Titus Co. Officers Make Arrests Near Talco

Two Oklahoma fugitives were arrested recently by Titus County officers, and turned over to Oklahoma officers.

Newly elected constable James Robison, and Deputy Sheriff Jim Talley made a routine check late Saturday of a car parked alongside the road on the Talco highway near L. B. Kaylors' barn south of Talco. They found two men sleeping in it, who failed to produce any identification or give a reasonable account of themselves and they were arrested.

The men gave fictitious names, but Sheriff Paul Brown traced their car to Anadarko, Ok., and when he talked to the sheriff there and described the men, the sheriff identified them tentatively as the Thompsons, nephew and uncle. J. W. Thompson was wanted for being AWOL for eleven months from Fort Hood, for being a suspect in an armed robbery in Oklahoma, for passing hot checks and car theft. Charley Thompson was wanted for passing hot checks and car theft.

The Oklahoma sheriff warned that the men were dangerous and every precaution should be taken with them.

The men refused to admit they were the Thompsons. On Sunday after two local men held church services at the jail, Charley Thompson asked to speak to Sheriff Brown alone. He then admitted who he was and that the other man was J. W. Thompson.

Both men waived extradition and Sheriff Peters from Hobart, Ok., and the sheriff from Anadarko took them to Oklahoma in handcuffs and leg irons.

Rain and Colder Weather Strike This Section

A slow easy rain began falling in this section Saturday afternoon and continued intermittently through Sunday night. The official government rain gauge, in charge of A. C. Nixon at Deport, registered .91 of an inch of rain over the period.

A cold wave moved in Monday night and temperatures dropped to 27 degrees Tuesday morning to send the mercury to the lowest reading this year. A heavy frost covered the area with the drop in temperature. Clouds which appeared early Tuesday and Wednesday mornings soon gave way to a bright sunshine.

Small grains, legumes and winter pastures needed the moisture. Livestock men and dairy farmers see extra grazing as a result of slow falling showers and light rains, where the moisture seeps into the ground.

Some water was caught in overground tanks and cisterns, but the run-off was not sufficient to replenish pools and lakes.

Pewitt Field Gets Raise in Quota

Austin. — Unseasonably warm January weather has helped the producers of oil in Pewitt Ranch field, east of Talco.

The Railroad Commission authorized Monday a 14-day producing schedule for the field in January, instead of 10 days as previously ordered. The commission said that "unseasonably warm weather" permitted the pipeline serving the field to handle more oil than had been expected.

There are 113 wells in the field served by Humble's 5-inch line.

First deeds right-of-way for the straightening of the Glade-water Highway have been obtained by Upshur County. Funds for straightening Highway 271 have been allocated by the state highway department, but the county must first buy right-of-way.

Thieves Make Big Haul at Buckman Drug in Bogata

Burglars entered the Buckman Drug Store in Bogata on Tuesday night and made off with about \$1,200 in money and merchandise, according to Aubrey Buckman, owner and operator.

Entrance was gained by breaking down the back door. The thieves knocked off the safe's knob and hammered the door open. They secured about \$700 in cash, \$200 in checks, \$200 in jewelry, \$150 in watches, fountain pens, billfolds and cigarette lighters, and \$30 worth of narcotics.

Sportsmen Report Fair Hunting In Season Rapidly Drawing to Close

The hunting season that is rapidly drawing to a close has been only fair, according to sportsmen. Probably a little better than that of last fall and winter, but nothing to brag about.

Drought had its effect on wildlife, and rains came too late to provide much of a growing season for food and cover.

The quail crop was fair, but better than the previous year. Shooting season ends for these birds on Sunday, Jan. 16.

Squirrel season closed Dec. 31 and opens again May 1. These little animals were fairly plentiful, but mosquitoes were bad at the opening of the season.

The trapping season closes on January 31. Take of trappers has been fair.

Of interest to deer hunters is report of another shipment of

South Texas deer to the Snake Creek Game Reserve in Northern Titus and Morris counties. The truck load, consisting of 13 bucks and six does, was released on the Brannon farm in Morris County.

All animals were sleek and fat and showed no signs of injury as a result of their long truck ride.

The Texas Game and Fish Commission has announced, also, that still another load is slated for the area this week, the third this season. Last year more than 200 deer were released in the Snake Creek area.

Dale Will Attend Training School For Mechanics

He is a body mechanic and selected the new model course, taking advanced study in model changes.

Bob Sandlin, head of the company, said he sent Dale to the Garland center to give his customers the benefit of improved service techniques taught there.

The Garland training center, with more than 26,000 sq. ft. of floor space, has eight specialized shop classrooms, for use by the Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick, Cadillac, GMC Truck & Coach, Fisher Body and United Motors Service divisions of GM. Each division supplies a highly trained instructor for its course at the center, which is managed by L. S. Kuehn.

GM officials expect a total of 5,000 mechanics to attend the center each year. Similar attendance is expected at other training centers when they are completed.

Harlow C. Curtice, president of General Motors, explained that the purpose of the centers is "to insure that the people who buy our cars and trucks will continue to receive efficient and satisfying service." TRUE STORY WITH FICTITIOUS NAMES ABOUT 2 AUTOMOBILES

During January, we as a civic group in our community, the Talco PTA, are studying safety measures. We can really realize the need for safety on our highways, after the final total of traffic fatalities in our nation showed that Texas led in deaths on the roads during the holidays.

It is the responsibility of each individual to do all he can to bring these figures down for this is one thing that Texas leads in that we cannot afford to brag about. We cannot be reminded too often of our need to be more careful and to teach our children the real need for safety in automobiles, or the following could be the fate of one of our own:

A Texas Teenicide—Roy Colt and Lester Gaither (Names are Fictitious) had three things in common. Listed in order of their importance to the gentlemen themselves, they were these: Each had a teenage son, each had a new automobile; and each lived with his family in Gruver, Hansford County, Texas.

This was the status quo prior to the date of May 9, 1950. On that date the situation changed. Mr. Colt still lived with his family in Gruver and still had a teenage son but no new automobile. Mr. Gaither was less fortunate—he had neither a son nor a new car but he did still live in Gruver with what remained of his family.

Here's how the picture changed with a sudden impact of tragedy: Mr. Colt's auto was one of the lighter models with a long-standing reputation for speed. Mr. Gaither's was a modern version of a familiar make with a rapidly growing prestige as the fastest thing on the road. On the evening of May 9, these two gentlemen had extended the use of their cars to their respective sons.

Young Gaither, aged 17, had picked up his 16 year old girl friend and they had spent a couple of pleasant hours driving. The junior Colt, 18 years old, had picked up his best friend, Alfred Hoffman, of the same age, and they had made the rounds of several of the soda bars and youth hangouts around town.

as air conditioning, power steering, power brakes and other major improvements."

At about half past ten o'clock that night fate brought the two autos and their occupants alongside each other at a traffic light. When the signal flashed green young Gaither crammed his foot into the carburetor with the apparent intention of showing the lighter vehicle his exhaust. Colt, however, had both his reputation as a speed merchant and that of his power plant to uphold so he dug a little gravel with his rear wheels and put the torch to the carburetor in an equally rapid dash.

For two or three blocks they spun down the nearly deserted street fender to fender. The larger and more powerful engine of the Gaither car, however, soon began to pay off and Gaither pulled ahead with his speedometer needle racking 85. Colt tagged along at 75. Both were in a 30 mile per hour zone in the heart of the small town.

There were still those who would argue and discuss the relative merits of the two vehicles and speculate on which is the faster. Unfortunately, these two youthful drivers never qualified as experts on the subject. For, suddenly, at full speed, both cars rammed headon into the side of a long string of boxcars attached to a train which blocked a grade crossing.

Both Gaither and his young female companion were instantly killed. Al Hoffman, the passenger in the other car, died too; but eighteen year old Colt lived and still lives as the sole survivor of the quartet who matched their egos as rash racers to add a word to the language—TEENICIDE!
