured in the Weatherford accident, including four Chamberlain children who received critical injuries. They were Billy, 10, J. W., 17, Ruth, 20, and Warren G. Chamberlain, 22.

Also injured were Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wallace, occupants of the locomotive, and H. H. Hodge, who was riding on the express car, received minor injuries in the Denison collision. Both are from McKinney.

Cannon Ball Explodes

Five children, all members of one family, were seriously injured in Houston when a Spanish-American war cannon ball with which they were playing exploded.

Children of Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Tharp, they were Billy, 8; Bobbie Jean, 5; Melvin, 9; Wanda Lee, 11, and Betty Jo, 13.

The children had found several of the rusty cannon balls in weeds near the house. A neighbor, D. J. Seals, told Deputy Constable Leo Butler they had borrowed a drill and bored out a section of one of the missiles. Seals said the children told him that "when something black poured from it" they touched a match to the substance.

No one could account for the cannon balls being in the neighborhood.

Bill Vennell of the Houston Transit Company, who was with Minton while swimming at Galveston, said the Denton man was caught in the undertow. Minton's son, Roy Minton, Jr., 14, went to his father's assistance and managed to help his head out of the water until T/Sgt. James Boyd, Fort Crockett lifeguard, was able to reach them. He was pronounced dead by a Fort Crockett doctor after artificial respiration.

Australian Again Blasts Soviet 'Lies'

Down Under Nation Drops Demand On Italy Inquiry

PARIS.—(P)—Australian Delegate J. A. Beasley brought delegates at the Paris peace conference to their feet Tuesday with a blistering attack in which he accused Russia of "lies," "intimidation" and "power politics."

But the burst of hard boiled oratory ended amicably and the Australian and his antagonist, Andrei Vishinsky, Soviet deputy foreign minister, left the room smiling to one another.

Before adjournment of the political and economic commission on the Italian treaty, at which the clash occurred, Australia agreed to drop her proposal for a standing sub-committee to "examine, collect and report" on the facts in Italy's frontier dispute with Yugoslavia, France and Austria.

But the commission adopted unanimously a similar proposal from the French to organize a standing committee to investigate any point of dispute concerning the Italian frontier.

Beasley began his outburst by exclaiming at Vishinsky "all right now, you've had a lot to say, and I'm going to have my say too."

He came to the defense of Col. W. R. Hodgson of Australia, whose arguments before the Italian Treaty Economic Commission, had been belittled by Andrei Vishinsky, assistant foreign minister of Russia.

Beasley appeared aroused especially by a remark Vishinsky made earlier that "Australia is the farthest point from Europe and has presented 35 per cent of the proposals to this conference." Beasley retorted:

"We may be 15,000 miles away from Europe, but we fought in two wars in Europe and have lost some of our best men here. We refuse to recognize that Soviet Russia has any more rights than we. We are not going to be intimidated because one power feels it is big at the moment."

\$1,300 Appropriated For Child Welfare

They also presented the nominations of Mrs. Ernest Sidwell, Mrs. P. E. Rhoads and Anton Thiel to the County Child Welfare Board and the nominees were approved as new board members.

Postoffice Receives Furlough Pay Blanks

The Midland Post Office announced Tuesday it had received for distribution to ex-service men application blanks for unused furlough time payments.

The application blanks obtained at the Post Office are to be filled out by the veterans themselves. They may secure assistance in doing this from the county service officer on the third floor of the courthouse or at the Red Cross office in the City Hall.

Industry Rushes To Get Release From Ceilings

WASHINGTON.—(P)—Industry's rush to get out from under OPA ceilings gained momentum Tuesday.

John Buckley, chief of the new decontrol division set up within the price agency, told a reporter he has had nearly 1,000 inquiries and some 300 informal applications from various manufacturing groups.

No formal petitions have been filed as yet, however, for two reasons:

1. OPA made public only last weekend the specific steps each industry must take to comply with the decontrol provisions.

2. Two weeks notice must be given industry advisory committees before the actual petitions can be filed.

OPA moved along on its own decontrol front Monday night by ripping all price lids from canned and

froze condensed soups. The agency found ample supplies indicated for these.

In reverse direction, other OPA officials hurried their effort to re-establish ceilings on livestock, meat and fats and oils made from cottonseed and soybeans.

Ceilings go back on live animals first on Thursday, then on packing house products Sunday, on wholesale sales September 5 and finally on the meat households buy on September 9. Between now and then OPA must prepare a maze of price ceilings for each group.

The Decontrol Board has final say on all ceilings. It already has announced, however, that industries first should get an answer from OPA on non-farms items and from the secretary of agriculture on farm products before applying to it for a decision.

1,000 Slav Soldiers To Make Final Attempt To Find Fifth Yank Airman

BELGRADE.—(P)—Ambassador Richard C. Patterson announced Tuesday that the Yugoslav Fourth Army will send out 1,000 men Wednesday to search for the fifth crew member of the machine-gunned crashed American transport if medical authorities fail to find sufficient evidence that all five airmen died in the blazing wreckage.

Patterson, commenting that "everyone is anxious to find conclusive answers," declared at Ljubljana that he had been informed the Yugoslav Fourth Army commanders were willing to send out a searching party of 1,000 soldiers "if necessary."

Exhaustive examinations in which chemicals were being used were carried out in a Ljubljana hospital on the parts of the bodies discovered Monday at the scene of the August 19 crash by a searching party of 30 Yugoslav soldiers, it was announced by Lt. Col. Chester M. Stratton, assistant U. S. military attaché.

These tests were being carried out, Stratton said, although evidence found thus far had led medical men to believe the fifth crewman also died in the crash.

Reports from Ljubljana said that Premier Marshal Tito, while enroute to Belgrade, sent a message of personal greetings to Patterson Monday through a Yugoslav staff officer, General Djuric.

Before the chemical tests were started, U. S. graves registration commission officers had abandoned hope that at least one crew member of the plane might still be alive. At that time, the officers said sufficient evidence had been found to indicate that all five crewmen had died in the crash.

Meanwhile the remains of the fliers lay in leaden caskets draped with American flags and banked with flowers in a hangar at Ljubljana Airport in preparation for the journey to their ultimate resting place in the United States.

WAC Describes How Hesse Crown Jewels Stolen

FRANKFURT, GERMANY.—(P)—WAC Capt. Kathleen Nash Duran's story of how the \$150,000 Hesse crown jewels were stolen from the state's Kronberg castle, split four ways and smuggled into the United States was laid Tuesday before a military court.

In response to questions, she related how the jewels were found buried in the basement and brought to her room by Carlton.

OPA Insists Ceilings As Of June 30

Compromise Is Expected By Deadline Thursday

WASHINGTON.—(P)—The Administration's economic high command sought Tuesday to reconcile differences between the Agriculture Department and the Office of Price Administration on the level of ceilings to be reestablished on meat animals Thursday.

The OPA has taken the position that ceilings—which the Decontrol Board last week ordered reestablished—be set at the June 30 levels of \$14.85 per hundred pounds for hogs and \$18 for cattle, Chicago basis, together with subsidies in effect at that time. Those were the ceilings in effect when the old price control law expired.

At the Agriculture Department, aides told reporters Secretary Anderson believes ceilings on cattle and hogs should be increased upwards of \$2 per hundred pounds to encourage greater production.

These aides said Reconversion Director John Steelman was taking part in a three-way telephone discussion with Anderson, who is vacationing at his home in Albuquerque, N. M., and Price Administrator Paul Porter in Washington.

Ceilings Effective Thursday

Confidence was expressed at the Agriculture Department and by the OPA that an agreement will be reached in time for the ceilings to become effective Thursday.

Department officials said that under the new price control law, Anderson has, in effect, authority to determine the final ceilings. They told reporters, however, that there "is no truth whatsoever" to published reports that the secretary had threatened to resign if the OPA did not accept his recommendations. 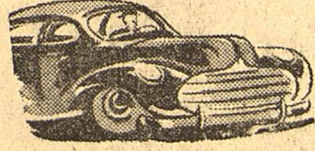

Packers Predict Livestock Sales Will Halt When OPA Ceilings Return

CHICAGO (AP)—“Eat it while you can” was the advice of the meat industry Monday as packers worked on the largest cattle run since 1934.

Packers predicted freely that by Thursday, when new OPA price ceilings on livestock are scheduled to become effective, the currently jam-packed livestock markets would resemble the great open spaces.

“Cattle are coming to market which should never be slaughtered,” Norman Draper of the American Meat Institute said. He added that this winter there would be “a real famine.”

In their rush to get in under OPA ceiling deadlines, producers were sending to market lightweight hogs and cattle which normally would remain on farms for months, observers said.

Twenty of the nation's largest stock yards handled a total of 183,000 cattle Monday, including 40,000 at the huge Chicago yards, the largest run for any one day here since Sept. 24, 1923, and the largest one-day total on record for August.

In 12 major markets, receipts were 21,000 calves, 52,000 sheep and lambs, and 75,000 hogs, including a run of 21,500 at Chicago.

Prices of almost all classes of hogs and cattle dropped sharply. Top price of \$30 a hundred-weight was recorded here for two loads of prime cattle, equalling the all-time high established last Saturday.

However, most other steers slumped.

He said the emergency price control act provides that on the first day of each month the secretary of agriculture must certify to the price administrator which agricultural commodities the secretary determines to be in short supply.

If he finds livestock is not in short supply, the Decontrol Board will meet, hold hearings and report its findings. If the secretary's findings do not agree with the action of the board, he may overrule them, an office of price administration spokesman said.

September 1 is the date set for OPA control prices on processed meats; September 5 for wholesalers, and September 9 for retail sales.

Fort Worth Has Rush
FORT WORTH (AP)—Fort Worth stockyards had one of the year's busiest days of cattle trading Monday as cattle were rushed to market before OPA meat controls are restored Thursday.

Fort Worth receipts Monday of 9,000 cattle and 5,100 calves were termed as the largest run in many months by W. L. Pier, stockyards company manager.

Active trade brought prices up 25 to 50 cents on most cattle, while calves were 50 cents to \$11.50 above last week's opening.

Packers have until September 9 to clear current stocks before OPA controls return on retail meat prices.

Wyatt To Control Non-Residential Construction

WASHINGTON (AP)—Civilian Production Administrator John D. Small Tuesday announced he will transfer control over all non-residential construction, except industrial, to Housing Expeditor Wilson W. Wyatt.

Wyatt will lead off a “whole series of steps” to get dwellings now under construction finished before winter, Small told reporters.

“It's my feeling that we should turn handspins if necessary to get these houses finished before snow flies,” the CPA chief said.

Small said the transfer of authority, funds, and from 1,200 to 1,500 employees had been approved by Reconversion Director John R. Steelman, who also ruled in favor of the immediate action on priorities and materials control to speed up home completions.

Small had advocated transferring control over non-residential construction to the National Housing Agency head, following Wyatt's demand upon him for a sharp new slash in non-residential building.

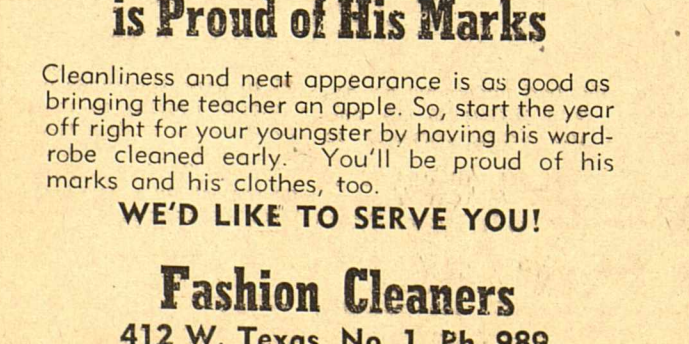

The tax rate is the same as that in effect last year.

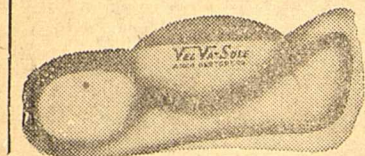

Where Russian Bear Wants A Paw-Hold

Turkey has held the strategic Bosphorus-Marmara-Dardanelles passage for the last 500 years. Although remaining Turkish territory, the Straits were under international guardianship from 1923 to 1936, at which time the Montreux Convention went into effect. This removed all restrictions, permitted Turkey to fortify the previously demilitarized Straits. Now Russia demands that control of the Straits be limited to nations bordering the Black Sea.

Russia has over 1000 miles of Black Sea coastline, Turkey about 800. Bulgaria and Romania, Soviet satellites, together have some 400 miles. USSR also claims strategically important Kars-Ardahan-Artvin area of Turkey. Turks fear Russian military bases there and in Straits area would convert Turkey into a Russian puppet state.

Map above shows the Dardanelles, world's most historic waterway and objective of warring nations since the Trojan Wars over 3,000 years ago. Seeing the real issue as a Russian threat to independence of Turkey, Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan and other nations, the U. S., followed by Great Britain, rejected Russia's bid for domination of the vital straits.

Blind Vendor Opens Concession Stand In Lobby Of Midland Post Office

Thanks to the aid of the Federal government, the State Commission for the Blind, and the Post Office Department, Claude E. Bishop, 61, the blind man who has been selling The Reporter-Telegram in front of the Scharbauer Coffee Shop and on the steps of the Post Office, went into business Tuesday in a news, cigar, and candy concession stand in the lobby of the Midland Post Office.

Learning of the family of six Bishop supports, the State Commission for the Blind several months ago set out to include him in its program of rehabilitation, although he is above the age of men normally started in the program. The first step was to get permission through the local Post Office from the federal Post Office Department for the space in the lobby.

Then the state agency, using aid from the federal rehabilitation funds, set about to provide the stand and to stock it with \$500 worth of magazines, cigars, cigarettes, candies, and chewing gum and other items.

Two representatives of the state commission arrived in Midland Monday to aid Bishop in the grand opening of the concession Tuesday. They are Mrs. Ellie Taylor, field worker, and G. W. Wilhite, rehabilitation counselor. Wilhite will remain in Midland all week helping Bishop learn how to find the vari-

ous items in the stand when customers call.

Stocked by Commission

The opening stock, valued at \$500, is furnished free by the commission. After that the operator will be on his own—in a business of his own. The commission urges the operator to buy supplies locally, but aids him in buying scarce items such as chewing gums and the better candies by making deals for him directly with the jobbers and the manufacturers.

Mrs. Taylor pointed out that the state commission has helped 23 other blind persons set up stands in Texas. Other stands will be opened at Big Spring, Pampa, Borger, and Amarillo.

"The State Commission for the Blind feels it is better to help one blind person make his own living than for charity to have to help him," Mrs. Taylor said. "The person has a feeling of living like other people—he has the satisfaction of making a living for himself and for his family."

She pointed out that the persons already operating the stands in the state make an average of \$250 a month.

Each operator is not left on his own after the first week. A close check is made on his progress. Twice a month he sends in to the commission a statement of his expenditures, income and profits. A small percentage is paid to the commission. This is used by the commission to aid other blind persons over the state.

Al Capone's Rival Fails To Convince Jury He's Innocent

DAYTON, OHIO — (AP) — George (Bugs) Moran, a rival of Al Capone in Chicago's gang wars of the prohibition era, failed to convince a jury of 11 women and one man here that he had settled down in Kentucky as a respectable business man.

Moran and two pals were convicted here Monday night of the robbery of a tavern which called for a 10 to 25 years sojourn in Ohio State Penitentiary.

Throughout the 11 days' trial Moran, who was known as Bugs by Chicago hoodlums because of his moodiness, insisted that he had been living a quiet, circumspect life in Henderson, Ky., as an oilman. He produced two witnesses from Kentucky who agreed with him and he also offered an alibi that he was some place else when John Kurpe, Jr., a tavern employe, was robbed of \$10,000 last June 28.

Convicted with him were Al Fouts of Dayton and Virgil (Doc) Summers of Henderson, Ky.

Although Moran has escaped prison terms on several occasions, iron bars would be no novelty for the one-time Chicago "miracle man," so-called because he was unscathed by slugs which killed many comrades. From 1910 to 1918 he served prison terms for robbery after starting a career as a yegg back in 1905, Chicago police said.

Moran joined the Capone-Torrio gang in 1923, then went with Dion O'Banion when Capone and Torrio split.

When O'Banion was assassinated in 1924 "Bugs" took over. Prior to 1929 he lost three henchmen and in the St. Valentine's Day massacre that year, he lost seven. He was accused twice of attempts on Capone's life in 1925-26.

Telephone Company Asks Consideration Of Hunters Of Area

An appeal to hunters to give birds—and the telephone company—a sporting chance, was made today by H. F. Fox, district manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, following several recent instances of gun shot damage to telephone wires and long distance circuits.

"When hunters take a pot shot at a bird on a telephone wire or pole they often wind up by scoring a bulleye on an insulator or wire," Fox said. "I don't know how often they bag the bird."

"A careless shot will often put a number of telephone lines out of service," Fox explained. "With the current critical material shortages, this type of damage to telephone equipment is more serious than ever."

With the approach of the dove season and with more ammunition expected to be available than in recent years, all hunters are asked to help eliminate this type of damage to hard-to-get telephone equipment.

A great many players would have opened South's hand with a weak three heart bid, and certainly most players would have made a pre-emptive bid with West holding after South's pass.

However, in this case both South and West passed and North, not bothering to pre-empt the diamonds, made a psychic spade bid.

Sanford (East) doubled, and why South elected to stay out of the bidding I do not know. West then showed his long club suit and North came in with another psychic bid of three no trump. He was not vulnerable and of course he was going to run out if he got doubled.

Sanford now reasoned that if the two missing aces were in the opponents' hands, they were very likely divided, and as neither of them had bid an honest suit, he would make South guess about the opening lead. That was why he jumped to six no trump.

South knew that East had the spade suit, even though North had bid spades. He did not know whether to lead diamonds or hearts, but finally decided to play safely and led the jack of hearts. Sanford won and spread the hand, as he could count 14 tricks.

While I do not recommend this type of bidding and am sure that Sanford does not, nevertheless it puts you on your toes and makes a game interesting.

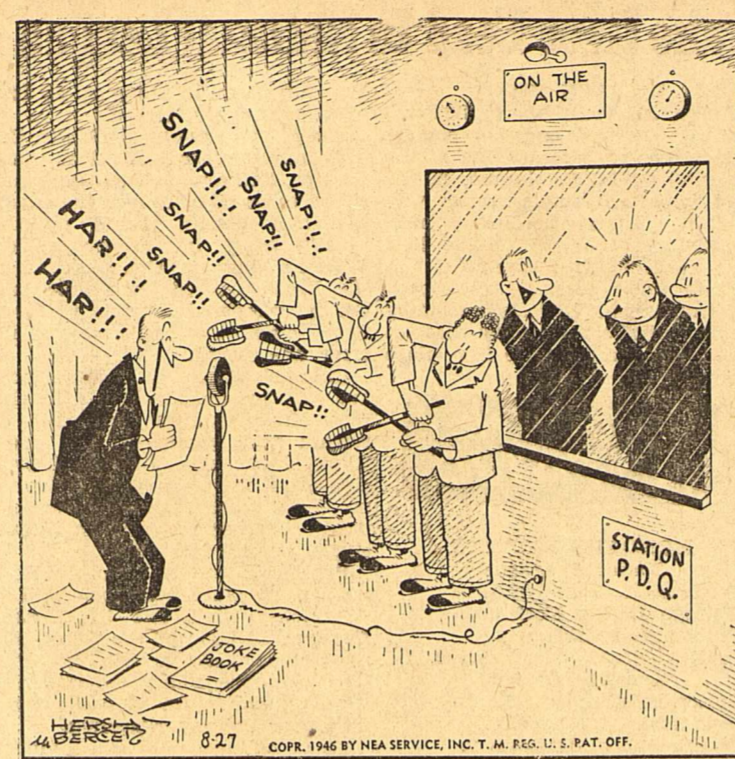

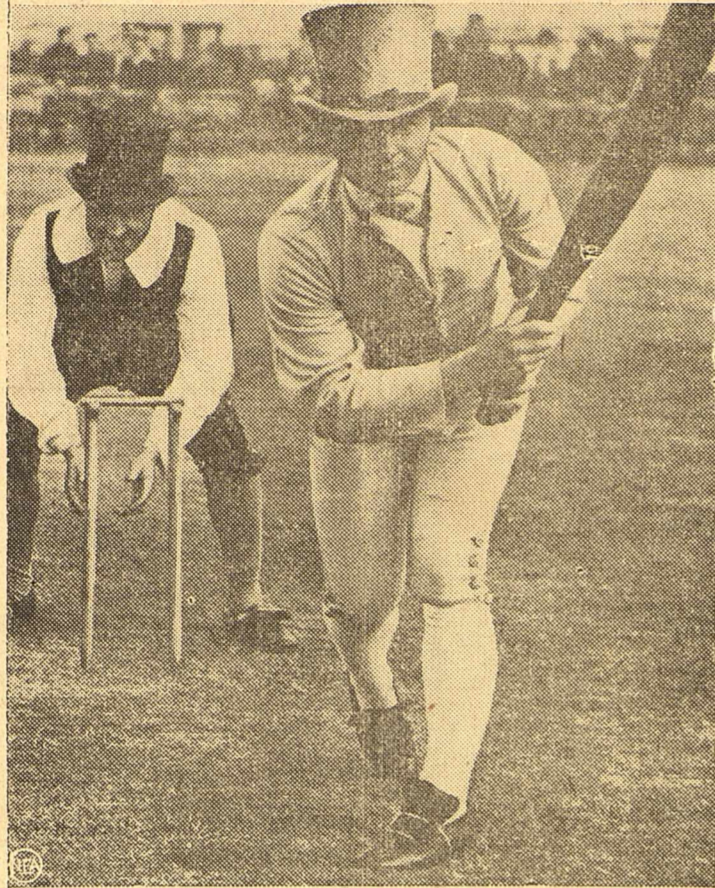

Million Dollar Cattle Deal Made By Lubbock Men

LUBBOCK — (AP) — A million-dollar contract, scrawled in pencil on a piece of tablet paper, represents one of the year's largest cattle transactions and may help restock dry Texas ranges.

The purchase of between 12,000 and 13,000 cattle valued at around \$1,000,000, by Sam C. Arnett, Sr., banker-rancher, and Tobe Foster, oilman-rancher, both of Lubbock, was reported Monday.

The cattle were bought from the Red River Cattle Company of Tucumcari, N. M., through Albert Mitchell. All of the stock was bred by the ranch and bears its brand.

Delivery is expected by December 1.

Arnett said he and Foster planned resale of the cattle to ranchers in small lots to "restock some of these dry ranges out here."

An undivided half interest in the cattle was sold Monday to Joe W. Esny, Fort Davis banker-rancher. The cattle are now on the 450,000-acre Bell Ranch, one of the oldest in New Mexico. It is owned by Mitchell. The stock is said to be in fair condition due to late rains.

Arnett is owner of the 100-section Clabber Hill Ranch in Andrews County and is president of the Citizens National Bank of Lubbock.

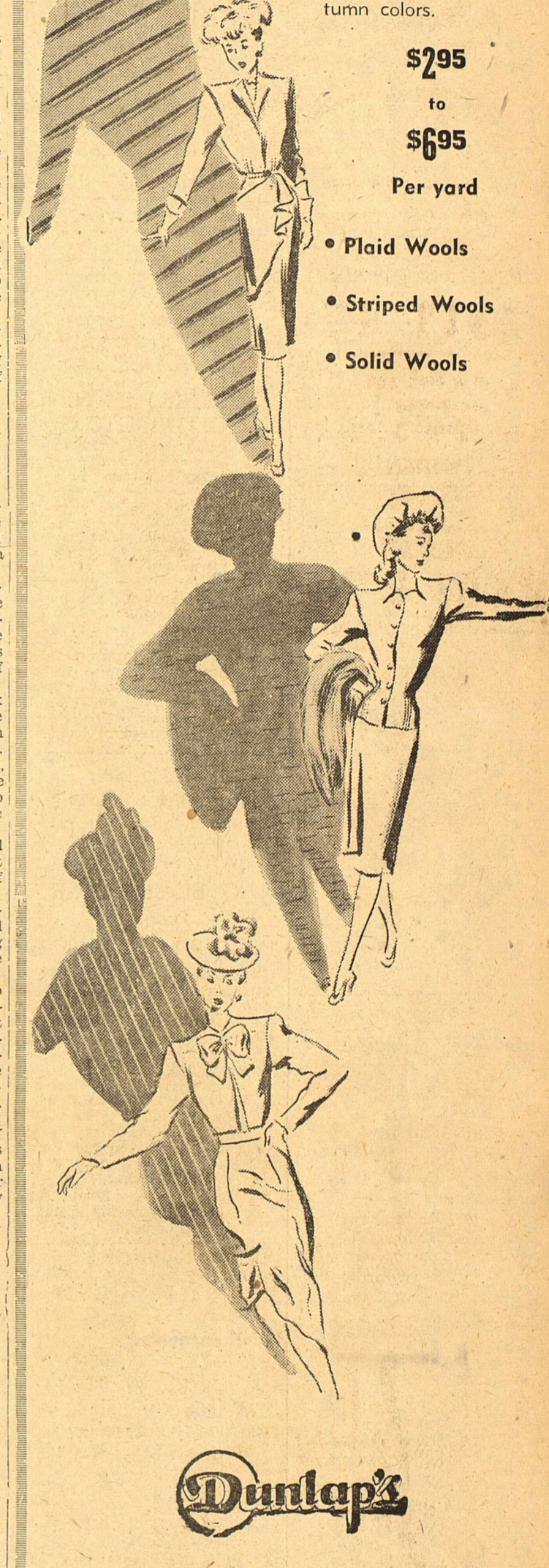
