

Lockney Troop Wins Swim Meet

Lockney Boy Scout Troop No. 59 won the Scout swimming meet here last Thursday night, gathering in 359 points to 214 for Troop 64 of Floydada.

Scoutmaster Arthur Barker Jr.'s boys won every event in the junior contests, but Troop 64 was able to split up the honors in the intermediate and seniors contests.

In the junior events, Dorsey Baker won first place, Jimmie Williams second and Jimmie Scott third in the following events: side stroke, back stroke, breast stroke, free style. In addition Dorsey won first in the plain dive and the jackknife with Jimmie Scott winning second in both events and first in the swan dive. Jimmie Williams placed fourth in the plain dive, third in the jack knife and second in the swan dive. Glen McLeod won fourth place in the breast stroke and third in the plain dive.

In the intermediate divisions Billie Stowe won first in the breast stroke, second in the free style, second in the plain dive, second in the jackknife and first in the optional dive. Norton Baker won first in the plain dive, first in the swan dive, fourth in the side stroke, third in the back stroke, third in the breast stroke, third in the free style. Ronald Reecer won first in the jack knife, second in the back stroke, fourth in the breast stroke, first in the free style, fourth in the plain dive, second in the swan dive. Orland Gilbert won third in the free style.

In the seniors events, Tip Jeffcoat tied for first in the side stroke, won first in the free style, second in the back stroke, tied for first in the breast stroke, second in the plain dive, third in the jackknife. 26-Year-Olds Are Required To Register

AUSTIN.—Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, Texas Selective Service director, said Saturday that veterans as well as other men now under 26 years of age are required to register for the draft.

This does not necessarily mean they will be drafted, however, he said. Also, he said, men of draft age who registered under the 1940 Selective Service law are required to register again under the 1948 act.

General Berry listed these groups as being exempted from registration. Members of the armed forces on active duty, including members of the Coast and Geodetic Survey and the Public Health Service.

Cadets of the U. S. Military Academy and Coast Guard Academy. Midshipmen of the U. S. Naval Academy.

Foreign diplomats and consular representatives and members of their families.

Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, state director of Texas Selective Service Boards, has announced that authority to set up as many registration points as they think necessary will be given members of the local boards.

The procedure in carrying out registration from August 30, through September 18, was contained in instructions sent to members of the state's 137 local boards.

Registration For Draft Will Begin August 30th

Registration for the military service draft will begin on August 30th with the 25 year olds registering first. It was announced this week. In Floyd County men will register either at Lockney or Floydada. Draft Board Chairman Jim Willson said last week, unless another community specially requests a registration place.

Registering will be at the Legion Hall in Floydada and at The Beacon office in Lockney.

Floyd County is part of Selective Service Board No. 45 with the counties of Hale, Motley and Swisher. Swisher County was just recently added to the board. Plainview is headquarters for the board.

Texas is expected to register slightly over a half a million men. Local estimates on Floyd County vary from 700 to 900.

Governor Beauford Jester announced this week registration days for each age group. They are as follows:

1. Persons born in 1922 after Aug. 30, 1922, will register on Monday, Aug. 30.

2. Persons born in 1923 will register on Tuesday, Aug. 31, or Wednesday, Sept. 1.

3. Persons born in 1924 will register on Thursday, Sept. 2, or Friday, Sept. 3.

4. Persons born in 1925 will register on Saturday, Sept. 4, or Tuesday, Sept. 7.

5. Persons born in 1926 will register on Wednesday, Sept. 8, or Thursday, Sept. 9.

6. Persons born in 1927 will register on Friday, Sept. 11.

7. Persons born in 1928 will register on Monday, Sept. 13, or Tuesday, Sept. 14.

8. Persons born in 1929 will register on Wednesday, Sept. 15, or Thursday, Sept. 16.

9. Persons born in 1930 before Sept. 19, 1930, will register on Friday, Sept. 17, or Saturday, Sept. 18.

10. Persons born on or after Sept. 19, 1930, will register on the day they are 18 years of age, or five days after.

According to the proclamation, men may register late only when prevented by circumstances beyond their control. Men of registration age in foreign countries must present themselves for registration within five days after returning to the U. S. or its possessions.

City Calls For Clean-Up Day

A call was issued by the city officials of Lockney last week for a thorough clean-up of all residential and business premises in Lockney in an effort to forestall an outbreak of Polio.

Acting on the suggestions of the State Health Department, the officials urged that all weeds be cut, all trash be either burned or piled in the alley for removal, and that DDT be used, to liberally spray the premises in order to kill flies and other insects.

City officials said this week that some people had complied with the city's request for an extensive and thorough clean-up for which the city wishes to express their appreciation and they trust that others will follow the lead that has been set. Requests had been made that the business houses close for one day for a clean-up campaign but it was thought the clean up could be accomplished without it but after making a survey of the business and residential section of the city the officials agreed that the clean-up campaign could not be accomplished without a clean-up day with all places of business remaining closed until 1 o'clock. This day has been set for next Tuesday morning, August 24, from 7:00 a. m. to 1 p. m.

Every one is asked to clean-up their own premises and if they have time to help clean up some vacant lot or alley. Immediately after the clean-up campaign the city is going to be sprayed again. It is hoped that a date for the spraying might be announced in order for those who wish may hang blankets and winter clothing on clothes lines if they so desire. It is sincerely hoped that all residents will lend their cooperation in this clean-up campaign.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS

Veterans planning to get under the wire in buying surplus property before end of the War Assets Administration priority system August 31 will benefit from attending new sales planned for August. Latest Texas sale announced by the regional office will involve eight lots of materials at two San Antonio locations. Items offered will include flying glasses, infra red lamps, and some very good used office equipment, an air compressor, magnaflex machine and photograph equipment. Inspection may be made at Kelley Field and Fort Sam Houston Thursday, August 26. The sale, by bidding will be held at WAA warehouse, 610 S. Flores St., San Antonio, on August 27.

Surplus housing is again available to Texas at both sealed bid and on the spot War Assets sales of camp buildings. Biggest offering will be approximately 2,000 structures to be marketed at the Camp Shelby, Mississippi, location August 24, 25 and 26. It will be an auction-type, cash and carry procedure. Another non-priority offering includes a dental clinic, barracks, mess halls, administration and other structures making up a total of 6 at Amarillo and Childress Air Fields. Bids are invited on special forms which may be secured from the Grand Prairie office of real property disposal. Deadline for this sale will be September 3.

World War II veterans are again reminded of their opportunity to purchase 17 government vehicles by submitting written bids at the WAA office August 20. Several of the machines are at the Temple VA hospital with others near Dallas, Midland, El Paso and McGregor. Bids must be accompanied by a 25 per cent deposit. The awards will be made at the Customer Service Center of the Grand Prairie office beginning at 10 a. m. August 20.

An unexpected withdrawal of about \$900,000 worth of surplus hand tools at Camp Bowie, Brownwood, brought about cancellation of a War Assets sale there planned for August 20. The tools were claimed by Army Ordnance for national defense needs. Meanwhile, sufficient utility facilities for a Texas town were going on sale at this camp. This utilities include water, telephone, gas and electrical systems. The period for priorities will expire August 27, following which remaining materials will be offered on a non-priority basis.

The War Assets Administration's southwest region will undergo another contraction August 31. One result will be the closing of WAA offices at both San Antonio and Houston which have been in continuous operation since 1944. Staffs at both cities have declined from upwards of 750 to skeleton forces, matching the dwindling of available surplus property in the

areas. The newest contraction is another step in the agency's march toward liquidation by February 28. A Customer Service Center will continue to be maintained at Grand Prairie for the state of Texas.

Eleven days before expiration of veterans preference in the purchase of surplus property, former servicemen of World War II will have a chance to buy 17 trucks, trailers and passenger cars. Sale will be by written bids, with the public bid opening to be held at the Grand Prairie WAA Customer Service Center on August 20. From one to four vehicles may be inspected at each of the following locations: Love Field, Dallas; Public Housing Project, Midland; Custom Patrol Office, El Paso, and the Bluebonnet Ordnance Plant, McGregor. Seven machines, including a sedan, jeep and pickup, are located at the Veteran's Hospital, Temple. Mailed bids must be accompanied by a 25 per cent deposit and a copy of a military discharge.

Another community has taken steps to attract new industry by the acquisition of government owned real estate. This week the War Assets Administration announced sale of the 12 acre commercial area of the former Tonkawa, Oklahoma, prisoner of war camp to the City of Tonkawa for \$10,000 cash. Tonkawa Mayor E. G. See announced that resale of the property will involve the employment of local veterans for conversion of the area to use by private industry.

Detailed compilation of figures by War Assets disclosed this week that government-owned personal property originally costing \$677,241,331.99 has been disposed of in the five state area of the southwest since start of the program in June, 1943. Specific recovery figures on this total are not yet available, but taking a national average, of slightly more than 30 percent in realization over the four year period, the government would have received \$205,204,123.59 in sales. For Texas alone, personal property costing \$385,405,089.77 has been disposed of.

Two tracts of land at surplus installations in Texas are available for acquisition by priority claimants. Slightly more than 386 acres located at Palacios Army Airfield on the Gulf Coast are to be disposed of by War Assets Administration to federal agencies, state and local governments, or non-profit institutions. Cut-off date for applications has been set by the regional office as August 23. A small arms firing range located at Fort Bliss

near El Paso is also being offered. Included are 1948 acres and one building. Priorities on this disposal will expire August 24.

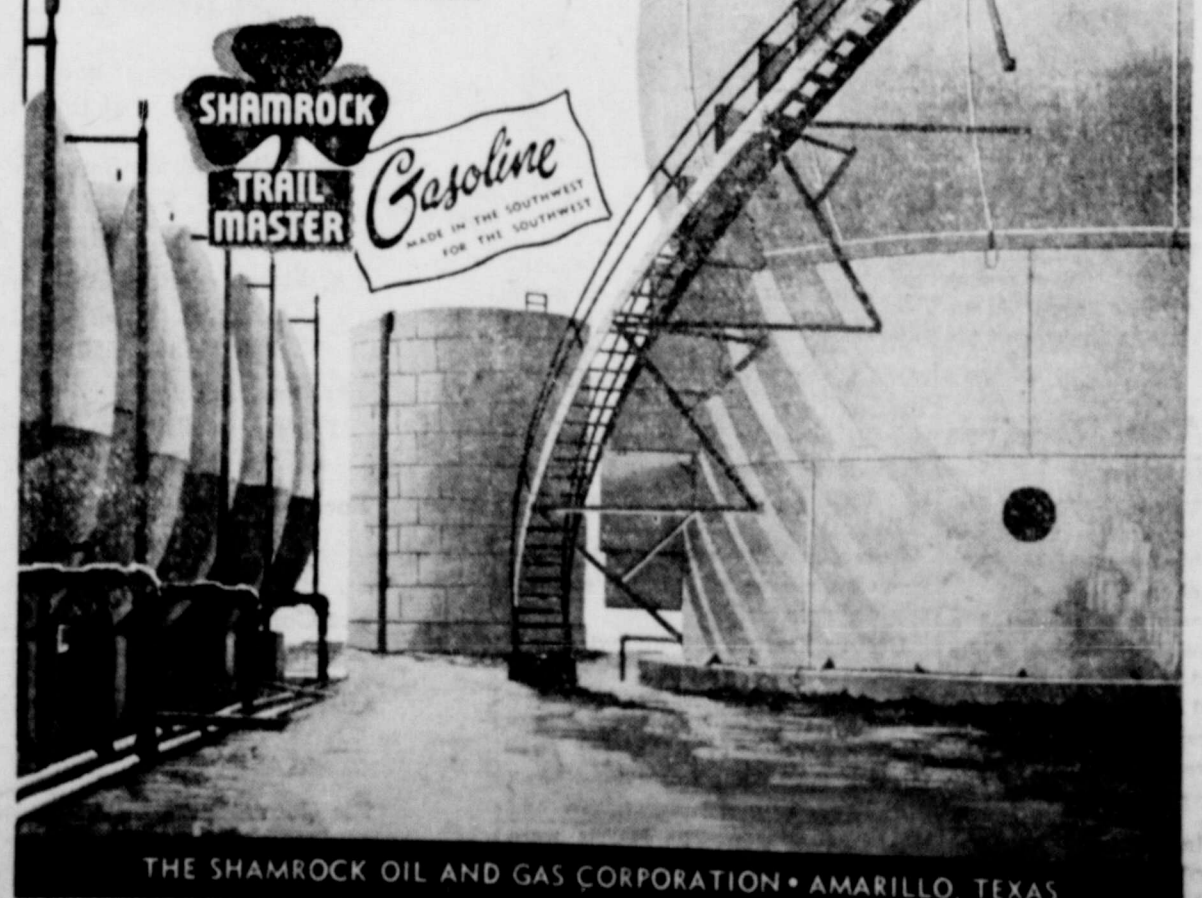

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes, providing the effective date, providing for the submission of said amendment to a vote of the qualified voters at an election and providing for necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 13, and 14 be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:
"Section 13. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes."
Section 14. Provided, however, the terms of this Resolution shall not be effective unless House Joint Resolution No. 24 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this Resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes," and
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties and other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 36
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section to be designated as "Section 40" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees, providing for the Governor, the election, and submission to the electors.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 39, to be designated "Section 40" to read as follows:
"Section 40. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance plan, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

DANGEROUS AND USELESS

A return to price control and rationing of food would be both dangerous and useless, in the opinion of C. C. Procure, president of the National Association of Retail Grocers. "Reimposition of these controls," he went on, "would cause the worst gigantic black market of history to come into existence, thus preventing orderly operation of our economy and removing supplies from the legitimate channels through which they should flow."

Loss of Farm Stored Wheat Due to Insects

COLLEGE STATION—In the past, some farmers have lost as much as one out of eight bushels of wheat stored on the farm.

Stored-grain insect losses are lower if wheat is dry and the bins have been cleaned and disinfected, says Paul Gregg, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College.

But with dry wheat and disinfected bins, you haven't done everything to reduce the grain losses. This is only the beginning. Most important of all is to keep the insects out once you have rid the clean bins of them.

By inspecting the bins frequently, you can see whether any insects have flown or crawled into the filled grain bin. If you do find newcomers, you can kill them with a mixture of three parts of ethylene dichloride to one part carbon tetrachloride, or one part of carbon disulfide to four parts of carbon tetrachloride.

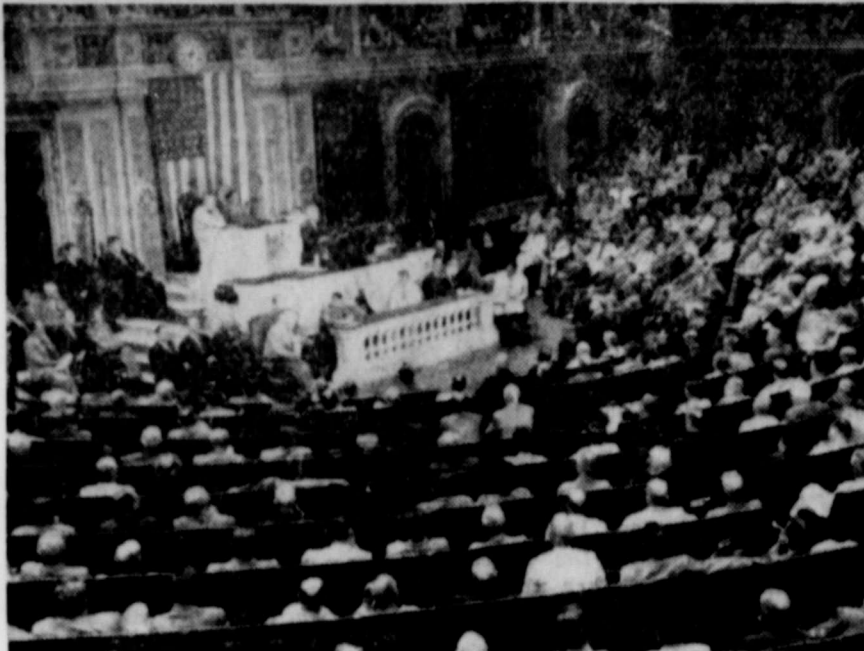
In steel bins, entomologists recommend three gallons of the 3 to 1 mixture, or two gallons of the 1 to 4 mixture for each 1,000 bushels of wheat. These dosages should be doubled where wheat is stored in tight, wooden bins.

Level off the surface of the grain at least six inches below the top of the bin before spraying the chemical evenly over the surface of the grain. If it is possible, the fumigant should be applied to the grain bins from the outside by means of a bucket pump or other type sprayer.

Gregg warns that these fumigants are poisonous to humans as well as to insects, so persons using these chemicals are advised to use caution, and avoid breathing their fumes or spilling the liquid on themselves or on their clothing.

By inspecting the bins for insects and spraying when necessary, farmers will have more grain in better condition for the millers, says Gregg.

Hale County School Districts to Vote On Consolidation

Three school districts in Hale County will vote on consolidation at a special election called by County Judge Ernest Tibbitts of Hale County for Saturday, August 28. The electorate will be voting on whether or not the Prairieview and Happy Union districts shall consolidate with Plainview.

Elections will be held simultaneously at the school building in Plainview and at the Happy Union and Prairieview school houses.

Prairieview district is northeast of Plainview, an area of about 33 sections of land in the extreme northeast portion of the county.

Happy Union district lies south of Plainview and consists of about 28½ sections.

Neither of these two districts has any bonded debts.

In order to carry it is necessary for the consolidation to receive a majority vote in each of the three districts.

The move to consolidate two more districts with the Plainview Independent School District follows closely consolidation and annexation of several other districts contiguous to the Plainview district.

Part of the Aiken district and the Bellview district southeast of Plainview, were first to be consolidated. Then followed annexation of the large rural High School District No. 2 and the Snyder Independent School District.

Selling of Ads On School Folder is Stopped at Plainview

The secret solicitations investigation committee of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce uncovered a "sucker" advertising scheme last week, said Raymond Lee Johns, CC secretary.

Representatives of a concern in Dallas selling advertising space of what was termed a school folder were stopped after they were asked for a letter of approval from the Chamber of Commerce.

During the investigation it was discovered that this concern has been selling similar advertising on song books and fans. Merchants pay for the advertisements and the concern awards the books, folders, and fans free to a church or school. Although it is not compulsory, according to a representative of the company, it is customary to collect for advertising at the time of sale.

In emphasizing its denial of the company's application for permission to solicit, the Chamber committee stated, "Decision of the committee is that while your company and its representatives may be entirely reliable and operating this form of advertising is worthless to the merchant, and it is doubtful whether school children will seriously use the folders."

"We urge you," said a member of the secret solicitations investigation committee, "to call the Chamber of Commerce offices immediately when approached by someone selling advertising or magazine subscriptions, and always require the person or persons involved to secure a letter from the Chamber of Commerce before you spend your money."—Plainview Herald

H. J. R. No. 39
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an Amendment to Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts of this State on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

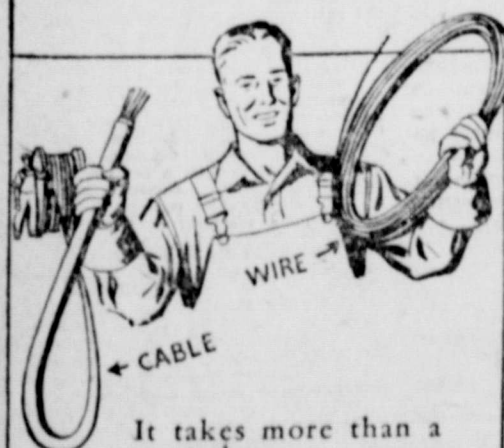

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an Amendment to Section 41, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers, shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties of this State beginning January 1, 1949; providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas, providing the time, means and manner thereof, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 41, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 41. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the amount of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county or any municipality, or in case where a paper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public welders shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 41, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis"; and
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 41, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines and each voter shall vote on each machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
