The new district is made up of Texas counties taken from the Amarillo district and the Oklahoma territory formerly a part of the Oklahoma district. District headquarters will be established in Perryton in the near future and a new building will be erected on a building which will be donated by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce. The people are pleased to have Rev. Fike returned to another year at least as pastor of the local church. Fike, during his short residence in Perryton, to be a very popular and efficient minister of the church. It is largely due to his efforts that the church has been able to get the cooperation of his congregation, that the new Methodist church has been completed. VOTERS WILL DECIDE ON TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLAR BOND ELECTION

PROPOSED AIRPORT SITE OF ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY ACRES JOINS CITY ON EAST; WOULD MAKE IDEAL PLANE LANDING FIELD

Next Saturday, November 22, is the day the voters of Perryton will go to the polls and decide whether the City of Perryton shall issue bonds to the amount of \$12,000 for the purchase and development of a municipal airport and landing field. The election will be held at the City Hall and will be in charge of Geo. M. Perry, presiding judge, and C. E. McLarty and Abe Green, judges.

This is a question of vital interest to every citizen of Perryton. Practically every town of any importance in this country either now has an established airport or is making preparations for the immediate acquiring of one and by far the greater part of these airports are municipally owned. The day of United States air mail is here at hand, and the towns that have standard landing fields are the ones that get this service. Mail planes don't land in cow pastures or wheat fields, neither do the passenger plane lines stop at towns which are not equipped with modern fields.

The land in question joins the city limits on the east and consists of one hundred and fifty acres and can be purchased by the city for the low sum of sixty dollars per acre, leaving \$3,000.00 to be used for improvements. It is but a question of a few years at the very most when Perryton will buy an airport, so why wait and pay double or treble the price for which it can be purchased today.

If you want to see Perryton go ahead and maintain the position as the best and most progressive city on the North Plains, then go to the polls and vote for these bonds. It is just another step forward to that goal as the metropolis of the North Plains. Modern schools, fine churches, city water, electric lights, paved streets, and other worthwhile improvements are what has made Perryton a leader among its neighbors. Of course they have cost money, but who would do without them, now that we have them.

VOICES

The head of a college of music has got into the newspapers by announcing that the pitch of American girls' voices is getting lower and attributing this to "yelling at football games and smoking cigarettes."

It is much more probable that the American type is changing through the admixture of races, and that the average American girl has a better muscular development than her grandmother had. Physical training rather than cigarettes would tend to enlarge the breathing passages which affect the pitch of the voice.

If the change which this teacher has noticed is general, so much the better. The high-pitched American female voice almost thrills, greates on sensitive ears. Women may admire sopranos, but most men prefer the deep-toned contralto voice.

JUNK

Nearly a year's experience with the plan, adopted by all of the large automobile makers, of offering a bonus to dealers for "junking" used cars, seems to have had a good effect, not only in stimulating the market for new cars but in removing dangerous vehicles from the roads.

Ford is paying \$20 for each hopeless Ford car delivered at the factory. Other makers allow from \$20 to \$40 to dealers for each car junked in the presence of responsible witnesses or factory representatives. The dealer has to find his own "graveyard" for the wreck, and that is a difficult problem in some localities. Almost every abandoned quarry and mine has been filled to the top with old cars. On some of the undeveloped streets in the suburbs of New York ancient automobiles virtually line the roadway on both sides.

There is a fortune waiting for the man who will discover a cheap and speedy way of reducing ancient cars to their original raw steel.

NOISE

Hiram P. Maxim, son of one great inventor and nephew of another, and himself the inventor of the gunman's pet, the Maxim silencer for firearms, has found a way, he tells the world, to keep noise out of the house even with the windows open.

The Principal use of such an invention will be, of course, in the large cities, where noise interferes not only with sleep but with the health of those who get no respite from it through the twenty-four hours. But everywhere there will be a demand for a silencer of this sort, for hospitals and rooms from which all external sounds must be excluded, as well as for places near railroads and other sources of noise.

TAXES

One of the things we are going to hear more about in the next two or three years is the proposal for a Federal Sales Tax on all merchandise or on a good many items. At present the Government levies a sales tax on automobiles, corporation stock sales and some other things. A few states have tried the sales tax as a means of raising revenue. The gasoline sales tax is in general use, in almost all of the states, as everybody knows. New York levies a tax on the sale of stock.

Advocates of the sales tax contend that it is the fairest of all forms of taxation, being based upon definite transactions in which money changes hands. Since the war many European countries have adopted it, and it ranks second only to the income tax as a revenue producer. Germany gets 15 per cent of her public funds from the sales tax. Belgium, France, Austria and Czechoslovakia somewhat more.

Whether our Federal Government ever tries it on a large scale or not, the effort to pass a sales bill is likely to be made in the next congress.

EINSTEIN

George Bernard Shaw, who has the clearest mind of any man in England introduced Professor Albert Einstein to a London audience the other night as "the man who has created a new universe." Eight men, each in his own time, had changed our conception of the universe, Shaw said. They are Pythagoras, Ptolemy, Kepler, Copernicus, Aristotle, Galileo, Newton and Einstein.

Each of those scientists gave the world a new conception of natural laws. Each in his turn proved that the others had been wrong, but each of them served the purpose of his times. Over a period of two thousand years man is gradually learning the truth about the world he lives in. A few hundred years from now some scientist, equipped with better measuring instruments than are available today, may prove that Einstein is wrong in his theory that a straight line is not the shortest distance between two points and that light travels in curves instead of in straight lines. But his theory will stand until somebody finds an unescapable fact which contradicts it.

That is the way scientific knowledge grows. Man probably will never know all the facts about the universe, but we are learning faster now than ever before.

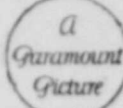

FARMERS' RIGHTS COMMITTEE
AUTHORIZED TO COMBAT
BOARD OF TRADE N
GRAIN FUTURES

The most forward step ever taken by any farm organization was taken at the board meeting of the Texas Wheat Growers Association at Amarillo on November 1, 1930, when they passed a resolution giving L. Gough and his associates full authority to take any action that they deem advisable against the Chicago Board of Trade and 'or' others, to stop the iniquity and injustice of the unlimited selling of so called grain and cotton futures and the criminal short selling of a few individuals which is destroying the value of our agricultural products and corrupting the nation as a whole.

The Board of Directors elected W. B. Dennison, Farnsworth, Texas, and M. D. Ramsey, Floydada, Texas, to work with the executive committee and L. Gough to raise sufficient funds and create public interest to obtain the desired results. The above named to be known as the Farmers' Rights Committee.

Many causes for the present depression has been advanced by many people. "When 'bears' raid the market, cutting the value of your property in half, they rob you as certainly and as unfairly as the thief who snatches your purse."

"When 'bulls' force prices to unreasonable heights and reap paper fortunes, they inspire covetous dreams and corrupt the people as they were corrupted by the great lobbies suppressed by law long ago."

Gamblers made hard times for us all in the midst of plenty and they will do it again and again until the people have the wit to stop them."

Mark 10:7-27
Rev. Samuel D. Price, D. D.
Here is a character in history from
whom valuable lessons can be learned
and yet his name is unknown to all.
Knowledge of this rich young ruler
persists because one day he
crossed the path of Jesus and was
identified with Him for a few minutes.

With bumptious pride this young
fellow who regarded himself as a
model man said "All these have I
kept from; my youth up." He claimed
that he had never wronged anyone.
There is no special credit in that
kind of a life. It is just being
ordinarily decent and each one
should be able to pass that kind of
an audit. That sort of clean living
is merely a healthy foundation on
which to build a worthy character.
Every one of us should avoid doing
the things which might get us behind
the bars.

This self centered man did not
reckon that he had any obligations
to help his neighbor in distress. This
great world of humanity as Jesus
told him to sell all that he had and
distribute the proceeds among the
worthy poor. Then he was to follow
with Jesus in general ministries.
He was not told to give up earning
more money in honest occupations,
for he had all of his former capacities
for work.

Lacking heart for others he spurned
the advice of Jesus, and the man
who might have been chosen to
take the place in the apostolic company
after the betrayal of Judas
"went away sorrowful." While Jesus
could not help him it was possible
to present great principles to the
company that witnessed the event.
To this audience that observed
the Lord said, as in the Golden
Text "If any man would come after
me, let him deny himself and take
up his cross daily, and follow me."

WORKING FOR IMPROVED TEXAS TURKEY MARKET

College Station—How to feed and
fit turkeys to meet the United
States grades which will be used
in buying and selling at many Tex-
as points this year is the object of
a series of one-day turkey schools
for farmers, inaugurated recently by
the A. and M. College Extension
Service through county and home
demonstration agents in coopera-
tion with local dealers and coopera-
tive associations. Beginning in
South Texas with Curoo as a start-
ing point, Paul A. Cunyus, assistant
Extension poultry husbandman, and
H. L. Shrader, Extension poultry-
man, United States Department of
Agriculture, are helping local Ex-
tension agents in drilling turkey
raisers in the essential points in the
new grading system outlined at the
recent Southwest Turkey Grading
School at San Angelo.

Farmers are told that because
turkeys wait until real cold weather
to put on fat and to mature their
feathers, it is very hard to produce
high grade Texas turkeys for the
Thanksgiving market. Lack of fin-
ish and excessive pin feathers cause
the early season Texas product to
sell at a disadvantage many times.
Furthermore, it is pointed out that
in seven out of ten years the Christ-
mas market is higher in price than
the Thanksgiving market, and that
half the time the January market is
equal to or better than the Christ-
mas market. Systematic feeding
and watering during several weeks
of cool weather prior to selling is
recommended to producers as a
means of making turkeys take the
prime or choice grades which top
the market.

Other important factors lowering
the grades of Texas turkeys are
careless handling, poor bleeding, and
late forced feeding. Farmers are
shown in these schools. Tying wings
or feet, loading in shallow coops, or
any kind of rough handling from
farm to market or in the dressing
plant will produce bruises which ma-
terially reduce the grade. Feed left
in the crop quickly sours and unless
the crop is carefully removed at the
dressing plant, the grade may be
lowered as much as two or three
cents per pound. Even if removed,
such turkeys cannot make the high-
est grade, prime. Other U. S. grades
are choice, medium and common, all
four grades being further qualified
by age and sex.

Auxiliary Member Drive

Mrs. O. H. Black is Chairman of
Membership Committee for
Legion Auxiliary

Service in the armed forces dur-
ing the World War by a member of
her immediate family is the only
basis upon which a woman can es-
tablish eligibility for membership
in the American Legion Auxiliary.
Mrs. O. H. Black, membership chair-
man of Pierce Johnson Unit of the
Auxiliary, declared in a statement
issued today to Auxiliary workers
engaged in enrolling the Unit's 1931
membership. Enrollment of a very
large per cent of the eligible women
in the city was predicted by Mrs.
Black.

"The right to belong to the A-
merican Legion Auxiliary is a privi-
lege purchased for the women of
their families by the men who serv-
ed in the World War," Mrs. Black
explained. "Naturally we value the
right very highly and guard it close-
ly. Every applicant for membership
must establish clear proof of eligi-
bility before her application can be
accepted. We make no exceptions
in the matter of eligibility and grant
no honorary memberships."

The following classes of women
are eligible to membership in the
Auxiliary according to Mrs. Black:
1. Wives, mothers, sisters and
daughters of members of the Ameri-
can Legion.
2. Wives, mothers, sisters and
daughters of men who lost their
lives in the war or who died since
discharge from war service.
3. Women who themselves were
regularly enlisted in the army or
navy during the war (army nurses
and navy "yeomanettes").

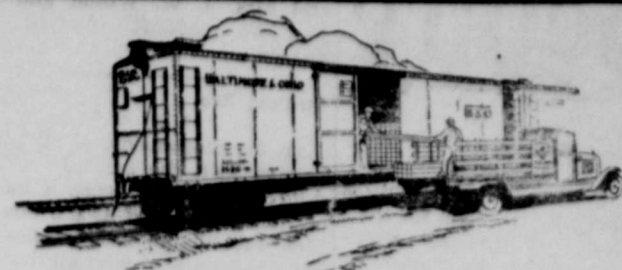

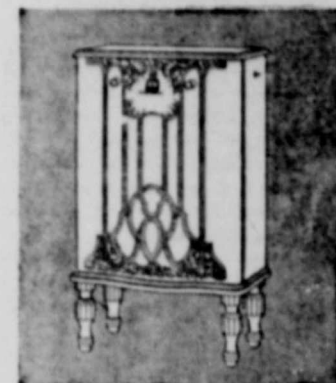
