Talco-Bogata School Board Discusses Budget

One of the major items on the agenda for discussion at the July 6th Board meeting was the 1978-79 school budget. The new budget calls for expenditures of \$1,132,646 which is about \$82,000 more than the previous year's budget. Overall, this is an increase of 9 percent more than the previous year. While there are expected cost increases in most phases of the budget, the major increases are in Budget Item 11, Instruction, which includes instructional salaries and in Budget Item 51, Plant Maintenance and Operation, which includes the costs of utilities and other operational costs.

It was stated that the school's budget studies for the coming year indicate a need for about \$63,000 more than estimated

revenue from State and Local sources will provide. However, a balance of about \$35,000 in the General Operating Fund at the end of this school year will reduce this need to about \$28,000.

In an effort to keep from substantially increasing taxes and at the same time obtain the needed funds, the following plan will be used by the District for the 1978-79 school year. Because the District has already reached the legal tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation and in order to obtain the revenue needed, the District is increasing the assessment ratio from the present 50 percent to 75 percent. However, the tax rate will be lowered and the tax bill for most of the tax payers will be about the same as the

previous year even though each piece of property on the tax roll will be higher. This can be accomplished by lowering the tax rate and because a larger percentage of revenue can be diverted into the General Operating Fund by increasing the rate of assessment and also by using approximately \$22,000 for a reserve in the Interest and Sinking Fund. At the same time, a smaller percentage of revenue will be diverted into the Interest and Sinking Fund Account. While a rate of \$1.75 was required with the 50 percent assessment ratio, it is felt that only a rate of \$1.16 will be needed with the 75 percent assessment ratio for the 1978-79 school year.

The resignations of Willie Lee, head maintenance man at Rivercrest, and Sandra Cox, Bogata Math teacher, were accepted. It was stated that applications are now being taken for the maintenance job at Rivercrest and that in-

terested applicants should contact Superintendent Talmadge Morgan or Rivercrest Principal, Tillman Hale.

In other and final matters, approval was given to the various financial reports and for the purchase of three electric typewriters for the Commercial Department. \$75.00 was approved to help defray the expenses of the Rivercrest student representative to the National FFA Convention. In other matters discussed, it was mentioned that better rules and regulations were needed for the operation of the three little league baseball fields that are located on school property. Also, the feasibility of removing mistletoe from trees on the Bogata Campus was discussed.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, August 1, 1978 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Loyd Begins Ambulance Operations

Loyd Ambulance Service became the only game in town insofar as ambulance service in Red River County is concerned at midnight Saturday as the former City-County ambulance

arrangement was phased out. Loyd will operate with his own ambulance but out of the present mobile home and building which has been used during the past few years. He has leased the building, office, radio equipment, and adjacent parking space from the County for one year at \$200 rental per month.

As of midnight last Saturday, subscribers to the Loyd Service, which already operates in four other counties, will be entitled to medically-required ambulance service as needed within a 50-mile radius, with as few additional charges possible for unusual services or excessive distances.

Non-subscribers, however, will be charged \$50 plus one dollar per mile.

Subscribers to the service, recommended by the Mayor's Committee on Ambulance Service, totalled about 2,150 at the weekend. The minimum goal is 2,500, and those desiring to join have only until August 1 to join.

Briscoe Proclaims Texas Safety Week

Governor Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed July 25-31 as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week, centered around the proposition that "good farm and ranch management prevents farm and ranch accidents." Purpose of the week-long observance is to call attention to the needless accidents which result in over 100 occupational-related deaths and 10,000 occupational disabling injuries occurring annually to Texas farmers and ranchers.

Governor Briscoe pointed out that today's farmers and ranchers understand the importance of management as it relates to efficiency, productivity, and profits. In the face of potential tragedy and loss resulting from accidents, "accident prevention must be a farm and ranch management goal," observed the Governor.

Today, more than ever before, farmers and ranchers must get the most out of their capital and labor, and deal successfully with the ups and downs of the marketplace. An

accident resulting in personal injury or equipment damage can often make the difference between a profit and loss. Safety management is as important to every farm and ranch operation as is other aspects of production management.

The Governor noted that although there is no easy answer to the prevention of all accidents, many, if not most, accidents can be controlled through the use of safety work procedures and the use of safety equipment. Farmers and ranchers must keep informed about accident prevention methods, seek to acquire equipment with safety built into their designs, and know applicable safe practices as well as the requirements of laws concerning employee health and safety.

"Management to prevent farm and ranch accidents" is

the theme for this year's observance, announced Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Vice President for the Farm and Ranch Section of the Texas Safety Association.

Nelson emphasized that safety management is a responsibility of every farm and ranch manager interested in an efficient and profitable farm or ranch operation. Accidents cost money in property damage, medical care and in lost production time. Accident prevention is an essential management function.

Farm managers should watch for unsafe practices that can lead to accidents and insist

that workers adhere to and understand the reasons for the use of safe work procedures.

Nelson emphasized that "safety management includes getting your equipment ready for planting or harvest well in advance." Also, "Follow your own rules and set an example for your workers," advised the engineer.

Further points suggested by Nelson included the following: Keep yourself posted on new developments in farm and ranch safety and accident prevention. Watch for and participate in short courses on safety subjects. Read farm magazine articles on accident prevention. Also, post clippings for others to see.

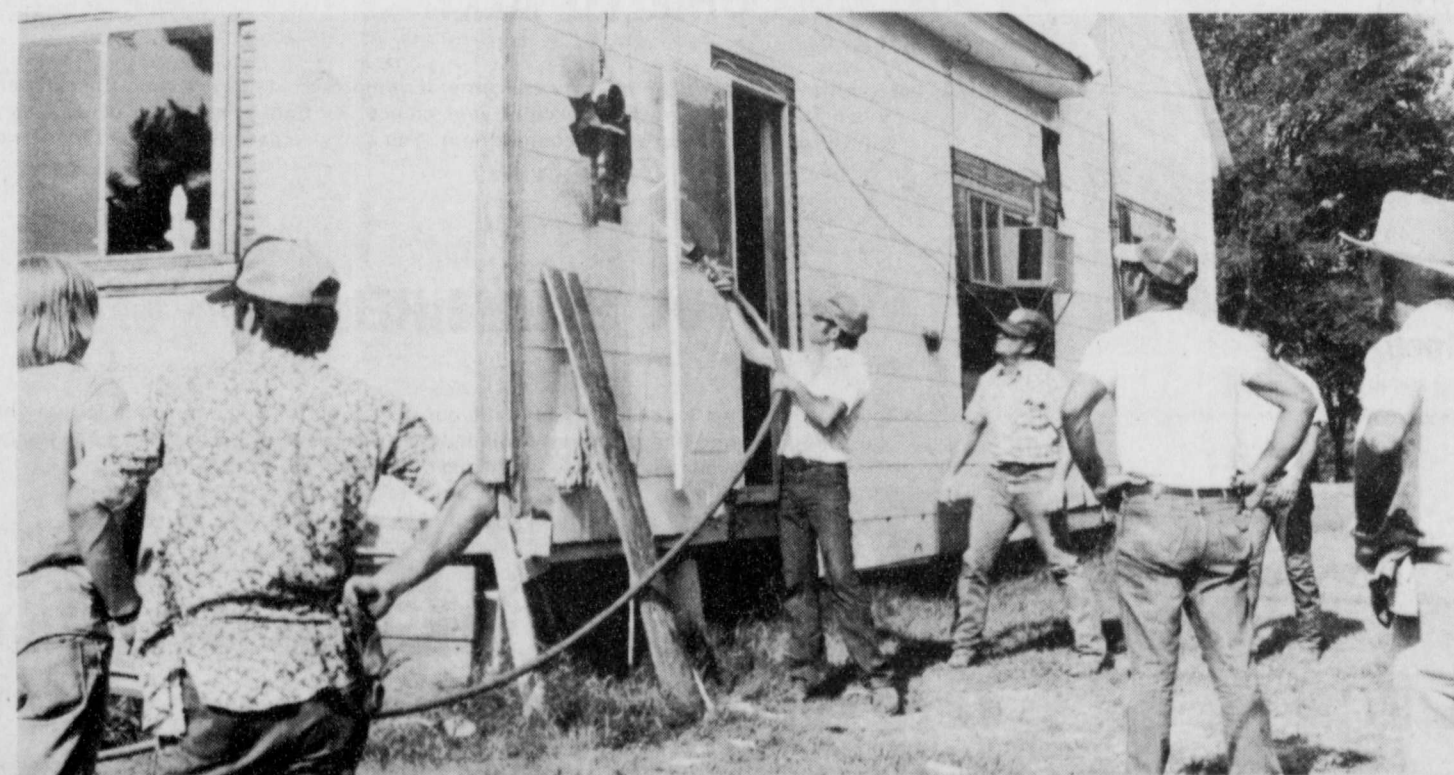
Honored With

Former Talco Resident Injured In Two Car Crash

Former Talco resident, Andy Morris, of Mount Pleasant, was injured Friday night at 10 p.m. on FM 1402 about 1/2 mile north of Mount Pleasant.

According to Texas Highway Patrol reports, a 1971 Chevrolet driven by Andy Morris and a 1971 Mercury driven by Anthony Brannon were both traveling south on 1402 when Brannon lost control of his vehicle and spun around in the

roadway, causing the Chevrolet to strike his car.

Brannon, 19, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Leon Rhea. Morris was taken to Titus County Memorial Hospital where he was in intensive care, but is reported to be doing satisfactorily.

Andy is the son of Mrs. Opal Morris of Talco.

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City Budget Hearing Scheduled For August 8

A hearing will be held on the Bogata City budget beginning at 7:00 p.m. August 8, 1978. The meeting will be held in the council room of the city office building, and will precede the regular August meeting of the city council.

Written and oral statements regarding the budget and Revenue Sharing may be presented and questions asked.

Senior Citizens, handicapped citizens, minority citizens as well as regular working, tax paying citizens are invited to participate in the hearing.

Revenue Sharing funds will be used mostly for capital expenditures, such as water

pipe, sewer pipe, payment on backhoe and renovation of the fire station and city building. The public transportation expenditure is for hot mix asphalt and road gravel. The public health expenditure was a quarterly payment to the Red River Ambulance Service. It has now been discontinued. The financial administrative expenditure is for auditors fees. The total proposed budget is \$142,426.00 of which 13.6 percent will be Revenue Sharing Funds. A complete copy of the proposed budget is on file at the city office in the Bogata City Building and is available during office hours.

Comptroller Mails \$19.8 Million To Texas Cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday notified the 42,000 holders of alcoholic beverage permits and licenses that after August 29 they will not need to file a certificate of good standing from his office with their annual renewal application.

"After enforcing this new law for a year, we have found that the overwhelming majority of businesses involved in the retail sale of alcoholic beverages are good taxpayers," Bullock said.

The Comptroller said his office will continue to certify

any delinquents to the Alcoholic Beverage Commission for revocation or suspension of their liquor permits.

Meanwhile, Bullock announced that his office has mailed checks totaling \$19.8 million to 900 Texas cities as their July share of the local option one percent city sales tax.

The July allocation raises to \$216.3 million the total received by the cities this year to date. This is a 13.4 percent increase over the same period last year. Annona received \$1,271.87 to date in 1978, compared to \$918.79 in 1977, with an increase of 38 percent.

Blossom has received \$3,179.59 to date, compared to \$2,675.84 in 1977, with an increase of 18 percent, while Bogata has received \$7,403.94 thus far, as to \$6,185.77 last year with a 19 percent increase.

Clarksville received \$4,389.62 for this period, totaling \$65,274.17 to date, over \$61,106.39 last year as a 6 percent increase.

Deport has received \$2,643.29 thus far in 1978, opposed to \$2,779.49 in 1977 for a 4 percent decrease, while Detroit received \$1,712.03 to date, over \$1,627.29 last year for a 5 percent increase.

Mount Pleasant received \$17,522.03 this period, totaling \$258,511.52 this year for a 14 percent increase over last year's \$225,321.68, while Mount Vernon received \$2,159.69 this period, totaling \$26,225.30 thus far in 1978, as compared to \$23,289.05 last year for a 12 percent increase.

Paris received a check for \$36,671.21 this period, totaling \$506,323.13 for the year, compared to \$475,061.78 last year for a six percent increase.

Sun Valley received payment of \$1,624.08 this period, with a total of \$10,801.75 thus far in 1978, with Talco receiving \$6,553.51 thus far in 1978 as compared to \$6,511.79 in 1977.

Toco showed a 34 percent decrease, receiving \$1,363.11 this period, for a total of \$7,784.66 to date as compared to \$11,850.388 last year.

50th Anniversary

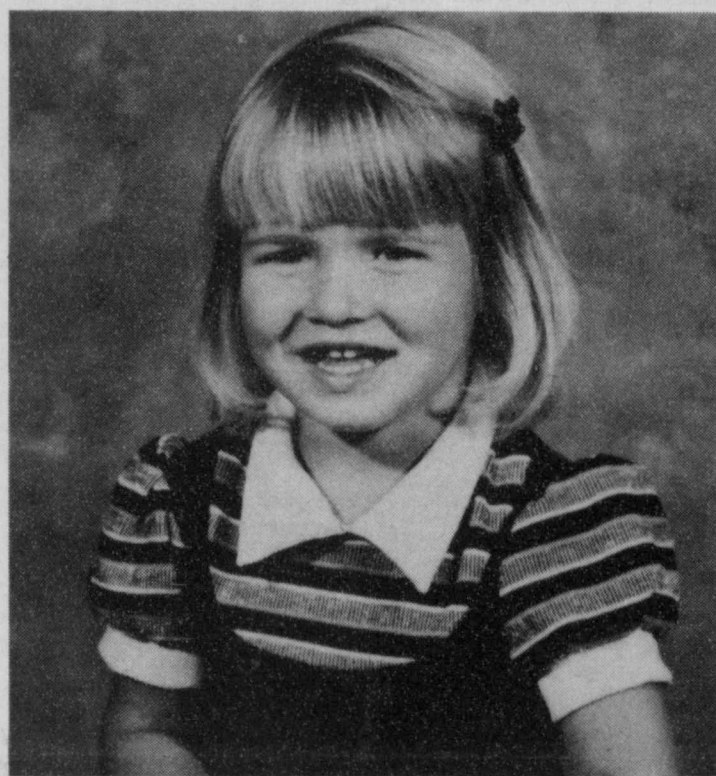

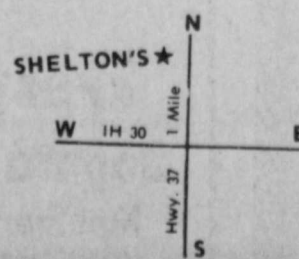

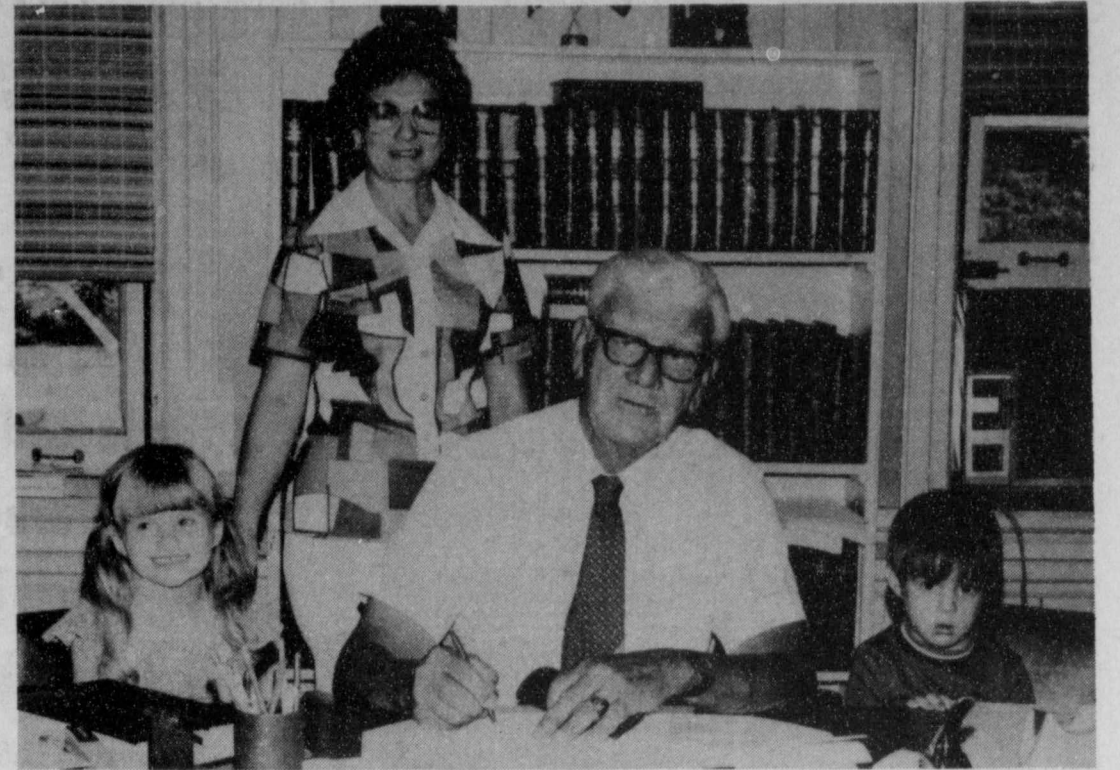
