PERRYTON GETS TEST FOR OIL

THE EMPIRE GAS AND FUEL COMPANY TO DRILL FOR OIL

The Empire Gas & Fuel Company of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, one of the REAL BIG Companies will drill a test for oil and gas in Oklahoma, on a block of acreage in Texas and Beaver Counties, Oklahoma, Townships one and two, Range 19 and 20.

The acreage for this test was blocked by H. C. and M. R. Coffee and L. S. Hobbs of Perryton, and thru Hastie & Smith of Wichita, Kansas, a contract was secured for the drilling of a test to a depth of 3500 feet unless oil or gas is encountered at a lesser depth. The people of Perryton are indeed fortunate in having two such men as Hastie and Smith to come here to test for oil, for they are certainly two live wires when it comes to getting action in the oil business, they have done here in 4 months what is generally takes from one to two years to do, and also in getting one of the largest oil companies in the United States to do the drilling which assures the people of this vicinity that if there is oil, they will find it.

The Geological surveying was done by Hamilton E. Anderson of Wichita, Kansas a Geologist of wide experience, and as good as the best. Mr. Anderson spent some four months work on this survey checking over a large area, every direction, and finds one of the most pronounced structures in the Panhandle.

Mr. Archie R. Kautz of the Geological Staff of the Empire Companies spent a part of August with Mr. Anderson checking over the main points of the Structure.

On Thursday, December 7th Mr. Layton of the Empire Companies, run the lines on the survey, and established the location for the Well and Mr. Anderson drove the stake.

Mr. McDonnell of the Empire Companies, who is Production Manager of Kansas and Oklahoma, was here this week making arrangements for sites for unloading material, and putting up fuel tanks and completing details for the beginning of operations.

Mr. Walter Harding is now here and he will have charge of the placing material on the ground at location and also have charge of the drilling of this well.

This well will be spudded in before February 1st, 1923, and here's hoping that it will be a real Oil Well as the country and people here deserve it and could use the benefits that would be derived therefrom, and if it is possible that these people open up an Oil Field here it will make Perryton a City of several thousand over night as that is the history of all fields, a big gas field would eliminate the high price fuel, and Perryton would make a big manufacturing center and the Coal Strikes would not worry the people whether they would freeze during the winter months, and we would not all have to be millionaires to buy coal.

We should get busy and try to get a Hotel of sufficient size to take care of the public that will come to our own, as that is one of the drawbacks that we are up against right now, we have one of the best farming countries on earth now and if we can add an Oil Field to this then we would certainly be fortunate.

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2 BANK BANDITS SHOT, 1 CAUGHT

TRIO CAPTURED SOON AFTER ROBBERING STATE BANK IN BURBANK, OKLAHOMA

Pawhuska, Ok., Dec. 8.—The Burbank State bank was robbed at 1 o'clock this afternoon by masked men, who obtained \$4,000 and fled in a car toward Pawhuska, but were captured after a gun battle with a sheriff's posse, two of the bandits being wounded.

One man gave his name as Williams and two others said their names were Rhodes and were brothers. Williams lives here and the Rhodes brothers live in Barnsdall.

Williams was shot in the hip and one of the Rhodes boys in the shoulder. The other robber was unarmed and surrendered.

Mrs. L. E. Hall, cashier, was alone in the bank at the time of the robbery. Leaving one man outside with the motor car, which had been stolen this morning in Pawhuska, the other robbers entered the bank and demanded the money, which was given them at the point of guns.

Attempt to Escape Futile. Less than fifteen minutes later Mrs. Hall had notified the sheriff's office in Pawhuska and Under-sheriffs Jenkins and Odell and Mecham were on their way to meet the robbers.

Driving their car at a rate of sixty miles an hour the officers came in sight of the trio coming towards Pawhuska at terrific speed. When the bandits became aware that they had driven into the sheriff's force they attempted to turn the car and start back, but their car stuck in the road. The bandits leaped from the car, fleeing across the prairie.

Loot Scattered in Roadway. The younger of the Rhodes boys was unarmed and at the first shot of the officers threw up his hands and surrendered.

The other two returned the fire of the officers, one with a .45 caliber and one with a .38 revolver. None of their shots took effect. Williams and Rhodes surrendered after being wounded by the officer's bullets.

Between \$3,500 and \$4,000 was recovered from the robbers. Seeing that they would be taken the robbers had started throwing money right and left when they started to run. Most of this was recovered, however, and was brought in a sack to Pawhuska.

Both wounded robbers were taken brought to Pawhuska, where they were placed in a hospital.

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The younger robber is in jail here.—Kansas City Journal-Post.

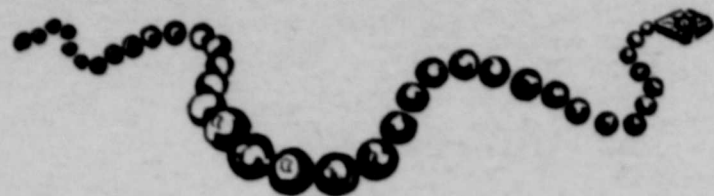

FARM DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

The Santa Fe Railway is plan-
ning to run a demonstration train in
co-operation with the Texas Agri-
cultural College over its lines in
Texas this winter, announces F. A.
Lehman, General Manager and Vice
President of the Panhandle lines of
the Santa Fe Railway.

The schedule will be announced in
the near future. It is planned to have
the train run in the Panhandle and
the South Plains late in March, said
Mr. Lehman.

The Agricultural College will pro-
vide the speakers and the exhibits
necessary to make the demonstration
while the Santa Fe Railway will fi-
nance and operate the train. The
Agricultural College is doing a great

The charge is still made that the railroads are asking returns
on "watered stock."

Congress undertook to ascertain the facts through the Valua-
tion Act, which was introduced by Senator LaFollette. The
Interstate Commerce Commission has been conducting this
valuation for nine years, and the following elements are consid-
ered: Cost of reproduction in the years 1913 to 1916, cost of
reproduction less depreciation, original cost, other values and
elements of value. Stocks and bonds or earning capacity have
not been considered.

From all the data available the Interstate Commerce Com-
mission has found—

Valuation of all the railways in 1920. \$18,900,000,000

Net capitalization of all the railways
December 31, 1919. 16,939,515,522

Value above capitalization. \$ 1,960,484,478

Otherwise stated, the value of the railroads is TWO BILLION
DOLLARS in excess of the net face of all stocks and bonds. If
present day unit prices had been used, the excess would be far
greater.

This should dispose of the question of "watered stocks."

But recently reference has been made to the "valuation that
the railroads have succeeded in putting over on the Interstate
Commerce Commission." The valuation work on the Santa Fe
is nearly completed and we know that we have not "put any-
thing over" on the Interstate Commerce Commission. On the
contrary, we believe that the Interstate Commerce Commission
has been over-strict in its rules and methods of valuation, and
that as a consequence it has greatly undervalued our railroad.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR A SPECIAL ACT OF THE LEGISLATURE AT ITS NEXT REGULAR SESSION CONVENING IN THE CITY OF AUSTIN, TEXAS, JANUARY, 1923, RELATIVE TO CERTAIN CHANGES IN THE STREETS AND PLAT OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

That the City of Perryton, in Ochiltree County, Texas, will apply for a special Act of the Legislature at the next regular session thereof convening in the City of Austin, Texas, January, 1923, after thirty days from the first publication of this notice, giving and granting to said city authority to close and reduce certain streets situated in and shown upon the plat of said city as dedicated to public use, as follows:

FIRST—To reduce the street on the west side of Block No. 40 in said city known as "West Main Court" to alley 20 feet in width and establishing the property line at the center of said alley, and to widen Main Street through said block 40 to 125 feet from property line to property line, the center of said street being the center of said block No. 40, and to adjudge all that part of said Block No. 40 west of said Main Street after passing through said block to be a part of Block No. 39, and to plat that part of said Block No. 39 as thus established into town lots to conform to all other blocks and lots in said town situated on said Main Street.
