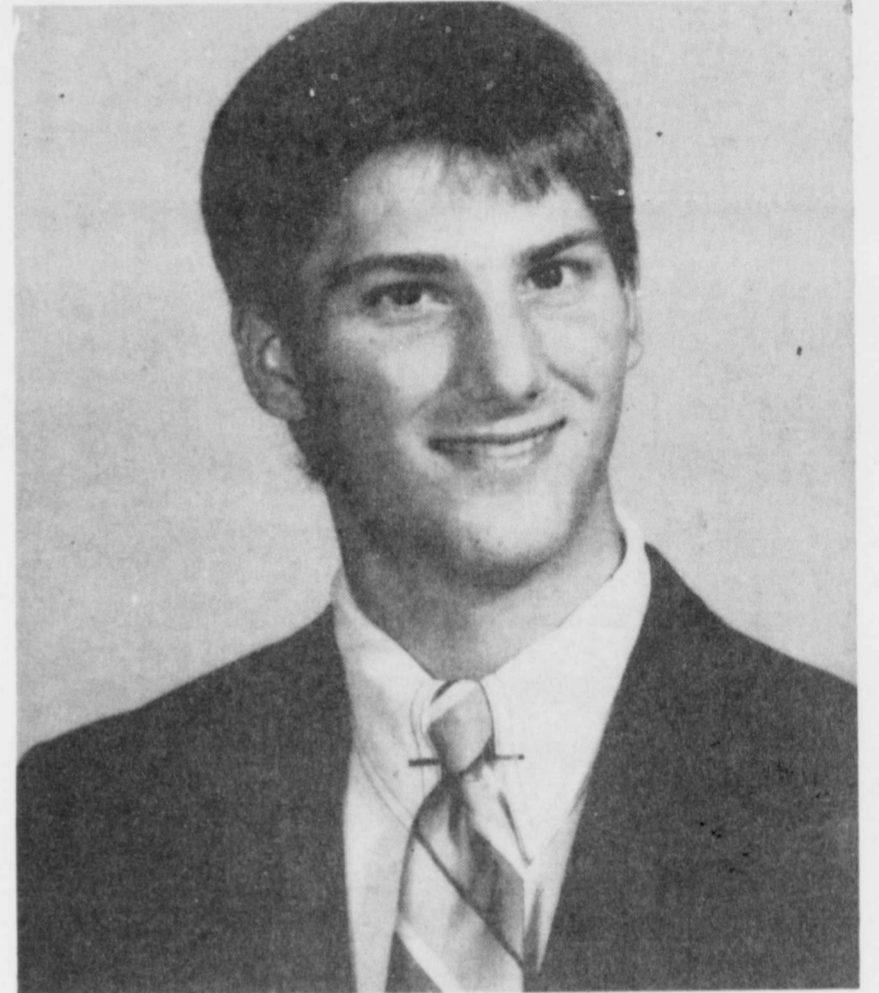

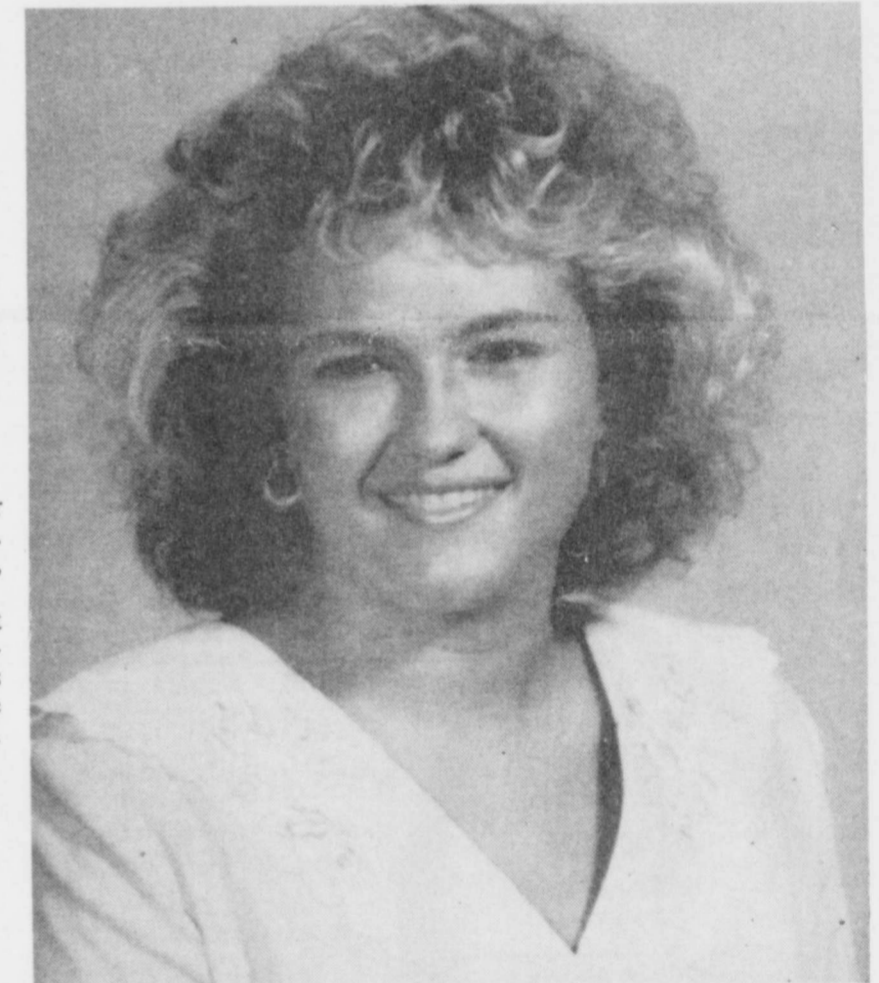
Alica is the daughter of Art and Ann Huffman of Paris. She plans to enter Paris Junior College in the fall and transfer later to a four year uni-

Trespasser Bill Becomes Law

State Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson, D-Brookston, announced today that Gov. Bill Clements has signed into law a bill that ends farmers' liability to trespassers. H.B. 239, authored by Patterson, "finally codifies that farmers don't have to be responsible for what happens to trespassers on their land. It removes much of the ugly cloud of potential litigation that hangs over farmers concerning people who didn't belong on their property to begin with," Patterson said.

For years civil codes have specified significant limitations on liability landowners owed to people using land for recreational purposes. But

for some reason some of the limitations had never been spelled out regarding trespassers and that fact had been the grounds for some lawsuits. "That was illogical," Patterson said. "As long as a farmer wasn't malicious, the mere size of acreage needed for agriculture production meant that the average farmer couldn't monitor all his operation at one time, nor should he have to. Also the complex machinery used in today's agriculture is inherently dangerous to outsiders not familiar with it. Farms are businesses and farmers shouldn't have to be responsible for outsiders unknown to them getting hurt at such complex operations."

Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that May's statewide sales tax payments to cities, counties and transit authorities continued to follow this year's steady upward trend.

"We've watched sales tax rebates across the state grow by more than 11 percent overall this year. More money is being pumped into our economy, which is great for the state and for local governments," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$117.8 million were sent Friday to 1047 cities that impose local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent, according to Bullock.

Houston received the largest check, which totaled \$20.1 million, an increase of 5.7 percent over the city's May 1988 payment.

Deport received \$2,630.89 for this period, compared to \$2,961.55, for an 11.63% increase. Blossom received \$3,198.91 for this period, for an 18.23% increase over last year's payment.

Paris received \$271,696.92 for a 7.05% increase.

Bogata received \$4,362.18, compared to \$4,651.24, for a 4.38% increase. Clarksville received

\$26,485.25 for an 8.16% increase while Detroit received \$2,546.56 for a 42.85% decrease.

Mt. Pleasant received \$117,151.30 for a 21.09% decrease.

Talco received \$2,258.57, compared to \$3,329.20, for a 21.09% decrease.

Bullock added that another \$10.5 million was allocated to 91 counties that collect the one-half percent county sales tax.

May's checks represent 5 taxes collected in March by monthly filers and during the 1989 first quarter by quarterly filers. The deadline for both monthly and quarterly taxpayers to file sales tax reports with the Comptroller's office was April 20.

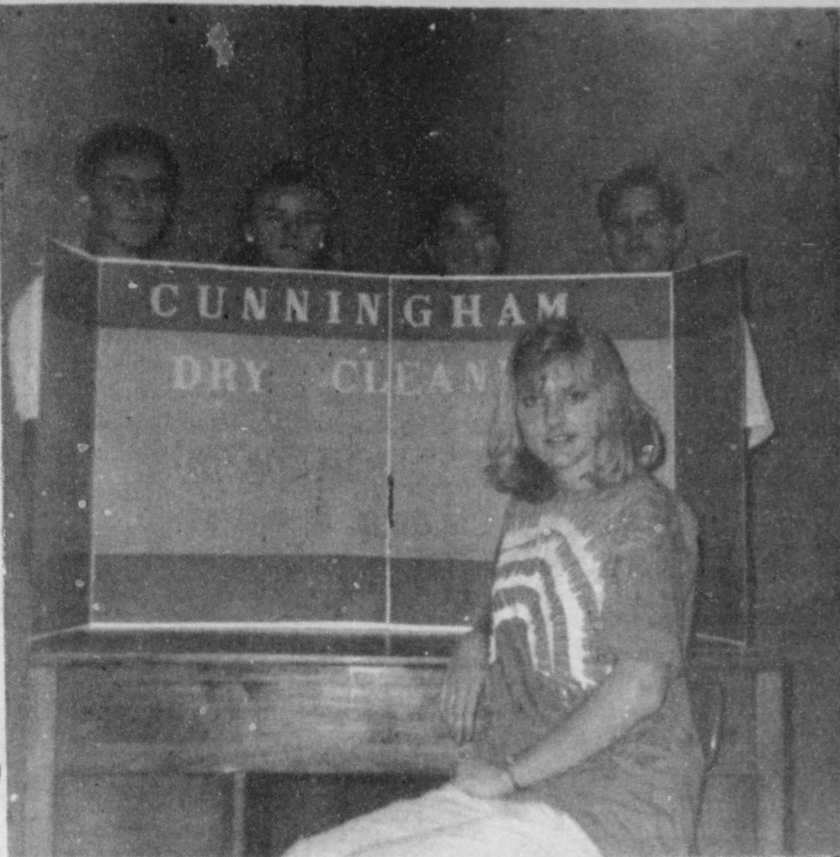

Fruited Pot Roast

In a large heavy skillet or dutch oven, brown 3 pounds boneless chuck roast in 2 tbsp. cooking oil. Area Code 214 To Change To 903

Beginning in late 1990, some 200 north and northeast Texas cities will have a new telephone area code.

Contel of Texas, Southwestern Bell and the 10 other independent telephone companies currently serving the existing 214 area code, today unveiled plans for establishing area code 903.

According to Dennis Myers, president of Contel of Texas, renewed growth in the region, along with an almost exhausted supply of available telephone numbers in the 214 area code, have created the need to establish a new source for additional numbers. Telephone forecasts indicate that all available area code 214 telephone numbers will be used by 1991. If those forecasts hold, telephone officials anticipate the 903 area code would become effective around November 1990.

Myers pointed out that all customers in both the 214 and 903 areas will keep the same seven-digit telephone number that they currently have. The change will not affect long distance rates.

Telephone customers in the new 903 area code won't have to worry

about receiving their calls after next year's conversion. Calls dialed to the old area code will automatically be routed to the new code.

"For six months after the conversion, a caller dialing 2-1-4, followed by a number located in the new 903 code will be routed to the latter number," Myers explained. "After that initial 180-day period, intercept operators and telephone company recordings will instruct the caller to dial using the new 903 area code."

Updated information on the 214 and 903 area codes will be sent to telephone customers periodically to prepare for the late 1990 conversion.

"We believe a change of this magnitude will significantly affect our customers," Myers said. "That's why we're making the announcement a year and a half in advance. We intend to provide our business customers with as much advanced opportunity to plan for changes they may need to make on any stationery, business forms or advertising. In addition, residence customers will have time to notify out-of-town friends and relatives of the new area code."

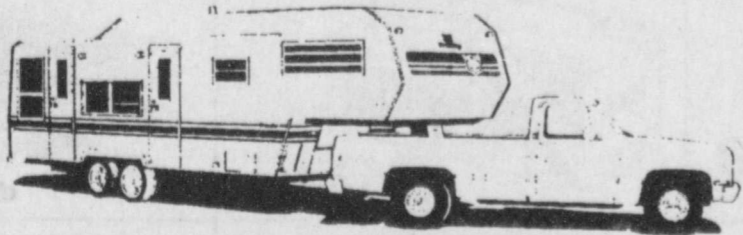

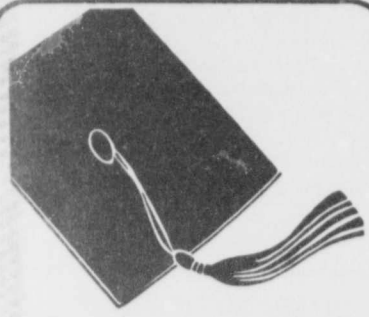

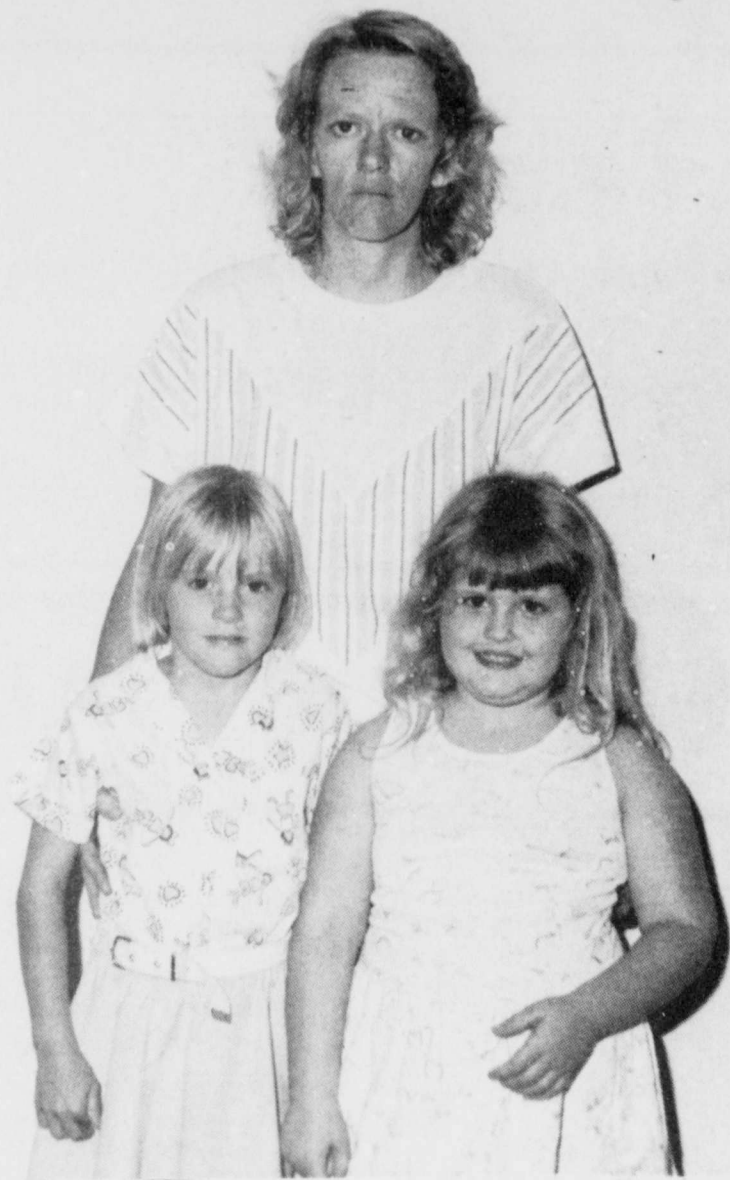
