The 102-member Antelope Band received a first division rating from each of the three judges to gain the top rating for the tenth consecutive year. Other AA bands winning first divisions were Morton, Hale Center, and Dimmitt.

Highlighting the band's routine was the special revolving square drill which received its "world premier" here in 1965. The Abernathy band is the only known band to successfully execute the drill. The band also played "Tri-

umphal March" and "Born Free" which won them first place in the annual Panhandle-South Plains Fair Parade earlier this year.

### CITY MANAGER ATTENDS MEET AT BIG SPRING

Y. F. Snodgrass and Bob Sokoll, city manager, attended the 14th annual West Texas Chamber of Commerce Industrial Development Conference in Big Spring last week.

One of the highlights of the meeting was the announcement of the Blue Ribbon City Awards program for cities of 12,000 and under. This award is to be used to publicly acknowledge the results of work by cities in the Small Town Economic Progress program (STEP).

Six categories have been established which set forth minimum standards for various sized cities. When a city attains the goals outlined in the category it will be awarded a certificate of achievement. Upon completion of the goals in all six categories a certificate, an outdoor road sign and public ceremonies will acknowledge the accomplishment, according to the STEP Chairman John Ben Shepperd of Odessa.

The six categories are: Tourism, Beautification, Education, Parks and Recreation, Industrial Development and Local Government. There is no contest between cities, but rather achievement goals which every city can attain.

The chairman stated that any town which indicates a desire to participate in STEP may enter the Blue Ribbon City Award program by meeting minimum requirements. Following entry, a team of STEP speakers will attend a meeting of community leaders to outline the necessary work for the community to qualify for one or more of the category awards.

Subjects discussed at the industrial conference included technical training institutes and their role in industrial development, the role of higher education in creating a better climate for industry, state and regional planning for industrial growth, natural resources of West Texas and their proper development.

Outstanding authorities on the subjects who presented the talks were Dr. Grover E. Murray, president of Texas Tech; Dr. Stanley Arbingast, Bureau of Business Research, Austin; Dr. Frank Konecny, dean of James Connally Technical Institute, Waco; and James Ray, director of the planning division, Governor's office, Austin.

STEP speakers and team members attended an indoctrination session for their work in the STEP and Blue Ribbon City Awards programs.

### Mustangs Win Wild Air Battle, 56-32

The Abernathy Antelopes, thwarted by a seemingly trifling third quarter, dropped their last football game of the 1967 season to the Olton Mustangs last Friday night by a score of 56 to 32.

Two pass interceptions and a recovered Abernathy fumble, which all three produced Mustang tallies, accounted for the majority of Olton's 34 points scored during the third quarter.

Although Olton raced away with the third period, Abernathy was in command of the first stanza taking a 8-to-0 advantage into the second stanza. The Abernathy TD came when Billy Elkins sliced through the right side of the line from six yards out. A pass from Burl Fuller to Travis Leach earned a pair of extra points for the Lopes.

Olton's first score came early in the second period when the Mustang's workhorse, Benny Akin, powered his way to

pay dirt on a four-yard jaunt. The try-for-extras failed. Late in the quarter, a ten-yard pass to Lannie McClain with Akin carrying the extras pushed the Mustangs into the lead for the duration of the game.

Akin carried the ball 50 yards to the seven yard line early in the third quarter setting up for Kenneth Johnson the initial score of that explosive period. Charles McClain returned an intercepted Antelope pass 55-yards moments later for the second score. R. L. Copeland caught passes of 20 and 35 yards for the third and fourth score with a 15-yard aerial to McClain producing the last six-pointers of the quarter. Toe specialist Steve Spain made good on each of his four kicks.

Abernathy came to life early in the fourth stanza going 55 yards to pay dirt. James Byers earned the points carrying the ball over from six yards out. The extra point went for naught.

Leach caught a 12-yard pass minutes later to capitalize on 51-yard march which began with an intercepted Olton pass. After a futile Mustang thrust, a 30-yard bomb again from Fuller to Leach further thinned the margin. Both of the extra-point efforts failed.

Akin ended Abernathy's domination of the quarter when he broke loose and raced 30 yards for the Mustang's final TD. Johnny Lewis added two extra points.

Abernathy's final score came when Clark Riley snatched onto a 15-yard Fuller pass and then went into the end zone standing up.

The game ended the regular season for both teams; however, Olton owns a record of ten straight wins which gives them the right to go into the bi-district playoffs. They will play the district 4-AA champions, the Denver City Mustangs, at Denver City next Friday.

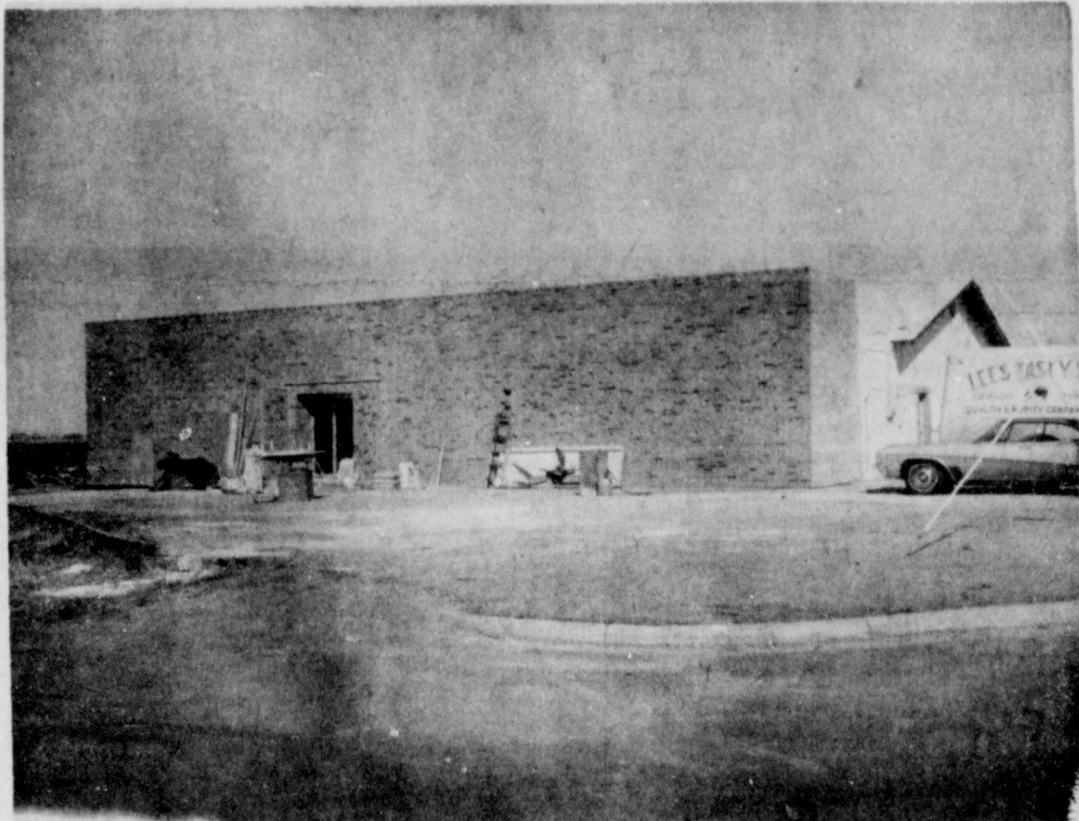

## LBJ Proclaims Farm-City Week

"In less than a generation, the American farmer has created a greater agricultural abundance than his predecessors through all the generations of our history achieved," said President Lyndon B. Johnson in proclaiming Nov. 17-23 as National Farm-City Week.

"THIS REVOLUTION wrought by the American farmers," he continued, "is one of the triumphs of our age. Even though he himself has not always received his fair share of the nation's prosperity — a circumstance which his country in good conscience cannot permit to continue — he has helped to improve the conditions of life for every American."

"The average consumer today enjoys a more abundant supply of food than any people has ever known — and he pays a lesser share of his income for it than ever before."

"One of the most vital contributions to the achievements of American agriculture has been understanding and cooperation between farm and city — an interdependence that has supported our national development."

Moreover, American agriculture now represents hope for cities and villages far beyond our shores, where the spectre of poverty threatens the stability — and even the peace — of the world.

"IN CALLING upon all Americans to join in the observance of Farm-City Week, which is coordinated nationally by Kiwanis International President Johnson emphasizes the necessity of facing the challenge of the future in agriculture simultaneously with meeting the needs of today; the need to help hungry nations help themselves to become more productive — the ultimate solution to food

shortage problems.

The President also noted the moral and practical imperative of creating a better total environment for all citizens in both rural and urban areas, by removing causes of poverty, discrimination, and ignorance, by controlling pollution, and by wisely and productively using our soil, water, forests, and other renewable resources; and the importance of continuing to build an economically sound family-farm agriculture and a visually beautiful countryside.

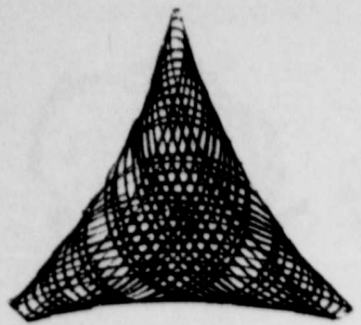

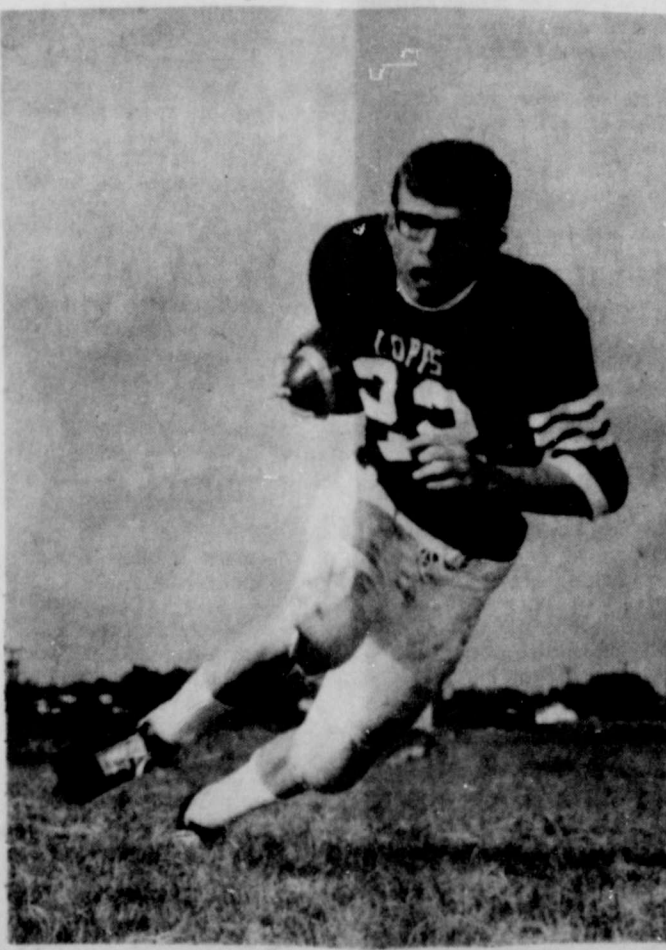

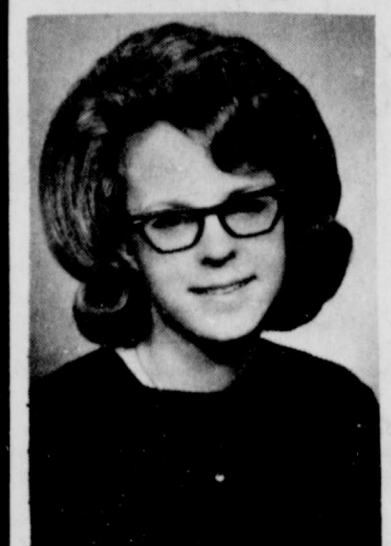
