Robert Wheatley, 51, prominent Haskell businessman, and civic worker, passed away on Thursday, July 2nd at 4:30 a. m. in Parkland Hospital, Dallas, where he had been a patient one week.

Mr. Wheatley was critically injured in a fiery pick-up crash on Highway 84 near an overpass north of Abilene at 7:10 p. m., Wednesday, June 24th. He was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene and the following day entered the Dallas Hospital.

Funeral services were held at 4:00 p. m., Friday, at the First United Methodist Church here, with Rev. H. O. Abbott, pastor, and Rev. Troy Culpepper, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Haskell, officiating. Holden-McCauley Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements, and interment was in Willow Cemetery.

A Haskell resident since 1925, Wheatley was born February 10th, 1919, in Midlothian, Texas. He married Edith Malone September 12th, 1942, in Garland, Texas.

Mr. Wheatley was a member of the Haskell First United Methodist Church, and was secretary of the Friendly Fellows Sunday School Class. He was a member of the Haskell Masonic Lodge No. 862 and was a 32nd Degree Mason; charter member of the Haskell Rotary Club; member and vice-president of the school board. He was a graduate of Haskell High School and A&M University.

Mr. Wheatley taught at the Veterans Vocational School for a number of years. His wife, Edith, and one daughter, Robin, of the home; his father, Claude Wheatley, of Haskell, and one sister, Mrs. V. S. Payne, of Gainesville.

Heavy Agenda On Docket At C of C Officers And Directors Meeting

Officers and directors of the chamber of commerce met at 7 a. m., Tuesday, July 7th, at Felker's Restaurant for a regular business session.

First Vice-President C. O. Holt presided in the absence of President Bob Philpot who was out of town on business.

The agenda included minutes of the last meeting which were read by the manager and approved along with the monthly financial statement.

Mrs. Sue Fincher, chairman of the recent Hey-Day Pageants, reported that a few bills were still out and that she could not give a definite financial report but reported that something over \$1900 total income from the sponsors of the contestants and admission fees had been received.

The manager advised board members that the stage which had to be erected in the theatre each year was costing much more over a period of years than it would be to purchase the lumber which has always been loaned by Brazleton Lumber Company. Board members voted to divide the cost four ways to include the use of the stage by Lane-Felker Frontier Days, Queen Reveille and two nights of Hey-Day, and they leave the stage as a permanent structure for future productions.

Other business included a report by the manager that the sheds over the Bar-B-Que pits in the overnight trailer park, Wayne Dilbeck, J. C. Yeary and manager Rex Felker, had been completed to include

enlargement and painting by Anderson Construction Company and that the two highway signs would be erected within the next few days.

Wayne Dilbeck, caretaker of the museum and trailer park, was a guest for the board meeting. He advised that some tourists were passing up the park and that it could be possible that it was due to a lack of electric drops for them to use with air conditioning and other appliances. 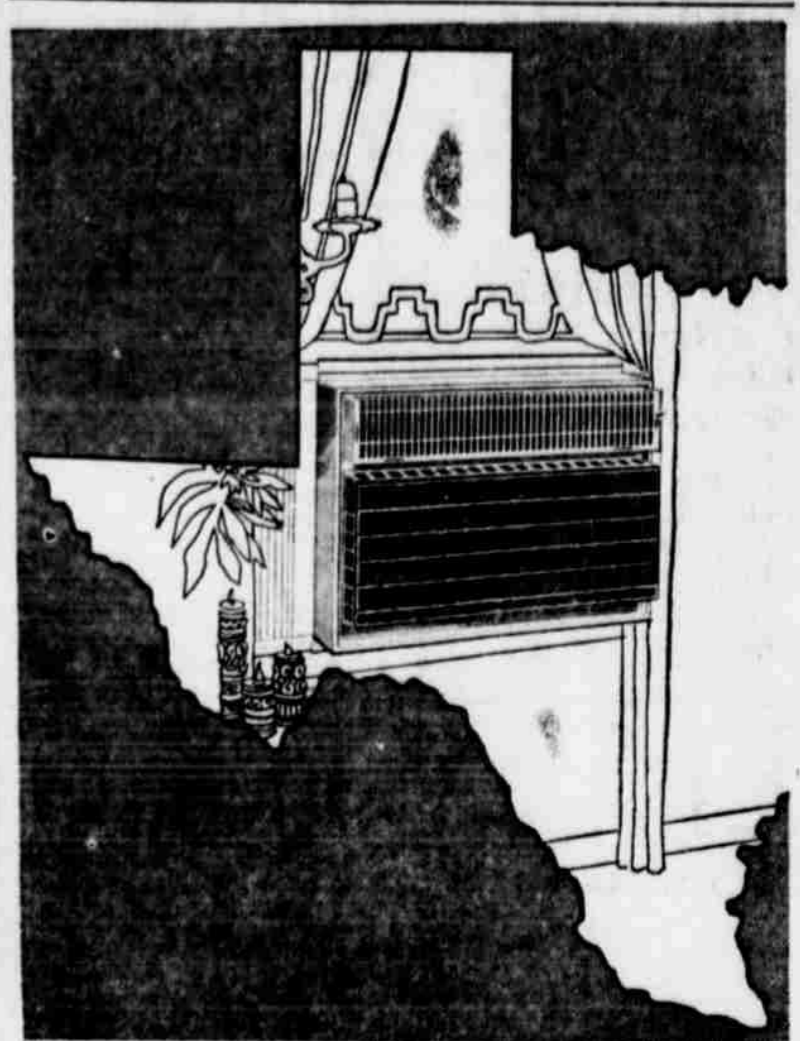

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

The 1969 Tax Reform Act contained a change that can be important to many taxpayers. Under the old law you could decrease your withholding tax for the following year if your itemized deductions for the past year ran high enough to create a large refund.

A good example of what can happen was brought out by the tornado and storm victims in West Texas. Many of these taxpayers are eligible to immediately reduce the amount of tax withheld from their pay, since their itemized deductions for the 1970 tax year will include a casualty loss amounting to several thousand dollars.

Archaeological Expedition Seeking Knowledge of Ancient Indian People

A six-member Northern Arizona University archaeological expedition left Flagstaff recently for the rugged, remote Navajo Mountain country near the Arizona-Utah border seeking new knowledge of an ancient Indian people who lived in the area almost 8,000 years ago.

The surprising antiquity of this otherwise little-known culture, NTU archaeologist Dr. J. Richard Ambler revealed, is known from hitherto unpublished radio-active carbon-14 dates obtained from fragile fragments of fiber sandals fashioned 5,000 to 6,000 years before the birth of Christ.

The dates, he added, are the oldest yet found for a human occupation in the northern Arizona area, and almost double the 4,000-year time depth for its prehistoric population established in the early 1960s from the curious split twig animal figurines that have been found deep in the Grand Canyon and in Walnut Canyon just to the east of Flagstaff.

The sandals, Ambler explained, were recovered from small, shallow Dust Devil Cave north and east of Navajo Mountain in test excavations which he conducted in 1961 as a staff member of the five-year Glen Canyon salvage archaeology project

Tax Questions And Answers

(This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.)

Q I'm moving in a few weeks and my refund hasn't come. What should I do?

A If your refund does not come before you move, notify your postmaster of your new address so your refund can be forwarded. Lack of an up-to-date mailing address is a major cause of delayed refunds.

Q Do you have to itemize deductions to claim moving expenses?

A No, you may take the standard deduction and still claim your moving expenses. To do this, complete Form 9903 and enter the total on line 15b of Form 1040. Be sure to attach Form 9903 to your return.

Q My wife died last year. Can I still file a joint return?

A Yes, a joint return may be filed by the surviving spouse for the year in which the death occurred and an exemption for the decedent taken on the return. You may also be entitled to the benefits of a joint return rate for the two years after your spouse's death. This is explained in the 1040 instructions.

Q Can I deduct any part of my dues to a charitable organization as a contribution?

A Dues paid to qualified organizations are deductible as contributions to the extent they exceed the value of membership services or privileges received in return. Any contributions you make to their fundraising appeals, however, may qualify.

Q How do I figure my tax surcharge?

A If your tax is less than \$735, you may determine the amount of surcharge you owe from the Surcharge Tables on Page T-1 of the 1040 instructions package. For a tax of \$735 and over, multiply the tax by 10 percent to figure the surcharge.

Q My wife and I are filing separate returns. Can I itemize while she takes a standard deduction?

A No, on separate returns each must use the same method of handling deductions. If one of you itemizes, then both must itemize deductions.

VA Questions And Answers

EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q When must veterans and dependents receiving pensions return the income questionnaires received with their October checks?

A Jan. 15 was the deadline. Anyone who has not returned his questionnaire should do so immediately as required by law. Assistance in completing questionnaires may be obtained from the nearest VA office.

Q I am thinking of selling my home which I purchased with a G. I. loan that is not yet paid in full. If the buyer

defaults, will I be liable to the Veterans Administration? Can I be released from such liability?

A Yes, to both questions. However, the VA may release you only if the buyer assumes full liability for repayment. If such a release is approved, you will not be liable for default by the buyer. Before signing the sales contract, ask the VA office which guaranteed your loan for forms and instructions for release from personal liability.

Q I borrowed on my GI insurance, and wish to start paying off the loan with monthly payments. How do I do this?

A Make your check or money order payable to the Veterans Administration, and mail it to the VA office where you pay your premiums. Give your insurance number and specify that the payment is to be applied to your loan.

Q My mother receives a pension from the Veterans Administration because of the death of my father, a World War I veteran. She has been in a nursing home for the past

four months. I recently learned that she may be entitled to an additional \$50 per month because she is in a nursing home. Is this correct?

A Yes. Have your mother submit evidence that she is a patient in the nursing home, and the VA will be able to make the additional award. (In fact, if VA determines such a person requires the aid and attendance of another person, she will be eligible for this payment even if she is not in a nursing home.)

Q My husband is permanently and totally disabled as a result of injuries suffered during World War II. Is my son entitled to assistance in securing a college education?

A Both you and your son may qualify for this assistance which is given to wives and children of certain totally disabled veterans whose disabilities are the result of military service. After receiving counseling at the expense of the VA, each of you may be entitled to educational allowances for 36 months. Contact your VA regional office for specific information.

Special Board Meeting Held By Farm Bureau

Haskell County Farm Bureau is currently involved in a statewide effort to evaluate current organization programs on the state and county level and establish goals and priorities, according to John Paul Perrin of Haskell, president. In a special board meeting held July 1st in Haskell, the local Farm Bureau directors adopted a resolution committing themselves to the "leadership of other county Farm Bureaus in a joint effort to up-grade and strengthen the organization's program to better serve the needs of farm and ranch families." The board also voted to send President Perrin as a representative to a special statewide meeting of county presidents August 27-28 in Brownwood. The purpose of this conference is to chart a recommended course of action for the Farm Bureau. All of the 203 organized county Farm Bureaus in Texas are holding special board meetings this summer to evaluate current programs and set goals. President Perrin said. A summary report of these meetings will be presented to all of the county presidents at Brownwood. In addition, they will consider a special report that is to be prepared by agricultural specialists in the land grant system on trends in farm production, marketing, etc. Recommendations on what the Farm Bureau Organization should do on both state and county levels are expected to come from the Brownwood meeting.
