Farwell Steers District 3-A Champions

Scott's Basketball Clubs Compile Great Records

When it comes to being consistent in winning basketball championships, Farwell High of District 3-A would have to be ranked as one of the winningest teams anywhere. Farwell's boys teams have won 10 district championships since 1959 and on two occasions have won their bi-district encounters to enter regional play.

The most recent title win for the Steers came last Friday night when they bested Sudan 86-41 for the 1970-71 trophy and the right to enter bi-district action. The Steers were also victorious in their final district game of the year when they beat Vega 68-46 in a game played at Farwell Tuesday night. This made the Steers' district record a perfect 14-0 and gave them a 21-8 mark on the season.

A great deal of the success of these teams would have to go to the head coach, Vernon Scott, who is in his eighth year of coaching basketball at Farwell. His teams have captured six district championships and have posted season records of over 20 wins annually even though losing out in the championship race two times.

At least two Steers have made the all-district squads each year Scott has been at Farwell, with more than that on several of the teams. Kyle Sheets, Dean Stovall and Greg Hargrove all were named to the All-South Plains teams under Scott's tutelage.

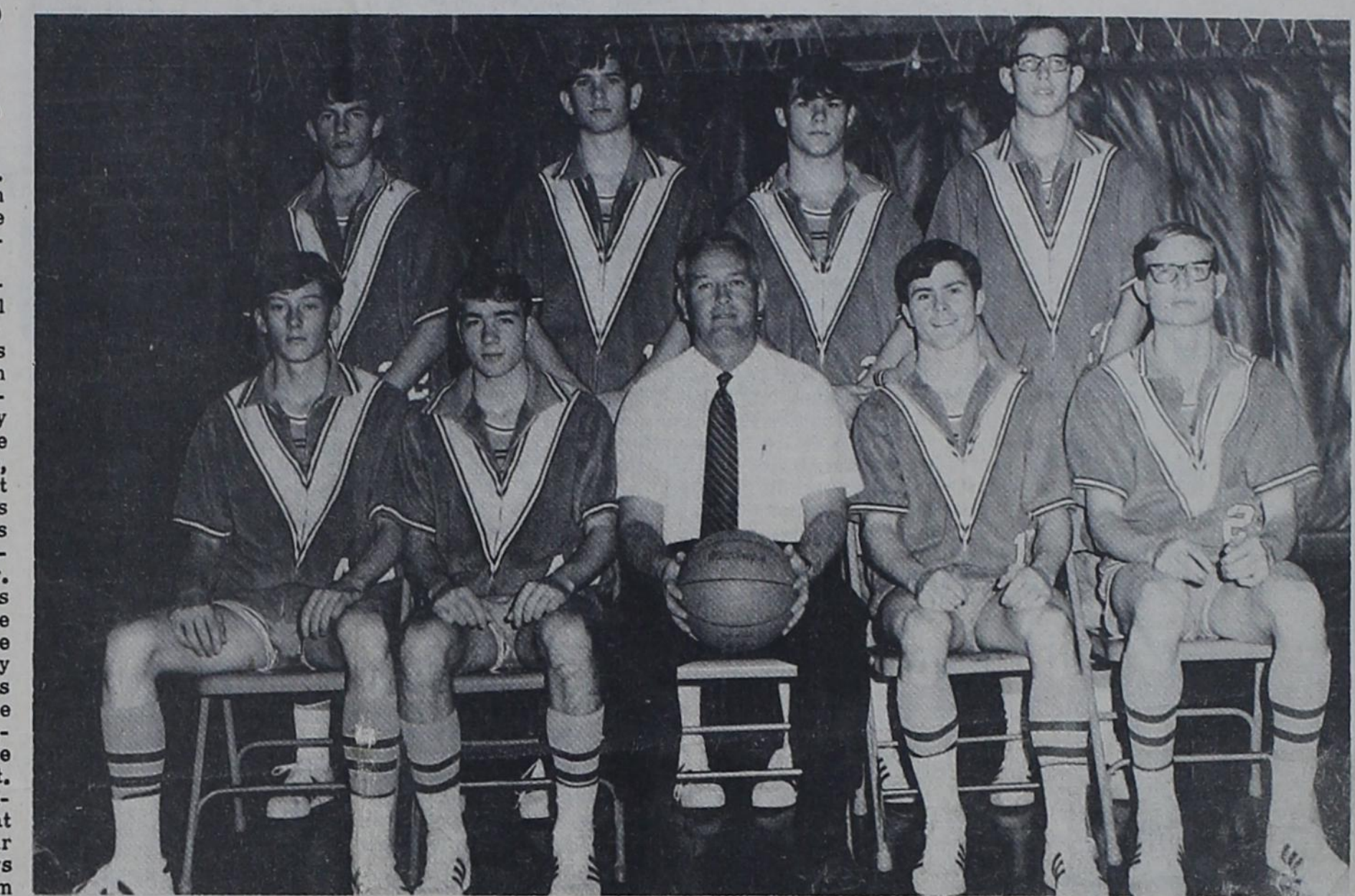
Coach Scott came to Farwell for the 1962-63 season from Friona where he had coached for three years. He attended high school at Quanah, Tex., where he was active in all sports and later played basketball at Wayland College in Plainview where he received his BS degree in physical education in 1961. In 1968 he received his MA degree in secondary administration from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. He and his wife, Omata, have two sons, Steve and John, who are three of the

Steers' most avid supporters. A real treat for Steve and John is to be allowed to sit on the bench with the coach and players occasionally.

Typical of Coach Scott's nature, he is quick to give all the credit for success to the kids on the team. Farwell has never fielded a team with much height, and some years the material pickings have been pretty slim. This is not because there's no interest in the game, Scott points out, it's just that every school sometimes goes through a period when there is just not much material available for any athletic endeavor.

This year there were 11 boys on the varsity team when the season opened, and by the time the final half of district play rolled around, only eight boys were left. Scott says that the varsity has had only two workouts in succession when all the team members were present. This is somewhat disheartening to the coach who says that this has been the roughest year he has ever known for always having someone absent from practice due to sore throat or some minor injury. No serious injuries have been incurred, he says, but there's always just

Blue Takes Loop With 14-0 Mark

Farwell Steers have captured another District 3-A basketball championship, the 10th time since 1959 and the third year in succession that the Blue and White has been the district's representative in bi-district action. The Steers' last loss in district play came in 1968 when they lost by one point to Sudan who was that year's district winner. The Steers have now won 34 district games in succession and ended this year's district schedule with a perfect 14-0 mark and a 21-8 season record.

The Steers beat Sudan by a whopping 86-41 margin last Friday night to gain the district title, and on Tuesday night they beat Vega 68-46 in the last district game of the season.

Bi-district action will be Monday night, Feb. 22, at the Texan Dome on South Plains College campus at Levelland at 7:30 p.m. The Steers will play the winner of District 4-A which will be Levens or Shallowater. These two teams will have a playoff to determine the district winner early next week.

Farwell will have a series of three practice games before the February 22 game. Tonight (Thursday) they will play Three-Way at 7:30; Monday night, Feb. 15, at 7:30 they will play Adrian; and on Thursday night, Feb. 18, they will play McAdoo at 7:30. All three games will be played at Farwell gym.

All fans are urged to be on hand at all the games and especially encouraged to attend the bi-district game in Levelland.

Sheets garnered 33 points and is now about 40 points above the all-time high scoring record at Farwell High which was set in 1964-65 by Larry Gregory. Brett Hargrove scored 19 points and Kevin Hargrove nabbed 13 rebounds.

In the Tuesday night game with Vega, Coach Scott commented that if that was not the best effort of the Steers all season, then it was certainly one of the best. "The hustle was just outstanding -- we really forced them to run," says Scott. Sheets was also high scorer in this game, hitting for 29 points. Kevin Hargrove had 18 and Brett Hargrove was high in the rebound department with 13.

"Our defense was just the best it's been all year," Scott noted, complimenting the play of all the boys. James Hobbs was the only team member who did not get into the game and he is suffering a sprained ankle.

Telephone Co-Op Sets Yearly Meet

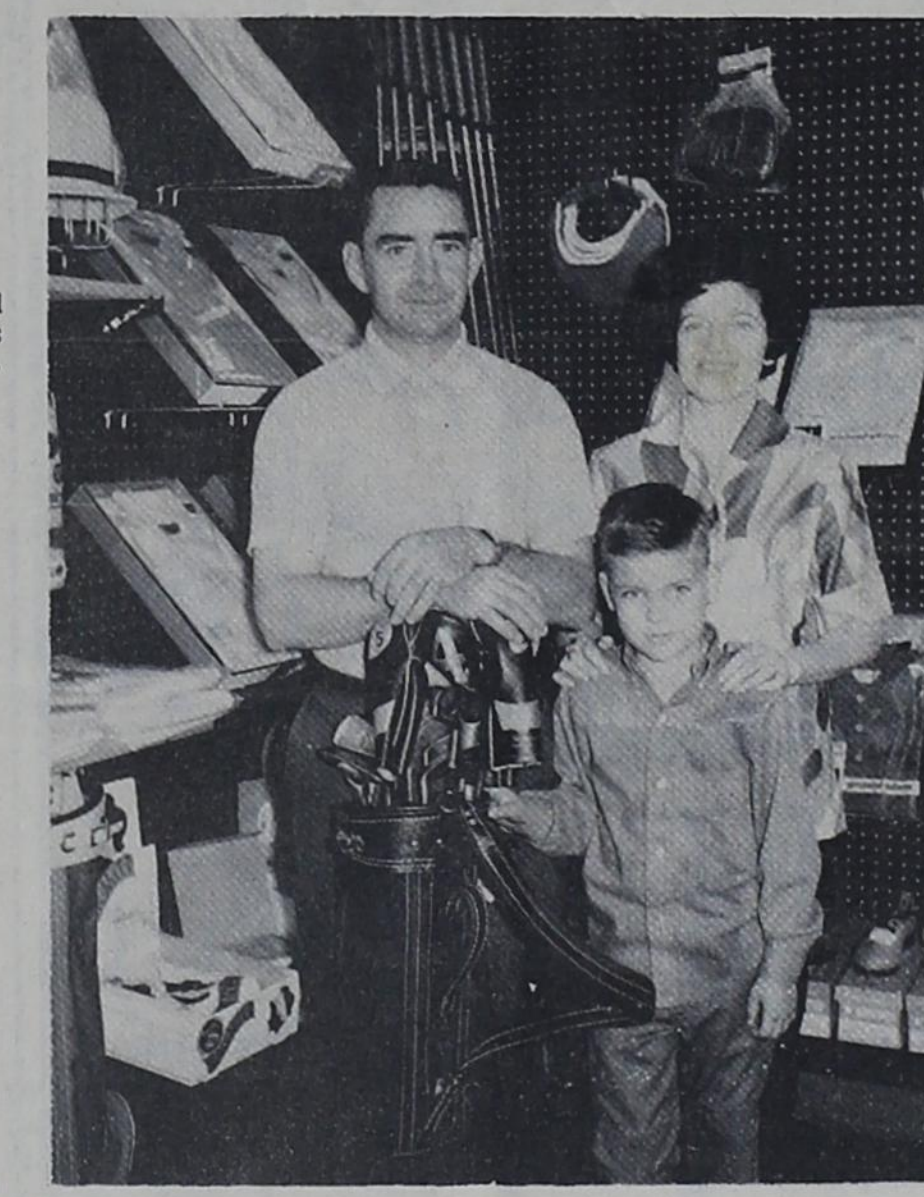

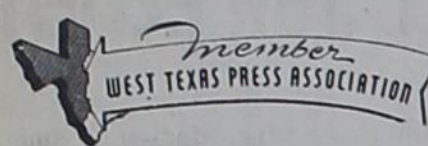

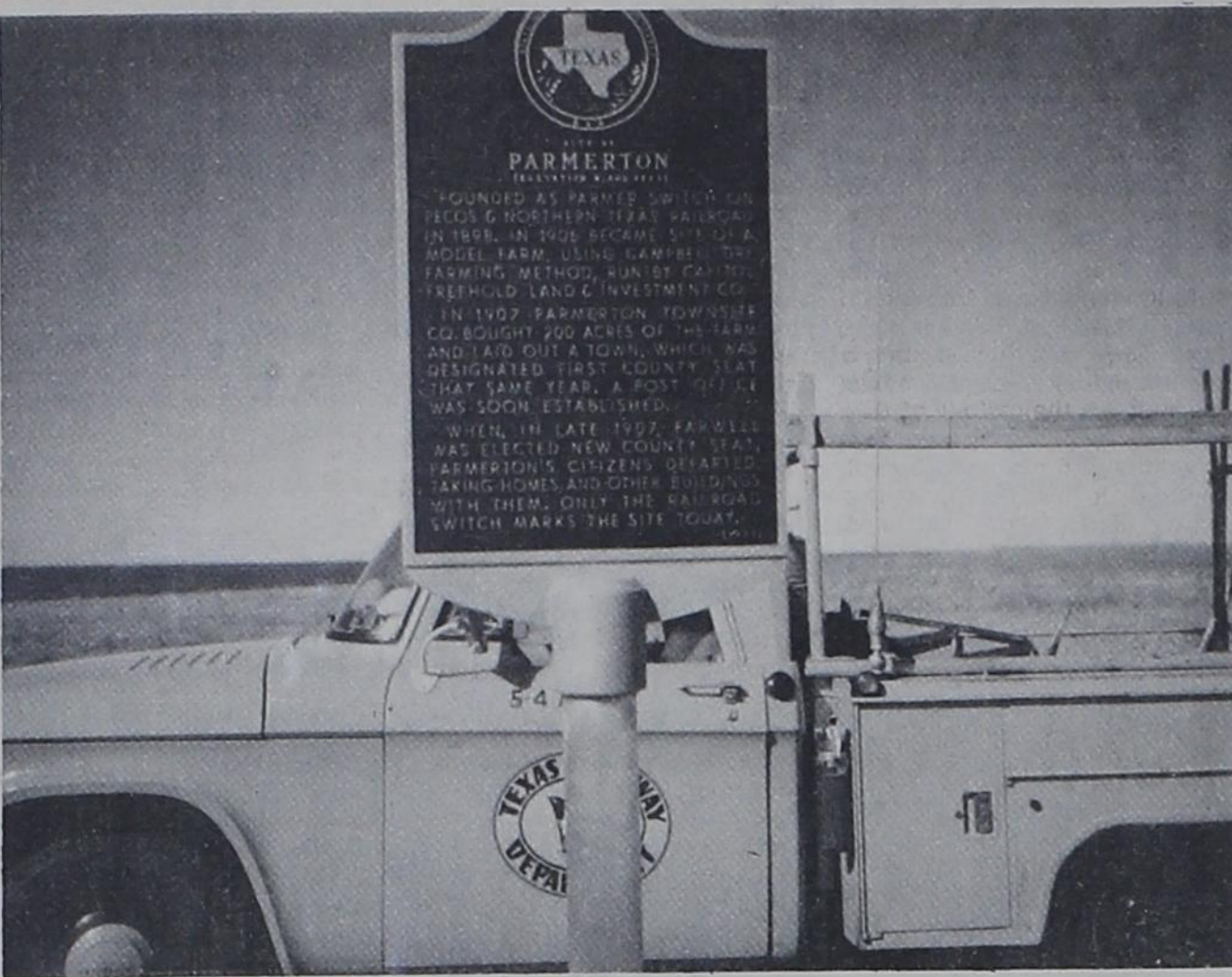
A Baptist minister who had never really retired, Rev. Horton had preached a sermon on December 6, 1970, at Haywood, Okla., commemorating his 50th year in the ministry. This was near the place he had preached his first sermon at the age of 22 when he had only received a grade-school education.

He was born in Miami, Okla., and in 1918 he was married to Vena, and after he was called to the ministry, he decided to return to complete his education. He completed his high school work then entered East Central State Teachers College in Ada, Okla., and later finished schooling at Oklahoma Baptist University at Shawnee, Okla.

In 1932 he came to Amarillo and was pastor of the Pierce Street Baptist Church for 16 years. He then spent seven years working on building churches and doing revival work in 18 states while working with the Baptist General Convention of Texas, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

It was in 1953 that he came to Farwell and helped to build the present-day First Baptist Church, Farwell. After a stay of approximately one year, he returned to Amarillo where he organized the Hillcrest Baptist Church and served as its pastor for 11 years.

He officially "retired" in August of 1965, but he continued to preach in revival services here and in other coun-



PARMERTON HISTORICAL marker was installed by the Texas Highway Department February 3 on Highway 60, some 5.5 miles northeast of Bovina adjacent to the Townsite of Parmerton. The black and silver marker is inscribed with a portion of the history of Parmerton which was founded as Parmers Switch on the Pecos and Northern Railroad in 1898. It was the first county seat of Parmer County and remained so until 1907 when Farwell was established as the county seat. Dedication ceremonies for the historical marker will be June 6, 1971, says Hugh Moseley of Farwell, chairman of the Parmer County Historical Survey Committee.

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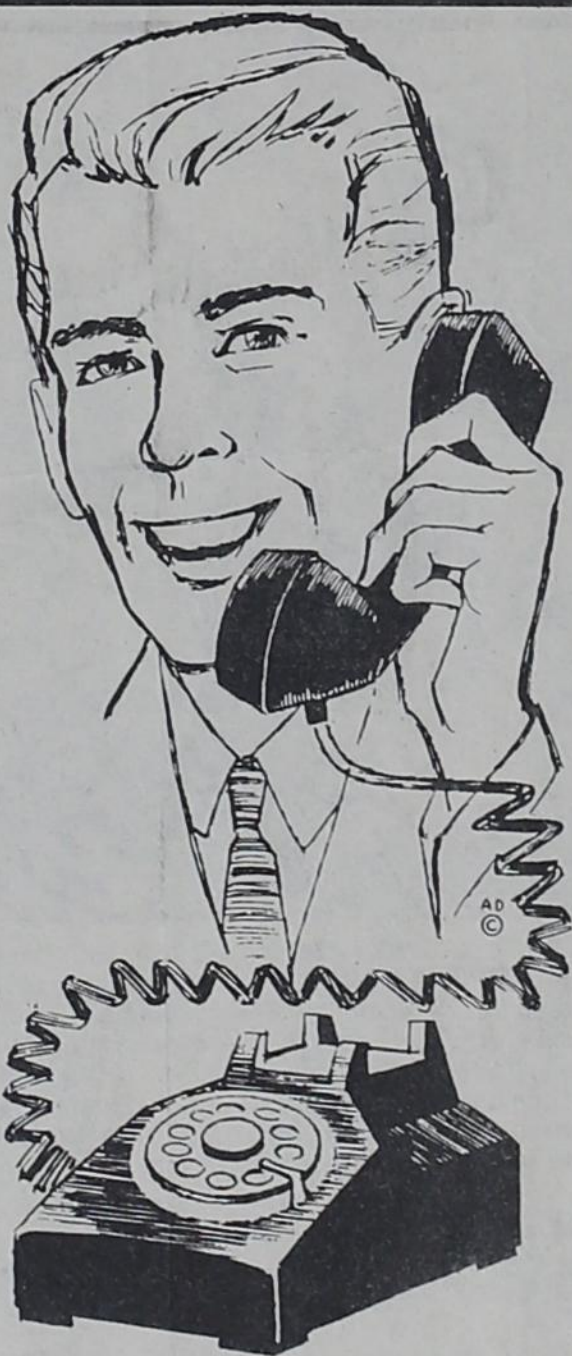

Earl L. Bradshaw Services Saturday

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon, Feb. 6, in Steed-Todd Funeral Home in Clovis for Earl L. "Brad" Bradshaw who was dead on arrival at Clovis Memorial Hospital Thursday afternoon, Feb. 4, following an apparent heart attack.

Officiating at the final rites were Dr. Rex Kyker of Abilene Christian College, brother-in-law of Mr. Bradshaw; Robert B. Hawkins, minister of the 16th and Pile Sts. Church of Christ, Clovis; and Dewey Fogerson, minister of the Farwell Church of Christ. Music was provided by a choral group from the Clovis church.

Burial with full military rites was in Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery in Farwell. Pallbearers included Warren Grant of Albuquerque and Vernon Neill of Dallas, cousins of the deceased; and Claude Rose Sr., A. T. Watts, Bob Anderson, and Hamlin Overstreet. All friends of the family were designated as honorary bearers.

He is survived by his wife, Evelyn; two sons, Earl L. Bradshaw Jr., of Dallas, and Michael, who is a student at the University of Texas; and two grandchildren, William Mark and Janet Lynn Bradshaw.

Mr. Bradshaw, who retired in 1966 from 30 years duty as a civilian employee with the Air Training Command of the United States Air Force, was at one time a resident of Farwell, serving as the Parmer County Engineer. Since his retirement, he and his family have made their home in Clovis.

Born in Big Spring, Tex., May 9, 1899, Mr. Bradshaw was reared in Mangum, Okla., where he lived until he enlisted in the United States Army during World War I. After serving overseas during this war, he returned to the states and entered college at the University of Tulsa and also served as City Engineer of Tulsa. He also worked for the Santa Fe Railroad and the Texas Highway Department and was one time the County Engineer for Lamb County.

In 1935 he came to Farwell as the county engineer and on August 9, 1936, in Portales, N. M., he was married to Evelyn Kyker, daughter of the Bob Kykers. Bob Kyker was a barber here for many years.

Mr. Bradshaw worked on several area dam projects as engineer, including those at Buffalo Lake, Umbarger; Lake Marvin near Canadian; and McClellan Lake at Pampa. He then worked as engineer with the Army Corps of Engineers in building what is now Ramey Air Force Base, Puerto Rico. He also worked on the Alcan Highway project and when the Air Force took over its own engineering projects, he was assigned to the Air Training Command headquarters in Shreveport, La. He served at Scott Air Force Base, Ill., and at Randolph Air Force Base at San Antonio, while under the ATC.

During his 30 years as a civilian employee with the Air Force, Mr. Bradshaw received numerous commendations and awards. He was one of the highest ranking civilian employees in the Air Force and retired with the rank of major.

He served during both World War I and World War II, serving as a major during the latter. He was presented several Air Force Certificates "in recognition of services to the nation in high-grade positions." The Department of the Air Force also presented him the highest award given civilian employees, the commendation for meritorious civilian service while serving as Assistant Director of Installations for Operations, Scott AFB, Ill. While at Scott, he was one

of several civilian employees to be presented cash awards for sustained superior performances, and at Randolph AFB, he received a certificate for work done as general engineer with DCS.

Among the engineering societies to which he belonged were the American Society of Civil Engineers, American Association of Agricultural Engineers, Society of Military Engineers, and the Air Force Engineers Society.

A member of the Methodist Church and also a member of the Farwell Country Club, Mr. Bradshaw was well-known in the Farwell area.

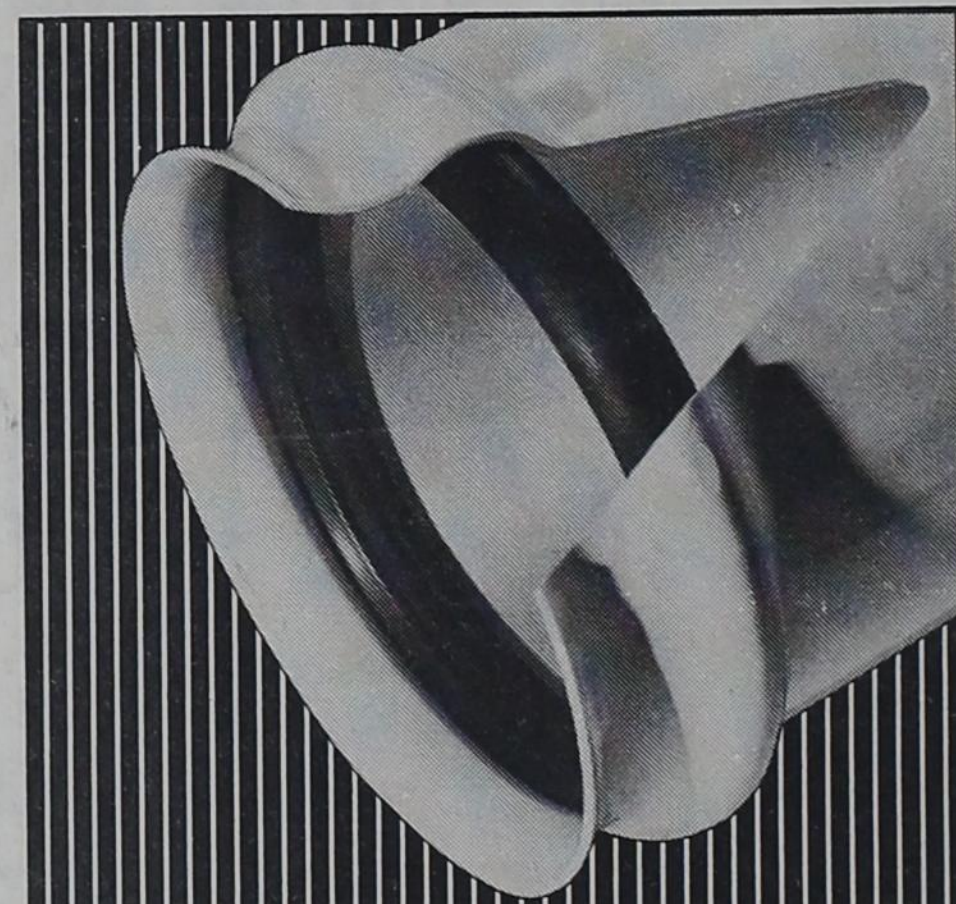

Ladies Find Bread Still Edible

They took it out of the bread box and discovered not one speck of mold nor any sign of spoilage. In fact, it was still soft enough to be sliced. So the two ladies sliced it, toasted it and had it for supper some 15 months and two weeks after it was baked.

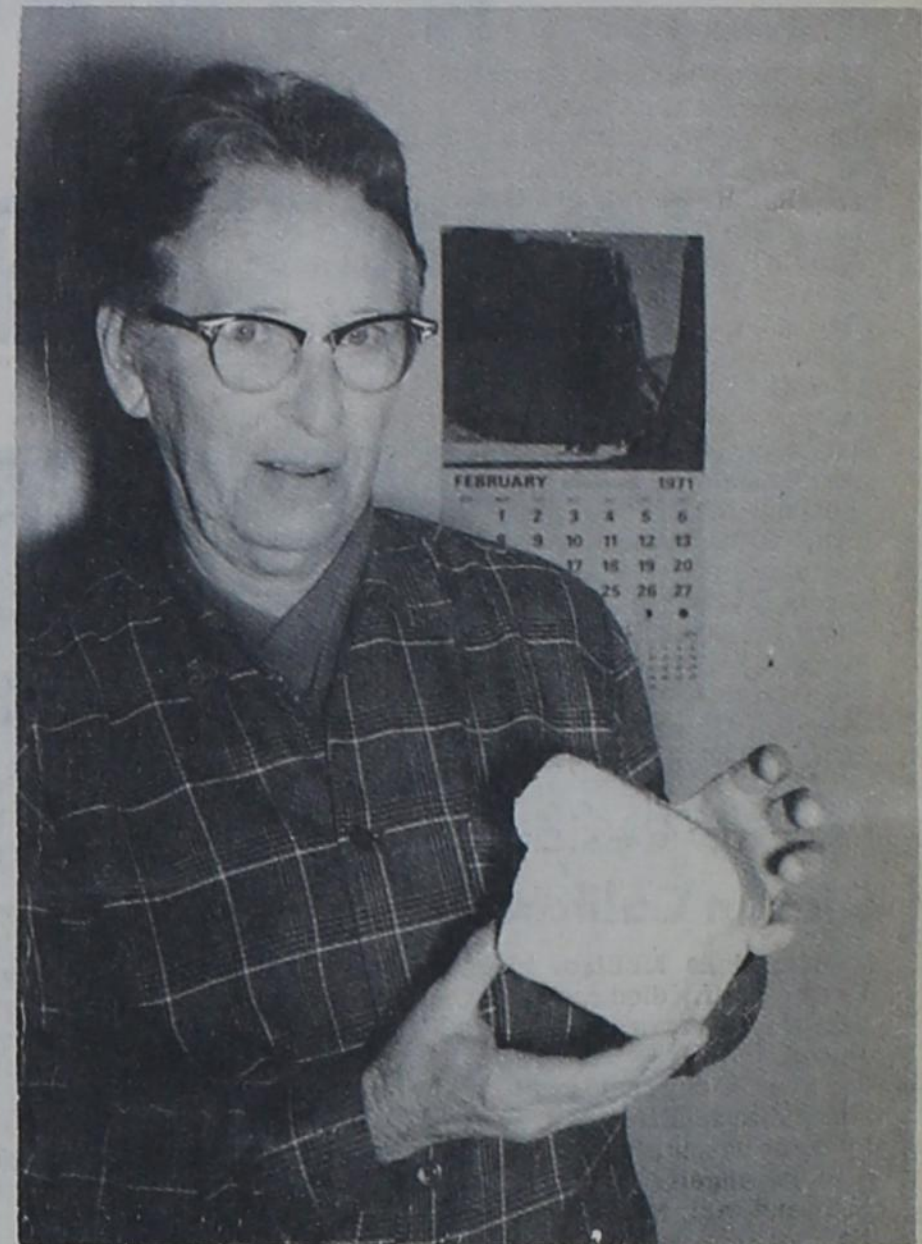
Most folks were skeptical when the ladies told them about the old bread, but a Tribune

that Mrs. Medley no longer has any of the starter since she had had orders from her son to bring home some of that "wonderful starter" to make more yeast bread.

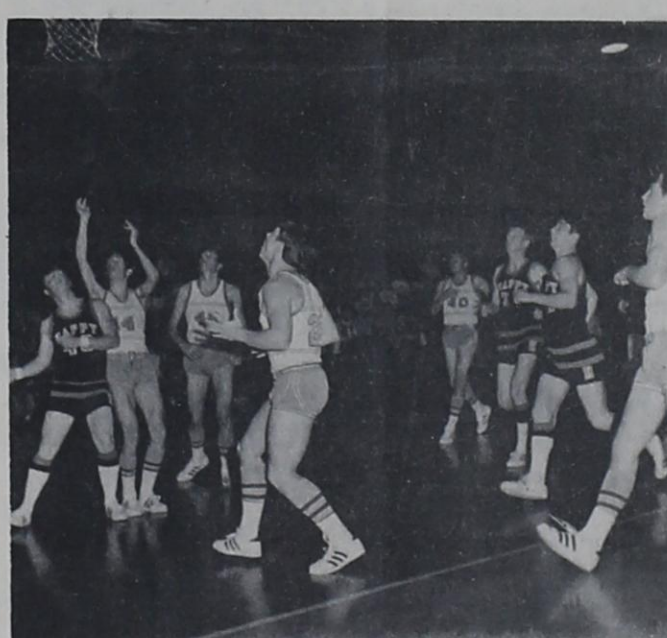

On The Farm In Farmer County

Two meetings are slated in the Panhandle for the week of February 15 to explain a wheat referendum to producers in 17 counties. These meetings are required prior to a certification by the state commissioner of agriculture for the Texas Wheat Producers Association to conduct such a referendum.

Purpose of the referendum is to raise funds with which to conduct programs of education, research, disease and insect control and marketing relating to wheat. The first meeting will be held February 15 at 2 p.m. in the County Community Building in Dumas.

Another meeting is slated for February 16 at 7 p.m. in the Community Center in Hereford. This meeting will be for producers in Deaf Smith, Farmer, Castro, Randall, Potter, Oldham and Armstrong counties.

The program at each location is designed to explain the provisions of the referendum and to give a brief report on the overall wheat industry.

Ed Garnett of Amarillo, area farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be the principal speaker at each meeting. Representatives of the Texas Wheat Producers Association will also be on hand to answer questions concerning the referendum.

I urge all wheat producers in Farmer County to attend the upcoming referendum meeting so that they will be able to make a knowledgeable choice when election time for the referendum rolls around. A two-thirds majority vote will be required.

March 1 is the deadline for farmers to file their 1970 income tax return. This date was extended from February 15 to March 1 by the 1969 income tax law.

To qualify for reporting as a farmer, two-thirds of your gross farm income must be from the sale of agriculture products. If farm income is less than two-thirds of the gross income, a taxpayer may be required to declare estimated tax and make quarterly payments. Statutory penalties are assessed for failure to file required declarations of estimated tax.

Many taxpayers will not be required to file a return due to a new low income allowance. As an example, for 1970 returns, married persons filing a joint return would not be required to pay any tax if their incomes were less than \$2,300. However, farmers may be required to file an income tax return in order to report self employment tax if their net income exceeds \$400 for 1970.

Additional information regarding farm income tax reporting regulations can be found in the 1971 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide which is available from your county agricultural agent or the Internal Revenue Service.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make return to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment, so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

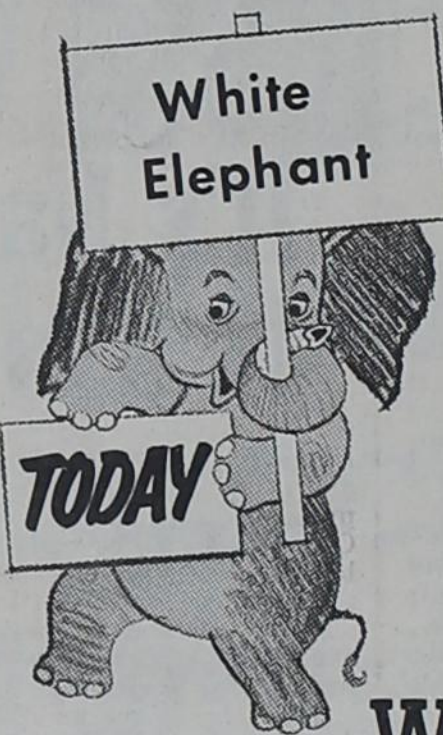

Astronauts are Today's Heroes: Our children's heroes are different from those of their older brothers and parents--but the ingredients are basically the same.

In past years, young boys pretended to be detectives, soldiers, cowboys. Now they've turned their eyes skyward to the world of astronauts--right in keeping with the image of daring, courage, intelligence and "good guy" that parents try to foster.

But, our children want to select their own heroes and the way they've been buying toys and space equipment is a good indication the astronauts are today's favorites.

Before man set foot on the moon, space toys weren't all that popular. And, most of them were in the form of "dolls" for boys.

However, with space gear, youngsters actually can be astronauts, rather than playing with them, because this realistic and authentic equipment is worn by the youngster. The gear may include a helmet with headpiece and amber gold dome giving the young spaceman the same tinted view of the universe seen by the moon walkers, air cushion space boots, a remote gripper device, ionization nebulizer to "de-radiate" moon samples and space equipment belt with anti-gravity tool, signal communicator, life support system and scanner scope. Such toys provide countless hours of imaginative playtime.

Fashionique: This is the year when it's the fun accessories that make the look, says a fashion co-ordinator. It's the year to stock up on "classic" dresses that can be worn for years and then zip them up with shawls, sashes, shoes and boots which are totally now!

In Paris the girls who set the pace are wearing the simplest shifts and A-line dresses with elaborately worked over-the-knee kid boots for the proper long-legged proportion, says the co-ordinator. In Italy, for example, leading designers wrap simple, long-sleeved silk dresses in triangular fringed shawls that drop below the hemline in back. The baby grand may go naked this year if you are to be in the height of fashion!

Platform shoes are another fun accessory that can give real fashion flair, according to the fashion co-ordinator. Even many models who started wearing them first admit "they're different, but so different they're beautiful." Also, one can not discredit the flat-tery of the higher heel.

The Living Room: Provided you have the space, a parlor-type living room is delightful. The word "parlor" suggests the Victorian era, and for anyone who likes a nostalgic atmosphere this is still the easiest period to simulate, besides being the most amusing, if done a bit tongue-in-cheek.

If you are fortunate to have family Victorian pieces, all you need are the appropriate fabrics and wall coverings. Victorians were partial to blue velvet, to flock and pattern against pater. Wallcoverings provided the print design, usually a quaint floral or festoons below ceiling moldings.

A more serious version of

the front parlor should probably be called a "drawing room." But here, quality is essential, and professional help is advised, especially as many of the materials required to do a French or English drawing room well--the fabrics and the wallcovering design from original documents -- might have to be purchased through a decorator.

For the contemporary and modern living room, there are wild options for avoiding plain walls. Large, bold swirls or oversized architectural designs are truly modern. They demand the plastics, both soft and firm, and see-throughs framed in silver and chrome arriving on the market from Europe and local manufacturers.

By skillful arrangement of furniture you can direct attention where you want, cause room traffic to flow where you want, and generally control the family design for living. Needless to say, a compartmented room would not presume to belong to a historical period, unless the period was distinctly modern. Indeed, if a room must serve more than one purpose, it should be frankly eclectic or else boldly contemporary. Neither of these ideas insists on subtle proportion or "correct" scale, and the avant-garde art of the moment leans strongly to optical illusions.



At Home In Parmer County

How much time does the average man spend taking care of his home?

About an hour and a half a day, or 11 hours each week. But, that amount doesn't appear to increase even when his wife decides to take an outside job.

A recent survey showed that husbands helped with cooking, marketing, and record keeping. Their housework of 11 hours was gauged against 51 hours for the full-time housewife. If the wife was employed outside the home, she still puts in 35 hours doing housework.

Teenagers in the survey gave nearly three hours a day to chores when their mother worked and two hours when she was at home.

GREEN BEANS
1 qt. green beans - heat - do not boil
Drain off juice and then add 3 T. salad dressing (according to taste)

Rabies Vaccine Clinic Here Friday, Feb. 19

A clinic to vaccinate all area pets for rabies will be held at the Farwell City Hall on Friday, Feb. 19, between the hours of 1:30 and 5:30 p.m. CST.

Both Texico and Farwell have ordinances stating that all pets kept within the city limits must have city tags, must be kept on the owner's property or must be kept on a leash. A New Mexico state law requires that all pets must receive a rabies vaccination at required intervals, and a similar law pertains to pets on the Texas side of the border.

Dr. B. L. Russell, Clovis veterinarian, will be on hand to administer the vaccine, and will be assisted by Mrs. Janie Bowery of Farwell and Mrs. Clara Wiehl of Texico in issuing city tags for pets kept within the city limits of either town.

Cost of the vaccine is \$2 and cost of the license tags is also \$2. All residents of the Twin Cities who have pets are urged to bring them to the clinic to have them inoculated against rabies.

Since several cases of rabies were reported in New Mexico during the past year, the Curry County Health Department has issued a list of precautions which should be taken concerning the disease. They read as follows:

Have all domestic animals three months or older vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian.

Domestic animals should be penned up or kept on a leash. Report all animal bites immediately whether wild or domestic, to the local health department.

Do not kill any animal which has bitten someone. It should be captured and observed.

Any animal which has bitten someone must be placed under observation for 10 days.

If your animal has been bitten by another animal that has been suspected of having rabies, contact the local health department immediately.

Contact the local health department if any animal behaves suspiciously or dies unexpectedly.

Clinics have also been set up in Clovis for February 20 and 27 at the Clovis Veterinary Hospital located at 2210 West 7th, and February 27 at the Northridge Animal Hospital, 2910 Prince.

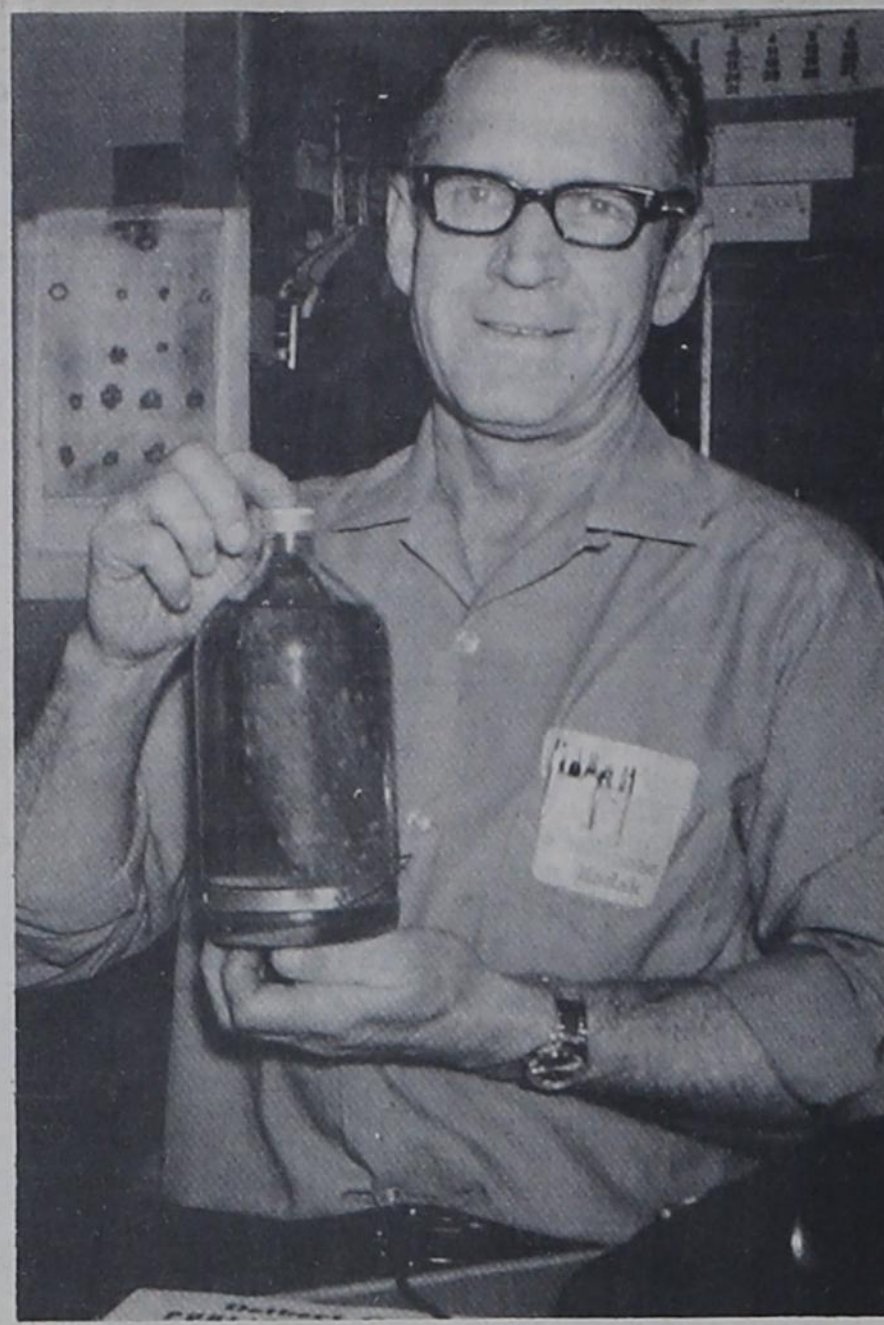

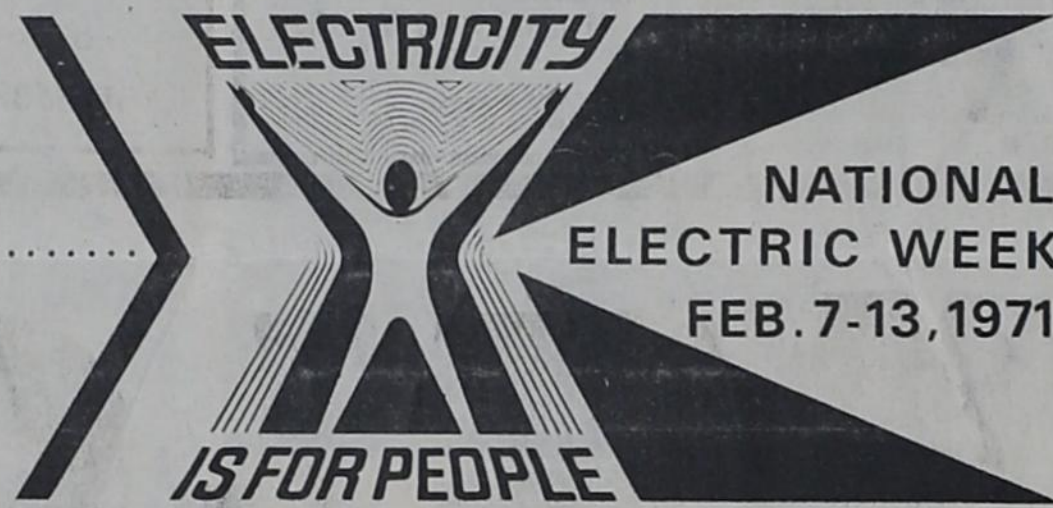

People are also susceptible to dry air. Touching metal objects produces static shock, and nasal passages feel dry. Also, one may feel cold even when the room temperature is high.

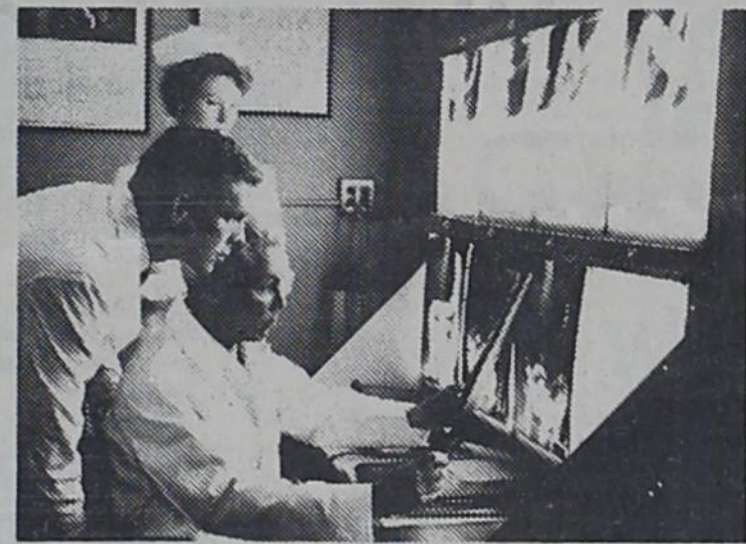

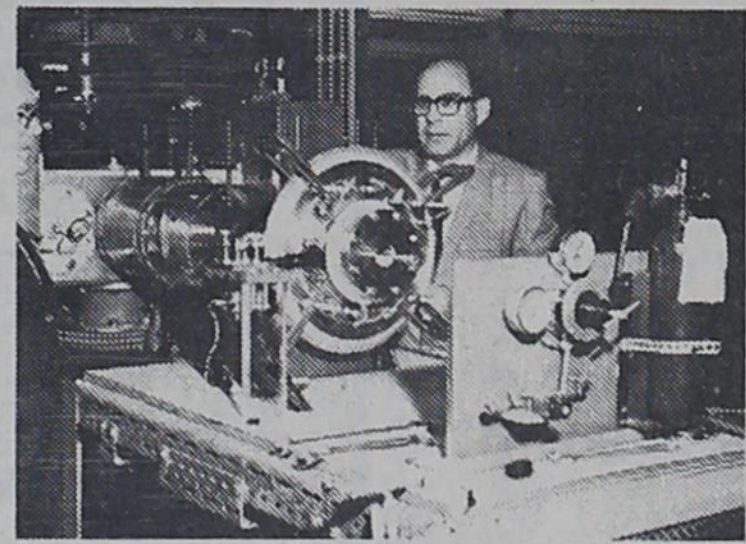

Portraying Area Homemakers

Mrs. Clarence (Clara Belle) Smith who makes her home near Pleasant Hill, north of Texico, is the area homemaker for this week.

Sunday mornings finds this lady keeping the nursery at the Texico Baptist Church where the Smiths are members. This voluntary job with the nursery is one she has held and enjoyed for seven or eight years.

Mrs. Smith graduated from Pleasant Hill where she particularly enjoyed playing basketball. She is still an avid sports fan and rarely misses a ball game at Texico School where daughter Patricia is a senior. Other children in the Smith family are Leon, who farms near the family home; and another daughter, Kathleen, who makes her home in Amarillo.

Although she is an excellent cook, Mrs. Smith says that cooking isn't as much fun now that most of her family has grown up and moved away from home. She lists sewing as her main hobby, but she still collects recipes, however; and is sharing some of her favorites with Tribune readers this week. Some of her best recipes are those which have been handed down, to her by her mother, Mrs. John Donahey, who now lives in Clovis.

3 eggs 3/4 cups sugar 3 T. flour 2 cups of milk dash of salt 1 t. vanilla 1 cup coconut Beat eggs, add sugar, flour, and milk. Cook until thick. Add vanilla and 3/4 cup coconut.

Never Fail Meringue

Mix in a small pan, 2 T. sugar, 1 T. corn starch, 1/2 cup water, and cook over low heat, stir until thick. Take off heat and put lid on and sit aside. The lid will keep it from getting thick. Beat 3 egg whites, pinch of salt until stiff. Then add 1/2 t. vanilla, 6 T. sugar. Add cornstarch mixture to whites. Put on pie, sprinkle remaining coconut (1/4 c.) and bake.

some nagging "something" that kept the roster down to six or seven.

To help neutralize the lack of height in his team, Scott employs a running game, feeling that if he can get the other team to run, his boys have a better chance. His slightly gray, crew-cut head bobbing up and down with the boys' every move is a familiar sight to local fans as is the ever-present notebook and pencil which he grabs during a time-out and quickly marks out a play. Or sometimes he just takes a piece of chalk and quickly diagrams a play on the floor. He spends the entire game coaching - physically, mentally and vocally - and somehow, a person can tell "he is getting through to the boys."

Scott says that if there would be one single thing he would want in a boy starting basketball under him, it would be "that he be from Farwell."

"These kids play with a great deal of desire and determination," he says, adding, "but they also play with a purpose, and that, to me, is the most important aspect."

"These kids work at the game on their own. They work out on weekends, during the summer and at any free time they may have, whether or not a coach is there urging them on," he says. He also notes, "these kids are tough--tough contenders, and they have confidence in themselves which is also a very important attribute."

"A team like this just won't hardly get beat," the coach comments, explaining, "they may run out of time in a game, but they just don't get beat too often."

In discussing this year's squad of eight members, who are all fairly short, Scott says that he believes this team is closer to each other as team members than any team he has coached and says this bunch has put out as much effort as any group he's ever had.

Folks around Farwell have become pretty used to having their boys win the district title, and when the team wins three or four in a row, the coach can't help but notice how the fans start looking 'way ahead to bi-district and bigger things, but Scott and his boys try to concentrate on one game at a time.
