50,000 GERMANS FALL TO FRENCH IN NIGHT'S FIGHT

PARIS, May 5.—All news from the front today is good news. The most violent fighting continued throughout last night in the Champagne region, but at every point the French report success. Counter attacks made by the Germans with a large number of troops in fresh divisions have been checked, says official reports. More than fifty thousand German soldiers were taken prisoners by the French on the Champagne front last night, and the French succeeded in routing the Germans at other places.

EIGHTEEN AUTOS BURN AT BROWNWOOD.

Fire destroyed Petty Bros. Motor Co., at Brownwood Friday morning causing a loss of more than \$25,000, other property adjoining the motor company being damaged. The Ben Horton pool hall also burned, causing a loss of \$4,000. Gilliam Bros. dry goods store was damaged and Martin O. Curry's jewelry store was damaged to the extent of more than \$500. The fire broke out about three o'clock Friday morning from some unknown cause.

Eighteen cars and a Ford were burned in the Petty Bros. building. All were brand new except the Ford. The inventory of the cars and their value follows: Two Paiges, valued at \$1250 each; three Studebakers valued at \$1065 each; one Overland valued at \$865; one Overland valued at \$925; one Maxwell Sedan valued at \$1040, and ten Maxwells valued at \$720 each. Total value \$15,725. Each car, except the Ford, was insured at the factory price, so that the net loss will be the freight and cost of handling the machines.

\$1,000,000 FOR BORDER PROTECTION

AUSTIN, Tex., May 5.—The special session has before it consideration of an appropriation to provide additional protection for 900 miles of land border and 700 miles of gulf border of the state. Governor Ferguson, is requesting the \$1,000,000 appropriation for strengthening the national guard stated specifically that the money was needed to place the state in a strong position. "Texas perhaps, might be exposed to more danger than any other state in the Union," declared the governor. "I feel sure that I voice the sentiments of each true Texan when I say that the people of our Lone Star state are willing to do more than their part to cooperate to the last dollar in this grave situation as it is possible and practicable.

TO TAKE OVER SHIP BUILDING

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Yielding to the international pressure for merchant ships to be used in transporting supplies to the allies, the administration has prepared a new bill, authorizing the president to take over all ship yards and ship building material on hand to be used in the construction of ships. The bill will be introduced Monday, Senator Fletcher stated today. Mr. Fletcher drafted the new bill and it is said to be the most drastic of the kind ever presented to congress. The bill provides that the president be not only empowered to commandeer all ships and shipyards, but all steel and lumber, and everything else entering the construction of ships.

Democrats Rule In Russia After An All Night Session

KAISER IS SHORN OF PRIVILEGES

AMSTERDAM, May 5.—The German constitutional committee appointed by the Reichstag for a revision of the imperial power granted the German emperor, voted in effect to continue Germany's present monarchical system of government. Democratic government was given a complete shut off, according to the interpretation put upon the news reports from Berlin today.

The first move towards curtailing the kaiser's power in Germany was taken recently by an appointed constitutional committee of the Reichstag, according to dispatches received here from Berlin today. The committee voted to amend the German constitution so hereafter decrees and ordinances issued by the kaiser must be countersigned by the imperial chancellor, who becomes in turn responsible to the Reichstag.

MORE MONEY FOR FRENCH AND BRITISH

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The American government announced today that further loans equaling one hundred and twenty-five million dollars would be made to Great Britain and France. A twenty-five million loan was closed with British representatives today and a one hundred million loan to France will be consummated within a few days.

BUSY WEEK FOR FARM DEMONSTRATOR

The United States Agricultural Department, under which department all farm demonstration work is carried on, requires all farm agents to make weekly reports. Blanks are furnished each agent for this purpose, and many people would be surprised to know what a close tab the department keeps on the work being done by the respective agents.

The agent's weekly report must show how he spends his time each day in the week. He must show the name of the community visited, for what purpose, and the result. He must report the names of farmers called on, and for what purpose, as well as reporting what particular line of farm work the farmer visited is engaged in. His report must show the number of miles traveled, the number of callers received at his office, the number of letters written, number of crop bulletins mailed out, and quite a lot of other information. The blanks furnished to all agents for making reports call for all this information as well as providing a blank for general remarks, or summary of the work.

Through the kindness of Demonstrator Eaton, we had the pleasure of seeing a copy of his report made to the department this week, and to note the rapid headway gained since coming here only a few weeks ago in getting the work revived in this county. After filling out the hundred and one answers to questions asked on the weekly report blank, Mr. Eaton makes a summary of his work, as follows:

Monday, in company with Capt. Sayers we spent the day in laying out and supervising the structure of a model terrace and the lines on 34 acre farm.

Tuesday, we spent in visiting the farmers and orchardist of S. Ballinger. We find the fruit trees in a very bad state resulting from a general attack of root knot. This has spread to practically all trees making the industry very unpromising.

Wednesday in company with the local editor of the Miles Messenger we visited the model dairy and stock farm of Hunton & Son, where we found one of the best dairy herds in this section. Also a home butter plant where he makes ninety pounds of butter per week which is sold under annual contract to Carlisbad Sanatorium, near San Angelo. He also has thoroughbred poultry and sheep. His farm is named Clendale Stock Farm.

On this trip we visited also Paul Gerhardt who is Leghorn poultry breeder, where we found 175 laying hens, record layers, and 800 baby chicks. His egg account last year was better than \$200 and this year to date has sold poultry and eggs to the amount of \$400.

Thursday was spent largely in field work among farmers visiting the secretaries of two local farmers' organizations with the view of putting through some marketing propositions along the lines of poultry and hogs. Also prepared program for local farmers' meeting for May 14, Ballinger.

Friday, in company with County Supt. Hagan we visited a farmers meeting for school betterment purpose, planning a new school building and other community work. On our trip we made three addresses two to schools and one to farmers. At night we met with the citizens of Poe school community effecting a local farmer's club. Mr. Benton was with us at night.

ENGINE ON TROOP TRAIN EXPLODES

DALLAS, Tex., May 5.—Three men were probably fatally injured today, when an engine blew up attached to a troop train at Wills Point, Texas.

The train was moving over the Texas & Pacific. A new engine was substituted for the damaged locomotive, so the troops will be moved with slight delay.

Cause of the accident is given as the crown sheet in the engine holding the water above the fire box dropping out, thereby causing an explosion. No troopers were injured.

Engineer Arthur Carrol, Fireman Caddis, and Brakeman Starkey, all of Longview, were injured. The three wounded men are at St. Paul's sanitarium here, where they were brought in a special train from the scene of the explosion.

Several people were wounded last night when shots were fired in numerous clashes in an attack made on the adherents of the pro-German agitators by the soldiers and workmen. Fighting and rioting broke out when the adherents of Nicholas Lenin socialist, separate peace advocate, sought to address a crowd which was swarming the streets. The riots are separate from the disturbances of the past two days which were directed against the provisional government.

Although it appears on the surface that the situation of the past two days has been cleared considerably, a statement by the provisional government ministry affirming complete acquiescence of yesterday's declaration by Foreign Minister Milukoff, indications are that there remains an acute crisis between the provision Duma leaders and the soldiers and workmen delegates.

Foreign Minister Milukoff stated again that under no conditions would Russia make separate peace with Germany, but would stand by all obligations and pledges made to the allies.

PETROGRAD, May 5.—After two days of continuous cheering, muttering and postling by mobs surging back and forth in a demonstration approaching perilously near organized riots, the provisional democratic government has apparently succeeded in re-establishing itself. In an all night meeting of the Duma last night the new government apparently succeeded in smoothing out all the differences between the Duma and the soldiers and workmen's delegates. In the mean time the temper of the surging crowds has perceptibly changed, the yelled impreccations against the ministers quieted by cheers for a democratic Russia. Twenty-five thousand people jammed the streets around Marinsky palace throughout the night, but when informed of the agreement reached between the provisional heads and the soldiers and workmen's committee they greeted the announcement with wild applause and dispersed.

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PRESIDENT SLIPS IN ON CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, May 5.—President and Mrs. Wilson visited the capitol this morning to be present at the visit of the British commissioners to the house. The president and his wife arrived without being noticed, slipping into the presidential section of house gallery. It was the first time on record that the president ever went into the gallery of the house to witness house proceedings. Mr. Wilson sat in his seat for five minutes before he was noticed. When seen the lid was literally blown off by members of the house and visitors in the gallery with wild

School Board Fills All Places for 1917-18 Term

The school board of the Ballinger Independent District held a lengthy session Friday afternoon, being in session for more than three hours. Most of the time was taken up in discussing plans for the 1917-18 term of the city schools, very little time being required in selecting a faculty. Perfect harmony prevailed throughout the meeting, and balloting on all questions acted upon was unanimous.

It will be remembered that an inspector from the state department of education recently visited the school and made certain recommendations, and these were discussed at the meeting held Friday. In order to maintain its affiliation with the State university the inspector said that better equipment was necessary in the high school. Since the inspector's visit some of his recommendations have been carried out by the addition of reference books to the school library, and we are glad to note that other improvements will be made by private donations and subscriptions and the school kept up to a standard.

In the election of a faculty for the next term the board cuts out one teacher, and re-elects all the

FEEDING THE POOR BIG JOB IN ENGLAND

LONDON, April 17—(By Mail)—Mrs. David Lloyd George, wife of the British Premier, has changed "Paddy's Goose," for years London's most notorious public house, into England's first communal "War Kitchen." Mrs. Page, wife of the American ambassador, participated in the opening ceremony and received a warm reception when she introduced the East End poor to American cereals for the first time.

"Lyceum," another ill-famed English "pub", on Miles End Road has also been opened to the poor, and a third, "The Crown," where 17,000 hot dinners are served out daily, is in full swing.

Although intended to relieve the food shortage and suffering resulting among the East End poor, England's new communal "War Kitchens" are by no means charitable institutions.

"From the very beginning," Mrs. Lloyd George said, "we have sought not to make this movement another outlet for charity. It is not our intention to give away free meals, but, at the same time, we hope to supply our meals at such prices as will be a real help."

Expressing her confidence that this East End example would be followed throughout the country, the wife of the Premier, welcomed over 200 first-day customers to the new kitchen.

"I don't know any more economical way than this," she said, "of saving food and at the same time giving good nourishing food to children of the poor districts. We want to save all the boys and
