GRID BOOSTERS INVADE PLAINVIEW CITY ACCORDS HUGE WELCOME TO FOURTEEN PLANES LOADED WITH WEST TEXAS BOOSTERS

SPECIAL TRAIN CARRIES FANS TO BIG CLASH

100 ARE ON BOARD AS TRAIN PULLS OUT FOR NEAR CITY

Football spirit soared high on a wave of loyal enthusiasm this afternoon as approximately 500 students and teachers of the Lubbock High school, and other gridiron followers of the city boarded the special train for Plainview where the Lubbock Westerners and the Plainview High school Bulldogs clash in annual gridiron rivalry this afternoon.

Containing eight coaches, the special train departed from here at 2 o'clock in time to reach the Lubbock city in time for the game at 3:30 o'clock. The special will leave Plainview at 6:30 o'clock tonight, arriving here about eight.

Band Goes, Too
The Lubbock High School band, under the direction of James W. Crowley, the school pep squad, and about twenty teachers accompanied the local delegation to the game.

A down-town parade will be staged through the streets of Plainview upon the arrival of the special there. R. L. Bayless, local Santa Fe agent, is in charge of the trip, and J. J. Lowery, business manager of the high school athletics, and the members of the school are in charge of the delegation.

Leaders in Charge
Superintendent M. H. Duncan and Principal R. W. Mathews are included in the delegation.

The train departed this afternoon with a series of yells. A number of stay-at-homes were at the station bidding the delegation to urge the Westerners to victory in this afternoon's game.

The football squad will return on the special train tonight.

FIND BODY OF BEATEN WIDOW
WEALTHY LADY FOUND SLAIN IN DETROIT BASEMENT

DETROIT, Nov. 9.—The body of Mrs. Jennie Lantz, 51, widow of a reputed wealthy Detroit real estate dealer, was found this morning near the furnace in the basement of her home. Her head had been crushed and indications were she had been in a struggle.

The body was found by Mrs. Priscilla Selmis, a neighbor, who said she entered the Lantz home to investigate because she had not seen Mrs. Lantz since yesterday.

Near the body, which lay in a pool of blood, was one of Mrs. Lantz's slippers.

Police said following a preliminary investigation that they believed Mrs. Lantz was slain yesterday afternoon. One theory advanced was that she might have been slain by a robber, although a number of her valuable diamonds were found in the house.

Mrs. Lantz had resided alone in her home since the death of her husband, James Lantz, eighteen months ago.

Red Cross Lays Its Plans For Campaign
Plans are being formulated this week for the intensive Red Cross roll call drive which extends from November 11 until Thanksgiving.

The principal drive of the campaign will be staged next week, according to G. P. Kuykendall, general chairman of the drive. Officials and directors of the campaign will meet sometime today to work out further details of the drive. A publicity director will be selected and active work begun Monday. The quota for this district is \$6,000.

HIDALGO VOTE IS HINGING ON EDINBURG BOX

(By Associated Press)
EDINBURG, Nov. 9.—Fate of the Hidalgo county Citizens Republican ticket, written on the ballot by supporters who lost their cause in the county's hotly contested election dispute, was hanging today off the result of the Edinburg box count, which had not been completed this morning.

State rangers were still on guard at the box, but no disturbances had been reported.

Gordon Griffin, citizens candidate for 93rd district judge, running against J. E. Leslie, democratic candidate for re-election, apparently was the only candidate on the officially denied ticket who stood a chance for victory, as indicated from the remainder of the county's returns.

Control of Politics Sought
J. E. McClellan, one of the citizens leaders, declared that the ticket was put out in order to wrest control of county politics from an "administration ring," which, he said, was headed by Sheriff A. Y.

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Cotton Palace At Waco Opens Gates

WACO, Tex., Nov. 9 (P)—Gates at the 1928 Texas Cotton Palace were thrown open today, and despite clouded skies large crowds attended events preliminary to the official opening tonight.

On the program this year is an unusual assortment of entertainment features. Tomorrow will be the Texas-Baylor football game; Sunday the Armistice Day program; Monday, children's night; Tuesday coronation of the king and queen; Wednesday, debutantes' reception; Thursday, farmers day; Friday, woman's night; Saturday, trades ball; Sunday, Sousa's band concert.

NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING PLAYED BIG PART IN CARRYING TEXAS ELECTORAL VOTE FOR HOOVER, HASKETT DECLARES

DALLAS, Nov. 9 (P)—A stupendous advertising campaign by the republicans and anti-Smith democrats while the straight out democrats pursued their old system of permitting nature to take its course was pointed to from some quarters today as having played a great part in placing Texas' twenty electoral votes in the republican column for the first time.

Six million pieces of literature were mailed from anti-Smith headquarters and the campaign of education included printing a specimen ballot in 138 Texas newspapers and, in the closing days of the campaign, paid advertising in 43 daily newspapers.

"In many counties the local Hoover supporters placed advertising unknown to the headquarters until copies of the papers were received," said Fred L. Haskett, publicity manager. "It was the greatest advertised political campaign in Texas."

TEXAS BALLOT CONTINUES TO FAVOR HOOVER

SMITH IS TRAILING BY 17,178 AS COUNT IS CONTINUED

DALLAS, Nov. 9.—Holding his own as returns from outlying counties, which had been expected to give Gov. Alfred E. Smith a big majority, came in, Herbert Hoover today had a 17,178 lead over the democratic nominee.

The Texas Election Bureau's last tabulation gave Hoover 350,464 and Smith 333,286, with complete returns from 168 counties and reports from all but one of the 253.

MOODY WINS VICTORY
DALLAS, Nov. 9 (P)—Alvin S. Moody, chairman of the anti-Smith democrats of Texas, today sent the following telegram to Herbert Hoover:

"All Texas would be pleased and gratified to have you return to Washington by way of our state. You could find no place in America more pleasant and hospitable than south Texas for a part or all of your vacation. We extend you our heartiest invitation to spend part of the winter with us."

Boy Week Workers Sessioning Today

Selection of a location for the big celebration to climax Father and Son week, which is scheduled to be held November 20, will be made this afternoon at a meeting of the location in the city hall.

A. C. Jackson, Cecil Horne, and Hubert Allen comprise the committee. Several locations have been suggested and a definite selection will be made today.

The site committee of the occasion headed by Alex McDonald, has already started to work preparing a menu, and it promises to be one which every father and son of the county will enjoy.

It is expected that more than 1,000 will attend the event, which present plans indicate will be the biggest of its kind ever held in the South Plains.

San Angelo Raises Its Railroad Fund

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 9 (P)—San Angelo today attained its goal of \$250,000 in a drive to help finance the Gulf and West Texas railroad. The road will need \$1,500,000 by public subscription for construction of the line from the Gulf to San Angelo, and towns along the proposed route have been endeavoring to raise their quotas.

When the drive reopened here this morning, San Angelo lacked only \$7,500 of the \$250,000 quota, and this difference was speedily raised, C. W. Hobbs, chairman, said.

Thieves Take Tires From Southland Man

Gaining entrance sometime after midnight last night, robbers stole twelve tires from the Big Street Garage of Southland, according to a report received by the local sheriff's department today.

SEAS SWALLOW FISHING CRAFT

HEAVY STORM OFF THE WASHINGTON COAST SINKS VESSEL

(By Associated Press)
HOQUIAM, Wash., Nov. 9.—An unidentified ship, presumably a fishing craft, was believed by coast guardsmen to have been swallowed up today by a raging sea in Gray's Harbor bar near here.

The ship, obviously in distress, was sighted shortly after midnight battling a fifty to sixty mile gale and enormous seas, just outside the harbor. A coast guard boat put out to her aid but returned two hours later and reported that no trace of the vessel could be found.

After learning that the distressed vessel had sent up a flare the coast guard boat started out again, but those aboard expressed belief that only a large ship could have withstood the heavy pounding of the surf.

The channel entrance to Gray's Harbor is deep enough to swallow a fair-sized ship. Fishing craft in this district generally are of the size which carry three to twelve men.

Another vessel, the trolling boat Beattie K., was reported to have been swept out to open sea off Astoria, Ore., with her captain Eino Jarvin and another man aboard.

Estacado Pioneer Dies In Hospital

J. M. Martin, 81, for about a quarter of a century a citizen of the South Plains near Estacado, died in a local hospital at about 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The body is being held in state at the Rix Funeral Home. Funeral services will be held at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the Estacado Baptist church with the Rev. J. M. Rankin, old friend and former pastor of the family officiating. Burial will be in the Lorenzo cemetery.

Mr. Martin is survived by his widow, four grandsons, three granddaughters, and seven grand-children. None of his children is living. All of the relatives reside in West Texas and all but two near Estacado.

Many Transients Appeal For Help

A steady stream of transients has poured into the offices of the local Red Cross organization for the past few days, officials of the organization reported today.

The transients are seeking food, places to sleep, and various things. Some state they will starve rather than pick cotton. The Red Cross officials make an effort to find jobs for as many as possible but do not encourage helping the transients unless they exert an effort toward finding work.

FLAMES RAGE IN OIL FIELD

CALIFORNIA INFERNO ENVELOPS TANKS AND RIGS

(By Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9.—A raging fire which started when a gas well at the Santa Fe Springs, Cal., oil field blew in this morning, was reported to have jumped to four nearby oil storage tanks and a derrick, making an inferno of the western part of the petroleum district.

This well is on the property of the Bellview Oil company and is located in an area of many oil wells located close together. All available men and fighting apparatus in the area were gathered to fight the blaze.

Field Is Near Whittier
The oil field is near Whittier, Cal., about fifteen miles from downtown Los Angeles, and is the scene of a recent gas well fire which burned fiercely for forty days before being extinguished.

Gravel being forced upward by outrushing gas and making sparks by striking the sides of the well casing was the cause of the Bellview fire. There was an explosion when the gas ignited. The derrick was wrecked, mud and gravel was thrown out in large quantities and the flames shot a hundred feet into the air and continued with a sustained roar.

Eighteenth Victim Dies

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 9 (P)—The explosion which wrecked the Preble Box Toe factory yesterday claimed its eighteenth victim today when Lewis Rogers, employee of the factory, died in a hospital. He was the sixth person to have died in the hospital, twelve others being killed outright.

Former Mill Worker's Ambition Is Crowned With Success As New York Acclaims New Star of Grand Opera

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (P)—Clara Jacobo, once a mill worker in Lawrence, Mass., stepped up last night into the golden world toward which she had struggled for nearly 15 years—the stage of the Metropolitan opera house.

She made her debut in "Il Trovatore," whose tuneful arias she could sing at an age when most children are learning kindergarten ditties. After she had sung with Giovanni Martinelli the old familiar "Miserere"—which she used to sing all by herself as a child, both soprano and tenor—she could have left no doubt in the minds of her old friends from Lawrence that she was a success.

From an inconspicuous seat in the gallery, a sturdy little old man, with drooping grey moustachios, listened intently to every note uttered by the new dramatic soprano of the Metropolitan Opera company. Later he went back stage.

BOY'S BODY FOUND

TOPEKA, Nov. 9 (P)—The body of Albert Cropper, 11, of Kansas City, Kansas, was found in the railroad yards here last night within three hours after the youth and two companions escaped from the boys industrial school. The boy was run over by a train, his head was crushed. Another of the trio, Herbert Stewart, 11, of Edna, Kas., was apprehended, but William Stafford, 16, of Kansas City, Kas., had not been located early today.

Ordinance Held Up By City Commission

Due to several difficulties which will have to be worked out, the city commission in regular session at the city hall yesterday agreed to hold up indefinitely the ordinance forbidding automobile agencies to park used cars along curb lines.

The ordinance was passed by the commission about two weeks ago and was to have become effective last Tuesday. It states that cars held for sale may be parked along the curb lines.

Adjustment of taxes and other routine business consumed the remainder of the time of the commission's meeting yesterday.

MORE THAN 1,000 CARS, FILLED WITH SOME 3,000 LUBBOCK CITIZENS, CHEER ARRIVALS AT TEMPORARY AIRPORT NORTH OF CITY

Flying several minutes ahead of their schedule, the 14 planes of the Fort Worth Aerocade, first air trippers in the state of Texas, swooped down onto Lubbock's temporary airport, two miles north of town on the Plainview highway, as several hundred automobiles—loads of citizens were arriving in frantic haste to watch them land.

Due to arrive here at 11:45, the last plane had landed on the field at 11:30 and a continuous string of cars continued to pour from town. In all there were at least a thousand automobiles and more than 3,000 people on hand to welcome the flyers.

The six U. S. army planes did not, for some unknown reason, join the Aerocade at Fort Worth Thursday morning, but were expected to join them at Plainview early today. Failing this they were expected to catch up with them here, but did not.

The flight from Plainview to Lubbock was made in 27 minutes by the official plane. This plane left Amarillo at 9:12 this morning, arriving at Plainview at 9:56; leaving there at 11:09 and arriving here at 11:33.

TEXAS BATTLE OVER VOTE IS CALMING DOWN

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Nov. 9.—Politics cooled from a boil to a simmer in Texas today. Warring factions of the republican and democratic parties were as far from agreement as ever, but the passing of the election robbed them of their field of battle and there was little that they could do about their differences beyond issue statements.

Regular leaders, who championed Al Smith and were defeated at the Texas polls, scoffed at the demands from the bolters that they resign their posts. The anti-Smith leaders continued to call for reorganization of the party, but the only way they can force such action is to defeat the present leaders in the next state convention which is two years away.

Regulars Are Adamant
Regular leaders declared that the bolting state would be unable to accomplish this. They pointed out that Hoover won by a few thousand and that his total was made up of 150,000 republicans, plus the bolting democrats. When the republican strength is subtracted from this total, they said, the bolters number would fall far below the total vote for Smith which was made up of regular democratic ballots.

Last available figures in the state make Hoover's total 342,956 and Smith's 327,671. One county has not been heard from at all and in 103 the count is still incomplete.

Wurzbach Is Elected
Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach the only republican Texas sends to the upper or lower house seemed to have won a narrow victory in the fourteenth district after a hair-raising battle in which he and his democratic opponent, Augustus McCloskey of San Antonio traded the lead back and forth a dozen times. McCloskey refused to admit defeat until the official canvass Monday. The most accurate figures available

MAIL SERVICE MAY INCREASE

Official maps of the U. S. Postal Department of Washington bearing upon free mail delivery service in Lubbock have been sent to the local post office as a preliminary step in the addition of the proposed 60-block extension of the city mail service.

Postmaster John L. Vaughan received the maps today with instructions to mark the proposed extension and make a detailed report to the department concerning the requirements necessary for delivery service.

Work to Satisfy Demands
According to Mr. Vaughan, all of the requirements have been met with the exception of street lights and street signs. A committee of the Lubbock Board of City Development has already been appointed to formulate a plan of marking the street and the street light requirement is now in the hands of the city commission although no action has been taken.

It was previously hoped that the extension would be granted in time for Christmas delivery but because of the delays it is now thought impossible to begin the service by that time.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 3 to 5 points on a continuation of yesterday's buying which seemed to find additional encouragement in a bullish view of the standard cloth statistics for October showing a sale of 41.1 per cent in excess of production, and relatively steady Liverpool cables.

The advance met a good deal of resistance and some southern hedging but it was readily absorbed with prices selling up to 19.50 for December and 19.35 for May or about 14 points above yesterday's closing figures by the end of the first half hour.

The demand seemed to taper off after the advance to 19.50 for December and 19.35 for May, but was comparatively quiet later in the morning with prices reacting under a little southern hedging and realizing. At mid-day December was selling around 19.28 with the general market about 2 to 5 points net higher.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 9 (AP)—The cotton market opened 11 to 16 points higher in response to relatively favorable Liverpool cables. The market improved and trading was early and active. Prices were met early and profit-taking was evident. The market was quiet and steady at 11 to 12 points above the previous day's closing. Near the end of the first hour the market was steady and at the high.

The market showed a slightly easier tone later in the morning under liquidation by buyers who apparently had held contracts over the slump preceding yesterday's sharp advance. The disposition to realize was also increased when traders endeavored to even up in advance of Monday's holiday.

Before the offerings were absorbed prices receded 7 to 8 points from the high. At noon the market was quiet and steady and 9 to 10 points above yesterday's close.

WALL STREET REPORT
NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—Stock prices moved irregularly higher at the opening of today's market. General Motors, directors of which declared an extra dividend of \$2.50 and proposed a 2-1-2 for 1 split up after the close of yesterday's market, opened with a block of 10,000 shares at the split price of 222 to 221-1/2, an extreme rise of 23-3/4 points. Radio showed an initial gain of 4-1/2 points. Montgomery Ward 4-1/2 points. American Sugar Refining, Trunk Roller Bearing and Dupont 1 to 1-1/2 points.

Strong buying support was provided overnight and the market resumed its advance on impressive fashion. Wall Street apparently was not disturbed by the increase of nearly \$72,000,000 in Federal Reserve brokers' loans to a new high record as earlier estimates generally ran above \$100,000,000.

General Motors Falls Back
General Motors ran into selling after its initial bulge, slipping back to around 220. Montgomery-Ward quickly extended its gain to nearly 6 points and Curtis Aeroplane, which broke 10 points yesterday, rallied 5 points at the opening. General Electric, Jewel Tea, Archer Daniels, Midland and Pillsbury Flour preferred advanced 2 to 3 points to new high records.

Rails took a more prominent part in the advance, Erie assuming the leadership of that group with an early gain of 3 points. St. Paul preferred, Delaware and Hudson and Canadian Pacific quickly advanced a point or more.

Foreign exchanges opened steady, with sterling cables unchanged at \$4.84 7/8-7/2.

OIL GOES UP

PROCLAMATION BY GOVERNOR COVERS ARMISTICE RITES

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 9.—Sunday being the 10th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice between nations participating in the world war Governor Moody today issued a proclamation asking the people of Texas to observe it as Armistice day.

He suggested that everyone join in two minutes of silence at 11 a. m. as a simple and beautiful means of honoring the memory of the deceased soldiers and emphasizing the duty of every citizen in preserving the peace of the world and in promoting the spirit of peace, and urged that patriotic civic and religious agencies "fittingly observe this occasion."

He stated that the American Legion requests that various patriotic programs for the day be arranged also to emphasize the efforts being made by it and the American Legion auxiliary to enlist new members and have paid up for 1929 the dues of all who are 1928 members of these organizations, "in order that their full strength may be put to work in their programs of unselfish service to the community, state and nation."

EXTRY! CHICAGO TO FIGHT GANGLAND!

EVEN MAYOR THOMPSON MAY HELP. IS CLAIM, AS VOTERS RAP PRESENT ADMINISTRATION

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—The "Unholy Alliance" as it has been called, between politics and crime in Chicago, trembled today from its second sound poll thrusting and quaking under the threat of new official attacks upon it.

A police chief only recently appointed, a sheriff newly elected and a prosecutor-elect, himself the victim of bombers several months ago, were organizing today to use in concert their three enforcement agencies to give Chicago's underworld a thorough house-cleaning.

Thompson May Help.
There was talk, too, that Mayor Thompson contemplates joining the police-crime offensive by using his executive shears upon numerous office-holders whose policies have been scored by investigating bodies.

Following the defeat in the primaries of the ticket sponsored by Mayor Thompson and the State's Attorney Crowe, and the further surrender of their ranks by Tuesday's vote, these two Republican leaders have come to a parting of their political ways.

Crowe will be out of office in December, greatly reduced in party power, and friends of the mayor believe the latter will throw the strength of his office toward the cleanup faction that will come into control at that time.

Judge John A. Swanson, state's attorney-elect, John E. Traeger, sheriff-elect, and Police Commissioner William A. Russell have indicated their intention to form a triumvirate of enforcement that will rout out the gangster and gunman.

There were indications that an unprecedented shakeup of the police force by the commissioner would be one of the first steps in the new program.

WILCOX WON'T RESIGN
TEMPLE, Tex., Nov. 9 (AP)—D. W. Wilcox, of Georgetown, chairman of the State "Democratic" Executive committee, has no intention of resigning his position merely because Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York failed to carry Texas.

In a statement to the Associated Press Mr. Wilcox said that he would not resign, but refused to make any comment on the election until he could study the results more fully.

He is here with his daughter who is being treated at a local clinic.

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 9 (AP)—Twenty-eight persons, nearly all of them girls, were drowned last night when a Felucca, or native boat, capsized in mid-stream near Abu Zabal.

The native employee of a nearby wireless station rescued nine girls but was so exhausted that he collapsed and died. The accident was due to overloading of the craft.

Hawkins Gives Out Political Opinions

BROCKENRIDGE, TEXAS, Nov. 9 (AP)—Judge William E. Hawkins, a candidate for Governor in the first Democratic primary this year, issued a statement today in which he said, in part:

"Let the true responsibility for the overwhelming repudiation of the national Democratic ticket rest where it truly belongs. Moody's effort to shoulder it off on Raskob is an affront to the intelligence of the Texas electorate. The great lesson of the most critical political contest in our history ought not to be perverted or lost. In it lies the hope of the perpetuity of free government among men."

Rumanian Cabinet Finally Gathered

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Nov. 9 (AP)—Juliu Maniu, leader of the National Peasant party and long an opponent of the Bratianu regime in Rumania, today formed a cabinet to succeed that of Vintila Bratianu which resigned several days ago at the request of the regency.

The new cabinet will take the oath tomorrow at noon.

"It is a triumph of constitutionalism over despotism," he said to the Associated Press correspondent as he bounded down the steps of the palace.

ROOSEVELT BELIEVED WINNER
NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—With one district unreported Franklin D.

Roosevelt today appeared to have been elected Governor of New York state by over 55,000 votes. Attorney General Albert Ottinger, the Republican nominee still refused to concede the election believing a checkup of the totals would show him a winner by a narrow margin.

HOOVER TURNS TOWARD SOUTH

GOP VICTOR PLANNING TO HOLD HIS GAIN BY ORGANIZING

(By Associated Press)
STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 8.—Assessing the effect of the tidal wave which has swept him into the presidency, Herbert Hoover finds that victory has brought him new problems quite apart from those he must shoulder as the chief executive.

These are political in character, and as the head of his party the decision as to dealing with them rests with him. Foremost among them is the future organization in the southern states, involving extensive campaign and some realignments south of the Mason and Dixon line.

Hoover is surprised. The president-elect has been fully aware of the factors contributing to the political revolution there—a revolution which surprised him as much as it did the country as a whole. However, latest reports show that in some of the states which threw their electoral votes to him, the republican trend extended into the congressional field, with the election of candidates of his own party in districts which heretofore have been strongly democratic.

One of the high hopes Hoover entertained during the campaign was that sectional lines might be broken down, and consequently his friends look upon it as only a natural consequence of the election that he should take steps to consolidate as far as possible the grounds that has been gained. The creation of a more extensive organization in the southern states was one of the first concerns in his campaign.

Plans Not Worked Out
This division brought about changes in the character of state organizations, and it is interpreted that the work undertaken within the limited time permitted during the campaign will be extended. Just how this will be done is for future determination, as the president-elect is keeping his mind free from political problems as much as possible during his period of rest and recuperation.

More other men who have been elected to the presidency, he finds it a little difficult to submit to constant watch by secret service men all the time he is away from home, and to have his residence constantly under guard. Therefore Hoover has roamed the country about his home unattended and has delighted in getting away from Mrs. Hoover for an hour or more.

STATE WILL BUY EQUIPMENT THAT GILCHRIST ASKS

AUSTIN, Nov. 9 (P).—The Board of Control has finally ordered purchase of 85 pieces of road equipment and machinery requisitioned by the State Highway department and solicited the department's approval of sixty additional pieces sought by it.

The two department concurred last August in recommendations of the machinery ordered today, but disagreed on specifications of the items held in abeyance.

In notifying Gibb Gilchrist, state highway engineer, of the board's decision to place orders for the machinery recommended by both departments, R. B. Walthall, chairman, suggested that the remaining items in disagreement should be purchased in accordance with the Board of Control's recommendation, which, he said, "is in keeping with the ruling of the attorney general."

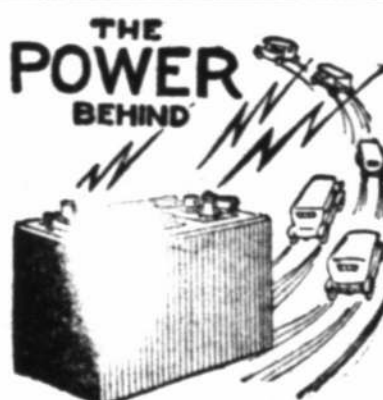

"One reason," he answered, "is that those players are satisfied. As they are, I am paying them as much as they could get in the major leagues and I am making money and making a league out of our league."

Building for Sen
The second and most important reason is that I am building for the future. I want to establish and maintain the greatest minor league team in the country to turn over to the greatest boy a father ever had.

Young Jack Dunn was one of the finest boys you ever could want to meet. A handsome fellow, a fighter like his father, but of more gentle disposition, and a young fellow who had learned a lot about the baseball business from one of the smartest tutors in the game.

"In a few years I'll be able to quit," the father said. "I'm getting tired of the game. I never will be able to get away from it entirely, but it will not be long until I can sit back and just help young Jack when he needs help. But that won't be often."

Dunn was the manager and majority stockholder of the club, and as there are not practical baseball heirs it is quite likely that his stock will be sold.

It has been demonstrated in recent years that football of the middle west and Pacific coast compares favorably in every respect with football as played in the east. That wasn't always the case.

Only in recent years has southern football received much of a nod in national attention. Two excursions to the Pacific coast demonstrated that Alabama had a nice football team, and the efforts of Georgia Tech, Georgia, Tulane, Vanderbilt and other strong southern teams international contests convinced the skeptics that southern football as played by the leading teams wasn't behind the football of other sections.

Demonstration of the football of another section was made in California last December when a trio of Texas players took the play away from eastern and western stars in a post-season game. To enhance the prestige gained from that, Southern Methodist visited West Point this year and held the powerful Army team to a 14-13 score.

Missouri Valley football teams, mainly Nebraska and Missouri have also shown in recent years that they get together teams as powerful as those of other sections.

Well, What About the Rockies? That leaves the Rocky Mountain teams out of the discussion so far, but we can't do that. They play football out there, too, you know, and it seems that they're coming along rapidly to the point where their teams will be able to hold their own against the best of any section.

One of the prominent coaches of that section is William T. "Bully" Vandegraaf. He is at Colorado College and his team is one of the best in that section. Mr. Vandegraaf knows his football, not only in the Rocky Mountains but in the south and in the east. They

will tell you in the south that no punter like "Bully" Vandegraaf, when he was at Alabama before the war has been seen since. You can also learn from easterners that he is quite a football player at West Point and also a star for one of the service teams early in the war.

Anyhow, Vandegraaf is not in the army now. He is trying his best to win the Rocky Mountain championship this year after barely missing out last year. And it is from him that we learn about Rocky Mountain football.

Time in on Vandegraaf's little talk:

"It's a little hard to compare the eleven of this section with those of other sections, but I do not think there is a great deal of difference. Our schools, as a general rule, are much smaller."

"I feel quite sure that the teams out here are not as strong in general as those of other major conferences but the difference is not great and some of our teams could compete on an equal basis with the best of them."

Teams Are Playing a Smart Game
Football in the conference, as a whole is showing steady improvement. The teams this year seem better in the average than teams of last year and I feel quite sure they are playing smarter football.

"A few comparative scores bring this out. Montana State beat Idaho and lost to Nebraska. We (Colorado Springs) won from Montana State by a 23-14 score, while Nebraska beat them 24-6. Practically the same difference in points."

"The conference seems to be shy of outstanding linemen and it doesn't seem as if very many are deserving of national mention. But we have some backs who are mighty good."

"Earl Clark, on my team, is an excellent back. He received

Two Lads Are Held In Shooting Case

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 9 (AP).—Two Atlanta youths, Paul Reynour and Robert B. Pettit, both 19, were held in jail today as suspects in connection with the death of Paul Hulme, 19, a high school student, whose body was found Saturday, near Forest road, a short distance from a point where Pettit admitted having fired a pistol.

Both have disclaimed knowledge of Hulme's death, declaring that if the two bullets Pettit said he had fired at a signboard used as a target had struck Hulme, the death was entirely accidental.

The youths will remain in confinement at least until officers have made a thorough examination of the case, police declared today.

The grand jury under the direction of Charles Harley, special state's attorney, had spent several weeks investigating charges that county officials were conspiring with roadhouse and resort owners to promote violations of the liquor laws and gambling.

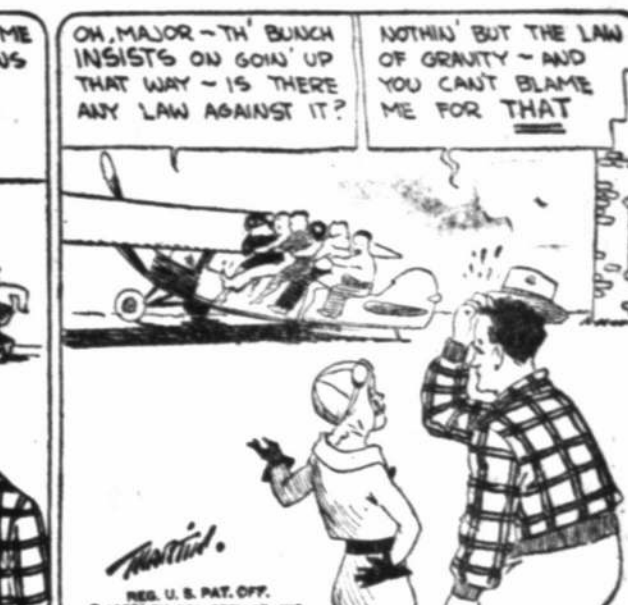

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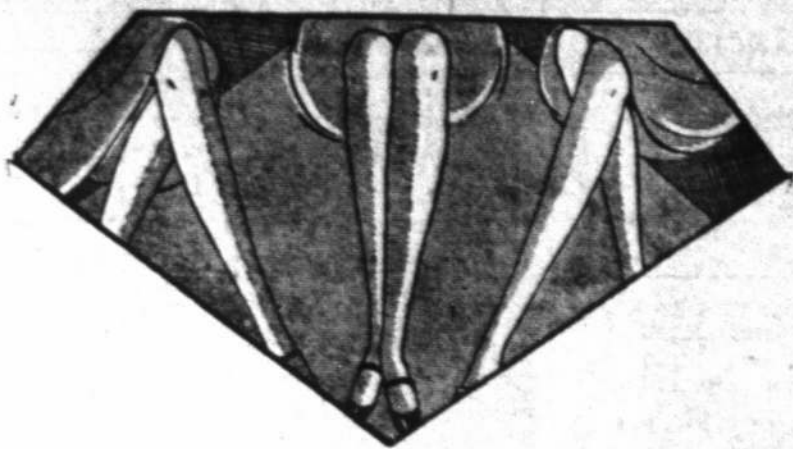

"That was a Horseback," he said, "and this trip to here has been made in exactly 8 and a half days less time than I made it then."

George Benson, chairman of Lubbock's airport committee, stated that 14 or 17 different sites have been offered the city for a municipal airport, within short distances of town, and that soon one would be selected, as Lubbock is rapidly becoming air-minded. A modern airport is probable within a short while, he declared.

Hubb Digs Makes Talk

Hubb Digs, chairman of the Fort Worth Aeroclub, introduced each member of the party and stated that the reason for the trip was to help solve problems in the way of development of aviation in West Texas.

J. E. Brown, geologist for the Tidal Oil company, of Tulsa, stated he was the only member of the tour making it for strictly commercial purposes, and that he believed geologists would be using airplanes in scouting for oil fields more and more within the next few years.

Jerry Marshall, air mail pilot, representing the Texas Air Transport company, which carries air mail in Texas, said that Texas daily flies 25 per cent of the air mileage in the United States, which is a total of 28,000 miles a day for the entire nation. In 1927 he said more than 27 million miles were flown by mail planes and that in the entire period only six casualties were reported.

HARVARD MAY COPY OXFORD

\$3,000,000 GIFT WILL HELP FORM SMALLER SOCIAL GROUPS

(By Associated Press) CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 9 (P)—A \$3,000,000 fund, given to Harvard University anonymously, is expected to make possible the establishment

of a number of small colleges within the university resembling the colleges of Oxford and Cambridge. The fund will be used to build and endow a group of dormitories, dining halls and common rooms to accommodate from 200 to 300 students.

Eventually it is hoped to change the existing system into a collection of convenient sized colleges, each of which would be a separate educational as well as social unit.

Under this plan Harvard college would be only the name given to this collection. The college, would, however, award degrees and conduct uniform examinations.

In making public the gift, President Lowell said: "For a generation there has been much discussion of the policy of breaking up our large colleges into smaller social units in order to secure at the same time the advantages of the large and small institutions. Many men here have felt that this must come if we were to confer the greatest benefit upon our undergraduates."

"The present plan involves no change in the method of teaching; and in fact our tutorial system lends itself to it perfectly."

Vaughn Asks Early Christmas Mailing

The first request of an early Christmas mailing campaign was issued this morning by Postmaster John L. Vaughan.

"The growth of the volume of mail here in both the parcel post and letter departments has already taxed the workers almost to the utmost," he said this morning. "The year more than any previous year it is urged that Christmas mailing be done early."

Advices have been received from the Post Office Department of Washington that local campaign for early mailing be started in view of the heaviest mailing period in history of the department.

"With slightly more than a month before Christmas, people should begin to lay plans for mailing," Mr. Vaughan continued.
