PROPOSE BOARD TO STUDY U. S. PRO LAW

ANDREWS URGES THOROUGH STUDY OF ALL PHASES

ENFORCEMENT OF LAW SO FAR NOT CONSIDERED FAIR TEST

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—Creation of a commission to study the general prohibition question in all its aspects was proposed today by Assistant Secretary Andrews, of the treasury, in charge of dry law enforcement.

With both senate and house preparing to take steps to inquire into conditions under prohibition and with wet and dry organizations engaged in bitter controversy over it, Mr. Andrews declared he believed the time had come for a thorough study of the question in its economic, social and other phases.

Action Demanded

unwilling to make an estimate of the various effects of the law himself the secretary declared that if enforcement was to proceed with success some action must be taken to quiet the public mind.

In the six years since the eighteenth amendment to the constitution was adopted, no move of a similar nature has been made by authorized officials, although congress has been asked on numerous occasions by various groups to order such a procedure.

Mr. Andrews emphasized that it was his business to enforce law rather than judge its benefits or advantages, and suggested that the study be left to a committee to be appointed by the president which would have trained experts and wide inquisitorial powers. He thought the investigations being proposed in congress would be helpful but believed they would result ultimately in the recommendation for appointment of a general commission to be composed of men of high standing and which would be outside of the political field.

Not Considered Fair Test

Enforcement of the law so far, he said, has not been a fair test of the working of the prohibition and a fair test cannot be made until a judiciary and a police sufficient to carry out the law is available.

Again the continuous agitation against the law the assistant secretary said this was responsible for the social trend of drinking. He said he hoped for the time when hostesses would apologize for serving liquor rather than for serving it which later condition, he said, now exists to a more or less degree.

He added that if improvement or enforcement continues on its present basis time soon would come when the hostesses would apologize for the quality of the liquor at least.

FARM PROBLEMS GROW WORSE

NEW YORK, Mar. 1. (AP)—The national industrial conference board has completed an agricultural survey of the United States in which it finds that the farm profits are steadily declining, production is lagging in an inverse ratio to the growth of population and that the farmers' expenses rise faster than the prices he gets for his products.

"Farm exports show a distinct downward trend since 1900," the board reported, "while agricultural imports are increasing. The farmer's weakened position in meeting foreign competition is said to have resulted from a tendency of his expenses to rise more rapidly than the prices he receives for his products." The average annual farm return, it was pointed out, in the last five years, was \$600 after allowing a nominal return on capital invested, including food, fuel and shelter.

Watson Is Reported Slightly Improved

The condition of James E. Watson, who is ill at a local hospital, remains serious, although he was a little better Monday morning, according to reports at the hospital. He suffered several sinking spells Monday morning but seemed to rally from them better than he had several days ago. His fever is not running particularly high and the physicians feel that his lungs must be healing. He had had the influenza and pneumonia.

GOOD BUSINESS IS SEEN AHEAD

New Building Activity Record With Improved Agricultural Situation Noted

DALLAS, Mar. 1. (AP)—A record breaking volume of building activity and a marked improvement in the agricultural situation, were balanced by a high mortality in business enterprises, the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas announced today in its monthly review for this district.

Business failures were more numerous in January than for any month since December 1923 and the liabilities of the defuncting firms were substantially greater than in the previous month and the corresponding month of last year.

"Winter rains and snows left an excellent season in the ground that greatly benefited grain crops and ranges," said the report. "Since the re-appearance of fair weather small farmers have made good growth and farmers have progressed rapidly with the preparation of the soil for the 1926 crops."

"The favorable outlook in the agricultural and livestock industry is gradually strengthening the sentiment in the business community but actual results are not yet visible. The January distribution of merchandise at wholesale reflected a seasonal gain over December, but a considerable decline from a year ago."

"When considering the comparison with last year, however, it must be borne in mind that trade at that time was at a high level. Reports indicate that both consumers and retailers in the rural sections are making purchases on a conservative basis pending a clearer view of the future with special reference to the agricultural outlook. Department store trade on the other hand continued relatively large; sales of a reporting firm, slightly larger than of January 1925."

BIG RAIL LINES TALK OF MERGER

Frisco Seeks Authority To Have Officials Named On Rock Island Board

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—Questions involved in a possible consolidation of St. Louis, San Francisco, and the Chicago Rock Island and Pacific roads were discussed by officials of the former road today before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The hearing was on the specific question of giving officials of the St. Louis-San Francisco authority to hold similar offices in the Rock Island.

Edward N. Brown, director of the St. Louis-San Francisco, said formal application for authority to merge the two lines would not be submitted until the whole consolidation situation had been clarified by the commerce and a decision handed down in the Nickel Plate merger case.

"For some time past," he said, "we have been studying in the condition in the territory served by the Frisco railway and the surrounding country to determine with what other railway line this company could best be combined. In view of the highly competitive system already formed, it seemed so essential that the Frisco should have at least assurance of cooperation with another railroad, through which it could secure established outlets to the Gulf of Mexico, the Mexican frontier and the West."

The Rock Island, he said, appeared the best available candidate. Under an arrangement with the Frisco, Speyer and Company and J. and W. Seligman had purchased 275,000 shares of common stock of the Rock Island and on January 29, last, the executive of the Frisco authorized purchase from Speyer and Seligman of 183,333 shares out of this total.

FARMERS FACE BRIGHT FUTURE

Feeling Better Over Prospects Than In Several Years County Agent Says

There is the best feeling among Lubbock county farmers for a prosperous year ahead at the present time than there ever has been since he has been on the job, County Agent D. F. Eaton said today. According to Mr. Eaton the farmers of the county are making fine progress in the breaking and listing of their land and with diversification ideas gradually taking hold of the planters of a most pleasing agricultural year is in the offering.

Some of the farmers are nearly through with their breaking while others are making rapid strides, Mr. Eaton says. Upbuilding of dairy herds, the addition of good hogs and chickens is underway and in the end will spell greater profits for the man of the soil the agent believes.

The moisture situation in the county is, on the whole, pleasing, Mr. Eaton reports, although in some parts of the county it is a little dry at the present time. Spring and the planting season is setting in earlier this year than usual, he says, and by the time planting is in order there will probably be plenty of moisture in the ground.

There is very little more cotton to be picked and wherever it is found small grain is doing well. The bumper corn crop in the north and middle west is handicapping farmers in this territory who have maize to sell. This fact, however, is keeping the feed on the farm and will enable the farmer to feed his stock at a very low cost to him.

PARKER RAIL BILL PASSES HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—The Watson Parker bill to set up new agencies of settling railroad labor disputes was passed today by the house. The measure, which now goes to the senate, would provide for abolition of the railroad labor board.

Final action was taken after the house had defeated 292 to 16 a motion by Representative Blanton, Democrat, Texas, to send the bill back to the commerce committee with instructions to provide for enlarging the powers of an emergency board, which the measure provides as a last resort in settlement of disputes.

TEXAS NEGROES TO PAY SUPREME PENALTY, RULING

BLACKS WHO ADMIT THEY KILLED MOTOR COP TRIED TODAY

DALLAS, Mar. 1. (AP)—Sentences of death in the electric chair were imposed on S. A. and "Snap" Robinson, negro brothers who pleaded guilty in simultaneous trials here today for the murder of C. M. Isbell, a motorcycle policeman.

Only two minutes were required for a verdict in the S. A. Robinson case, while the trial of his brother was nearly as brief. There was no threat of violence.

The negroes were sentenced to be electrocuted early on the morning of April 2.

The two went to trial simultaneously in two crowded court rooms here today for the slaying of the Motorcycle Policeman, who was shot by occupants of a speeding automobile he tried to stop February 4. Pleas of guilty were entered. The negroes, S. A. and Forest "Snap" Robinson, claiming to be brothers, were returned here a few days ago from Missouri where they were captured after a flight through several states. Besides signing confessions to the Isbell killing, officers say, the negroes also admitted the fatal shooting of H. H. Delmas, railway special agent who tried to put them off a freight train at DeQueen, Ark., during their flight from Dallas.

District Judges Robertson and Tipton, presiding at the trials, warned the crowds against demonstrations of attempts at violence.

Six sheriff's deputies were stationed on guard in each court room. Selection of jurors was made from 250 veniremen summoned for each court.

JUDGE WOULD BAR TRIAL REPORTS

BAY ST. LOUIS, Mar. 1. (AP)—Although Circuit Judge Walter White announced that a cell in the Hancock county jail awaited any newspaper reporter who makes public any testimony or purported testimony in the trial this week of Jesse Faye, charged with murder, several newspaper representatives were preparing today to "cover" the hearing.

The judge Saturday directed an order prohibiting publication of details of the trial, making it clear that contempt proceedings would follow any infraction of the order, with a jail sentence as the penalty.

He announced that some newspapermen might set a "trap" in the trial, but if they did, "the court would get one too." He added that publication of "information or misinformation" concerning the case, would "defeat the ends of justice."

The newspapermen, however, said today they intended to write the news as they would have done had not the judge's order been issued.

The judge said news of the trial could be published after the court had censured it. One editor revealed that the vital portions of a story written for his weekly paper had been eliminated when submitted for court approval.

The ruling was causing quite a stir here, some citizens favoring and others disapproving it.

Faye is charged with the murder of William Minnow and J. H. McLeane, federal entomologists, whose bullet riddled bodies were found recently near Pecos, Miss. The trial will probably set under way Tuesday.

Menus for the Family

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, crisp whole wheat toast, creamed eggs on toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Macaroni with beef, brown bread, sliced oranges with grated coconut, milk, tea.

Dinner—Pork chops and apples in casserole, scalloped potatoes, buttered cauliflower, pear and cream cheese salad, sponge cake, floating island, graham bread, milk, coffee.

When purchasing macaroni remember that a good brand is essential. While the proper cooking of this paste-food is of utmost importance a poor brand won't lend itself to "proper cooking." If macaroni—properly cooked—splits and becomes sticky and tough the flour used in its manufacture was poor or else the paste was not carefully cured.

Macaroni With Beef

Two slices bacon, 1/2 pound round steak, 1 large onion, 2 cups boiling water, 1 cup macaroni broken in inch pieces, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 2 teaspoons dark brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon pepper.

Cut bacon into tiny pieces and fry out fat. Cut meat into half-inch dice and sear quickly in hot bacon fat. Stir with a fork and cook until meat is brown. Add boiling water, onion cut in thin slices, tomatoes, sugar and pepper and cover closely. Simmer over a low fire for two hours or until the meat is tender.

BEAUMONT, Texas, March 1. (AP)—Baseball talent from the proverbial four winds will converge here March 8 to open spring training of the Beaumont team of the Texas League. Bought from minor leagues of high and low degrees, the men who will constitute the 1926 exporters represent largely that primary asset—experience. For James Cato Galloway, upon whose shoulders rests responsibility for a new regime in local baseball, has bought just those men thought necessary to round out a team that will restore Beaumont's baseball faith, and Skipper Lim knows experience counts most, all else considered equal.

Taking a hand-ful of left-overs from 1925, Galloway started building less than two months ago. To date the roster shows four experienced catchers, six infielders, five outfielders and six experienced hurlers. Then there will be the customary clutter of highly recommended, from somewhere.

Galloway, always recognized as one of the leading first basemen of the league, will command his old position. At second base he expects to use Paddy Regan, a three eye leader, Ed Handley, from Denver, or possibly Tom Connolly, no stranger to the Texas League. Andy Woebe, leader of the third basemen in fielding last year, returns. And last, but likely most important, is Bernie De Viveros back to play short.

In the outfield one finds Red Ormond, back again, Guy Dunning, of St. Joseph, Yank Davis, from the South, Joe Robinson, of Omaha, and Bill McCabe from Seattle. There should be three good ones in that lot and all southpaw hitters of note. They should find the short fence attractive.

Catching honors will be contested by Claude Robertson, once with Dallas and later of Birmingham and Indianapolis, Ennis, of Los Angeles, Bozile of Danville, Lothes who comes back after voluntary retirement, fields out of the East Texas League and a rookie from California.

Billy Evans Says

THIRD BASE UMPIRE MAY BECOME THE WORTHY KEEPER OF RESIN BAG

Why the umpire at third base? That is the question invariably asked when some fan for the first time sees three umpires in charge of a ball game.

True, the umpire at third base does seem a lot of excess baggage, but there's a reason. Difficulty in getting competent men has resulted in this rather intensive, or perhaps you may prefer to call it, passive training.

The National League recently announced that it would carry 12 men think this is an excellent idea, even though it does seem that the man at third base should be provided with a ukelele to keep him busy during the afternoon.

President Johnson of the American League, originated the idea of schooling the recruit. Last season the American League had a staff of 11 men.

Major league presidents have discovered that when injury or illness forces a regular umpire out of the game, it is impossible to recruit an umpire from the minors and ask him to give satisfaction with a close fight for the pennant in progress.

Using a man at third, enables the recruit to learn much by observation and instruction, making him ready to step into any emergency and deliver. No doubt the scribes who have worried about ways and means to keep the umpire at third interested, will suggest that he made worthy keeper of the resin bag.

ALEXANDER TALKS

I was rather interested in reading what Grover Cleveland Alexander of the Chicago Cubs had to say the other day relative to the use of the resin. Alexander is one of the greatest pitchers the game has ever known.

Like all great pitchers, throughout his career, he has been long on control. Batters must earn their way to first base with Alexander pitching.

"Nothing doing on the resin for me," says Alexander. "I have been pretty successful using natural methods to fool the batter and I am going to continue along those lines."

"Last year several of our pitchers rubbed resin on their hands between innings, insisting it helped them get more stuff on the ball. Being curious I tried it but the result was most disappointing."

"Instead of helping control on hot days I am sure it will retard that feature. Resin has a tendency to make my hands sticky and hand-capped rather than helped me. So I intend to go along the same old way."

I am inclined to string with Alexander. Resin in the spring and fall will enable the pitchers to get more stuff on the ball, largely through trickery, but in the real warm weather is certain to handicap control.

RULE DIFFERENCE
There is nothing unusual about the American League placing the ban

on resin. For years both leagues have had at least a half dozen league rules governing their games that have been at variance with the strict interpretation of the rules.

There was a striking illustration of this condition when both leagues used the Polo Grounds in New York. The distance from the home plate to the grandstand is much less than 90 feet.

The rule says the batter-runner is entitled to an extra base if the ball touches any fence or building less than 90 feet from the home plate.

In the American League games any such a happening made the ball dead and baserunners could advance only one base. In the National League, the base runner was entitled to the extra base but could advance more at his peril.

Thus the two leagues differed widely. In world series games two separate rulings were necessary.

The American League is placing a ban on the resin bag, simply to refuse to conform to a rule that it believes savors of trickery. The rule is not compulsory, merely optional.

MEXICO TO ASK MONEY ON DEATH

Death of Mexican General To
Be Subject of Request
For Cash for Widow

(By The Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, Mar. 1.—A dispatch from Mexico to La Prensa, Spanish language paper published here, says that a claim will be filed against the United States for the death of General Felix U. Gomez, killed in 1914 in a fight between Mexican and American troops at Carrizal.

The dispatch adds that Mrs. Refugio P. Gomez, the general's widow has been called to the capitol from her home in Palacios, state of Coahuila, by Aaron Serna, minister of foreign relations, to sign the claim, the amount of which will be determined upon her arrival.

Is Known As Hero
The Mexican report of Gomez's death was that he was killed while returning from a truce with officers of Pershing's punitive expedition. He is known in Mexico as "the hero of Carrizal."

General Gomez was in command of the Mexican troops in Carrizal when a troop of the ninth Cavalry, (negro), reached there. The Americans reported they were ambushed by several thousand Mexicans under command of Gomez, who was acting under order of General Jacinto B. Trevino, commander of troops in Chihuahua.

In the clash several of the American troops were killed, including one officer. Several others were captured, followed the Wilson ultimatum giving President Carranza 24 hours which to deliver the captives to Brigadier General George Bell in El Paso. Thirty seven men were brought to El Paso before the time limit expired and turned over to General Bell.

LAYMAN THANKED BY TAFT FOR SERVICES

CHICAGO, Mar. 1. (AP)—A chief justice of the United States has written thanking a layman, unlettered in the law and unknown to many lawyers, for his service to the courts.

The letter, made public today, was from William Howard Taft to Charles F. Ruggles, Manistee, Mich., timber and salt king, with large interests on the Pacific Coast. The chief justice congratulated Mr. Ruggles on having made possible the application of business principles to courts.

Mr. Ruggles also was lauded by Chief Justice Harry Olson of the Chicago Municipal Court, who said "no individual has contributed more to a court reform in the last fifty years than Mr. Ruggles."

Judge Olson had received a letter from Elihu Root similar to that from Chief Justice Taft, which he forwarded to Mr. Ruggles. Appended was a declaration by officers and directors of the American Judicature Society, of which Judge Olson is chairman, which disclosed additionally that Mr. Ruggles founded the society and has financed it since its inception in 1912.

Mr. Ruggles' chief purpose in sponsoring the society was to eliminate the delays of the law.

"In maintaining the equality between the rich and the poor in the court," said the Taft letter in part, "the greatest difficulty is the delay. A rich man can stand the delay and profits by it, but the poor man always suffers."

"A judicial force of judges ought to be under the executive direction of somebody, so that the number of judges needed to meet the arrears of business at a particular place should be under the control of one who knows what the need is. They have worked out this plan in the city of Chicago, where Chief Justice Olson, as chief justice of the Municipal court, assigns the judges of that court to the work that is most pressing. In other words, we ought to apply business principles to the use of our judicial force."

"It is along these lines as I understand that the American Judicature Society is working, and I write to congratulate you on your having made this possible. You could do NO more important work for the body social and political than this. As one in the community I write to thank you."

Besides doing directly many admirable things, wrote Elihu Root, the Judicature Society has served as a model for a vast amount of research.

In 1912, Mr. Ruggles employed a Manistee editor, Herbert Harley, to investigate the courts of the country. Through Mr. Harley he discovered in Judge Olson a judge who kept books on his court. Impressed by the Chicago system of records, audits, organization and procedure, he organized the American Judicature Society and asked Judge Olson to head it. Mr. Harley remained in Chicago as secretary of the society.

Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, has agreed to finance the Judicature Society when Mr. Ruggles' appropriation shall have been exhausted.

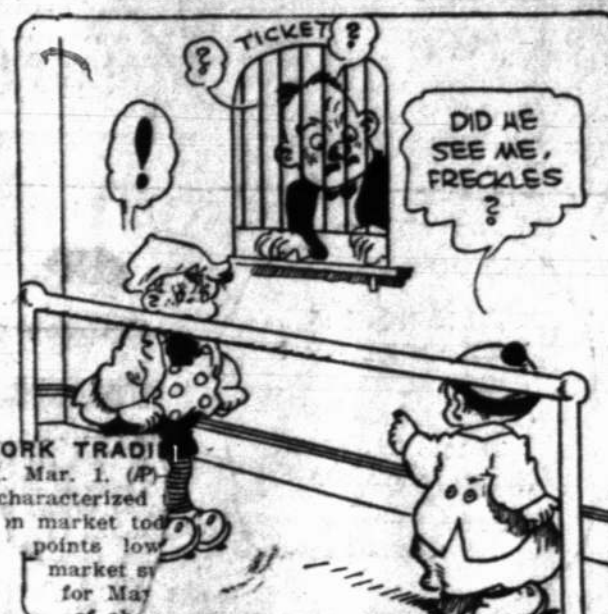
HOUSTON MAN WILL BE BURIED TODAY

NEW YORK REPORT

NEW YORK, Mar. 1. (P)—Banking interests today came to the aid of stock market pools whose financial condition was weakened by the sensational collapse of a few special stocks last Saturday.

Marshall Smith, who was credited with having directed the pool operation in Foundation Company and New York Canners, which broke 29 and 11 1-4 points respectively, announced that his holdings of those stocks had been taken over by a banking group. The first sale of Foundation Company this morning was a block of 15,000 shares at 128, as against a close of 128 on Saturday, but the stock was quoted minus the 2 percent quarterly dividend, making the opening quotation half a point net lower. It later rallied to 128.

New York Canners rallied 5 points to 44.

Samuel Gilman, attorney, also announced that a group of bankers and shareholders of the American Brake Shoe and Foundry Company, the stock of which broke 35 points on Saturday, has acquired a block of the stock from a group which had been operating on the long side in the issue. The stock opened 7 points higher at 111.

Selling pressure was directed, however, against other specialties in which pools have been operating, Combustion Engineering, Coca Cola, Fox Film and United Drug being hammered down 4 to 7 points, most of them to new low prices for the year.

Strong buying support was apparent, however, for high grade rails and industrials. General Electric rallied six points and P. S. Steel common, American Smelting, Pan-American, B. Hudson Motors, Mack Trucks, Stewart Warner Speedometer and National Biscuit were bid up 1 to 2 points in the early trading.

WALL STREET REPORT

NEW YORK, Mar. 1. (P)—With the stock market's technical position improved somewhat by last week's drastic declines, supporting orders were effective in starting rallies of one to six points among high priced specialties as trading was resumed today.

American Brake Shoe recovered six points, General Electric 5, and gains of 3 1/2 points were registered by Dupont, Mack Trucks, U. S. East Iron Pipe and American Can.

Forced liquidation of other industrial holdings had been under pool exploitation gave a regular appearance to the market. International Combustion Engineering and Coca Cola reacted 5 to 7 points to new low levels for the year and Texas Gulf Sulphur fell back 2 points.

Nieto was the last of three arrested and held in San Antonio under capias based on the indictment. R. Esperanza Martinez and General Francisco Coss have been released.

All of Nieto's bonds were signed by El Paso friends.

Aged Professor Dies In Nacogdoches Home

NACOGDOCHES, Texas, Mar. 1. (AP)—Professor George M. Hale, 75, dropped dead in his home four miles east of here today. He was winding up his fiftieth year teaching in the rural schools of this county and has to his credit the instruction of more than 1,000 of the leaders of East Texas in all walks of life.

He is survived by his wife and 12 children.

Well Known Lawyer Dies At Age of 95

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Mar. 1. (AP)—William W. Cropp died last night at the age of 95 years. Among the many famous cases in which he was engaged during his career as a lawyer was the preparation and collection of the "Alabama claims," arising out of the destruction of many New Bedford ships during the Civil War by the Confederate cruiser Alabama. He was prominent in the development of cotton manufacturing in New Bedford.

LOUISIANA TAX UPHeld

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—The Louisiana tax upon corporations doing business in, but not domiciled in that state, was sustained today by the supreme court. It had been attacked by the General American Tank Car and other corporations.

LAW WILL BE BIG FACTOR IN LAND SQUABBLE

NEW YORK, Mar. 1. (AP)—The Mexican alien land and petroleum laws forecast a struggle for the vindication of international law. Guy Stevens, director of the Association of Producers of Petroleum in Mexico, said in an address before the foreign policy association.

He quoted legal precedent in support of his contention that the laws were confiscatory.

He pointed out that a large part of oil properties lie within the zones where alien ownership is prohibited and that owners of mineral concessions must renounce their rights under international law.

Mr. Stevens said that no oil or land rights obtained prior to 1917 were obtained through government concession, but through purchase of land from former owners. He said this gave the alien owners, including oil companies, vested rights which international law would uphold, but which Mexico, under the constitution of 1917 has sought to abrogate.

Mexico has not yet endeavored to enforce these laws and he asserted that it had been indicated that they might not be enforced to the letter, but under any circumstances the situation should be clarified so that no precedent should be set whereby the recognition of vested rights under international usage might be denied.

MEXICANS SEARCH FOR HEALTH BUT DIE

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico, Mar. 1. (AP)—Two of the many thousands of afflicted persons flocking here recently to the graveyard camp of four Indian "divine healers," never will learn the potency of the ministrations they received. The pair, a father and son, were drowned when they attempted to swim the Rio Grande to evade American immigration authorities, who had refused to let them return to the Texas side.

The authorities said Pilar Coronado, 50, and his son Macario, 20, whose badly decomposed bodies have been recovered, would not reveal the nature of the illness for which they sought healing, and therefore were refused re-admittance to Laredo, Texas, their home.

The two men crossed to Nuevo Laredo last Saturday to consult the healers. On February 25, they bought tickets to the American side of the river, but were denied passage. Determined to get back to their home, the Coronados went upstream and plunged into the fatal current.

Both bodies were buried on the Mexican side because of their advanced stage of decomposition.

After attracting hordes of ill, suffering and maimed to their camp, the long-haired Indians had returned to the interior of Mexico. Many of the patients treated are said to have reported cures, although no authentic instance was recorded.

DISASTER NOT TO HALT AIRSHIP BUILDING

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. (AP)—The house naval committee is convinced that the Shenandoah disaster should not halt the progress of airship development. The report in part said:

"The utility of disasters is in what they teach.

"Out of the welter of charges and insinuations which have characterized, so unfortunately, the inquiry into the Shenandoah crash, it begins to appear that that catastrophe teaches us no lesson that airships are impossible.

"The construction of two airships, each three times the size of the Shenandoah, included in the program, will go far toward building up in this country an air industry.

"The committee does not feel that the crash of September, terrible as it was, should discourage further experiments with airship navigation. All the world's accomplishments that are of any value have cost money and lives. Money and lives are wasted if the work is abandoned."

WESTERN UNION'S MEXICO ENTRY ARRANGED

SAN ANTONIO, Mar. 1. (AP)—Introduction into Mexico of modern telegraph service such as now exists between states of this country, will begin in the near future, if a contract negotiated by J. C. Willever, vice president of the Western Union Telegraph Company, with the Mexican government, is approved by President Calles, of that country; according to a message received from Superintendent Mohr of this district, of Dallas.

The telegraph service extension to Mexico would include international traffic of night letters, day letters, night messages and money order service with regular tariffs to be adjusted, based upon zones and distances, while a flat rate of two cents per word would be charged for press dispatches. This service, telegraphically, would bring Mexico City as close to New York as Chicago or Boston.
