WHEAT GIFTS CUT FEDERAL SUPPLY

Chicago — The Grain Stabilization Corporation has announced that gifts to the Red Cross had left the Federal Farm Board with only 28,000,000 bushels of wheat.

"This is equivalent to less than three weeks' consumption of wheat in the United States and it is therefore obvious that stabilization stocks are not now in any sense an important market factor," said President George S. Milnor.

TEXAS JUNE FARM INCOME \$9,760,045

Texas June sales of farm, ranch and orchard products are estimated at \$9,760,045 as recorded by The Dallas News farm income thermometer. That brings the grand total since Jan. 1, 1932, up approximately \$65,364,883. Owing to severe price declines in all farm commodities Texas farm income, as in all other farming regions, has suffered. To offset this condition it can be stated that Texas farmers are raising their crops this season at smallest outlay possible and making the farms feed them and their live stock.

Wheat and oats harvest, which was to have contributed heavily to the June total, has been seriously handicapped by rainy weather which has interfered with threshing operations in Central and North Texas and combining on the high plains where wheat losses are reported to be staggering. Entire wheat fields will not be harvested on account of damage done by recent heavy rains and hailstorms. Latest estimates are for a movement out of the Texas Panhandle (premier Wheat Belt of Texas) of only about 14,000,000 to 16,000,000 of new wheat. This will be harvested just as soon as field conditions improve. The East Texas commercial peach crop also will go to market in July and August.

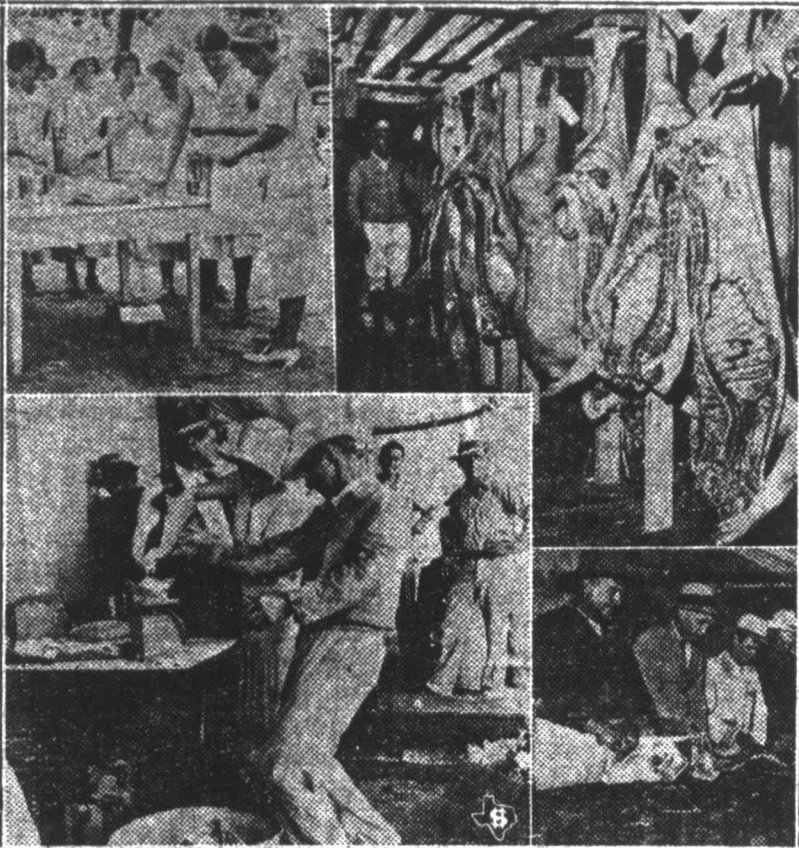

The first large scale summer hog butchering in Texas took place recently at Navasota, and proved conclusively that hogs can successfully be killed and cured in summer to save farmers high cured meat costs and help them realize a profit on their almost unsalable hogs. Upper left shows group of farmers' wives engaged in learning the proper way to can by-products. Upper right shows W. I. Ross, county agent of Grimes county, with carcasses hung up for cooling. The average hog was worth \$5.66 alive and is worth \$14 cured, curing costs only \$1.50 each.

WEEVIL THREAT LOOMS AS RAIN SOAKS COTTON

Increased insect activity following weeks of rainy weather, with sixty four Texas counties in the main cotton belt reporting boll weevils as more numerous than last July, features the report of The Dallas News for the week ended Thursday. If showery, cloudy weather should continue throughout July heavy damage to the crop is certain since it is generally still held to be two to three weeks later than average.

Not only boll weevils but cotton flea hoppers, grasshoppers and in some counties leafworms are beginning to damage the crop. In all dry areas which had high temperatures insects are mostly checked. On the whole the Texas cotton crop is still making fair to good progress owing to a combination of conditions is highly vulnerable to pest ravages. Humidity for weeks has been unusually high in the upper third of Texas which at this time of year should have its annual prolonged dry semi-arid weather.

EGGS AND DIAMONDS

Loraine News: There is a bright spot in the poultry outlook for this winter, declares E. N. Holmgren, A. & M. poultry specialist, who was here Thursday. It is this: Last year there were 5,000,000 cases of eggs on cold storage at this

time of the year; the five-year average is 5,000,000 cases; this year there are only 3,000,000 cases on cold storage.

State Press in Dallas News: The big butter and egg men of the cold storage division who bought up millions of eggs and butters at last summer's prices are having their troubles this summer. Not to be caught with a loss on their hands next year, they are buying and storing very conservatively, not to say cautiously, this year. This bodes favorably for bigger egg and butter money next winter. When the surplus declines, price rises. This is as true of hen eggs and cow butter as of bread grain and clothing cotton. Incidentally, there is seldom a heavy excess of live hogs or stored bacon, hence swine and swine products are, as a rule, more stable than those commodities which are produced in great volume. Hogs have been bid up at the stock yards during the last few weeks, not because the people are consuming more pork per capita, but because farmers are raising fewer pigs. Anything that is overdone is done badly. The diamond miners understand this very thoroughly. They could put enough diamonds on the market to ruin the price, with the result that all of us would soon be a-glitter with gems. The output is controlled, and the Farm Board has not interfered with the natural flow of supply and demand.

THE GOVERNOR'S RECORD

In asking the electorate of Texas to return him to the Governor's chair, Mr. Sterling stands with confidence on the record of his first term. The chief executive of Texas can not by himself accomplish legislative change, but by executive recommendation reforms can be achieved through co-operation between the Governor and the Legislature.

The Sterling administration has definitely started Texas toward a long needed experiment in State economy and the saving that has been affected by rigid application of frugality under difficult conditions is itself important. The passing of the State deficit is very welcome when most States urge an increase of taxation to balance budgets. In addition, Governor Sterling hopes to stop tax leakage in State expenditure, in view of the forthcoming reports of the legislative committees on administrative reform. The start that has been made in governmental economies should not be per-

mitted to suffer a setback by a change of Governors; that might defer for years the realization of this effort to put Texas government on a business basis. Under Governor Sterling, Texas has seen a hopeful start toward economy in public expenditure and he should be permitted to finish the job.

The News is aware that other candidates who have entered the field as opponents to a restoration of Fergusonism would probably carry on the Sterling program. Their qualifications are high, but the best assurance of successfully carrying the fight this year narrows down to the re-election of the Governor. Under existing political conditions, a scattered vote tends to lessen interest in the polls, and may result in a small vote, possibly throwing the election in the first primary to the Fergusons. This would be a great misfortune to Texas. Governor Sterling is entitled on his record to his second term and the best interests of Texas call for his re-election. —Dallas News.

Current Comment From Washington

The fourth of July and the Democratic Convention undoubtedly distracted the attention of Congress a little from its regular business, but the week, nevertheless, has not been passed in idleness. During the year which ends on the 30th of June, the government paid out more money than any year in a decade. This, and other circumstances, caused Congress to get busy with the economy bill. Eleven senators did not like it, but thirty-five considered it to be a wise measure, and so it went to the President. That official could not give it his unqualified approval, but, recognizing it as a step in the direction indicated by the title, his signature was affixed, and the so-called economy bill became a law. As to its provisions, federal workers receiving more than a thousand dollars, will have to take a furlough of one month, without pay. Annual leave, amounting to thirty days per year heretofore, will be cut to fifteen days, but the leave-cut will not go into effect for a year, in view of the present working of the furlough arrangement. Where man and wife are in the government employ, one or the other will be discharged before the unmarried are forced to go. Promotions and increases in pay which otherwise would become automatically effective, are suspended, and pay for overtime work has been practically cut off. Vacancies in the federal service now can be filled only with the consent of the President. Heads of departments are at liberty to retire workers for as long periods as may be necessary in order that appropriations be not exceeded. Heretofore, extensions beyond the retirement age occasionally have been granted, but now the old will have to go, when they reach the age limit, unless their time is extended by direct presidential action.

A TRAGIC DEATH

Mr. Bread Wheat died at the family residence, known as "The Pitt," after a lingering illness attributed to Over-Exposure in Washington to a dreaded disease known as Hoover's Farm Relief. Mr. Wheat was born in the year of Joseph B. C., survived in panics and depressions of all ages only to be stricken down in the year 1930; he lived an honorable upright life before God and man, serving with unflinching zeal, faith, and confidence the human race for more than 6,000 years, without regard to race, creed, or color; he was the Farmer's best friend, a faithful servant in war, as in peace; he stood for upright, honorable, sound, logical, and reasonable business methods; he was a devout believer and expo-

nent of free and unrestricted commerce between Nations and Individuals, based upon intelligence.

Mr. Wheat is survived by three grandsons, Doubt, Guess and Gamble; a legally adopted stepson, Hoover's Farm Relief, who was constantly at his bedside during the last days and is now sitting up with corpse; two daughters-in-law, Mrs. Broken Down Co-Ops and Mrs. Peanut Politician, who were with him constantly when he was exposed to this dreaded and fatal business disease known as Hoover's Farm Relief, called Stabilization. The death of the honorable character is a distinct loss to the economic world, he being one of its most faithful and responsible servants.

Services will be conducted by the Rev. Alexander Legge and the body will be in state for public inspection between the hours of 9:30 a. m. and 1:15 p. m. each business day until the remains can be smelled as far east as Washington.

Burial, if any, will be in the campaign of 1932, and the honorary pallbearers will be selected by the present Farm Board. By request, no flowers. MITCHELL COUNTY FARM NOTES

One of the Federal Experiment Stations took ten cows and fed them a ration of alfalfa, corn silage and pasture. They averaged 13295 pounds of milk and 464 pounds butterfat. The next year the same ten cows were fed the same roughage and 1 pound of grain for every six pounds of milk and they averaged 3,112 pounds more milk and 112 pounds more butterfat and the profit was \$25 more per cow. The next year they used the same ten cows and fed 1 pound of grain for every three pounds of milk but the extra grain was wasted as the cows made \$53 less profit than on the smaller grain ration.

Hoover City has come into being on the outskirts of Houston and will remain there until a switch engine comes along and removes it.

Hoover City, consisting of some 15 or 20 freight cars in an off-shoot of the Ship Channel railroad yards, was established, named, and is run by jobless seamen.

They picked out the best looking box car and designated it the city hall. On the side they lettered "Hoover City, Welcome. Free beds for all but no food, thanks to Hoover."

WHEAT SENT CHINA MAY MEAN LARGER MARKET IN FUTURE

Chinese palates, whetted by 15,000,000 bushels of Federal Farm Board wheat, may furnish American farmers with a new market larger than any they have ever had.

The National Republic of China was very anxious to buy more, George S. Milnor, president of the Farmers National Grain Corporation, said Wednesday, but the Farm Board doesn't feel justified in granting China's request for credit terms even more liberal than of the first bargain last year.

M. S. Briggs, representative of the grain corporation in Shanghai, reported to Milnor that more than 2,000,000 Chinese have been converted permanently from rice eaters to wheat consumers, and that an enormous market had been created for American grain in the Yangtze Valley.

State Auditor Reports No Shortage In Highway Funds

Austin, July 18.—Statements of a gubernatorial candidate that the report of an audit of the State Highway Department is being suppressed, and that a shortage of \$100,000,000 exists in the highway department funds, were challenged by State Auditor Moore Lynn this week. State Auditor Lynn said:

"The statements being made on behalf of one of the candidates for Governor to the effect that the audit for the Highway Department has been suppressed and that there is a shortage of one hundred million dollars in the Highway funds are too utterly ridiculous to be worthy of consideration. Statements of this kind are based either on a lack of information or a contemptuous disregard for the facts.

"In view, however, of these unreasonable and unwarranted attacks that are being made on the Highway Department and the State Auditor's office by the spokesman for one of the candidates for Governor, I think it is only fair to the people that I should make some statements in regard to the audit of the Highway Department which is now being made by the State Auditor's office.

"This audit was authorized by the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature, and an appropriation was made for the cost of the audit to be paid from the State Highway fund, which was supplemented by an additional appropriations made by the second called session. At the end of the year 1931 practically all of the special funds appropriated for this audit had been expended. At that time many very important special investigations already begun were far from complete. For this reason the work has been carried on since

the first of this year by the auditors paid out of the regular appropriations for the State Auditor's office. In view of the many other audits and investigations continually being carried on by our office, the work of completing the audit of the Highway Department was slowed down to a great extent after the special appropriations were expended.

"The report on the Highway audit when completed will be filed with the proper officials and the Legislature in the form of a printed report containing several hundred pages. In the meantime the State Auditor's office is preparing a preliminary report containing the findings to this date, together with recommendations for improvements in procedure. It is expected that this preliminary report will be released during the next few days.

"The audit has disclosed no wrong doing on the part of the Highway Commissioners or the general management of the Highway Department. In all cases where irregularities on the part of the employees were disclosed by the audit, the management has taken prompt corrective measures. Considering the number of employees involved and the volume of operations of the Highway Department, the number of irregularities has been comparatively small.

"The affairs of the Department as a whole were found to have been managed in an efficient manner, but as would probably be true in the case of any business of equal size, many criticisms are offered and recommendations made concerning various methods of procedure and practices which are not considered to be for the best interests of the State."

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"PIE-NAPPLES"



OTHER, may I have a pip-pip...?" lisped the little girl excitedly.
 "Perhaps, dear, if you'll tell me what it is."
 "A pip-pip-pip..."
 "Are you pretending to be a little bird?"
 "No, mother. A pip-pip-pip..."
 "Spell it, dear."
 "P i e n a p p l e."
 "That doesn't spell anything."
 "Yeth it doth, mother," lisped the little girl, her tongue finally loosened. "It sthells pie made out of pineapple."
 There are many pies made out of pineapple from which this little girl's mother might choose. Here are the recipes for some of them.

With Other Fruits

Pineapple-Cranberry Crisscross Pie: Cook one cup cranberries, one-half cup seeded raisins and one-half cup water until the berries burst open. Add two-thirds cup sugar, the contents of one 8-ounce can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple, two tablespoons bread crumbs and one slightly-beaten egg. Pour into a pastry-lined pie tin, and lay narrow strips of pastry over the top, criss-cross fashion. Bake in a hot, 450°, oven for twenty or twenty-five minutes. This makes one large pie.

Pineapple-Lemon Soufflé Pie: Add the juice and grated rind of two lemons to one-fourth cup water and the contents of one 8-ounce can of crushed pineapple, heat to boiling, and add three-eighths cup sugar mixed with two tablespoons corn-

starch. Cook until thick in a double boiler, add two slightly-beaten egg yolks (first heating eggs by adding a little of the hot mixture) and cook a few minutes longer. Cool slightly. Beat two egg whites stiff, add four tablespoons sugar, and fold into the first mixture. Pour into a baked pie crust and place in a slow, 300°, oven for fifteen minutes, or until set and brown on top. One large pie.

With Crackers and Milk

Pineapple Pie in Graham Cracker Crusts: Melt one-half cup butter, add one-half cup brown sugar, and cook for a minute. Add one and one-half cups graham cracker crumbs. Take out two tablespoons of crumbs for the top and to the rest add one beaten egg white. Press mixture into a large pie tin using fingers dusted with flour, until it fits like pastry. Fill with filling given below, sprinkle with the reserved crumbs, and bake in a moderate, 350°, oven for fifteen to twenty minutes, or till set. One large pie.

Filling: Beat four egg yolks, add one cup condensed milk, then the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple, slightly drained. Add three tablespoons lemon juice and a little grated rind, and fold in three stiffly-beaten egg whites.

Pineapple Caramel Pie: Make caramelized milk by boiling a can of condensed milk in water for two hours. It can then be kept for weeks. If too thick, simply add a

few drops of cream. Spread three-fourths cup of this caramel over the bottom of one large baked pastry shell, lay in the drained contents of two 8-ounce cans of pineapple tidbits, and pile sweetened whipped cream thickly on top. Sprinkle chopped nuts over all. One large pie.

Envelopes and Tarts

Pineapple-Raspberry Envelopes: Cook together until thick the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple, one-third cup raspberry jam and three tablespoons sugar. Roll pastry thin, and cut in four-inch squares. Put a large spoonful of the fruit in center of each square, bringing corners together, and either pinch together or hold with a toothpick. Sprinkle with sugar and bake in a hot oven for fifteen or twenty minutes. This makes eight envelopes.

Luxor Tarts: Beat one cup cream. Soften one-half teaspoon gelatin in two tablespoons cold water, and dissolve in four tablespoons boiling apricot syrup from a No. 2 can of apricots. Add to whipped cream, chill and pour into baked pastry shells till they are about half full. Let chill and harden. Drain the apricots and the contents of a No. 2 can of crushed pineapple, and press the apricots through a sieve. Spread a layer of apricot purée over the cream, then a layer of pineapple. Melt a little currant or quince jelly and spread over the pineapple, making a glaze. Makes ten fairly large or twelve medium sized tarts.
