### Meeting In Interest Of Air Base Is Held Wednesday

#### Lamesans Plan Visit To Lubbock To See Breedlove

A meeting of Lamesa business men was called for Wednesday afternoon at the District Court room for the purpose of discussing the proposed Air Training Base which will be located in this section.

Various plans were discussed by the group, and suggestions were offered as to how Lamesa might offer special inducements to have the base located here.

It was thought that the matter would have been settled before this time, but the inclement weather is blamed for the fact that Army men from Corpus Christi were unable to fly to Lamesa to inspect the site here, as well as other proposed sites over the South Plains.

It was decided at the meeting to get an audience with Mr. Breedlove, at Lubbock, today, for a group of Lamesans. If they are successful in contacting him they will go to the Hub City for an interview, to find out if there is anything new or if there is anything else that the citizens of Dawson County can do to secure the location of the base near Lamesa.

About one hundred men, representing almost all lines of business, along with the Mayor and members of the City Commission, County Judge and members of the Commissioners' Court, were present at the meeting, which was conducted by M. C. Lindsey, president of the Lamesa Rotary Club, and one who has worked hard for the securing of this project.

It is expected that some announcement will be forthcoming within a few days, as the project is expected to be ready to start training men not later than June 1. A large amount of construction work is necessary before the base could get in operation, regardless of where it is located.

#### Seven Men Will Be Inducted In Army April 2nd

The Dawson County Local Draft Board Wednesday issued a call for seven more Dawson County men, to be inducted into military service on Wednesday, April 2nd. A total of nine men will be called, but the last two are alternates.

It was also announced Wednesday that questionnaires have been sent to men with order numbers between 801 and 900 inclusive.

### NYA Woodwork Shop Here Shows Great Activity

The NYA Woodworking shop on North Second Street, in Lamesa, has been the scene of a great deal of activity for the past several days.

The youths are building eight double-deck beds for a girls project at Lubbock. The beds require the turning out of sixty-four legs. These were originally four inches square, and they have been turned out on their wood lathe into beautiful designs.

All of the work is done by the youths themselves, who work in 2 shifts daily. There twenty boys in each shift.

The local shop, under the supervision of X. R. Banks, is ranked among the best NYA shops in the entire state, not excluding those in the larger cities.

The youths are building a large variety of furniture, of various kinds, much of which will be used for projects here and elsewhere. They have also repaired desks and chairs for various tax supported institutions over the country.

The work they turn out must be for schools, cities, court houses, or other tax supported institutions, or various government sponsored projects.

Mr. Banks stated Wednesday that they expected to be called upon to do various work for army camps over the country as a part of the defense program.

They welcome visitors to their shop at all times, where they have a large amount of equipment, with more being added almost every week.

### Lester Gregg Is Selected As Head Coach In Only Action By Lamesa School Board

The following statement was issued last week by the Board of Trustees of the Lamesa School District:

"Mr. F. T. McCollum, who has been principal and football coach of Lamesa High School over a period of sixteen years has advised the School Board that the combined duties are more than one man can reasonably be expected to perform without some sacrifice of efficiency to some aspects of one of the assignments, and that the increased demands upon being principal because of increased enrollment with accompanying growth of curriculum problems and demands for time for administrative and supervisory duties that the two positions should be separated for Lamesa High School. He also stated that of the two positions he prefers to be principal rather than teacher and football coach. Mr. McCollum's re-election was announced recently.

"The Board of Trustees concurs in the recommendation and have taken steps to comply with authorization of the assignment of spring football training to Mr. Lester Gregg. Mr. Gregg has been designated head coach."

### ONLY GREGG ELECTED

Through a misinterpretation, the Courier erred when the impression was left in Monday's issue that the Lamesa School Board had elected Football Coaches, other than Lester Gregg as head football coach. This was the only election of a coach by the board, and the Courier is exceedingly sorry that it was wrong in interpreting the statement of the action of the school board.

The Courier hastes to apologize and takes full responsibility for the error, with the explanation that it was merely a misinterpretation of the facts as issued by the Board.

### More Than Three Inches Of Rain Falls In Month

Additional rain fell over this section Monday and Tuesday night to bring the total for the past ten days to 2.96 inches, according to figures released Wednesday night by the local weather bureau.

Up until last Saturday night the total had amounted to 2.01. The fall Monday night and Tuesday morning amounted to .60 inches, and an additional .35 inches fell Tuesday night. The fall for the month of March is above 3 inches.

This is the first time since records have been kept, which go back to 1911, that the rainfall in March has exceeded three inches, and in only three years out of all that time has the fall exceeded two inches.

In March 1919 the fall amounted to 2.69 inches; March 1934, 2.16 inches and in March 1937, 2.26 inches were recorded.

Dawson County has possibly the best underground season at this time of the year, in its history, according to old timers of this section.

Wednesday night the skies were still overcast, but the brisk north wind that blew up in the early hours of Wednesday morning scattered the clouds considerably, and late in the afternoon it appeared as if it might clear off.

### Champion Calf Is Among Finest Ever Shown Here

The Grand Champion Calf at the 4-H Club Boys Fat Stock Show held in Lamesa last week, was purchased last September from George McIntyre of Sterling City, by Dalton Adcock, club boy who fed him out.

The calf was fed on crushed maize, cottonseed meal, oats, alfalfa commercial sweet feed and sweet sorghum bundles.

He weighed 740 pounds when sold to Sam Richardson of Richardson Stores and dressed out 484 pounds, with a dressing percentage of 67 per cent hot, and 66 per cent cold. The calf stood only 43 inches high at the withers.

Benny Baskin, County Agent, stated this week that this was one of the finest calves he had ever had the opportunity of handling, and stated that judges of the show were high in their praise of the animal.

### Anti-Graft Drive Saves Merchants Many Thousands

A potential \$5,000 has been saved since January 1, 1941—since the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce developed a plan for the investigation of miscellaneous solicitations for donations and advertising and other types of promoting a slow-down of outside salesmen and promoters of all types has been noted by the business people of the city, according to a survey of the situation made recently.

Song book advertising, school curtain advertising and other promotions have been investigated by the secret committee to which each application for permission to solicit has been referred and an average of seven out of ten applications have been refused the records show to date.

Members of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce have placed themselves in agreement under a protective plan to have all solicitations investigated through the organization before they will listen to any proposition. A solicitor is directed to the organization offices when he propositions a merchant and there the solicitor must fill out a long application explaining the procedure of his project. Three copies of the application are made and referred to a secret committee of three men, who approve or disapprove the plan on the basis of its merit. If approval is indicated by the committee the applicant is provided with permission certificates from the office of the Chamber of Commerce, containing a brief summary of the plan dates on which the promoter is authorized to solicit, and the Chamber of Commerce official seal of approval.

It is estimated by the official office records that a potential saving of \$5,000 has already been accredited Lamesa merchants since January 1, 1941, because of their excellent cooperation with this program.

## Monday Is Last Day For Farm Classification

Since March 31, 1941, is the final  
date for reconstitution of farms, all  
Dawson County farm operators  
should be sure that all important  
changes, that have been made in  
their farming operations since 1940,  
are reported to the AAA office.

The County AAA Office has been  
advised by the State AAA Office  
that if farms are not properly con-  
stituted in 1941 the records will be  
checked and if it is found that  
farms are being operated contrary  
to regulations a reconstitution will  
be made of compliance.

Each farm should be covered by  
a single work sheet in accordance  
with the following definition of a

farm:  
(1) Farm means all adjacent or  
nearby farm land under the same  
ownership which is operated by one  
person, including also:

(a) Any other adjacent or nearby  
farmland which the county com-  
mittee, in accordance with instruc-  
tions issued by the AAA, determines  
is operated by the same person as  
part of the same unit with respect  
to the rotation of crops and with  
workstock, farm machinery, and  
labor substantially separate from  
that for any other land; and

(b) Any field-rented tract (whether  
operated by the same or an-  
other person) which, together with  
any other lands included in the  
farm, constitutes a unit with re-  
spect to the rotation of crops.  
It is important that the county  
office know all 1941 operators, land-  
lords and sharecroppers before ap-  
plication for parity payments are  
made.

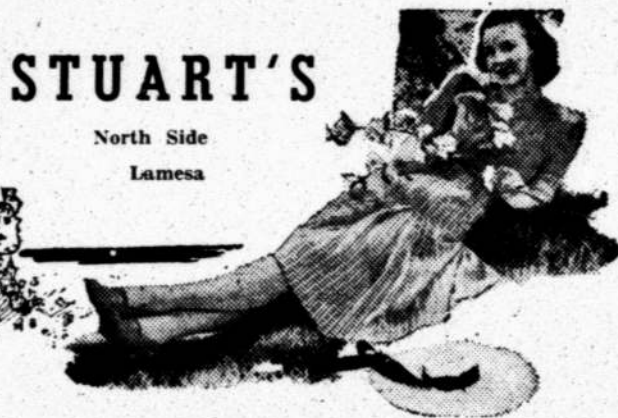

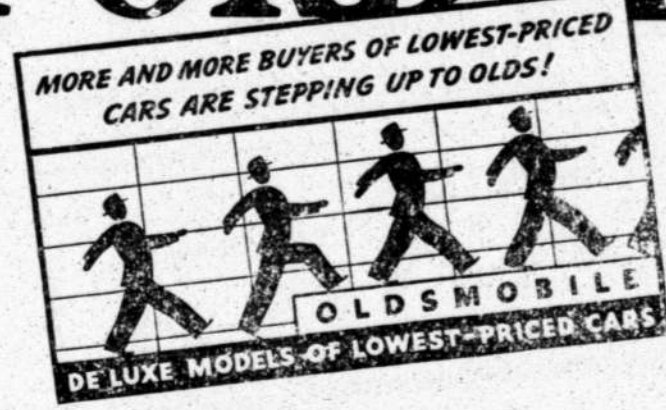

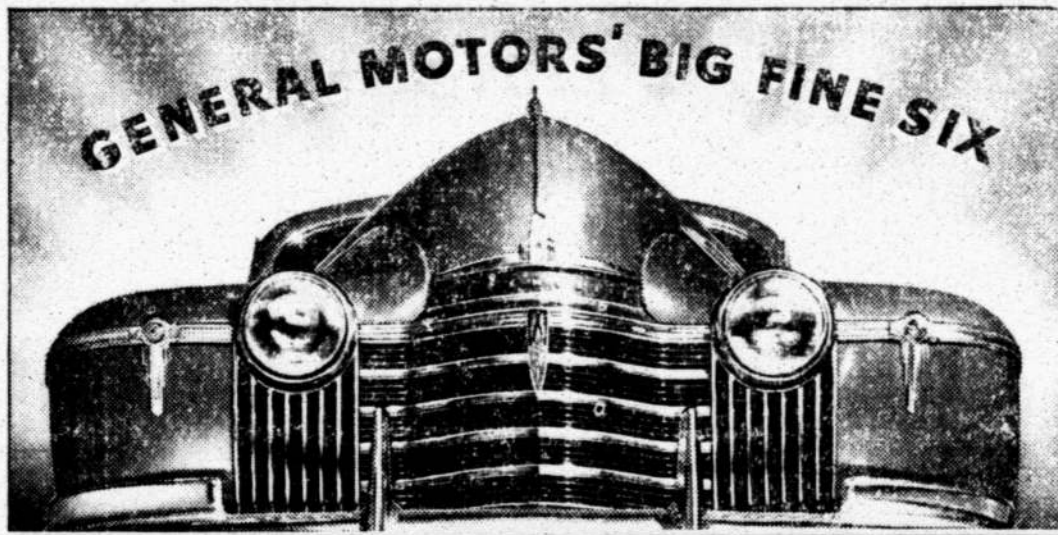
