Final Rites For Feaster

Funeral services for Luther Feaster, 85, were conducted Tuesday in Oak Street Baptist Church.

Feaster, a long time resident of Mitchell County, died Saturday in Root Valley Fair Lodge after a lengthy illness.

Rev. Don Timberlake, pastor, officiated in final rites. Burial was in Colorado City Cemetery under direction of Kiker and Son Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Hiram Mann, Elks Jones, Dr. W. K. Cowan, Delmer Lowe, Lester Biggs and Raymond Fuller.

Feaster was born in Edgefield County, S.C. November 13, 1884. He came to Texas as a small boy and to Mitchell County in 1901.

He was a retired farmer of Dunn Community and was a member of Dunn Baptist Church. He and the former Winnie Graham were married in Dunn on January 3, 1909.

Feaster is survived by his wife, two sons, Albert Feaster of Susanville, Calif., Lonnie Feaster of Vealmore, four daughters, Mrs. Bill Adams and Mrs. Bill Henderson, both of Colorado City, Mrs. Grady Lloyd of Monrovia, Calif., Mrs. Gordon Robertson of Orangevale, Calif., one brother, Claud Feaster of Mission, two sisters, Mrs. Ewell L. Smith and Mrs. Young Hammond, both of Colorado City, 30 grandchildren and 37 great grandchildren.

School Board Acts Quickly

McKee - 'A Natural For Job'

Losing a superintendent and acquiring another was practically a one-step action for Colorado Independent School District trustees.

As soon as they accepted the resignation of James G. McMath Tuesday and released him from his contract here to accept the superintendency of Brownwood public schools, they appointed Lloyd McKee in his place.

McKee, 40, who has served three years as assistant superintendent, took over the duties of superintendent immediately.

In fact, his two-year contract at a \$16,000 annual salary is dated from July 1.

The promotion for McKee came with unanimous vote of the board in a special noon meeting in Villa Inn Restaurant.

It was in this same meeting that the board accepted McMath's resignation—so he could begin duties in Brownwood at increased salary with a school system larger than Colorado City's which is beginning a \$3,300,000 building program.

"Promoting Lloyd McKee to succeed McMath appeared to the board as the best manner for continuing the advancement of our public school program," said Tom Rees, attorney and Colorado City school board president.

The board knows Lloyd is

familiar with our entire school program.

"He is knowledgeable with the plan and procedures instituted by McMath."

"We believe that McKee, by reason of these facts, is the person for the position," Rees continued. "That's why the board granted him a 2-year contract immediately."

W. J. (Dub) Waldrup, vice president of the board, presented the motion to hire McKee as superintendent. Second was by Jeff Taylor.

Remaining members of the board—Mrs. Kenneth Cowan, O. B. Trulock Jr., Ed Thrift, A. K. McCarley Jr. and Rees, all in attendance—voted to make the action unanimous.

The board expressed regret at the loss of McMath, who had been named to his new position late Monday night by the Brownwood school board.

McMath, superintendent here for four years, was selected from a field of 28 prospects at Brownwood. He will have a two-week vacation period before reporting there.

His successor here, McKee, has first-hand knowledge of every phase of Colorado City's public school system.

As assistant superintendent he has been director of curriculum for the school system, director of the highly appraisal

ed Adult Education Program, coordinator of federal aid which has provided critical financing for numerous areas of the education program.

In addition, McKee has worked with personnel and budget preparation.

McKee has been in the forefront of the planning and organizing of the self-evaluation study which will provide an in-depth evaluation of the Colorado City school program.

His work as federal aid coordinator has been instrumental in the application of securing a \$60,000 grant for a pilot program in bilingual education, beginning with the 1970 fall term.

In addition, as coordinator he

has been a principle force in keeping a high level of Title I, II, III funding for the schools. Through his work came the funds for Colorado High's data processing equipment, plus matching funds for innovative education subject matter.

The new superintendent also has been active in recruiting hiring and supervising teacher and administrative personnel.

A personable educator and administrator, McKee is a leader in First Christian Church and active in Lions and Chamber of Commerce.

"My interest is for the children and youth within our Colorado Independent School District," spoke McKee after his promotion.

"We are going to have the very best school system possible."

"I am especially pleased that we have such a fine group of teachers and administrators... who I am certain will continue in effective, dedicated job of teaching."

McKee and his wife, Joan, are parents of two children—Cynthia Ann, 16, and Lloyd Wayne, 11.

He came to Colorado City in 1968 from Odessa, where he was assistant principal of Odessa High School, summer principal of Permian High School.

Gardner To New Duties

Wallace Principle To Assist McKee

One of Lloyd McKee's first actions as school superintendent will be to trim administrative costs.

He plans to shift Wallace Principal Gary M. Gardner into the superintendent's office as administrative assistant.

The post of assistant superintendent, from which McKee moved up into the superinten-

dency Tuesday, will be discontinued.

At the same time, one principal's position will be eliminated from the school system's administration.

Instead of a separate principal for Wallace, which includes only the sixth grade, Hutchinson Principal Jerry Reynolds will be administrator for both Hutchinson and Wallace.

McKee said elimination of the Wallace principalship would be discussed with school board members before it is finalized.

However, he believes the move will be in keeping with the board's policy of economy without undermining educational progress.

Reynolds and Gardner are in that group of outstanding young administrators who have moved into posts as principals in the last few years.

Gardner as administrative assistant to Supt. McKee will take over the duties of coordinator of federal funds. This was formerly handled by McKee while he was assistant superintendent.

With the shift, McKee will add some of the duties he carried as assistant superintendent to his responsibilities as superintendent.

Gardner, whose wife Andria

was a fourth grade teacher during the last school year, has bachelor of science and master of education degrees from Abilene Christian College.

He was in Lubbock school system 1965-66 before being reading supervisor in Aspermont (1966-67) and Sonora (1967-69). He became Wallace principal here last fall.

Six new additions to the school system's teaching staff were approved Monday night by Colorado Independent School District board of trustees.

They are Mrs. Charles A. Gray, high school math and science, who is a graduate of Alabama College and has been a geophysical assistant programmer for an oil company in Midland. Her husband has been transferred here by Sun Oil Company.

Miss Rita Naredo, who is moving here from Abilene for the new bilingual program, after

graduating from Hardin-Simmons University.

Miss Margaret Mathis, choral director, who has bachelor of science degree from Southern Methodist University, master of arts degree at North Texas State University. She taught choral music the last two years in Brazosport secondary schools.

Miss Barbara Pollard first grade, a recent graduate of Sul Ross State University with practice teaching experience in Odessa public schools.

Mrs. F. E. Armijo, reading in Junior High. She is a graduate of University of New Mexico (Albuquerque) and her husband has moved here with Sun Oil Company.

Mrs. Roy Fish, kindergarten teacher in the new bilingual program. Her husband also with Sun Oil and she is a graduate of Texas A&I, who taught last year in Corpus Christi schools.

Hospital Makes Improvements

An addition to Root Memorial Hospital is now underway and plans for more improvements are in the offing.

The 30x35 feet addition under construction includes a private bath for adjoining patient room and an examination room plus storage area for equipment.

Fire proof construction, including a sprinkler system comparable to the rest of the hospital, is located between the dietary department and nurses quarters on east side of building.

Interior of the hospital is now being repainted and patient rooms are being completely redecorated, according to Charles Root, administrator for Colorado City Hospital District.

Sealed proposals are now being received by district for installation of an oxygen and vacuum pipeline system throughout the hospital, Root said.

An anonymous donor has pledged 50 per cent of the project cost estimated to be in neighborhood of \$10-\$15,000, Root said.

Bids will be received at the hospital, 1543 Chestnut Street, until 8 p.m. July 28.

Copies of plans and specifications and other proposal contract documents are on file in the administrator's office and are open for public inspection.

Loraine Doctors Join Staff Here

Two Loraine doctors have been approved as members of medical staff at Root Memorial Hospital.

Applications of Dr. Joe Terry and Dr. Bruce Johnson were approved unanimously in this week by both Root Memorial medical staff and governing board of Colorado City Hospital District.

The two doctors, although already considered members on staff here, will have the option of admitting patients to Johnson Hospital until Friday when the Loraine Hospital will be closed to Medicare benefits.

After that date operation at the hospital will be reduced as in-patients are dismissed and new patients will be admitted to Root Memorial.

The Loraine doctors will maintain clinic offices in front part of Johnson Hospital and services will be available any time day or night.

In announcing membership approval of the two doctors, Murrell Blassingame, chairman of Colorado City Hospital District board, said "Local doctors and members of the board are all pleased to have

the Loraine doctors on our medical staff. We sympathize with persons in the Loraine area over the loss of their hospital service, but we consider Dr. Johnson and Dr. Terry an asset to our hospital.

"We pledge the best possible service and care to all patients," Blassingame concluded.

Wilkinson, who transferred to highway patrol after two years in drivers' license department in San Antonio, joined local Highway Patrolman Jim Mauldin for his first day of service here Tuesday.

Appointment of the 23-year-old patrolman to this area fills a vacancy created by recent transfer of former patrolman Buddy Hertenberger to license and weight division.
