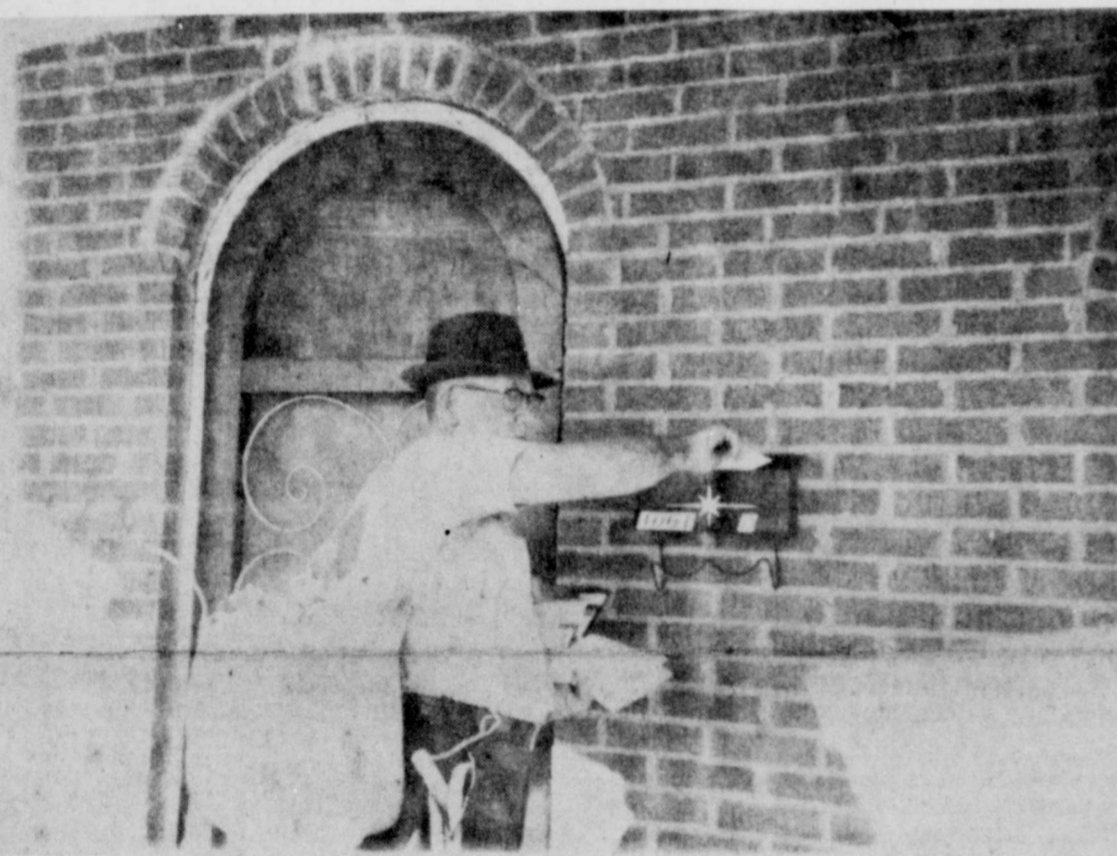
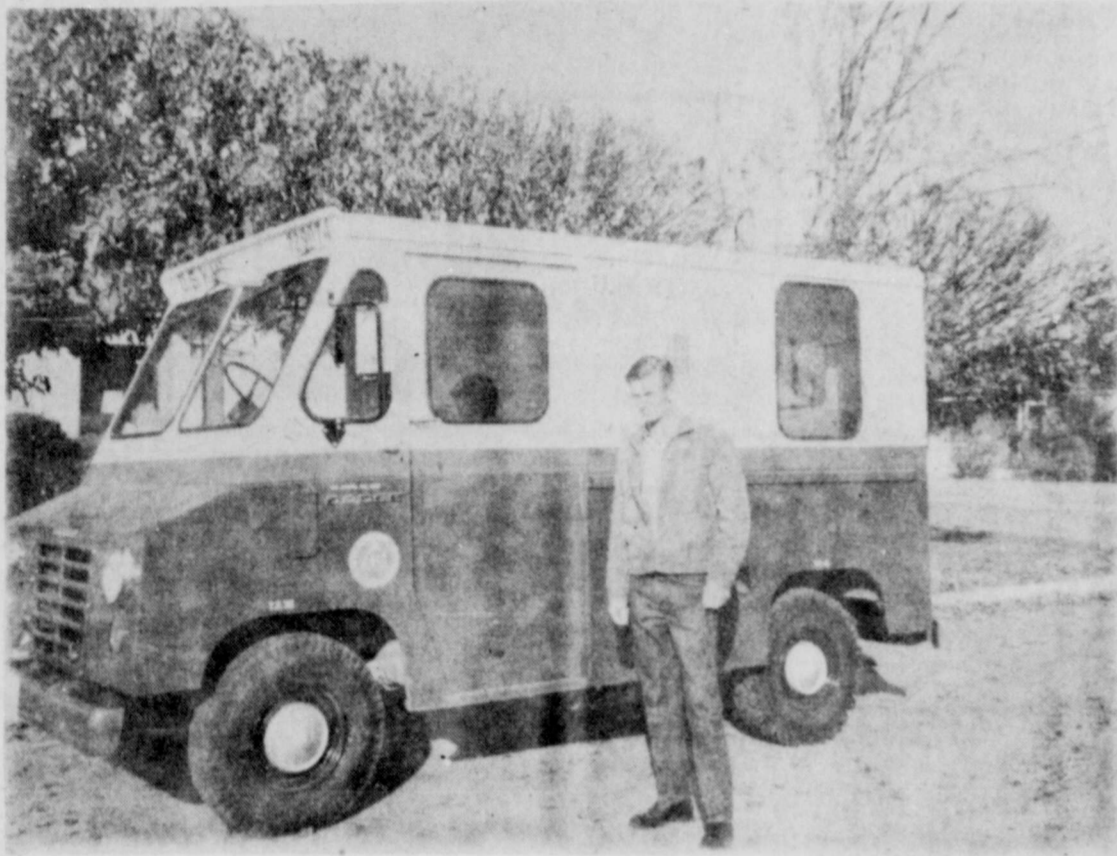

SERVING ON THE JFK CARRIER

USS John F. Kennedy (CVA-67) at sea (FHTNC) Oct. 31 Radioman Third Class Norman L. Condray, USN, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton J. Condray of 708 12th St., Abernathy, Texas was one of 2,400 crewmen aboard the USS John F. Kennedy when the Navy's newest attack aircraft carrier put to sea for the first time with an all-Navy crew.

Kennedy, commissioned at Newport News, Va., Sept. 7, is engaged in independent exercises off the Virginia Capes. The ship will depart soon for formal training at the Fleet Training Center, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

While at sea aboard the Kennedy, he will take part in many phases of his ship's final trials. The cruise is designed to check out new equipment, train the flight deck crew and familiarize crewmen with the ship's characteristics. The first Navy jet take-offs and landings on Kennedy's 4.5-acre flight deck will be included in the tests.

The AHS Antelopes close out the 1968 football season Friday night, Nov. 15, when Friona comes here for a District 3-AA conference game, starting at 7:30 p. m.

STUDENTS CAST "BALLOTS" IN NOV. 5 ELECTION

Posters had been put up in the hallways; campaign speeches had been made in all the classrooms; ballots had been printed; and a polling place had been provided.

At 8:00 a. m. Tuesday, Nov. 5, 1968, Abernathy High School students began forming a line to cast their ballot for the President and vice-president of the United States, as well as for governor, congressmen and other state and local officials.

By 11:00 a. m. all who desired to vote had cast their ballot and the polls were closed. Those present in high school that day numbered 274. Of these, 268 voted in the high school election, 98% of those eligible had voted.

When the ballots were counted, Nixon had 100 votes, Humphrey had 100 votes, and Wallace had received 68 votes.

For governor, Smith won 186 to Eggers, 63.

For U. S. Representative, Price won 123 to Brown's 119.

For State Representative Wayne won 142 to Strickland's 95.

The Democrats won all the other races by a large majority.

The high school votes turned down three of the amendments. They were Number 4, 10, and 13. All the other amendments passed.

It is interesting to note that the high school votes voted exactly the same as the nation on Nixon and Humphrey (percentage vote).

The entire project of a model election was sponsored by the 5th period government class. This class had divided into 3 political parties early in the school year. They had worked very hard to make this election a success. The interest of all students in the election was greater than expected.

All in all this experiment in democracy was turned a great success.

BLOCKED PUNT IS MARGIN

'Winds Tip Abernathy

FLOYDADA (Special) — The Floydada Whirlwinds capitalized on a blocked punt for the only score of the night here Friday to defeat the Abernathy Antelopes, 7-0.

Abernathy started out on a high note, driving to the Floydada 14-yard line in the first quarter, but the drive stalled there.

In the second period, the Whirlwinds recovered the blocked punt at the Antelope 23-yard line. A little later, quarterback Jack Gregory passed to wingback Con Bearden for 10 yards and the touchdown.

Abernathy moved to the Floydada 14 again before halftime but the Whirlwind defense stood. Floydada was deep in Antelope territory as the game ended.

Abernathy halfback Mack Rogers missed the game after pulling some shoulder ligaments on the opening kickoff.

Hale Center Owls Tromp New Deal's Lions, 36-8

HALE CENTER (Special) — Hale Center's Owls trounced the New Deal Lions Friday night, 36-8, on the strength of a consistent ground game and several spectacular defensive plays.

Hale Center now stands 5-4 for the season, including District 3-AA games, while New Deal's District 4-A Lions stand 3-6 for the year.

Hale Center halfback Larry Hammit ran seven and 41 yards for touchdowns, and quarterback Bert Ferguson passed for five yards to end Bill Davis for a third touchdown, then added a fourth on a one-yard plunge.

Defensive end Melvin Roberts returned a punt 97 yards for another marker for the winners, and it was halfback Tommy Dyer's 65-yard return of an interception which set up the winners' final touchdown.

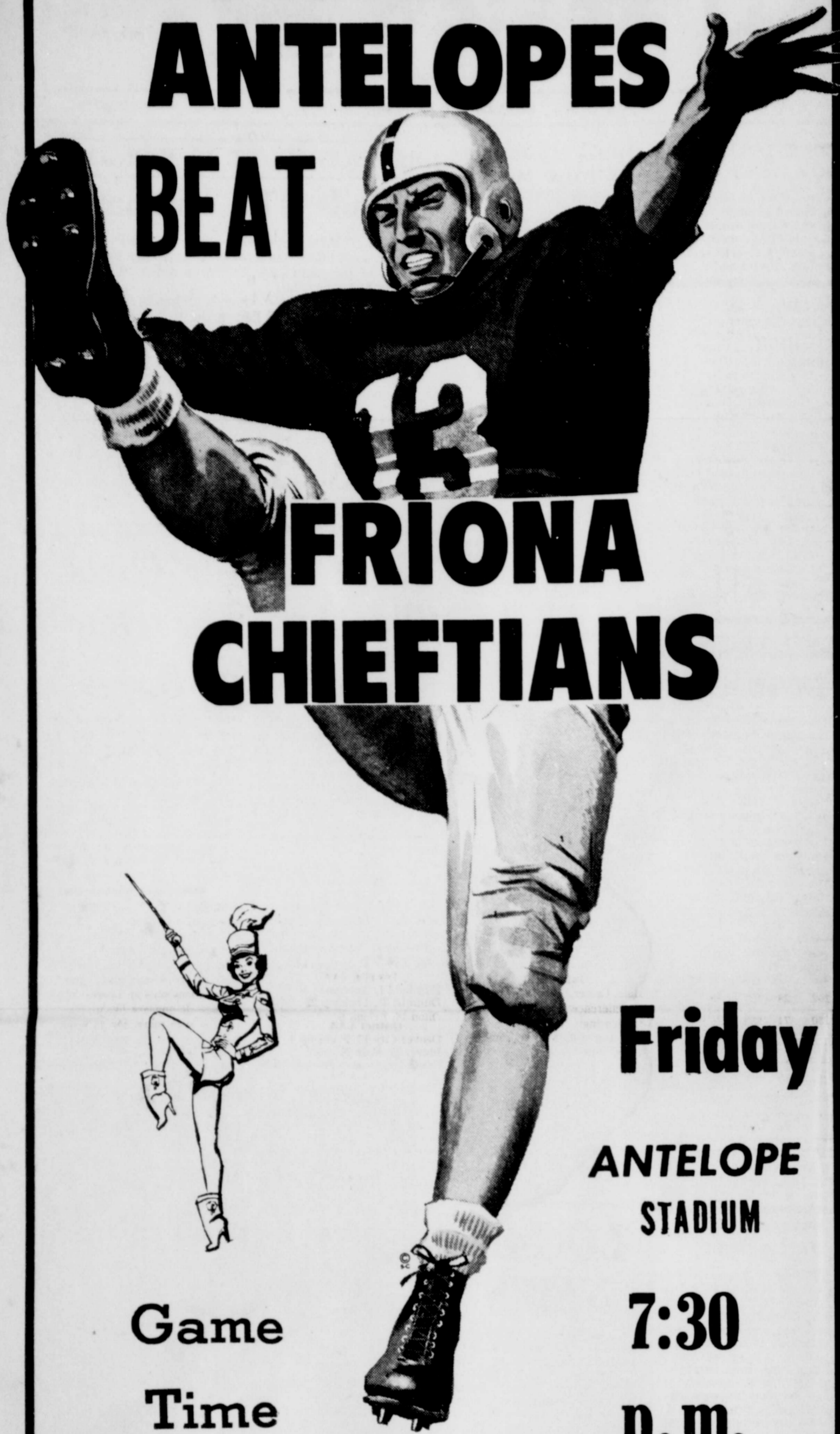
PFC JOHNNY CRUZ

WEAPONS MUST BE REGISTERED

Dallas, Texas--Anyone having an unregistered machine gun, sawed-off shotgun, short barreled rifle or other gangster-type weapon, or a device such as a bomb, grenade or land mine, may register it with the Internal Revenue Service without penalty from November 2 through December 1, according to B. Frank White, Regional Commissioner, Southwest Region, IRS. The Gun Control Act of 1968, signed into law last week, establishes a 30-day period for the registration of certain weapons and destructive devices. The registration requirement does not affect ordinary rifles, shotguns, pistols and revolvers. Firearms and devices covered by the registration requirements must be registered by filing Form 4467, in duplicate, with Director, Alcohol & Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, C. C., 20224.

Social Security

The preceding article covered the person reaching 65 at the end of this year and retiring after maximum taxes.

What about the young person aged 22, just starting his career of 43 years of work or self-employment before reaching age 65? What will he invest in social security and what will it bring him in return?

Using the current and projected tax rates, the employee will pay in \$16,490 toward his retirement benefit at age 65 (or \$39,700 if you add 3.34 per cent compound interest on the assumption he would otherwise have invested that \$16,490 as the months went by). With the average male life expectancy of 13 years at age 65, and with a wife also 65 (81 per cent of men reaching 65 are married), the retirement benefits due him and his wife would total \$42,860 — \$3,160 more than the value of his social security contribution.

Projected Look

Actuaries state that under the schedule of contributions now in the law, the young worker will get social security retirement benefits worth from 15-20 per cent more than their own contributions plus an interest allowance. It appears likely they will get even more, for as wage levels continue to rise income to the social security system increases at a rate faster than corresponding benefit liabilities. Future benefits therefore can be raised without further increasing the taxes, according to federal officials.
