Scrap Drive To Start Here Next Monday Morning

The United States Army which launches its 10-county area scrap drive last Monday in precinct one, will arrive in Burk Burnett next Monday with army trucks.

These trucks will visit every farm, ranch and oil lease in Precinct two during the next week. The preliminary work included sending out letters from Sheppard Field to every rural address in this precinct and by announcement in the city and rural schools.

After Burk Burnett's precinct has been canvassed, Iowa Park and Electra precinct will follow in order.

This campaign is expected to last through most of the summer. The scrap will be collected, broken up and shipped by the army and the scrap collected will represent going to the making of guns and ammunition for our fighting forces and some of it will go into new farm implements and other necessities for the winning of the war.

Two Soldiers Arrested For Burk Robbery

Batteries and Radios Taken From Logan Electric Co.

Working on the theory that those who need a good battery probably also want one, Police Chief W. M. Green and Deputy Sheriff Jim Turner of this city arrested in Wichita Falls Wednesday two Sheppard Field soldiers in connection with the alleged theft of two new auto batteries and six used radios from Casey Logan's Electric Service Shop Tuesday night.

When it was discovered Wednesday morning that the Burk Burnett shop had been entered and robbed, officers recalled that on Tuesday night two soldiers were having battery trouble with a 1938 Buick in that city. They were pushing the car in an effort to start it. Its license number had been taken.

Wednesday the two officers launched a search for that number. The car was found in a garage in Wichita Falls—with a new battery in the cradle. Four of the missing radios were found in the car. It was stated by the district attorney's office that the two prisoners, held Wednesday in the county jail would be turned over to military police here for government prosecution.

Southwestern Life Buys War Bonds Through Local Agent

B. H. Alexander, local representative of the Southwestern Life Insurance Co., received a check this week for \$7,500 from the company authorizing him to buy that amount in war bonds in connection with Burk's quota.

R. W. Archer, director of publicity, also announced that the company is purchasing \$9,000,000 of United States Bonds in the Second War Loan Campaign. Since Pearl Harbor, the company has purchased more than \$24,000,000 of United States Government Securities.

Interest In 1944

No matter what—interest in the 1944 presidential elec-
tion keeps beckoning even in the midst of the serious busi-
ness of winning a war and establishing a world order. With
the prediction that President Roosevelt will be elected for a
fourth term, comes many predictions concerning the war's
end. Military spokesmen believe that 1944 and 1945 hold
the crisis for the present conflict. If this be true, then
politically speaking, the president might warrant another
presidential victory because of the national emergency that
would exist. More optimistic people predict the end of the
war by early 1944 and if this should be true, the president
would still have a reason for accepting a fourth term. It
would only be just (politically) to give a president, who
has seen a battle, through the privilege of readjustment
after the conflict. So either way, the argument remains
politically the same whether the war has ended or just end-
ing in 1944.

But the next few months are bound to change rapidly.
The Casablanca conference has yet to show distinct re-
sults and at present congressional reaction to bureaucracy
is changing American minds. Vice-president Wallace is
becoming unpopular as well as McNutt and Nelson. Near
isolationists are sowing seeds of doubt and discordant ele-
ments are being dropped here and there by rising Republi-
cans. The most regrettable thing though, is the fact that we
must hold the presidential election in 1944 regardless.

Politics is sure to capitalize either way at the expense
of American resources and lives, and this is distressing to
true American policies. No matter what—politics is sure
to be the main forceful operation (outside of the war) in
the next twenty months.

Horse Sense

If John L. Lewis wins \$2 a day pay increase for his
miners, he will lose it. He will start an inflationary spiral
in which the increased wage will be worth less in buying
power than the present wage. He will release a torrent
capable of sweeping wage floors and price ceilings into
chaos. He may strike blows heavy enough to crush the
Axis.

The Lewis miners get a base pay of from \$6.00 to \$8.60
a day for a 35-hour week, says the Journal, and the way
for them to get more income "is to work more and produce
more."

"Regulatory" Army Needs Training

If it were not tragic it would be humorous to see how
all at once the powers-that-be in Washington have awak-
ened to the fact that farming is an essential industry.

Those who are writing the regulations for farmers
should have more practical knowledge of the sources of
food supplies than is furnished by Washington restaur-
ants.

Leading dairy organizations have long pointed out
what was going to happen to our milk, cheese and butter
supply. Maybe if a few of the white-collar boys in Wash-
ington had had to shovel manure and milk cows for three
months as training for their regulatory jobs, there would
be more dairy products today.

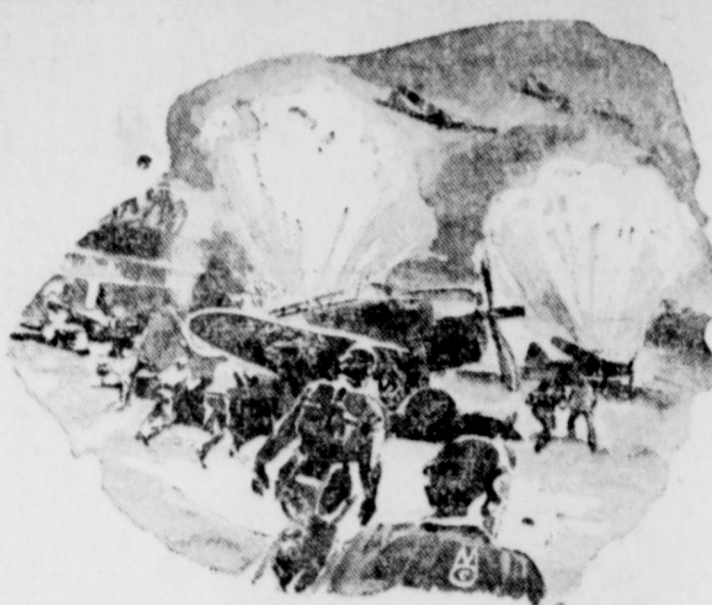

PETER AND JOHN IN GETHESEMANE

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 26:36-46;
John 12:13-15.
GOLDEN TEXT—Watch and pray, that
ye enter not into temptation.—Matthew
26:41.

The morning of that great day
when atonement was made for the
sins of all the world was nearly at
hand. In the darkness of the night,
following the institution of the Lord's
Supper, and the words and prayer of
our Lord (John 15-17), He and His
disciples came to the Garden of
Gethsemane. Taking three of His
disciples He went deeper into the
shadows to pour out before the Fa-
ther His soul, "exceeding sorrowful
even unto death."

It is a sacred scene, and we feel
a sense of awe and reverence as
we approach it, feeling that we too
would prefer to tarry outside the
garden, did we not feel that we
should try to understand a little bet-
ter what took place that night.

We are especially concerned with
Peter and John, who with James
shared our Lord's sorrow up to a
point, and then so sadly failed Him.

We note that they had a

I. High Privilege (Matt. 26:36-38).

To be asked by Christ to stand by
in this crucial hour was to be en-
trusted with one of the greatest
privileges a man could ever know.
As there swept over His holy soul
a great tidal wave of sorrow unto
death, He wanted and needed their
fellowship. As Dr. Maclaren puts it,
He "grazed the very edge" of hu-
man endurance. "Out of the dark-
ness He reaches a hand to feel the
grasp of a friend, and piteously asks
these humble lovers to stay beside
Him; not that they could help Him
bear the weight, but that their pres-
ence had some solace in it. His ag-
ony . . . they could not bear with
Him, but they could watch with
Him, and that poor comfort is all He
asked."

Undoubtedly they intended to do
it. Jesus bore witness that their
spirit was willing (v. 41), but in spite
of that, and all the boasting of Pe-
ter at the table that he would never
desert Him, they failed Him in His
hour of need. (vv. 39-46).

Our Lord's prayer showed great
faith in God the Father, the terrific
recoil of His soul against being
blackened with the burden of sin,
and a complete surrender to the Fa-
ther's will. Here was true denial of
self and submission to God, but it
was nonetheless an appalling expe-
rience for our sinless Lord. So He
went back for fellowship with His
three trusted friends—and they were
asleep.

Jesus recognized that the weak-
ness of the flesh caused them to for-
get and slumber. We may profit by
a little closer scrutiny of the scene.
Was it just a physical tiredness?
That doubtless entered in, but was
not Jesus even more tired than they
could possibly be? Was it not rather
the weakness of indifference? They
did not yet fully believe that their
Lord was about to die. That was
why they were quickly scattered in
unbelief when He did die. This mat-
ter was not so serious in their sight,
so it was not difficult to yield to the
tired body and the deep, quiet dark-
ness, and fall asleep.

We are in much the same posi-
tion. Danger—grave, spiritual dan-
ger—threatens our souls, our fami-
lies, our nation. We who call our-
selves Christians have declared our
readiness to stay awake and alert.
But we have become at home in this
world; the enemy soothes us with
the assurance that all is well, time
goes on and nothing too seri-
ous happens. So, we go to sleep
right in the midst of danger, and
sleep on even though the Master
awakens us again and again.

But now the scene changes. The
mob has come to take Christ, and
then the sleepy Peter, now much
awake, indulges in

III. Foolish Courage (John 18:10-12).

The act of Peter was courageous,
even to the point of recklessness.
What chance had he against a great
armed multitude? It was the natural
impulse of a loving heart, but it was
misguided and foolish.

What did he think to accomplish—
to deliver Jesus from those who
would crucify Him? That would have
meant no death on the cross and no
redemption. The hour for the offer-

ing up of the Son of Man as Saviour
had come. Peter might have learned
that with our Lord in the garden,
but then he was asleep. Christ who
had hitherto walked right through
the crowd of enemies (Luke 4:30),
now submitted. In the dark hours
of the night He had been prepared to
drink this bitter cup (v. 11).

We need to learn from this expe-
rience of Peter's lest we make the
same mistake. There are all too
many in the Church who are asleep
as far as their spiritual struggles and
opportunities are concerned, who
are eager to wield a reckless sword
in outward conflict. In their folly
and ignorance they do more harm
than good, and yet they think they
are working for Christ.

In Riding a Bicycle, We Balance With Our Ears

The transportation restrictions
have sent many thousands of peo-
ple back to the bicycle. Some of
us had not ridden a bicycle for
years, but the art of balancing on
two wheels came back to us easily
enough.

Now, why don't we fall over?
The tires on the bicycle are a
semi-circular pattern, you will
have noticed, and when you come
to think about it they do look pretty
peculiar. In fact, it is obvious
that you are going to hold them
up, not they hold you.

The truth is that we balance our
bicycles with our ears. It is all
part of our normal make-up, this
balancing act, and we commence
putting it into operation as soon
as we begin to walk.

The ear is divided into three
parts: the outer ear, the middle
ear, and the inner ear. Our bal-
ancing mechanism is contained in
the inner ear. There we have two
tiny canals filled with liquid. We
might almost call them "fluid lev-
els," for they function in much the
same way. When the liquid is
moved by the sway of the head it
touches tiny hairs which convey to
the brain the message that we are
overbalancing.

Notice how a tight-rope walker
keeps his head perfectly still. Al-
though he may not know it, he is
listening carefully to the message
from the delicate mechanism of
his inner ear.

STOCKINGS SALVAGED

Since the beginning of the stocking salvage campaign three months ago, 12,522,540 pairs of silk and nylon stockings have been salvaged by the women of America for war use. In the third month period, which ended February 15, 253,969 pounds of hosiery were collected in stocking salvage depots of thousands of retail stores. This is an increase of 861.4 per cent over the first months collection figure, bringing the total up to 626,127 pounds.

GARDEN HINTS

How are your radishes coming? How much garden space do you have?

These are questions on every lip in America today. For the Victory Garden idea is sweeping the country. Everywhere you see plowed-up corner lots, neatly bedded gardens, and busy seed stores. Yes, it's garden time—Victory Garden time.

This year there will be millions of inexperienced gardeners putting around the back yard. And there had better be, for our Government tells us that the United States of America must grow 20,000,000 Victory Gardens if we are to have enough to eat.

So the question arises as to how to make a good, practical, successful Victory Garden. Here are some of the expert's suggestions:

In the first place, there should be a plan, and even before that, a determination to stick it out, come what may, for vegetable gardening is not easy, and it is not too inexpensive unless you make a business of holding down expense.

Probably Question No. 1 to be answered is where to have the garden. Vegetables need lots of sun. The ground should be high enough for good drainage. Preferably, vegetables should be grown by themselves, away from flower beds. If you have back yard space or a vacant lot next door, the location problem is answered for you. If you have no sufficient location available, better consider taking up some of the lawn. Lawns are beautiful, and we work hard to perfect them, but in a time like the present we cannot subsist on them. It may be that our Victory Garden will mean subsistence if food limitations become severe.

After you have your garden plot located, include plans for laying out your rows north and south, ditch for drainage, and arrange your footpaths so you can easily reach all your vegetables. Plant nothing that your family doesn't like to eat; and if the space is small, stick to vegetables with the highest nutrition values, such as tomatoes, spinach, beans, lettuce, onions. And one more thought for the planting—plant your tall crops like corn and okra, and climbing vegetables, so that they will not shade the low crops. And remember we have some high winds here in the South and Southwest—wind protection is important.

Now, as to the soil, which again is a matter for experts. If the soil in your garden plot is good, you are fortunate. If not, there are some things you can do for it that will help.

First, plow or spade it thoroughly down to the subsoil, but not into it.

Second, see that it is well drained by providing the proper ditching.

Third, see that the soil particles are thoroughly broken up by careful chopping and raking to pulverize the clods, and separate the grass and turf from the beds. The next step is to establish the rows. Roughly, these rows should be set two feet apart, although some small vegetables, such as carrots, beets, radishes, can be planted in double rows. After the rows are located, beds should be made by trimming down the rows so that they are approximately a foot wide at the base, tapering up to a round top, four to six inches high.

If you like to be neat and wish to be proud of your garden—lay your rows out straight.

The next step is fertilization of the soil. Many fertilizers are restricted now and are difficult to get. In treating the soil, it is suggested that you determine whether it is acid or alkaline, as that will influence the type of fertilizer to be used. It is wise to put some fertilizer along the rows shortly before planting, and the rest along the sides of the rows after the young plants have grown some. The question of how much fertilizer to use can often be answered by local gardeners or experts, or your seed store. A maximum is about one pound per 30-foot row—no more than that should be used.

For applying fertilizer before planting, it should be mixed deeply into the soil with a hoe or rake. After plants have grown, fertilizer should be applied in a shallow trench alongside the plants.

Preparing and working the ground at the start of the Victory Garden is more than half the battle. That is the hardest work you will encounter. It is safe to say that those who have the gumption to stick it through the hard labor of breaking and working the soil are likely to make the best gardeners, provided they stay on the job after the garden begins to grow.

Planting, growing, and caring for the garden will be the subject of the next article in this series. Watch for it at an early issue.
