FM Highway 168 To Get Seal Coat

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$82,000.00 for highway safety and betterment for Farm to Market Road improvement in Lamb County during 1970.

Included in the highway improvement program is 25.5 miles FM 168 from US 70 to the Hockley county line. The proposed seal coat will cost an estimated \$72,800 with the additional expenditure to be spent on US 70 from the Bailey county line to FM 303.

Local Boys Engage In Vo-Ag Program

Eight high schools boys are participating in a new type of schooling offered in the Vocational Agriculture department this year.

Earning credits for their on-the-job training, the boys are working in agriculture related jobs.

James Lively is working at Sorley Supply; Larry Farr, Olton Grain Co-Op; Lester Walker, Ed Thompson Implement; Gilbert Richardson, Olton Farm Supply; Juan Escamilio, Rube & Sons Garage; Gary Peel, Thompson Chevrolet; Jerry Loveless, Olton Motor Machine and Gary Gregory, American Grains.

John Paul Jones, vocational agriculture instructor, said that the program is set up primarily for those boys who will probably not go on to college, and who are interested in learning a trade and becoming self-supporting when they get out of high school.

"The boys must work a minimum of 15 hours and

over 25 hours per week," Jones said. "The instructors feel that when the boys work over 25 hours that their grades suffer."

"They attend school all morning, taking all required subjects, then I have them for special instructions pertaining to their field of study for one hour and then they have the 'on-the-job' training period."

Jones confided, "This is our first year with the program, but we have talked to others who have used this type program be-

fore and they have found it very satisfactory. They report that some of these boys go on to pursue employment in this particular field of study."

Jones said that the jobs must be agriculture related and that in keeping with this requirement, some boys were being placed in jobs related to mechanics, thereby giving them training in working on farm machinery.

Boys who participate in the program must be 16 years of

age and a junior or senior in high school.

Jones attended a training school for instructors in this program this summer. He reported that there was a few possibilities of other job openings but that none had opened up as yet.

"We feel that this is a real fine program and are glad to see Olton youth engaged in this type of program. We think it is a real benefit to the youngsters," Jones concluded.

School will be dismissed early Friday, Sept. 5 so that teachers may attend a general faculty meeting, according to Supt. Ray Schultz.

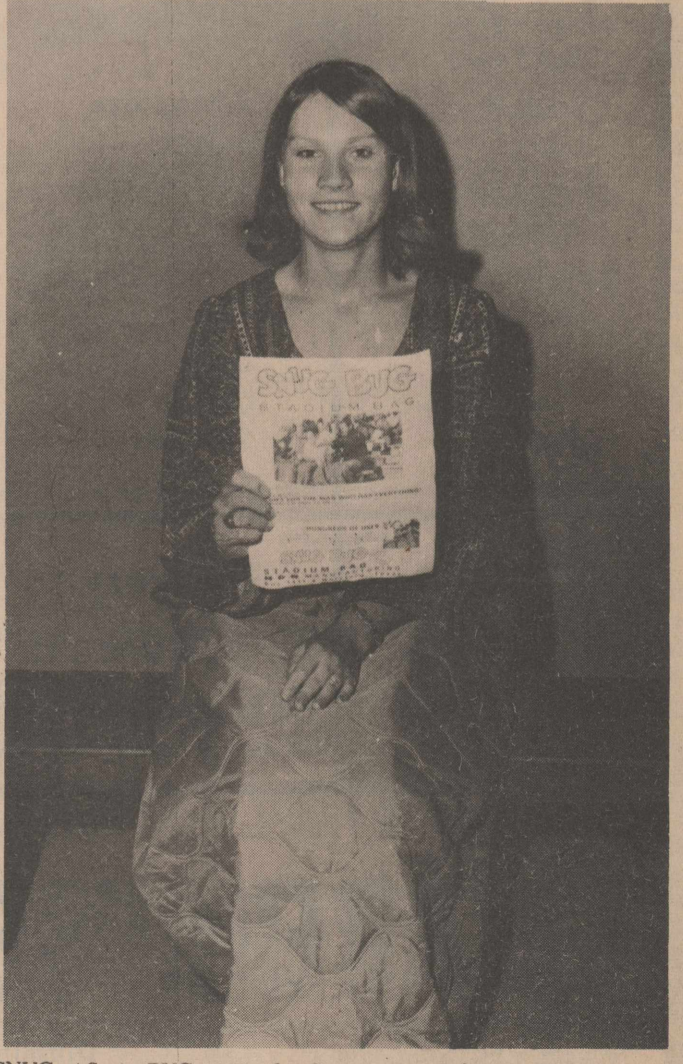
Schultz said that classes will dismiss at 3 p. m. Friday and that busses will run at that time.
