11 Accidents Are Investigated In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 11 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in one person killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1971 shows a total of 50 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 20 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1971, shows a total of 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 17 more accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 76 more injured than during July.

The 25 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Wise, five; Gray and Potter, three each; Garza, Hale and Carson, two each; Baylor, Crosby, Montague, Parker, Briscoe, Castro, Randall, and Roberts, one each.

Farmers Welcome Sun, Rainfall For Month 6.44

Sunny skies brought bright shiny faces about Hart this week as farmers breathed sighs of relief that the harvest-interrupting rains were over.

Rainfall from Sept. 1 to Sept. 24 totaled 6.44 inches as compared to the 6.75 inches for the entire year of 1970. The official rain gauge at the Fort Worth and Denver depot registered 3.94 inches from Wednesday

until 9 a. m. Friday. Thus far, 16.29 inches have been reported for the year.

Some area farmers report they received as much as five inches from last week's rain clouds.

The yearly total, however, is still considerably less than the 1969 measure of 23.76 inches.

Ray Joe Riley Is Elected Plains Cotton Growers Prexy

Ray Joe Riley was elected president of Plains Cotton Growers Incorporated Tuesday at the 15th annual meeting in Lubbock. He will head the 25,000 member regional organization, succeeding Donnell Echols of Lamesa. Echols becomes

chairman of the board.

Riley is a 1956 graduate of Texas Tech. He farms near Sunnyside and has been outstanding in agriculture since exhibiting a fine record in FFA work in high school.

Selected to be listed in the

1971 edition "Outstanding Young Farmers of America", Riley's agricultural operations are spread over more than 4000 acres. In addition to cotton, he grows sorghum, wheat, corn and alfalfa.

Riley and his wife, Jo, have two sons. The family is active in the Church of Christ.

Some 600 persons attended the annual meeting Tuesday and heard Kenneth Frick, National administrator of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, speak.

3 Sought In Connection With Saturday Burglaries

Three persons are being sought by Castro County sheriff's officers in connection with burglary of two Hart businesses Saturday morning.

According to Granville Martin, deputy sheriff and investigating officer, three sets of tracks were discovered at the scene of a burglary at the Green Frog Cafe and the Shamrock Service Station. This makes it seem at least three persons are involved," he said.

Martin said the burglars broke a window in the front of the cafe to enter the building. They left both doors wide open. Anyone could see the building had been broken into," he said.

The burglars escaped with \$132.35 from the juke box and cigarette machines, 157 packs of cigarettes and three boxes of candy.

Industrial Cooperative Training Program Aiding Students For Future Careers

Hart High School has for the first time the Industrial Cooperative Training program. This program has received a hearty welcome from several of the businesses. Business men were so responsive to the ICT that they outnumbered the 30 students who enrolled for the training.

George Carroll, coordinator of the program said "We are very fortunate in Hart to have this many firms willing to cooperate. This is about an unheard of thing for a town the size of Hart. The city counts about 1,000 citizens.

Each student attends school one-half day, taking their regular academic subjects usually, math, English, History or physical science. In a one hour

class of I.C.T. the students study the theory of their jobs, at which they work at in the afternoons. Each student seems very enthusiastic about I.C.T. program which is administered by the Texas Education Agency in Austin.

The program is divided into two groups, the sophomores who are just now beginning their high school careers, then the seniors who only lack their diplomas before stepping out into the world. Carroll said that all of his seniors are planning to go to college after finishing high school. They are taking this course to learn how to work, how to get a job and hold it. Carroll stated that this course helps to teach them what work is all about.

"In the classroom we are trying to stress business ethics, and teach students when they are working on a job to be seen and not heard", said Carroll. The program is not really limited

but school is the most important thing when looking for students, because if a student does not come to school regularly, he would not be regular on a job. Students must be 16 years old.

One boy is training to be an auto mechanic, three girls are studying to be restaurant managers, and one works as a clerk in a variety and drygoods store. Another boy is learning to be a meat cutter while there are several who are training to be farmers. Some of the girls are employed in the offices of nearby feedlots and one is employed at the bank.

Prior to becoming Industrial Cooperative Training coordinator Carroll worked in sales with Morrow-Thomas Hardware before the company closed, and recently returned to school to get his BBA degree in business administration at West Texas State University. He is now working on his master's degree

in education at WTSU. He took night courses and did most of his degree work at night.

Carroll was born in Lamesa, but resided in Amarillo since he was five. He is a graduate of Amarillo High School. He was a drill instructor two years in the U. S. Marines before returning to Amarillo to work for Pioneer Natural Gas Co. as pipe line inspector for six years. Then he operated his own insurance agency.

Carroll's wife, Betty is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Chambers of Amarillo. She teaches first grade in Southlawn Elementary School in Amarillo. The couple has two boys; Ted, 17, a senior in Amarillo High School, and Cliff, 13 a student at Fannin Junior High School. The family lives in Amarillo but plans to move to Hart later.

Carroll is a member of the First Baptist Church in Amarillo, a member of the Texas Business Teachers Association and Masonic Lodge 731 of Amarillo. He is the son of Mrs. Bernice Carroll of Amarillo.

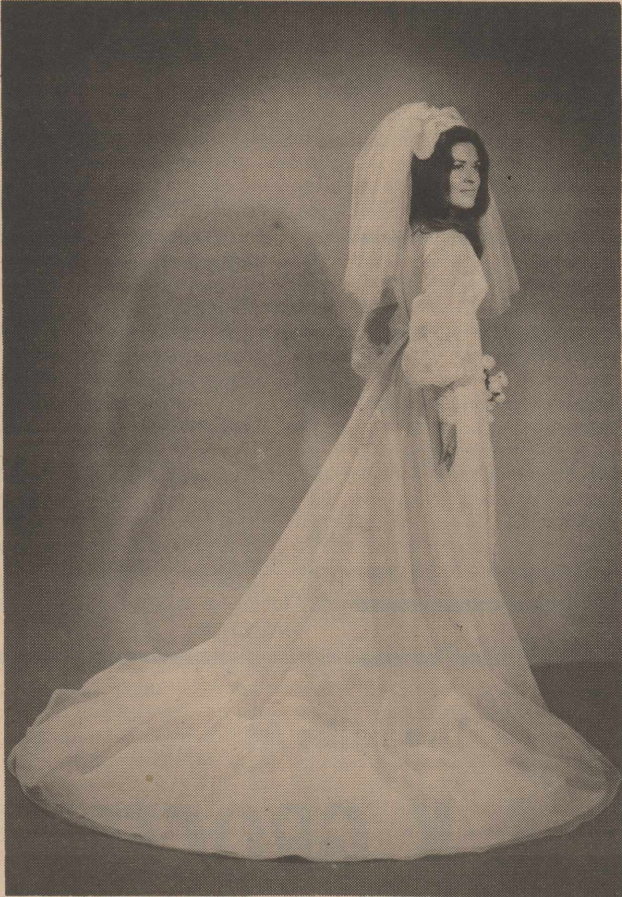

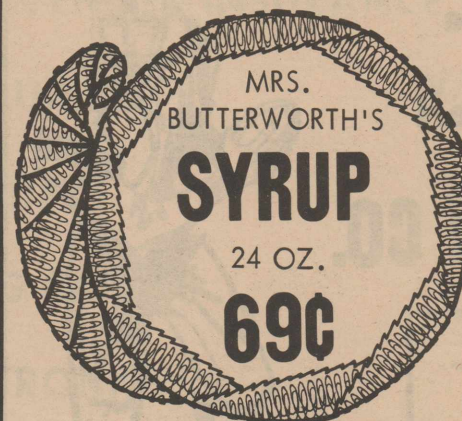

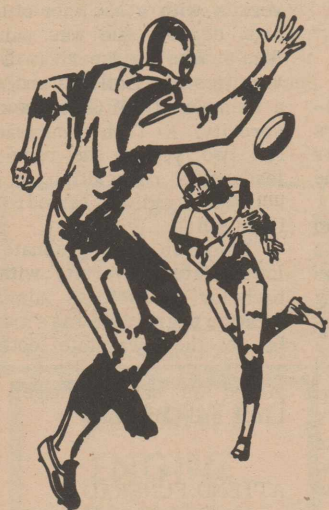

Horns Trample Bulldogs 44-6, Ready For District Tilt Friday

The Hart Longhorns whacked the Amherst Bulldogs 44-6 last Friday night in the last non-district game for the Horns. The Horns rode on 336 yards total offense and three touchdown passes by Dirk Rambo to defeat the Bulldogs. The Horns had 13 first downs compared to only five for the Bulldogs.

The Horns started off the game with a bang as Jimmy Brown took the opening kickoff and returned it for 52 yards. But after that the Horns seemed to bog down. But the Bulldogs could do no better and had to punt. The Horns then started rolling as Stanley Dyer raced 53 yards to the Amherst 12 yard line. From there Jimmy Brown took a pitchout from Dirk Rambo and scampered unmolested into the end zone. The try for the extra point was no good. This score came with a little over six minutes left in the first quarter. Then with only seconds left in the quarter, Dirk Rambo fired a pass to Guillermo Carrasco that carried for 42 yards and a touchdown. Again the extra points were no good and Hart had to be content with a 12-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

In the second period, things really got rolling with the offense scoring twice with the defense setting up both scores and adding another. The first score came after Stanley Dyer intercepted a Bulldog pass, Dirk Rambo hit Erasmo Castillo on a 16 yard scoring strike. The point after try was still amiss. Then only a minute later, Jimmy Brown intercepted another Amherst pass and raced 55 yards

The Horns really started moving in the third period as Jimmy Brown ran 50 yards for a touchdown with only seconds

gone in the quarter. The kick for extras was no good. Then the Amherst Bulldogs made their first move of the night as they moved the ball inside the Hart 20 yard line before the Horns were able to stop them. However, the next time the Horns were not so lucky as Doug Cummings lit up the board for Amherst with a 1 yard plunge after which the point try failed. The Horns retaliated though with a 1 yard run by Johnny Ethridge to cap off the scoring in the fourth quarter. The game ended moments later with Hart on the long end of a 44-6 score.

Jimmy Brown led the Horns offensively with 122 yards, followed by Stanley Dyer with 90 yards. Dyer led the Horns in for a score. The extra points again failed. Only four plays later the tough Hart defense again set up another score as they jumped on a fumbled punt try on the Bulldog 17 yard line. The Horns then took the ball and moved it to the Bulldog 6 where they faced a fourth down and four situation. But quarterback Dirk Rambo came through as he found Erasmo Castillo in the end zone for a score. After this the Horns made their only two-point conversion of the night, as Dirk Rambo passed to Guillermo Carrasco for the extra points. This gave the Hart Longhorns a 32-0 score at half-time.

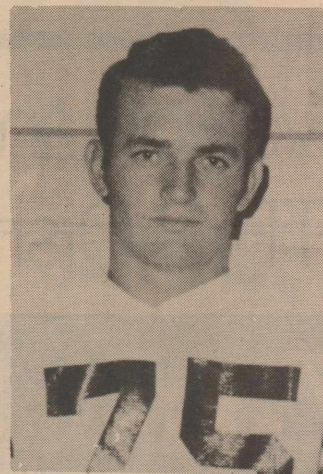
DUANE CLEVINGER - a sophomore, plays center. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Deryl Clevenger, Duane weighs 168 pounds.

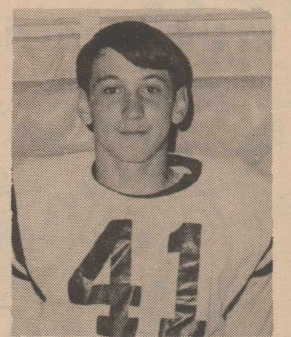
OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - Erasmo Castillo, caught two passes for TD's.

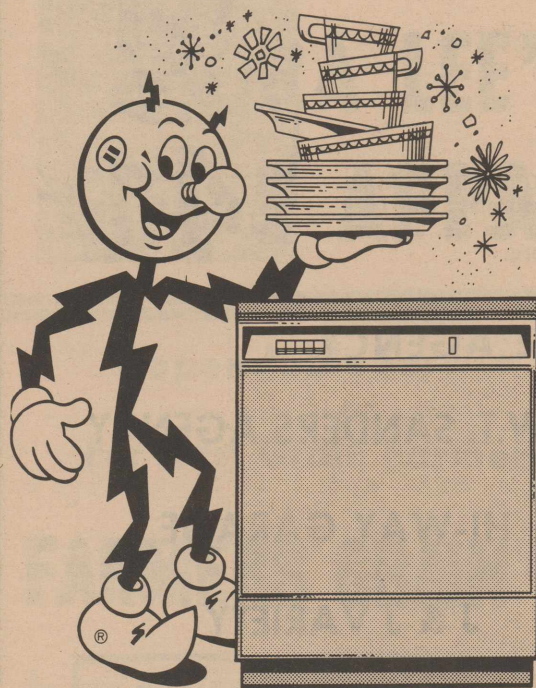

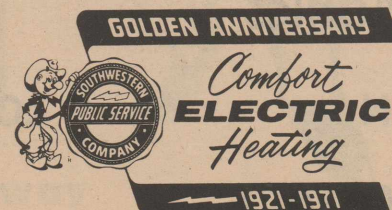

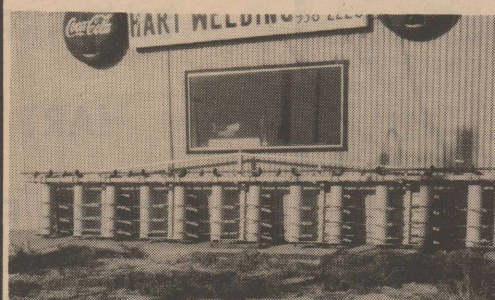
